





















THE BIG EAST MEANS...

BOWL GAMES

- The BIG EAST has always assured itself of prestigious bowl invitations. The league champion will attend the Tostitos Fiesta, FedEx Orange or Nokia Sugar Bowl as part of its membership in the Bowl Championship Series. The Hokies have represented the league in two of the aforementioned bowls the Nokia Sugar Bowl (twice) and the FedEx Orange Bowl.
- The BIG EAST and the Toyota Gator Bowl have a multiyear pact, which allows the Gator Bowl to select a BIG EAST bowl-eligible team after the league's representative in the Bowl Championship Series has been determined. The BIG EAST has sent a team to the Gator Bowl for seven of the past eight seasons. Since joining the league, Tech has represented the BIG EAST in four Gator Bowls.
- The Insight Bowl is entering its fifth year as a partner with the BIG EAST. The Phoenix, Ariz.-based game will select a third league team.
- The conference is in the second year of an agreement with the Continental Tire Bowl. The agreement allows the Charlotte, N.C.-based bowl to choose a fourth league squad. A representative from the BIG EAST conference will meet a team from the Atlantic Coast Conference.
- The BIG EAST is in its second season of a deal to send a team to the Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl, played at Pacific Bell Park in San Francisco. A BIG EAST team will be pitted against a squad from the Mountain West Conference. Tech won the inaugural bowl, beating Air Force 20-13 on New Year's Eve of 2002.
- Tech holds the longest active bowl string in the BIG EAST. The Hokies have been to 10 straight bowls.



A SHOT AT THE NATIONAL TITLE

- The BIG EAST has been a charter member in each of the major bowl agreements, designed to help determine a national champion. It began with the Bowl Coalition in 1992 followed by The Bowl Alliance in 1995. The Bowl Championship Series began in 1998 and will continue this season.
- The Hokies have been to a bowl every year since the BIG EAST started round-robin play. A league team has played for a claim of the national championship eight times, including Virginia Tech following the 1999 season and Miami, which won the national title two years ago and was the runner-up last season.



- The league established its own regional television package in 1991 before a game was played. The BIG EAST Television Network immediately was the largest regional college football network in the country.
- Two years ago, the BIG EAST began new multi-year contracts with ABC and ESPN. Prior to the current deal, the BIG EAST enjoyed a five-year deal with CBS and ESPN.
- For the eighth straight season, ESPN Regional Television of Charlotte, N.C., will own telecasting rights for all telecasts not assigned to ABC or ESPN. ERT will produce and distribute additional games for a Game of the Week syndication, local markets and pay-per-view.
- Once again this season, BIG EAST Conference football will be viewed in over 33 cities, including the major television markets of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Miami, Pittsburgh, Baltimore and Indianapolis.





In the first 12 seasons of its existence, the BIG EAST has been a frequent contender for the national championship. Eight times a league squad has been in a bowl game, playing

for a claim to the national crown. Last January, the Miami Hurricanes appeared in their second straight Bowl Championship Series title

game.

What the BIG EAST has been able to achieve more recently is establishing its reputation as a conference with quality depth.

First, consider that a BIG EAST team has competed in the BCS championship game in three of the last four years. Miami captured the national championship two seasons ago with a win over Nebraska in the Rose Bowl and Virginia Tech battled Florida State in 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

Also consider that the BIG EAST placed five of its eight teams in bowl games last season. Over the past three years, BIG EAST teams have compiled an 11-4 record in bowl games. That mark is the best bowl record of any conference that competes in the BCS.

The BIG EAST is proud of its football student-athletes for their academic achievements. Last year, three conference players were named to Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-America First Team. The three award winners were: defensive lineman Matt Walters and linebacker Jonathan Vilma of Miami along with offensive lineman Vince Crochunis of Pittsburgh. Rutgers defensive back Nathan Jones was a second-team selection. All four also excelled on the field with Vilma and Jones garnering All-BIG EAST first-team honors.

Since its inception, the BIG EAST has been a national force, both on and off the field. Commissioner Michael Tranghese is in his second year as coordinator of the BCS. He has spearheaded the development of BIG EAST football since its beginning.

The BIG EAST Conference's entrance into football was announced on February 5, 1991. The league gained instant notice and credibility with its level of excellence on the field and its television and bowl relationships. The BIG EAST

Extensive television exposure and the BIG EAST have been synonymous terms. For football, the league established its own regional television package in 1991 before it had played a game. The BIG EAST Television Network immediately was the largest regional college football network in the country.

The BIG EAST is in the third year of broadcast deals with ABC and ESPN that run through the 2007 season. ABC telecasts five games per year. ESPN and ESPN2 will carry at least 10 games each season. Both agreements will mean that ABC or ESPN will telecast a BIG EAST game virtually every week of the

ESPN Regional Television owns broadcasting rights for all telecasts not assigned to ABC or ESPN. ERT, which took over for the BIG EAST Network in 1996, produces and distributes additional games, including a BIG EAST Game of the Week, through syndication, local markets and pay-per-view.

The BIG EAST has always aligned itself with prestigious bowl games. The league champion will go to the Tostitos Fiesta, FedEx Orange, Nokia Sugar or Rose Bowls as part of its membership in the Bowl Championship Series.

The BIG EAST and the Toyota Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla., have a multi-year pact, which allows

the Gator Bowl to select a BIG EAST bowl-eligible team after the league's representative in the Bowl Championship Series has been determined.

The Insight Bowl, which is held in Phoenix, Ariz., is in its sixth year as a partner with the BIG EAST. The Continental Tire Bowl in Charlotte, N.C., and the Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl begin their second year with the BIG EAST in 2003.

BIG EAST teams have enjoyed plenty of success in recent years. League squads have played in 19 bowl games on or after New Year's Day. Virginia Tech is on a 10-year bowl streak, the longest active string in the conference. In addition to the 2001 national championship, Miami captured national titles in 1983, '87, '89 and '91. The Hurricanes played on New Year's Day every year from '84 to '95 before returning to that echelon for the last four seasons. Syracuse has been to the postseason in 12 of the last 16 years. West Virginia has gone to bowl games in seven of the past 10 seasons and Boston College has gone bowling seven times in the past 11 years, including the last four in a row.

Some of the same elements that were in place when The BIG EAST Conference was born in 1979 are present in BIG EAST football. The football members are a group of schools that, for the most part, were traditional rivals, but were never a formal league. They are: Boston College, University of Miami, University of Pittsburgh, Rutgers University, Temple University, Syracuse University, Virginia Tech and West Virginia University.

MICHAEL A. TRANGHESE



Mike Tranghese opened the office doors of the BIG EAST when the league was born in 1979. He has helped guide the conference to national prominence while adhering to his unwavering commitment to create opportunities for BIG EAST student-athletes to succeed academically and athletically.

The 2003-04 academic year will be Tranghese's 14th as Commissioner. The BIG EAST Conference has flourished under his direction.

Tranghese has led the BIG EAST through membership expansions, a significant increase in the number of championships, the formation of BIG EAST football and numerous television negotiations. All of this has been accomplished in the face of an NCAA national landscape that seems to change regularly.

Tranghese has been an active leader nationally since becoming Commissioner on June 21, 1990. In 2000-01, he concluded a five-vear term on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee by serving as chair. Tranchese also has served as chair of the NCAA Men's Basketball Subcommittee on Television. He was on the NCAA's negotiating team that secured a record \$6 billion contract from CBS for broadcast rights to the men's basketball championship.

For the 2002 and 2003 football seasons, Tranghese will oversee the administration of the Bowl Championship Series, the group of major conferences and bowls that helps produce a national championship and the best possible bowl matchups.

In addition, he has served as chair of the Division I-A

Commissioners and the Collegiate Commissioners Association.

Shortly after being named Commissioner, Tranghese laid the groundwork and put together The BIG EAST Football Conference. In response to the beginning of significant conference realignment nationally, he coordinated an expansion, which included the University of Miami becoming a full league member in 1991-92 and being a key addition to the unique football group. Despite its youth as a league, the BIG EAST was a charter member of the Bowl Championship Series.

After establishing BIG EAST football, Tranghese guided the league through a critical time that many observers felt could have resulted in a permanent split among its members. In March, 1994, the conference added football members Rutgers University and West Virginia University as its 11th and 12th full-time members and maintained its overall structure.

Just four months later, the University of Notre Dame, clearly the nation's premier men's basketball independent, joined the BIG EAST. Rutgers, West Virginia and Notre Dame began BIG EAST competition in the 1995-96 academic year.

In 1999, football member Virginia Tech was admitted to the league as the 14th full member. It began competing in the BIG EAST in all sports in 2000-01.

The league's athletic directors unanimously appointed Tranghese in 1990 after his 11 years of service, the last nine as associate commissioner. As Commissioner, he has led the BIG EAST while maintaining the principles which have marked the conference's explosive rise to prominence promoting and cultivating intercollegiate athletic programs in an environment of

integrity while pursuing excellence at the highest possible level.

Tranghese's career in college athletics began at American International College in his hometown of Springfield, Mass. He was the sports information director at Providence College where he garnered publicity for the immensely successful Friar teams of the 1970s under Dave Gavitt. As the media focus on Eastern college basketball and the growth of sports events on television increased, Gavitt and Tranghese were ready to take advantage. Gavitt became the **BIG EAST's first Commissioner** in 1979 and served until 1990 when Tranghese assumed the helm.

Under Tranghese, the BIG EAST championship slate has expanded from seven men's championships in 1979 to 20 men's and women's events in 1993. The recent addition of women's lacrosse increases the number of sports to 21.

His negotiating expertise also has resulted in a long-term partnership with Madison

Square Garden, host of the BIG EAST Men's Basketball Championship since 1983. The league and the Garden have agreed to be partners through

Today, Tranghese is an acknowledged leader in the area of television, including negotiation and technical production. The BIG EAST has been a long-time partner with CBS Sports and ESPN and has enjoyed multi-year agreements with both entities in basketball and football. Tranghese negotiated a new television package for football with ABC. That contract began in 2001.

Additionally, Tranghese was the force behind The BIG EAST Television Network which, for 10 years, was a benchmark for regional network television. In 1995, the league awarded ESPN, Inc., exclusive rights to all of its basketball and football games not broadcast on a national network.

Tranghese is a 1965 graduate of St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vt. He is married to Susan Huntemann.





TECH IN THE BIG EAST




