

TECH TRADITIONS

NOTHING defines Lane Stadium more than the playing of “Enter Sandman”

as the team runs out of the tunnel before kickoff.

For the past 16 years, Tech fans have become part of the stadium’s “Enter Sandman” culture. Virginia Tech has played the introduction of the Metallica classic as the team has emerged out of the tunnel and onto Worsham Field since 2000.



HOKIE STONE

Before each home football game, Tech’s players and coaching staff enter Lane Stadium through the tunnel to Worsham Field. As they pass beneath a Hokie Stone they touch for good luck, they see these words: “For those who have passed. For those to come ... Reach for Excellence.”



HOKIE VILLAGE

Located on the turf soccer practice field, across Beamer Way from Lane Stadium, Hokie Village opens up 3.5 hours before kickoff, is free for all, and begins Tech’s gameday experience.





HOKIE WALK

Established in 2001, when the football team arrives on campus about 2.5 hours before kickoff, the Hokies take the short walk up Beamer Way sandwiched on either side by the Tech faithful.




MARCHING VIRGINIANS

Known as "The Spirit of Tech" and established in 1974, the Marching Virginians draw from the general student body and perform at halftime of every home football game.



THE HIGHTY TIGHTIES

A Regimental Band, the Highty Tighties are Tech's longest-serving musical organization and the oldest college band in the Commonwealth and is a company in the third battalion of the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets.



SKIPPER

In 1963, three Virginia Tech students and Corps of Cadets members built a cannon and it made its debut against VMI in the two schools' annual Thanksgiving Day game. The students named the cannon "Skipper" after President John F. Kennedy was assassinated on November 22, 1963. Ever since, Skipper fires outside of Lane Stadium at the opening of Hokie Village, after the national anthem and whenever the Hokies score.



HOKIE POKEY

The spirit teams and the Marching Virginians' tuba section lead the Lane Stadium crowd in Blacksburg's rendition of the Hokie Pokey.







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LUNCH PAIL D



The famed Virginia Tech Lunch Pail has come to symbolize the blue-collar approach of the Hokies' defense under longtime defensive coordinate Bud Foster.



In 1995, Foster served as co-defensive coordinator with Rod Sharpless, whose mother-in-law found the original Lunch Pail in Mercerville, New Jersey. The pail once belonged to a coal miner and after a record-setting defensive season, the Lunch Pail became an iconic part of Hokies' lore.



The Pail travels wherever the Hokies go and its care is only entrusted to a defensive leader.



Before the start of every season, a signed mission statement from the defense is placed in The Pail. Then every week, unit goals, team goals and keys to success are placed in The Pail, plus the turf from any road victories.



Since 2007, The Pail has also contained the names of the 32 fallen Hokies taken in the April 16 tragedy.



Corey Moore – whose jersey No. 56 is retired by Tech – is the only player who has ever earned lifetime possession of an incarnation of The Pail from Foster.



NOTABLE ALUMS OF

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Herb Thomas

HERBERT J. THOMAS, JR.
(Class of 1944)

Thomas, a former football player, received the Medal of Honor for action on Bougainville Island in the South Pacific during World War II. During a battle, Thomas threw a grenade, but the jungle vines dropped it back among his men. Thomas jumped on the grenade, giving his life to save the lives of his men.

CHRISTOPHER KRAFT
(Class of 1944)

Kraft, a former baseball player, is a retired NASA engineer who established the agency's "Mission Control" operation. He served as the agency's first flight director and oversaw the first human spaceflight, orbital flight and spacewalk. The Mission Control Center at the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center in Houston is named after Kraft, who graduated from Tech with a degree in aeronautical engineering.

ROBERT RICHARDSON
(Class of 1958 and 1960)

Richardson brought international notoriety to Virginia Tech when she shared the 1996 Nobel Prize in Physics with two others for their 1972 discovery of the property of superfluidity in helium-3 atoms. He received both his undergraduate and master's degrees in physics from Virginia Tech and spent nearly his entire career as a professor and physics researcher at Cornell.

IRVING PEDDREW
(Class of 2016)

Yates was the first African-American student to attend Virginia Tech and the first to attend any historically all-white four-year public institution in the 11 former states of the Confederacy when he enrolled in 1953. Peddrew studied at Tech for three years before moving to California to join the workforce. In 2016, the university presented him with an honorary Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering.

CHARLIE YATES
(Class of 1958)

Yates was the first African-American graduate of Virginia Tech, receiving his degree in mechanical engineering 1958. He later became a college professor and twice returned to Virginia Tech to work. The final time was in 1987 when he served as an associate professor in the aerospace and engineering department. He remained at Tech until his retirement in 2000. In 2010, he passed away after a long bout with leukemia.

HOMER HICKAM
(Class of 1964)

As a Corps of Cadets member, Hickam designed Skipper, the iconic cannon Virginia Tech fires during football games when it scores and also at other functions. After graduating with a degree in industrial engineering, Hickam served in the military during the Vietnam War, and after he returned, he worked for NASA. But he is best known as an author, with his memoir "Rocket Boys," becoming a New York Times best seller. The 1999 movie entitled "October Sky" was based off Hickam's book.

DAVE CALHOUN
(Class of 1979)

Calhoun is the senior managing director and head of private equity portfolio operations of Blackstone. He also has worked as a vice chairman of The General Electric Company. He graduated with a degree in accounting and serves on the Pamplin College of Business Advisory Council.

ROB WITTMAN
(Class of 1981)

Wittman earned his degree in biological sciences and worked for 26 years in state government as a field director for the division of shellfish sanitation in the Virginia health department and as an environmental health specialist for local health departments in the commonwealth. He transitioned to politics, and today, the former Corps of Cadets member is a U.S. Congressman, representing Virginia's 1st Congressional District.

LETITIA "TISH" LONG
(Class of 1982)

Long began her career in the U.S. Navy before she even graduated with her degree in electrical engineering, serving as an intern developing capabilities for the submarine force. She eventually moved into intelligence arena, and in 2010, became the director of the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency. She became the first woman to lead a major U.S. intelligence agency. In 2014, she retired after 36 years of federal service.

HODA KOTB
(Class of 1986)

Kotb works as a co-anchor for the fourth hour of the TODAY show with Kathie Lee Gifford and she also serves as a correspondent for Dateline NBC, an investigative show. In addition, she has written three books and once served as Virginia Tech's commencement speaker (2008). She graduated from the university with a degree in broadcast journalism.

STEVE MOLLENKOPF
(Class of 1992)


Mollenkopf began his career with Qualcomm more than 20 years ago as an engineer and eventually led the chipset business, overseeing the launch of the 4G technology. In 2010, he moved into the role of chief operating officer and he now serves as the CEO of the company. He graduated from the university with a degree in electrical engineering.

(Class of 1999)







Strength and conditioning program epitomizes what head coach Justin Fuente wants his program to embody — #HardSmartTough

The words can be found right above the entrance to the Virginia Tech football team's weight room.

They are displayed big and boldly – Hard, Smart, Tough.

Those three pillars represent the foundation of new head coach Justin Fuente's football program and the construction of that foundation starts in the weight room, where Ben Hilgart, the associate athletics director for strength and conditioning, oversees that construction. Hilgart took over for Dr. Mike Gentry, one of the most respected names in the profession and a man widely credited for helping the Hokies' achieve tremendous success over the past two decades.

Hilgart is well aware of the Hokies' past prowess in the weight room.

"This program has a great tradition as it relates to strength and conditioning," he said. "We want to continue that."

Hilgart himself knows first hand the importance of strength and conditioning. His effort in this area led to him becoming a scholarship football player at Western Illinois.

After he graduated, he knew he wanted to be a strength coach.

"This area gave me a chance, just through my hard work," Hilgart said of strength and conditioning. "It gave me an opportunity to become a scholarship football player and I think that's what drew me to the weight room, just the impact it's had on me physically and mentally.

"When I found out that strength and conditioning was a profession,



I knew it was what I wanted to do. It had an impact on me and I know it has an impact on these kids as well."

Hilgart has been tasked with making the football players bigger, stronger, and faster. That sounds simple, and in theory, it's the goal of every strength and conditioning program in the nation.

But his task goes beyond that. He and his staff want to make this team tough, and more importantly, instill Fuente's vision for the program.

"I think it starts with culture," Hilgart said. "It's bigger than any bench press or back squat that we'll do. Our job as a strength and conditioning coach is to promote the culture and instill the vision that the head football coach has for this entire program. That's something we can do every day.

"We have the unique opportunity to be around these players every single day. We're around them more than the assistant coaches are, so every single day, we're going to promote the culture and the vision of this football program.

"Beyond that, it's athletic development. We'll have a comprehensive plan in place that will train all aspects of athletic performance. I've coached five-star kids and zero-star kids and it all comes down to development and maximizing these kids' potential."

Hilgart and his staff believe in practicing what they preach. In breaks during their daily schedule, the coaches can be found lifting weights, though the goal isn't necessarily just to get stronger and stay in shape.

"I want to feel what these kids feel," Hilgart said.

Hilgart will have four other staff members helping with the football program for the 2016 season and that staff includes a mixture of old and new. Anthony Crosby came to Tech after four years at Ole Miss and that staff as senior director and former Tech players Jarrett Ferguson and Ryan Shuman will remain in their current roles of senior director and associate director, respectively. Former Tech player Nick Acree is slated to come aboard as a full-time assistant in the summer.

HOKIE FUEL

Eating healthy and making food functional for athletic performance are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program in July of 2002. Jennie Zabinsky is the department's director of sports nutrition.

The sports nutrition program offers a wide variety of services that aim to enhance the performance of each student-athlete. Services include individual assessments, team talks, body composition analysis using the Bod Pod, grocery store tours, supplement management and education, disordered eating counseling, travel meal arrangements,

and football training table menu planning and management. Zabinsky works closely with coaches, team physicians, athletic trainers, strength coaches and the sport psychologist to address any performance concerns. She directs the nutrition and performance committee that meets monthly to discuss student-athletes of concern.

The sports nutrition staff manages two facilities, the Nutrition Oasis and Fueling Station, that provide athletes fuel in between workouts, classes and meals. Each facility provides recovery beverages, Gatorade products, smoothies, and a variety of high performance snack options as well as nutrition education resources.

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
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Merryman Center undergoing major renovation in 2016

Earlier this year, the first part of a two-phase project began to that calls for updating the entrance to the Merryman Center and renovation of the Legends Hall area. The football offices and Olympic Sports entrance area on the first level of the Jamerson Athletics Center near the sports medicine area also received a major facelift.

New exhibits commemorate the accomplishments of Tech's greatest players, including All-Americans like Bruce Smith, Corey Moore and Michael Vick, while another area will highlight current Hokies playing in the NFL such as Duane Brown, Kam Chancellor, Brandon Flowers, the Fuller brothers, DeAngelo Hall, Tyrod Taylor and others. Tech's greatest football accomplishments will also be celebrated along with new graphics and video displays on the walls. The specifications of the area also call for an open floor plan that will allow for a stunning view the indoor practice facility.

Snyder & Associates, a local company, started the demolition for the project in early January, while Cannon Design, with regional offices across the nation has been handling the design concepts. Nashville-based 1220 Exhibits, Inc., will add Virginia Tech to its impressive list of exhibits and

display clients that includes the Pro Football Hall of Fame, as well as Notre Dame and Tennessee.

The \$1.7 million Phase I of the project is being paid for with private contributions to the athletics department.

Phase II will involve overhauling McConnell Auditorium, which is the football team's meeting room inside the Merryman Center, and also the football team position meeting rooms – spaces adjacent to Legends Hall. Plans call for replacing the seating, the lighting and the ceiling, along with adding new graphics on the walls.

Plans are in the works to overhaul the Bowman Room, which resides on the fourth floor of the Jamerson Center. The room sees heavy use – from meetings to luncheons and dinners before and after football and basketball games to providing team meals for all sports on occasion. The athletics department wants to expand the room, adding seating and possibly a full-service kitchen. This area would provide a central place for team meals and other functions.

- Saw duty in 20 games at OU and led the Sooners to a 30-27 upset in win overtime against No. 25 Texas in the Red River Shootout (10/12/96) in the inaugural Big 12 contest between the two longtime rivals. Also set an OU freshman record with 11 TD passes that season.
- Transferred to Murray State, the same school that Frank Beamer coached prior accepting the Virginia Tech job in 1987.
- Set 11 schools records during his two-year career at Murray State, completing 458 of 794 passes (57.7%) for 6,372 yards with 50 touchdowns and 20 interceptions, good for a 140.8 rating. Also scored two rushing TDs and had a 15-yard reception.
- Posted a career-high 553 yards at Southern Illinois (9/11/99) and threw for 470 yards and five TDs in his final game against Kentucky Wesleyan (11/20/99), leading the Racers to a 53-0 victory.
- Named the 1999 Ohio Valley Conference Offensive Player of the Year and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award.
- Played professionally for the Arena Football League's Oklahoma Wranglers before embarking on his coaching career.



WELCOME TO HOKIE NATION

- Named Virginia Tech's head coach on Nov. 29, 2015 after orchestrating one of the more dramatic program resurrections in recent college football history at Memphis.
- Considered one of the hottest coaching commodities in a market filled with high-profile openings, Fuente later indicated that Virginia Tech was a program he had long admired from afar, and was the only job he truly coveted, thanks in large part to the rich football tradition, a great environment to raise his family in Blacksburg and campus leaders committed to winning with integrity.
- While following in the footsteps of a bona fide legend like Frank Beamer would be a daunting task for any individual, Fuente immediately embraced the lofty expectations associated with inheriting the nation's longest active bowl streak and a fanbase hungry for a return to championship contention.
- Perhaps the coup de grâce for Fuente incorporating the best of BeamerBall into his own program came when he and longtime defensive coordinator Bud Foster forged an immediate connection and he promoted Foster to associate head coach, while retaining one of college football's most respected defensive minds.

THE MEMPHIS TURNAROUND

- Compiled a 19-6 record in his final two seasons at Memphis, guiding the Tigers to back-to-back bowl berths after inheriting a program that went 5-31 in three years before his arrival.
- Unanimous selection as 2014 American Athletic Conference Coach of the Year when he led Memphis to its first conference title since 1971.
- Guided Memphis to a 15-game winning streak that included a 37-24 win over No. 13 Ole Miss (10/17/15).
- Memphis posted a 9-3 regular season mark in 2015, capped by a 63-0 win vs. SMU in Fuente's finale as the Tigers' head coach.
- The Tigers concluded a 10-3 season in 2014 with a 55-48 double-OT triumph over BYU in the Miami Beach Bowl, the first 10-win season for the Tigers since 1938.
- Fuente's final game as Memphis head coach was a 63-0 win vs. SMU (11/28/15). QB Paxton Lynch tied an FBS record with seven touchdown passes in the first half of that game. Lynch threw for a school-record 28 TD passes on the 2015 season.
- Memphis outscored its opponents by an average margin of 20.7 points per game during a run of 15 consecutive wins from 2014-15, scoring 652 points (43.5 ppg), while allowing only 341 (22.7 ppg).

- Memphis scored 471 points in 2014, shattering the old school record of 430 points set in 2004, while allowing a mere 19.5 points per game, a figure that ranked 11th among FBS squads.
- The Tigers went +11 (31 takeaways/20 giveaways) in the turnover column in 2014, finishing the campaign ranked in both the AP Top 25 and in the USA Today/Amway Coaches Polls, a first in school history.
- Fuente's squad led Conference USA in total defense in league games in 2012, giving up just 331.6 ypg.
- The Tigers also excelled on special teams under Fuente as Tom Hornsey won the 2013 Ray Guy Award as the nation's top collegiate punter.



BUILDING THE BLUEPRINT AT TCU

- Earned a well-deserved reputation not only as a top recruiter, but also as one of football's most innovative offensive minds during a record-setting five-year stint on head coach Gary Patterson's staff at TCU (2007-11).
- It was also at TCU where Fuente began a track record of developing quarterbacks and preparing them for NFL futures.
- During his final three seasons as play caller, QBs coach and co-offensive coordinator at TCU from 2008-10, the Horned Frogs produced a 36-3 overall record and went on a 24-game win streak in the Mountain West Conference.
- From 2008-10, TCU was the only program in the country that finished in the Top 10 in both the AP Poll and USA Today Coaches Poll all three of those campaigns. TCU also made back-to-back appearances in BCS bowls with Fuente on the staff, registering a 2011 Rose Bowl victory over No. 5 Wisconsin.
- In 2010, TCU set single-season school marks in touchdowns (73), points scored (541), total offense (6,199 yards) and first downs (327).
- The Horned Frogs also ranked fourth nationally in scoring (41.6 ppg), sixth in passing efficiency (166.9), 10th in rushing (247.4 ypg) and 12th in total offense (476.9 ypg) in 2010.
- His prowess for mentoring quarterbacks garnered national attention as TCU QB Andy Dalton flourished under his tutelage. From 2009-10, Dalton led TCU to a 25-1 record and set the Mountain West career record for total offense (11,925 yards).
- TCU was the only school in the nation to have two different quarterbacks rank in the top 10 in the country in passing efficiency from 2009-11.
- After Dalton completed his career as TCU's career leader in virtually every passing category, QB Casey Pachall picked up where Dalton left off. In 2011, Pachall led TCU to an 11-2 mark, completing 66.5 percent of his throws (228 of 343) with 25 TDs and seven INTs.

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FCS ROOTS AT ILLINOIS STATE

- The composition of the Fuente's current staff traces some key roots to his initial coaching assignment at Illinois State as four of his nine assistants – Brad Cornelsen, Galen Scott, Vance Vice and Holmon Wiggins – worked with him there. In an ironic twist, the hometown of Bud Foster (Nokomis, Ill.) is actually less than 100 miles from Bloomington, Ill.
- After beginning his tenure at Illinois State coaching quarterbacks in 2001, he added offensive coordinator duties to his assignment for his final three seasons with the Redbirds (2004-06).
- Under his direction in 2005, Illinois State ranked fifth in both total offense (477.6 ypg) and scoring (39.2 ppg) among FCS squads.

COACHING INFLUENCES



BILL BLANKENSHIP

Fuente played for Blankenship at Tulsa's Union High School. Blankenship later served as head coach at Tulsa (2011-14) and worked with Fuente at Memphis (2015). He currently is the head coach at Fayetteville High School in Fayetteville, Ark.

"I'd still run through a brick wall for him. Many years later, he's still my coach, but he's also become a great friend, confidant and mentor. I'm eternally grateful for everything he's taught me over the years, lessons that have extended far beyond the football field. He's taught me about life, how to treat people, how to deal with success and how to overcome adversity." – Fuente



DICK WINDER

The late Winder served as Oklahoma offensive coordinator when Fuente was quarterbacking the Sooners in the 1990s. Winder retired as Gary Patterson's quarterbacks coach at TCU following the 2006 season and encouraged Patterson to interview Fuente for that position.

"Coach Winder was as rough and tough and as hard as they come. I would have jumped in front of a train for him, though. He was the polar opposite of Coach Blankenship personality-wise, but what an amazing coach. While my demeanor may be different, a lot of techniques and idiosyncracies of coaching offense and quarterbacks specifically, I took from Coach Winder." – Fuente



GARY PATTERSON

Before accepting the challenge of rebuilding the Memphis program, Fuente spent five invaluable seasons working with Patterson at TCU from 2007-11 as the Horned Frogs emerged as a national power.

"I patterned many organizational pieces of our program based on the structure of what Coach Patterson had developed at TCU. Working with Gary really prepared me in a number of facets to become a head coach. Gary's expertise was on defense, but I really appreciated the balance he stuck between giving us his input on the offense and then giving us the freedom to operate, while being mindful of the overall picture with defense and special teams. It was a great lesson and it's a style I try to emulate with our staff." – Fuente

FUN FACTS ON THE FUENTES



- Fuente's great grandfather, Jack, supported his family during the Great Depression as a professional wrestler under the nicknames "The Spanish Red Devil" and "Spanish Jack".

- The most popular conversation piece in Fuente's office is a WWE title belt that was presented by Memphis native Jerry "The King" Lawler after Fuente's Memphis squad won a share of the 2014 American Athletic Conference championship.



- Other notable pieces of wrestling memorabilia in Fuente's office include a pair of personalized photos from Hall of Fame wrestling announcer Jim Ross, who once served as a high school football referee in Oklahoma.


- Current Virginia Tech offensive line coach Vance Vice held that same role at Murray State when Fuente was the Racers' quarterback. Vice is also an Oklahoma native and once played in a high school game where Ross was an official.

- Current Tech assistant head coach Galen Scott introduced Fuente to his future wife - the former Jenny Kabbes - while Fuente and Scott were roommates at Illinois State.

- Jenny was an accomplished athlete in her own right as a volleyball student-athlete at Illinois State. The 1998 Missouri Valley Conference Newcomer of the Year was a first-team all-conference choice in 1999. After major shoulder surgery, sidelined her in 2000, she returned to the court to earn second-team All-MVC honors in 2001 and first-team accolades as a senior in 2001. She holds a business degree from Illinois State in addition to earning a master's degree in kinesiology and recreation with an emphasis in sport management.

- An avid golfer and fisherman in his limited free time, Fuente enjoyed the thrill of playing Pebble Beach in June.

- The Fuentes are the proud owners of two dogs – Petey & Bear.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Respected as one of the nation's top coaching minds and one of college football's most decorated defensive coordinators, enters his 30th season at Virginia Tech.
- Elevated to the post of associate head coach by current Tech head coach Justin Fuente after enjoying a historic 29-season run under Frank Beamer that began in 1987. Interestingly, both Fuente and Foster played at Murray State more than a decade apart.
- Architect of Tech's famed "Lunch Pail Defense," is the longest continually-tenured FBS defensive coordinator, holding that position with the Hokies since 1995 (as co-coordinator) and taking over sole possession of that role in 1996.
- Owns the second-longest continuous tenure at the same school among current FBS assistants, a mark surpassed only by Oregon running backs coach Gary Campbell, who has served with the Ducks since 1983.
- Has been a key component in helping the Hokies register the nation's longest active bowl streak recognized by the NCAA, a 23-year stretch that began in 1993.
- Beginning when he was named co-defensive coordinator in 1995, the Hokies began a stretch where the club produced 13 seasons with 10 or more victories during a 17-season span.
- Won the 2006 Broyles Award, given annually to the top assistant coach in the country, and was a finalist on three other occasions (1999, 2001, 2005).
- Named the Division I-A Defensive Coordinator of the Year by American Football Coach magazine after helping the Hokies to the 1999 national championship game on the strength of a defense that led the nation in scoring defense at 10.5 ppg.
- His defenses have led the nation in a major defensive statistical category eight times and have placed in the top five 40 different times.
- Virginia Tech has finished in the top five in scoring defense on six different occasions under Foster, leading the nation in both 1999 and 2006, while ranking second in 2001, 2004 and 2005. The Hokies registered six straight top 10 finishes in scoring defense from 2004-09.
- The Hokies led the nation in total defense in both 2005 and 2006, while ranking second in 2001.
- His 2006 defense was arguably one of Virginia Tech's finest as the Hokies led the nation in scoring defense (11.0 ppg), total defense (219.5 ypg) and pass defense (128.2 ypg).
- Since Foster took over sole reins as Tech's defensive coordinator in 1996, the Hokies lead all FBS programs in sacks (749.0), sack yardage (-5,177); interceptions (337) and INT return touchdowns (44), while owning a share of the nation's best mark in third-down defense with a 31.6 conversion rate.
- Over that same span, only Ohio State (16.5 ppg) and Alabama (16.6) can boast better scoring defenses than Virginia Tech (17.4), while Alabama (291.2 ypg) is the only squad that ranks ahead of Virginia Tech (303.1) in total defense.
- Since the start of the 1996 season the Hokies are second among FBS squads in pass defense (187.8 ypg), fourth in takeaways (552) and sixth in rushing defense (115.3 ppg).
- Thanks to his opportunistic defenses, Virginia Tech owns an unbelievable +120 turnover differential (552 takes/432 gives) dating back to 1996, while 50 different defensive players have scored a total of 77 touchdowns.
- Blacksburg has truly become a no-passing zone under his direction. Since the start of the 1996

campaign, Tech has permitted the lowest completion percentage (50.5) of any FBS team, while owning the nation's highest INT percentage (4.5) and the lowest TD/INT differential (0.75) over that span.

- During that same timeframe, only Florida (105.9) has held opponents to a lower composite passer rating than Virginia Tech (106.0).
- Going back to 1996 NFL Draft, 40 of his defensive pupils have been drafted including nine players picked in the first or second rounds. Six of those nine first or second-round selections have been defensive backs, including a pair of first rounders in CBs Kyle Fuller (D1-14, Chicago) and DeAngelo Hall (D1-08, Atlanta).
- Coached three of the four Fuller brothers – Vinnie, Kyle and Kendall – part of the only quartet of brothers in NFL history to all be drafted and all attend the same college.
- Hall has gone on to earn three Pro Bowl berths during his professional career, while fifth-round pick Kam Chancellor has earned a Super Bowl ring, appeared in two Super Bowls and been named to four Pro Bowl squads with Seattle.
- Postseason honors have become synonymous

with the Hokies' defense with at least one defensive player earning All-America honors of some form in 18 different seasons.

- Under Foster, Virginia Tech produced its first Lombardi Award winner and its first Nagurski Trophy winner in Corey Moore.
- The Hokies have also two BIG EAST defensive players of the year during Foster's tenure – Moore, who earned the honor in both 1998 and 1999, and Cornell Brown, who won it in 1995. Brown would later earn a Super Bowl ring with the Baltimore Ravens.
- Originally came to Tech as inside linebackers coach in 1987 before serving as outside linebackers coach from 1988-92. Added special teams duties to his responsibilities in 1993 before becoming co-defensive coordinator in 1995 and taking over sole responsibility for those chores in 1996.
- Began his career as a graduate assistant at Murray State in 1981-82 before assuming a full-time role with the Racers from 1983-86 before making the move with Beamer to Blacksburg in 1987.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Another longtime colleague of head coach Justin Fuente enters his inaugural season coaching for the Hokies. Scott's association with Fuente dates back to Illinois State when they both served as assistants on the Redbirds' staff and shared an apartment.
- High-energy coach owns experience as a defensive coordinator at both Memphis and Illinois State, joining defensive line coach Charlie Wiles as another member of Bud Foster's defensive staff with experience in that role.
- A former All-America linebacker in his own right, Scott brings 15 seasons of collegiate coaching experience to Tech and will work with the Hokies' safeties, in addition to duties assigned by Fuente as assistant head coach.
- The 2005 American Football Coaches Association I-AA Coach of the Year, Scott most recently served as defensive coordinator for Fuente at Memphis.
- Played an integral role in helping Fuente resurrect a squad that finished 2-10 in 2011 and hadn't posted a winning campaign since 2007.
- Only 15 FBS squads allowed more points than Memphis in 2011 (35.1 ppg) and only three teams permitted more yards of total offense than the Tigers (491.0 ppg) that season. Just a year later, Memphis led Conference USA in total defense in league games at 331.6 ppg.
- By the 2014 and 2015 seasons, the Tigers registered back-to-back bowl berths, compiling a 19-7 record that included a 15-game winning streak that boasted a victory over No. 13 Ole Miss.
- Despite losing eight starters from the previous season, the Tigers held four opponents under 20 points in 2015, including a 63-0 shutout of SMU in the regular season finale. The Tigers followed up that performance by registering three interceptions in the Birmingham Bowl vs. Auburn, including one that was returned for a 53-yard TD.
- With Scott serving as defensive coordinator in 2014, Memphis ranked 11th in the FBS in scoring defense (19.5 ppg), putting the Tigers ahead of traditionally stout defensive programs such as Ohio State, Michigan State, Wisconsin and many others.
- The 2014 squad led the American Athletic Conference and ranked eighth nationally in opponent passer rating (106.3) and was 19th among FBS squads in rushing (121.5 ppg).
- The defensive effort by the Tigers in 2014 played a pivotal role in Memphis claiming the American Athletic Conference championship, the team's first league title since 1971. At 10-3, Memphis equaled a school record for victories which had stood since 1938, capping the season with a dramatic, double-OT win over BYU in the Miami Beach Bowl.

- Memphis continued its defensive improvement in 2013, ranking 12th among FBS squads in rushing defense (116.3 ypg) as the Tigers permitted only one individual 100-yard rusher and contained four teams to under 100 net rushing yards. Memphis also ranked 39th nationally in total defense (370.7 ppg).
- Scott guided one of the most-successful linebackers in school history in 2010 when Jamon Hughes ranked third nationally with 147 tackles.
- Spent two seasons working under head coach Bill Blankenship at Tulsa from 2008-09. Blankenship served as Fuente's prep coach at Union High School in Tulsa, Okla.
- Coached outside linebackers and safeties in 2008 as the Golden Hurricane finished the season with an 11-3 record and a 45-13 win over Ball State in the GMAC Bowl.
- Served seven years at his alma mater, Illinois State (2001-07) and took on the role of defensive coordinator his last two seasons.
- In his first season as defensive coordinator in 2006, Scott directed a Redbirds defense that was the Gateway Conference's No. 3 total defense and No. 2 scoring defense, allowing 19.7 ppg.
- Began his coaching career at Illinois State in 2001.
- Was one of nine minority coaches selected to participate in the 2016 NCAA Champion Forum in June 2016 where attendees gained a realistic view of the role of a successful college head football coach and the preparation necessary to become one.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- A three-time All-America selection and four-year All-Gateway Conference pick as a linebacker, helped Illinois State to its first Gateway Conference title (1999) and a pair of NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances (1998, 1999).
- Held the school's career tackle record with 528 at the time of his graduation, a mark that was subsequently broken by one of his pupils, LB Boomer Grigsby (580), but still ranks third in Missouri Valley history.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- Three-time All-Big South wide receiver at VMI from 2002-05, finished his career with 162 receptions for 2,101 yards (13.0 avg.) with 12 touchdowns for the Keydets.
- His 162 catches rank second in school history behind only Mark Stock (165) while his yardage tally is third in VMI history.
- Owns a share of a school record with a reception in 34 consecutive games.
- Racked up 58 catches for 742 yards and three TDs as a senior in 2005, tying as the second-best season reception total at the school. Also had 57 catches as a junior in 2004.
- Registered two games with 10 catches during his career, a mark that ties as the second-best single-game tally in VMI history, while his five 100-yard contests are the second-highest total in the VMI record book.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Talented and versatile coach enters his second season at Virginia Tech and will make the switch to running backs under head coach Justin Fuente in 2016 after serving as wide receivers coach in 2015.
- Born and raised in the heart of the 757, Burden hails from an area that has served as a hotbed of talent for the Hokies for generations. Also owns experience coaching at Fork Union Military Academy, a school that has produced a distinguished pedigree of NFL performers.
- A record-setting collegiate receiver in his own right at VMI, helped develop WR Isaiah Ford into Virginia Tech's first pass catcher to ever produce a 1,000-yard season in 2015.
- As only a sophomore last season, Ford set single-season Tech records with 75 receptions for 1,164 yards and 11 touchdowns that was capped by a 12-catch, 227-yard effort in the Independence Bowl.
- Joined the Hokies after a three-year stint as the passing game coordinator and coaching wide receivers for Old Dominion (2012-14).
- Prior to Virginia Tech, Burden spent three seasons at Old Dominion (2012-14) in Norfolk, Virginia, where he groomed 1,000-yard wideouts such as Antonio Vaughan, Zach Pascal, Larry Pinkard and Nick Mayers.
- Old Dominion was one of 13 FBS schools in 2014 to have three players with 40 or more catches and one of 16 schools to have four players with 30 or more receptions.
- Vaughan produced his best collegiate season with 63 catches for a league-high 1,019 yards under Burden's guidance in 2014 as his 12 touchdowns tied for fourth among FCS programs.
- With Burden serving as passing game coordinator in 2013, Old Dominion ranked fourth in the FCS in scoring offense (42.3 ppg), fourth in passing offense (359.4 ypg) and seventh in total offense (519.0 ypg) as Pinkard led the squad

- with 68 catches for 1,020 yards.
- Helped lead the most prolific FCS offense in 2012 as the Monarchs led the nation in scoring (45.2 ppg), total offense (548.2 ypg), passing offense (393.8 ypg) and TD passes (44). Mayers tied for second among FCS performers with a school-record 16 TD catches. He also set single-season school records with 79 catches for 1,233 yards earning All-America honors from College Sports Madness and Beyond Sports Network.
- Developed WR Tre Gray into a record-setting receiver at Richmond in 2011. He earned third team All-America honors from the AP after leading the Colonial Athletic Association and setting Richmond single-season records with 95 receptions for 1,187 yards.
- Served as an integral part of one of the most successful start-up programs in recent history as Old Dominion returned to the field in 2009 after a 68-year absence.
- Joined the Old Dominion staff as defensive backs coach in 2007, helping to build a roster from scratch as the Monarchs got on the field in 2009 and produced a 9-2 mark, the best record for a first-year program in the modern era of college football.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- Became the first quarterback in the history of NCAA Division II football to pass for at least 4,000 yards and rush for at least 2,000 yards during his career at Missouri Southern State from 1995-98.
- Inducted into the Missouri Southern State Athletics Hall of Fame in 2014.
- Was on the same Oklahoma roster as current Tech head coach Justin Fuente in the 1995 Oil Bowl, an annual Oklahoma vs. Texas high school summer all-star game.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Record-setting collegiate quarterback enters his initial season serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Virginia Tech.
- Along with current Tech head coach Justin Fuente, helped lead a remarkable resurgence in four seasons at Memphis, taking a program that had gone 3-21 in the two seasons prior to their arrival to a squad that went 19-7 and earned back-to-back bowl berths in 2014-15.
- Joined Fuente in grooming a relatively unheralded two-star quarterback prospect, Paxton Lynch, into a first-round NFL Draft pick.
- During his final two campaigns for the Tigers, Lynch completed 64.8 percent (855 of 856) of his passes for 6,807 yards with 50 touchdowns and 13 interceptions, good for a 147.9 rating, a 5.8 touchdown percentage and a 1.5 interception percentage. He also ran for 15 TDs over that two year span, while surrendering a mere 32.0 sacks.
- By contrast, in the three seasons (2009-11) prior to Lynch's arrival at Memphis, the Tigers compiled a 5-31 record; threw for 7,182 yards with 37 touchdowns and 36 interceptions, while suffering 80.0 sacks.
- Under Cornelsen's tutelage in 2015, Lynch threw for 3,776 yards, with 28 touchdowns and only four interceptions. He tied an FBS record with seven touchdown passes in the first half of Memphis' 63-0 victory over SMU.
- In 2015, under his direction as co-offensive coordinator, Memphis finished 11th nationally in scoring offense (40.2 ppg), ranking ahead of both squads who played in the College Football Playoff Championship Game – Clemson (16th – 38.5 ppg) and Alabama (30th – 35.1 ppg).
- The Tigers averaged 307.5 passing ypg in 2015 to rank 18th among FBS squads and were 19th in total offense (486.9 ypg).
- Memphis was particularly efficient on third down in 2015, converting 48.8 percent (101 of 207) of the time to rank eighth in the FBS, a mark that no ACC squad could beat last season.
- Under his direction, the Memphis offense also gained big chunks of yardage on the ground. In 2014-15, the Tigers averaged 185.0 rushing ypg and scored 60 TDs on the ground, producing 11 games with 200 or more net rushing yards. By contrast, the Tigers averaged a mere 87.8 rushing ypg and scored 15 rushing TDs in 2010-11.
- The Tigers set a school record for points in consecutive seasons (993 in 2014-15) and were particularly adept in protecting the football under Cornelsen's direction during that timeframe, boasting a +19 turnover differential (53 takes/34 gives).
- In 2014, with Cornelsen as the quarterbacks coach, Lynch guided the Tigers to a Miami Beach Bowl win over BYU. Lynch was the MVP after completing 24 of 46 for 306 yards and four touchdowns. He also ran for three scores, tying an FBS record for touchdowns responsible for in a bowl game.
- Cornelsen coached quarterbacks at Memphis for all of his four seasons at Memphis. Lynch threw for more than 2,000 yards in three of those seasons. As a redshirt freshman in 2013, Lynch recorded just the 10th 2,000-yard passing season in program history, and as a redshirt sophomore in 2014, he set a school record for total offense (3,352 yards), becoming just the third quarterback in school history to throw for more than 3,000 yards. He subsequently broke those marks in 2015.
- In 2012, Cornelsen mentored Jacob Karam who completed 64.2 percent (176 of 274) of his passes, while throwing 14 touchdowns and a school-low three interceptions.

- Prior to joining the staff at Memphis, Cornelsen was the offensive coordinator at Northeastern State, a Division II school in Tahlequah, Okla. In his final season there in 2011, he helped the offense become among the nation's leaders in passing offense (13th, 291 ypg) and total offense (22nd, 440 ypg). NSU's seven wins that season were the program's most in 11 years.
- In 2011, Northeastern State receiver Trey McVay became a first-team All-American while in Cornelsen's offense, catching 82 passes for 1,533 yards. He set a school single-season record for receiving yards. His 425-yard performance vs. Harding set an NCAA single-game record at any level for most receptions in a game. His 16 catches and six TDs in that contest also established school records.
- Landed his initial full-time coaching position at Illinois State in 2003, where Fuente also served as an assistant on the Redbirds' staff from 2001-06. Current Tech assistants Holmon Wiggins and Vance Vice were also members of that Illinois State staff.
- When Fuente departed for TCU in 2007, Cornelsen took over as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coaching at Illinois State as QB Luke Drone developed into an All-Gateway Conference choice, throwing for 2,222 yards and 18 touchdowns.
- In 2005, while the receivers coach at Illinois State, Cornelsen helped Laurent Robinson become an All-America selection and earn conference offensive player of the year honors after he set school records with 86 catches for 1,465 yards. That single-season yardage tally remains a Missouri Valley record, while those 86 catches are tied for third in conference annals. Robinson's 292-yard game against Indiana State in 2005 still stands as a conference record.
- In 2005, while the receivers coach at Illinois State, Cornelsen's had three receivers catch 30 passes or more, the most by a Redbirds' trio since 1996.
- Robinson concluded his career at Illinois State with 192 catches for 3,007 yards with 29 TDs, a yardage total that still ranks sixth in Missouri Valley annals.
- Spent the spring of 2001 at NW Missouri State working as a graduate assistant under legendary NCAA Division II head coach Mel Tjeerdsma before taking a similar role at Oklahoma State under head coach Les Miles.


COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Veteran coach and former NFL player enters his first season with Virginia Tech as cornerbacks coach.
- Comes to Blacksburg after spending the past three seasons in a similar capacity at West Virginia.
- Served as defense coordinator and secondary coach for Ruffin McNeill at East Carolina from 2010-12 after working with McNeill on the defensive staff at Texas Tech.
- During his distinguished coaching career, has been a member of staffs that have won five conference titles and made 13 bowl appearances.
- Ten of his defensive backs have gone on to sign professional contracts.
- In 2015, WVU's defense led all Power Five schools by forcing 23 interceptions and ranked second with 31 total takeaways. Mitchell's cornerbacks accounted for 11 of those INTs, finishing the year with 28 pass breakups. The Mountaineers finished the year with a +9 turnover margin (31 takes/22 gives) to rank 15th among FBS squads.
- Daryl Worley tied for third among Power Five players with six interceptions and was eighth among FBS performers with 12 passes defended.
- The Mountaineers also finished eighth among FBS squads in highest percentage of opponent three downs and out in 2011, while ranking No. 11 among Power Five squads in third-down defense (31.7%).
- In 2014, WVU's defense was eighth among Power Five teams in third-down defense (31.4%) and were No. 15 among FBS squads in terms of forcing three-and-outs. The Mountaineers also ranked No. 18 among Power Five teams in opposing passer efficiency (116.2).
- In 2013, WVU's defense was No. 4 among FBS squads with 16 fumbles recovered and ranked 14th among Power Five squads with 28 turnovers forced.
- In 2012, East Carolina tied UCF for first place in the Eastern Division of Conference USA with a 7-1 league record and made its second bowl appearance in three years with Mitchell serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach.
- Spearheaded the installation of a 3-4 scheme in 2011, an alignment that produced immediate results and earned ECU a reputation as one of most improved units nationally as the Pirates allowed 947 total net yards and 185 fewer points than the previous season.
- Tutored cornerback Emanuel Davis to back-to-back All-Conference USA selections and developed Damon Magazu into a ball-hawking free safety who led the team with four interceptions and three fumble recoveries in 2011.
- Accompanied McNeill to East Carolina after a four-season stint at Texas Tech.

- Jamar Wall led the secondary with 62 tackles and two interceptions in 2008 and earned All-Big 12 honors in 2009 after ranking second nationally with 17 passes defended.
- The Red Raiders pass defense led the Big 12 Conference in net passing yards in both 2006 and 2007. In 2007, Texas Tech limited foes to 188.4 ypg in that department, a figure that ranked 13th among FBS squads.
- Worked on the staff of legendary coach LaVell Edwards at BYU after a stellar playing career for the Cougars.
- Helped guide the team to five bowl appearances and a No. 5 national ranking following a 14-1 campaign in 1996, as well as back-to-back Western Athletic Conference championships.
- While at BYU, he also served as the faculty advisor to the Black Student Union from 1995-02.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- A seventh-round draft choice of Atlanta in the 1991 NFL Draft, played in 36 games over three seasons for the Falcons.
- All-WAC cornerback who played in four bowls and ran the opening leg of BYU's All-America 400M relay team.
- Still holds the school record for the longest interception return, a 97-yard effort against New Mexico in 1989.
- His 13 career interceptions stand fifth in the school's record book, while his five picks in 1989 were a season high.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

• Regarded as one of the nation's top special teams coaches, enters his first season serving as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Virginia Tech.

• Joins the Hokies after working with current Tech head coach Justin Fuente the past four seasons at Memphis.

• Brings 25 years of coaching experience with him to Blacksburg, which includes 12 seasons working as a special teams coach in the Southeastern Conference at both Ole Miss and Arkansas.

• His special teams units at Memphis were among the nation's finest the past two seasons. His 2015 squad ranked seventh in the country in overall special teams efficiency via Football Outsiders, while his 2014 unit was the best in the FBS according to ESPN.

• Helped Memphis register 19 victories during the 2014-15 seasons, including a 15-game victory streak that was highlighted by a 37-24 win over No. 13 Mississippi and a 55-48 double-OT victory in the 2014 Miami Beach Bowl against BYU.

• Memphis kicker Jake Elliott was named the American Athletic Conference's Special Teams Player of the Year Award with in both 2014 and 2015.

• Elliott was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker in 2015. Memphis was the only collegiate program to have a semifinalist for both the Ray Guy Award and the Lou Groza Award in 2014.

• A three-time Groza Award semifinalist, Elliott connected on 76.9 percent (60 of 78) of his FGs the past three seasons under Shibest with eight makes from 50 or more yards, including a school-record 56-yard FG at South Florida (11/16/13).

• Elliott established Memphis records in 2015 with 23 made field goals and 132 points. He connected on 82.1 percent (23 of 28) FGs and nailed all 63 of his PATs.

• Special teams coverage units coached by Shibest haven't allowed a kick return or punt return TD over the past five seasons. His squads ranked among the nation's top 10 in net kickoff coverage three of the past four years.

• Was part of a Memphis staff that guided the Tigers to a 10-win season in 2014, the first time the school had registered double-digit victories since 1938. The 2014 campaign also marked the first time Memphis had won a conference title since 1971.

• Memphis ranked fourth among FBS squads in punt coverage in 2014, allowing opponents only a 2.77 yards per return.

• Memphis wide receiver Keiwone Malone concluded his collegiate career with a school-record 83 punt returns for 716 yards, a figure that ranked as the fourth-highest tally in school history.

• In 2013, Shibest coached the nation's best punter, Tom Hornsey, who earned the Ray Guy Award and was honored by the American Athletic Conference as the league's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year.

• Hornsey ranked seventh nationally in punting in 2013, averaging 45.2 yards per punt. He also landed 46.8 percent (29 of 62) of his punts inside the 20.

• Memphis led Conference USA in kickoff coverage with a net average of 42.6 yards in 2013.

• Freshman tight end Alan Cross led Memphis with five TD catches in 2012 and was named to the All-Conference USA Freshman Team.

• Spent four seasons at Ole Miss, where he coached an NCAA statistical champion, four All-SEC honorees and two freshman award winners highlighted Shibest's special teams accomplishments.

• Tutored the top two kick returners in Ole Miss history in Mike Wallace and Jesse Grandy.

• In 2011, the Rebels ranked second nationally and led the SEC in punt returns with a 15.6-yard average.

• Kicker Joshua Shene wrapped up his career at Ole Miss second in career scoring (310), field goals (57), field goal attempts (75), PATs made (139) and PATs attempted (142).

• In his first season with the Rebels in 2008, Shibest was honored as the Special Teams Coordinator of the Year by FootballScoop.com.

• Shibest groomed running back Felix Jones into the SEC Special Teams Player of the Year at Arkansas in 2007. He ranked third in the nation with a 31.33-yard kickoff average with two TDs and earned a spot on the Walter Camp All-America First Team squad. Jones was a first-round pick of Dallas in the 2008 NFL Draft.

• Prior to his time at Ole Miss, Shibest spent eight years at his alma mater, Arkansas, from 2000-07, where he coached special teams and had stints tutoring tight ends (2000-01, 2006-07) and receivers (2002-05).

• Enjoyed a highly successful four-year stint as head coach at Butler County (Kan.) Community College. Shibest led the Grizzlies to a four-year record of 34-10 and back-to-back National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) championships in 1998 and 1999.

• Named the NJCAA Coach of the Year both seasons, and he also earned Jayhawk Conference Coach of the Year honors in 1996 and 1998.

• During his tenure at Butler County, Shibest coached 19 NJCAA All-Americans and 34 NCAA Division I signees, including Jermaine Petty who earned All-America first team honors from the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

• Led the Grizzlies to records of 7-4 in 1996, 4-5 in 1997, 12-0 in 1998 and 11-1 in 1999.

• Began his career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma State, coaching receivers in 1990 and running backs in 1991.

• Started his ascent through the junior college coaching ranks as offensive coordinator at Independence (Kan.) Community College in 1992 and then coached the secondary in 1993.

• Embarked on a two-year tenure as an assistant at Garden City (Kan.) Community College. There, he helped the Bronco Busters to a 10-1 record in 1994 and a 9-2 mark in 1995 with an offense that ranked sixth in the NJCAA.

• Prep All-American receiver at Houston's MacArthur High School earned All-Southwest Conference honors at Arkansas in 1984 and 1986, amassing a then-school-record 1,920 receiving yards on 97 receptions, including 10 touchdowns.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- Two-way player at Oklahoma State who saw duty at both defensive tackle and tight end.
- Blocked for a pair of Pro Football Hall of Fame running backs in Thurman Thomas and Barry Sanders.
- Was also a teammate of current Oklahoma State head coach, Mike Gundy, who quarterbacked OSU from 1986-89.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Veteran offensive line coach represents another longtime associate of head coach Justin Fuente to Blacksburg. Their relationship dates back to 1999 when Vice served as offensive line coach at Murray State and Fuente was the Racers' quarterback. The duo later coached together at Illinois State before reuniting at Memphis.
- Fuente's "Hard, Smart, Tough" mantra is personified in Vice, who played collegiately as a defensive lineman and tight end at Oklahoma State in the 1980s.
- Credited with helping Fuente establish a winning and competitive culture at Memphis, taking a once moribund program to back-to-back bowl games in 2014-15.
- During his final two campaigns at Memphis, the Tigers compiled a 19-7 record and allowed a conference-low 32.0 sacks, cutting that sack total in half compared to the 64.0 sacks Memphis allowed in the two years prior to his arrival in 2010-11. The Tigers also set a school record, scoring 993 points over that two-season period.
- The Tigers permitted a mere 17.0 sacks in 2015 as only nine teams in the Power Five permitted fewer. Memphis allowed 16.0 sacks in 2014, a total that ranked 15th among FBS squads.
- The rapid development of a blocking unit to protect QB Paxton Lynch allowed the Memphis passer to complete 64.8 percent (555 of 856) of his passes for 6,807 yards with 50 touchdowns and 13 interceptions, good for a 147.9 rating during the 2014-15 seasons. By contrast, Memphis registered only 24 TD passes during the 2010 and 2011 seasons combined.
- The Memphis ground game also prospered thanks to Vice's blocking unit. In 2014-15, the Tigers averaged 185.0 rushing ypg and recorded 60 rushing TDs after averaging a 87.8 rushing ypg and scoring 15 rushing TDs in 2010-11.
- To put the ascent of the Memphis rushing game in additional perspective, Vice and the offensive staff inherited a squad that averaged 84.0 rushing ypg in 2011. The only FBS program that ran for fewer yards per game was Miami (Ohio) at 73.8 ypg.

- During the 2015 campaign, Memphis scored 40.2 ppg to rank 11th among FBS squads, while coming in 18th in passing offense (307.5 ypg) and 19th in total offense (486.9 ypg). The Tigers also ranked eight among FBS squads on third down, converting on 48.8 percent (101 of 207) of their opportunities.
- Prior to rejoining Fuente at Memphis, Vice spent three seasons at Louisiana-Monroe (2009-11) where his offensive front paved the way for 21 rushing scores in 2009 and 22 rushing TDs in 2011. The Warhawks amassed 392.3 ypg of total offense in 2009, the program's highest offensive output since joining the FBS.
- RB Frank Goodin finished the 2009 season with 1,126 rushing yards, good for the fourth-highest seasonal total in school history, while his 13 TDs were the second-best mark in Louisiana-Monroe history as the squad averaged 183.9 rushing ypg.
- The Warhawks were tied for 21st in the FBS by permitting 16.0 sacks in 2009.
- During Vice's four seasons at Utah State, a quartet of his offensive linemen earned All-Western Athletic Conference (WAC) honors including Ryan Tonnemacher who was a two-time Rimington Trophy Watch List nominee at center.
- Enjoyed a five-year stint Illinois State as offensive line coach with additional responsibilities as assistant head coach.
- Three of Vice's linemen earned All-America honors and eight garnered All-Gateway Conference accolades at Illinois State. In 2003, the Redbirds established a school record with 248.1 yards per game rushing and allowed just 5.0 sacks on 367 pass attempts, tying as the fifth-lowest tally among FCS squads.
- Part of the Hokies' "Murray State Mafia," joining Fuente, Bud Foster and Charley Wiles who also spent time with the Racers earlier in their careers.
- Spent three seasons as tight ends coach at Clemson under head coach Tommy West from 1996-98.
- Began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Ray Goff at Georgia before spending three seasons in the Georgia high school coaching ranks.


PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- A four-year letterwinner and three-year starter at running back for New Mexico (1998-2001), he finished his career with 1,833 rushing yards, the 14th-most in school history. He also remains the Lobos' single-season leader in punt returns (46) and punt return yardage (392) – both set in 2000 – and ranks 12th all-time in all-purpose yards with 2,912 yards.
- Named the Los Angeles Class 4A Player of the Year as a senior at San Pedro High School.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Well-versed in the offensive philosophy of head coach Justin Fuente and offensive coordinator Brad Cornelsen, Wiggins' relationship with that duo and current Tech offensive line coach Vance Vice dates back to their time together at Illinois State.
- Enters his initial season with the Hokies and will coach the wide receivers at Virginia Tech. Joins the Hokies from Memphis, where he spent the past four seasons in the same capacity.
- An integral component of Fuente's staff that helped lead Memphis to 19 victories and back-to-back bowl appearances in 2014-15. That amazing run featured a 15-game winning streak, the school's first conference championship since 1971 and a double-overtime win over BYU in the Miami Beach Bowl.
- Inherits an All-ACC pass catcher in WR Isaiah Ford, who set single-season Tech records with 75 receptions for 1,164 yards and 11 touchdowns as a sophomore in 2015.
- Drastically improved the production of the wide receivers corps at Memphis. That position accounted for 125 receptions for 1,417 yards and eight touchdowns in 2012 and made incremental gains each subsequent season.
- Memphis wideouts registering 148 receptions, 1,687 yards and four TDs in 2013 and upped that total to 205 receptions for 2,422 yards and 14 TDs in 2014 before that hauling in 255 passes for 3,277 yards and 19 TDs in 2015.
- In total, Memphis registered 53 total receiving scores in 2014-15, compared to only 24 TD passes in the two seasons before Wiggins accompanied Fuente to the school.
- Under Wiggins' tutelage, WR Mose Frazier (who began his career at Arkansas-Pine Bluff) enjoyed a breakout senior campaign in 2015, leading the Tigers with 70 catches for 797 yards, while adding four scores.
- The Tigers ranked 18th in passing offense (307.5 ypg) among FBS squads and were 19th in total offense (486.9 ypg) in 2015, while finishing 11th in scoring offense (40.2 ppg). Memphis also ranked eighth in the nation in third-down conversions at 48.8 percent (101 of 207).
- Memphis posted a 10-3 mark in 2014 thanks to a potent offense that ranked 21st among FBS squads by averaging 36.2 ppg.

- Frazier and fellow WR Keiwone Malone formed a dynamic tandem of wideouts for the Tigers in 2014, combining for 92 receptions, 1,061 yards and seven TDs.
- Joined the Memphis program after a one-year stint coaching running backs under head coach Bill Blankenship at Tulsa in 2010.
- His Tulsa running backs combined for 2,006 rushing yards, while H-Back Willie Carter led Tulsa with 868 receiving yards that season, meriting a spot on the All-Conference USA Second Team.
- Enjoyed a five-year tour of duty coaching running backs at Illinois State from 2006-10, helping guide the Redbirds to the FCS quarterfinals in his initial season on the staff.
- Under his tutelage in 2006, RB Pierre Rembert earned All-America accolades and rushed for a school-record 1,743 yards. From 2006-08, Illinois State averaged 187.7 rushing ypg and racked up 76 rushing scores.
- Wiggins began his coaching career at his alma mater of New Mexico after enjoying a standout playing career for the Lobos.

COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

- Enters his 21st season coaching Virginia Tech's defensive line, making him the second-longest tenured member of the Virginia Tech staff behind only associate head coach/defensive coordinator Bud Foster who joined the Hokies in 1987.
- The productivity and consistency of Virginia Tech's defensive front have been hallmarks of Tech's vaunted "Lunch Pail Defense" over the years, thanks in large part to Wiles.
- Dating back to 1996 when Wiles began his tenure coaching Tech's defensive line, the Hokies have registered 749.0 sacks, the highest total of any team in the nation over that span.
- The Hokies are tied for the nation's best mark in third-down defense since 1996, limiting opponents to a 31.6 conversion rate.
- The ability of Wiles' linemen to put pressure on the passer also helps explain why Virginia Tech has forced an FBS-best 337 interceptions during his tenure in Blacksburg.
- With Wiles helping Foster devise schemes to stop the run, Tech has permitted an average of 115.3 rushing ypg dating back to 1996 to rank sixth nationally.
- Since he joined Tech as defensive line coach, only Ohio State (16.5 ppg) and Alabama (16.6) own better scoring defenses over the past 20 seasons than Virginia Tech (17.4).
- Has coached five All-America selections – Cornell Brown (1995 & 1996), Corey Moore (1998 & 1999), John Engelberger (1999), Darryl Tapp (2005) and David Pugh (2001).
- The most highly-decorated member of that group was Moore, who became the first-ever Tech defender to earn unanimous All-America honors in 1999.
- Moore also earned the 1999 Bronco Nagurski Award as the college football's defensive player of the year while also taking home the Lombardi Award as the national lineman of the year as the Hokies tied for the national lead with 58.0 sacks and advanced to the national championship game.
- Under his tutelage, 26 different Virginia Tech defensive linemen have earned all-conference honors. In 2015, Luther Maddy (second team), Dadi Nicolas (third team) and Corey Marshall (honorable mention) continued Wiles' trend of producing All-ACC performers as Tech extended its string of consecutive bowl berths to 23 straight years.
- In 2014, his linemen helped contribute 26.0 sacks as the Hokies ranked second among Power Five squads with 48.0 sacks.
- Behind second-team All-ACC pick, Derrick Hopkins, Tech ranked 10th nationally in rushing defense (110.9 ypg) and tied for eighth with 39.0 sacks in 2013 as all four starting linemen were represented on an All-ACC squad.
- His front was part of a 2011 defense that ranked seventh in the country in scoring defense (17.6 ppg) and 10th in total defense (304.6 ypg).

- Tech claimed the ACC title in 2010 as the Hokies led the nation with a +19 turnover differential (32 takes/13 gives) and ranked second among FBS squads with 23 INTs.
- In 2006, Virginia Tech led the nation in scoring defense (11.0 ppg), total defense (219.5 ypg) and pass defense (128.2 ypg).
- Wiles' 2005 defensive line was led by first-team All-America Darryl Tapp who helped Tech lead the nation in total defense (247.6 ypg) and rank second in the nation in scoring defense (12.9 ppg).
- Tech won the ACC title during its debut season in 2004 when its defense ranked second nationally in scoring defense (12.8 ppg) and came in fourth in both total defense (268.0 ypg) and pass defense (152.8 ypg).
- The Sporting News ranked Tech's 2001 defensive line coached by Wiles as the fourth-best in the nation.
- In 1999, Corey Moore was chosen the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year for a second consecutive year as The Sporting News rated Tech's defensive front the best in the college football as the Hokies rattled off an undefeated regular season behind the nation's stingiest scoring defense (10.5 ppg).
- Under Wiles' guidance, one-time walk-on John Engelberger earned All-BIG EAST honors in both 1997 and 1998 before earning second team All-America honors from the AP in 1999.
- Wiles embarked on his two-decade career coaching the defensive line at Tech in 1996 when his star pupil was All-America defensive end Cornell Brown.
- As co-defensive coordinator at Murray State in 1995, he helped lead the Racers to an 11-0 regular-season mark and a berth in the Division I-AA playoffs.
- Originally began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for the Hokies in 1987, Frank Beamer's first season as Tech's head coach.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS

- Wiles won Kodak Division I-AA All-America honors as an offensive lineman at Murray State in 1986 playing under Frank Beamer, who served as the Racers' head coach.
- Is one of three former Murray State players on the current Tech coaching staff, joining head coach Justin Fuente and associate head coach/defensive coordinator, Bud Foster.



DANIELLE BARTELSTEIN

SENIOR DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Danielle Bartelstein is in her first season as the senior director of football operations for new football head coach Justin Fuente. She oversees the daily administrative and operational duties within Virginia Tech's football program, the handling of team travel, and other assorted responsibilities to ensure that the program functions smoothly and efficiently.

"She possesses all of the attributes that I wanted in this role," Fuente said. "She's extremely organized, works hard, is passionate

about helping us win and understands the high standards we'll have for our program. Most importantly, she always has the best interests of our student-athletes and their families at heart."

Bartelstein is the only female in such a role among Power 5 schools and one of just four among all Football Bowl Subdivision schools. The Chicago, Illinois native came to Tech after working for a year as a senior advisor for Hance Scarborough, LLP, a prestigious law firm in Austin, Texas, where she assisted in the overall management for the former U.S. Congressman and Chancellor Emeritus at Texas Tech University. However, she possesses a lot of experience in working with football programs, having served in various operational capacities at Texas Tech, TCU, and Stanford.

Prior to working for Hance Scarborough, Bartelstein served as the director of football relations at Texas Tech from 2013-15. She was responsible for the day-to-day recruiting operations. This included coordinating all official and unofficial visits, developing seasonal recruiting campaigns, and evaluating and organizing all off-campus recruiting activities. She also assisted in the logistics of team travel and the operation of summer camps.

Before heading to Texas Tech, Bartelstein worked at TCU as the assistant director of football operations (2010-12) under head coach Gary Patterson. While at TCU, she worked with Fuente, who served as the quarterbacks coach and co-offensive coordinator at the time. She helped coordinate team travel, organized and maintained the recruiting database, and served as the contact for high schools and junior colleges. She was also the liaison to pro scouts.

Her first stop in college football occurred at Stanford, where she worked as a volunteer for then-head coach Jim Harbaugh. She helped with summer camps and game-day logistics.

Bartelstein's interest in sports came at a young age, as she learned about the game of football from her grandfather, Steve Reid, who was an All-America lineman at Northwestern during the 1930s and was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1985. When she went to Illinois, where she received her undergraduate degree, she volunteered to help with the football program – her first step toward a career in the sport.

She graduated in 2006 and moved to California to start teaching. She missed football, and with her summers free, she approached the Stanford football program in hopes of finding an opportunity. Her work there and the relationships that she cultivated ultimately have led her to Virginia Tech.

CHUCK CANTOR
DIRECTOR FOR PLAYER PERSONNEL

Chuck Cantor is in his third year as the director for player personnel for Virginia Tech football program, as he oversees all aspects of the football recruiting process – from official and unofficial visits to academic eligibility of prospects to social media and camps.

Cantor came to Virginia Tech following a year at Temple University as the coordinator of external operations/on-campus recruiting coordinator.

Cantor worked at LIU-C.W. Post as the receivers coach in 2013, and prior to that, he worked as an offensive graduate assistant at Middle Tennessee State in 2012. From 2008-11, he worked at Georgia with head coach Mark Richt as an assistant athletic recruiting coordinator, where he was an integral part of the recruiting efforts that landed Georgia's "Dream Team" recruiting class of 2011 considered by many to be the top recruiting class in the country.

In 2007, Cantor served as a recruiting assistant at Rutgers under then-head coach Greg Schiano for a year. Prior to that, he worked at his alma mater – Florida State – as a graduate assistant. Cantor, a native of New Hyde Park, N.Y., graduated from Florida State in 2006 with a degree in social science education and sport management and earned his master's from Florida State in 2011 (sport management).



THOMAS GUERRY
DIRECTOR OF HIGH SCHOOL RELATIONS

Thomas Guerry is in his third year as the director of high school relations for the Virginia Tech football program, as he is tasked with enhancing Tech's recruiting efforts by taking the lead on communicating with high school football coaches, assisting with official and unofficial visits and working on increasing the social media presence of the Virginia Tech football program.

Guerry came to Tech from Georgia, where he worked for the University of Georgia Athletic Association starting in 2010 as an assistant to the director of football operations. He also assisted with recruiting visits, was responsible for updating MarkRicht.com on a daily basis, and assisted with character education and the UGA Football Mentor Program.

In 2011, Guerry was promoted to football recruiting assistant and served in that position for three years.

The Madison, Miss., native graduated from Mississippi State in 2008 with a degree in business administration and earned his master's from Mississippi State in 2010 (M.B.A. with a minor in sport administration).



MATT TRANSUE
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PLAYER PERSONNEL AND RECRUITING

Matt Transue is in his first year on the Virginia Tech football staff, serving as the assistant director of player personnel and recruiting. Transue is responsible for assisting in the day-to-day operations of the Hokies' recruiting department. This includes managing databases, overseeing student workers and volunteers, taking care of administrative duties, assisting with content for the program's social media channels, and other general duties as assigned.

He also serves as the team's pro liaison to the NFL. Transue worked with Fuente and many members of his staff as a recruiting volunteer at the University of Memphis during the 2015 season.

While in Memphis, he also worked as an account executive in the ticket office of the Memphis Redbirds, the Triple-A affiliate of the St. Louis Cardinals. The Brentwood, Calif., native, is a graduate of the University of Tennessee, with an undergraduate degree and a master's degree in recreation and sport management. While at Tennessee, he served as a student assistant, and later a graduate assistant, in the football recruiting/operations area from 2011-15.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech continues to evolve, incorporating new ideas by utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

The team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, acupuncturists, brace consultants, sport psychologists, nutritionists and massage therapists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Virginia Tech's student-athletes.

Following the 10th full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room, the space was expanded in 2013 to create a facility that unites the training and medical staffs in a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes.

Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The addition of the rehabilitation area makes Tech the first school to install the new Pavi Gym Customized flooring and X-Lab Fitness Rack, while also adding numerous pieces of equipment to address strength, flexibility, proprioception, and cardiovascular endurance. This space is directly joined with the new training area that is home to dozens of training

tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, and a Biodex System 3.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the LewisGale Hospital at Montgomery's SWVA Center for Orthopaedics and various specialty services offered through HCA Southwest Virginia and its affiliated hospitals.

"We are privileged to have access to the finest physicians and services that HCA has at its disposal," Goforth said. "It is comforting knowing that our local hospital has the best care available in this region of the country for our student-athletes."

The team's chiropractor, Dr. Greg Tilley, also provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions and plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

"As certified athletic trainers, for us to have the resources we have is a tremendous asset," Goforth said. "The knowledge and skills that they bring are invaluable."

Over the past 17 years, Tech has developed the reputation for producing top-level certified athletic trainers. Graduates are now employed in positions across the country at various levels of the profession.

MIKE GOFORTH

ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR FOR SPORTS MEDICINE

Responsibilities: As associate athletics director for sports medicine, Goforth oversees the healthcare needs of all student-athletes and organizes all trainers and doctors while supervising all other healthcare-related services that Tech offers.

Joined VT Staff: 1998; 18th year.

Prior to Virginia Tech: Goforth came to Tech from the Hamilton Medical Center/Bradley Wellness Center in Dalton, Georgia, where he was the director of wellness and sports medicine. He has an extensive background in sports medicine, working at East Tennessee State University, William Fleming High School, Tusculum College, Greene County Sports Medicine/Industrial Cooperative, and Pioneer Sports Medicine/Physical Therapy Clinic. He also has consulted on program development throughout the country.

Education: East Tennessee State University, 1991, B.A. in physical education; Virginia Tech, 1995, master's in sport management.

Family: Goforth and wife Tracy, a teacher at Blacksburg Middle School, have two sons, Ethan and Luke.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Department contracts with the Thomas E. Cook Counseling Center to provide psychological services for its student-athletes through the Sport Psychology Office. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes.

The mission of the sport psychology office is to promote student-athlete learning and development. Consistent with the university's mission to "educate the whole person," the sport psychology Program

promotes the academic, intellectual, social, emotional, athletic, and personal development of student-athletes.

On average, Bennett conducts more than 50 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises. The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to student-athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

DR. GARY BENNETT SPORT PSYCHOLOGIST

Responsibilities: Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication, and performance enhancement. Bennett has taught and supervised pre-doctoral level interns.

Joined VT Staff: 2000 (full time since 2007); 17th year.

At Virginia Tech: Bennett began working at Virginia Tech in 1995 at the Cook Counseling Center. Now, as the sport psychologist, he also serves on the committees for nutrition, performance, and substance abuse; and the planning committee for the "Summit for Student-Athlete Success" events. He also works with various teams in the area of performance enhancement.

Education: Centre (Ky.) College, 1981, B.A. in English, where he played baseball; University of Kentucky, 1988, master's in rehabilitation counseling; University of Kentucky, 1995, Ph.D in counseling psychology.

Of Note: Bennett is licensed as a clinical psychologist and has additional training in sport psychology. He is certified as a sport psychology consultant by the Association of Applied Sport Psychology and is a member of Division 47 (exercise and sport psychology) of the American Psychology Association.

Personal: Bennett lives in Blacksburg and enjoys playing golf and basketball, as well as hiking and skiing, in his spare time.



JENNIE ZABINSKY, MAEd, RD SPORTS NUTRITIONIST

Responsibilities: Zabinsky is responsible for all nutrition and performance related concerns for varsity student-athletes, including individual counseling, team talks, body composition analysis using the Bod Pod, recovery nutrition plans, grocery store tours, training table menu planning, travel meal arrangements, managing the Nutrition Oasis and Fueling Stations, and supplement education.

At Virginia Tech: Zabinsky worked as the sports nutrition graduate assistant under former director Amy Freel before being hired as director. She directs the nutrition and performance committee.

ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR FOR STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Ben Hilgart enters his initial year as associate AD for strength and conditioning after being hired by head coach Justin Fuente in January 2016.

Named a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association – the highest given in the profession – Hilgart owns an impressive resume. He has trained numerous players who have gone on to play in the NFL during his previous stints at New Mexico, Arizona State, Ohio State, and UTEP. In his seven years at Arizona State, 10 players earned first-team all-conference recognition, including tight end Zach Miller, who would go on to earn All-America honors in 2006.

Hilgart oversees the Hokies' entire football strength and conditioning program, which includes all phases of strength, conditioning, rehabilitation, and injury prevention.

Before coming to Tech, Hilgart spent four seasons at New Mexico, including the past two as the director of athletic performance. He was in charge of the entire athletics performance initiative for the Lobos and he was also responsible for a redesign of the Athletic Performance Center, revamping the area into one of the top performance centers in the West.

Prior to working at New Mexico, Hilgart spent seven years at Arizona State, which included the final four seasons as the head sports performance coach. He worked directly with the Sun Devils' football program in addition to overseeing the sports performance programs for all 20 of Arizona State's sports.

Before arriving at Arizona State, Hilgart spent two seasons at Ohio State. He started as the assistant strength and conditioning coach before being promoted to associate strength and conditioning coach. He also spent two

years at UTEP as the graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach. He served as the head strength coach and assistant defensive line coach at his alma mater, Western Illinois, in 2001.

Hilgart was a two-year letterman at Western Illinois, earning his bachelor's degree in physical education in 2001, and he earned his master's degree in kinesiology from UTEP in 2003. Hilgart also once served as the head strength coach at Deer Valley High School in Glendale, Arizona.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program with counseling and advising for student-athletes, offering academic counseling to ensure students receive a complete system of support consistent with university and NCAA policies.

Student-athletes have access to the department's spacious facilities, located in the West Side of Lane Stadium. Opened during the 2006-07 academic year, the SAASS suite, located in the Quillen Family Academic Center, features 17 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 36-station computer lab with printer access, a conference room, three quiet areas for reading and studying and a reference library. To accommodate the busy schedules of all of Tech's student-athletes, the SAASS office is open and available for students to access from 8 a.m., until 10 p.m., weekdays and from 6 p.m., to 10 p.m., on weekends. The SAASS office offers a tutor program available

to Tech's student-athletes in both individual and group settings. Tutor services are available six days a week and the staff assures options for nearly every subject a student-athlete could request assistance in. The collection of SAASS programs housed in Lane Stadium guarantees that all student-athletes achieve success during their time at Virginia Tech.

Tech's football student-athletes have always seen great success in the classroom much in part to the help of the SAASS office. Since 2012, 100 percent of Hokie seniors have earned their degree, and the football team has earned some of its highest scores ever in the Academic Progress Rate (APR) in recent reports. Academic All-America honorees in past years have included the likes of Danny Coale and Chris Drager. Among FBS schools, Tech is annually among the best in the number of players on the current roster who have already earned their undergraduate degrees.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

BLACKSBURG – Ohio State quarterback Cardale Jones threw two touchdown passes and rushed for 99 yards, as the No. 1-ranked Buckeyes rallied from a small halftime deficit to defeat Virginia Tech 42-24 at Lane Stadium on Monday night.

Jones had a touchdown pass and a touchdown run in the second half, helping the Buckeyes avenge last season's 35-21 loss to the Hokies in Columbus, Ohio. Behind Jones, Ohio State amassed 572 yards of total offense.

Worse than the loss, Hokies quarterback Michael Brewer fractured his collarbone in the third quarter and was expected to miss at least 4-8 weeks after surgery.

After Brewer's injury, the Hokies didn't mount much in the way of offense behind untested backup Brenden Motley. Tech amassed just 77 yards of offense after Brewer left the game.

Braxton Miller gave the Buckeyes a 28-17 lead on a 53-yard touchdown run with 2:05 left in the third quarter. Jones' 10-yard touchdown run with 12:26 left in the game essentially put the game away.

Brewer completed 11 of 16 for 156 yards and two touchdowns for the Hokies. Motley completed 4 of 9 for 36 yards, with a touchdown and an interception.

BLACKSBURG – Coming off a short week and playing a quarterback who came into the season as the backup left Virginia Tech fans feeling that disaster loomed on the horizon. But Brenden Motley took away those doubts.

Making his first collegiate start, Motley threw two touchdown passes and rushed for a touchdown to lead the Hokies past Furman 42-3 on Saturday afternoon. Motley started in place of injured Michael Brewer, who broke his collarbone in the Hokies' Monday night loss to No. 1 Ohio State.

Enter Motley, a redshirt junior who played his high school ball at nearby Christiansburg High School. He completed 16 of 24 passes for 233 yards, and he also rushed for 38 yards on four carries.

Mostly behind Motley, Virginia Tech (1-1) finished with 583 yards of total offense, the Hokies' most in a game since 2010 and their most under offensive coordinator Scot Loeffler, who took over in 2013. Virginia Tech had a balanced attack, running for 299 yards and throwing for 284.

Much of that came in the second half. The Hokies had 371 yards in the final 30 minutes, including 200 on the ground.

Andrew Motuapuaka's interception return for a touchdown – his second career touchdown – headlined a Tech defense that forced three turnovers and held Furman to 254 yards.

Travon McMillian paced the Hokies' rushing attack with 98 yards on six carries, while Lawson finished with 51 on nine carries. Cam Phillips and Ford each caught five passes for 86 and 77 yards, respectively.

GREENVILLE, N.C. – East Carolina quarterback James Summers rushed for 169 yards and threw for 110 yards, helping the Pirates rally from a 14-0 deficit to beat Virginia Tech 35-28 in a non-conference game at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium on Saturday.

The loss marked the Hokies’ second straight to the Pirates, who downed Tech in Blacksburg last year. Tech lost in Greenville, North Carolina, for the first time since 1992.

East Carolina scored 28 consecutive points at one stretch after the Hokies scored two touchdowns off Pirate turnovers.

Tech had two chances to score in the final five minutes. One drive ended when Bucky Hodges couldn’t corral a fourth-down pass from Motley that would have given the Hokies a first down in ECU territory. The final chance came at the end of the game when Tech got the ball to its 41 and tried a “Hail Mary” that fell incomplete.

Motley led the Hokies with 366 of their 439 yards of offense. He completed 20 of 35 for 281 yards, with a touchdown and an interception. He also rushed for 85 yards and a score.

BLACKSBURG – Pittsburgh rushed for 166 yards and its defense held the Hokies in check for much of the game, enabling the Panthers to knock off Virginia Tech 17-13 in the ACC opener for both schools.

The win marked just Pittsburgh's second in Blacksburg – the other one came in 2002 – and sent the Hokies to their second straight loss. Pittsburgh is now 3-1 overall, 1-0 in the ACC. Tech is 2-3, 0-1.

Tech cut a 17-10 lead to 17-13 on a 48-yard field goal by Joey Slye with 13:20, but the Hokies couldn't get any closer. Their next three drives ended in an interception, a punt and an interception.

Tech finished with only 100 yards of total offense, including just nine rushing. Brenden Motley was sacked seven times, and he completed 9 of 20 for 91 yards, with a touchdown and three interceptions.

Off to a slow start, the Hokies finally put together a good drive spanning the first and second quarters. A 12-play, 83-yard drive that took more than six minutes ended when Motley hit Cam Phillips for an 11-yard touchdown play. The big play on the drive, though came two plays earlier when, on third-and-17 from the Pittsburgh 40, Motley completed a 28-yard pass to tight end Bucky Hodges for a first down. Slye's extra point following the touchdown cut the Pittsburgh lead to 10-7 with 11:38 left in the half.

Pittsburgh wasted little time in getting going in the second half. Ollison rumbled 43 yards on the Panthers' first play from scrimmage, giving Pittsburgh a first down at the Tech 25. On the next play, he scored, and Blewitt's extra point gave the Panthers a 17-7 lead.

Tech sliced into that lead midway through the third quarter. Andrew Motuapuaka forced Ollison to fumble, and the Hokies' Terrell Edmunds recovered and returned it to the Pittsburgh 23. The drive stalled, but the Hokies got a 43-yard field goal from Joey Slye to cut the lead to 17-10 with 6:03 left in the third quarter.

That turned out to be their last score. On the final eight plays from scrimmage, Tech's offense turned the ball over twice and gave up three sacks.

BLACKSBURG – Virginia Tech quarterback Brenden Motley threw three touchdown passes to Isaiah Ford, and the Hokies rushed for 200 yards, as they notched a much-needed 28-13 victory over ACC foe NC State on Friday night.

For the second straight game, Tech found itself behind 10-0 in the first half. But Tech's defense responded after that, holding the Wolfpack to just a field goal the rest of the game. In fact, the Wolfpack amassed just 125 yards in the final three quarters and finished with just 270 yards for the game.

The Hokies' defense also held NC State quarterback Jacoby Brissett in check. Brissett threw for just 113 yards and his streak of passes without an interception ended at 241 when Adonis Alexander intercepted him in the fourth quarter.

Tech's offense exploded in the second quarter, scoring on three straight possessions – all ending on touchdown passes from Motley to Ford. Motley's 27-yard touchdown pass to Ford with 10:41 left in the first half cut the NC State lead to 10-7 and then his 5-yard touchdown pass to Ford with 5:54 left in the first half gave Tech a lead it would not relinquish.

A 2-yard touchdown pass to Ford with 18 seconds left gave the Hokies a 21-10 lead at halftime. Ford became the first Tech receiver since Ernest Wilford in 2002 (Syracuse) to catch at least three touchdown passes in a game. Wilford caught four in the Hokies' triple overtime loss to the Orangemen.

NC State added a field goal in the third quarter, but the Hokies put the game way midway through the fourth quarter. Leading 21-13 and taking over at their own 12, they drove to their own 41 before Motley handed the ball off to Travon McMillian on a second-down play. McMillian broke down the left sideline, hurdled a tackler and went 59 yards for a touchdown that gave Tech a 28-13 lead with 6:54 left in the game.

BLACKSBURG – Virginia Tech tailback Travon McMillian rushed for a career-high 142 yards, but it wasn't enough as the Hokies came up on the losing end of a 45-43 four-overtime affair with the No. 23 Duke Blue Devils.

Duke quarterback Thomas Sirk threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Erich Schneider in the fourth overtime and then ran in the two-point conversion to give Duke the wild win in the first four-overtime game in ACC history.

With the loss, Tech fell to 3-5 overall, 1-3 in the ACC. Duke moved to 6-1 overall, 3-0 in league play.

The Hokies had taken a 43-37 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run by McMillian to start the fourth overtime. Tech went for two points, as required by NCAA rules, but quarterback Michael Brewer's pass attempt to Isaiah Ford was broken up by a Duke defender.

Brewer completed 24 of 45 for 270 yards, with three touchdowns.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. – Travon McMillian rushed for 105 yards, Joey Slye booted four field goals and the Hokies' defense scored a touchdown, helping Virginia Tech down the Boston College Eagles 26-10 in an ACC game played at Alumni Stadium. The win snapped the Hokies' two-game losing streak.

The Eagles came into the game ranked in the top 10 nationally in nine defensive categories, but the Hokies got off to a good start, and the Eagles offense, which has struggled much of the season, couldn't make up the difference.

Tech's defense held the Eagles to just 218 yards and forced four turnovers, including three fumbles, and it didn't give up a touchdown until the fourth quarter. Tech's offense finished with 275 yards of offense, led by McMillian's 105 rushing and Michael Brewer's 180 throwing.

Tech's defense accounted for the Hokies' second touchdown, as mike linebacker Andrew Motuapuaka stripped Jordan Gowins of the ball at the BC 34 and then grabbed it. He returned it 34 yards for a touchdown, and Slye's extra point gave Tech a 17-0 lead with 11:01 left in the first half.

The Eagles finally got on the board toward the end of the third. An 11-play, 59-yard drive ended when Mike Knoll hit a 29-yard field goal that cut the Hokies' lead to 23-3 with 3:26 left in the third. The Eagles added a touchdown on a 3-yard run by Richard Wilson with 8:09 left in the game.

ATLANTA – Virginia Tech used great defense and a timely touchdown in the fourth quarter to rally from a 14-0 deficit and knock off Georgia Tech 23-21 in an ACC game played at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta on Thursday night.

Georgia Tech's third lost fumble of the game put Virginia Tech in prime scoring position in the fourth quarter. Virginia Tech defensive tackle Woody Baron forced Georgia Tech's Marcus Allen to fumble, and Dadi Nicolas recovered at the Georgia Tech 18 for the Hokies.

Travon McMillian took advantage, scoring a touchdown on a 4-yard run with 6:58 left that gave the Hokies the lead. Joey Slye missed the extra point, but Virginia Tech still led 23-21.

Virginia Tech's defense did the rest. Georgia Tech twice had chances to take the lead, but the Hokies held both times. On the Yellow Jackets final drive, they drove into Virginia Tech territory, but an unsportsmanlike penalty pushed them back and then the Hokies' Ken Ekanem came up with a big third-down sack of Georgia Tech's Justin Thomas. On fourth-and-27, Thomas' pass fell incomplete, enabling the Hokies to secure the win.

McMillian paced Virginia Tech's offense with 135 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Quarterback Michael Brewer threw for 178 yards and a score.

The Hokies fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter, but came from behind to tie the game at 14 at halftime following two long second-quarter scoring drives. The first one ended with a McMillian 2-yard touchdown run and the second one ended with a 17-yard touchdown pass from Brewer to Isaiah Ford.

Georgia Tech's lone score in the second half came when Brewer threw a pass that was intercepted on Georgia Tech's Brant Mitchell on third-and-10. Mitchell took it 32 yards to the end zone for a touchdown that gave the Yellow Jackets a 21-14 lead with 14 minutes left in the third quarter.

BLACKSBURG – Virginia Tech rallied from a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter to tie the game, but the Hokies couldn't quite overcome No. 12 North Carolina, falling 30-27 in overtime to the Tar Heels at Lane Stadium in what marked the final home game of Tech head coach Frank Beamer's coaching career.

There were multiple tributes to Beamer, who, on Nov. 1, announced his plans to retire at the end of the season following 29 seasons as the Hokies' head coach. The Hokies played with emotion for their head coach, but were unable to overcome the Tar Heels.

On the field, North Carolina opened a 24-10 lead in the fourth quarter, taking advantage of a Sam Rogers fumble and a Michael Brewer interception on back-to-back possessions to score two touchdowns – both on Elijah Hood touchdown runs.

But the Tar Heels couldn't salt the game away. Quarterback Marquise Williams fumbled on back-to-back possessions in the fourth quarter, with the first one leading to an 8-yard touchdown pass from Brewer to tight end Bucky Hodges and the second one leading to a 4-yard touchdown pass from Brewer to receiver Isaiah Ford.

Ford's touchdown catch came with 1:07 remaining and tied the game at 24. Tech's defense held the Tar Heels on the ensuing possession and forced a punt. The Hokies then ran out the clock, sending the game into overtime.

Tech lost the toss heading into overtime, and North Carolina elected to play defense first. The Hokies went three-and-out and settled for a 41-yard field goal by Joey Slye that gave them a 27-24 lead.

North Carolina then got the ball. The Tar Heels drove to the Tech 3, but a false start pushed them back. A 3-yard run by quarterback Marquise Williams left North Carolina faced a third-and-goal from the 5.

Out of timeouts, Williams threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Quinshad Davis to end the game. Davis appeared to be juggling the ball, but the officials reviewed the play, and the call stood.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. – Virginia Tech kicker Joey Slye hit a field goal with 1:38 remaining, and safety Chuck Clark sealed the game with an interception in the final minute to lift the Hokies past in-state rival Virginia 23-20 at Scott Stadium in Charlottesville in the regular-season finale for both teams.

The win marked Tech's 12th straight over the Cavaliers and moved the Hokies to 6-6 overall, 4-4 in the ACC. The Hokies extended another streak, becoming bowl eligible for the 23rd consecutive season.

The game marked the final regular-season game for Tech head coach Frank Beamer, who announced Nov. 1 that he was retiring at the conclusion of the season. For the second straight week, Tech's players carried their head coach off the field.

Tech trailed by seven on two occasions in the second half, but rallied both times. The final time came midway through the fourth quarter when the Hokies trailed 20-13 after Virginia quarterback Matt Johns threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to Canaan Severin with 10:04 remaining.

On the ensuing possession, the Hokies quickly went 75 yards in six plays. On third-and-15 from the UVA 27, quarterback Michael Brewer threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to Isaiah Ford, and Slye's extra point tied the game with 8:40 left.

Tech's defense held UVA on the ensuing possession, and the Hokies took over at their own 20 with 6:38 to go. Tech then drove to the Virginia 23, eating five minutes off the clock. The Hokies settled for a 41-yard field goal by Slye that gave them a three-point lead.

Virginia had time for one final drive, taking over at its 20 with 1:38 to go. But on the third play of the drive, Clark intercepted Johns' pass, and the Hokies then ran out the clock, giving Beamer his 20th victory over the Cavaliers.

Tech's offense struggled for much of the afternoon and only finished with 304 yards, but 134 of that came in the fourth quarter when the Hokies amassed 17 points to rally past the Cavaliers.

Brewer paced the Hokies offensively by completing 15 of 29 for 237 yards, with two touchdowns and an interception. Travon McMillian rushed for 81 yards on 18 carries.

HOKIES HOLD ON TO WIN INDEPENDENCE BOWL OVER TULSA

Tech sends Frank Beamer out a winner in his final game as the Hokies' head coach



SHREVEPORT, La. – Virginia Tech made the final game for its head coach a memorable one, beating Tulsa 55-52 in a record-setting performance Saturday night at Independence Stadium in Shreveport.

The win marked the final one for Frank Beamer, who decided in November to retire at the conclusion of this season after 29 seasons as the Hokies' head coach. Tech's players doused Beamer as he walked across the field to shake the hands of Tulsa coach Philip Montgomery.

Beamer finished his career with 280 coaching victories, including 238 at Tech. The win also marked the 11th bowl win for Beamer, who won three of his final four bowl games.

The win – Tech's fourth in the final five games of the season – enabled the Hokies to extend their streak of winning seasons to 23 straight. They finished 7-6 overall.

"The first time, we came to Shreveport, I left here a happy guy," an elated Beamer said afterward. "The last time I come to Shreveport, I leave here a happy guy. I'm going to come back to Shreveport just for the hell of it. I like it down here.

"I'd say for the football team ... the way we hang in there and keep battling, and we got up against a quarterback tonight who really threw well. They've got some tall guys that went up and got it. We got to scrambling around a little bit with personnel, but I give them credit. I thought we had a quarterback that stayed in there and battled and threw a lot of good balls, too.

"Great win for the program and a great way to finish this thing up."

The Hokies set a school record for points in a bowl game and total offense (598) in a bowl game, among the many records set in what turned out to be the highest-scoring Independence Bowl in history. Wide receiver Isaiah Ford set individual school records for receptions in a bowl game (12) and receiving yards in a bowl game (227). One of his catches was a 75-yarder for a touchdown, which marked the longest reception of his career.

But a defensive play sealed the game – arguably a perfect ending for a defensive-minded coach such as Beamer.

Tulsa (6-7) cut Tech's lead to 55-52 on a 36-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Dane Evans to Keyarris Garrett with 3:47 remaining. The Hokies picked up a first down on their ensuing drive, but ultimately were forced to punt, and the Golden Hurricane took over at the Tulsa 20 with two minutes left.

Tulsa drove to its 46, but on second-and-10, Tech's Luther Maddy sacked quarterback Dane Evans for a six-yard loss to the 40. An incomplete pass on third down left the Golden Hurricane facing fourth-and-16.

Forced to go for it, Evans went back to pass. But Tech defensive end Dadi Nicolas sacked him, sealing the game for the Hokies.

"I just wanted to finish it strong with my teammates, my brothers," Nicolas said. "We didn't want to take an 'L.' That was not an option for us. We kept sticking together the whole time, and God willing, He gave me the power, the strength and the skills to be able to finish that game.

"After I got the sack, it was just a great feeling. I haven't felt that feeling – a clean sack like that – in a while. I really wanted one. It was a great feeling. I looked up, and all I saw was my teammates running to

me on the field. That was just a great experience. That was the perfect play just to remember my whole college career."

The Hokies trailed 7-0 and 14-7 early in the game, as the two teams went back and forth early and often in the first five minutes of the game. But Tech tied the game on a 75-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Michael Brewer to Ford and grabbed a 17-14 lead on a 27-yard field goal by Joey Slye with 9:53 left in the quarter.

That gave the Hokies a lead they would not relinquish. Sam Rogers' 14-yard touchdown run gave Tech a 24-14 lead at the end of the first quarter – the most points scored by a Tech team in a quarter of a bowl game.

A Bucky Hodges touchdown run, a Travon McMillian touchdown run and Greg Stroman's 67-yard punt return for a touchdown enabled Tech to take a 45-21 lead in the second quarter. Tulsa scored 10 points late in the second quarter to make things interesting, cutting the lead to 45-31 at halftime.

On the opening drive of the second half, the Hokies went 81 yards in 15 plays, scoring on a 1-yard run by Trey Edmunds with 7:38 left in the third quarter. Slye's extra point gave the Hokies a 52-31 lead.

"The offensive line played great," Brewer said. "We told them there at the beginning of the game that, if we could keep getting big chunks in the run game, then it would open things up and make it easier in pass protection. We felt like if we could get some time – Isaiah and Bucky [Hodges], in particular – then we could get them open down the field. You saw that."

The Golden Hurricane scored 21 points in the final 20 minutes sandwiched around a field goal by Slye, who tied the school record for field goals in a season with his 23rd (Dustin Keys, 2008). But Tulsa couldn't get into field goal position on its final drive at the end.

Brewer completed 23 of 37 for 344 yards, with a touchdown and an interception. McMillian rushed for 82 yards on 16 carries and scored two touchdowns to lead the Hokies' rushing attack.

Ford was named offensive MVP of the bowl game. He also became the first Tech receiver in school history to go over 1,000 yards in a season.

"It gets down to people," Beamer said. "These are two great players for us [Brewer and Ford], but two great people. Isaiah's mom sent me the nicest letter this week. That's what it is really all about. That's what makes this game so good. That's why I know I've been fortunate to stay around guys like this that long. That's my final word."




JIM PYNE
C • 1993

In 1993, Jim Pyne achieved something even Bruce Smith failed to do – earn unanimous All-America honors. Pyne helped pave the way for an offensive unit that set school season marks for total offense and scoring in 1993. The Hokies averaged 444.1 yards and 36.4 points per game and finished 14th nationally in total offense, 11th in scoring offense and 10th in rushing.

Pyne was named first-team All-America by the AP, UPI, Walter Camp, the Football Writers Association and the Football Coaches Association (Kodak). He was one of the 12 semifinalists for the Lombardi Award, which goes to the nation's top lineman.

In four seasons at Tech, Pyne played more than 2,700 snaps and allowed just one quarterback sack. He started 35 consecutive games and 41 of the 42 games in which he played.



CARROLL DALE
E • 1959

After earning second-team Associated Press All-America honors as a junior in 1958, Carroll Dale went on to become the first Virginia Tech football player to earn first-team All-America honors following the 1959 season. Dale was named to the Football Writers Association (LOOK Magazine) and Newspaper Enterprise Association first teams as a senior and


was once again a second-team choice by the AP. He led Tech in receiving four straight years and finished the '59 season with 17 receptions for 408 yards and six touchdowns.



BOB SCHWEICKERT
QB • 1963, 1964

One of the finest triple-threat quarterbacks in the history of the Southern Conference, Bob Schweickert was named to the LOOK All-America team picked by the Football Writers Association following the 1964 season. Schweickert fought off injuries during the '64 season to rush for 576 yards and nine touchdowns and pass for 833 yards and nine more TDs.

He also handled the punting duties with a 37.7-yard average. As a junior in 1963, Schweickert earned third-team All-America honors from The Associated Press.




COREY MOORE
DE • 1998, 1999 (Unanimous)

Following an outstanding senior season in 1999, Corey Moore was voted first-team on all six major All-America teams to become the Hokies' second unanimous All-American. He was selected first-team by the AP, the Football Writers Association, the Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp, The Sporting News and Football News.

Moore posted a BIG EAST record 17 sacks during the '99 season to go with 11 other TFLs and 60 total tackles.

He also earned All-America honors in 1998 when he led the BIG EAST with 13.5 sacks. He gained first-team All-America recognition from the Football Coaches Association. Moore was a second-team pick by the AP and The Sporting News and a third-team choice of Football News.



FRANK LORIA
S • 1966, 1967 (Consensus)

Safety Frank Loria was the first Tech football player to gain first-team All-America honors in back-to-back seasons and became the Hokies' first consensus All-America pick in 1967. As a junior in 1966, Loria helped Tech to the Liberty Bowl, contributing three interceptions and returning three punts for touchdowns. He was named to first-team A-A squads picked

by The Associated Press and the Football Writers Association and was a second-team selection by the Helms Athletic Foundation. Loria was named to six major All-America squads following the 1967 season. He finished the year with three interceptions and 420 yards on punt returns, including a 95-yard return for a TD against Miami. His first-team honors came from the AP, United Press International, NEA, the Football Coaches Association, the Football Writers Association and the Walter Camp Foundation.



JAKE GROVE
C • 2002, 2003 (Unanimous)

Jake Grove became the third unanimous All-American in Tech football history when he was named to the first team of all five recognized All-America squads: the FWA, the AFCA, The Sporting News, the Walter Camp Football Foundation and the AP. He was a fourth-team All-American in 2002 (Sporting News).

As a senior, he was named first-team All-BIG EAST and was presented the Rimington Trophy in Lincoln, Neb., honoring the nation's top collegiate center.

In 13 regular season games, Grove graded out at 91.8 percent on over 700 offensive plays and led the offensive line in knockdowns with 48.

He went on to be drafted in the second round by the Oakland Raiders in the 2004 NFL Draft as the first center taken.



MIKE WIDGER
LB • 1968

Mike Widger capped an incredible junior season by earning first-team All-America honors from The Associated Press and the Football Writers Association. Widger compiled a record 825 tackling points and was among the national leaders in pass interceptions (7) and return yardage (203 yards). He returned two of his interceptions for touchdowns and scored another TD after pulling the football loose from a Kansas State running back and racing 46 yards to the end zone.



JIMMY WILLIAMS
DB • 2005

Jimmy Williams became Tech's fourth unanimous All-American in football history when he was named to the first team of all five recognized All-America squads: the Football Writers Association of America, the American Football Coaches Association, The Sporting News, the Walter Camp Football Foundation and the AP.

As a senior, he was named first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference and was one of three finalists for the Jim Thorpe award, honoring the nation's top collegiate defensive back.

In 13 games, he recorded 44 tackles, including two for loss and a sack, along with 14 quarterback hurries, five pass break ups and an interception.

He went on to be drafted in the second round by the Atlanta Falcons in the 2006 NFL Draft.



BRUCE SMITH
DT • 1983, 1984 (Consensus)

Bruce Smith was named to first-team All-America squads picked by the Football Coaches Association and the Newspaper Enterprise Association after registering an incredible 22 quarterback sacks as a junior in 1983. Smith, who also was named to The Associated Press second team that year, finished with a total of 55 tackles, 31 of which were behind the line of scrimmage. As a senior in 1984,

Smith accumulated 16 sacks and nine other tackles behind the line. He finished the year with 69 total tackles and was a consensus All-America pick, making first teams selected by the AP, the Football Writers of America, Kodak and Walter Camp.

HOKIE FIRST-TEAM ALL-AMERICA SELECTIONS



EUGENE CHUNG
OT • 1991

When Eugene Chung was named to the Football Writers Association All-America team following his senior season, he became the first Tech offensive lineman to win first-team All-America honors. Chung started every game at tackle for the Hokies in 1991, allowing just one quarterback sack in 730 plays. The Washington Gridiron Club honored Chung as the National Lineman of the Year.



CORNELL BROWN
DE • 1995 (Consensus), 1996

Cornell Brown became the first Virginia Tech football player to gain consensus All-America honors as a junior when he was named to five first teams in 1995. Brown was a first-team A-A pick by AP, UPI, the Football Writers Association, The Sporting News and Football News. He finished the year with 103 total tackles, including a BIG EAST-leading 14 sacks. He was selected National Defensive Player of the Year by Football News and was one of five finalists for the Defensive Player of the Year. In 1996, Brown missed three games, but still earned first-team honors from Walter Camp and second-team recognition from AP. He posted eight sacks, five other tackles behind the line, 19 quarterback hurries and 58 total tackles during the '96 season.



BILLY CONATY
C • 1996

Considered one of the top offensive linemen in school history, Billy Conaty saw action on 98 percent of Virginia Tech's offensive plays in 1996 and went on to earn first-team All-America honors from The Sporting News. Conaty helped the Hokies to a 10-2 record and a trip to the Orange Bowl that season, grading a winning percentage in 10 of the 12 games and leading the squad with 65 knockdown blocks. He finished his career by setting an all-time school record for starts and consecutive starts with 48.



MICHAEL VICK
QB • 1999

In a spectacular freshman season that saw him lead Virginia Tech to its first ever 11-0 regular season and its first appearance in the national championship game, Michael Vick became the first Tech freshman football player to earn first-team All-America honors. Vick was named first-team by The Sporting News. He also was a second-team pick by The Associated Press. The redshirt freshman quarterback was third in the voting for the 1999 Heisman Trophy and second in the voting for the AP Player of the Year. Vick led Division I-A in passing efficiency (180.37), setting a NCAA record for a freshman in the process. He completed 59.2 percent of his passes for 1,840 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also contributed 585 yards and eight TDs rushing.




ANDRÉ DAVIS
PR • 2000

André Davis finished the 2000 season second in the Division I-A ranks in punt returns and earned first-team All-America honors on the American Football Coaches Association team as a return specialist. Davis returned 18 punts for 396 yards for a school-record average of 22 yards per return. He tied another school season mark when he returned three punts for touchdowns. His 87-yard TD return against East Carolina was the second-longest in school history.



KEVIN JONES
RB • 2003 (Consensus)

One of the highest-rated recruits ever to sign with Virginia Tech, Kevin Jones rushed for a school-record 1,647 yards, including 241 yards against Pittsburgh, on 281 attempts with 21 touchdowns as a junior in '03. He went on to earn first-team All-America honors from The Sporting News, The Walter Camp Football Foundation, FWAA and AFCA. He was named to the second team by AP.



DARRYL TAPP
DE • 2005

Considered one of the best defensive ends in school history, Darryl Tapp capped an incredible career, earning first-team All-America honors by AFCA and second-team honors by The Associated Press. During his senior season, Tapp, who started all 13 games, recorded team-bests for sacks, tackles for loss and forced fumbles. He recorded 10 sacks, 14.5 tackles for loss and three forced fumbles. Tapp was also fifth on the team in tackles. He won the Dudley Award, given to the state's top player, and was a Lott Trophy finalist.



XAVIER ADIBI
LB • 2007

Xavier Adibi teamed with fellow linebacker Vince Hall throughout his career to form what was arguably the best linebacking duo in school history. Though he enjoyed a breakout season as a junior, Adibi put up eye-popping numbers as a senior on his way to first-team All-America honors from the American Football Coaches Association. He led the team with 115 tackles, including 12 tackles for loss, while chipping in three sacks and two interceptions – one of which he returned for a touchdown. In addition to being named first-team All-ACC, Adibi was also awarded a spot on The Associated Press All-America third team.



BRANDON FLOWERS
CB • 2007

Despite leaving a year early for the NFL, cornerback Brandon Flowers became only the seventh Hokie to be named a two-time All-American when he was placed on the American Football Coaches Association first team after his junior season. He was also named second team by both The Associated Press and the Walter Camp Football Foundation. Flowers was a third-team AP honoree as a sophomore. In 2007, he placed third on the team with 86 tackles from his secondary spot, adding eight tackles for loss in the process. After leading the ACC in 2006 in passes broken up and passes defended, opponents shied away from him as a junior, but he still managed nine breakups, 14 passes defended and a career-high five interceptions.



VICTOR "MACHO" HARRIS
CB • 2008

One of the nation's top cornerbacks, Victor Harris earned first-team All-America honors from Sporting News and was a second-team pick by The Associated Press after a stellar senior season. Harris considered entering the NFL Draft following his junior year, but decided to return, earning his degree along with A-A honors. He tied for 11th nationally in interceptions with six, two of which he returned for touchdowns. A two-time first-team All-ACC selection, he finished fourth in the league in interceptions and passes defended, and third in punt returns. His 15 career interceptions rank third all-time at Tech, while his four career TDs on picks are an all-time record for a Hokie.



JAYRON HOSLEY
CB • 2010

Jayron Hosley tied a 43-year old Virginia Tech season record for interceptions on the way to being selected first-team on the Walter Camp All-America squad. Hosley led the nation in interceptions with nine and tied for third in most passes defended with 17. The sophomore cornerback was also a second-team A-A pick by The Associated Press and earned the National Defensive Back Trophy from the College Football Performance Awards. Hosley was named first team All-ACC after topping the league in both interceptions and passes defended. He also ranked second among ACC players in punt returns.



NATIONAL HONORS

JAKE GROVE WON THE RIMINGTON TROPHY IN 2003

Jake Grove arrived on the Virginia Tech campus as a lightly recruited guard from Forest, Va. He left as a unanimous All-American, winner of the Rimington Trophy as the nation's top center and a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders.

Heading into his junior season, Grove made the switch over to the center position and became a natural fit. By the time he headed into his final season, he was gaining headlines and recognition for his play. He was rewarded by being named to all five major All-America first teams. He was awarded the Dave Rimington Trophy, given to the nation's top collegiate center.



MICHAEL VICK WON AN ESPY AS THE NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR IN 1999


When Michael Vick took to the field against James Madison on Sept. 4, 1999, little did people in attendance or watching on television realize they would be witnessing the beginning of the most exciting two years in Virginia Tech football history.

In 1999, Vick led the Hokies to a perfect 11-0 regular season and a berth in the national championship game, both firsts in school history. The Hokies lost that game to Florida State, but all the talk was about the performance the redshirt freshman put on in that game.

For his accomplishments that year, he was awarded an ESPY by ESPN, given to the nation's top college football player. Vick was awarded the trophy at the ESPY ceremonies on Feb. 14, 2000, in Las Vegas as he mingled with some of sports' all-time greats.

COREY MOORE EARNED THE LOMBARDI AND NAGURSKI AWARDS IN 1999

In three years on campus, Corey Moore amassed 35 sacks for losses, totaling 292 yards. He left Tech as the most decorated player ever to put on the Hokie uniform. He won the 1999 Bronko Nagurski Award as college football's Defensive Player of the Year. Moore also won the 1999 Lombardi Award as college football's lineman of the year. He became Tech's second-ever unanimous All-American, joining Jim Pyne. Moore won the Dudley Award as the top college player in Virginia, the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year award and was selected as Football News' Defensive Player of the Year.




BRUCE SMITH WON THE OUTLAND TROPHY AS THE TOP LINEMAN IN 1984

Bruce Smith, "The Sack Man" of Virginia Tech football, capped his sensational college career in 1984 by winning the Outland Trophy as America's top lineman.

The big announcement was made by Wilt Browning at a press luncheon in Tech's Bowman Room. Browning, a sports columnist of The Greensboro Daily News and a committee member of the Football Writers' Association of America, began by reading a long list of former Outland Trophy winners. He then said, "Add to that list today, the 1984 winner – Bruce Smith of Virginia Tech."

"The one thing though, that stuck in my mind was the statistic on his tackles for losses," Browning said. "In four years at Virginia Tech, he accounted for losses totaling more than five times the length of a football field (504 yards). That's amazing."

Smith was a consensus All-American and was the first Virginian to win one of the national awards (including the Heisman and the Lombardi).



CARROLL DALE


A native of Wise, Va., Carroll Dale entered Virginia Tech in 1956 as an offensive and defensive end. After seeing varsity action as a reserve in the first game of the '56 season, Dale went on to start the remaining 39 games of his college career and became Tech's first bona fide All-American. As a junior in 1958, he was named the Southern Conference Player of the Year. In 1959, Dale was captain of the Tech team and earned first-team A-A honors. Dale led the Hokies in pass receiving each of his four seasons and finished his Tech career with 67 catches for 1,195 yards and 15 touchdowns. He went on to a pro football career that lasted more than a decade and was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1987. His Tech jersey was the first to be retired.



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BRUCE SMITH

Known as "The Sack Man" of Virginia Tech football, Bruce Smith capped his sensational college career in 1984. As a Tech player, Smith had a career total of 71 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for losses totaling 504 yards. Smith had 46 career quarterback sacks, including 22 during his junior season in 1983 when he was named first-team All-America. In 1984, the Norfolk, Va., native won the Outland Trophy as America's top lineman and was a consensus All-American. Smith was the No. 1 player picked in the 1985 National Football League draft. During his pro career, he established himself as one of the greatest defensive players ever to play the game. He ended his career in 2003 as the NFL's all-time sack leader with 200.

FRANK LORIA

Despite his 5-9, 175-pound frame, Frank Loria was one of the most tenacious football players ever to play for Virginia Tech. Loria, who started every game at safety from 1965-67, rapidly established himself as one of Tech's all-time greats. During his junior year, he earned first-team All-American honors. As a senior in 1967, Loria became Tech's first consensus All-American, making seven first-team All-American squads. He finished his Tech career with seven interceptions and a number of punt return records. He went on to coach at Marshall. In 1970, at age 23, he died in an airplane tragedy that claimed the lives of the Marshall football team and staff. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1999. His number was retired prior to the 1971 season.



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JIM PYNE

Center Jim Pyne became Virginia Tech's first unanimous All-American when he made all five major teams that were selected in 1993. In addition to All-America honors, Pyne was named winner of the Dudley Award as Virginia's Player of the Year. During his four seasons at Tech, he established himself as one of the Hokies' top linemen of all time, leading the charge for the 1993 team that rewrote the school record books for scoring and total offense. Pyne started 35 consecutive games and 41 of the 42 Tech games in which he played. He allowed just one quarterback sack by the man he was assigned to block during more than 2,700 career snaps. Pyne spent nine seasons as an NFL lineman before becoming an assistant coach in the pro ranks.

BEAMER AMONG FIVE WHO HAVE HAD JERSEYS RETIRED

In 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department developed a new policy on retiring football jerseys. This special honor is bestowed to acknowledge an individual who has won an established national award in their sport, while allowing the number to continue to be worn by others. Tech no longer retires numbers. That year, three jerseys were retired in ceremonies. The jerseys of Frank Beamer, Cornell Brown and Michael Vick were the first to be honored. In 2006, Jake Grove had the same honor bestowed upon him. Corey Moore's jersey has been retired since 2009.







INDEPENDENCE BOWL WIN CAPS BEAMER'S UNPARALLELED CAREER

The Virginia Tech football team set 10 school bowl records in its 55-52 win over Tulsa in the Independence Bowl the day after Christmas, but the game will be remembered for much more than numbers or even the victory itself.

The game marked the final one for Frank Beamer, Hokie Nation's beloved and longtime football coach.

In early November, Beamer announced his plans to retire following the conclusion of the 2015 campaign. The bowl win wrapped up a 29-year tenure in which he long ago established himself as the school's all-time winningest coach. It also capped a coaching career that began in the early 1970s.

"When you're not sure it's the right thing, that's when you're not at peace," Beamer said at the news conference in which he announced his decision. "I do feel like it's the right thing to do and it's the right thing for Virginia Tech. I think it's the right time for me."

As many know, Beamer's tenure at Tech got off to a slow start. He inherited NCAA sanctions that limited the number of scholarships that were available and the Hokies went 24-42-2 in his first six seasons while he tried to guide the program through those sanctions. Many fans called for his ouster, but Dave Braine, Tech's AD at the time, made the bold decision to keep him.

Beamer certainly validated Braine's decision. He finished his career with 280 coaching victories, the final of which came at the same Shreveport, Louisiana stadium where he and the Hokies started their current streak of 23 consecutive bowl appearances. He departed with 238 coaching victories at Tech, including 11 bowl wins.

Before he arrived in Blacksburg, Tech had notched just one 10-win season. He enjoyed 13 seasons with 10 wins or more. The Hokies won 59 percent of their games from 1892 to 1986. They won 76 percent with Beamer from 1993-2011.

Beamer guided the Hokies to four ACC titles (2004, 2007, 2008 and 2010), five ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories, six BCS appearances and a trip to the 2000 national championship game. He earned five conference Coach of the Year honors (three in the BIG EAST, two in the ACC), and in 1999, he received eight national Coach of the Year awards.

Beamer only considered leaving Blacksburg on one occasion. In 2000, he accepted the North Carolina position, but got cold feet after coming back home and backed out. The decision resulted in a long-term contract at Tech – and served to endear him to the Tech faithful.

"I've thought about it," Beamer said of his legacy. "As I look at it now, I don't look at it as, 'OK, I don't have this or I don't have that or I'm not going to do this.' I look at it as that I was fortunate to stay 29 years in one place and that place is something that means a lot to my family and me. I've had several people in my family get their degrees from Virginia Tech. I think more in terms of how lucky can a guy be in that you've been able to do this for 29 years. You know as well as I do that staying one place in the coaching business is not an easy thing to do."

Beamer's decision to retire reverberated throughout the college football landscape, as coaches nationally and former players congratulated him on his decision. He departs with more coaching victories than Tom Osborne, Lou Holtz, Bo Schembechler, Steve Spurrier, and Woody Hayes.

But most remember him for the man whom he is rather than the coach he was.

"Coach Beamer has been so much more than a football coach to me," former player and current Washington Redskin DeAngelo Hall said.

"Everybody always asked me when I first got into the league, 'Why did you go to Virginia Tech over some of these other schools?' It's that personal connection, that personal touch that those coaches just created with me and a lot of other players that they were able to recruit and get to come to Blacksburg.

"But Coach Beamer has been so much more than a football coach to me and a lot of other guys. We still talk to him to this day."

"I have admired Frank Beamer for years and years and years, and to have the opportunity to work alongside him as an ACC coach has been a privilege," Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said.


Beamer departs the profession with a slew of accolades. He's already been inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame. The Football Bowl Association honored him with its Champion's Award. The College Football Hall of Fame has displays for coaches who have changed the game and Beamer is in it for his innovative work with special teams.

Now he begins the next chapter of his life, which includes spending time with wife Cheryl, watching son Shane coach at Georgia, chasing grandchildren, and lowering his golf handicap. It also includes speaking engagements, as organizations and businesses alike want to learn how a farm boy became such a success story.

He will miss the daily interactions with his assistants, and more importantly, his players, most of whom cherish their four or five years playing under him. But he has no regrets.

"No, no, not at all," Beamer said. "I feel very thankful that I was able to stay in this place and be here for 29 years. I have no regrets. I did it for a long time and I was ready to move on and feel good. I look forward to the future."







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ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide the Hokies' football program since the 1940s, won more games at Tech than any other head football coach. Prior to Beamer, no other grid coach in Virginia Tech history had served more than 10 seasons as head coach. Beamer was also the most-tenured active FBS head coach, having been at his current school consecutively longer than any other coach in the nation at the time of his retirement.

With last season's victory in the Independence Bowl, head coach Frank Beamer led the Hokies to 23 straight bowl games, making him one of four coaches all-time in college football history to accomplish that.

- been to five times as many bowl games (23) than under any other staff.
- won more bowl games (11) than under any other coaching staff.
- posted 23 straight seasons of seven or more wins for the first time in school history.
- had 244 of their last 271 games televised (90 percent).
- compiled a 174-70 record in televised games since the start of the 1995 season.
- blocked more kicks in the 1990s than any other Division I-A team.
- become one of only eight FBS schools ever to lead the nation in both scoring offense and defense in the same season.
- had at least one player from every defensive position score a touchdown.
- produced a No. 1 pick in the National Football League draft.
- had 95 players taken in the NFL Draft and more than 200 players sign with NFL teams.
- had two players who entered the program as walk-ons drafted in the top four rounds of the NFL draft.
- had 19 different players earn AP All-America honors over the past 18 seasons.
- had players win 16 major conference individual awards in the past 18 years, including three in 2011.

TECH HONORS BEAMER FOR TRANSFORMATIONAL CAREER

The school renames a street and the team's locker room after the retired football coach

Frank Beamer gave 29 years of his professional career to Virginia Tech, leading the football program to unprecedented heights and attracting national attention to the university.

In return, the university has recognized Beamer in numerous ways for his accomplishments, first renaming a campus street after him and later approving a renaming of the football team's locker room after him.

In August of 2015, the Virginia Tech Board of Visitors renamed Spring Road, the street that runs adjacent to Lane Stadium, to Beamer Way in appreciation of Beamer's years of service and extraordinary contributions to university life.

"Frank Beamer is the winningest football coach in Virginia Tech history and Cheryl [Beamer's wife] has been by his side supporting him and their family the entire way," Tech President Timothy Sands said when he made the announcement on Aug. 6, 2015, at the Hokies' first team meeting before the start of fall practice. "He has served as a figure of strength, excellence and compassion on campus and we wanted to honor Frank and Cheryl this way by renaming Spring Road to Beamer Way."

After 29 seasons as the head coach, Beamer retired at the conclusion of the 2015 season following the Hokies' win over Tulsa in the Independence Bowl. He finished his career with 280 victories, including 238 at Tech. He also won 11 bowl games and guided the Hokies to 23 straight bowl appearances.

This past spring, in March of 2016, the Board of Visitors decided more recognition of Beamer was warranted. The group approved the renaming of the football program's Team United Locker Room to The Frank Beamer Locker Room to honor Beamer for his years of service and contributions to the university and the game of football.

The locker room, which resides next to the team's indoor practice facility and outdoor practice field, was built four years ago after a generous donation from Beamer friends and longtime contributors Brian Callaghan (Class of 1993), Win Sheridan (Class of 1994), Jeff Veatch (Class of 1993) and Ted Hanson (Class of 1991). The quartet owns Apex Systems, Inc., in Richmond and their donation facilitated the construction of the facility, which now bears Beamer's name.





UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT



Timothy D. Sands is the 16th president of Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, joining the university in June of 2014. A scientist, educator and inventor, he has dedicated much of his career to advancing the impact of research and innovation in public education. As president, he engaged the university community in a visionary plan to advance Virginia Tech's role as a global land grant institution, confronting the Commonwealth's, the country's and the world's most challenging problems.

The initiative, called "Beyond Boundaries", seeks to define Virginia Tech's role a generation into the future, and align the educational experience with the needs and opportunities that will be created by changing world economies and the evolving landscape of higher education.

In collaboration with the provost and academic leadership, he has championed the development of signature Destination Areas, thematic focus areas that leverage the university's signature strengths to attract talent and generate creative energy that extends across the disciplines. The development of these areas involves reimagining Virginia Tech's Blacksburg residential campus, catalyzing the economic development of the Blacksburg-Roanoke region with a growing health science and technology center of excellence and developing the experiential learning and research potential in the National Capital Region. He prioritizes building new and enhancing existing partnerships and collaborations to use resources and expertise in a focused and efficient way across the country and the globe.

He also launched and led *InclusiveVT*, an initiative to provide leadership, collaboration, guidance, and resources to support and accelerate the implementation of inclusion and diversity goals throughout the university community.

InclusiveVT supports the imperative of inclusion and diversity as key components of a university ecosystem rich in opportunities for experiential learning, cross-disciplinary engagement and the development of cultural awareness and empathy.

President Sands' vision for Virginia Tech embraces the university's heritage of service and community, and its motto, *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve). Virginia Tech students will graduate with disciplinary mastery, technology literacy, cultural competency, resilience, empathy for others

and the passions and strengths needed for a life and career of impactful service to humanity.

Before coming to Virginia Tech, President Sands served as executive vice president for academic affairs and provost of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. He was acting president during the summer and fall of 2012, before Mitchell E. Daniels became the 12th president of Purdue.

He earned a bachelor's degree with highest honors in engineering physics and a master's degree and doctorate in materials science from the University of California, Berkeley. He joined the Purdue faculty in 2002 as the Basil S. Turner Professor of Engineering in the schools of materials engineering and electrical and computer engineering. Prior to becoming provost, he served as the Mary Jo and Robert L. Kirk Director of the Birk Nanotechnology Center in Purdue's Discovery Park.

From 1993 to 2002, President Sands was a professor of materials science and engineering at the University of California, Berkeley, and before that, he performed research and directed research groups at Bell Communications Research (Bellcore) in Red Bank, New Jersey. Throughout his career, he has participated in and led research teams and academic programs that have been characterized by open collaboration across a wide array of disciplines.

He has published more than 250 refereed papers and conference proceedings and has been granted 20 patents in electronic and optoelectronic materials and devices. His recent research efforts have been directed toward the design and development of novel nanocomposite materials for environmentally friendly and cost-effective solid-state lighting, direct conversion of heat to electrical power and thermoelectric refrigeration. He is a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the Materials Research Society (MRS) and the National Academy of Inventors (NAI). He was recently appointed to Governor McAuliffe's Council on Youth Entrepreneurship.

President Sands is joined at Virginia Tech by his wife, Dr. Laura Sands, a professor of gerontology in the Department of Human Development at Virginia Tech. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

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Whit Babcock is in his third year as Virginia Tech's Director of Athletics after being formally announced as Tech's AD on Jan. 24, 2014. The Harrisonburg, Virginia native came back to the state following stints at Cincinnati, Missouri, West Virginia and Auburn.

"It [the position] was appealing to me primarily because of two reasons – fit and opportunity," Babcock said at the news conference announcing his hiring. "My Virginia heritage – I'm a fifth-generation Virginian – certainly helps with fit and understanding the culture, and coming home is a big component.

"But it's more than that. It's also the opportunity to compete against the best and to join a championship-caliber program that is and will continue to be a leader in the ACC athletically and academically."

Babcock continues making his mark on all facets of the athletics department, from fan engagement to facilities to fundraising and coaching hires.

The 2015-16 academic year turned into a busy one for him, as he made three key coaching hires and oversaw the revamping of the Hokie Club, the athletics department's fundraising arm. Babcock's biggest hire came when he brought in Justin Fuente as the new football coach to succeed legendary Frank Beamer, who retired after the 2015 season following 29 years as the head coach of the Hokies. Fuente came to Tech after four seasons at Memphis, where he turned around a struggling program, guiding the school to 19 wins in his final two seasons there.

Babcock also tabbed Kenny Brooks to lead the Virginia Tech women's basketball program. Brooks joined the Hokies after registering 337 wins

at James Madison, where he led the Dukes to 11 consecutive postseason appearances, including six NCAA tournament berths. Babcock also tabbed John Sung to lead the women's lacrosse program after starting a program from scratch at Winthrop and proceeded to guide the Eagles to back-to-back NCAA appearances before coming to Blacksburg.

Babcock's penchant for attracting some of the nation's top coaching talent to Virginia Tech paid dividends for the Hokies in 2015-16 as men's basketball coach Buzz Williams led Tech to a 20-win season and an NIT berth in just his second season in Blacksburg. Tech registered a six-game ACC winning streak and rejuvenated the raucous atmosphere at Cassell Coliseum. Williams joined the Hokies in 2014 after a six-year stint at Marquette where he posted 139 victories and five NCAA berths.

On the fundraising front, Babcock and his staff teamed with the staff of the Hokie Club to launch a big initiative. After more than a year's worth of research, they introduced the "Hokie Scholarship Fund." The program is designed to increase funding for scholarships by requiring football and men's basketball season ticket holders in certain designated locations to meet minimum per-seat gift contributions. These contributions will provide revenue to meet the rising costs of tuition for the school's more than 550 scholarship student-athletes.

Babcock's professional background is mostly in fundraising and marketing, and he believes that success in these areas begins with developing relationships.

"People have to trust you, and you have to paint a vision for them and show them how they can make an impact," he said. "The reason we want to treat all of our fans well is because they are all important. There's an old adage in our business that everyone's first gift is their smallest. If you do things right, it moves on up the line. So we'll look forward to engaging everybody and focus on that point of creating memorable experiences when they come in contact with us."

The 2015-16 academic year also saw Babcock and his staff secure corporate donations for upcoming facilities projects. Carilion Clinic committed \$5 million that will be used for scholarships and improvements to Cassell Coliseum, and Union Bank committed \$3.5 million toward improvements to English Field, the Hokies' baseball home.

In addition, Babcock unveiled future projects that include improvements to the department's academic center and student-athlete development areas, Rector Field House, Tech Softball Park, and Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center. These plans follow the completion of the new \$21.3 million indoor practice facility behind the Jamerson Athletics Center, a facility that opened in the summer of 2015. This facility is being used by the football program and also the men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball and lacrosse programs.

The Hokies have continued to enjoy success both in the playing venues and in the classroom during Babcock's brief tenure. In the 2015-16 academic year, Virginia Tech won ACC championships in the sports of men's outdoor track and field and wrestling – the school's 21st and 22nd ACC team titles since joining the league. In that same year, eight teams qualified for NCAA postseason competition, with the track and field and swimming and diving programs also sending several individuals to the NCAA Championships. During the 2014-15 academic year, the Hokies won two ACC titles and seven teams qualified for NCAA competition.

Academically, 53 percent of Tech's student-athletes maintained a cumulative grade-point average 3.0 or better at the conclusion of the 2016 spring semester. The average team cumulative GPA was 3.09, and 15 teams maintained a 3.0 cumulative GPA or better.

All of this builds on what Babcock and his staff accomplished during the first two years of his tenure. In year No. 2, they launched two big campaigns, with the announcement of the 110% Hokie Campaign and the Twenty4You initiative. Babcock recognized Tech's student-athletes giving 110 percent, so the 110% Hokie Campaign called for donors to do the same by increasing their annual contributions by 10 percent to help offset Tech's commitment in paying the cost-of-attendance "gap" for its student-athletes.

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The Twenty4You initiative implemented 24 ideas to improve the fan experience at Tech's venues for 2015-16. Babcock and his staff plan on updating and continuing this initiative to better serve Hokie Nation on game day.

A new mission statement and core values for the athletics department were also launched under Babcock's direction. The mission statement and the core values – integrity, service, honor, excellence, and strong together – represent the foundation of the department and every decision made. In addition, he unveiled the "Pylons of Promise," a landmark document that sets forth the university's and the athletics department's commitment to student-athletes during their times at Virginia Tech. This document served as Virginia Tech's response to the changes in the NCAA governance landscape. The Pylons of Promise is based on the ideals emblazoned on the eight pylons at the Virginia Tech War Memorial Court.

Babcock arrived in Blacksburg following two and a half years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Cincinnati and five years at the University of Missouri, where he served as the Executive Associate Director of Athletics. His background in fundraising, marketing, promotions, ticket sales, licensing, and multimedia partnerships were key attributes in support of his hiring. In his introductory press conference, Babcock cited three guiding principles for his vision for the athletics department's future: commitment to comprehensive excellence, centering the department's focus on the student-athlete experience, and engaging the community.

During his two-year stint as the AD at Cincinnati, Babcock initiated a new administrative structure within the department and proposed a comprehensive vision and capital campaign for athletics facility enhancement, which included

an \$86-million renovation and expansion to Nippert Stadium, the school's football stadium. He also set forth a scholarship enhancement plan for Olympic sports, crafted a three-year strategic plan for all facets of the program, hired head coaches in football, baseball, men's track and field, lacrosse, volleyball and women's soccer, and implemented numerous external relations strategies to connect and engage with Bearcats' alumni, donors, fans, and students.

Babcock's last full season at Cincinnati (2012-13) was successful one for the Bearcats that saw the football team win its fourth conference championship in five seasons and the men's basketball squad earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament for the third straight year.

Academically, Cincinnati transitioned from an academic calendar of quarters to semesters, and the Bearcats had a departmental GPA of 3.028. Overall 11 of 17 teams achieved a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Over the past five years, both while at Cincinnati and Virginia Tech, Babcock has been active on the local and national speaking circuits. He has presented before the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA) and the 1-A Athletic Directors Association annual institute. He is a past president of the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD).

Prior to his time at Cincinnati, Babcock's 22-year career path included stops at Missouri, West Virginia, Auburn and James Madison.

A student-athlete himself, Babcock lettered four seasons in baseball at James Madison University and served as team captain his senior year. He earned his bachelor's degree from JMU in 1992. In 1996, he received his master's in sports management from West Virginia University.

He and his wife, Kelly, have three sons: Andrew, Brett and Eli.

DEPUTY ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Desiree Reed-Francois fills a critical role for Virginia Tech Director of Athletics Whit Babcock, overseeing the football program and the day-to-day operations of the external team, which includes ticketing services, marketing and promotions, HokieVision, strategic communications, graphic design/publications, corporate development, and IMG, as well as having oversight of sports medicine.

Reed-Francois followed Babcock to Tech in May of 2014 after serving as Babcock's Senior Associate Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator at the University of Cincinnati. She served as the interim AD at Cincinnati for five months after Babcock left to take the same position at Tech, making her the first Hispanic female (interim) AD at the FBS level.

"She earned my trust and respect at Cincinnati and did an outstanding job leading and enhancing all of the external units of the department along with successfully collaborating with our coaches, staff and university administration," Babcock said in announcing her hire. "Desiree believes in creating 'memorable experiences' for our fans, students, donors and alumni and will bring tremendous energy, organization, creativity and work ethic to the department. She will help move Virginia Tech forward and will be an asset to our program and overall vision."

Coming to Tech as the Executive Associate Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator, Reed-Francois received a promotion to Deputy Athletics Director in June of 2016. A 2009 graduate of the Division I Athletics Director Institute, she is among an elite group of Power Five female administrators who have ascended to the role of Deputy AD.

She is also among an even more exclusive group of women who oversee the day-to-day operations of a nationally prominent FBS football program. Along with Babcock, she played a pivotal role in the hiring of head coach Justin Fuente to succeed Frank Beamer.

"I lean on her for advice and counsel often and she is an executive leader of our department in her own right," Babcock said. "She has my trust and respect. She does a wonderful job for the Hokies."

"Thanks to her steadfast approach and commitment, we have developed a very collaborative culture in athletics and an enhanced commitment to excellence across the board. She has made a very positive impact on our department and our student-athletes, while strengthening our relationships on campus and across the country. We are very fortunate that Desiree is leading so many aspects of our team at Virginia Tech."

"I am humbled by the trust and responsibility that Whit has placed in me," Reed-Francois said. "But this is truly a team effort and I'm grateful for the many

talented individuals who have all been part of the positive momentum that we are collectively building. Whit has been a tremendous mentor and example for us all. I appreciate his continued leadership and his support of our work as we seek to uphold and exceed the very high standards of Virginia Tech."

As a former NCAA Division I student-athlete herself – she was a member of the UCLA rowing team – Reed-Francois brings a unique perspective to her post and has been a staunch advocate of making the student-athlete and fan experience at Virginia Tech even better. She and her respective units have listened to feedback from coaches, students, ticket-holders, donors and many other groups to more effectively and authentically engage a wide array of Virginia Tech stakeholders. Their efforts have recently been recognized for national awards by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and Information Display and Entertainment Association (IDEA).

Prior to coming to Virginia Tech, Reed-Francois oversaw the football, women's basketball and volleyball programs at Cincinnati in addition to the sports communications, marketing and promotions and video services and production departments. She also led the department's strategic planning initiatives and assisted in management of external partnerships.

During her more than 17 years in intercollegiate athletics administration, Reed-Francois has occupied positions at the University of California, San Jose State, Santa Clara, Fresno State and the University of San Francisco. Prior to that, she held numerous positions of progressive leadership, including working as a legal associate for the Oakland Raiders and serving in a similar position with the NFL's Management Council.

A 1994 graduate of UCLA, Reed-Francois earned a Juris Doctorate from the University of Arizona College of Law. She is a member of the California Bar, taught law classes at Tennessee and Santa Clara University and is involved on the national level, serving as a Division I-A Fellow and presenting at the NACDA Mentoring Institute and the NACWAA, NACMA, NACDA and CoSIDA annual meetings.

Reed-Francois lives in Blacksburg with her husband, Joshua, and son, Jackson.

Led by Megan Caligiuri, senior director of visual and broadcast communications, the HokieVision staff is on the cutting edge of entertainment both online and in games. The full-time staff of six, plus scholarship student workers, has worked together to put out top-notch work that highlights the best of Virginia Tech Athletics.

The stadium video display, which was installed in 2013, replaced a 13-year-old structure in the north end zone of Lane Stadium. Complete with a new Daktronics line array sound system, this true high-definition video board measures 45-by-95 feet with a display that takes up approximately 4,275 square feet to make it one of the largest video boards in an on-campus stadium.

A production studio with state-of-the-art equipment was built in Merryman Athletic Center for the use of the staff to run the video board in Lane Stadium, plus the two boards in Cassell Coliseum. From this master control room, HokieVision has the ability to produce network quality broadcasts that air on ESPN3 and hokiesports.com.

The video staff can use the LED display and the accompanying for on-field presentations, graduation ceremonies and other stadium events.

JON LAASER (pronounced “laser”) enters his second season as “The Voice of the Hokies” in 2016. In that role, Laaser serves as the lead announcer for Virginia Tech football and men’s basketball across the Virginia Tech IMG Sports Network. Additionally, he is the host of the weekly Tech Talk Live! radio program and Virginia Tech Sports Today television show. The 37-year old also pens the “Behind the Mic” column for Inside Hokie Sports magazine and frequently serves as an emcee, public speaker and ambassador for Virginia Tech. The Chaska, Minnesota native boasts a wide range of football, basketball and baseball announcing experience throughout his 15-year broadcasting career. Officially named to his current position on June 23, 2015, he joined Virginia Tech after spending four

years working as a television and radio broadcaster for VCU basketball. His broadcasting journey originally brought him to Virginia in 2009 as one of the founding staff members of the Richmond Flying Squirrels, the Double-A affiliate of the San Francisco Giants. He served six seasons (2010-2015) as “The Voice of the Squirrels” and during that time garnered regional college basketball television assignments which included partnering with analyst John Feinstein on Comcast Sportsnet Washington.

Recognized by his peers as one of the top young play-by-play talents in the country, longtime FOX Sports and Cincinnati Reds broadcaster Thom Brennaman was one of several prominent sports figures who endorsed Laaser along with “Voice of the Minnesota Vikings” Paul Allen and San Francisco Giants general manager Bobby Evans.

Working for Hampton Roads Sports Network in 2014-15, Laaser served as lead play-by-play broadcaster for college, high school football and basketball telecasts featuring schools throughout Virginia. He was also “The Voice of the Buccaneers” for the football and basketball programs of Charleston Southern from 2008-09, in addition to baseball broadcasting duties with the Myrtle Beach Pelicans, which at the time was the Class A Advanced Affiliate of the Atlanta Braves.

His extensive minor league baseball background also includes stints with the Altoona Curve (Pirates AA affiliate), Yakima Bears (Diamondbacks short-season A affiliate), St. Paul Saints (independent) and St. Cloud River Bats (Northwoods League). Laaser’s professional career began in Minnesota with stints working for KFAN Radio in Minneapolis and KXSS Radio in St. Cloud as well with the NFL’s Minnesota Vikings. Laaser is a graduate of Brown College in the Twin Cities.

MIKE BURNOP, Virginia Tech’s Hall of Fame network analyst received a multi-year contract extension prior to the 2015 football season and enters his 34th season in the Hokies’ football booth. Burnop, a former star tight end for the Hokies, still holds the Virginia Tech record for receptions in a season by a tight end with 46. In addition to his broadcasting duties, Burnop owns New River Office Supply; a business operating in Blacksburg, Pearisburg and Salem, Va.

In addition to his role as analyst, Burnop handles all post-game interviews from Tech’s locker room. His versatility at the mic is nearly unparalleled in collegiate athletics as he also serves as the analyst for Tech men’s basketball broadcasts. He is one of just a few announcers nationwide that provide analysis for both sports. Burnop is prominent member of the Blacksburg community, frequently lending his time and talents to philanthropic causes throughout the area.

ANDREW ALLEGRETTA is in his sixth season as the Director of Broadcast Operations for Digital Media and Olympic Sports. He serves as the sideline reporter and pre/post-game host for football broadcasts on the Virginia Tech IMG Sports Network. He also serves as the play-by-play broadcaster for Virginia Tech’s women’s basketball and baseball teams. In addition, he anchors coverage of Tech Olympic sports on HokiesXtra and hokiesports.com. Allegretta is also a contributor to men’s basketball radio broadcasts and Virginia Tech Sports Today, the network’s weekly regional television program. A native of Yarmouth, Maine, Allegretta graduated from Syracuse University with a degree in broadcast journalism.

WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That’s a frequently asked question in Virginia Tech athletics, and the answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer, and a contest for that purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his “Hokie” yell which is still used today. Later, when asked if “Hokie” had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Virginia Tech teams and those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors – Chicago maroon and burnt orange – also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a “unique combination” not worn elsewhere at the time.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech." Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, "Vah Tech," VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.





HEAD IMPACT RESEARCH

VIRGINIA TECH LEADING THE WAY IN HEAD IMPACT RESEARCH

In 2003, Virginia Tech was the first school to use the HIT System to monitor head impacts experienced by its football players. The HIT System consists of a sensor array that integrates into existing football helmets. This device measures head acceleration for every impact that players experience during each game and practice in which they participate. After each impact is recorded, data is sent to a computer on the sideline for real-time feedback.

While researchers have used the HIT System to better understand the biomechanics of concussion and head impact exposure in football, the athletics training and medical staff have used the system as another tool improve concussion identification in athletes. Virginia Tech is participating in a new, landmark \$30 million national effort sponsored by the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the U.S. Department of Defense to combat concussions among college athletes and active service military personnel.

The initiative funds the most comprehensive study of concussion and head impact exposure ever conducted. It will enroll an estimated 25,000 male and female NCAA student-athletes during a three-year study period. Virginia Tech is focusing on athletes participating in various sports, including football, women's soccer, men's soccer, and women's lacrosse.

The 2016 football season will be the 14th year that Virginia Tech has collected head impact data from its players. To date, more than 200,000 head impacts have been collected and analyzed. The head acceleration data collected at Virginia Tech using the HIT System has allowed researchers to quantify the head impact exposure that collegiate football players experience.

In addition, these data have produced valuable insight to the head accelerations associated with concussion. Beginning in 2013, the sports medicine staff started a new study looking at different biomarker

levels found in the blood of its athletes. These levels are measured before and after the season, as well as in the unlikely event of a concussion being diagnosed. Researchers are looking for correlations between the force that each of these athletes sustain over the course of a season (through using the HIT System) and the changes they find in the levels of these specific biomarkers.

Knowing the location, severity, and frequency of head impacts experienced during a season of collegiate football, Virginia Tech researchers developed the STAR, an acronym for the Summation of Tests for the Analysis of Risk, Evaluation System. This system evaluates the ability of football helmets to reduce the probability of concussion, and disseminates the results to the public so that consumers can make informed decisions when purchasing helmets.

The STAR Evaluation System involves a series of 20 drop tests consisting of different impact locations and energies that represents impacts experienced by collegiate football players. Each drop test is weighted based on how often a player experiences that impact scenario throughout a season of play. For each test, risk of concussion is determined based on the head acceleration produced by each helmet.

An overall predicted incidence of concussion is calculated for each helmet for the given impact exposure to assess helmet performance. This is the first tool to assess helmet performance and make the results available to the public, allowing consumers to make informed decisions when purchasing a new helmet.

Led by Dr. Stefan Duma, this work has resulted in a paradigm shift in the way consumers purchase helmets, as well as how helmets are designed. Duma's work and data has been featured nationally on ESPN and NBC, as well as in the New York Times and other nationally recognized media outlets.


