The top research institution in the commonwealth, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. Today, the co-educational institution, which operates a European studies center based in Switzerland and educational, research and outreach/Extension facilities throughout Virginia, has recognized programs in music, business, architecture and the humanities, as well as its traditional strengths in the sciences, engineering and technology.

Virginia Tech is organized into eight colleges – Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Science, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts and Human Sciences, Natural Resources, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, the colleges offer about 175 bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs to approximately 28,000 students, who hail from countries

throughout the world.

Virginia Tech follows the dictates of its motto, Ut Prosim ("That I May Serve"), focusing on its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through outreach and Extension activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, the university disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. It is a university that puts knowledge to work.

Building **Team** Chemistry

While no one on the Virginia Tech lacrosse team is pursuing a degree in chemistry from the College of Science, they may soon reconsider. This year, the Hokies are rolling up their sleeves, strapping on their goggles and tying their lab coats, as they anxiously prepare to learn a lot about chemistry — team chemistry that is.

With a roster that includes more underclassmen than veterans, head coach Tami Riley will mix the old with the new to create a competitive squad for 2004.

With 11 fresh faces joining the program, Riley has spent the fall and winter practices helping the team adjust to playing with each other.

"I am really impressed with this year's freshman class," Riley said. "They are going to make a huge impact on this squad immediately. Despite their age, they have shown a lot of leadership."

With half of the roster made up of newcomers, Riley hopes to make some changes to benefit the program.

"I want to create the most competitive environment," Riley said. "Our newcomers are going to surprise a lot of people. They may be the most talented class we have ever brought in."


Defense

With Jamie McGraw returning for her final season as the Hokies' goalkeeper, Riley anticipates the veteran will be the leader of Tech's young defense.

"Our defense could be led again by senior Jamie McGraw," Riley said. "The rest of the positions will be a mix of experience and youth, with more youth."

Freshmen Bryana Keenan and Lindsay Pieper will lead the youth movement on defense. Keenan is a quick player with good speed who is moving from the attack to defense, while Pieper is an aggressive player who will rotate between defense and midfield.

The remainder of the Hokies' defense will be determined as players return from injuries. Sophomore Casey Goodman has worked hard in the off-season and will see a considerable amount of playing time on defense.



While the defense may be very young, the Hokies have two strong returnees and an energetic newcomer in the net.

"I anticipate Jamie McGraw to be our starter at goalkeeper," Riley said. "Jamie is an emotional, physical player who expects a lot from herself and her teammates. When she is on, she is an amazing goalie."

McGraw is one of the most decorated goalies in Tech lacrosse history. She holds the school record for saves in a season (228) and ranks among career leaders in virtually every goalkeeping record at Tech. She also holds a BIG EAST record for saves in a conference game with 28 and saves in a season during conference games with 94. McGraw also ranks in the BIG EAST top five in career saves (third, 139) and save percentage (second, .542).

'Carrie Hill is a technical keeper who stays further off the line than our other goalies," Riley said. "She has great stick work and nice clears. Nikki Schiavone is a young, but quick keeper. She is already a leader on and off the field and is developing into a great goalie for Tech."

Midfield

Despite losing Sam Sybert, one of the greatest players in school history, the midfield should be able to manage. Starters Lindsey Welch and Hilary Fay are returning

for 2004 and will be looked upon to step up after the loss of Sybert. Both Fay and Welch will serve as team captains for the

"Although we lost Sam (Sybert) in the midfield, we had some great newcomers enter the lineup," Riley said. "Aside from the goalkeeper, the midfield is one of the most important positions on the field. You need to be able to run up and down in hopes to control the tempo of the game."

Welch, now a senior, finished the 2003 season ranked third on the team in scoring. points and shooting percentage. Fay finished fourth on the team in assists and started in all but one game.

Attack

The Hokies' explosive offense will be led by senior Kate Threadgold. Tech's second-leading scorer last year, Threadgold scored two or more goals in 10 games last season and is currently 11th in the Hokies' record book for career goals with 55.

"Kate (Threadgold) will be controlling our attack," Riley said. "She is a very consistent and powerful player who shows all three characteristics of a good athlete: she is effective moving off the ball, shows great ball feed and is a good one-on-one player."

After a stellar freshman campaign, Stephanie Jones should continue to impress on the attack.



"I have decided to move Stephanie into the attack," Riley said. "She has the ability to see the open players along with having strong one-on-one skills."

Jones ranked first on the team in shooting percentage and draw controls last year, while finishing second on the team in ground balls and caused turnovers. She now ranks in the Tech record book among season leaders in groundballs (sixth) and caused turnovers (eighth).

Threadgold and Jones will be assisted by Welch and Fay who will rotate within

"Welch has outstanding one-on-one moves and a nice shot, while Fay has surprising ball placement," Riley said.

Threadgold, Welch, Jones and Fay will all appear once again on Tech's attack. Last year, these four women accounted for 50 percent of the Hokies' goals.

While the attack will be a spot filled with veteran players, freshmen Britt Faulkner Kelsey Mays and Kate Schilling will add depth to the position.

Schedule

Nine of the Hokies' seventeen opponents last season were ranked in the Top 25 in the nation, but this season's schedule looks to be less strenuous.

"I have adapted the schedule to playing more teams at our level," Riley said. "The team, as well as the coaching staff, are looking forward to the season beginning."

Tech will open the season in its new Lacrosse Stadium against Georgetown in March. After they battle the Hoyas, the Hokies will head to Pennsylvania for two games against Bucknell and Lafayette. They conclude their trip in Virginia against Longwood.

"The first match at home in our new stadium will be one of the most difficult one being against Georgetown," Riley said.

After spending the first half of the season mostly on the road, the Hokies return to Blacksburg to host six out of their last eight games. Tech's home schedule will feature Rutgers, Ohio

State, Boston College, Ohio University, Davidson, Connecticut and in-state rival Virginia.

"In the BIG EAST, Georgetown, Notre Dame and Syracuse should be our toughest matches," Riley said. "We will play six of our last eight games at home, so it will be interesting to see how the team plays with the fan support behind them."

Facility

This year, Tech will open play in its new Lacrosse Stadium. With a natural bluegrass surface and stands that seat 1,000 fans, the Hokies will boast one of the finest facilities in the conference.

"The stadium is absolutely beautiful," Riley said. "When you watch a game under the lights, you can just sense so much energy from the players, coaches and the fans."

With an exciting schedule, a new facility and an eager freshman class, the Hokies are ready to show everyone how much they know about chemistry - team chemistry.



Coaching



Tami Riley

Head Coach

Tami Riley enters her third year as the head coach at Virginia Tech. In her first two

seasons at the helm of the Hokies, Riley has produced four All-BIG EAST Conference team selections and four Virginia Tech Athletes of the Week.

In 2003, Riley led the team to a victory over No. 20 Northwestern. This win marked only the second time in the program's history in which the Hokies defeated a ranked opponent. Tech finished the 2002 season, Riley's first year with the team, ranked 14th nationally in ground balls and 21st in caused turnovers.

Riley joined the Hokies after serving four years as assistant coach at James Madison University. During her career at JMU, the Dukes won two Colonial Athletic Association Championships, went to the NCAAs all four years, and appeared in the 2000 NCAA Final Four. JMU won their second CAA title under assistant coach

Riley and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament.

Prior to her time at James Madison, Riley served as an assistant at the University of Virginia for the 1996-97 season. She helped guide the Cavaliers to the NCAA tournament.

As a player at Maryland, the Terrapins won three NCAA titles during Riley's career and she co-captained the first team to successfully defend an NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship with titles in

1995 and 1996. Riley was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team in those years. In her final two seasons at Maryland, the Terrapins were 36-0 overall. At Maryland, Riley was not only a four-year letterwinner in lacrosse for the Terrapins, but also

played soccer her first two seasons at the university.

Riley graduated from Maryland in 1996 with a degree in kinesiology. A Maryland

native, she graduated from Severna Park High School with her twin sister, Tina, and an older sister, Bethany. She adores her nephews, Patrick and Zachary, as well as her nieces, Riley and Maggie. Her parents live in Northern Kentucky.



Lisa Staedt

Assistant Coach

Lisa Staedt begins her first season at Virginia Tech as an assistant coach.

Off the field, Staedt handles all of Tech's travel responsibilities along with some onand off-campus recruiting. On the field, she works primarily with the midfield.

A native of Springfield, Pa., Staedt comes to Tech from James Madison University

where she helped guide the Dukes to three NCAA Tournament bids, including a Final Four appearance in 2000, and two Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) championships as a player.

A three-time All-American, Staedt was twice named CAA Player of the Year (2003) and 2002). She was named James Madison's Female Athlete of the Year (2003) and was a nominee (2002 and

2003) and finalist (2003) for the Tewaaraton Trophy, which honors the top collegiate lacrosse player.

For the last three years, Staedt was an assistant coach at James Madison's Elite Challenge Lacrosse camp and volunteered as a coach for the Girl Scouts of America.

Staedt graduated from James Madison in 2003 with a degree in kinesiology.



Julie Tice

Assistant Coach

Julie Tice returns to the Virginia Tech coaching staff for a third season as an assistant

coach. Her daily duties include alumni relations, working with indivduals, and assisting with Tech's recruiting efforts. Tice also is in charge of the design and distribution of recruiting and alumni mailings.

She comes to Tech from Towson University, where she served as an assistant coach for the Tigers in 2001.

As an undergraduate at Penn State from 1996-2000, Tice was a four-year letterwinner for the Nittany Lions and received All-America honors her junior and senior years. She also led the country in assists her junior year when the Nittany

Lions reached the Final Four, and holds the record for assists in the NCAA Tournament. Tice also set the record for career assists at Penn State with 115.

Tice graduated from Penn State in 2000 with a degree in communications and is currently pursuing a degree in interior design at Virginia Tech. She is a native of Annapolis, Md., where she attended Severn School.

Virginia Tech acrosse Stadium



Completed in the fall of 2003, the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg. The stadium is the home of the lacrosse team in the spring and the men's and women's soccer teams in the fall.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 feet. The field is equipped with an underground Cambridge irrigation system and is the only field in the BIG EAST with this system. If rainy weather should occur, the field can be drained and ready for play. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.


One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features 1,000 seats where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games. On Friday, Nov. 21,

2003, the Virginia Tech men's soccer team hosted a first-round game of the NCAA Soccer Tournament, where a record-breaking 2,300 Hokie faithful witnessed Tech defeat Clemson.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. A fully-heated 18 by 8-foot area, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

"The stadium is absolutely beautiful," lacrosse head coach Tami Riley said. "When you watch a game under the lights, you can just sense so much energy from the players, coaches and the fans."

While the stadium is open for full use at this time, construction of a restroom facility will begin in the spring of 2004. After that phase is completed, a concession stand and additional seating will make the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium one of the best venues to watch the sport.



A Research University In Action

The top research institution in the commonwealth, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. Virginia's premiere land-grant university, Virginia Tech has grown from a small college of 132 students into the largest institution of higher education in the state during its 131-year history.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has challenged the university to become one of the country's top 30 research institutions by the end of the decade. Tech is currently ranked 49th in the nation.

Among recent research innovations, Tech teamed with Wake Forest University to establish the Virginia Tech-Wake Forest University School of Biomedical Engineering and Sciences to offer M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in biomedical engineering (BME) and to be the focus of collaborative research. The university's Virginia Bioinformatics Institute is leading the way in helping scientists merge computers and biotechnology to sort through complicated genetic material to speed research. And the university's



partnership with the University of Virginia and Carilion Health System to form the Carilion Biomedical Institute is improving health care worldwide and increasing economic development opportunities in Southwest Virginia.

In other areas, Virginia Tech has one of the most comprehensive and successful programs to support state and local economic development, according to a study conducted by the Southern Growth Policies Board and funded in part by the National Science Foundation. The study report, Innovation U: New University Roles in a Knowledge Economy, named the nation's 12 most successful universities in terms of outreach, economic development and technology transfer practices.

Virginia Tech was established in 1872 as an all-male military school dedicated to

the original land-grant mission of teaching agriculture and engineering. Today, the co-educational institution, which operates a European studies center based in Switzerland and educational, research and outreach/ Extension facilities throughout Virginia, has recognized programs in music, business, architecture and the humanities, as well as its traditional strengths in the sciences, engineering and technology.

While participation in the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets is now voluntary, the corps, which has approximately 700 cadets, remains a proud tradition of the university. Virginia Tech is one of only three public universities in the nation with a military component and a large civilian population.



Virginia Tech is organized into eight colleges - Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Science, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts and Human Sciences, Natural Resources and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, the colleges offer about 175 bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs to approximately 26,000 students, who hail from countries throughout the world.

The university's 2,600-acre main campus is home to more than 100 buildings, hundreds of research laboratories, the Donaldson Brown Hotel and Conference Center and an airport. Adjoining the campus is the 120-acre Corporate Research Center, home to more than 100 companies and 1,800 employees who take advantage of the university's research and faculty expertise. Within five miles of campus is a 1,700-acre research

Virginia Tech follows the dictates of its motto, Ut Prosim ("That I May Serve"), focusing on its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through outreach and Extension activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, the university disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. It is a university that puts knowledge to work.

Instruction

Eight colleges offer more degree programs than any other university in the state, with 62 undergraduate and 115 graduate programs. In addition, the university is one of the nation's leaders in integrating instructional technology into the curriculum, requiring all entering students to have a computer. The university's Math Emporium has been hailed as an innovative way to break the credit-for-contact model of classroom instruction.

Research

With annual research expenditures of about \$232 million and more than 100 research centers, Virginia Tech consistently ranks among the top institutions in industrysupported research and in the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's faculty and students are involved in more than 4,000 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to nanotechnology, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

Outreach

Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of projects as part of its outreach mission. For example, it spawns economic development, helps global marketing efforts, investigates better uses for strip-

mined land, helps clean the Chesapeake Bay and other state waterways, provides design and planning assistance to communities and directs reforestation in Senegal. University scientists developed the vaccine that is the standard for preventing brucellosis in cattle around the world.

Outreach efforts also focus on education and distance learning techniques - satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer



conferencing and web-based courses, for example — to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students. Professionals, organizations and communities also tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise and research results through Continuing Education, which offers hundreds of programs annually.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their

> economic, cultural and social well-being for nearly 90 years. And while Extension has a long history of helping make America's agricultural powerhouse more productive and economical, it also does important work — from helping people learn healthy nutritional practices to counseling families in financial distress — in the state's urban as well as rural areas. With 107 city/county offices, and more than 61,000 volunteers, more than one million participants benefit annually from Extension's nonformal educational. Extension has touched virtually every life in the state in some way.

Administration



Dr. Charles Steger University President

Few people within the university community are unaware of Virginia Tech's national leadership aspirations. Setting his sights on

joining the nation's truly elite universities, President Charles W. Steger laid down the challenge to become ranked among the top 30 research universities by decade's end and energized the university community in the process.

Virginia Tech achieved double digit growth in research expenditures for the past two years hitting \$232 million in fiscal year

2002, which propelled the institution back into the nation's Top 50 research universities.

Under Steger's leadership, the university completed a strategic plan creating the outline for national leadership of a comprehensively engaged university. The university recently completed a campus wide restructuring of colleges and departments in concert with the strategic plan.

A registered architect and former dean of Tech's College of Architecture and Urban Studies, Steger was an architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech raised \$337 million. Last year, the university raised a record \$70 million.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the voungest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years

Steger received his Bachelor and Master of Architecture and a Ph.D., in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech.



Jim Weaver Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics'

most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 58, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader on behalf of Tech athletics. In his years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-

Weaver is also committed to the continuing improvement of Tech's facilities.

To meet a growing demand for Virginia Tech football, Weaver spearheaded the construction of the south end zone project to expand seating capacity to 65,115 for the 2002 season. A north end zone addition was completed prior to the 2001 season. Renovations are underway for the west side of Lane Stadium as well.

This year, Weaver represented the BIG EAST at the NCAA's Sportsmanship Summit and he is the BIG EAST AD representative on the Bowl Championship Series committee.

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's degree in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's in college counselor education, also from Penn State. in 1968.

Weaver started a coaching career as an assistant at Penn State for six seasons. He later was the offensive

coordinator at Iowa State and head coach for one season at Villanova in 1974. He also spent five years as an assistant professor at Clarion State and three years as director of franchise sales at Athletic

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida, which was sanctioned by the NCAA in 1983. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletic director.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons - Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

Support Services

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's athletic program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 70 percent in 2003 as compared to the national average of 60 percent. The 70 percent student-athlete graduation rate marks the second straight year and five in the last 10 years that Tech has reached that level.

SAASS provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition, and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAASS office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in

Advanced Technology) Lab and its satellite sites house over 40 computers on the second and third floors of Cassell Coliseum. Laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes to use when travelling to away contests. The athletic department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Together, these spaces provide the studentathlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use

these facilities between classes, after practice, or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

SAASS is comprised of coordinator Chris Helms, associate coordinators Lois Berg and Colin Howlett and three assistant coordinators -Katie Ammons, Renia Edwards and Drew Scales. Terrie Repass is the secretary and the "first contact" person for the SAASS. Scales coordinates the academic services for the lacrosse team.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

For the Virginia Tech lacrosse team, the strength and conditioning program, under the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, plays a very important role.

The lacrosse team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletic Department.

Gentry is in his 15th season as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning. As assistant athletics director for athletic performance, his duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981 where he worked as an assistant strength coach. He then went to East Carolina University and was elevated to head strength coach there in 1982. Gentry received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Virginia Tech in 1999.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and

conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports, and Emily Chones, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of five graduate assistants.

Chones, in her second year at Virginia Tech, came to Blacksburg from the University of New Mexico, where she spent one year as an assistant strength coach. Prior to her time at UNM, she worked three years at the United States Naval

Academy and was directly responsible for six sports and assisted with all other varsity programs.

Chones is a 1998 graduate of the University of Maryland with a degree in kinesiology. She competed in lacrosse for three years, including 1994-95 when she was a starter for the nationally-ranked James Madison Dukes.

The Annapolis, Md., native is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist with the NSCA and is a member of USA weightlifting.

SPORTS MEDICINE & TRAINING

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an everchanging and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The department, under the leadership of Gunnar Brolinson, D.O., Delmas Bolin, M.D.,

and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists is available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed the 4,300 square foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The new facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech studentathletes.

The new room, which nearly doubles the size of the former Merryman Center facility, also allows the staff to utilize that room for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent

In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, will supplement the new training room.

This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities including electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot packs and interferential current. It also has an office for the staff, dozens of training tables, whirlpools, rehabilitation equipment and two cold tubs.

A vital part of student-athlete services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the

other. The center also has a fully-operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight fulltime physicians. Staff psychologists, located in the Cook Counseling Center, are also available to all student-athletes for personal and performance

Megan Rittler oversees the athletic training of the women's lacrosse team. Working directly with the Hokies this year is Kevin Domboski.

Virginia Tech and the Town of Blacksburg gained national and international attention by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the quaint town's potential.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that accentuate the area. The nearly 40,000 residents (including students) enjoy a close proximity to a variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Appalachian Trail, Claytor Lake and the New River.
