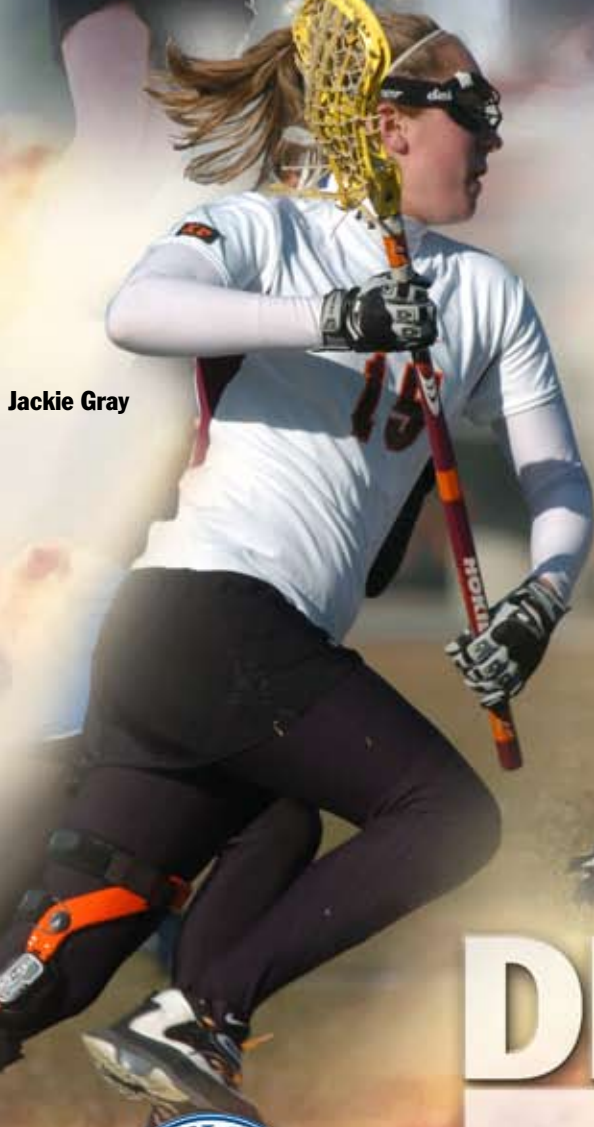

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2007 OUTLOOK

NEW YEAR BRINGS NEW VISION FOR HOKIE LACROSSE PROGRAM

The Virginia Tech women's lacrosse team welcomes new head coach, Katrina Silva, and a "Dream Big" mentality to the program this season. The Hokies will look to take the season one day at a time, making each moment count as they prepare to make their mark in the ACC.

"It's going to come down to this team's ability to reconstruct themselves and embrace what we're trying to teach before we can develop into our deepest potential," head coach Katrina Silva said. "This is a new program with a new vision and we're excited about the opportunities it brings for the student-athletes."

Tech returns 19 players from last season's 8-9 squad, while seven newcomers have been added to the roster. The spring schedule this year appears to be the most difficult one to await the Hokies yet. Seven of Tech's 16 opponents are ranked within the top 20 of this season's IWLCA preseason poll, while four of their five ACC opponents are ranked within the top 10.

"Being in the ACC is a phenomenal opportunity," Silva said. "It offers a tough challenge to each and every one of us. As we look to become one of the best teams in the nation, we must compete against the best teams in the nation. We are excited about the enthusiasm of the players we have, and expect to be tough competition for the other ACC programs."

Attack

The Hokies' attack will look to veteran starter, Kady McBrearty, for leadership in the eight meter during the 2007 season. With new faces in the starting rotation, the attack provides a great opportunity for success under a new system.

"We're excited about the possibilities of bringing in a new mentality for the offense," Silva said. "It's fun to see our attack grow into the

new philosophies. It gives them a great opportunity to take ownership of our sets on the offensive end."

McBrearty proved last season that she was capable of setting up the offense, as well as attacking the goal. She dished out a team-high 17 assists and scored 15 goals in 2006. Alongside McBrearty, junior Jenna Reich will be looked upon to take control of the offense. Reich played in 12 games for the Hokies last season, scoring eight goals.

"Kady sees the game very well and has naturally emerged as a leader due to her vision and understanding of the attack. She has already helped bring new ideas to a growing offense, while Jenna has emerged immensely throughout the fall season."

Supporting McBrearty and Reich will be junior Christen Fratter, who adds a strong presence in the offensive end. Fratter played in 13 games for Tech last season and will also be expected to step up into a leadership role. Sophomore Kristy Zeigler and freshman Alex Mengel will join junior Katie Russo and sophomore Terri Coover, who combined for 13 goals last season, to have an opportunity to make a significant impact on the offense as well.

"Fratter adds an explosive punch on the offensive side of the ball," Silva said. "She provides a strong challenge to goal and possesses good vision within our attacking sets. Katie, Terri, Kristy, and Alex all have the ability to emerge as strong contributors on our attack throughout the season and we look forward to seeing their growth."

Midfield

The Hokies' midfield is highlighted in 2007 by a new style of transition, designed to push the fast break and create new scoring options. Anchored by senior captains, Lindsay Pieper, Britt Faulkner and Jackie Gray, the midfield lineup will control the tempo of the game and bring unity to the field.

Pieper, a three-year starter and All-ACC selection, returns as the team's leader in goals and points from last season. As one of the top offensive players in the conference, Pieper brings valuable consistency, scoring 46 goals last season, including at least one in all 17 games, and at least one in 30 of her last 32 games. She also has a knack for causing turnovers, as she led the team with 27 last season, in addition to collecting 30 ground balls and 23 draw controls.

contribute all over the field and what she will do for this team. She is sneaky on the attack, creating great off-ball movement and scoring opportunities. Defensively, she is a spark who knows how to cause turnovers."

Faulkner, a fellow three-year starter, scored 22 goals and set up five shots for Tech last year. She also scooped up 21 ground balls, won 10 draw controls and caused 10 turnovers in helping Tech break down opposing team's offenses and guiding the ball into Tech's offensive end.

"Britt is an all around player," Silva said. "She's everywhere, all the time. She works hard on defense, on offense and throughout the entire midfield. She goes aggressively after ground balls and has really adapted to the new style of play we've incorporated. She has really come through for us as an explosive, athletic player who is fun to watch."

Gray will join Pieper and Faulkner in trying to create and maintain a smooth, quick transition from defense to offense. She tallied nine points for the Hokies last season, with four goals and five assists. Her attitude on and off the field is expected to become a contagious force this season.

"Jackie is one of the most positive players on the team," Silva said. "She never quits, never stops working, never stops believing. She will be depended on as a motivating force in order to get things going each and every day for this team."

In addition, sophomores Rachel Culp and Casey Warner, and freshman Faith Richards will be utilized to create an immediate impact upon the midfield.

"Rachel, Casey and Faith will be expected to step up and round out the midfield lines. Rachel is a talented player that is very fluid and solid. Faith is tough. She is a persistent addition to this team that has a good eye for the goal and knows how to finish her shots. We look forward for her to emerge from this freshman class and begin to really make an impact. Casey has emerged throughout the year to contribute on both ends of the field."

Senior Kate Schilling, junior Rosemary Patterson and freshman Mackenzie Costello will vie for time in the midfield for the Hokies, as well.

2007 OUTLOOK

Defense

A new style of play will be incorporated into what is already returning to Tech's backline in 2007. In order to become one of the strongest defensive teams in the ACC, the Hokies will need to be willing to outwork their opponents each and every day.

"We are excited about the opportunities our defense is going to create," Silva said. "The team has worked to develop a strong set of fundamentals and good communication, to generate turnovers as a unit."

Tech will be guided by senior Bryana Keenan and sophomore Christina Griel. Keenan has been a consistent player for Tech throughout her three years and is expected to break out during her senior season. Her 24 ground balls and 16 caused turnovers from last season will provide the necessary spark for the defense this spring.

In addition, Griel was a strong force for the Hokies' in her freshman campaign. Her ability to win draw controls, cause turnovers and pick up ground balls will be an asset to the Hokies' defense and a key in creating fast break opportunities.

"With Bryana and Christina's emergence from the fall practices, we now have two tenacious leaders who have adapted to the new system," Silva said. "They have raised the standard of toughness in our defense and we will look to them to continue to pace the team throughout the entire spring season."

Senior Jamie Webster, juniors Jessica Galindo and Kristen Burtch and freshman Sam Titus will also be needed to push this defense into one of the strongest in the ACC. Sophomore Lauren Swenson and freshman Ashley German will continue to integrate their way into the system, as they keep looking to contribute.

"Jamie, Jessica, Kristen and Sam are all very capable of stepping in and solidifying the unit in order to create depth," Silva said. "Defense is all about hard work and discipline, and in order to create a strong team, you need a good defense."

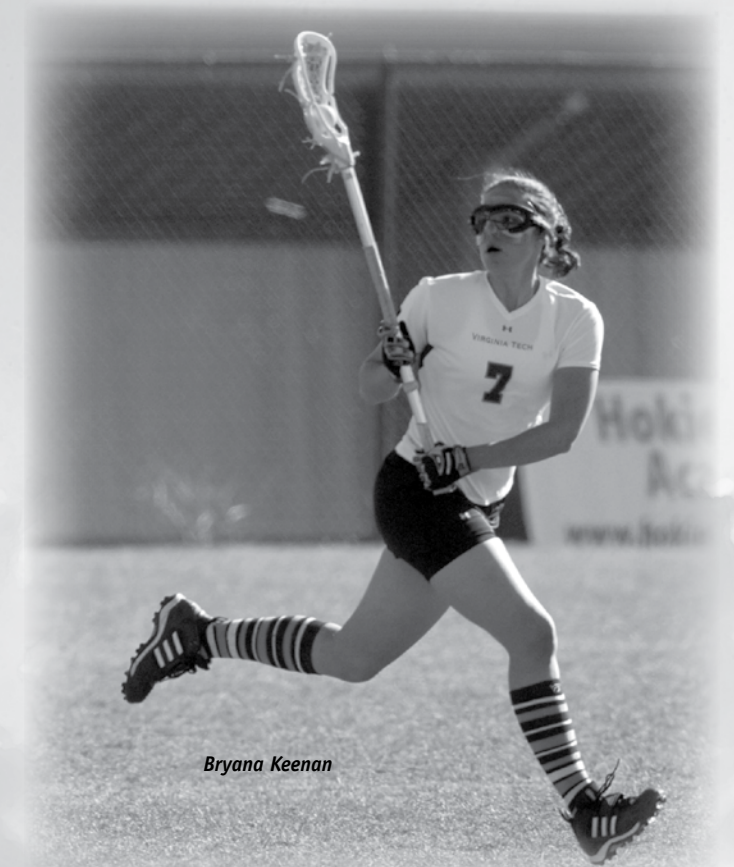
Goalkeepers

Despite being young between the pipes, the Hokies' are confident about the progress made between sophomores Kari Morrison and Megan Waters.

"When you have a goalie that you are confident in, it brings an added level of organization to the defense and a desire to want to help protect the goal," Silva said. "We are excited to work with both goalies in order to create an all-around, cohesive defensive unit."

Both Morrison and Waters will see some time in front of the net this season. Waters saw some time behind senior Carrie Hill last year and is looking to make her way into the crease some more this season. Morrison, a transfer from Colgate University, is also looking to find valuable minutes in front of the goal.

"I'm excited about Kari's decision to transfer to Virginia Tech," Silva said. "She brings a lot of excitement and a strong voice to the defense. We expect her to step up right away and be a major contributor on the defensive end. We are very confident in Megan,

also. We feel that when she gets a chance, she will be able to make her mark as well."

Schedule

The Hokies will battle through another season in the premier conference for women's lacrosse, as they continue to fight to become a contender in the ACC. Tech opens their schedule on the road against in-state competition, traveling to both No. 13 Richmond and No. 9 Virginia, in mid-February. The two games will set the tone for Tech's season.

Tech's schedule will feature 10 home dates, including playing host to ACC rivals Boston College, North Carolina and Maryland, as well as in-state rivals George Mason and James Madison. In addition, Tech will host a four-game home stand to open the home portion of the schedule, featuring its first-ever contest against Albany. Denver, George Mason and Mount St. Mary's will all visit the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium the beginning of March.

The Hokies will travel to play American before returning home to face ACC-foe, Boston College, and first-round NCAA tournament contestant Stanford. A trip to Delaware and Ohio State will close out the away portion of the schedule before Longwood, North Carolina and Maryland close out the regular season at home.

This season's ACC tournament will be held in Chapel Hill, N.C., on Apr. 26-29. The winner will advance to the first round of the NCAA tournament.

MEET THE COACHES

KATRINA SILVA



Head Coach First Season

Coming off seven seasons spent at Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y., Katrina Silva will begin her first season as the head coach of Virginia Tech. Silva compiled a 67-57 overall record while at the helm of the Raider program, with her teams winning Patriot League Tournament titles in 2004 and 2005, and finishing second in 2006. Silva was the 2006 Howard Hartman Award winner as Colgate's Coach of the Year, and was named the Patriot League Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005, while leading Colgate to the NCAA tournament in both of those seasons.

No stranger to Western Virginia and Blacksburg, Silva was head coach of both women's lacrosse and field hockey at Roanoke College from 1996-99. During her three seasons with the Maroons, Silva coached the lacrosse team to a 37-11 record and two Old Dominion Athletic Conference championships, in 1997 and 1999. In 1997, her Maroons advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Division III tournament. During the 1996 season, Silva worked as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse team at Virginia Tech. The team, in just its second season, compiled a 7-6 overall record.

Silva's first stint at Colgate came during the 1994-95 academic year, where she served as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams under Cathy Foto. That spring, she helped the Raiders post their best record as a Division I program to date, 10-5, and they earned an invitation to the ECAC tournament.

Silva began her coaching career at Goucher College, where she served as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams from 1992 to 1994. Under her guidance, Goucher's goalkeeper recorded 192 saves and a .642 save percentage on her way to becoming a two-time all-region selection.

Silva is a 1993 graduate of Towson University with a bachelor's degree in physical education studies, with a minor in psychology. She was the starting goalkeeper for Towson's nationally-ranked lacrosse team for three years. During her junior campaign, the Tigers were finalists in



the ECAC tournament. Silva was also the starting goalkeeper on Towson's field hockey team for four years, and she was honored as the Southeast Conference's Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

As a member of both the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association and US Lacrosse Incorporated, Silva has served on several committees with the IWLCA, including the regional All-America committee, and has been a representative on US Lacrosse's board of governors.

Silva currently resides in Blacksburg.

ANNIE RICHARDS



Assistant Coach Second Season

Annie Richards begins her second season at Virginia Tech as an assistant coach. Richards will continue to work with the goalies and the defense.

A native of Point Pleasant, N.J., Richards comes to Tech from Caterham, Surrey, England, where she was an assistant

and goalie coach with the England Women's National Lacrosse Team. She worked closely with the head coach to coordinate and run national squads and weekly practices in preparation for the World Cup, in which England took the bronze medal.

While in England, she also worked at Caterham School as a coach and teacher. In addition, Richards taught the physical education curriculum.

A graduate of Bucknell University in 2001, Richards was a four-year letterwinner as a goalie for the Bisons, stopping 412 shots in her career. As a senior, she received the Bison Club Award, which is presented to the two senior athletes 'who best exemplify the winning spirit of the University's athletic program'.

Richards graduated with a degree in elementary education. She currently resides in Blacksburg, Va.

MEGAN BURKER



Assistant Coach First Season

Megan Burk begins her first season at Virginia Tech as an assistant coach, where her on the field duties will include primarily working with the attack and some midfield.

A native of Baltimore, Md., Burk comes to Tech from Stanford University, where she had a standout career. As a senior, she was a member of the pre-season Tewaaraton Watch List and the first player in team history to be named an IWLCA National All-American with third team honors. She also received IWLCA Regional First-Team All-America honors that same year.

As a four-time Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Tournament All-Star and a three-time ALL-MPSF team selection, Burk finished her career atop the Cardinal career-scoring list with 143 goals. She also finished second with 64 career assists, 120 draw controls and 155 ground balls.

Burk graduated from Stanford in 2006 with a degree in Urban Studies. She is currently a member of the US Lacrosse team and resides in Blacksburg, Va.

LACEY PUSTIZZI



Volunteer Assistant Coach First Season

Lacey Pustizzi begins her first season at Virginia Tech as a volunteer assistant coach.

A native of Hingham, Mass., Pustizzi comes to Tech from Colgate University, where she was a volunteer assistant coach for one season under head coach Katrina Silva. While helping the Raiders, she was working on her masters at Lock Haven University and serving

as a graduate assistant coach for field hockey. During her season with the Lady Eagles, her team won the NEC league championship.

Prior to the '06 lacrosse season at Colgate, Pustizzi first began coaching at Colgate, in the fall of 2002, where she was an assistant coach for two seasons with the field hockey and lacrosse teams. She then went on as an assistant coach with field hockey at Yale University and Lock Haven University, before returning to Colgate.

Pustizzi also spent time overseas playing and coaching field hockey. In the summer of 2004, she traveled with Colgate to train in Holland before traveling with Yale to train in Rome. This past winter she spent some time coaching in New Zealand.

In addition to coaching and playing, Pustizzi has also spent time as a certified lacrosse official in Connecticut.

A graduate of Hartwick College in 2002, Pustizzi lettered four years in field hockey as a goalie and one year as a lacrosse goalie. She ranks sixth for single season saves in lacrosse at Hartwick. She's also a 2006 graduate of the NCAA Women's Coaches Academy.

Pustizzi graduated with a degree in English. She currently resides in Blacksburg, Va.

THE STADIUM



Completed in the fall of 2003, the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground Cambridge irrigation system and is the only field in the ACC with this system. If rainy weather should occur, the field can be drained and ready for play. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features 2,028 seats where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. A fully-heated 18 by 8-foot area, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

While the stadium is open for full use at this time, construction of a restroom facility has already begun. After that phase is completed, a concession stand and additional seating will make the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium one of the best venues in the country to watch the sport.

With about 25,800 full-time students in Blacksburg and more than 2,000 other students statewide, the university produces world-class scholarship in a challenging academic environment. University tradition is firmly rooted in our motto, *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve), and our historic land-grant mission is brought to life through learning, discovery, and engagement.

Learning

Virginia Tech's challenging academic standards attract high-achieving students. Our eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School offer more degree programs than any other university in the state with 60 undergraduate and 140 graduate offerings. Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in developing and using instructional technologies. Some 85 percent of our departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 60,000 enrollments since 1998.

Discovery

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures of about \$290 million, Virginia Tech is ranked 55th among research universities in the United States. The university, which has more than 100 research centers, also consistently ranks among the top

institutions in industry-supported research and near the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in more than 3,500 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

Engagement

As part of our outreach mission and in adherence to our motto, we serve and engage the citizens of the commonwealth, the nation, and the world. Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of economic and community development

projects. These efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live. Professionals, organizations, and communities tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers. Virginia Tech has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques, such as satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing, and Web-based courses, to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$30 million in funded economic development projects in 27 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2005-06, about 1,870 students from 117 foreign countries studied at Tech, while more than 800 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for more than 90 years. With 107 city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that distinguish the area.

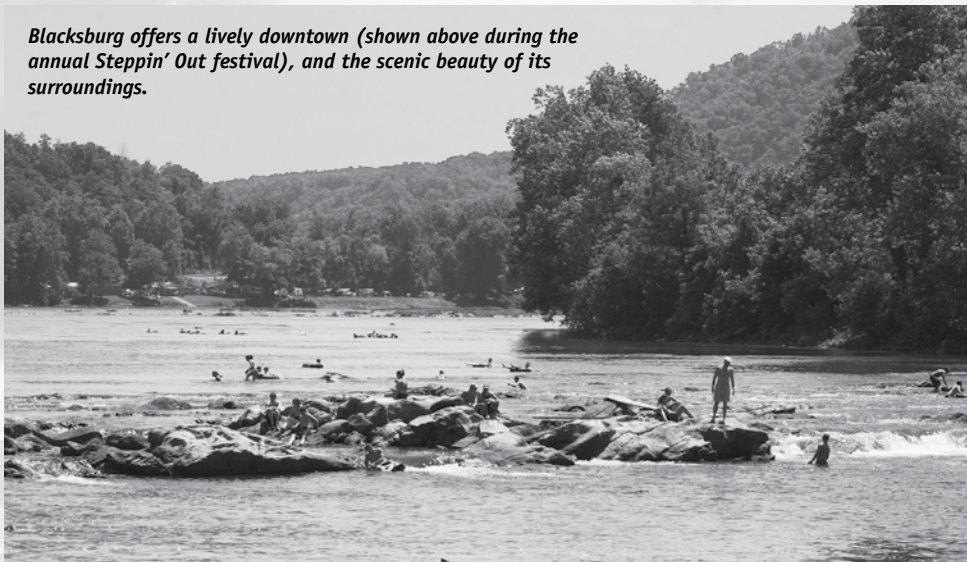

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

The success of Virginia Tech's lacrosse program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and was a school-best 74 percent for 2005. This marked the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, Virginia Tech's student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2005 calendar year, 376 3.0 GPAs were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with University and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student-athlete's educational experience.

During the summer, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium.

Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms and direct access to the SAASS staff. This complex is a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides a centralized place for student-athlete services.

The new facility features more than 18,000 square feet of space, 10 staff offices, 18 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 45-station computer lab, three reading/study rooms, a conference room and reference library.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his eighth year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Drew Scales begins his fifth year with Student Athlete Academic Support Services as an assistant director. Scales provides academic support for student-athletes in lacrosse, volleyball, men's and women's soccer and wrestling, in addition to overseeing the mentor program.

Terrie Repass begins her 32nd year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office secretary and "first contact" person for the SAASS.

STUDENT LIFE

The Athletics Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech is committed to developing the total student-athlete. Megan Armbruster and Patricia Lovett are dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through the programs that this office administers.

Personal Development

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

Community Outreach

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart." Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. In collaboration with the Virginia Tech Corp of Cadets and student leadership, the "Hokies with Heart" program works together with the Montgomery County Public Schools System to visit with local school kids about the importance of education and character development. In 2006, the student-athletes also volunteered with the Montgomery County Christmas Store, the Hokies United Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund, Virginia Tech's Relay for Life campaign, and the Special Olympics.

Each athletic team at Virginia Tech is encouraged to select one local charity on which to focus their philanthropic efforts throughout the year. The lacrosse team has a partnership with Kippis Elementary School.

Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resumé design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and co-ops during their college careers.

Academic Excellence

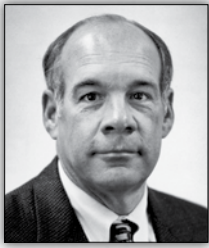
The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.00 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2005 calendar year listed 378 student-athletes with this honor. Neil Savage of the men's swimming & diving team, and Lindsay Pieper of the women's lacrosse team, received the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics. The award is given to one male and one female student-athlete who demonstrate leadership, outstanding academic excellence and community involvement. The recipients of the award receive a \$5,000 scholarship donated by Dr. Bill and Peggy Skelton.

Several athletes from the Virginia Tech lacrosse team have received various academic awards. Lindsay Pieper, Britt Faulkner, Jackie Gray, Christina Griel, Stephanie Jones and Kate Schilling were named to the 2006 ACC All-Academic Team. Pieper was also honored as one of seven scholar-athletes of the year.

Athletic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season. The lacrosse team representatives are Lindsay Pieper and Rachel Culp.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all Tech student-athletes.

The athletic training staff recently completed its fifth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room, a facility that gives the staff a centralized area to care for the needs of student-athletes. Virginia Tech has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility that includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, supplements the Ferrell training room.

The sports medicine staff takes great pride in treating the athletes year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity.

"We owe it to our athletes to provide them with the necessary resources to keep them actively participating," director of athletic training, Mike Goforth, said.

After the sports medicine staff diagnoses and treats an ill or injured athlete, the staff then starts collaborative work with the strength and conditioning staff to give the best injury prevention and performance enhancing programs possible. The training, medical, and strength and conditioning staffs each have a role in bringing the athlete back quickly and ready to play. After an injury, an athlete will go through rehabilitation and physical therapy. Athletes are then moved to weight training, as they become able. The strength and conditioning staff uses specific programs for each injury

in an effort to get the athlete back quickly. Prior to return to full participation, the athlete will also complete a series of drills and progressions that are specific to the athlete's position that will help insure that the athlete is ready to return with a greatly reduced risk of re-injury.

A vital part of student-athletes' services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Katie Rovtar is the trainer for the lacrosse team this spring.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

Tech lacrosse players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie football player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department.

With the two facilities, the Hokies have over 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Dr. Gentry is in his 20th season as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning.

As assistant athletics director for athletic performance, his duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

A native of Durham, N.C., he received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981. He received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Tech in 1999.

Gentry worked as an assistant strength coach at UNC and as the head strength coach at East Carolina University prior to coming to Virginia Tech in 1987.

In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are four full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches — Terry Mitchell, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Jarrett Ferguson and Keith Short, coordinators of strength and conditioning, and Jamie Meyer, coordinator of strength and conditioning for Olympic sports.

Sports Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.

She also designs individual meal plans for athletes. Freel gives an on-campus dining education seminar. She also provides over 300 athletic department recipe books and supplement bars for every athletic team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our student-athletes to have nutrition

education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel says. "The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system.

Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BOD POD is found in many professional training facilities, such as Major League Baseball and the NFL. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

Sport Psychology

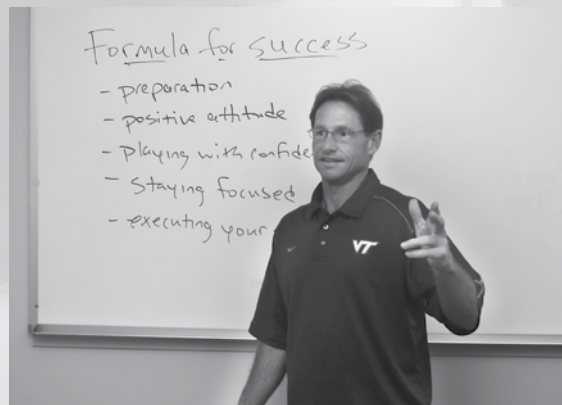
Virginia Tech also offers another important service to all its student athletes — sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A new addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions, and increase peripheral awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

THE ACC

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 54th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 100 national championships, including 52 in women's competition and 48 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 71 times in women's action.

2005-06 in Review

The 2005-06 academic year concluded with the league pocketing an all-time high six national team titles and 15 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 57 national team titles over the last 16 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 24 of the past 26 years.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2006-07 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

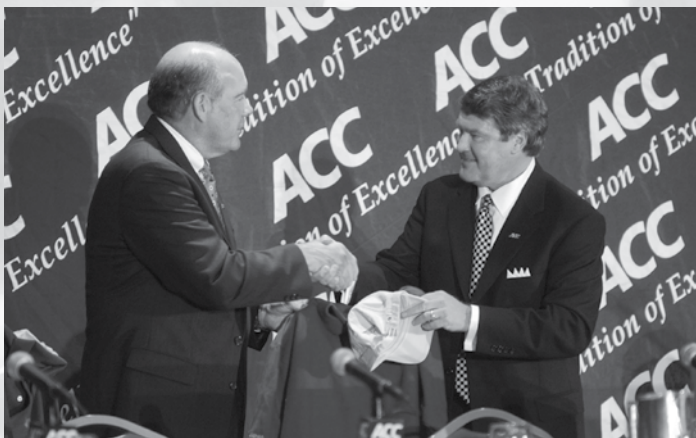
Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names

suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

2006 SEASON REVIEW

The Virginia Tech lacrosse team used 13 first-half goals to open the season defeating UMBC, 18-12. Lindsay Pieper then finished off a pass from sophomore Kady McBrearty in the final four seconds of the contest against Denver to give the Hokies a second victory at home, 11-10, over the Pioneers. The back-to-back wins marked the first time since 1999 that Tech has started the season 2-0.

The Hokies' first loss was heartbreaking, as Tech and George Mason were neck-in-neck before the Patriots found the back of the net with 3:42 left to play. The goal proved to be the game-winner as the Hokies were unable to respond and left Fairfax, Va., with a 10-9 loss. Tech also showed tenacity against traditional lacrosse powerhouse James Madison in Hilton Head, S.C., but despite outscoring the Dukes, 6-5, in the second half, the Hokies fell 14-10.

Senior Stephanie Jones and Pieper each scored five goals in a 16-8 win over LaSalle on March 11, but the Hokies were unable to put together a win-streak as they dropped their first Atlantic Coast Conference game at No. 3 North Carolina, 18-11. Tech held a 6-2 lead through the first 14 minutes, but the Tar Heels came back to score 16 of the next 21 goals to escape with an 18-11 win over the Hokies.

Tech rebounded with a 17-4 victory over Ohio State before eventually falling to No. 2

Duke, 22-6. A two-game winning streak began at Bucknell on March 25. With the game tied 5-5 in overtime, senior Katie Boyle caused a turnover at midfield, picked up the ground ball, and raced the length of the field to score the game-winning goal with 24 seconds remaining to put the Hokies on top 6-5.

In its next game, Tech broke the school record for goals scored in a single game, with 23 against Delaware. Junior Britt Faulkner led the way to a 23-8 victory with six scores, while McBrearty tallied a school-record seven assists.

Tech closed out the month of March with an 18-9 loss to ACC powerhouse Maryland before beginning a tough April. The Hokies opened the month with a 14-5 victory over Ohio before falling 13-8 to Boston College and 15-13 to Longwood. Tech also fell to instate rival, No. 3 Virginia, 12-5, before closing out the regular season with a 16-5 defeat of Davidson.

The Hokies were the No. 6 seed in the ACC tournament, drawing third-seeded North Carolina in the first round. At M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md., Tech tallied four straight second-half goals to come within two, at 9-7, with less than eight minutes remaining, but the Tar Heels scored the final three goals of the game to defeat the Hokies, 12-7.

Pieper, the team MVP, led the team with 46 goals and 54 points on the season, tying her for

third on Tech's single-season scoring list. Her 85 career goals ties her for eighth on the all-time career scoring chart. She was named All-ACC, and earned a spot on the 2006 Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA) All-Region team and the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) All-State first team. Pieper also earned the Virginia Tech Skelton Award, the top academic honor given to a student-athlete.

Boyle, a 2006 team captain, led the team with three game-winning goals, scoring 22 as a defender. She finished her career ranked among Tech's career defensive leaders, holding second place with 67 caused turnovers and fourth with 113 groundballs. She was named to the VaSID second team and participated in the North/South All-Star game following the season.

Jones, a model of consistency through her four years, found a place among the top 10 of almost all of Tech's career statistical categories. With 102 goals, 139 points and 107 draw controls, Jones ranks third in each of those categories. She also resides fifth with 112 ground balls and sixth with 53 caused turnovers in her career. During her senior season, she finished second on the team with 33 goals and 19 draw controls.

Sophomore Natasha Fuchs ranked seventh in the country and first in the ACC in draw controls with 61. Her 61 draw controls ranks

second on the all-time single season list at Tech. She was second on the team with 38 points and 16 assists.

McBrearty led the Hokies with 17 assists, scoring 15 goals. Faulkner had 22 goals and five assists.

On defense, junior Jamie Webster had 30 ground balls and 24 caused turnovers. Freshman Christina Griel also made an impact

in her first season with the team. She was the only freshman to play in all 17 games, starting 16, and was named Rookie of the Year by the team. She had 23 ground balls and was second on the team with 30 draw controls and caused 12 turnovers. Junior Bryana Keenan tallied 24 ground balls and 16 caused turnovers. Virginia Tech ranked sixth in the country in caused turnovers, averaging 11.71 per game.

Between the pipes, senior goalkeeper Carrie Hill stopped 147 shots for the year, increasing her career total to 212, good for fourth on Tech's all-time saves list. She also finished the season with a 10.54 goals against average, setting the career GAA record at 10.72. She is also ranked second on the single season GAA list. Hill earned the teams Coaches Award at the conclusion of the season.

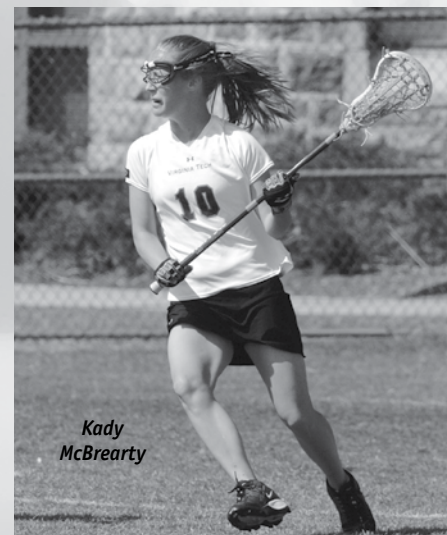

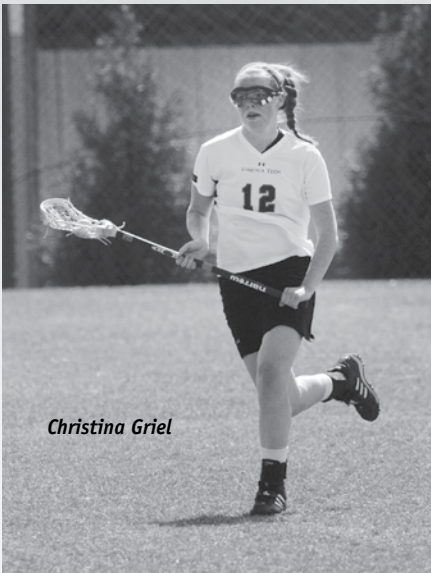

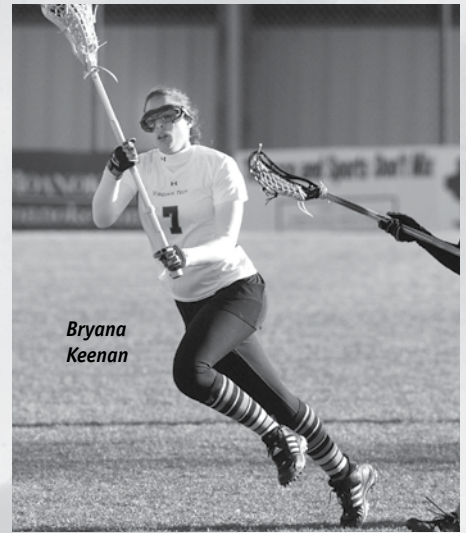

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Directions to Blacksburg

From the north or east, take Interstate 81 south to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From the south, take Interstate 81 north to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

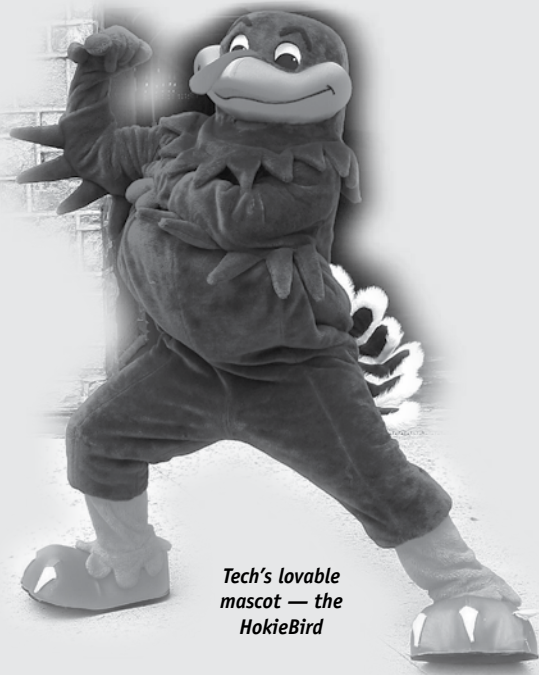
Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the traffic light at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed one-half mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road at the traffic light, just before the football stadium. The Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium is on the left past the outdoor track and Field house, just across the parking lot from Lane Stadium and the Jamerson Athletic Center.

Just what is a Hokie, anyway?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

The Hokie Stone Story

Most of the buildings on the beautiful Tech campus are constructed using Hokie Stone. This natural rock is 475-million-year-old dolomite limestone, some of which is mined from a quarry located not far from from Cassell Coliseum. In constructing the buildings at Tech, a stone mason shapes individual stones, arranges them and cements them together with mortar to create walls of great strength and durability.

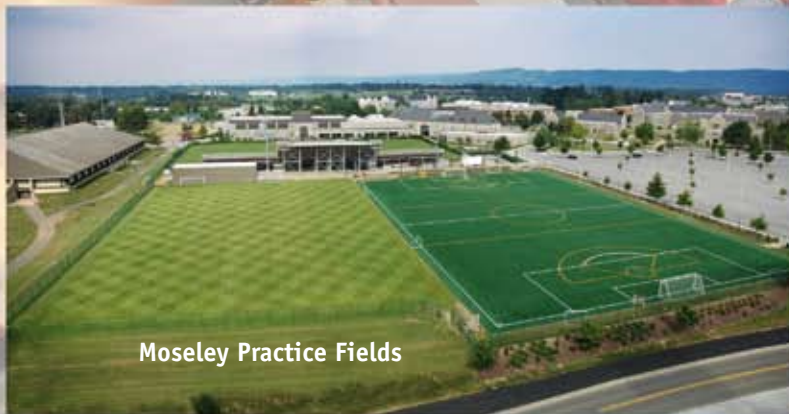

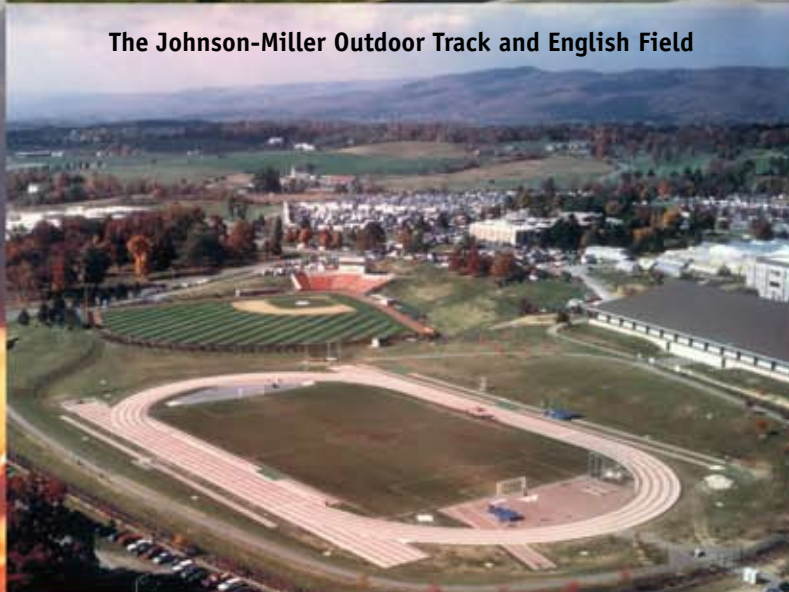
