The 2010 Virginia Tech women's lacrosse team is coming off its best season in the ACC, a year that included its first ACC victory, and will look to keep the ball rolling as it battles a tough in-state schedule as well as a strong conference slate. Though the Hokies lost two impact players to graduation in the offseason, they return the majority of their squad that gave head coach Katrina Silva her winningest record since arriving in Blacksburg four years ago.

Tech returns 10 starters from last season's squad, while also welcoming 13 newcomers to the seasoned squad. The Hokies have big goals for the 2010 season as they look to use their experience and leadership to improve in every aspect of play.

"This is the fastest, most experienced team we've had here," Silva said. "They are exciting to watch and explosive. They are getting a handle on what we have asked them to do over the past couple years. This junior class is our first recruited class. They came in with the expectation in mind to change Virginia Tech lacrosse into a power in the ACC. I truly believe that they are starting to grasp what that means."

Attack

Although the Hokies lost one of their best attackers in program history in Rachel Culp, they return dominant attackers in Allie Emala and Morgan Widlake, who bring a wealth of talent and experience to the team. Silva will also move sophomore Shannon Bone up from the midfield to add depth at the attack position.

"We have the most dynamic attack we have ever had at Tech," said Silva about her front line. "Everyone can score goals, everyone can assist and play hard for one another. In the past it has always been a one or a two-player combination and for once we'll have four or five attackers out there at one time that can really make a huge impact for us."

Emala finished last season second on the team in scoring (35) and assists (15), and also led not only the team but the nation in draw controls (63). She will be the biggest force on the front line, returning the most experience and leadership for the attack. Tech also has what Silva feels is the best and most consistent depth she has ever had at Tech with players such as Caitlyn Weir, Ryan Rotanz, Tori O'Shea, Sarah Fletcher,

Julia Heaps and Emile Hunter, who will also battle for time on the field.

"[The depth] makes us exciting because you can't shut us down, you focus in on one and the others are more than capable of stepping up," said Silva. "We have players with a lot of game experience and a lot of different combinations that work really well together."

Midfield

The midfield remains intact from last season as the Hokies return all four starters in Dylan Garner, Liz Carpenter, Jessica Nonn and Julia Wolfinger. Silva considers the midfield to be the one of the team' biggest strengths this year with all the returning talent and experience.

"These four players are huge midfield returners for us that are going to come back and lead their lines so that we are a consistent team every time we play," says Silva about her midfield. "We have a lot of different combinations in there and a lot of different athletes that, throughout the course of the year, are going to step up and find themselves in big-time spots."

The returning core will be joined by talented and prepared newcomers Brooke Martin and Libby Rosebro, who will see time coming off the bench. Silva has also added a plethora of athleticism to this year's midfield selection as freshmen Charlotte Marsh, Kate Sistare and Katie Grogan will all add quickness and unprecedented athletic abilities to the squad while they look to earn game experience and adjust to the college level of play.

Defense

Silva refers to the defense as the "strongest returning unit" of this year's team as they bring back all starters and bench players from last year's line-up. The squad's very vocal and passionate senior leader, Jacquelyn Duggins, will lead Tech's back line along with Christina Patten, Sam Voelker and Katie Rotanz.

"A lot of our gameplan revolves around creating positive turnovers, and forcing shots that our goalies can save and generating our offense quickly out of that," Silva stated. "Returning those four with that frame of mind, combined with the fact that they have already played together for a year, is a huge opportunity for us."

Behind this experienced defensive unit will be Mackenzie Hanley, Joanna Kiser and Jamie Ariosa, who have all been troubled by injuries throughout the past year, but all three players have returned healthy and ready to play this season. Silva will also mix in some new, young faces into the lineup as Kristin Semones will use her "unique, instinctual play" to challenge the starting unit along with classmate Kimberly Patten.

Goalkeeper

The Hokies will have their work cut out for them this season in net after losing veteran keeper, Kari Morrison, to graduation. Silva has added two talented freshmen in Alexis Carey and Alex Gale to play in the net this season while Morrison will also remain with the squad as a volunteer coach to help transition the young newcomers. Silva has been impressed with both goalies through the fall season, noting that both are ready to compete but is also excited about what each can bring to the team this year. Freshman Katelyn Luker will also challenge her classmates for playing time in net.

"Alex makes a lot of plays outside the goal and likes to come out and make big clears," Silva said. "And Alexis is a little bit more in the goal, doesn't go out too far, but both of them are very capable of stopping shots at this level."

Schedule

Tech will look to get off to a good start this season as the team will open the year at home with Drexel and a week later Presbyterian, but then hits the road for five-straight games, facing a tough slate of in-state competition including games at James Madison and George Mason. The Hokies will also begin conference play during their road stretch, as they will travel to Boston to face Boston College. After outing the Eagles last season to earn their first ACC win, Tech will look to start conference play with a victory on the road.

Days later the Hokies will return home to face a Duke team that they regularly play well at home, while also hosting William & Mary and Davidson before embarking on a two-game road trip that includes Old Dominion and North Carolina. Tech will return home for its final two games at Thompson Field to host Virginia and American. The Hokies will finish their season on the road, traveling to Longwood and Maryland, only to return to Maryland a week later for the ACC Tournament.

KATRINA SILVA

HEAD COACH | FOURTH SEASON | TOWSON 1993

Virginia Tech head coach Katrina Silva enters her fourth season with the Hokies. Prior to Tech, Silva spent seven seasons at Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y. Silva compiled a 67-57 overall record while at the helm of the Raider program, with her teams winning Patriot League Tournament titles in 2004 and 2005 and finishing second in 2006. Silva was the 2006 Howard



Hartman Award winner as Colgate's Coach of the Year and was named the Patriot League Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005 while leading Colgate to the NCAA Tournament in both of those seasons.

No stranger to Western Virginia and Blacksburg, Silva was head coach of both women's lacrosse and field

hockey at Roanoke College from 1996-99. During her three seasons with the Maroons, Silva coached the lacrosse team to a 37-11 record and two Old Dominion Athletic Conference championships in 1997 and 1999. In 1997, her Maroons advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Division III Tournament. During the 1996 season, Silva worked as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse team at Virginia Tech. The team compiled a 7-6 overall record in just its second season.

Silva's first stint at Colgate came during the 1994-95 academic year, where she served as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams under Cathy Foto. That spring, she helped the Raiders post their best record as a Division I program to date, 10-5, and they earned an invitation to the ECAC tournament.

Silva began her coaching career at Goucher College, when she served as an assistant coach with the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams from 1992 to 1994. Under her guidance, Goucher's goalkeeper recorded 192 saves and a .642 save percentage on her way to becoming a two-time all-region selection.

Silva is a 1993 graduate of Towson University with a bachelor's degree in physical education studies, and a minor in psychology. She was the starting goalkeeper for Towson's nationally-ranked lacrosse team for three years. During her junior campaign, the Tigers were finalists in the ECAC tournament. Silva was also the starting goalkeeper on Towson's field hockey team for four years, and she was honored as the Southeast Conference's Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

As a member of both the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association and US Lacrosse Incorporated, Silva has served on several committees with the IWLCA, including the regional All-America committee, and has been a representative on US Lacrosse's board of governors.

Silva resides in Christiansburg, Va.

MEGAN BURKER

ASSISTANT COACH | FOURTH SEASON | STANFORD 2006

Megan Burker begins her fourth season at Virginia Tech as an assistant coach, where her field duties include working

with the attack and assisting in the midfield, while she is also in charge of recruitment off the field.

A native of Baltimore, Md., Burker came to Tech from Stanford University, where she had a standout career. As a senior, she was a member of the pre-season Tewaarton Watch List and the first player in team history to be named an IWLCA National All-American

with third-team honors that year.

As a four-time Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Tournament All-Star and a four-time All-MPSF selection, Burker finished her career ranked in the top-10 in every career chart. While standing atop the Cardinal career-scoring list with 143 goals, she also finished second with 64 career assists, 120 draw controls and 155 ground balls. A two-time captain in her junior and senior seasons, Burker was also honored as the team MVP in 2005 and 2006.

Named to the U.S. National Team's program at the completion of her junior season, Burker competed until 2008 as a captain for the Developmental Squad.

Burker graduated from Stanford in 2006 with a degree in urban studies and is currently working towards an MBA from the Pamplin College of Business at Virginia Tech.

LYNZ KEYS

ASSISTANT COACH | THIRD SEASON | OHIO 2004

Lynz Keys enters her third season with Virginia Tech as an assistant coach, where her on-field duties include primarily working with the midfield.



Keys comes to Tech from Longwood University, where she served as an assistant coach for two seasons. During her first season, Keys helped the Lancers in their first full NCAA Division I schedule. In addition to coaching at Longwood, Keys served as an assistant coach with the 2007 U-19 National Canadian Women's Lacrosse team. During her tenure with the U-19 team, her responsibilities included working with the attack and midfield, as well as mental training, nutrition and conditioning.

Prior to Longwood, Keys managed the Lax Shack Mississauga in Toronto, Canada, a division of Proboss

Lacrosse Company after a standout career at Ohio University.

While At Ohio, Keys earned All-Region and All-American Lacrosse Conference honors during both her junior and senior seasons. A senior captain for the Bobcats, and part of only the second graduating varsity class, Keys had 52 goals and eight assists in Ohio's best season. Keys was also honored as a third-team Inside Lacrosse National All-American and was a Senior All-Star game participant.

Keys' playing experience extends beyond Ohio, as she was a six-year member of the Canadian National women's lacrosse team and played three years for the Canadian National U-19 Women's Lacrosse team.

Additionally, Keys has 10 years of camp experience with Ohio University Lacrosse Camp, Patterson Lacrosse Camp, International Lacrosse Camp hosted at Rutgers University and Merestead Sports Camps, in Richmond, Va.

A native of Whitby, Ontario, Keys earned her bachelor of science degree in sports industry from Ohio University and completed a masters of health promotions at Virginia Tech in 2009.







The Virginia Tech women's lacrosse team finished the 2009 season with a 7-10 record while also earning its first-ever ACC win, finishing 1-4 in conference play. The program continued to advance and grow throughout the 2009 season, embarking on an impressive four-game win streak in the middle of the year and another three-game streak towards the end of the season. The team's record was its best under head coach Katrina Silva and second-best since joining the ACC in 2005.

Beginning their season with three road games, the Hokies also faced two ranked teams in their first month of play. Tech opened the season at Drexel University, falling just short to the Dragons, 9-10. Sophomore Allie Emala led all scorers in the match with three goals while senior leader Rachel Culp also burried two as she began what would be an eightgame scoring streak. Tech continued with road play as it took on No. 4 Virginia in Charlottesville, but the Cavaliers were too much for the Hokies, claiming a 19-3 victory.

On Feb. 21, the Hokies held their home opener as they hosted No. 19 James Madison, but dropped the match by a score of 14-9. Despite the loss, Tech notched it's first of five games in which seven different Hokies scored at least one goal.

Hitting the road again, the Hokies crossed the state to take on William & Mary but continued to skid, falling to the Tribe 14-8. Nonn led the team in scoring with three goals, while Tori O'Shea and Liz Carpenter each earned at least one point in the match for the third time this season.

Tech would return home to earn its first win of the year, hosting George Mason on the final day of February. The Hokies claimed a 10-8 victory over the Patriots in just their second match of the year at Thompson Field. Culp led Tech with four scores while six other Hokies also found the back of the net.

After their next match against Vanderbilt was cancelled, the Hokies would continue with their winning ways as they played host to George Washington, claiming a 20-10 victory over the Colonials. Culp paced the offense with six goals while Emala also added five for Tech.

Taking a break from play at Thompson Field, the Hokies traveled to Davidson, N.C. to take on the Wildcats and tack yet another victory on to their streak as they earned a huge, 20-5, win. Culp tallied her second-best performance of the year, netting seven scores and assisting two. Emala added two goals in the match while Ryan Rotanz also scored a seasonhigh three goals.

The Hokies continued their march down victory lane, earning their biggest win of the season as they topped conference-foe Boston College, 16-14, in overtime, at Thompson Field for their first ACC victory. Emala posted a season-high four assists while also scoring four. Culp added six scores for the Hokies with Nonn and Morgan Widlake added three as well.

Tech finished the month of March on a threegame skid, making trips to Duke and Louisville, playing host to North Carolina as well. Culp broke her scoring streak as she was unable to score against the No. 5 Blue Devils and the Hokies fell by a score of 21-3 to the conference opponent. Against Louisville, in just their second all-time meeting, the Cardinals had the upper hand, outing the Hokies 14-8. Culp was back on the board, starting yet another eight-game scoring streak, as she burried three but Nonn would spearhead the offense with a season-best four scores. The No. 4 North Carolina Tar Heels would top Tech by a similar score, claiming a close 12-8 victory over the Hokies. Emala tallied three goals in the match and Culp added two scores.

The Hokies began April with an 11-10, overtime victory over Old Dominion as Nonn tied her seasonhigh with four goals and Dylan Garner made it three games in a row with a score. Tech would next earn a

19-11 win at American as Culp put up a season-best eight scores in the match and the Hokies tallied their final seven-player scoring game of the season. Their final win of the season was a 13-10 victory at home over Longwood before ending the regular season with a two-game skid, dropping a 15-10 match at Oregon and a 16-6 match at home to fellow ACC member and then-No. 2 Maryland. Culp tallied ten goals over the final three games of the regular season while Emala added five.

The 2009 ACC Tournament would be held in Blacksburg at the end of the season and although the Hokies were the host, in-state rival and then-No. 9 Virginia bounced the young Tech squad in the first round. The Hokies did improve since the first time the two teams matched up, earlier in the year, but the Cavaliers claimed a 13-5 victory. Caitlyn Weir led the offense with two scores while Culp, Emala and Carpenter each added a goal and Culp earned the only assist for Tech in the match.

Culp finished the season as the overall team leader

on offense tallying 70 points on the year, including 54 goals, three of which were game-winners, and 16 assists. Nonn was second on the team in scoring with 33 goals on the year while also adding three assists for 36 points. Emala tallied 28 scores on the season, tacking on three assists for 31 points while three other Hokies added ten goals. Behind Culp on the assists chart was Weir with nine on the year as Garner also added. As a team, the Hokies finished the season with 178 goals and 56 assists, good for 234 points on the year.

Emala led the team with 63 draw controls while Nonn picked up a team-best 52 groundballs, also causing a team-high 28 turnovers.

Kari Morrison manned the net all season for the Hokies, accumulating 1029:21 minutes in net. Morrison made 190 saves on the year, wrapping up the season with a 7-10 record.

Both seniors landed themselves in the Tech record books by the end of their collegiate careers as Culp sits second all-time with 119 career goals and third in goals in a season with her 54 from her final season. Culp also ranks fourth in career points with 149 and second in points in a season with 70. Morrison ranks fifth in single-season saves with 190 as a senior, while she also sits atop the career and single-season ground balls lists with 116 and 65 respectively.

As the team issued its awards after the season, Culp was named the team's MVP while also earning the Strength & Conditioning award. Nonn was awarded the Rookie of the Year award and Jacquelyn Duggins was the recipient of the Coaches Award.

Numerous Hokies also received postseason awards from the ACC as Culp continued the four-year streak of Hokies being named to the All-ACC team, garnering the honor for the first time in her career. Culp was also named to the US Lacrosse national team after her outstanding senior season. Culp, along with Morrison also made it three years in a row on the All-ACC Academic team as they were joined by two-year honoree Allie Emala, and first-timers Dylan Garner and Caitlyn Weir.







In 2003, the Hokies began play in what was formerly known as Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium. In the fall of 2008, the facility was renamed in honor of long-time Virginia Tech women's athletics supporter Sandra D. Thompson. Located in the center of the Virginia Tech athletics complex, the facility has become one of the finest places to play in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system so the pitch can be drained and ready to play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard allows fans to have a full score

update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 additional fans to watch the games.

During the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium. The approximately 900-square foot facility enhances the continued growth of the stadium. The center includes two dedicated broadcast booths, two covered areas

available to broadcast and videographers' cameras and a large working area for media covering the Hokies. The climate-controlled facility contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandra D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a half-time room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations.

STUDENT LIFE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is under the direction of Reyna Gilbert, the assistant athletic director for student life, who came to Tech from Nova Southeastern University in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. Assisting Gilbert is coordinator of student life, Danny White.

The programs and services implemented by the Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life are inspired by the NCAA/CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success) Life Skills Program. The program was honored for its commitment to serving the good of the studentathletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association in 2006-2007 as a Program of Excellence.

SAAC

The Student Athlete Advisory Committee is a committee made up of student-athletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. VT SAAC also offers input on the rules, regulations and policies that affect student-athletes' lives on NCAA member institution campuses. Two members from each sport team serve on SAAC each academic year. The leadership team during 2009-2010 is Tim Miller (wrestling), president; Sarah Ameen (women's swimming), vice-president; and Kelly Phillips (women's track), secretary.

Highlights from the 2008-2009 year include the second annual Relay for Life dodge ball tournament, third annual Brother/Sister toy drive competition among sports teams for the Montgomery County Christmas Store, which collected over 1, 000 toys,

and a canned food drive competition collecting over 4,000 lbs of food items for the local food banks.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

In October 2008, Virginia Tech student-athletes welcomed Linda Hancock to campus, director of the Wellness Resource Center at Virginia Commonwealth University. Hancock provided an interactive and engaging program on alcohol education and sexual responsibility using personal response systems (clickers) to record student responses to questions. Student-athletes celebrated National Student-Athlete Day with a presentation from five-time Olympic swimming medalist and motivational speaker, Josh Davis.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

In an effort to better assist Virginia Tech student-athletes in reaching their career goals, the Athletics Office of Student Life has created the Career Game Plan. This program is intended to focus on a different aspect of career development each year of student-athlete's career at Virginia Tech, essentially serving as stepping stones on their path to post graduate success. The Office of Student Life works with Becca Scott in the Virginia Tech Career Services Center to create programs designed to help student-athletes fill their career development "play book" with information that will help them achieve post-graduate success. Student-athletes are encouraged to take advantage of Go2Athelte, an online career networking resource, as well as participate in on-

campus interviewing and secure internships and co-ops during their college careers.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2008 calendar year listed 342 student-athletes with this honor

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Virginia Tech student-athletes were involved more than ever in the local community. During the 2008 academic year, Virginia Tech student-athletes reached almost 5,500 youth through community involvement. Having volunteered hundreds of hours annually in local schools, community groups and hospitals, the student-athletes are setting a high precedent for all involved with the program. Each athletic team has a community partner with which it volunteers time and hosts at a home game to honor the partnership program. Annual community outreach initiatives include the Margaret Beeks Elementary School Hokie Night, Montgomery County Christmas Store, Winning Choices Week and Scouting Day with the Hokies. Six student-athletes were awarded the ACC Top Six for Service Award for their contribution to volunteering on campus and in the surrounding communities.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Whether in the classroom or on the field, expectations placed on Virginia Tech student-athletes remain consistently high year after year. In collaboration with the Tech Athletics Department, Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) works tirelessly to help Hokie student-athletes achieve their full potential, both on and off the field. Services available include tutors, study assistance, computer and technology aid as well as individual skill development programs. In addition, SAASS integrates its services with those of the Virginia Tech community, assisting students in arranging appointments with various University departments, such as their academic advisors, the Registrar, the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, dean's offices. Career Services, Cook Counseling Center, Cranwell International Center and the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence. The department is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program for student-athletes, offering academic counseling in combination with university academic advising to ensure students receive a complete system of support.

Each team at Virginia Tech is assigned an academic counselor to coordinate individualized support efforts for every team member. Together, SAASS department members assist approximately 500 student-athletes in all areas of academic assistance, from freshman orientation to course selection to career counseling and planning.

In addition, student-athletes have access to the department's spacious facilities,

located in the West Side of Lane Stadium. Opened during the 2006-07 academic year, the SAASS suite, located in the Quillen Family Academic Center, features 18 private tutor rooms, a state of-the-art classroom, a 36-station computer lab with printer access, a conference room, three quiet areas for reading and studying and a reference library. The office is available between classes, after practice and in the evenings, while hours of operation are flexible and may be tailored to maximize the student-athlete's limited time. The collection of SAASS programs housed in Lane Stadium guarantees that all student-athletes, regardless of their personal backgrounds, talents and interests, achieve success during their time at Virginia Tech. SPORTS MEDICINE

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Training Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidenced by their participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection (MRSA), high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies.

Tech is entering its ninth year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room, which consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a

centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is top-of-the-line equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer.

The Ferrell Training Room nearly doubled the size of the former Merryman Center facility. Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing in the top five percent nationally. The \$10 million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physician's suite. The suite is equipped with a new state-of-the-art X-ray system, a fluoroscopy unit and a minor procedure room. The training room also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities

The range of benefits that athletes have access to includes custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized DonJoy prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries.

The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athletes year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. During this time, the staff will analyze past injury data from

each participant and construct a preventative program.

If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen by physical therapists Mark Piechoski and Katie Burns in the Ferrell Training Room. Piechoski, a certified athletic trainer, physical therapist and strength and conditioning specialist, plays a large role in the overall program developed to return an injured athlete back to 100 percent. In addition, staff sport psychologist Dr. Gary Bennett is available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues. Team chiropractor, Dr. Dale Reynolds, provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions and plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

Team orthopaedic surgeons bring a wealth of experience and skill to assist when athletes need orthopaedic consultation for certain types of sports-related injuries.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the Montgomery Regional Hospital's SWVA Center for Orthopaedics and Schiffert Student Health Center. Both facilities are staffed with qualified physicians and staff, and feature a wide variety of technologies designed to increase the level of care available to athletes.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies continue to improve in the ACC.

SPORT NUTRITION

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director. Freel, who is one of 16 full-time college dietitians in the country, also serves on the nutrition and performance committee with Dr. Gary Bennett.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet to improve performance.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BodPod bodycomposition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BodPod is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) within five minutes through air displacement. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game.

He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

"We try to address all the various factors that

affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett said. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologist. On average, Bennett conducts 30 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises. One of the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions and increase peripheral awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.



BY THE WAY... WHAT IS A HOKIE?

The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.
