

### WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loval to Tech athletics. The official school colors – Chicago maroon and burnt orange – also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they

made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.





### HOKIE STONE

Hokie Stone is used to construct most of the buildings on the beautiful Tech campus. This natural rock is 475-million-year-old dolomite limestone mined from a quarry located less than a mile from Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. In constructing the buildings at Tech, a stone mason shapes individual stones, arranges them and cements them together with mortar to create walls of great strength and durability.

### LACROSSE FACILITIES



In 2003, the Hokies began play in what was formerly known as Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium. In the fall of 2008, the facility was renamed in honor of long-time Virginia Tech women's athletics supporter Sandra D. Thompson. Located in the center of the Virginia Tech athletics complex, the facility has become one of the finest places to play in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system so the pitch can be drained and ready for play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard allows fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 additional fans to watch the games.

During the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium.



The approximately 900-square foot facility enhances the continued growth of the stadium. The center includes two dedicated broadcast booths, two covered areas available to broadcast and videographers' cameras and a large working area for media covering the Hokies. The climate-controlled facility contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box.


Between each team's bench area is the Sandra D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a half-time room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations.

# SEASON OUTLOOK

The 2011 season will be one of new beginnings for the now seasoned Virginia Tech lacrosse team. The Hokies, under new command as first-time head coach Megan Burker took over the reins for an interim year, return to play as a more seasoned squad looks to lead Tech to a successful spring campaign. Seven seniors and eight juniors on the squad also add a wealth of experience for the former Tech assistant and her newly assembled staff.

After a 6-11 season last year that also saw the Hokies plagued by injuries and included a disappointing conference slate, Tech looks to bounce back in 2011 and make a name for itself. The Hokies lost one player to graduation but welcome a talented freshman class of eight newcomers. The team will once again face a challenging schedule, which includes a treacherous battle in the stacked Atlantic Coast Conference that sent four of its six teams to the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals, two of which advanced past that round.

"This is definitely the deepest our team has ever been, after losing just one senior last year," Burker said of her new squad. "There has been a huge off-season emphasis on leadership and, because of that, this team is playing with more poise than they ever have. They have recognized where their strengths are and have really come together to bring those out of each other to work towards a successful 2011 season."



#### **ATTACK**

Tech returns great experience and depth in its attackers for 2011, as four starters rejoin the team. Last season's team captain and points leader, Allie

Emala, returns for her senior season after scoring 32 goals and assisting 15 more in 2010. Emala also tallied 88 draw controls to propel herself to the top of the all-time career chart with 185 so far in her three-year career. In her second year as team captain, Emala's game experience and leadership will set the tone for the squad's development and success this season.

Rejoining Emala on the front line is fellow senior Caitlyn Wier, along with juniors Shannon Bone and Ryan Rotanz. Wier, a three-year starter as well, finished last season third on the team in scoring with 24 goals, while assisting 14 more, good for second on the squad. Bone, who started all 17 games as a sophomore last season, added 13 goals and a third-best nine assists in 2010, while Rotanz rallied for 17 goals and seven assists as she saw increased playing time later in the season, eventually earning a spot in the starting lineup.

Sophomore Julia Heaps has emerged through the off-season to build on her playing experience during her freshman season. She posted some of the team's top newcomer numbers in 2010 and will be a valuable scoring option for the Hokies this season. Sophomore Emile Hunter also earned valuable minutes as a freshman and returns with solid game experience to contend for time this year.

Freshman Kelly Naslonski will enter her first season with high expectations as a newcomer on the squad. She comes in ready to compete at the collegiate level and battle for quality minutes. Fellow classmates Morgan Toland, Sydney Taylor and Andrea Ebeling will also fight for field time in their first season, while also providing Tech with a multitude of options and depth in its front line.

"Our attack is one of our most experienced units," Burker said of her front line. "We have seven players competing for quality time and return some great leadership at this position with seniors Allie Emala and Caitlyn Wier. The depth we have here will give us consistency as we move through the spring."

#### **MIDFIELD**

Tech returns more experience at the midfield position and will look to juniors Jessica Nonn and Morgan Widlake to lead the way. Nonn finished the 2010 season having scored at least one goal in all 17 games as a second-year starter and led the team in scoring after putting away 36 goals. Nonn ranked in the top three on the squad in six different categories last year, also leading the team in ground balls (45) and caused turnovers (30). Widlake, who posted quality numbers across the board in her sophomore outing, will look to improve on her 19 goals, 16 ground balls and 22



draw controls from last season and emerge as a leader for the Hokies.

Senior captains Dylan Garner and Liz Carpenter will also contribute in the midfield as they provide great leadership and on-field experience. Garner, who is serving as a team captain for the second-straight year, is a seasoned veteran that can contribute quality minutes and is a trustworthy option. Carpenter was named team MVP last season despite missing the final four games of the season due to injury.

Sophomore Brooke Martin saw time in every game for the Hokies last season and will look to make more of an impact in her second year. Martin made four starts last season and will look to build upon her eight goals, five assists and 18 ground balls as she works to emerge as an underclass leader through the spring. Fellow underclassman Kate Sistare will also battle for increased field time after playing in 11 games in her debut. She will offer some depth in the midfield as well as the defensive end.

Freshmen Taylor Landry, Lindsay Roche and Becca Niles will compete for playing as they adjust to the college game.

"Through our off season, our midfield grew immensely with the speed and consistency they can bring to our team. Juniors Jessica Nonn and Morgan Widlake have shown that they are ready to step up and lead this group along with sophomore Brooke Martin and senior Dylan Garner. This unit will provide the glue we need as they look to contribute at both ends of the field."

#### **DEFENSE**

Tech's defense has faced more of a transformation than the other units throughout the offseason. With changes in the starting rotation and noticed improvement throughout the fall, junior Julie Wolfinger and sophomores Libby Rosebro and Kristin Semones are looking to step up and make an impact this spring. The defense will also look to midfielder Charlotte Marsh to make an impact this season, as veteran starters Christina Patten and Sam Voelker continue to battle back to full health.

Wolfinger, who finished the year with 15 ground balls and nine caused turnovers, transitioned to the defense from the midfield last season with the absence of Voelker and junior Amanda Mosketti, who was also injured in 2010 and will also return to action and battle for playing time.

Seniors Jamie Ariosa and Joanna Kiser, who saw increased playing time late last season, will provide great senior leadership for the Hokies after combining for 20 ground balls and seven caused turnovers last year. Junior Mackenzie Hanley and sophomore Kimberly Patten, who will make her collegiate debut after suffering a foot injury prior to the 2010 season, will join freshman Sammi Mosketti and compete for field time

"Though we enter the season with a few injuries, we feel good about the athleticism we can draw on from the defensive group that is developing, as well as the support from our midfield," Burker said. "We will look to players like Julie Wolfinger and Libby Rosebro to lead us here, along with seniors Joanna Kiser and Jamie Ariosa. We've also moved senior Liz Carpenter into the defense and are excited about the promise of sophomores Kristin Semones and Katie Grogan."

#### **GOALKEEPERS**

Tech returns two starting keepers from last season as Alexis Carey and Alex Gale shared the duties in net last year. Gale saw the slight edge in playing time due to impressive play and Carey missing games due to illness. Gale, the team's Rookie of the Year, finished her collegiate premiere with a 5-7 record after making 82 saves and recording 602 minutes in goal in 12 starts. Carey started just five games but played in 13, recording 370 minutes in net and making 59 saves. The pair will work together again in 2011 and look to improve in every category as they use their year of experience and opposing styles of play to propel them forward.

Fellow sophomore Katelyn Luker will also fight for time in goal this season as she adds great depth to the young position.

"We are fortunate to have two players returning who have both logged solid minutes in cage," Burker said. "They bring back strong game experience in big contests, which will bring more confidence to our defensive unit. Alex and Alexis each have unique strengths that offer us flexibility in our goalkeeping position, and we're excited to see them emerge throughout the season as leaders in the defensive end"

#### **SCHEDULE**

The Hokies will once again face a challenging slate in 2011, as they have to compete in the treacherous Atlantic Coast Conference which annually ranks at least four of its six members in the nation's top 20 throughout the season. The talented quartet of Virginia, Maryland, Duke and North Carolina all advanced to at least the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals, while

North Carolina ended its season in the semifinals and Maryland claimed its 10th national championship.

The 2011 season will begin with three-straight road games for the Hokies, as they travel to High Point, Presbyterian College and Davidson before opening a three-game home stretch by closing out the month of February with George Mason and later opening the month of March hosting James Madison and George Washington. Presbyterian College was Tech's first win of the season last year, and the Hokies will be looking for revenge against George Washington after barely dropping the road contest last season. James Madison will provide an early challenge for Tech, as the Dukes participated in the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals in 2010.

The Hokies will next travel to the nation's capital to face American in a mid-week clash and then return home to open conference play with Boston College, who Tech defeated the last time the teams matched up in Blacksburg.

Road games at Duke, William & Mary and Liberty, as well as a home game against Old Dominion will close out the month of March for the Hokies and allow time to prepare for notoriously talented ACC foes, North Carolina and Virginia. Tech will host the Tar Heels before traveling to Charlottesville less than seven days later to battle the Cavaliers.

The Hokies will make their final road trip of the season when they trek to Bethlehem, Pa., to take on Lehigh before closing out the regular season at home with Longwood and defending national champion Maryland.

Tech will close out the 2011 season with a trip to Cary, N.C., to participate in the ACC Tournament during the final days of April.

Megan Burker has taken over as the head coach of the Virginia Tech lacrosse team, serving as interim head coach for the 2010 season. This will be Burker's fifth season at Tech after serving as an assistant coach for four years. In addition to running the attack and serving as the recruiting coordinator, Burker organized team travel, led video breakdown and prepared camp and clinic schedules during her time as an assistant. She has worked through the year to make incremental changes for the Hokies, placing an emphasis on creating a solid foundation of team values and goals to quide the lacrosse program into the future.

Since arriving at Tech, Burker has served as the recruiting coordinator and focused intensively on player skill development. She spent two years with Kady McBrearty, helping the all-time assists leader (68) at Tech improve her numbers each season and propel herself into the top 10 in goals (93) and points (161). McBrearty also established herself as the second Hokie ever to earn All-ACC team honors and the only player to do it more than once, while also being recognized on many more occasions. Rachel Culp worked with Burker through her final three years and graduated as one of the best attackers in program history. She ranks second all-time in scoring (119) and fourth in points (149) and became the second Hokie to play for the US Lacrosse Developmental team and the third and most recent to be named to the All-ACC

A native of Baltimore, Md., Burker came to Tech from Stanford University, where she had a standout career. As a senior, she was a member of the preseason Tewaarton Watch List and the first player in team history to be named an IWLCA National All-American with third-team honors that year. In addition, as a senior Burker boasted a .495 shooting percentage, ranked fourth in her conference with 2.5 goals per game and 18th nationally with 2.83 draws per game.

Burker made a big impact on lacrosse in the west as Stanford transitioned into the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation. She was named Rookie of the Year as a freshman in the Mountain Pacific Lacrosse League as well as her team's Attacker of the Year. As a four-time conference tournament. All-Star and a four-time All-Conference selection, Burker finished her career as one of only three players all-time at Stanford to be ranked in the top 10 in every career chart. While standing atop the Cardinal career-scoring list with 143 goals, she also finished second with 64 career assists, 120 draw controls and 155 ground balls at the time of her graduation. In addition, she earned Academic All-Conference honors in 2004, 2005 and 2006. Through her career she led the Cardinal to three conference championships and in 2006 the program's first-ever trip to the NCAA Tournament. She started every game of her career and was voted a two-time captain for her junior and senior seasons as well as team MVP in 2005 and 2006.

Named to the U.S. National Teams program at the completion of her junior season, Burker competed until 2008 as a captain for the Developmental Squad along with Tech assistant coach Lindsay Lewis.

Burker graduated from Stanford in 2006 with a degree in urban studies and is currently working towards an MBA from the Pamplin College of Business at Virginia Tech with expected graduation in May of 2011.

Lindsay Lewis is entering her first season at Virginia Tech after spending the 2009 season on the George Washington coaching staff. Lewis will help with the midfield, while also working closely with the goalies.

Lewis brings a wealth coaching experience to the Hokies as she served as an assistant coach at James Madison University from 2006-2009 before taking on recruiting, video and travel arrangements responsibilities for the Colonials. While at James Madison, Lewis was the defensive coach and recruiting coordinator, also assisting with travel plans and scouting. The Dukes were 25-25 during Lewis' three seasons, which were highlighted by a trip to the Colonial Athletic Association title game in 2007.

The former Boston University standout has remained in the game beyond her coach experience since ending her college career, playing competitively with the United States' Developmental Lacrosse Team, a team that also featured current head coach Megan Burker. Lewis served as

a team captain every year she was with the program, and also participated in the U.S. World Cup team's training camp in June of 2009. Lewis has also dedicated time to working with the Brine/Warrior Lacrosse's Research and Development (R&D) team, providing input in product design and testing and running promotional camps and clinics.

As a player, Lewis was a four-year starter at BU, as well as a four-time All-America East selection and All-America. The All-American graduated as the Terriers' all-time scoring leader with 187 goals in her career. Lewis also ranks among the program's all-time best in points (232) and draw controls (132), as well as ground balls, caused turnovers, assists and games played. Lewis also helped guided BU to three America East championships and three NCAA Tournament appearances, including a quarterfinal run in 2005.

Lewis, a Glenelg, Md., native received a bachelor's degree in hospitality administration in 2006 from Boston University.

# **ANNE MURRAY**

Anne Murray will begin her first season at Virginia Tech this year after serving on the Mount St. Mary's coach staff during the 2009-10 season. Murray will be responsible for the defense as part of the Tech

While at Mount St. Mary's, Murray was responsible for assisting in the day-to-day team practices and workouts, while also coordinating recruiting efforts, team travel and scouting reports.

Murray was a four-year letterwinner at Princeton University and finished her senior season with 10 goals and seven assists, good for 17 points. She was a member of the Princeton teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Murray posted an assist against Northwestern in the 2008 NCAA Quarterfinals and dished out another assist against both Northwestern and Loyola during the 2009 NCAA Tournament.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Murray graduated from Princeton in 2009 with a history degree.







# 2010 SEASON REVIEW

The 2010 season was one of growth for the Virginia Tech lacrosse team as it finished the year with a 6-11 overall record. The Hokies struggled in conference play, going winless through five games, in a league that sent four of its six teams to at least the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament. The loss of outstanding seniors, Kari Morrison and Rachel Culp, presented an early challenge for the Hokies as they searched to replace their leading scorer and veteran keeper. Also plagued by injuries throughout the season, Tech took on the challenge and battled back throughout the year and put together the second-best record under head coach Katrina Silva and third-best record since joining the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Hokies began the year with back-to-back home games but were unable to compete at Thompson Field until exactly one month after the season opener. Tech held its first two games of the year at Moseley Field, the team's practice field located just next to Thompson Field because of the wintery conditions. With snow banks surrounding the turf surface and frigid weather whipping through campus, the Hokies came up just short in their opener, falling to Drexel, 13-9, but would bounce back a week later with

a whopping home defeat of Presbyterian College, 19-5, in the two teams' first-ever meeting.

Tech ended the month of February and began the month of March on the road, embarking on a five-game road stretch, its longest since 2005. First up was a trip to nearby James Madison, which was one-of-five teams on Tech's schedule that finished the season ranked among the nation's top 15 teams. The Dukes had their way with the Hokies, topping them 16-3. Just three days later Tech was on the road again, this time traveling to Fairfax, Va., where it would eventually drop it's second-straight road game to George Mason, 11-7.

The Hokies began their spring break road trip just over a week later, headed in the opposite direction of most. The trek north began in Washington, D.C., where they took on George Washington. The Colonials snuck by the Hokies in a nail-biter and eventually got the 9-8 victory. After stops in Baltimore and New York City, the play continued as Tech bounced back and picked up a big win at Central Connecticut State, 16-4, to snap a three-game skid. Ten different players found the back of the net in the victory, a season high for the Hokies. Days later, Tech concluded its weeklong road trip as it began conference play at Boston College. The Hokies

battled through the cold, rainy Massachusetts weather and hung with the Eagles for much of the game, but BC eventually pulled away and took the 14-9 win.

Finally back in Blacksburg and able to play at Thompson Field, Tech hosted a talented Duke team three days after returning from Spring Break. The No. 3 Blue Devils were too much for the Hokies and grabbed the victory. With no time to relax, Tech hosted No. 18 William & Mary the following Saturday and despite a season-high and team-high tying six goals from junior captain Allie Emala, the Hokies fell again at home.

In it's final of three-straight home games, Tech was able to turn things around and end the three-game slide with a huge, 22-8 victory at Thompson Field over Davidson. The team posted its highest points total of the season (36) against the Wildcats and its 22 goals was the most goal scored by the team all year.

Tech hit the road again, making another trip across the state to take on Old Dominion. It was the late heroics of sophomore scoring machine, Jessica Nonn, that gave the Hokies the 13-12 edge in the closing seconds of the game, making it two wins in a row for Tech.

The Hokies continued road play as they opened the month of April traveling to No. 3 North Carolina.

The skilled Tar Heel team displayed why it is one of the nation's best programs, topping Tech 19-3 at Fetzer Field, and ending the Hokies' first win streak of the season.

Returning home for its final games at Thompson Field in 2010, Tech hosted No. 5 Virginia and American. The Hokies split the week of play, first falling to the Cavaliers despite rallying for the most goals they have ever posted on their rival, and topped the Eagles, 17-12, as sophomore Morgan Widlake tallied season highs of eight points and six goals in the victory.

The Hokies picked up their final regular season win at Longwood, 15-14, before falling to the eventual national champion and then-No. 3 Maryland Terrapins in College Park. The Terrapins also served as the host for the 2010 ACC Tournament, where Tech drew No. 4 Virginia for the second-straight year, and fell to the Cavaliers, 18-6.

Sophomore Jessica Nonn made a name for herself in her second season, as she finished the year as the

team's leading scorer with 36 goals, and put away at least one goal in each of Tech's 17 games, a feat that has not been done at Tech in years. Nonn also led the team with 45 ground balls and 30 caused turnovers, adding her name for a second time to the single-season record books with both of those numbers. This propelled her into the top 10 all-time at Tech with 58 caused turnovers to date.

Emala, a junior captain, remained the dependable player she has been through her first two seasons as she continued to improve her game and lead the Hokies. Emala set a new Tech record for draw controls as she upped her career total to 185 with her teamleading 88 in 2010. Emala also led the team in points (47), assists (15) and shots (78). With her 32 goals, good for second on the squad, Emala landed the eighth-best career goal total in Tech history with 95 so far, and also took over the ninth spot on the career assists list with 33 in her three-year career.

Following the conclusion of the season, the team issued its annual awards at the spring athletic banquet. Junior Liz Carpenter was named the team's MVP, despite missing the final four games of the season due to injury, senior Jacquelyn Duggins received the Coaches' Award and goalkeeper Alex Gale was voted the Rookie of the Year

For the second time in program history, the Virginia Tech lacrosse team was named an Honor Squad by the IWLCA for its overall performance in the classroom through the year. Nonn, along with Emala were also honored in the postseason as both players were selected to the VaSID All-State second team for the first time in either of their careers. Emala was again honored by the conference for her academic performance when she was named to the ACC All-Academic team for the third time in her career. Nonn too was named to the conference's academic squad, this was the first time the midfielder made the list.







# **ACADEMIC SUPPORT**

Whether in the classroom or on the field, expectations placed on Virginia Tech student-athletes remain consistently high year after year. In collaboration with the Tech Athletics Department, Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) works tirelessly to help Hokie student-athletes achieve their full potential. Services available in the Quillen Family Academic Center include tutors, study assistance, computer and technology aid as well as individual skill development programs. In addition, SAASS integrates its services with those of the Virginia Tech community, assisting students in arranging appointments with various University departments, such as their academic

advisors, the Registrar, the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, dean's offices, Career Services, Cook Counseling Center, Cranwell International Center and the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence. The department is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program for student-athletes, offering academic counseling in combination with university academic advising to ensure students receive a complete system of support.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include studentathletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders, founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

# STUDENT LIFE

At Virginia Tech, student-athletes don't just play sports. With help from the Athletics Office of Student Life, Hokie student-athletes work outside the athletic arena to develop into community assets and responsible adults. Inspired by the NCAA/CHAMPS (Changing Athletes' Minds for Personal Success) Life Skills Program, the Athletics Office of Student Life creates programs designed to enhance student-athletes in five areas of commitment: athletic excellence, academic excellence, personal and leadership development, community service and career development. The program has been previously honored for its commitment to serving the good of the student-athletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association as a program of excellence.

Led by the Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee, Hokie student-athletes volunteered countless hours in the local community last year. In addition, over 300 Virginia Tech student-athletes earned a 3.00 grade point average during one or both semesters

#### STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is a committee made up of student-athletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. Two members of each sports team serve on SAAC each academic year.

#### PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Life aims to help studentathletes lead balanced lifestyles, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills.

#### CAREER DEVELOPMENT

The Student Life Office worked with Becca Scott in the Virginia Tech Career Services Center to create programs designed to teach student-athletes why they are much sought after for their transferable skills (resiliency, time management, teamwork, competitiveness and ambition).

#### ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. In 2009-2010, 370 student-athletes were named to this prestigious list.

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Virginia Tech student-athletes are involved more than ever in the local community. Having volunteered many hours in the schools, community groups and hospitals, student-athletes are setting a high precedent for all involved with the program. Under the "Hokies with Heart" umbrella, each sports team has a community partner with which they volunteer their time.

# **PERFORMANCE**

#### **SPORT PSYCHOLOGY**

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

Mike Gentry, assistant AD for athletic performance, said, "I've always felt that (sport psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department, and we wanted to and needed to include sport psychology in that model."

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett said. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologist. On average, Bennett conducts 30 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises.

#### SPORTS NUTRITION

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director. Freel, who is one of 16 full-time college dietitians in the country, also serves on the nutrition and performance committee with Dr. Gary Reportet.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BodPod body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BodPod is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) within five minutes through air displacement.

#### SPORTS MEDICINE

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Training Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes.

Tech is entering its ninth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes.

# **MEDIA INFORMATION**

Virginia Tech women's lacrosse home games are held at the Sandra D. Thompson Field and are free of charge. Media interested in attending these games are encouraged to notify the Virginia Tech Athletics Communications office at least 24 hours in advance.

The Thompson game operations center is located on top of the grandstands. Additional space, including a film area, is also available on top of the grandstand. No media pass is needed to enter the game operations center.

#### **COACH/PLAYER INTERVIEWS**

Please schedule all interviews at least 24 hours in advance. For interviews with head women's lacrosse coach Megan Burker or any of the athletes, please contact Rachel Perreault at the Virginia Tech Athletics Communications Office – (540) 231-2228.

Coach Burker is usually available for interviews during the week, depending on practice and game schedules. Interviews with players will be available according to individual class and practice schedules. At no time will an athlete's telephone

number be released to the media. Members of the media are asked not to contact an athlete at home, on their cell phone or via e-mail.

#### **POST-GAME INTERVIEWS**

Coach Burker and players will be available for interviews after home contests on the field. Please make all requests for interviews to Perreault in the game operations center.

#### **GAME RESULTS**

Box scores will be available immediately following the conclusion of the game and will also be available at hokiesports.com. A short AP-style story will be faxed to all major media outlets in Virginia and also will be made available online.

Team and individual statistics will be updated and available shortly after each game as well.

#### LIVE STATS AND BROADCASTS

Fans and media can keep up with the Hokies via the Internet with live stats. At all home games, and selected away contests, play-by-play, as well as

up-to-date box scores and stats, are available by clicking on the live stats link on Tech's homepages. Once again this year, audio broadcasts can be found on hokietv.com. Veteran play-by-play man Jerry Massey will call most home games, providing fans with another option to keep up with the team.

#### **DIRECTIONS TO BLACKSBURG**

From the north or east, take Interstate 81 south to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From the south, take Interstate 81 north to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the traffic light at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed one-half mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road at the traffic light, just before the football stadium. The Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is on the left, just across the parking lot from Lane Stadium and the Jamerson Athletic Center.
