Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has grown


from a small college of 132 students into Virginia's largest university and its top research institution. During its 130 years of existence, Virginia's premiere land-grant institution has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, our economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has challenged the university to become one of the country's top 30 research institutions by the end of the

Virginia Tech is organized into eight colleges — Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Arts and Sciences, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Human Resources and Education,

Natural Resources, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Plans have been approved to restructure the university, which will result in the creation of a College of Biological, Mathematical, and Physical Sciences next year. Together, the colleges offer about 175 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs to approximately 26,000 undergraduate and graduate students.



# 2003 OUTLOOK Hokies look forward to a winning season in 2003

As the 2003 season approaches, the Hokies hope to combine the experience of the veterans with the youthful energy of their newcomers for a successful campaign. Coach Tami Riley and her staff expect this year's squad to become a competitive force in the BIG EAST Conference, using a fresh outlook to invigorate the program.

"On a broad scale of things, our new style is a more exciting and explosive game," Riley said. "The team that wins will be the team in possession of the ball."

With nearly as many new faces on the team as there are veterans, there are plenty of opportunities for numerous different players to make an impact.

"I enter each season with an open view—everyone starts from scratch," said Riley. "Regardless of your playing time in the past, everyone starts with a clean slate." of time and effort to build this program."

Whether a returning veteran or a first-year player, each member of the Tech squad will have an impact on the team's success. 2003 should prove to be an exciting season as the Hokies strive to find the perfect balance.

#### **DEFENSE**

The balance between youth and experience may be exemplified most on the defense. The Hokies will rely on several freshmen to step up on the defensive end, while utilizing the leadership of a few key returnees, including senior Sarah Duffy and sophomores Melissa Fullenkamp and Lauren Whitty, as well as goalkeeper Jamie McGraw.

Duffy, who has been fighting injuries throughout her career, had a spectacular fall season and will provide the defense with excellent senior leadership. Fullenkamp, who started 15 games in 2002, played solidly for the Hokies in her first season and will bring quality game experience to the young defense. She is also expected to

take the draw again this season for the Hokies. Whitty, who also had a successful freshman campaign, is recovering from a hip injury that slowed her in the fall, but looks to return to full strength to add depth to the defense.

In goal, Tech finds one of its top players. McGraw, a captain for 2003, will provide the experience needed for the Hokies to be successful on defense.

"A talented keeper is crucial to winning games and we believe that Jamie provides that essential piece," said Riley.

A second-team All-BIG EAST selection in 2002, McGraw led the conference in saves and ranked 16th nationally in save percentage. She will use her quickness and athleticism to again prove herself as a defensive threat.

#### **MIDFIELD**

The midfield will be one of the strongest areas for the Hokies this season, as leadership and experience are plentiful. Senior captain Sam Sybert returns for her final year to lead the group in the midfield. She will be joined by junior Lindsey Welch and redshirt sophomore Hilary Fay, as well as a host of newcomers.

Sybert, a two-time All-BIG EAST first team selection and captain in 2002, has been a controlling figure in the midfield since arriving at Tech. An outstanding all-around player, she currently ranks in the school's top ten in several career statistical categories. She is the career leader in blocks/interceptions/caused turnovers, while she ranks second in groundballs, fifth in assists and tenth in goals scored. This season, Sybert will look to continue her dominance on the field, drawing on her aggressiveness, speed, power and versatility to lead the Hokies to success.

While Sybert receives most of the attention in the midfield, Welch returns as another one of the team's leaders. Starting all 16 games last season, the junior has proven to be a potent offensive threat, while also providing defensive assistance.

She ranked third on the team in goals scored last season and second in assists and groundballs. In 2003, she should continue to be a threat in the midfield, relying on her heart and hustle to make great plays.

Fay, who scored eight goals in only six games last season, should add another offensive weapon to the Hokies' arsenal with her hard working mentality.

#### **ATTACK**

The Hokies will not experience a letdown on the attack this year, as last year's leading scorer, Kate Threadgold, returns, along with senior captains Lauren Kenney and Katie Madden. Several fresh faces will also see time on offense to help provide Tech with more scoring opportunities.

Threadgold looks again to be the Hokies' top scoring threat. The junior notched 26 goals last year in her first season at Tech and remains the offensive leader for 2003. The Australian native brings a wealth of international experience to the table, as she competed for the national team that won the silver medal in the 1999 World Cup.

Kenney, who was hampered in the fall by compartment syndrome, is expected to regroup from her injury with a strong spring. She provides another scoring threat on the attack and will look to

#### **SCHEDULE**

This season Tech faces several top teams on its schedule, including the always competitive BIG EAST slate with 2002 national runner-up Georgetown and NCAA participants Syracuse and Notre Dame. The Hokies' non-conference schedule includes road tests against 2002 NCAA participants Duke, Virginia, Ohio State and Maryland, which has won seven of the last eight national titles. Also on the slate are matchups with George Mason, Ohio, Columbia, Richmond, New Hampshire, Northwestern and Davidson. The Hokies should face some strong competition and get some quality wins under their belt in 2003.

Tech will rely on the leadership of junior Jamie McGraw in goal.

## Tami Riley


Tami Riley enters her second year at the helm of the Virginia Tech lacrosse team. She led the Hokies to a 6-10 mark in 2002 and hopes to improve that record this year.

Riley came to Virginia Tech last season after serving four years as assistant coach at James

Madison University. During her career at JMU, the Dukes won two Colonial Athletic Association Championships and appeared in the 2000 NCAA Final Four. In 2001, JMU won their second CAA title under assistant coach Riley and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament.

Prior to her time at JMU, Riley served as an assistant at the University of Virginia for the '96-'97 season. This was Riley's first coaching experience after graduating from the University of Maryland in 1996 with a degree in kinesiology. She helped the Cavaliers into the NCAA Tournament that year — which is an accomplishment that Riley has become very accustomed to. The Terps won three NCAA titles during Riley's career and she co-captained the first team to successfully defend an NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship with titles in 1995 and 1996. Riley was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team in those years. In her final two seasons at Maryland, the Terps were 36-0 overall. At Maryland, Riley was not only a four-year letterwinner in lacrosse for the Terrapins, but also played soccer her first two seasons at the university.

Riley graduated from Severna Park High School in Maryland with her twin sister Tina and an older sister, Bethany. She adores her two nephews Patrick and Zachary, as well as her niece Riley. Her parents live in Northern Kentucky.





## Chris Mastro

Chris Mastro returns to her alma mater this season for her first year as an assistant coach at Virginia Tech. She comes to Tech from Brown University, where she served as an assistant coach from 2001-2002.

Mastro was a letterwinner for the Hokies

from 1996-1999. As a senior, she was a starter on the squad that captured the Atlantic-10 Championship. She also was a recipient of the Coach's Award in her final season. Mastro currently ranks in Tech's top-20 list for goals, assists and points in a career.

## ASSISTANT COACH

Prior to her stint at Brown, she was a substitute teacher at Cave Spring High School in Roanoke, Va. She also served as an assistant tennis coach and the head coach of the boys' and girls' swimming teams. Her tennis team finished as the Roanoke Valley District Champions, while the boys' swim team won the Roanoke Valley District, Northwest Region and AAA State championships.

Mastro graduated from Tech in 1999 with a degree in health and physical education. The Latham, N.Y., native is a graduate of Shaker High School.



## Julie Tice

Julie Tice is entering her second season as an assistant coach at Virginia Tech. Tice came to Tech from Towson University, where she served as an assistant coach for the Tigers in 2001.

Prior to her stint at Towson, Tice spent her undergraduate years at Penn State from 1996-2000. She was a four-year letterwinner for the Nittany Lions and received All-America honors her junior and

senior years. She also led the country in assists in her junior year when the Nittany Lions reached the Final Four and holds the record for assists in the NCAA Tournament. Tice also set the record for career assists at Penn State her senior year with 115.

Tice graduated from Penn State in 2000 with a degree in communications and is currently pursuing a degree in interior design here at Virginia Tech. She is a native of Annapolis, Md., where she attended Severn School.

#### What is a Hokie?

In 1896, when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute, the necessity for writing a new cheer arose. A contest for such a purpose was held by the student body, and senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

# SUPPORT SERVICES

#### STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's athletic program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 71 percent in 2002 as compared to the national average of 58 percent. The 71 percent student-athlete graduation rate marks the fourth time in the last nine years that Tech has reached that level.

SAASS provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition, and eligibility education. Additionally, studentathletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAASS office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced

Technology) Lab and its satellite sites house over 40 computers on the second and third floors of Cassell Coliseum. Laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes to use when travelling to away contests. The athletic department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes'

Together, these spaces provide the studentathlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success.

Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice, or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

SAASS is comprised of coordinator Chris Helms, associate coordinators Lois Berg and Colin Howlett and three assistant coordinators - Katie Ammons, Renia Edwards and Drew Scales. Terrie Repass is the secretary and the "first contact" person for the SAASS. Scales coordinates the academic services for the lacrosse team.



#### **STRENGTH & CONDITIONING**

For the Virginia Tech lacrosse team, the strength and conditioning program, under the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, plays a very important role.

The lacrosse team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletic Department.

Gentry is in his 15th season as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning. As assistant athletics director for athletic performance, his duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at


Chapel Hill in 1981 where he worked as an assistant strength coach. He then went to East Carolina University and was elevated to head strength coach there in 1982. Gentry received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Virginia Tech in 1999.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and

conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports, and Emily Chones, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of five graduate assistants — Erin O'Neil, Lisa Guarneri, Keith Short, Gabe Teeple and Ken Oxendine.

Chones, in her second year at Virginia Tech, came to Blacksburg from the University of New Mexico, where she spent one year as an assistant strength coach. Prior to her time at UNM, she worked three years at the United States Naval Academy and was directly responsible

for six sports and assisted with all other varsity programs.

#### **SPORTS MEDICINE & TRAINING**

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes.

The department, under the leadership of Dr. Gunnar Brolinson, Dr. Delmas Bolin, Dr. Duane Lagan and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes. A staff including general practitioners, orthopedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists, are available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed the 4,300 square foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The new facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes.

The new room, which nearly doubles the size of the former Merryman Center facility, also allows the staff to utilize that room for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally.

In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, will supplement the new training room.

This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities including electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot packs and interferential current. It also has an office for the staff, dozens of training tables, whirlpools, rehabilitation equipment and two cold

A vital part of student-athlete services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall,

while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other.

The center also has a fully-operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians. Staff psychologists, located in the Cook Counseling Center, are also available to all studentathletes for personal and performance issues.

Ron Esteban oversees the athletic training needs of the women's lacrosse team. Working directly with the lacrosse team this year is Megan Rittler, now in her second year at Tech.
