



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HAHN HURST BASKETBALL PRACTICE CENTER

Virginia Tech is able to claim perhaps the finest practice facility in major college basketball. The Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center affords the Hokies every imaginable convenience needed to build an elite college basketball program.

Since moving into the center in August 2009, this \$21 million facility has given the Hokies the WOW! Factor so needed to compete at the highest level. The 49,000 foot building, which ties together modern, state-of-the-art amenities with the architectural integrity of the beautiful Virginia Tech campus, is a shining beacon to the commitment the university has made to basketball.

From the moment you walk through the front doors, you are engulfed with the magnitude of this beautiful facility. The two-story front lobby is a testament to the history and future promise of the Virginia Tech basketball program. From the large graphics to the various memorabilia, this area is awash with images of the greatest players in Hokie history.

The main feature of the building is the two-

court, 16,609-square-foot practice gym. Spacious and convenient, the gym is equipped with a softwall that can be lowered to divide the courts to allow both the men's and the women's team to practice at the same time. The courts are exact replicas of the main court in Cassell Coliseum, allowing the team to practice on the same surface on which they will play.

The office suites on the second floor features five large offices for the assistants, a conference room and a huge office for the head coach. A view of the practice courts is available from the head coach's office, the large reception area and the connecting balcony.

Behind a secured entrance, the facility offers every imaginable feature needed to build a program. The spacious weight room has the full range of free weights, machines, treadmills, ellipticals and other equipment – all with a panoramic view of the practice courts.

Adjacent to the weight room is the modern, fully-equipped training room. This area features two examination rooms, a taping area and hot


and cold immersion tubs. A state-of-the-art Alter G rehab machine also inhabits this area. The sports medicine staff can handle all aspects of treatment and rehabilitation of injuries from this room.

Across the hall is the equipment room, completely stocked with the finest gear offered by Nike. This area also opens out into the parking lot, where the team begins its travel just steps from the locker room.

Speaking of the locker room, the Hokies boast the finest around. The fully-appointed lounge area is outfitted with a sound system, 62" flat screen television, refrigerator and computer workstations. The complex also features a classroom with video and dry-erase boards, perfect for various forms of instructions and team meetings. The locker room itself is spacious, with video screens and large individual lockers with extra storage space.

Immediately behind the practice gym is a large patio area. This area is used for social events and tailgating functions.







CASSELL COLISEUM BOASTS ELECTRIC ATMOSPHERE!

Now beginning its second half century of providing exciting basketball memories to the Hokie Nation, one thing has remained a constant over the years: The Cassell is one tough place for an opposing team to visit.

During its first 50 seasons, Cassell Coliseum has witnessed a total of 659 Hokie men's basketball games and Tech has won 509 of those game, good for a .772 winning percentage.

In recent seasons, the arena has seen a rebirth of sorts in the terms of fan excitement. Since joining the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004, one of the toughest tickets in all of college basketball has been a conference game in the Cassell. A passionate fan base, competition at the highest level and one of the best arenas in the land have made Cassell Coliseum the place to be on game nights.




COMPETING IN AMERICA'S TOP CONFERENCE:

Return of Injured Players and Arrival of Talented Freshmen Usher in a New Era for Tech Hoops

Given that the Virginia Tech basketball program lost the third-leading scorer in school history, the fourth-leading rebounder and fifth-leading shot blocker in school history, and a role player who contributions were incalculable, it would be easy to forget all about the Hokies this upcoming season.

But that would not be advisable.

Sure, Tech lost Malcolm Delaney (2,255 points), Jeff Allen (1,702 points, 1,111 rebounds and 150 blocks) and Terrell Bell (577 points and 518 rebounds) and their combined 324 starts. But the 2011-12 Hokies feature two returning starters from last year. They also return three players who missed last season with injuries, including an All-ACC player from two years ago in Dorenzo Hudson and an experienced role player in JT Thompson.

So combine that with five freshmen from maybe Seth Greenberg's best recruiting class – one ranked in the top 15 by ESPN.com – and you can see why Greenberg quietly likes his team and likes the Hokies' chances of returning to postseason play for the sixth straight year.

"It's very rare to have three players [Hudson, Thompson and Cadarian Raines] that you expect to contribute [last season] sitting out due to injury," Greenberg said. "Two of them have a wealth of experience and understand what it takes to be successful at the highest level. So, despite having lost two of the most efficient, effective and statistically elite players in the history of the program, I'm extremely optimistic and excited about the upcoming season."

Tech's chances for a return to postseason play hinge primarily on the continued development of guard Erick Green and the return to form of both Hudson, who missed most of last season with a foot injury, and Thompson, who tore his ACL in an offseason pick-up game last summer. Both Hudson and Thompson received medical hardship waivers.


Hudson, a senior, played in nine games last year before deciding to shut it down, and he averaged 10.4 points per game in that span. He averaged 15.2 points and 3.5 rebounds per game and earned third-team All-ACC honors as a junior, so the injury robbed Tech of a potent offensive weapon last season.

However, Hudson's injury allowed Green to blossom. The junior from Winchester, Va., started 26 games and averaged 11.6 points and nearly three assists per game, even playing next to a scoring machine like Delaney.

"Erick is one of the elite guards in the ACC," Greenberg said. "He's got a new set of obstacles in that he's going to draw the other team's best defender. There's going to be an added pressure on him, but he's worked extremely hard on his body and his game. I think he's going to be a much-improved 3-point shooter. I think he's embraced the leadership role. We expect him to be a player who can lead us."

Replacing Bell may be Greenberg's most difficult task because of Bell's versatility. He defended multiple positions and knew his role on offense.

But small forward might be the deepest and most talented position on this squad. Sophomore Jarell Eddie and talented freshman Dorian Finney-Smith figure to be the front-runners for the starting nod. Eddie played in 27 games a year ago and showed his talent with a dazzling display at Wake Forest in which he scored 17 points and made all six of his shots from the floor.

Finney-Smith ranked as one of the best players in the nation last season after leading I.C. Norcom High in Portsmouth, Va., to its second straight state championship. He averaged 18 points, 10.7 rebounds and 3.8 blocks per game en route to being named the state's player of the year. His 6-foot-8 frame and his versatility allows him to play any number of positions.

"I think Bell is a hard player to replace, not only defensively, but also in his willingness to embrace a role," Greenberg said. "His role will be taken up by Dorian, Jarell and maybe Robert Brown.

"Dorian has a lot of his [Bell's] traits. He's a guy in terms of those attributes – not just the position, but the attributes – who will fill some of that void."

The rest of the backcourt includes sophomore Tyrone Garland and freshmen Marquis Rankin and Robert Brown. Garland struggled with the transition to college basketball last season, but the staff expects improvement. Rankin, a point guard from Charlotte, and Brown, a guard/forward from Clermont, Fla., played together at Hargrave last season along with power forward C.J. Barksdale. Rankin excels in an up-tempo environment, while Brown can really shoot it.

"Ty Garland is a guy who cut his teeth a little last year," Greenberg said. "He's explosive off the dribble, and I think the dribble-drive stuff we're going to be doing is going to help him. I want to see him guard harder.

"Marquis has tremendous leadership skills. He can really guard the ball, and he's not afraid to guard the ball. He pushes it at a high speed. He's a better shooter than people realize. He looks to make plays for others.

"Robert is a big-time scorer. He's got to continue to get stronger with the ball, but he's got the potential to be an accomplished offensive player."

Tech's frontcourt isn't quite as settled as the backcourt, though center/power forward Victor Davila returns. Davila, a senior who has started 77 games in his first three years, averaged 7.4 points and 5.1 rebounds per game last season.

Also, two players who missed last season with injuries return. Thompson averaged 7.3 points and 4.6 rebounds per game in a reserve role his junior season. He gives Tech energy and toughness, and he'll need to help replace some of Allen's substantial production.

Cadarian Raines played in four games last season, but missed the rest of the season with a foot injury and received a medical hardship waiver. At 6-9, 240 pounds, Raines is the biggest Hokie, but after two surgeries on his foot, one wonders about his impact.


Barksdale and Joey van Zegeren round out the post players. Both possess size and a ton of potential, with Barksdale probably closer to helping right away. Either or both need to emerge to give the Hokies some depth.

"We'd like to have a little more depth at the 4," Greenberg said. "But you've got JT, who has competed at a high level, and C.J. has the bulk. He just has to learn how to play basketball at this level. Having said that, he's a productive player.

"We need Victor to have a big season. I think that's really important. He can't tease us. He's teased us in the past. He's done some special things. Late in the Duke game [a 64-60 Tech win], the guy was phenomenal. That's what we're going to expect of him all the time. That's what he's capable of doing."

Actually, all of Tech's roster needs to contribute to replace the production of Delaney, Allen and Bell. After all, those three combined for 4,534 points, 1,993 rebounds, 896 assists and 484 steals – and 87 wins.

But the Hokies have the talent and a confidence about them. Those who forget this group in 2011-12 do so at their own peril.

MEET THE COACHES



SETH GREENBERG virginia tech basketball

Head Coach

In his eight seasons as head coach of the Hokies and throughout his coaching career, Seth Greenberg has proven to be a winner both on and off the court. His passion for the game and his player's success in life has helped put the Virginia Tech program among the nation's elite.

Only through hard-work and dedication will success come. Greenberg has set the Hokies on a course of winning and competing at the highest level. Since joining the Hokies, Greenberg has established himself as not only a builder of programs, but as a coach who has an eye on the ultimate goal.

Greenberg has a career record of 367-276 in 21 seasons as a collegiate head coach and a 154-106 record in his eight seasons at Virginia Tech. Since coming to Blacksburg, 1 ranked teams, including, most recently, a 64-60 vicory over top-ranked Duke on Feb. week before, the Hokies spent time atop the ACC standings for the first time ever. During the 2008-09 season, the win at No. 1 Wake Forest and an 80-77 win at No. 12 Clemson were added to the list. This past season, home wins over a pair of No. 23 teams, Miami and Wake Forest, continued the run of top 25 victories.

With Greenberg's win at Campbell on Nov. 23, 2009, he passed Chuck Noe into second place on the all-time wins list at Virginia Tech. Only Charlie Moir, with 213 victories, has more wins at Tech than Greenberg.

In his time at Virginia Tech, Greenberg is 3-3 against top-ranked teams, with all three losses coming on final possessions. Tech has made five consecutive post-season appearances and six in Greenberg's eight years in Blacksburg.

The Hokies moved into the new \$21 million Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center in August 2009. This building gives Virginia Tech basketball the "WOW Factor!" that it needs to compete among the elite in college basketball and is the culmination of a vision that Greenberg has for the university and its basketball program.

In the past few years, Greenberg has received two awards that not only speak to his success on the court, but his works off the court as well. In September 2009, Greenberg was presented with the inaugural Al LoBalbo Award by his alma mater, Fairleigh Dickinson University. In April 2010, Greenberg was inducted into The National Jewish Sports Hall of Fame and Museum.

In the 2006-07 season, the Hokies defeated four nationally ranked teams and had a 3-0 record against teams ranked in the top-five.

On March 11, 2008, Greenberg added another honor, as he was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's 2008 Coach of the Year. This marked the second time in four years that Greenberg earned the honor.

On April 3, 2003, the Hokies introduced Greenberg as their 27th head coach. A proven program builder, an admired and innovative tactician and an experienced recruiter, Greenberg took over the reigns of a Tech program that has made tremendous strides in his first six seasons in Blacksburg.

Greenberg earned his first major honor at Virginia Tech in 2005, being named the ACC Coach of the Year by



the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association. He was the fourth Hokie honored by the group for the team's play during the Hokies' inaugural ACC season. The *Richmond Times-Dispatch* named Greenberg the Coach of the Year in the commonwealth of Virginia.

The aggressive, up-tempo style that Greenberg installed in his first season with the Hokies has paid dividends and has brought a renewed sense of excitement to Cassell Coliseum, as well as to the "Hokie Nation."

Perhaps the biggest influences seen in the program have been the work ethic and attention to detail that Greenberg and his staff have instilled. When speaking of hard work, the principle begins at the top, with Greenberg himself. Long hours of watching film, instructing players and developing the program, along with tirelessly working to promote the program and university while being involved in the community, have made Greenberg a popular face on the Blacksburg campus and in the "Hokie Nation."

Greenberg came to Virginia Tech from the University of South Florida, where he served as head coach for seven seasons. At USF, Greenberg had a record of 108-100. Prior to USF, Greenberg was the head coach at Long Beach State University, where his overall record was 105-70.

During his time at Long Beach State and USF, Greenberg's teams posted impressive

records against major conference opponents. During his Long Beach State tenure there were wins over four nationally-ranked teams, including a 64-49 victory against then-No. 1 Kansas at Allen Fieldhouse in 1992-93. At South Florida, his teams were 2-0 against Ohio State, had two wins over Texas and won at Pittsburgh during the Panthers' run to the Sweet 16 in the 2001-02 season. The Bulls defeated eventual Final Four team Wisconsin in the 1999-2000 season.

A 1978 graduate of Fairleigh Dickinson, Greenberg was a four-year letter winner under head coach Al LoBalbo. His father, the late Ralph Greenberg, played at Long Island University under coaching legend Clair Bee, one of college basketball's all-time winningest coaches.

Greenberg began his coaching career as an assistant at Columbia in 1978. He moved to Pittsburgh two years later, where he made two trips to the NCAA Tournament in three years with the Panthers. He spent the 1983-84 season at Virginia, helping the Cavs reach the Final Four before moving on to Miami as an assistant under future Virginia Tech head coach Bill Foster. At Miami, he helped revive a program that had been dormant for a number of years.

Greenberg first went to Long Beach State as associate head coach under Joe Harrington. Greenberg replaced him three years later when Harrington accepted the head coaching position at Colorado. In his six seasons at LBSU, Greenberg led the 49ers to two NCAA Tournament appearances and one NIT appearance. He led LBSU to two Big West Conference championships and one Big West regular-season title. While Greenberg was at LBSU, he tutored future NBA players Bryon Russell, Lucious Harris and Juaquin Hawkins.

In the summer of 2004, Greenberg received a lofty honor when he was inducted into the Five Star Basketball Camp's Hall of Fame. The honor, shared by some of the greatest coaches like Rick Pitino and Hubie Brown, was bestowed for the many years that Greenberg has been a part of the nation's top summer basketball camp as an instructor and quest speaker.

Greenberg has always been involved in charitable organizations and causes. In September of 2009, he was the winning head coach in the inaugural "Chairmen of the Boards" 3-on-3 charity basketball tournament to benefit Tuesday's Children in New York City. This group is the premier non-profit organization serving the needs of the 9/11 community, providing a widerange of programming from mentoring, to advocacy for children, to next-step life skills and leadership training for 9/11 families and rescue and recovery workers.

When confronted by the destruction of



JAMES JOHNSON

Associate Head Coach



James Johnson begins his first season as associate head coach and his fifth season on the men's basketball staff for the Hokies. Johnson was promoted to associate head coach in April 2011.

A top-notch recruiter, Johnson has used his enthusiasm and knowledge of the game to help lead the Hokies to new heights. In his first four seasons with the Hokies, Johnson established himself as a key assistant coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. His knowledge of fertile recruiting areas has paid dividends for the Hokies.

Johnson joined the Hokies following two seasons as an assistant at George Mason. While at Mason, he focused on organizing the team's defensive efforts in practice and games. The Patriots were a combined 45-23 in his two seasons and advanced to the 2006 NCAA Final Four.

"I elevated James Johnson to associate head coach because of work ethic and commitment to Virginia Tech basketball," head coach Seth Greenberg said. "There is not an aspect of the program that I have not asked him to assist me with and he has done an excellent job in every area. He is an outstanding recruiter, a terrific teacher and a great mentor to the young people in our program. He gets it. He understands the role of an assistant coach, and he is as good an assistant coach as I have ever had."

Before joining the Patriots, Johnson spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Penn State. He was the recruitment coordinator for the Nittany Lions, responsible for bringing Geary Claxton to the team. Claxton was named to the Big Ten Conference All-Freshman Team. Johnson also was responsible for the breakdown of tape in scouting opponents for game preparation.

Prior to Penn State, Johnson had a oneyear stint as an assistant at the College of Charleston. During his season at Charleston, the Cougars had a 25-8 overall record and claimed the Southern Conference regular season title. The 2002-03 team also won the Great Alaska Shootout and advanced to the second round of the 2003 post-season NIT. Prior to College of Charleston, Johnson spent two years as an assistant at Elon.

Johnson, a native of Powhatan, Va., was a four-year player and three-year starter at Ferrum College. A three-time Defensive Player of the Year, he helped guide his team to two conference championships and a berth in the NCAA Division III Tournament. He was also voted his team's Most Valuable Player in 1993. In 2001, Johnson was selected as one of the Top 10 players in Ferrum basketball history. In September of 2009, Johnson was elected into the Ferrum College Athletic Hall of Fame.

After graduating from Ferrum College with a bachelor of science in psychology in 1993, he immediately stepped into the

Hokies Make Fifth Straight Postseason Appearance

The Virginia Tech Hokies entered the 2010-11 season as a team with great promise. As the season closed, the team instead was able to look back and sense many great accomplishments, but also ponder what could have been.

Tech battled through an inordinate rash of injuries to post a 22-12 record and reached the post-season for the fifth consecutive season. The team's three seniors that finished the season all had marquee performances in key situations and a couple of younger players stepped up and contributed when injuries decimated the line-up.

The Hokies opened the season, ranked No. 21 nationally, with a home victory over Campbell, in which Malcolm Delaney scored 20 points and Jeff Allen registered a double-double with 11 points and 14 rebounds. Tech then hit the road to Manhattan, Kans. to play third-ranked Kansas State in a nationally televised game. Tech, now up to No. 22, fell to K-State, 73-51, but Delaney scored 22 points in the loss.

After a 92-70 victory at UNC Greensboro, the Hokies flew across the country to compete in the 76 Classic in Anaheim, Calif. Tech opened with wins over Cal State Northridge and a previously unbeaten Oklahoma State team, before falling to UNLV, 71-59, in the finals. Delaney was named to the all-tournament team, scoring 63 points in the three games, including 30 points against UNLV, when he was seven-of-nine from three-point range.

There was no rest for the weary, as three nights after returning from Anaheim; the Hokies took on No. 22 Purdue in Cassell Coliseum. The game was close throughout, and Tech held the Boilermakers to just 36.2 percent from the floor, but Tech fell to Purdue, 58-55. Then, later that week, Tech opened the ACC schedule with a 57-54 loss to Virginia in Cassell.


The UVa game would prove to be a delineation game for the Hokies. Having already lost senior forward JT Thompson before the season began to a knee injury, his cousin, senior guard Dorenzo Hudson, would essentially be lost for the remainder of the season with a foot injury. Adding to the medical list, sophomore forward Cadarian Raines would also see his season cut short by a foot injury.

Tech's next three games would come against big name opponents, and the Hokies rose to the occasion. Tech opened the run with a 79-69 home win over Penn State, following that with a 31-point victory over Mississippi State in the Bahamas and a 76-68 overtime win over St. Bonaventure in Rochester, N.Y. Tech would also win its two home games over USC Upstate and Mt. St. Mary's.

As January rolled in, it was time for the meat of the ACC schedule, and Tech opened with a 71-59 home win over Florida State. Allen was the big story here, as he recorded another double-double with 24 points and 11 rebounds. Tech followed that with a heart-breaking 64-61 loss at North Carolina, where, behind Delaney's 28 points, the Hokies led most of the game, before running out of healthy bodies late in the contest.

Tech would bounce back with a pair of ACC wins over Wake Forest and at Maryland, along with a home win against Longwood. When Tech returned to ACC action, the Hokies fell at Georgia Tech.

Tech would then win four of its next five ACC games, including home wins over Miami, a pay-back win over the Yellow Jackets and a season sweep over the Terps. Tech's next two games were a loss at



Virginia and a win at Wake Forest, leading in to., perhaps, the biggest home game for any Virginia Tech team.

On Saturday, Feb. 26, the ESPN cameras pulled into Blacksburg for not just the Hokies' game with top-ranked Duke, but also College GameDay. The atmosphere in Cassell and around campus was, to say the least, electric. From early in the morning until midnight, Tech, its fans and the university gave the daylong national audience its money's worth.

When the game finally tipped-off after 9 p.m., the Hokies were ready for the challenge. From the opening tip to the final horn, Tech controlled the game and never let the Blue Devils go on a run. In the end, a clutch three-pointer from Delaney and some terrific defensive stands from senior Terrell Bell led Tech to a 64-60 victory. The ensuing madness was a testament to what makes Cassell Coliseum and the Hokie Nation special. Celebrations, yes, but respect for the opponent, facility and television were also at the forefront.

Tech concluded the regular season with losses at home to Boston College

and at Clemson. The Hokies entered the ACC Tournament as the fifth seed. The Hokies opened the ACC Tournament with a convincing 59-43 win over Georgia Tech. Virginia Tech held the Jackets to just 32.1 percent from the field and Delaney, Allen and Erick Green all scored in double figures to clinch the win.

In the quarterfinals of the event, Tech and Florida State played one of the most memorable games in ACC Tournament history. Green buried a jumper with 4.7 seconds remaining to give Tech a 52-51 lead. The Seminoles quickly advanced the ball upcourt and Derwin Kitchen hit a shot from the corner, which apparently gave FSU the win. The Florida State team erupted, but the game officials went to the replay and determined the shot came after the horn, and Tech had the win and advanced to the semifinals of the tournament.

Tech, playing its third game in as many days, and faced with a rematch with now No. 5 Duke, fell in the semifinals, 77-63. Delaney scored 19 points; Green added 17 points and Victor Davila scored 11 points, despite

battling a shoulder injury that would limit his playing time in the post-season.

For the fourth consecutive season, Tech advanced to the NIT and once again claimed a top-seed in the event. The Hokies opened play in Cassell Coliseum with a 79-54 win over Bethune-Cookman. Allen led five Hokies in double-figures with 19 points. In the second round, the season's injuries finally took a toll on the Hokies, as Tech lost to eventual NIT champion Wichita State, 79-76, in Cassell. Delaney concluded his stellar Virginia Tech career with a 30-point performance.

In the end, Tech had a season most teams would be envious of. Twenty-two victories in such a tough schedule, lots of exciting trips, national television exposure and a continuance of post-season play. Individually, Delaney finished second on the Tech career assist list and third in career scoring and Allen finished fourth in career rebounding and steals, fifth career blocked shots and 11th in career scoring. Green and Davila proved that they were capable of big-time efforts in significant games. In all, Tech has continued to build a prime-time program.



Malcolm Delaney scored 20 points and Jeff Allen recorded a double-double as the No. 21-ranked Virginia Tech Hokies got the season started on a good note with a 70-60 non-conference victory over Campbell University at Cassell Coliseum.

Delaney, the ACC's leading scorer a year ago at better than 20 points per game, hit just 3-of-9 from the floor, including 3-of-8 from beyond the 3-point arc against Campbell's zone defense. But he made all 11 of his free-throw attempts.

Terrell Bell scored a career-high 17 points, while Allen recorded his 28th career double-double with 11 points and 14 rebounds.

The Hokies led by just two points, 24-22, after Campbell's Lorne Merthie drained a 3-pointer with 5:17 left in the first half. But Delaney hit two free throws to start a 17-4 run to close the half and that allowed the Hokies to open a 41-26 bulge at the break.

Campbell cut that lead to seven, 52-45, on a basket by Eric Griffin with 11:18 remaining. But the Hokies were too much down the stretch. They scored the next 11 points – five by Delaney – to take a 16-point lead and never looked back.

Tech shot 42.3 percent from the floor but won primarily because of its dominance on the boards. Paced by Allen, the Hokies out-rebounded Campbell 41-24.

VIRGINIA TECH 92, UNC GREENSBORO 70

Virginia Tech used solid defense and a balanced scoring attack to defeat UNC Greensboro, 92-70 in non-conference men's basketball action at the Greensboro Coliseum.

The Hokie defense forced UNCG into 29 turnovers, 20 of which went toward Tech steals. Seven different Hokies recorded steals on the day, including a career-high five steals by guard Erick Green. The 20 steals for the Hokies were one shy of the school record of 21 steals.

The host Spartans led by as many as seven points early in the contest, but Tech went on a 21-14 run in the final eight minutes of the first half to take a 43-32 lead into intermission. UNCG was able to keep the Tech lead relatively within reason until the Hokies opened the lead up to as many as 26 points before clearing the bench in the final minutes.

Malcolm Delaney led all scorers with a season-high 23 points, pacing four Hokies in double figures. Jeff Allen, Dorenzo Hudson and Green all recorded season highs, as well, with 17, 17 and 10 points, respectively. Kyle Randall led the three Spartans in double figures with 15 points.

Purdue to just 36.2 percent shooting from the floor, but it wasn't enough to overcome JaJuan Johnson and the Boilermakers, as Tech fell to Purdue 58-55 in overtime in an ACC-Big Ten Challenge game at Cassell Coliseum.

In overtime, Tech led by a point, 55-54, after a Dorenzo Hudson free throw with 1:45 left. But Johnson hit a jumper with 1:27 left that gave the Boilermakers at 56-55 lead.

On the ensuing possession, the Hokies' Jeff Allen turned the ball over, as Purdue's Terone Johnson stole Allen's pass to Dorenzo Hudson, JaJuan Johnson then missed a 3-pointer with 26 seconds left as the shot clock ran down, but the Hokies couldn't corral the rebound and the ball went out of bounds off a Tech player, giving Purdue the ball. Tech then fouled E'Twaun Moore, who sank 1-of-2 from the line with 23.8 seconds left to give Purdue a 57-55 lead.

Tech called a timeout with 16 seconds remaining to set up a play. But Malcolm Delaney stumbled and lost the ball while trying to drive toward the basket with three seconds left to play. A group of players got hands on the ball and the officials called a jump ball. Purdue retained possession, and Tech again fouled Moore, who hit 1-of-2 with 2.6 seconds left to give the Boilermakers a 58-55 lead. Moore missed the second, but Purdue's Lewis Jackson got the rebound and ran out the clock.

Tech appeared to be in good shape in regulation, leading 51-49 after a Terrell Bell free throw with 21.9 seconds remaining, but after a timeout, Purdue went inside to Johnson, who hit a jump hook with 8.8 seconds left to tie the game at 51.

The Hokies pushed the ball up the court and tried to get a good look. But Johnson stepped out on Delaney, forcing Tech's guard to shoot a tough shot along the baseline that bounced off the rim as the horn sounded, sending the game into overtime.

Allen paced Tech with the 14 points and had nine rebounds, as the Hokies out-rebounded Purdue 42-34. Victor Davila played his best game of the season, scoring 12 points, grabbing six rebounds and blocking three shots before fouling out with 1:46 remaining in regulation.

Malcolm Delaney scored 26 points, but a slow start to the game hobbled the Hokies and they ended up falling to in-state rival Virginia 57-54 in the ACC opener for both teams at Cassell Coliseum.

The loss marked Tech's third straight and dropped the Hokies to 4-4 overall on the season.

Tech never led in this one, trailing by as many as 16 points in the first half after Virginia shot 55.6 percent from the floor. The Hokies closed the lead to two points twice in the final 2:30 of the game, once when a **Dorenzo Hudson** 3-pointer made it 51-49 with 2:25 remaining and once when **Victor Davila** scored with 19.4 seconds to go to make it 53-51

Virginia called a timeout after Davila's basket to set up an inbounds play, and the Cavaliers got Mike Scott running free down the length of the court. Tech's **Jeff Allen** intentionally fouled Scott with 18 seconds left, and Scott hit both free throws to give Virginia a 55-51 bulge. Virginia got to keep the ball as a result of the intentional foul, and Tech fouled Mustapha Farrakhan, who made two free throws with 16 seconds remaining to increase the Cavalier lead to 57-51.

Delaney drilled a 3-pointer with 11 seconds to go to cut the lead to 57-54. Virginia then proceeded to miss the front end of two one-and-ones – Joe Harris missed the first, but Scott got the rebound and then he missed one – giving the Hokies the ball with a chance to tie. But Joe Harris got a piece of Hudson's 3-point attempt with two seconds left and Jontel Evans got the rebound for the Cavaliers. He ran out the clock to preserve the game.

Delaney, coming off a Purdue game in which he scored nie points and hit just 2-of-18 from the floor, canned 10-of-15 against the Cavaliers, including 4-of-7 from beyond the 3-point arc.

Jeff Allen added 12 points and nine rebounds for the Hokies, who held Virginia to just 21 points and 36.4 percent shooting in the second half. The Cavaliers, behind that big first half, shot 46.9 percent for the game.

Virginia got a huge game from Scott, who scored 21 points and grabbed 13 rebounds. Harris finished with 10 points.

Starting in place of an injured **Dorenzo Hudson, Erick Green** tied his career high with 15 points as the Hokies
snapped a three-game losing streak with a 79-69 nonconference victory over Penn State at Cassell Coliseum.

After a week off, the Hokies looked crisp, particularly on offense, as they shot a season-high 54.5 percent from the floor. Tech also dished out 20 assists, just one short of its season high, and finished with four players in double figures, paced by **Malcolm Delaneys** 18 points.

The Hokies jumped out to an 11-point lead at the break thanks to a Delaney 3-pointer at the buzzer. Penn State went on an 8-0 run to start the second half and cut the lead to 44-41 on two free throws by Talor Battle with 16:15 left in the game.

But Green – who got the start after his collision with Hudson in practice earlier this week resulted in an injured calf for Hudson – hit a 3-pointer 35 seconds later and that started a 10-0 Tech run. Delaney's 3-pointer and a **Tyrone Garland** lay-up with 10:52 left gave the Hokies a 54-41 lead, and Penn State got no closer than nine points the rest of the game.

Green connected on 6-of-11 from the floor, including 2-of-5 from beyond the 3-point arc. He tied his career high for field goals made and set a career high for field-goal attempts. He also dished out two assists and grabbed four rebounds in 27 minutes.

Delaney scored 15 of his 18 points in the first half for Tech. He made 6-of-9 from the floor for the game, including 5-of-7 from beyond the 3-point arc. He also finished with a season-high eight assists.

Jeff Allen and Terrell Bell both recorded double-doubles for the Hokies. Allen had 11 points and 13 rebounds and he also added a career-high six assists. Bell finished with 13 points and 10 rebounds. It marked the 31st double-double of Allen's career and the second of Bell's.

Tech also got 15 points off the bench – something Greenberg had been searching for in previous games. Garland paced Tech's effort off the bench with a career-high nine points, hitting 3-of-4 from the floor and 3-of-4 from the free-throw line.

Virginia Tech jumped out to a 17-point halftime lead and never looked back in defeating Mississippi State, 88-57, in the second game of the Battle at Atlantis in the Imperial Arena at the Atlantis Resort in the Bahamas.

MSU scored the game's first two points for its only lead of the contest. Tech's lead swelled to as many as 33 points in the second half. The Bulldogs cut Tech's lead to 49-34 with 18:35 remaining in the game, but Tech pushed the lead back out to 20 points with 13:55 remaining on a lay-up by Jeff Allen and Tech's lead never again fell below 20 points.

Virginia Tech, now 6-4 on the season, placed five players in double figures in the win. **Malcolm Delaney** led all scorers with 19 points and **Dorenzo Hudson** came off the bench with 17 points. Allen recorded his second straight double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds, while **Erick Green** scored 11 points and **Manny Atkins** came off the bench with a career-high 10 points. Renardo Sidney and Ravern Johnson scored 12 points each for the Bulldogs, now 7-3 on the season.

The Hokies outrebounded the taller Bulldogs, 39-24, including 13 offensive rebounds. Tech forced MSU into 16 turnovers and the Hokies recorded assists on 17 of their 30 made field goals.

The 31-point margin of victory is the largest of the season for Tech and the largest by any Virginia Tech basketball team since a 72-30 win over North Carolina Central last season.

All 11 Hokies that dressed saw action and nine of the 11 players scored in the game.

Delaney took a final shot for the Hokies, but it fell short and the game went into overtime.

In the extra session, the Hokies jumped out to a 68-65 lead one minute into overtime on a three-pointer from the corner by **Manny Atkins**. SBU twice cut the lead to two points, but the Hokies made two stops in the final seconds to claim the 76-68 victory.

Delaney led the Hokies with 19 points, while **Jeff Allen** added 18 points and nine rebounds and **Erick Green** scored 15 points and tied a career-high with five steals. In his three games as a starter this season, Green has 10 assists and no turnovers. Andrew Nicholson led four Bonnies in double figures with 21 points. Delaney moved past former teammate A.D. Vassallo into fifth place in career scoring at Virginia Tech in the victory.

The Hokies played the game with just eight scholarship players, as starting senior guard **Dorenzo Hudson** and reserve sophomore forward **Cadarian Raines** both were announced on Thursday to be out for the rest of the season with foot injuries, joining the sidelined **JT Thompson** (ACL surgery) and **Allan Chaney** (viral inflammation of the heart).

Jeff Allen posted his third double-double in four games with 16 points and 15 rebounds and Malcolm Delaney added 17 points and five assists to lead Virginia Tech to its fourth straight victory, a 64-53 decision over USC Upstate.

The Hokies closed out the first half on a 13-2 run to go into the locker rooms with a 34-29 advantage. Within five minutes of the second, they pushed their lead into double figures when Allen scored on a lay-up with 15:34 left in the contest.

Virginia Tech (8-4) jumped out to a quick 7-0 lead, hitting its first three shots, but the Spartans responded with 10 straight in a three-minute spurt capped by Chandler Hash's first three of the afternoon.

Trailing 12-9, the Tech bench sparked a 5-0 run to give the team a two-point lead as **Manny Atkins** scored on a layup and **Tyrone Garland** knocked down a three with 10:38 left in the first.

The Hokies then went on their game-changing run, which included eight straight points, four off dunks from **Terrell Bell** and Allen, and Green scored the last four capping it off with a steal and dunk.

Green finished with 12 points, his fourth straight game in double figures, and added three assists and three steals. Coincidentally, since Green earned the starting role, the Hokies are 4-0.

Tech scored nine total points in the last five minutes off turnovers and held a 16-0 edge in the first half and a 24-3 advantage in the game. They turned the ball over a season-low nine times.

For Allen, over the last six games, he has three double-doubles and missed in three games by one rebound. He is averaging 13.8 points and 10.8 rebounds over that stretch and has five double-doubles this season. His 15 rebounds in this contest were a season-high and the most since the 14 in the home opener against Campbell.

Five Hokies scored in double figures led by **Erick Green**'s game-high 17 points to help Virginia Tech dismantle visiting Mount St. Mary's, 99-34, to earn their 499th all-time victory in Cassell Coliseum.

The Hokies shot a school-record 69.2 percent from the floor as all 10 players that saw the court for Tech scored. They also registered their second-greatest margin of victory and greatest margin at Cassell, while holding the Mountaineers to just 17 percent shooting, the lowest ever for a Tech opponent.

Helping the Hokies to their fifth straight win was **Jeff Allen**, who notched his sixth double-double of the season, fourth in the last five games, with 14 points and 12 rebounds, while also adding four steals, three assists, and two blocks to his totals.

Other significant Hokie numbers from the day include Green's career-high 17 points, his fifth straight game scoring at least 10, Malcolm Delaney's 12 points, five assists, and two steals, Tyrone Garland's season-high 16 points, Manny Atkins' career-high 12 points and five steals, and Terrell Bell's career-high five blocks.

Recapping the five runs by Tech – Delaney scored five of the team's seven points in run number one; Garland capped the second with a pair of lay-ups; the third run was started and ended with a pair of made free throws by Allen; and Green scored five in run four and six in the final one to give the team a 50-11 lead.

Tech missed just nine of its 28 shots, for a 67.9 percent shooting in the first opposed to the Mountaineers' 4-for-24 (16.7 percent) shooting. The Hokies also forced 13 turnovers resulting in 22 points and 11 on fast breaks.

Every available Hokie saw action including **Andrew Griffin**, who entered with 8:27 left in the contest, the first minutes of his career, and scored a basket, blocked a shot, and grabbed a rebound.

VIRGINIA TECH 71, FLORIDA STATE 59

Jeff Allen scored 18 of his season-high 24 points in the second half to lift Virginia Tech past Florida State 71-59 in an ACC game played at Cassell Coliseum.

With the victory, the Hokies extended their winning streak to six straight games. They moved to 10-4 overall, 1-1 in the ACC. They also snapped a three-game losing streak to the Seminoles.

The Hokies broke open a close contest in the first half with a 12-0 run to end the half and took a 29-19 lead at halftime. They never trailed again. Florida State went scoreless in the final 6:43, turning the ball over six times and missing six shots on its final 11 possessions of the half.

In the second half, the Seminoles cut Virginia Tech's lead to 46-42 with 7:32 remaining on a 3-pointer by Luke Loucks, but the Hokies scored the next eight points. The Seminoles got no closer than eight points the rest of the game.

Tech, which is now down to eight scholarship players because of injuries, played exclusively a 2-3 zone against the bigger, more athletic Seminoles and held Florida State to just 35.5 percent shooting from the floor (22 of 62). The Hokies also forced 19 FSU turnovers.

Head Coach Seth Greenberg, who usually has his team play man-to-man defense, said it marked the first time as a coach that he had played 40 minutes of zone.

Allen, who also had 11 rebounds for his seventh double-double of the season, connected on 7-of-12 from the floor and 10-of-12 from the free-throw line. The scoring outburst marked his best game since a 25-point performance in the Hokies' double-overtime loss to Maryland last February.

Tech also made the most of its free-throw opportunities. The Hokies, who were shooting 67.8 percent from the free-throw line coming into the game, made 34 of 37. Malcolm Delaney and Erick Green combined to make all 15 of their attempts.

The Hokies got 13 points from Delaney and 12 from Green, while Chris Singleton paced Florida State with 22 points.

Virginia Tech's **Malcolm Delaney** made nearly every 3-pointer he took against the North Carolina Tar Heels, but his attempt in the waning moments was just off the mark, and the Tar Heels rallied past the Hokies, 64-61, in an ACC game at the Dean E. Smith Center.

The loss snapped Tech's six-game winning streak and moved the Hokies to 10-5 overall on the season, 1-2 in the ACC. North Carolina is now 12-4, 2-0.

The Hokies trailed 62-58 after UNC's Tyler Zeller connected with 1:01 remaining, but Delaney buried a 3 with 47 seconds left to cut the lead to one, 62-61. Zeller then missed a shot inside for the Tar Heels, giving the Hokies a final chance.

Without any timeouts, Delaney took a 3-pointer with seven seconds left that looked good once it left his hand. But the shot bounced off the rim and the Tar Heels rebounded. Tech then fouled Kendall Marshall with 2.8 seconds to go, and Marshall made both free throws to extend the lead to 64-61. Tech's **Erick Green** tried to throw a halfcourt pass after Marshall's second free throw, but Dexter Strickland stole it to end the game.

Delaney paced the Hokies with 28 points, hitting 8-of-18 from the floor, including 7-of-12 from beyond the 3-point arc. He also finished with five assists and four steals.

Tech controlled much of the game, jumping out to a 12-2 lead and expanding that lead to as many as 16 points in the first half. The Hokies led by 10 with 17:12 remaining in the game, but with players like Green, Jeff Allen and Manny Atkins suffering from cramps and missing portions of the second half – and the Hokies already down to eight scholarship players – the Tar Heels went on a 14-3 run to claim a 43-42 lead on John Henson's basket with 9:36 remaining.

Henson scored 12 of his 17 points to pace the Tar Heels in the second half, who shot 41.3 percent for the game and out-rebounded Tech 46-33. The Hokies shot 39.6 percent from the floor, but made 11 3-pointers – a season high.

Green was the only other player in double figures for the Hokies, finishing with 10. Zeller added 16 and nine rebounds for the Tar Heels, while Harrison Barnes ended up with 12

The Virginia Tech Hokies used two big first-half runs and shot a season-high 58.6 percent from the floor to roll past Wake Forest 94-65 in an ACC game played Saturday night at Cassell Coliseum, handing the Demon Deacons their worst loss of the season.

The win marked the seventh in the past eight games for the Hokies, who moved to 11-5 overall on the season, 2-2 in the ACC. Wake Forest, which lost to Tech for the fourth straight time, fell to 7-11, 0-3. The Demon Deacons have lost seven of their past eight.

Wake Forest led 9-6 in the early going, but the Hokies used a 14-2 run – with six players scoring baskets – to take a lead they never would relinquish. **Jarell Eddie**'s 3-pointer with 10:04 remaining in the first half ended the run and gave Tech a 20-11 lead.

Tech made seven 3-pointers in the first half and shot 53.1 percent from the floor. For the game, the Hokies hit eight 3-pointers.

Six players scored in double figures for the Hokies, but the story was the production they got from their bench, which chipped in 39 points. Atkins led Tech with a careerhigh 16 points, while Eddie scored a career-high 12 points. Victor Davila scored 14 points, while Terrell Bell finished with 12. Jeff Allen and Erick Green each scored 10.

Malcolm Delaney, who came into the game averaging 19.3 points per game, scored just nine, but dished out nine assists – one short of his career high.

Virginia Tech used balanced scoring, led by a career night from **Erick Green**, to defeat Maryland, 74-57, at Comcast Center on Thursday night. With the win, the Hokies improve to 12-5 overall and 3-2 in ACC action. Maryland falls to 11-7 overall and 1-3 in league play.

The Hokies jumped out to a 12-0 lead less than four minutes into the contest and never trailed in the game. Tech took a 40-29 lead into the intermission and built the lead to as many as 17 points before Maryland cut the score to 61-53 with 7:15 remaining. The Hokies then held the Terps to just four points in the remainder of the game to claim the 17-point victory.

Green led all scorers with a career-high 24 points, 14 coming in the first half. He also registered four steals in the win and made 12 of his 16 shots on the evening. **Malcolm Delaney** added 19 points and seven assists and **Victor Davila** chipped in 13 points on six-of-eight from the floor. **Jeff Allen** grabbed 10 rebounds for the Hokies, who outrebounded the taller Terps, 37-30.

Tech shot 53.6 percent from the field for the game, including 56.0 percent in the second half. The Hokies assisted on 14 of their 30 made shots and forced Maryland into 16 turnovers. Tech scored 42 of its 74 points in the paint.

Though the Hokies held Maryland's Jordan Williams to just one basket in the first half, the sophomore forward finished the night with 11 points and 11 rebounds, earning his 12th consecutive double-double which ties Len Elmore's school record set back in 1974.

The 17-point loss was the largest for the Terps in the history of Comcast Center.

Malcolm Delaney scored 23 points to lift the Virginia Tech Hokies past Longwood 70-52 in a non-conference game at Cassell Coliseum on Saturday night.

The win marked the Hokies' ninth in their past 10 games and moved them to 13-5 overall on the season. Longwood fell to 7-15.

The Hokies trailed for most of the first 10 minutes, but they closed the first half with a 19-4 run, erasing a five-point deficit to take a 29-19 lead at halftime. The Lancers missed 10 of their final 11 attempts from the floor in the first half.

Longwood got as close as five in the second half, 38-33, on a basket by Aaron Mitchell with 12:37 remaining. But the Hokies outscored the Lancers 29-9 over the next eight minutes to take control, with Delaney scoring 10 in that stretch

The game marked the second in a 48-hour span for Virginia Tech, which won at Maryland on Thursday. The Hokies returned home to face the Lancers and came out sluggish.

Delaney led Virginia Tech, connecting on just 6-of-14 from the floor, but hitting 10-of-12 from the free-throw line. He needs just 42 points to eclipse the 2,000-point mark for his career.

Erick Green added 14 points and five assists for Virginia Tech, who shot 44.6 percent from the floor (25-of-56). **Jeff Allen** scored just six points, but grabbed 10 rebounds, as the Hokies out-rebounded Longwood, 36-29.

Mitchell and Antwan Carter paced Longwood with 14 points each. The Lancers shot just 37 percent from the floor (17-of-46).

A Delaney free throw pushed the Hokies' lead to 71-68 with 16 seconds left. Miami tried to tie it, as Adams launched a 3-pointer that came up just short with three seconds to go, and Tech's Terrell Bell grabbed the rebound. He made 1 of 2 free throws with under a second left to account for the final margin.

Jeff Allen enabled Tech to keep the lead throughout the second half, scoring 10 of his team-high 18 points in the final 20 minutes. Allen, who made 7-of-12 from the floor, finished with 11 rebounds, notching his ninth doubledouble of the season and the 37th of his career.

Virginia Tech ended the first half of the ACC schedule with a 77-69 victory over NC State at the RBC Center in Raleigh on Wednesday night. With the victory, the Hokies improve to 15-6 overall and 5-3 in ACC action, while NC State falls to 12-10 overall and 2-6 in conference play.

The Hokies jumped out to a 34-18 lead with 3:19 remaining in the first half on a three-pointer by Malcolm Delaney. Tech took a 39-26 lead into intermission. The Hokies never trailed in the second half, but NC State was able to cut the lead to single digits several times after the break. State cut the Tech lead to six points with 20 seconds remaining, but Delaney hit a pair of free throws to secure the win.

Delaney reached two major milestones in the contest, as he registered his 2,000th career point and 500th career assist in the game. Teammate Jeff Allen recorded his 1,500th career point in the win. Delaney becomes just the fourth person in Virginia Tech history to score 2,000 points.

Delaney led all scorers with 22 points. Allen recorded his third straight double-double with 15 points and 11 rebounds. Terrell Bell and Erick Green each scored 13 points and Victor Davila grabbed a career-high 13 rebounds.

The victory is the fourth straight for the Hokies over the Wolfpack and second straight in the RBC Center. The Hokies dominated the boards, out rebounding the Wolfpack, 46-35, including 19 offensive rebounds for Tech. The Hokies committed a season-low six turnovers on the night and hit 19-of-25 free throw attempts.

Virginia Tech's Malcolm Delaney scored 22 of his season-high 33 points in the first half to lead Virginia Tech past Georgia Tech 102-77 in an ACC game played at Cassell Coliseum on Sunday afternoon.

The Hokies (16-7, 6-4 ACC) now have won 12 of their past 15 games and are alone in fourth place in the ACC. They avenged a 72-57 loss to Georgia Tech in Atlanta on Jan. 25 - a game in which Delaney scored eight points and turned the ball over eight times.

Delaney hit 9-of-14 from the floor for the game, including three 3-pointers, and he connected on 12-of-14 from the free-throw line. He missed his career high in points by just four.

Behind him, Virginia Tech scored the first nine points of the game and never trailed. He hit the game's opening basket and added a 3-pointer in that run.

Georgia Tech (10-14, 3-8), which has lost five straight, cut the lead to 9-6 on a basket by Iman Shumpert, but the Hokies embarked on a 33-11 run over the next eight minutes to blow open the game. Virginia Tech hit 14 of its first 17 shots from the floor.

Delaney scored 15 of the 33 in that run, including four on free throws after Georgia Tech head coach Paul Hewitt received back-to-back technical fouls from official Roger Ayers with 7:53 remaining and was ejected.

Georgia Tech did not get closer than 13 points in the second half. The Hokies, who looked fresh after an eight-day layoff, led by as many as 30 and shot 55.2 percent from the floor (32-of-58). They established a school record for points in an ACC game.

Virginia Tech's Jeff Allen had 25 points and 14 rebounds for his fifth straight double-double and 12th of the season (and 40th of his career). Erick Green scored 15 points, while Terrell Bell had 13 for the Hokies.

Shumpert paced Georgia Tech with 27 points, including six 3-pointers. His six 3-pointers tied a career high.

The Hokies continued their winning ways, moving to 17-7 overall, 7-4 in the ACC. They won for the 13th time in their past 16 games, and swept the season series from Maryland, following a 72-57 victory over the Terps on Jan. 20 with this one.

Tech trailed 76-75 after a basket by Maryland's Jordan Williams with 5:21 remaining in the game. But behind Delaney and Green, Tech went on a 9-0 run to take control of the game.

Following two Delaney free throws with 4:54 remaining and then a jumper by Delaney with 4:33 left – his only basket of the second half - Green hit a 3-pointer with 3:22 to go and the shot clock running down. That bucket gave Tech an 82-76 lead. Delaney hit two more free throws with 1:14 left that gave the Hokies an 84-76 lead, their biggest of the half.

Maryland (16-10, 5-6) stopped the run with a 3-pointer by Dino Gregory with 1:09 left. The Terps cut the lead to 87-83 with 33 seconds left on two Terrell Stoglin free throws.

But Delaney hit two free throws with 28 seconds left push the lead back to six, and after Stoglin missed a 3-pointer, Delaney added two more with 14 seconds to go to account for the final margin.

Despite hitting just 3-of-14 from the floor, Delaney canned all 14 of his free-throw attempts, and the Hokies made 9-of-10 from the free-throw line in the final five minutes. Delaney finished with five assists and no turnovers

Jeff Allen added 16 points and 11 rebounds for his sixth straight double-double, while Terrell Bell also finished with 16 points - including a career-high five 3-pointers. Victor Davila chipped in 14 points.

Stoglin had a career-high 25 points and six assists for Maryland. Williams added 16 points and nine rebounds.

But UVa's Joe Harris hit two free throws with 17.5 seconds left, and then Farrakhan hit 3-of-4 from the line in the final 11 seconds to preserve the win for the Cavaliers.

Delaney connected on just 8-of-22 from the floor - as a team, Tech shot just 40.4 percent - but he hit six 3-pointers. Erick Green added 12 points, and Jeff Allen continued his double-double streak for the Hokies. A stick-back with 4.2 seconds to go gave him 11 points and 15 rebounds. That marked his seventh consecutive double-double and 13th

Farrakhan led Virginia with 16 points, while Harris finished with 15 and Sammy Zeglinski had 10.

Jarell Eddie scored a career-high 17 points off the bench to help the Virginia Tech Hokies rebound from a loss to rival Virginia with a 76-62 victory over Wake Forest in an ACC game at Lawrence Joel Coliseum on Tuesday night.

With the win, Tech moved to 18-8 overall, 8-5 in the ACC, and the Hokies have now won 14 of their past 18 games. Wake Forest, which lost to Tech 94-65 in Blacksburg, fell to 8-20 overall, 1-12.

Against the Demon Deacons, Tech overcame some early foul trouble, with **Jeff Allen** picking up his second foul at the 14:01 mark in the first half. He sat for a little over five minutes, and then head coach Seth Greenberg elected to bring him back in.

The move paid dividends. Once Allen returned with 8:59 left, the Hokies outscored Wake Forest 20-9 to end the first half and took a 38-25 lead at halftime.

The second half was much of the same. Tech opened a 21-point lead, 56-35, on a basket by Eddie 13:14 remaining. Eddie drained all six of his shots from the floor, including all three of his 3-pointers, easily surpassing his previous career-high of 12 points – which, coincidentally, came against Wake Forest earlier this season.

Behind Eddie, the Hokies blistered the nets, shooting 60 percent from the floor and 66.7 percent from behind the 3-point arc. The shooting percentage was their second-best of the season (Mount St. Mary's) and the 3-point percentage was their best of the season.

Allen and **Malcolm Delaney** each finished with 17 points as well, while **Erick Green** added 12. Allen grabbed eight rebounds, thus ending his streak of double-doubles at seven.

Travis McKie led Wake Forest with 22 points and nine rebounds. Gary Clark finished with 13.

VIRGINIA TECH 64, DUKE 60

Jeff Allen scored 18 points and 15 rebounds, and Virginia Tech ended the game with a 17-7 run to stun No. 1 Duke 64-60 in an ACC game on Saturday night in front of a packed audience at Cassell Coliseum.

The win marked Tech's fourth over a No. 1 team in school history — three since joining the ACC. Tech moved to 19-8 overall, 9-5 in the ACC, and the Hokies have now won 15 of their past 19 games. Duke, which saw its seven-game winning streak snapped, fell to 26-3, 12-2.

The day may go down as the greatest in Tech basketball history. On Saturday morning, ESPN's College GameDay came to Blacksburg for the first time and broadcast from Cassell Coliseum in front of more than 3,100 students. Then the basketball team polished off the day by rallying in the final seven minutes to beat the Blue Devils. Following the game, Tech fans stormed the floor, much as they did in the 2007 victory over then-No.1 North Carolina.

Tech dominated the game during the second half. An Allen 3-pointer with 6:30 to go started the Hokies' game-ending run. **Terrell Bell**'s 3-pointer with 4:40 remaining tied the game at 55, and his two free throws with 4:19 left gave the Hokies a 57-55 lead. Allen added another basket with 2:39 to go to give Tech a 59-55 bulge.

Kyle Singler's basket cut the Tech lead to two with 2:27 left, but Tech answered when **Malcolm Delaney** connected on arguably the biggest basket of the game. Without a 3-pointer to this point, he buried a 3 from the right wing with 2:01 remaining to push Tech's lead back to five, 62-57.

The Blue Devils then cut the lead to three, 62-59, on a steal and dunk by Mason Plumlee, and sliced it to two on a free throw by Plumlee with 23.2 seconds left. Duke then fouled Allen with 21.8 seconds remaining, and Allen made the second of two free throws to give Tech a 63-60 lead. After a turnover, Duke fouled Allen again with 1.6 ticks to go. Allen made one free throw to account for the final margin.

Allen paced five players in double figures, connecting on 7-of-18 from the floor, including both 3-point attempts. It marked his 15th double-double of the season and the 43rd of his career.

Bell and **Erick Green** added 12 points each for Tech, while Delaney and **Victor Davila** finished with 11. Davila grabbed 10 rebounds for his first double-double of the season.

Malcolm Delaney scored 19 points, but it wasn't enough as the Virginia Tech Hokies lost back-to-back games for the first time this season, falling to Clemson 69-60 in an ACC game played at Littlejohn Coliseum on Saturday afternoon.

With the loss, the Hokies fell to 19-10 overall, 9-7 in the ACC. Tech finishes in a three-way tie with Clemson and Boston College for fourth but will be seeded sixth in next week's ACC Tournament. Clemson moved to 20-10 overall, 9-7 in the league. The Tigers will be the No. 4 seed in the ACC Tournament and receive a first-round bye.

Tech never led in this one, falling behind 19-6 and making just one basket in the first nine minutes of the game. Despite 14 first-half turnovers, the Hokies scrambled back to cut the lead to four. 34-30. at halftime.

Tech got no closer than four points in the second half, the final time coming on an **Erick Green** jumper with 16:25 remaining. But the Tigers proceeded to go on a 10-0 run, extending their lead to 49-35 on a basket by Jerai Grant with 11:25 left.

The Hokies cut the lead to seven on two free throws by Delaney with 1:28 remaining, but the Tigers drained their free throws down the stretch. Clemson made 4-of-6 from the free-throw line in the final 1:06 to preserve the win.

Delaney hit 5-of-14 from the floor, including 2-of-6 from beyond the 3-point arc, on a day when the Hokies struggled against Clemson's man-to-man defense. Tech shot just 30.5 percent from the floor – its worst shooting performance of the season.

ACC TOURNAMENT FIRST ROUND

Virginia Tech opened the game with a 15-2 run and never looked back, cruising to a 59-43 victory over Georgia Tech in the first round of the ACC Tournament on Thursday night at the Greensboro Coliseum.

With the victory, the Hokies, the No. 6 seed in the tournament, advanced to the tournament semifinals, where they met third seed Florida State.

Virginia Tech, coming off back-to-back losses for the first time this season, won its first ACC Tournament game at the Greensboro Coliseum (three tries) and moved to 20-10 overall on the season. Perhaps more importantly, the Hokies got another victory toward their quest of making the NCAA Tournament.

The Yellow Jackets, who scored the fewest points in a tournament game since 1998 when Virginia scored 41 in a loss to Duke, finished their season with a 13-18 mark.

Virginia Tech dominated the first half, shooting 50 percent from the floor and out-rebounding Georgia Tech 20-15. The Yellow Jackets shot just 23 percent in the first 30 minutes

In the second half, Georgia Tech got no closer than 15. The Hokies opened up their largest lead at 55-31 on a layup by **Jeff Allen** with 8:24 remaining.

Malcolm Delaney paced the Hokies with a game-high 15 points, hitting 4 of 7 from the floor, including 2 of 4 from beyond the 3-point arc. Allen recorded his 16th double-double of the season with 14 points and 11 rebounds despite playing with a sore ankle that he injured in the Clemson game and then tweaked in the second half against the Yellow Jackets.

Erick Green added 11 points for the Hokies. Glen Rice, Jr., led Georgia Tech with 14 points off the bench, while Iman Shumpert scored 12.

The Hokies shot 46.8 percent from the floor for the game. In contrast, Georgia Tech shot just 32.1 percent – the third-worst shooting performance by a Virginia Tech opponent this season (Mount St. Mary's, Oklahoma State).

Virginia Tech's **Erick Green** buried a jumper with 4.7 seconds left, and the officials ruled a potential game-winning shot by Florida State came after the horn sounded, thus enabling the Hokies to pull out an improbable 52-51 victory over the Seminoles in an ACC Tournament quarterfinal game on Friday night at Greensboro Coliseum.

With the win, Tech advanced to the ACC Tournament semifinals, where it will face second seed Duke at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

On a night when the Hokies shot just 31.5 percent from the floor and got pounded on the glass, they relied on their defense down the stretch and some clutch shooting. **Manny Atkins** – huge all night for Tech – buried a 3-pointer with 3:04 left that tied the game at 49.

Tech's **Jeff Allen** then made the biggest defensive play of the game after the Seminoles called a timeout with 25 seconds remaining. They got the ball to Michael Snaer, but Allen ripped the ball out of Snaer's hands, and Tech called a timeout with 17 seconds left.

Coming out of the timeout, **Malcolm Delaney** drove to the basket, but flipped the ball back to Green. The sophomore from Winchester, Va. – who had been 1-for-12 from the floor at that point – canned a jumper from the free-throw line to give the Hokies their first lead since the 17:12 mark of the first half.

The excitement was only beginning, though, as Florida State called after Green's basket with 4.7 seconds remaining. Derwin Kitchen got the ball for the Seminoles and drove the corner, where he lofted a floater that went in right as the horn sounded. That set off a wild celebration, as Kitchen's teammates mobbed him in the corner.

But the officials went to the monitor to see if Kitchen got the shot off as the horn sounded. Both teams and fans waited anxiously for roughly two minutes before the officials ruled that Kitchen's shot was not released before the horn sounded. That sent the Hokies into a wild celebration.

Delaney paced the Hokies with 16 points, 11 in the second half, but made just 5-of-16 from the floor. Atkins scored 14 points on 4-of-8 from the floor and 3 of 4 from beyond the 3-point arc.

Malcolm Delaney scored 19 points, but the Hokies struggled shooting from the floor and succumbed to the No. 5 Duke Blue Devils 77-63 in an ACC Tournament semifinal game played Saturday afternoon at Greensboro Coliseum.

Duke (29-4) broke open a close game midway through the first half, using a 12-2 run to take a 26-16 lead on Nolan Smith's 3-pointer with 7:34 remaining in the half. The Blue Devils led by as many as 11 on three occasions in the first half, the final time coming when Seth Curry drained a 3-pointer right before halftime to give Duke a 39-28 lead at the break

The Hokies, who beat Duke 64-60 on Feb. 26 when the Blue Devils were ranked No. 1, cut the lead to 41-35 early in the second half on an Erick Green basket with 17:52 remaining, but they got no closer. Kyle Singler scored after Green's basket, and after a Delaney turnover, the Blue Devils extended their lead to 10 on two free throws by Curry with 16:52 left. Tech got to single digits just one time after that.

The Hokies made just 36.8 percent of their shots from the floor and made just 2-of-16 from beyond the 3-point arc. Delanev led Tech in scoring, but made just 4 of 14 from the floor. He did go 10-for-10 from the free-throw line and grabbed six rebounds.

Green finished with 17 points for the Hokies, hitting 7-of-16 from the floor (1-of-6 from beyond the arc). Victor Davila added 11 points for Tech. Jeff Allen, though, spent most of the game in foul trouble and scored just two points before fouling out with 6:29 left.

Barring something unforeseen, Tech will be making its fifth straight postseason appearance and sixth in the past seven seasons - all under Seth Greenberg.

Jeff Allen scored 19 points to help Virginia Tech overcome the sting of not making the NCAA Tournament by beating Bethune-Cookman, 79-54, in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament at Cassell Coliseum on Wednesday night.

Virginia Tech (22-11), making its 12th appearance in the NIT and fifth in eight seasons under head coach Seth Greenberg, will meet Wichita State in the second round on Sunday after the Shockers beat Nebraska, 76-49. The Hokies moved to 24-9 all time in NIT competition.

Tech connected on 10 of its first 11 shots from the floor and took a 23-9 lead after Allen's basket with 13:01 left in the half. The Hokies led by as many as 23 in the first half and shot 61.3 percent from the floor (19-of-31).

Malcolm Delaney scored a game-high 30 points, but Wichita State's Joe Ragland hit a short shot with 2.6 seconds left in overtime to lift the Shockers to a 79-76 victory over the Hokies in the second round of the National Invitation Tournament on Sunday afternoon at Cassell Coliseum.

With the loss, the Hokies finished their season with a 22-12 record. It also marked the final game for Tech's seniors, including the trio of Malcolm Delaney, Jeff Allen and Terrell Bell. This senior class will leave tied with the 1985-86 senior class for the most wins (87) in school history by a class.

Ragland's shot came after the Hokies' Bell had made a layup to tie the game at 76 with nine seconds remaining. Ragland raced up the court, and Wichita State's Gregg Marshall decided against calling a timeout to set up a play. It worked as Ragland got into the lane to hit the game-winning shot.

Tech called a timeout following Ragland's shot, but Touré Murry forced Delaney to step out of bounds with a second left, and the Hokies never had a chance to tie the game. Tech then fouled Murry with 0.9 seconds remaining, and Murry made one of two free-throw attempts before rebounding his own miss to run out the clock.

The Shockers had a chance to win in regulation. Wichita State's J.T. Turley hit a 3-pointer with 47 seconds left in regulation that tied the game at 69. Bell then missed a 3-pointer with 22 seconds remaining, giving the Shockers one last opportunity to win the game. But Ragland's off-balance shot at the buzzer was a little too strong.

Murry led a balanced Wichita State attack with 15 points. Graham Hatch added 14 as five Shockers finished in double figures.

Delaney paced the Hokies with a game-high 30 points. It marked his ninth game of 30 points or more in his career and will go down as his postseason high.

Erick Green added 17 points for the Hokies, while Allen had 10 before fouling out with 6:12 remaining in regulation.

CASSELL COLISEUM

For more than a half a century, Cassell Coliseum has provided Virginia Tech with one of the greatest home courts in all of college basketball. Winning has been the norm in the facility since its opening in 1961. Cassell is perhaps even more exciting today than ever in its history. The 2009-10 season saw a record 176,159 fans pack the building and in 2010-11, more than 142,000 fans packed the building.

A facility long known for one of the great home-court advantages in college basketball, "The Cassell" now gives Tech opponents one of the most difficult environments in the Atlantic Coast Conference. And in the 2007-08 season, the four millionth fan witnessed a Hokie victory.

Cassell Coliseum enjoyed a renaissance of sorts during the 2003-04 season but truly came to life during the 2004-05 season. The Hokies finished the season 13-3 in the coliseum and saw all eight ACC games sell out. Tech's 13 home wins that season were the most since 1994-95 and tied for the fourth-most home victories for a Virginia Tech team in Cassell Coliseum history. That excitement increased in the 2005-06 season, when the Hokies finished 10-7 in the building and saw 14 sellouts, including all eight home ACC games.

The 2006-07 season witnessed many outstanding games, but two contests will rank among the most memorable in school history. On Jan. 13, 2007, the Hokies defeated topranked North Carolina, 94-88, in front of another full house in the Cassell. And just eight days later, the Hokies downed #22 Maryland, 67-64, in overtime. That game was played in front of 8,500 fans, mostly students, who braved an ice storm to make Cassell Coliseum the tough home court that it has come to be. The 2007-08 season saw the young Hokies post a 14-3 record and cap the year with three packed home games in the NIT. The festival seating for those three games only enhanced the facility's reputation as a great place for a great fan base to watch a basketball

Since opening, the Coliseum has attracted more than four million fans for men's basketball. Tech finished sixth nationally in Division I in increased attendance during the 2003-04 season, drawing 95,136 for the season, about one-third more than the season before. And Hokie fans improved upon that. Virginia Tech led the nation in increased attendance during the 2004-05 season, averaging 9,406 per game, the largest average attendance in Cassell Coliseum history. That record was broken again in 2005-06, as the Hokies averaged 9,764 per game and once again in the 2006-07 season, at 9,822 per game.

Cassell Coliseum is constantly undergoing improvements. Eleven years ago, new state-ofthe-art video screens were added, and seven years ago, each seat in the arena was refinished to its natural wood look. Prior to the 2002-03



season, the athletics department completed step one of a three-step process to renovate and improve the ambulatory of the coliseum. New video screens were added in the concourse, as well as a new design to the court, reflecting the Hokies' entrance into the ACC. Five years ago, the north and south ambulatories were upgraded to blend with the work done on the east and west ambulatories prior to the 2004-05 season.

Restoration and sealing of the exterior concrete walls and buttresses of Cassell Coliseum took place in 1997. Roof repair was completed in the fall of 1996, with replacement of the roof surface and installation of structural access to the heating and lighting systems as well as installation of steel beams in the top of the arena.

The men's basketball team was given a gift from Pat and Sandy Cupp of Blacksburg, Va., to renovate the men's basketball locker room, which is now the Bill Foster Basketball Suite. named after one of Tech's most successful men's basketball coaches. Even with the addition of the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center, the Bill Foster Basketball Suite remains the game-day locker room for the Hokies.

Entering the 2011-12 season, the Hokies have won 509 out of 659 games played in Cassell, for a winning percentage of .772.

During the 1994-95 season, Cassell was the site of high excitement as the Hokies hosted two National Invitation Tournament games en route to the championship. The Hokies beat Clemson in a first-round game at the Coliseum, then scored an emotional 64-61 third-round win over New Mexico State, turning the arena into a madhouse. Tech continued its strong home showings in the NIT in 2005, as the Hokies defeated Temple, 60-50, in front of more than 9.100 fans in "The Cassell." The Hokies' three home games in the 2007-08 season's NIT were all

The first basketball game played in the Coliseum was on January 3, 1962, as the Hokies routed Alabama, 91-67. The near-capacity crowd had to sit on the concrete floor to watch the initiation of the new building because the seats had not arrived.

There have been four perfect season records for the Hokies in Cassell: two 10-0 years (1961-62 and 1965-66), an 11-0 campaign (1972-73) and a 14-0 season (1975-76). The Hokies have lost only one game on their home court in 11 other years, including 13-1 records in 1977-78 and 1987-88.

In-state rivals have had little success playing the Hokies in Cassell, winning only 15 of 130 visits. Tech was 1-1 against Commonwealth of Virginia opponents last season and have won 12 Of the last 13 home games against in-state opponents.

On September 17, 1977, Virginia Tech officials and friends dedicated the Coliseum in honor of the late Stuart K. Cassell.

Adjacent to Cassell Coliseum is the Jamerson Athletic Center. It was completed in 1982, dedicated in the fall of 1983 and named in honor of J.E. Jamerson and his son, William E. Jamerson, owners of the firm that built the building.


The complex contains administrative and coaching offices, athletic department accounting and business offices, team and coaches' meeting rooms, the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room and the Gordon D. Bowman Memorial Club Room on the top floor for Hokie Club members.


Rising from a former parking lot on the east side of Cassell Coliseum is the \$21 million Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center. Completed in August 2009, the men's and women's basketball teams boast one of the finest practice facilities in the nation, and the new building only enhances the appeal of Cassell Coliseum.

Prior to the 1988-89 season, a modern, spring-loaded playing floor was installed in the Coliseum. During the fall of 1989, the facility was upgraded with an improved lighting system in the arena.

Construction for the main portion of the Coliseum began in 1961. It was completed in December 1964, at a cost of \$2.7 million. Built by T.C. Brittain and Company of Decatur, Ga., it houses a 10,052-seat basketball arena, locker rooms, two auxiliary gymnasiums, offices and other athletic facilities.

Although capacity crowds are a frequent occurrence in Cassell Coliseum, the largest crowd ever recorded was an overflow of 11,500 for Purdue on December 3, 1966.





TECH IN POSTSEASON PLAY

Hokies Make Postseason Five of Last Six Years

The history books continue to be updated as Virginia Tech has made postseason basketball appearances in five of the last six seasons.

A new chapter in Virginia Tech postseason history was written in 2007. The Hokies advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1996. Tech defeated Illinois, 54-51, in the first round in Columbus, Ohio, before falling to Southern Illinois, 63-48, in the second round at Nationwide Arena.

Coach Seth Greenberg's team earned a berth into the tournament as an at-large selection following a season that saw the Hokies go 3-0 against teams ranked in the top five and reach the 20-win plateau.

This was the Hokies' grand return to the NCAA Tournament following more than a decade's absence.

Guided by coach Bill Foster, Virginia Tech basketball hit the jackpot in 1995 and 1996 with a championship run in the National Invitation Tournament and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament.



The Hokies defeated Illinois, 54-52, in the first round of the 2007 NCAA West Regional in Columbus, Ohio.

The players and coaches of the 1994-95 team cemented their names in Hokie basketball lore in one of the most dramatic NITs of all time.

Tech won the title, defeating Marquette in overtime, 65-64, on two free throws by Shawn Smith with 0.7 seconds left. Smith calmly sank the first free throw to tie it. After Marquette called a timeout, Smith made the second.

Fans at Madison Square Garden rushed on the court. Smith ran into the stands to give his father a bear hug. Blacksburg went wild as students and townspeople stormed the downtown area to hail their heroes.

Tech reached the championship game by defeating Clemson, 62-54; Providence, 91-78; New Mexico State, 64-61; and Canisius, 71-59. That Tech team finished with 25 victories, the most in school history.

The next season, Tech qualified for the NCAA Tournament. Drawing a disappointing ninth seed, Tech was placed in the same bracket with power-packed Kentucky.

The Hokies beat Wisconsin-Green Bay in the first round in Dallas, Texas, 61-48, as Shawn Good led the way with 25 points. The Hokies, however, lost in the second round to eventual national champion Kentucky, 84-60.

That Tech team finished with a 23-6 record, one of the best marks in school history.

In all, Tech has made 17 postseason appearances, compiling an overall record of 29-17.

Tech's NIT title in 1995 was the second for the Hokies. Tech also won the crown at Madison Square Garden in 1973 in strikingly similar fashion.

Tech guard Bobby Stevens hit a jumper at the buzzer in overtime to propel the Hokies

to a 92-91 victory over the Fighting Irish of Notre Dame and the NIT title. The victory was a highlight of the championship series in which Tech won four games by a total of five points, including a first-round victory over nationally ranked New Mexico, 65-63, on national television.

Tech's first postseason appearance came in 1966, when the Hokies lost to Temple, 88-73, in the NIT's opening round.

A year later, Tech made its first NCAA Tournament appearance, advancing to the finals of the Mideast Regional with wins against Toledo and Indiana. The Hokies fell just short of the Final Four when they dropped a heartbreaking 71-66 overtime decision to Dayton.

In the 1980 Mideast Regional, Tech made headlines with its amazing first-round comeback victory against homestanding Western Kentucky. The Hokies trailed, 48-30, at the half, but rallied to take an 89-85 overtime win. In the second round against Indiana and Isiah Thomas, Tech came close to an upset. The Hokies trailed by only three points with less than five minutes to go, but fell, 68-59.

The Hokies made it back to the NIT in 1982. Tech advanced to the quarterfinals with impressive wins against Fordham and Mississippi before finally losing to Georgia and high-flying All-American Dominique Wilkins.

In 1983, Tech opened NIT play at home against William & Mary, winning 85-79, then lost on the road at South Carolina, 75-68.

Tech also had the good fortune of opening the 1984 NIT at Cassell Coliseum against Georgia Tech. The Hokies prevailed, 77-74, behind 19-point performances from Dell Curry and Perry Young. A last-second tip-in by point guard Al Young sparked the Hokies to a 68-66 win against South Alabama in Greensboro, N.C. The Hokies then returned home where they rode a 27-point outing by Curry to a victory against Tennessee, 72-68.

In the semifinals at Madison Square Garden, it took a last-minute comeback by eventual champion Michigan to beat Tech, 78-75. The Hokies bounced back two days later to nail down third place with a 71-70 victory over Southwestern Louisiana.

In 1985, the Hokies took a 20-8 regular season record and a second-place Metro Conference finish into the NCAA Tournament. Tech bowed out in the first round, losing, 60-57, to Temple.

In 1986, the Hokies were eliminated in the first round of the Metro Tournament. Despite the defeat, they received a bid to the NCAA Tournament behind the strength of their 22-8 record. Tech was defeated in the first round by Villanova, 71-62.

The Hokies added to their total NIT wins in 2005, as Tech defeated Temple, 60-50, in Cassell Coliseum before falling, 83-62, at Memphis in the second round.

Two more NIT victories were added in 2008, as Tech advanced to the quarterfinls of the tournament. In 2009, the Hokies made another trip to the NIT, as they defeated Duquesne, 116-108, in a double-overtime thriller in Cassell Coliseum before falling to Baylor in the second round at home. Tech made it four years in a row to the NIT, as the Hokies were a top seed again in 2010 and 2011. The Hokies are 24-10 all-time in the NIT and 30-18 all-time in postseason play.

TECH SPORTS HALL OF FAME

The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame was organized in 1982 to honor persons who have made great contributions to athletics at the university. Since its inception, a total of 152 people have been enshrined, including 23 individuals who were chosen primarily for their contributions in basketball.

CHRIS SMITH

A brilliant basketball center from 1958 through 1961, Smith was one of the nation's leading rebounders three years in a row. He still holds all of Tech's major rebounding records and is regarded by many as the greatest basketball player in school history. Smith is a charter member who was inducted in 1982

ALLAN BRISTOW

A scrappy forward who paced the Hokies to the National Invitation Tournament championship in 1973, Bristow scored in double figures during every game of his Tech career and still holds the Hokies' single-game scoring mark of 52 points. After 10 years as a player in the NBA, Bristow went into coaching, including a stint as the head coach of the NBA Charlotte Hornets. He retired as the general manager of the New Orleans Hornets. Bristow was inducted in 1984.

JOHN WETZEL


A swingman who was always at his best in the clutch, Wetzel led Tech to its first-ever national postseason tournament in 1966. He enjoyed a 10-year NBA playing career and was in the pro coaching ranks since 1979 until retiring this summer from the Sacramento Kings. Wetzel was inducted in 1985.

HARRY BUSHKAR

A fine scorer and playmaker, Bushkar capped his career by being named All-Southern Conference in 1945-46. He was tabbed Virginia's Player of the Year that season and made the SoCon All-Tournament Team. Bushkar was captain of the 1944, '45 and '46 Tech teams. He was inducted in 1986.

GEORGE PARRISH

One of Tech's first big-name stars, Parrish earned All-South honors in both basketball and football during

a career that extended from 1916 to 1920. Parrish was regarded by many as the best center in southern basketball in 1919 when he scored 320 of the Hokies' 766 points. He was inducted in 1986.

HOWARD PARDUE

One of the greatest shooters in school history, Pardue played on Tech teams in the early 1960s. He finished with a career scoring average of 20 points and was named to the All-Southern Conference team three years in a row and twice was named to the Southern's all-tournament team. He was inducted in 1992.

BUCKY KELLER

A 6-3 swingman who led Tech to glory in the early 1960s, Keller finished his Tech career with an overall scoring average of 18.2 points per game. He averaged 15.0 ppg on a 1959-60 team that went 20-6, posted a 17.6 scoring mark in 1960-61 when the Hokies were 15-7, and averaged 21.7 ppg in 1961-62 when Tech finished 19-6. Keller died in 1977. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1993.

BILL MATTHEWS

Matthews had a tremendous impact on Tech athletics in a 35-year career as a basketball player, a coach of three sports and an administrator. A bulky center, he ranks second only to Chris Smith in all-time rebounding for the Hokies. Matthews had a career average of 13.8 rebounds per game and in 1954-55 had a sensational seasonal average of 18.8. He was the Virginia Player of the Year in 1955-56. Matthews was inducted in 1993.

DALE SOLOMON

A dynamic center, Solomon burst on the Virginia Tech basketball scene in a big way during his

freshman year in 1978-79. He sparked Tech to its only Metro Conference Tournament championship and was named the tourney's MVP. He went on to become the first player to make All-Metro four years in a row. In 1990, he was chosen on the Metro's decade team of the 1980s. Solomon tallied a career total of 2,136 points and ranks fourth on the Hokies'all-time scoring list. He was inducted in 1994.

EARL (BUS) HALL

The Southern Conference's leading scorer in 1932, Hall was a unanimous choice for the all-conference team that year. Nicknamed "The Princeton Phantom," he was a complete player who excelled as a floor leader, dribbler and passer, as well as a scorer. Hall was inducted in 1992.

GLEN COMBS

Still rated one of the best long-range shooters in school history, Combs helped the 1967 Tech team to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Regional, where an overtime loss to Dayton cost the Hokies a spot in the Final Four. Combs, who averaged 17.9 points over his three varsity seasons at Tech, went on to enjoy a seven-year career in the ABA. He was inducted in 1987.

LEE MELEAR

Although he starred in both basketball and baseball, Melear may be best remembered for his 24-point performance against Kentucky in 1962 when the Hokies handed legendary coach Adolph Rupp the only season-opening home loss of his career at UK. Melear, who averaged in double-figure scoring all three of his varsity seasons, was inducted in 1989.

BOB AYERSMAN

A hot-shooting forward from 1957-61, Ayersman made the All-Southern Conference team two years in a row. He still ranks ninth in career scoring at Tech and his 26.5 scoring average in 1958-59 still stands as the second-best in school history. Ayersman was inducted in 1990.

LEWIS MILLS

A point guard deluxe, Mills was the captain of the Hokies in 1959-60 and helped that team post the school's first 20-win basketball season. He entered the coaching field after graduating from Tech and served as the head basketball coach at the University

of Richmond from 1963 until 1973. Mills, who also spent 12 years in athletic administration at VCU, was inducted in 1991.

DELL CURRY

This silky-smooth outside shooter scored a Tech record 1,021 field goals and tallied a total of 2,389 points. He ranks second on the Hokies' all-time scoring list behind Bimbo Coles and holds the school career record for steals with 295. Curry, who helped the Hokies to four postseason tournaments, posted 115 double-figure scoring games on the way to a career scoring average of 18.9. He was a first-round draft pick of the NBA's Utah Jazz in 1986 and is now retired from playing after a long and successful NBA career. He is currently an executive with the expansion Charlotte Bobcats of the NBA and was inducted into the Virginia State Sports Hall of Fame in 2004. Curry was inducted in 1996.

LOYD KING

A mixture of good ball-handling skills, leaping ability and a keen eye for long-range jumpers helped make King one of the best guards to play for the Hokies. He was the captain and leading scorer for Tech's cage teams in 1969-70 and 1970-71. He averaged 19.3 points per game as a junior and carried a 21.3-point scoring average as a senior. During his last two years, he reached double-figure scoring in 45 of 47 games, including the last 23 in a row. King finished his Tech career with 1,248 points and a 17.1



scoring average. He went on to play in the American Basketball Association and French Professional League. King was inducted in 1998.

TED WARE

Ted Ware, whose rebounding and defense were vital ingredients for the Hokies during his three varsity seasons in the 1960s, had the distinction of playing an important role on Tech's first NIT team in 1966 and also on the Hokies' first NCAA Tournament squad in 1967. The 6-5 forward was Tech's second-leading scorer as a sophomore in 1965-66 with a 14.6 average. During the 1966-67 season, he shot 55.6 percent from the field, which was a school record at the time. As a senior in 1967-68, Ware posted a team-high 9.2 rebounding average. Ware's overall 52.4 field-goal percentage was a Tech career record at the time. In 1968, he was selected to the 10-man Academic All-America Basketball Team chosen by the nation's sports information directors. Ware was inducted in 1999.

BIMBO COLES


Vernell "Bimbo" Coles played a leading role at point guard for the 1988 U.S. Olympic team, which won a bronze medal in Seoul, South Korea. He capped his collegiate career as the leading scorer in both Virginia Tech and Metro Conference basketball history. Coles' jersey, No. 12, was officially retired just prior to his final home game against Memphis State on March 3, 1990. He was inducted in 2000.


WAYNE ROBINSON

Wayne Robinson was a central figure in Tech's early success in the Metro Conference. He was Tech's leading rebounder in each of his three years as a starter and is ranked fourth among Tech's career rebound leaders and is 10th in career scoring at Tech. Robinson was a first round selection of the Los Angeles Lakers in the 1980 NBA Draft and played for both the Lakers and the Detroit Pistons before playing seven seasons professionally in Europe. He was inducted in 2003.

CHARLES MOIR

Charlie Moir is the winningest coach in Virginia Tech basketball history. The native of Francisco, N.C., won 213 games in his 11-year tenure with the Hokies. His teams won 19 or more games in nine of his 11 seasons and during one stretch, he produced a school-record five consecutive 20-win seasons. Moir guided the





Hokies to eight postseason tournament appearances – four in the NCAA and four in the NIT – the most ever by any Tech men's coach. His 1978-79 team won the Metro Conference tournament in its first season of league play. Moir was inducted in 2006.

ACE CUSTIS

Curry

One of the most popular players in Virginia Tech history, Custis completed his Virginia Tech career with 1,706 points and 1,777 rebounds, joining Chris Smith as the only two Hokies to reach or surpass the 1,500 mark in both points and rebounds. In 1997, he became just the third player in school history to have his number retired. Custis has enjoyed a lengthy professional career in Japan since graduation. Custis was inducted in 2007.

CHUCK NOE


In his seven years at the helm of the Tech men's basketball program, Noe guided the Hokies to seven consecutive winning seasons, compiling 109 victories. In 1959-60, Tech posted the first 20-win season in school history with a 20-6 record that included a 12-1 mark in Southern Conference play. The Hokies won the league's regular season title that season and also laid claim to the state championship with a 7-0 mark against in-state competition. Noe was inducted in 2009.


DUKE THORPE


Duke Thorpe didn't waste any time in capturing the fancy of Virginia Tech basketball fans with his tough, relentless style of play for the Hokies. The 6-6 forward won a starting job midway through his freshman season and went on to help Tech earn postseason berths in both his junior and senior years. He led the team in scoring (15.6) and rebounding (8.3) as Tech advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NIT. Thorpe's career field-goal percentage of .600 still ranks as the top all-time shooting mark for a Tech player. He also holds the top two career single-season field goal percentage marks among Tech players and stands 10th overall in career rebounds with 756. He finished his career with 1,294 points. He was inducted in 2010.

PAUL DEAR, LEO BURKE, MEL HENRY

Although they were chosen for the Hall of Fame primarily for their excellence in other sports, they also made contributions in basketball.





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
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
THE 1966-1967 HOKIES


A season of firsts. A record-setting year. A year to remember and be talked about throughout Virginia Tech history. The 1966-67 basketball team featured a star-studded lineup that included two players who went on to a professional career and a third who was drafted in the ABA. The Hokies were virtually unstoppable, despite losing the leading scorer and rebounder from the year before.

After reaching the postseason in the 1965-66 season, fans thought the Hokies would be good, but not nearly as good as they turned out to be. Opening up the season against fourthranked Duke, Tech blew out its opponent on a neutral court in Charlotte, N.C. Hokie fans were so stirred up after knocking off the Blue Devils, a school-record 11,500 fans filed into Cassell Coliseum to watch Tech down Purdue the very next day. To this day, it is the largest watched home game in Virginia Tech history. At the time, it was also the largest crowd to ever see a game in the state of Virginia. The momentum carried them to seven more wins over the next nine games, before dropping a narrow loss to Clemson. After losing to the Tigers, the Hokies would win the next seven games heading down the stretch, thanks mainly to the sharpshooting of Glen Combs, who averaged 21.3 points per game as a junior.

Tech averaged 78.8 points per contest during the memorable season. The potent offense contributed to its run in the NCAA Tournament, where they promptly knocked off Toledo in Memorial Coliseum in Lexington, Ky., after losing to the Rockets at the end of the regular season. The Hokies reached the Elite Eight before succumbing to Dayton in overtime.


Despite being on the verge of the Final Four and coming up just short, fans remember the team as a run and gun affair in the pre-shot clock era. They also remember players like Ron "Spider" Perry, Chris Ellis, Ted Ware and Ken Talley.

Although the squad has been apart for nearly 40 years, they will always be etched in the history books as one of the best ever. There is simply no other way to describe the 1966-67 Virginia Tech men's basketball team.






Ace Custis is interviewed following the Hokies' NIT Championship in 1995.



Ace Custis is 10th on Virginia Tech's all-time scoring list and is third in career rebounding for the Hokies.

Ace Custis, one of the most popular athletes in Virginia Tech history, became the third men's basketball player to have his jersey retired when his career ended in 1997. Custis became the third player in Tech basketball history to surpass the 1,000-mark in both points and rebounds. He finished with 1,706 points and 1,777 rebounds, joining Hall of Famers Chris Smith and Bill Matthews in that category. Custis made the all-conference team in two different leagues during his time at Tech. He was All-Metro Conference as a sophomore and was selected to the All-Atlantic 10 team his junior and senior seasons. During his senior year, he was a finalist for the Boost/Naismith Award which goes to the National Player of the Year. Custis has played on NBA Summer League teams in the past and now plays professionally in Japan. He was a 2007 inductee into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame.

All-America guard Dell Curry, who helped Virginia Tech to four postseason tournaments, became the first Hokie basketball player ever to have his jersey retired when the university honored him in a ceremony before his last home game on March 1, 1986. Curry was a three-time All-Metro Conference choice for the Hokies and was named the Metro's Player of the Year in 1986, after leading the league with a 24.1 scoring average. He finished his Tech career with 2,389 points, which was a school record at the time. Curry earned first-team All-America honors from The Basketball News, second-team recognition from the Associated Press and the Basketball Writers of America, and third-team honors from United Press International and the Helms Foundation. During the summers of 1984 and 1985, the 6-5 sharpshooter played on U.S. All-Star teams that competed abroad in Jones Cup play. Following his senior season, Curry was a first-round draft pick of the NBA's Utah Jazz. Curry retired from the NBA following the 2002-03 season, after a long career in which he was one of the top shooters in the league. Last year, he was featured in USA Today due to his involvement in numerous community and charity causes. He currently works for the NBA's Charlotte Bobcats.

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ALLAN BRISTOW

Tech All-Time Great

Allan Bristow, a scrappy forward who paced the Hokies to the National Invitation Tournament championship in 1973, became the fourth Virginia Tech basketball player to have his jersey retired. Bristow scored in double figures during every game of his Tech career and still holds the Hokies' single-game scoring mark of 52 points. He finished as Tech's all-time scoring leader in 1973 with 1,804 points and still stands seventh on the list. He holds Tech records for career scoring average, most points in a game, consecutive double-figure scoring games and most field goals in a game. After 10 years as a player in the NBA, Bristow went into coaching, including a stint as the head coach of the NBA's Charlotte Hornets. His jersey was retired on Oct. 17, 1998, at the Temple homecoming football game, commemorating the 25th anniversary of the 1973 NIT team. After returning to the Hornets' organization as the team's assistant general manager two seasons ago, Bristow was promoted to general manager, before retiring in September 2005.

DON DEVOE

Tech All-Time Coaching Great

To many Hokie fans, it will remain the most important event in Virginia Tech basketball history. In 1973, the Hokies shocked the basketball world by defeating New Mexico, Fairfield, Alabama and Notre Dame to win the NIT. The win over the Irish in the finals was capped by a buzzer-beating jumper by Bobby Stevens to win the game in overtime, 92-91.

The coach of the Hokies was Don DeVoe, in just his second season in Blacksburg. DeVoe took a group of experienced players in his first season, built upon that foundation by teaching strong fundamentals and put the Hokies on the basketball map.

"I was fortunate at the age of 29 to be named the head coach at Virginia Tech," DeVoe said. "I was lucky to inherit five outstanding seniors. I give credit to those five seniors in being able to grasp what we were teaching and believing in what we were teaching. That first team laid the foundation for what we were to accomplish in the future."

DeVoe was fortunate to work with an outstanding staff, including future head coaches Sonny Smith (VCU, Auburn) and Jim Hallihan (East Tennessee State). A graduate assistant on those teams was Kevin O'Connor, currently the senior vice president of basketball operations of the NBA's Utah Jazz and father of former Tech women's assistant basketball coach and player, Katie O'Connor. That group was able to recruit an outstanding group of players that brought a lot of excitement to Blacksburg.

"My first staff, Sonny Smith and Jim Hallihan, were great at finding the type of kids we wanted in our program. They helped us establish the success that we had and we were fortunate to have them here," DeVoe said.

DeVoe coached the Hokies for five seasons, compiling an 88-45 overall record. He is the fifth-winningest coach in Tech history and is remembered for being the coach that got the Hokies started on the most prolonged and successful streak in the school's basketball history.

"When we left, we were able to leave behind an outstanding group of players and I know that Charlie Moir took those outstanding players and was able to continue the success at Virginia Tech."

DeVoe retired following the 2003-04 season as the head coach at Navy.

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CHARLES MOIR

Tech All-Time Coaching Great

Perhaps no era in Virginia Tech basketball was more successful and more exciting than the 11 years that Charlie Moir led the Hokies. An assistant coach under Bill Matthews and Howie Shannon in the 1960s, Moir is Tech's all-time winningest coach. His teams won big games against the best teams in the country. Cassell Coliseum was a feared place to play and Tech was one of the top teams in the nation.

In honor of his many contributions to Virginia Tech, Moir was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 2006. Moir became the 20th basketball inductee into the elite group.

During Moir's time in Blacksburg, Tech won more than 64 percent of its games. Moir never had a losing record and failed to win at least 20 games just three times, and two of those three seasons saw Tech win 19 games. The Hokies made seven postseason appearances, including four of the school's seven NCAA Tournament trips. The Hokies also won the 1979 Metro Conference Tournament under Moir.

Great players dotted the rosters during Moir's term. The top four scorers in school history all played for Moir. Bimbo Coles, the only Olympian in Tech history was recruited by Moir, who coached the highest-scoring teams in Virginia Tech history.

"The seats go way up there, and it feels like the fans are so close to the court. I know other coaches hate to play there. It felt like a great place, with tremendous fan support, and most nights it was rocking."


Tech's biggest wins in Cassell Coliseum came under Moir. On Monday, Jan. 10, 1983, Moir and the Hokies spoiled the day for Memphis State, as the Hokies knocked off the No. 1-ranked Tigers, 69-56, in a sold-out Cassell Coliseum. MSU had, earlier in the day, ascended to the top spot in the national polls. Tech had other memorable wins under Moir, including a 76-72 victory over second-ranked and unbeaten Memphis State in 1986.

The names that played for Moir are among the best-ever for Tech. Bimbo Coles, Dell Curry, Dale Solomon, Al Young, Perry Young, Bobby Beecher and 2003 Virginia Tech Hall of Fame inductee Wayne Robinson were all vital parts of the great teams under Charlie Moir.



BILL FOSTER

Tech All-Time Coaching Great

Bill Foster came to Blacksburg as a proven, successful basketball coach. Everywhere he had coached, including Miami, Clemson and UNC Charlotte, Foster had won. But perhaps more importantly, Foster had won with grace and integrity. During his time in Blacksburg, he proved that class shines through.

Foster enjoyed many successes and milestones during his time at Virginia Tech. On Dec. 31, 1995, in New Orleans, the Hokies defeated Wright State to give Foster his 500th coaching victory. During that season, Tech climbed to eighth in the polls and lost in the second round of the NCAA Tournament to eventual champion Kentucky. Tech finished the season ranked 22nd nationally.

The previous season had seen perhaps Foster's greatest accomplishment at Tech, as he led the Hokies to the 1995 NIT Championship. Tech defeated Clemson, Providence, New Mexico State, Canisius and Marquette to capture the school's second NIT title. During his six seasons at Virginia Tech, Foster amassed a 101-78 record with the Hokies and stands as the fourth-winningest coach in school history.

"The people here were special to work with, including Coach Beamer and President (Paul) Torgersen. The improvement we had over four or five years was amazing to see. The NIT was a great experience, as well as getting an NCAA bid the next year," Foster said.

Foster has a connection to the current era of Virginia Tech basketball. Hokie head coach Seth Greenberg was a member of Foster's first staff at Miami. Greenberg gives much credit to his former boss and will rely on Foster's knowledge and experience in helping mold his program in Blacksburg.

"Seth Greenberg is a bright young man who has built and developed outstanding programs at both Long Beach State and South Florida. He is a hard worker who has been a basketball person since he was old enough to dribble a ball. I don't know anything but positives about Seth Greenberg," Foster said.

The Bill Foster Basketball Suite

In addition to their space in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center, on game days Virginia Tech players have the use of one of the best game-day locker room facilities in the country — The Bill Foster Basketball Suite — donated by Pat and Sandy Cupp of Blacksburg, Va., in honor of Virginia Tech coaching great Bill Foster. It includes a spacious locker room, private restroom and showers, a players' lounge, a meeting area and a foyer honoring former Hokie greats throughout the years. The suite opens into the arena floor and continues as the game-day home to the Hokies. During the fall of 2005, the suite was completely renovated. The renovation included plasma screen televisions in the players' lounge and locker room, a surround-sound stereo, new lockers, a computer station, hardwood flooring in the entrance and the lounge, a scouting and film editing station, murals and HokieStone throughout the complex.



STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE


The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is a committee made up of student-athletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. It also offers input on the rules, regulations and policies that affect student-athletes' lives on NCAA member institution campuses. Two members of each sports team serve on SAAC each academic year.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Life aims to help studentathletes lead balanced lifestyles, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills. Each team is required to attend two personal development programs during the year to educate student-athletes.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Virginia Tech student-athletes go through their collegiate athletic experiences with the understanding that they will need to secure a job upon graduation. The Office of Student Life works to enhance student-athlete career development by collaborating with the Virginia Tech Career Services Office. Student-athletes also receive assistance in learning about majors and minors, preparing for career fairs, and obtaining scholarships and internships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Office of Student Life is also responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded and honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. In 2010-11, 362 student-athletes were named to this prestigious list, just slightly lower than the 370 who were honored during 2009-10.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Virginia Tech student-athletes are now involved more than ever in the local community. In conjunction with the mission of the Office of Student Life and the Ut Prosim motto, student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. Each team partners with a local community organization and volunteers time at community-wide events. Along with large volunteer efforts, studentathletes engage in community support with visits to local hospitals and elementary and middle schools. Community organizations can also request Tech student-athletes to attend local outreach events. Involvement in this program helps maintain and improve the positive relationship between student-athletes and the surrounding community.

In 2010-11, the Virginia Tech basketball team partnered with Special Olympics and participated in events with the organization. The program also works closely with other organizations and programs. Tech basketball players are often visitors to local elementary schools and assisting in community service projects.

ATHLETIC Virginia tech basketball PERFORMANCE

One of the Nation's Top Programs Helps Student-Athletes Get Bigger Faster and Stronger

Having a top-flight strength and conditioning program is one of the most important aspects of a successful college basketball program. Long before players ever step on a court in competition, the truly successful ones have dedicated themselves to the long hours of preparation it takes to be the best. The Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is perfectly suited to develop successful student-athletes. And with the increased space in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center, this has proven even more so for the Hokies in the past two years.

Under the direction of assistant athletics director for athletic performance Mike Gentry and director of strength and conditioning for basketball programs David Jackson, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the men's basketball program one of the best as well.

One of the main support centers of Tech men's basketball is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies have continually shown improvement in all aspects of college basketball.

The men's basketball team trains in the 4,000-square foot strength and conditioning center in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center. This dedicated weight room facility features free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer Strength equipment, and four platforms. With this facility, Hokie basketball players do not need to split time between different weight rooms; everything needed to build a winner is under one roof.

Tech also has the use of a 10-by-40-yard sand pit located outdoors and adjacent to the weight room in the Merryman Center. This pit is used

for resistive running drills to improve speed. The Hokies also have the practice fields for use in running drills.

Each player has personal goals, which he works to achieve. There are two strength awards for the team — the personal record breaker and the elite award. In order to receive the personal record breaker award, the individual has to break all of his personal records. For the elite award, the player has to average a seven on a scale of 10 on all the exercises.

The Elite Level of Performance was created to push the athletes to higher levels. This level is a predetermined performance test which measures achievement for the individual's position. It comprises four tests in strength (bench press, squat, push jerk and power clean) and five tests in performance (vertical jump, 40-yard time, 10-yard time, sit-reach test and 20-yard shuttle).

DR. MIKE GENTRY

ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR FOR ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

Responsibilities: As associate athletics director for athletic performance, Gentry's duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech, and he is directly involved in training the football team. Gentry also supervises the sports nutrition and sport psychology programs.

Joined VT Staff: 1987; 25th season.

Record at Virginia Tech: Gentry was inducted into the USA Strength and Conditioning Coaches Hall of Fame in 2010. He was named the second-annual Samson Strength & Conditioning Coach of the Year in the March 2005 issue of American Football Monthly.

In May 2003, Gentry was honored by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches when he was named a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach. Gentry is currently one of only 36 coaches in the country to have received the CSCC's highest award. In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year.

Prior to Virginia Tech: Gentry worked as an assistant strength coach at UNC and as the head strength coach at East Carolina University prior to coming to Virginia Tech in February 1987.

Education: Western Carolina, 1979 (physical education); UNC Chapel Hill, 1981 (master's degree); Virginia Tech, 1999 (doctorate; curriculum and instruction with emphasis in motor behavior).

Family: Gentry has a son, Roy Christopher (Bo), 21, a member of the Hokie football team. Gentry is married to the former Wendy Ann Williams.



Sport Psychology

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett works to serve the needs of Tech student-athletes. He is also employed at the Cook Counseling Center on campus.

The sport psychology department offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with a sport psychologist and other injured athletes and talk about the recovery process. On average, Bennett conducts 30 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

DR. GARY BENNETT SPORT PSYCHOLOGIST Responsibilities: Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team buliding, communication and performance enhancement. Bennett has taught and supervised predoctoral level interns. Joined VT Staff: 2000 (Full time since 2007); 12th year. Record at Virginia Tech: Bennett began working at Virginia Tech in 1995 at the Cook Counseling Center. Now, as the sport psychologist, he also serves on the committees for nutrition,

He is certified as a sport psychology consultant by the Association of Applied Sport Psychology and is a member of Division 47 (Exercise and Sport Psychology) of the American Psychology Association.

Personal: Bennett lives in Blacksburg and enjoys playing golf and basketball, as well as hiking and skiing, in his spare time.

Sports Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program in July of 2002. Jennie Schafer is the department's director of sports nutrition.

The nutrition program offers individual and team education to student-athletes concerned with lean muscle gain, fat loss, dining hall eating, eating for energy and other performance issues.

It offers student-athletes the opportunity to use the Bod Pod, which measures body composition (body fat and lean body mass percentages). Research shows that lean muscle mass increases athletic performance, so the machine helps student-athletes reach their potential.

Student-athletes also have other resources available to them, including the Nutrition Oasis, which provides recovery drinks, fruit and bagels, and Quick and Easy Recipe Books, which are designed to help student-athletes shop for healthy foods.

The nutrition staff provides educational materials as well and is available for one-on-one consultations with student-athletes regarding their nutrition needs and goals.



SPORTS MEDICINE

Providing the Hokies with Experienced, Professional Care

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidenced by its participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection (MRSA), high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies. Research is considered instrumental to the sports medicine department. The department has participated in several projects with the engineering department and school of education, respectively.

Tech is entering its ninth full year in the 4.300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room, which consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is topof-the-line equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer. In 2010, Reynolds again helped Tech spearhead another 3,000-square-foot expansion of the training room that will be completed by 2013.

The Ferrell Training Room nearly doubled the size of the former Merryman Center facility. Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The \$10 million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physician's suite. The suite is equipped with a new state-of-the-art X-ray system, a fluoroscopy unit and a minor procedure room. The training room also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities.

As of August 2009, the Sports Medicine facilities now include a 1,600-square-foot athletic training room in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center. This training room is the center of activity for treatment, rehabilitation and injury prevention for Tech's basketball program. Always on the cutting edge of technology and health care for its student-athletes, the facility includes hot and cold tubs, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot and cold packs, massage units, physician exam areas and an Alter G treadmill that utilizes state of the art technology to allow recovering athletes to walk and run at a fraction of their body weight, enhancing their rehabilitation and allowing them to stay in shape while they are out of competition. Virginia Tech is one of only a handful of NCAA programs to implement the Alter G into the sports medicine program.

Athletes have many options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine

staff takes great pride in treating athletes yearround. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. The staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program that is followed over a nine-week period between the end of the season and the beginning of spring

practice. This same procedure is followed during the summer.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the LewisGale Hospital at Montgomery's SWVA Center for Orthopaedics and various specialty services offered through HCA Southwest Virginia and its affiliated hospitals.

"We are privileged to have access to the finest physicians and services that HCA has at its disposal," said Goforth. "It is comforting knowing

> that our local hospital has the best care available in this region of the country for our studentathletes."

> If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen in the Ferrell Training Room by physical therapists Chris Rogers and Erin Gibson, both of whom play a large role in the overall program developed to return an injured athlete to 100 percent. Team chiropractor, Dr. Greg Tilley, provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions and plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

> Team orthopaedic surgeons Dr. Marc Siegel and Dr. James Farmer bring a wealth of experience and skill to assist when athletes need orthopaedic consultation for certain types of sports-related injuries.





Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 59th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 122 national championships, including 65 in women's competition and 57 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 140 times in men's competition and 99 times in women's action.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC is unrivaled in NCAA annals. With Duke's victory over Butler in the 2010 NCAA title game, ACC teams have won five of the last 11 NCAA National Championships and 12 overall, including eight over the last 21 years.

The ACC, with Duke, North Carolina and Florida State, was the only conference to have three teams make it to the "Sweet 16" in this past year's NCAA Tournament.

No conference has compiled a better NCAA Tournament record than the ACC. Since the inaugural tournament in 1939, league teams have posted an NCAA Tournament-best mark of 355-179 for a sterling .665 winning percentage against the nation's toughest competition.

The ACC is the only conference to have each of its teams make at least one NCAA Tournament appearance over the past five years.

Since 1985, the ACC has produced 24 Final Four teams, an average of almost one per year and six more than any other conference. The ACC has had at least one team in the Final Four in 19 of the last 23 years.

Since the NCAA Tournament was expanded to 64 teams in 1985, ACC teams have compiled a 251-126 (.666) NCAA record, including 69 "Sweet 16" appearances and 24 Final Four berths – all NCAA Tournament bests. Since 1985, 70 of the 137 ACC teams receiving NCAA berths have won at least two NCAA Tournament games.

North Carolina's Tar Heels lead all ACC schools with five NCAA basketball championships to their credit. Duke is next with four national titles, followed by NC State with two and Maryland one. The Tar Heels claimed

NCAA titles in 1957, 1982, 1993, 2005 and 2009, while the Blue Devils won their fourth title in 2010, following earlier championships in 2001, 1992 and 1991. The Wolfpack walked away with the coveted crown in 1974 and 1983 while the Terps claimed the 2002 national title.

The ACC has 10 or more NCAA Tournament wins 13 times overall, and the league has not posted a losing record in NCAA Tournament play since 1987. The conference's 24-year non-losing streak in NCAA Tournament play is tops among all conferences.

Since 1981, the ACC has produced 39 consensus All-Americans - 15 more than any other conference and has accounted for 25 percent of the nation's consensus All-Americans (39-of-159).

Seven of the last 15 and nine of the last 19 consensus National Players of the Year have been from the ACC. Since 1975, the ACC has had 16 consensus National Players of the Year – 12 more than any other conference. In addition, nine of the ACC's 16 National Players of the Year were unanimous selections.

A year ago the ACC had 57 players on NBA rosters. In addition, over the past six years 54 ACC players have made their NBA debuts, including an all-time high 15 in 2006.

In this past June's 2010 NBA draft, the ACC had five first round selections and seven players drafted overall. The ACC has had five-or-more first round selections in four of the past five years and has had at least one first-round pick in 23 consecutive NBA drafts. Since 1986, the ACC has had 98 first round selections - 15 more than any other conference.

With two teams – Duke (3), North Carolina (7) – listed in the final Associated Press ranking, the ACC extended its streak to 51 consecutive seasons with at least one team ranked in the top 10 of the final AP Poll.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference conducts championship competition in 25 sports – 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field



hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

YEAR IN REVIEW

ACC schools captured two national team titles during the 2010-11 academic year. Maryland captured the national title in women's field hockey and Virginia claimed the crown in men's lacrosse. Overall, the ACC has totaled 52 national team titles over the last 14 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 29 of the past 31 years.

A total of 132 ACC teams participated in NCAA post-season competition in 2010-11. League teams were 125-79-5 (.610) in NCAA championship competition.

The ACC was the only conference in America to place four schools - Duke (5th), North Carolina (6th), Virginia (7th) and Florida State (10th) - in the final Top 10 of the 2010-11 Learfield Director's Cup Standings. ACC History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

A SUCCESS STORY

In recent years, Virginia Tech's athletic programs have grown immensely and are on an escalating path to success. For the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference – a move that has already helped the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger. Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle. Prior to joining the ACC, Virginia Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference starting in 1991, and a member of the BIG EAST in all other sports except wrestling from 2001 to 2004.

Tech's nationally known football program has had unprecedented success for nearly two decades, recently participating in its 18th-straight bowl game. In 2010, the Hokies won 10 games for the seventh-consecutive season. The Tech football team captured the ACC Championship in back-to-back seasons in 2007 and 2008 after taking the title in 2004, its inaugural season in the league. The Hokies added another league title in 2010. The Hokies also won BIG EAST Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

The Hokie baseball program broke out a

record season in 2010, earning national top-25 rankings for the first time since 1992 and posting seven wins over top-10 teams. The Hokies' season ended with a loss to South Carolina in the NCAA Regional at Columbia, S.C. Subsequently, a school-record seven Hokies were chosen in the 2010 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

During the 2010-2011 season, the men's basketball team advanced to the NIT for the fourth-straight year, after a huge victory over No. 1 Duke at Cassell Coliseum. Led by AP All-American Malcolm Delaney, the Hokies finished with a 22-12 record. The women's basketball team has advanced to the postseason 12 times in the past 17 years.


In 2005, Spyridon Jullien won NCAA titles in the indoor weight throw and the outdoor hammer throw, bringing the school its first-ever NCAA championships in any sport. A year later as a senior, Jullien won both titles again, and during the 2009 outdoor season Tech's Marcel Lomnicky won the national title in the hammer. The women's track and field team won back-to-back titles in both the 2007 and 2008 Indoor and Outdoor ACC Championships. In 2010, hurdler Queen Harrison, who participated in the 2008

Olympic Games, captured the NCAA Indoor Championship in the 60-meter hurdles. A large contingent of Hokies from the men's and women' track & field teams participated in the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Harrison made NCAA history when she won both the 100- and 400-meter hurdle events, marking the first time a woman has swept both hurdles events in the same NCAA national meet. Tech's women's and men's squads finished fifth and 10th, respectively, in the team standings.

In 2010-11, the track team continued their success, as Alexander Ziegler and Dorotea Habazin won the men's and women's hammer throw in the outdoor championship. In all, the

women's team finished in fifth place, highest ever for a Hokie track team and a total of 12 athletes between the two programs earned first and second team All-America honors in the outdoor season after Tech gained four All-Americas in the indoor championship.

The men's soccer program advanced to the NCAA College Cup for the first time in history



Head volleyball coach Chris Rlley led the Hokies and senior Felicia Willoughby (15) to NCAA Tournament competition in 2010.




in 2007, while the women's soccer program earned its first Sweet 16 appearance in 2009, and collected its third-consecutive NCAA Tournament bid in 2010. The Virginia Tech volleyball team earned its first-ever NCAA Tournament bid in 2010.

In 2001, the Hokie golf team won a nation's best six tournaments, including the BIG EAST Golf Championship, and went on to record an

eighth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Golf Championship. In 2007, the Hokies tied for the ACC tournament title and this spring the Tech squad is competing in an NCAA Regional for the fifth consecutive season, hosting the event at the Pete Dye River Course of Virginia Tech. In 2007, the women's softball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the third straight year and made its first appearance at the Women's College World Series. Led by National Player of the Year, Angela Tincher, Tech posted back-to-back ACC Tournament titles.

Many individuals have also participated in NCAA postseason competition in recent years, including Hokies from wrestling, tennis, swimming, golf, cross country and track & field. The men's and women's swimming and diving programs sent a combined seven athletes to the NCAA Championships in 2009-2010, coming home with two individual All-Americans and an Honorable Mention All-America Relay Team in the 800 freestyle. The wrestling team finished the 2010-11 season ranked sixth nationally, with three conference champions and a 20-4 dual meet record, while the men's tennis team made its fifth straight appearance in NCAA postseason competition.

A University Inventing the Future

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved from 132 students and two programs of study at its founding in 1872 into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With approximately 31,000 students in Blacksburg and statewide, the university provides a challenging academic environment that produces world-class scholarship. The university is firmly rooted in its motto, Ut Prosim (That I May Serve), and its historic land-grant mission of learning, discovery, and engagement.

LEARNING

Virginia Tech's academic excellence attracts high-achieving students. More degree programs – approximately 215 graduate and undergraduate – are available through the university's eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources & Environment, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School than at any other university in the commonwealth. In addition, 96 percent of all departments offer e-learning courses, including 35 graduate degree and certificate programs.

DISCOVERY

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures exceeding \$400 million, Virginia Tech ranks in the top 50 research universities in the United States. Boasting more than 100 research centers, the university also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and in the top 15 in the number of patents issued each year. Tech's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in thousands of research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and human health, and from transportation to computing information and wireless technology. In addition, the Virginia Tech Corporate Research Center nurtures entrepreneurs pursuing new inventions and developments.

ENGAGEMENT

Virginia Tech nurtures a multitude of economic and community development projects not only locally and statewide, but around the world. Many of these efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live.

Professionals, organizations, and communities depend on Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise,

and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers located throughout the commonwealth. The university has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques to meet the needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.

The Inn at Virginia Tech and Skelton Conference Center on campus and The Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center in Roanoke, both owned by Virginia Tech, support the university's outreach mission by working with faculty to plan and host conferences and continuing education and professional programs.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$92 million in funded economic development projects in 44 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2010-11, more than 2,250 students from more than 100 foreign countries studied at Tech, while 1,200 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for nearly a century. With city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.

CHARLES W. STEGER

University President

Now in his 12th year as President of Virginia Tech, Dr. Charles Steger continues to hit milestones he laid out to establish Virginia Tech among the nation's premier research institutions. Steger has provided visionary leadership in the creation and implementation of a bold vision and strategic plan, with a demand for quality across all aspects of the academic enterprise.

Under Steger's leadership, the university has expanded the campus buildings more than any university president adding more than 2 million square feet of research, classroom, and athletic facilities, most recently in Northern Virginia. Although Tech has offered educational opportunities in the National Capital Region for more than 40 years, it cemented its regional footprint with opening of the Virginia Tech Research Center Arlington in May. This 144,000 sq. ft. building places the university in close proximity to its many federal government sponsors.

One of the most exciting new initiatives to become reality is the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine and Research Institute, which is housed in a new 152,000-square-foot building in Roanoke. The school admitted its inaugural class in August 2010 and began staffing and outfitting labs in the research institute later that autumn.

Among the highlights of his presidency to date are the university's adoption of the Principles of Community (2005) and the Virginia Tech Climate Action Commitment (2009). In the minds of many, Steger will best be remembered for making the impossible a reality. He will be forever credited with negotiating Virginia Tech's entrance into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004 – a 50-year dream-come-true for Hokie fans.

Another initiative on the horizon is the new Center for the Arts that will open in the fall of 2013. This 130,000-square-foot facility will feature a 1,300-seat performance hall, visual art galleries, and innovative creative technology lab spaces. At the intersection of North Main Street and Alumni Mall, its location symbolizes the university's commitment to the arts and its importance to the university and the broader community.

Since Steger became president, the university's annual research expenditures have increased 300 percent, now topping \$400 million. According to the National Science Foundation (NSF), Virginia Tech ranks 44th out of 679 universities in the nation in sponsored research, the only Virginia university in the top 50.

A hallmark of Steger's administration is

his commitment to the students. With his leadership, the university has reaffirmed its core mission of undergraduate education. The university is dedicated to fostering a researchintensive environment that offers students an opportunity to learn the scientific process while enhancing their critical-thinking skills. Recognizing that graduates will be entering a global economy, Virginia Tech initiated a comprehensive International Strategic Plan and has doubled the number of students participating in international education opportunities.

Steger was as a recipient of the 2010 Michael P. Malone International Leadership Award, sponsored by the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. During his presidency, five international centers have been established around the globe, and another is being developed in India.

The university concludes this year an aggressive \$1 billion fundraising campaign to "invent the future" and provide the university with a margin of excellence for its academic agenda. Today, private support from Virginia Tech's alumni and friends continues to play an essential role in this university community.

Steger received his Bachelor of Architecture degree, Master of Architecture degree, and Ph.D. in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech. His passion for teaching led him to leave a career in the private sector as a professional architect and planner to return to Virginia Tech to teach in the College of Architecture and Urban Studies (CAUS). When he became Dean in 1981 at the age of 33, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation. After 12 years in that role, he was appointed Vice President for Development and University Relations (1993-2000) before being named President in 2000.

Steger is a Fellow in the American Institute of Architects (AIA) and holds the William C. Noland Award and the Distinguished Achievement Award from the Virginia Society AIA. The New Century Technology Council awarded him its 2004 Compass Award for visionary thinking and leadership in the field of information technology.

Credited with calm leadership during a very difficult period, President Steger led the university through an extended recovery period in the aftermath of the April 2007 tragedy.

In 2009, President Steger received the Chief Executive Leadership Award from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) District III for outstanding leadership and service in support of education.



PRINCIPLES OF COMMUNITY

Virginia Tech is a public land-grant university, committed to teaching and learning, research and outreach to the commonwealth of Virginia, the nation and the world community. Learning from the experiences that shape Virginia Tech as an institution, we acknowledge those aspects of our legacy that reflected bias and exclusion. Therefore, we adopt and practice the following principles as fundamental to our on-going efforts to increase access and inclusion and to create a community that nurtures learning and growth for all of its members:

We affirm the inherent dignity and value of every person and strive to maintain a climate for work and learning based on mutual respect and understanding.

We affirm the right of each person to express thoughts and opinions freely. We encourage open expression within a climate of civility, sensitivity and mutual respect.

We affirm the value of human diversity because it enriches our lives and the university. We acknowledge and respect our differences while affirming our common humanity.

We reject all forms of prejudice and discrimination, including those based on age, color, disability, gender, national origin, political affiliation, race, religion, sexual orientation and veteran status. We take individual and collective responsibility for helping to eliminate bias and discrimination and for increasing our own understanding of these issues through education, training and interaction with others.

We pledge our collective commitment to these principles in the spirit of the Virginia Tech motto of *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve).

JIM WEAVER

Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 66, was appointed on Sept. 24, 1997, and has been a tireless leader on behalf of Tech athletics. His efforts were recognized in 2009 when he accepted the prestigious John L. Toner Award, which is presented annually by the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame. The award is given to a director of athletics who has demonstrated superior administrative abilities and shown outstanding dedication to college athletics and particularly college football.

In his 14 years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes. Under his leadership, the athletics department entered into a comprehensive agreement with NIKE beginning in 2007-08 which provides uniforms, clothing and equipment for all Virginia Tech varsity teams over an eight-year period. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet. The Monogram Club was revitalized in 1998 and provides several benefits to former Hokie athletes, trainers and managers.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the continuing improvement of Tech's facilities. Progress is evident in a number of new facilities now in use or currently under construction.

A new football locker room and lounge has been constructed adjacent to Jamerson Athletic Center. The three-story building was completed in 2010 and features a spacious locker room for players and coaches, as well as a lounge on the second floor and a wrestling facility on the third floor. The vacated space in Jamerson is being renovated to provide expanded weight training, sports medicine and locker room facilities for Olympic sport teams.

The remodeling of Lane Stadium's west side was completed in time for Tech's 2006 home opener. It involved the construction of additional new luxury suites, a new President's area, four private club seating areas, a ticket office, athletic fund offices, a memorabilia area and a new student academic services area.

Tech's basketball staffs and teams moved into their new practice facility in 2009. The \$20 million building boasts two practice gyms, a 3,000 square-foot basketball weight room, coaches' offices, film rooms and locker rooms.

Weaver presided over Tech's move into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004-05, when Virginia Tech and Miami were officially introduced as the 10th and 11th members of the ACC, effective July 1, 2004. Weaver renegotiated Tech's multimedia rights contract with IMG College, creating an agreement which went into effect in 2008-09 and extends for 10 years to provide enhanced revenue for the athletics department. In the Fall of 2000, Weaver arranged a joint venture with IMG to commit \$2 million to purchase new scoreboards, upgrade sound systems, install an L.E.D. video display screen at Lane Stadium (which was enlarged for the 2005 season) and place two wall-mount L.E.D. video screens in Cassell Coliseum.

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Weaver brings a "Penn State mentality" to the position. He says that various schools' interest in him as a reformer through the years can be traced to Penn State and its reputation for how it conducts business in intercollegiate athletics.

It was with the Nittany Lions' football team that Weaver first made a name for himself in athletics. He was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was recruited to Penn State by Engle. He played three seasons under Engle and one under Paterno, who is still the coach of the Nittany Lions.

"I learned a lot from Joe Paterno," Weaver says. "One thing he said certainly has stuck with me. 'You either get better or you get worse. You never stay the same.'"

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation



education. He received a master's in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver started a coaching career as an assistant at Penn State for six seasons. During that time, the Lions played in five bowl games – the Cotton, Gator, Sugar and Orange (twice).


He later was the offensive coordinator at Iowa State and head coach for one season at Villanova in 1974. He also spent five years as an assistant professor at Clarion State and three years as director of franchise sales at Athletic Attic.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletics director.

Weaver drew rave reviews at UNLV for his fund-raising expertise. He generated nearly \$15 million in his time there and built a new athletic complex.

While at Western Michigan, Weaver announced creation of a \$7 million football center, stabilized fluctuating revenues and installed a CHAMPS Life Skills program.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons – Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.



PRESS SERVICES

The Virginia Tech Athletics Communications Office will be available throughout the 2011-12 basketball season to accommodate any media requests. Following are some guidelines that will make it easier for media members to cover the Virginia Tech men's basketball team. Any additional questions should be directed to Bill Dyer, athletics communications director for men's basketball.

PRESS CREDENTIALS

Once again this season, Virginia Tech will use an on-line credentialing system. This will be a different system this season, but will be the same system used for football credentials. Email Bill Dyer at wdyer@vt.edu for instructions.

Requests for press credentials are screened with care to ensure a working press row. Traditional print, television and radio (media agency) regularly assigned to cover Virginia Tech and the visiting school, as well as national news-gathering agencies, will receive first priority. Credentials for on-line Internet sites will be granted to Virginia Tech operated Web sites, the visiting team's official Web site and the Atlantic Coast Conference's official Web site.

Any abuse of a working credential will result in the media agency losing credential privileges.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS

The NCAA has established a control policy to keep the court free from congestion. Only photographers on assignment and members of the television media are given photo credentials. Free-lance or amateur photographers will not be issued credentials. Accredited photographers may work along the playing floor at both ends behind the restriction line established by the NCAA. Permission to install strobe lighting must be made, in writing, to Bill Dyer, athletics communications director for men's basketball, at least 10 days in advance of the game. Photographers should follow the same credentialing system as listed above.

ADDITIONAL ACCREDITATION GUIDELINES

- Only full-time, salaried employees intending to provide actual game coverage may receive a credential.
- A requesting media agency must represent a collective, organizational editorial voice, not simply the offerings of a single individual.
- Membership in a writers' association does not automatically qualify an agency for credentials.

- A media agency may assign one of its credentials to its on-line entity.
- An on-line entity, not associated with a traditional media agency, may qualify for one credential, subject to the following conditions:

An on-line entity may receive a credential only if its own full-time staff writes a majority percentage of that site's own material.

On-line entities that focus primarily on Virginia Tech athletics and also sponsor message boards or chat rooms may receive credentials provided they adhere to a policy that requires that a posted message or opinion is identified with the actual name and city of the individual.

Any on-line service that is recognized as an outlet intended primarily for the purpose of delivering news related to the recruitment of student-athletes will not qualify for credentials.

On-line entities will not receive photography credentials.

On-line entities (other than those identified above) registering 20,000 legitimate unique users per month in each of the past 12 months will be given first consideration.

"Real-time" transmission of digital images, audio and data, including live game play-by-play and statistics, of any home game is the exclusive property of Virginia Tech and/or its rights holder(s). "Real-time" is defined as "live continual coverage or description of an event."

The Atlantic Coast Conference has adapted an Internet Real-Time Policy. Virginia Tech adheres to this policy.

MEDIA WILL CALL

In most cases, credentials will be mailed. Credentials may be picked up the day before a game from secretary Donna Smith in the Athletics Communications Office. Credentials not mailed or picked up will be held at the Will Call Window located at the front entrance to Cassell Coliseum.

PARKING

Media parking is extremely limited. Parking is available in the lot across from Cassell Coliseum. The entrance to this lot is on Spring Road. Requests for parking credentials should be made using the on-line credentialing system.

AT THE GAME

Cassell Coliseum is the site of Hokie home basketball games. There is no smoking permitted in Cassell Coliseum. The working press area is located courtside on the main floor. Both radio groups will be seated on press row. Virginia Tech grants broadcast rights to the official radio outlet of the visiting team on a reciprocal basis. Student radio stations wishing to broadcast games from Cassell Coliseum must make arrangements through Bill Dyer at least 10 days in advance. Space is not guaranteed for student stations, due to space limitations.

GAME SERVICES

The Virginia Tech Athletics Communications Office will be at your service throughout the game. All media will be provided game programs, rosters, press guides and other pertinent information. Statistics will be available at halftime and at the conclusion of the game. Information provided includes play-by-play and individual and team statistics in standard NCAA box score format and a shot chart. A pregame meal is served, starting approximately one and one-half hours before tip-off in the Bowman Room, and refreshments are available throughout the game. Members of the media work in a modern press room, located on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum, down the hall and to the left from the court entrance. This press room houses both the working press area and the post-game interview room. Only credentialed members of the media will be allowed in this work room. There are phone lines available on a first-come, first-served basis. There is also complimentary wireless ethernet available in the press room and on press row. Please contact a member of the athletics communications staff for log-on information.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The Virginia Tech locker room is closed to the media. In accordance with ACC by-laws, requested players will be made available to the media following a 10-minute cooling off period in the player lounge, inside the Bill Foster Basketball Suite. Coach Seth Greenberg and the visiting coach will hold postgame press conferences in the interview room. The visiting coach will go first, followed by Coach Greenberg after his post-game radio interview. Media access to visiting players will be determined by the visiting media relations contact.

INTERVIEW POLICY

Virginia Tech's coaches and players will be available throughout the season for interviews by members of the news media. It is important, however, that all requests for player interviews be made through the Athletics Communications Office at (540) 231-8852. Please allow at least 24 hours notice for a request. Media members wishing to get video footage of practice

should contact the Athletics Communications Office at least 24 hours prior the practice to be attended. Practices will be open to the media at the discretion of the men's basketball staff. Not all players are available on any given day. As in years past, freshman members of the Virginia Tech basketball team will not be available to the media until post-game interviews of the first game of the regular season.

Mid-week interviews will take place one day per week. That day, which will change from week-to-week, will be announced on Sunday. All interviews will take place in the multi-purpose room on the second floor of the practice facility or in the media room of Cassell Coliseum, depending upon the basketball practice schedule for that given day. Please contact the Athletics Communications Office for more details.

When demand occurs during the season, there will be teleconferences with Coach Greenberg and selected players.



That familiar refrain — delivered by Bill Roth, the Voice of Virginia Tech basketball — opens every Tech sports broadcast and reflects the network's goal of reaching Hokie fans across the region. So, whether they're sailing off Virginia's eastern shore, hiking in the Blue Ridge Mountains, or sitting in their homes anywhere in the commonwealth, Tech fans know they're always within range of a Virginia Tech IMG Sports Network radio station.

Again during the 2011-2012 season, the Tech network includes an impressive list of both AM and FM radio stations that blanket the region, giving Tech basketball tremendous exposure throughout Virginia and surrounding states. Many of the mid-Atlantic region's most popular and powerful radio stations carry Tech basketball broadcasts, including 106.7-The Fan, WJFK-FM in Washington, D.C., Newsradio 790 WNIS in Norfolk, WRNL and WRVA in Richmond, and powerful WSNV-FM in Roanoke. They join more than thirty other strong affiliates that blast Tech basketball broadcasts to fans throughout the region both day and night.

In addition, Tech basketball broadcasts can be heard on SiriusXM Satellite Radio and on-line through the Hokies' All-Access package.

The Virginia Tech IMG Sports Network also produces Tech Talk LIVE!, a weekly radio talk show which airs on stations throughout the region, featuring Roth and Tech coach Seth Greenberg every Monday night from 7-8 p.m. Tech Talk LIVE! originates from Bull & Bones Brewhaus and Grill In Blacksburg. Fans are welcome to attend in person every Monday night.

The network's weekly television magazine show, Virginia Tech Sports Today, airs every Sunday on a number of TV stations and cable networks throughout Virginia and the southeastern United States. The show includes weekly highlights and previews, focusing on Tech basketball.

Roth — who has been named Virginia's Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association a record eight times — is in his 24th season as the Voice of Virginia Tech's football and basketball teams. A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Roth graduated from Syracuse University in 1987, earning a degree in broadcast journalism and winning the Bob Costas Scholarship as an undergrad. Roth, who was inducted into Virginia Tech's Monogram Club in 2000 and the Richmond Hokie Club Hall of Fame In 2008, is on the Board of Directors of the Montgomery County United Way, serves as an advisor for the Sigma Chi Fraternity on Tech's campus, and is a frequent public speaker at Hokie Club and various philanthropic events around the commonwealth.

Virginia Tech Hall of Famer Mike Burnop is in his 16th season as the analyst on Tech men's basketball broadcasts. Following each game, Mike also handles player interviews from inside Tech's locker room. The colorful Burnop, and his wife Ellen, own and operate New River Office Supply stores throughout the region. Burnop, a native of Salem, Va., has served as the analyst on the Tech football network for the past 29 seasons. He was a starting tight end for the Hokies in the early 1970s and was inducted into Virginia Tech's Hall of Fame in 2000. Mike is active with Special Olympics Virginia and the Blacksburg Rotary Club. He is a popular speaker at events throughout Virginia.

Together, Roth and Burnop comprise one of college athletics' longest-running broadcasting teams, having described the action of Tech games dating back to the 1988 season.

Adam Witten is in his sixth year as scoreboard host for Tech men's basketball broadcasts. Witten's

responsibilities include anchoring the pre-game, halftime and postgame shows during Tech radio broadcasts. Additionally, he has filled in to bring fans the play-byplay of Tech basketball broadcasts. A native of Sarasota, Fla., Witten graduated magna cum laude from Witten Appalachian State University in



Boone, N.C., in 2004 with a degree in electronic media/broadcasting.


