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# Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium

Completed in the fall of 2003, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg. The stadium is the home to the men's soccer team. It provides an excellent venue for men's soccer matches and should be filled to near-capacity this fall as the Hokies serve as the host for seven home matches, including four ACC matches.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system that can be drained and ready for play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 1,000 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games. On Friday, Nov. 21,

2003, the Virginia Tech men's soccer team served as the host for a first-round game of the NCAA Soccer Tournament, where a record-breaking 2,263 Hokie faithful witnessed Tech defeat Clemson.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. Fully-heated, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system and ethernet capability. The internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, [hokiesports.com](http://hokiesports.com), to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

While the stadium is open for full use at this time, additional construction of a restroom facility is planned for the future. After that phase is completed, a concession stand and additional seating will make the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium one of the best venues to watch the sport.



## MEDIA INFORMATION

**Information:** This media guide is intended to provide members of the media with an in-depth view of Virginia Tech men's soccer. Inside you will find coaches' bios, player bios, schedules and updated records for the 2004 season. Should you need any assistance in covering the Virginia Tech men's soccer team, please contact Brent C. Hager in the Sports Information Office.

**Media Services:** Media members are encouraged to contact the sports information office for any story ideas, stats, records, or help in accurately covering the Hokies.

**Press Box:** The Sandy D. Thompson press box is located on the opposite side of the field from the grandstand, in between the team benches. Additional space, including a film area, is located on top of the grandstand. No media pass is needed to enter the press box.

**Match Services:** Media members covering a Virginia Tech men's soccer match are encouraged to contact the sports information office at least 24

hours in advance. Space is extremely limited in the press box. Also, radio stations broadcasting for the visiting team need to contact the SID office at least three days prior to playing at Virginia Tech to ensure that phone lines and ethernet lines are secured.

**Statistics:** Media members will be provided with box scores immediately after a match. The press box has an ethernet line for Internet use should any media need to send stories or photos.

**Interviews:** Media members MUST contact the SID contact to arrange interviews with players and coaches. No interviews will be allowed without at least 24 hours advance notice. At no time will a student-athlete's home phone number be given out.

**Hokies' online:** The SID office compiles weekly notes for men's soccer. They can be accessed through the athletic department's official site, [hokiesports.com](http://hokiesports.com). Also, media and fans can access the latest news and stats on the Hokies at that site.

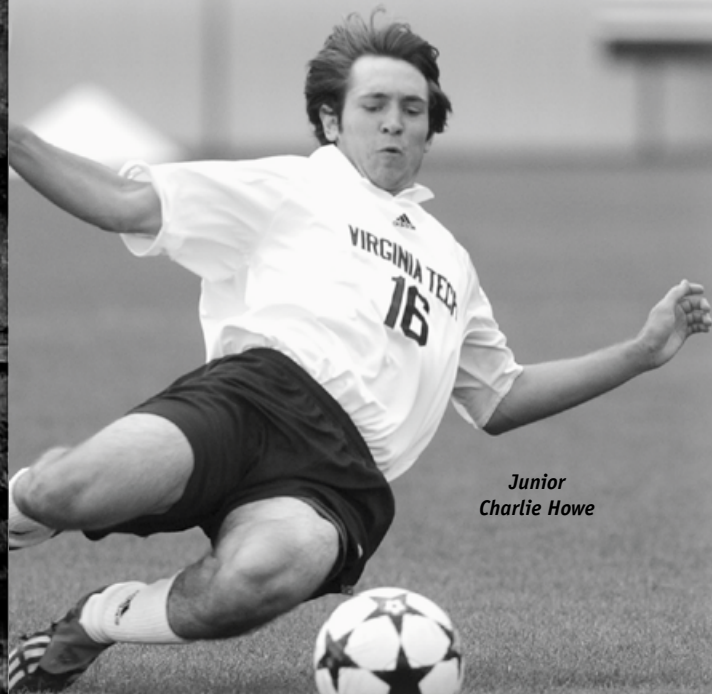
# 2004 OUTLOOK

*Younger Hokie team looking to better last year's record-breaking season as Tech begins play in the ACC*

Optimism abounds in the world of Virginia Tech soccer. Third-year head coach Oliver Weiss only loses three starters off an NCAA second round team. Ten promising newcomers will join the team as the Hokies look for a little déjà vu with a return to the NCAA Tournament. As Tech moves into the always-tough Atlantic Coast Conference this year, the Hokies appear ready to challenge for conference and national prominence.

"Overall, the outlook is very rosy. We're coming off the most successful season in Virginia Tech soccer history, and that should motivate us to perform even better," said Weiss. "We did lose three impact players, but the newcomers and returnees will give us a great balance of youth and experience. We'll be younger, but better."

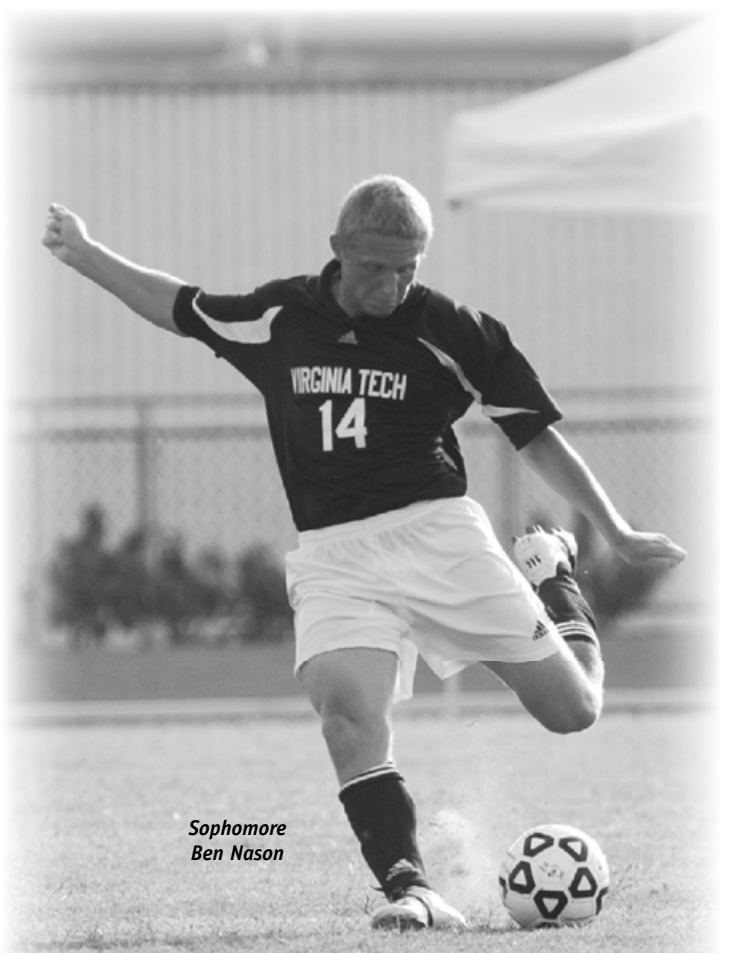
### Forwards

Weiss has big shoes to fill on the front line where he'll have the task of trying to replace leading goal scorer Bobby O'Brien's school-record tying 15 goals. However, several players can fill the gap. Redshirt senior co-captain, Ken Jonmaire (East Aurora, N.Y.), will be asked to take charge from day one. Jonmaire will look to improve on his 2003 output of six goals and two assists. Using his terrific leaping ability and short range shooting, Jonmaire should be dangerous in the air and from distance on the ground. Sophomore Scott Spangler (South Media, Pa.) should continue to come up big in important matches. His six goals last season all came in the clutch. Senior Peter Woody (Richmond, Va.) may see time as a forward this year as well. His great work ethic and pace can be an asset to the team. Sophomore Eric Vickers (Fort Worth, Texas) has been a positive addition with his three goals in 2003 and is expected to play on the right flank again either as a forward or midfielder.

The big question will be how quickly the new recruits can contribute to the Hokie attack. Marcus Reed scored 31 goals in his senior year for Hickory High in Chesapeake, Va. If he can be consistent in ACC competition, the Hokies would be quite happy. Gordon Bengtson (Newport, R.I.) set a New England Prep scoring record during his career. Coach Weiss hopes he can continue his streak in Blacksburg. Nick Norwood (Southlake, Texas) may add a scoring punch to the attack with his pace and poise. Kevin Edwards (Fredericksburg, Va.) will most likely play forward and in midfield, leaving his mark on the field with his dribbling, speed and terrific shooting. Brandon Miller (Knightdale, N.C.) is another player that will get a chance to showcase his skills in the attacking half of the field.

### Midfield

Lacking experienced midfield players is not a concern for Weiss this season. Six players who saw extensive playing time in 2003 return, along with several newcomers who could work their way into the lineup. The coaching staff knows it has a plethora of combinations to work with to solidify the midfield. Leading the way is sophomore Ben Nason (Stafford, Va.), the 2003 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year. He led the team with nine assists last year and has the ability to dominate the tempo of the game. Senior co-captain Bailey Allman (Virginia Beach, Va.) has the task of being the vocal and organizing leader on the field. His experience, tenacity and great work ethic should give him a spot in the midfield, from which he will be the backbone of the entire Hokie unit. Charlie Howe, a junior from Mechanicsville, Va., was voted the team's most improved player in 2003 and will have to bring his defensive skills to the table while competing for one of the midfield spots this year. Junior Greg Roach (Woodbridge, Va.) is expected to step up his minutes played as he has the ability to slip through defenses with his tricky dribbles. Sophomore Brent Dillie (Pittsburgh, Pa.) could play a midfield role or drop back to help on defense, depending on how quickly Weiss is rebuilding the losses of two defenders due to graduation. Dillie's vision and game intelligence should still cause problems to any 2003 opponents. Chad Steuck (Cary, N.C.), also a second year player, will renew his friendship with the left side of the field as he did a superb job in 2003, starting all 22 games as a freshman.

Two newcomers may add a different element to the Tech midfield this year. Icelandic junior national team member Magnus Einarsson may end up playing in front of the Hokie defense based on his wealth of experience in European "football." As an incoming graduate student, he will have to get to work quickly, since he only has two seasons of eligibility for the Maroon and Orange. Northwestern University transfer David Brown (Media, Pa.) has the credentials to add great creativity to the midfield lineup.

## Defense

With Academic All American and 2nd team All-BIG EAST selection Lasse Mertins, as well as 5th-year senior and "Ironman" Harold Russell gone from the Tech defense, some major reshuffling is due this fall. The spring season proved to be a nice building block to tinker with different players and lineups alike. Junior Dustin Dyer (Ashland, Va.) remains a constant on the right side of the defense. His powerful free kicks and tough marking skills make him a true asset on both sides of the ball. Second year players Bo Lawrence (Haymarket, Va.) and Keith Osborne (Manassas, Va.) showed improvements during the spring games and should make a case for their inclusion in the lineup this fall. Bo's technical ability and Keith's imposing 6-2 frame, combined with their speed should certainly help the team on the outside positions.

Two new faces should have a positive impact this season. Ian Taylor (Reston, Va.) enrolled in January at Tech and played in all of the spring matches. He claimed a spot during those games and is expected to

continue to excel in his first fall season for the Hokies. Bryan Collier (Fayetteville, Ga.) will challenge for a spot. Collier's speed and tenacity as one of Georgia's top prospects should help him see significant playing time.

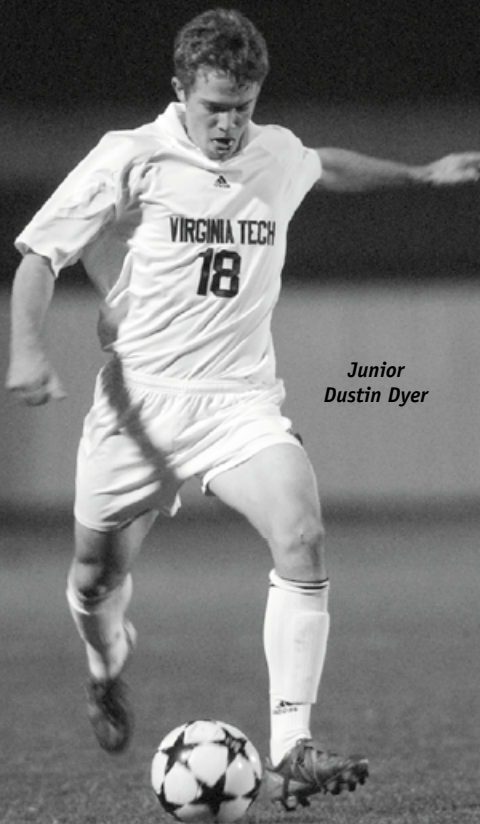
## Goalkeeping

In net, Tech appears to be solid as all-state junior goalkeeper Chase Harrison (Huntington, W. Va.) returns for his third season after posting a 1.13 goals against average with 5.5 shutouts last year. Sophomore Dustin Toth (Chesterfield, Va.) made great strides in the spring and will give Harrison a serious battle for the starting position. Newcomer Drew Czekanski (Westerville, Ohio) will add depth as he joins the Hokies for his first collegiate season.

## Schedule and Expectations

Tech is slated to face a challenging schedule that includes seven ACC matches. They will face Big Ten powers Penn State and Ohio State, both on the road, as well as 2003 NCAA Elite Eight participant Coastal Carolina. The Hokies have four other in-state rivals to compete against this season in addition to Virginia. This includes James Madison, Liberty, Radford, and William & Mary. The Virginia Tech Classic as well as three other tournaments should keep Hokie soccer fans happy, as they get to see two weekend games at each of these events. Seven of Tech's 2004 opponents made last year's NCAA Tournament.

"Our expectations are clear as usual. We want to be among the best teams in the ACC and in the nation. We want to get a seed in the NCAA Tournament this year and have a shot at the national title by advancing to the College Cup, which is soccer's version of the NCAA Final Four. We can only achieve these goals by working extremely hard, staying injury free, and playing against opponents who have similar goals," said Weiss.

# MEET THE COACHES



## Oliver Weiss

### Men's Soccer Coach

With two successful seasons behind him, Virginia Tech head coach Oliver Weiss embarks upon his third season in 2004 looking to elevate the Hokies into the upper echelon of the collegiate soccer world. After leading the Hokies to a school-record tying 14 wins and to the NCAA Tournament second round in 2003, Weiss has established himself as one of the most productive young coaches in collegiate soccer. Utilizing Weiss' attacking style, the Hokies set records for goals, points, shots and corner kicks while ranking among the nation's most prolific offensive teams last season. In his first year, in 2002, Weiss guided the Hokies to a 10-7-1 record, tying for seventh place in the conference with a 5-5-0 mark in BIG EAST play.

Before coming to Tech, Weiss served as the top assistant at the University of North Carolina from 1999-2001. During his three years in Chapel Hill, the team went 54-14-1 and earned a trip to the NCAA Tournament each season. In 2000, UNC captured the ACC championship and was seeded No. 1 in postseason play. In 2001, the Tar Heels won the national championship.

Weiss also served as an assistant at the College of William & Mary from 1996 to 1999, where he helped the Tribe to a 49-19-3 record and three trips to the national tournament. Before going to William & Mary, Weiss spent a year as an assistant at the University of New Hampshire.

Weiss began his coaching with a Richmond Under-10 team in 1988. A youth coaching career of eight years followed, producing eight consecutive Virginia State Cup championships, along with a Region 1 championship and a trip to the 1995 Snickers USYSA National Championships.

Weiss was selected as the 1990 and 1995 Virginia Youth Soccer Association Coach of the Year. In 1995, he was honored as the NSCAA East Region and the USYSA Region 1 Coach of the Year.

As a standout player at the University of Richmond, Weiss captained the team three out of his four years. He also earned All-Colonial Conference honors twice and South Atlantic honors once during his career with the Spiders. Weiss received his history degree from the university in 1988.

Weiss graduated from Central High School in High Point, N.C., in 1984. He was named North Carolina High School Player of the Year and earned All-America honors.

Weiss holds a USSF 'A' coaching license and a German Soccer Federation 'B' license. He is also the director of the Hokie Soccer Academy for Boys and the Junior Hokies Day Camp.

A native of Burgdorf (a suburb of Hannover), Germany, Weiss became a United States citizen in 2000. He and his wife, Peggy, have a daughter, Samantha, and a son, Max.

# Michael Brizendine

## Assistant Men's Soccer Coach

Michael Brizendine begins his first year with the men's soccer program. An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine will work with all

aspects of the Hokie program.

Brizendine joins the Hokie staff after a successful stint at Bridgewater College, a Division III program in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. He was also an assistant men's coach at Ferrum College in 1999.

He was the head men's coach at Bridgewater since 2001 and assisted with the men's and women's teams in 2000. Guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program, Brizendine led Bridgewater to a 25-10 mark over the past two seasons – a .714 winning percentage, which earned him the Coach of the Year award his last season.

Brizendine is working toward his master's degree in sports administration from James Madison.

He graduated from JMU in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in religion and a minor in business. He holds an Advanced National Coaching License from the NSCAA.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at JMU from 1995-98 and ended his career in the top six in career scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

He will also coach the local New River Rapids under-10 team during the upcoming season.



# John Sexton

## Assistant Men's Soccer Coach

John Sexton, a former standout goalkeeper for the Hokies, returned last season as a volunteer assistant coach in charge of the

Hokies' keepers. This season, Sexton was promoted to an assistant coach as he begins his second year with the program.

Sexton came back to Tech from Richmond, Va., where he served as the head goalkeeper coach/assistant coach for the Richmond Kickers PDL (Premier Development League) team in 2003. In addition, he was the head

goalkeeper coach for the Kickers Youth Club for two seasons, as well as the Richmond Super Y-League in 2003. He is currently serving as the head coach for the under-11 New River Rapids.

Sexton, who played for Tech from 1994-97, earned four letters as a goalkeeper. In his senior season, the Hokies were ranked as high as 14th nationally and set a school record for victories in a season (14). Sexton posted a 1.20 goals against average in his final season and is ranked sixth on Tech's career saves list.



# Michael Emenalo

## Volunteer Assistant Coach

Michael Emenalo, a former standout college player with extensive professional experience, joins the Hokie staff as a volunteer in 2004.

A native of Nigeria, he played four seasons at Boston University (1985-88). Emenalo led the Terriers to a 54-17-11 record over his four years, scoring 36 goals along with 32 assists. Emenalo was named All-New England all four seasons. He was inducted into the Boston University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

He played professionally in the first division in England and Belgium and was a member of the San Jose Clash MLS team in 1996 and 1997. In 1994, he represented Nigeria in the World Cup, giving him the distinction of being the only foreign player to play for a U.S. college and in the World Cup.

Michael will also coach the under-15 New River Rapids team during the upcoming season.

## By the way, what is a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

# This Is Virginia Tech

*A research university in action*

The top research institution in the commonwealth, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. Virginia's premier land-grant university, Virginia Tech has grown from a small college of 132 students into the largest institution of higher education in the state during its 132-year history.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has challenged the university to become one of the country's top 30 research institutions by the end of the decade. Tech is currently ranked 52nd in the nation.

Among recent research innovations, Tech teamed with Wake Forest University to establish the Virginia Tech-Wake Forest University School of Biomedical Engineering and Sciences to offer M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in biomedical engineering (BME) and to be the focus of collaborative research. The university's Virginia Bioinformatics Institute is leading the way in helping scientists merge computers and biotechnology to sort through complicated genetic material to speed research. And the university's partnership with the University of Virginia and Carilion Health System to form the Carilion Biomedical Institute is improving health care worldwide and increasing economic development opportunities in Southwest Virginia.

In other areas, Virginia Tech has one of the most comprehensive and successful programs to support state and local economic development, according to a study conducted by the Southern Growth Policies Board and funded in part by the National Science Foundation. The study report, Innovation U: New University Roles in a Knowledge Economy, named the



university as one of the nation's 12 most successful universities in terms of outreach, economic development and technology transfer practices.

Virginia Tech was established in 1872 as an all-male military school dedicated to the original land-grant mission of teaching agriculture and engineering. Today, the co-educational institution, which operates a

European studies center based in Switzerland and educational, research and outreach/Extension facilities throughout Virginia, has recognized programs in music, business, architecture and the humanities, as well as its traditional strengths in the sciences, engineering and technology.

While participation in the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets is now voluntary, the corps, which has approximately 700 cadets, remains a proud tradition of the university. Virginia Tech is one of only three public universities in the nation with a military component and a large civilian population.

Virginia Tech is organized into eight colleges — Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Science, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts and Human Sciences, Natural Resources and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, the colleges offer about 175 bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs to approximately 28,000 students, who hail from countries throughout the world.

The university's 2,600-acre main campus is home to more than 100 buildings, hundreds of research laboratories, the Donaldson Brown Hotel and Conference Center and an airport. Adjoining the campus is the 120-acre Corporate Research Center, home to more than 100 companies and 1,800 employees who take advantage of the university's research and faculty expertise. Within five miles of campus is a 1,700-acre research farm.

Virginia Tech follows the dictates of its motto, *Ut Prosim* ("That I May Serve"), focusing on its

## Outreach

Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of projects as part of its outreach mission. For example, it spawns economic development, helps global marketing efforts, investigates better uses for strip-mined land, helps clean the Chesapeake Bay and other state waterways, provides design and planning assistance to communities and directs reforestation in Senegal. University scientists developed the vaccine that is the standard for preventing brucellosis in cattle around the world.

Outreach efforts also focus on education and distance learning techniques — satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing and web-based courses, for example — to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students. Professionals, organizations and communities also tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise and research results through Continuing Education, which offers hundreds of programs annually.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural and social well-being for nearly 90 years. And while Extension has a long history of helping make America's agricultural powerhouse more productive and economical, it also does important work — from helping people learn healthy nutritional practices to counseling families in financial distress — in the state's urban as well as rural areas. With 107 city/county offices, and more than 61,000 volunteers, more than one million participants benefit annually from Extension's non-formal education. Extension has touched virtually every life in the state in some way.

land-grant missions of instruction, research and solving the problems of society through outreach and Extension activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, the university disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. It is a university that puts knowledge to work.

## Instruction

Eight colleges offer more degree programs than any other university in the state, with 62 undergraduate and 115 graduate programs. In addition, the university is one of the nation's leaders in integrating instructional technology into the curriculum, requiring all entering students to have a computer. The university's Math Emporium has been hailed as an innovative way to break the credit-for-contact model of classroom instruction.

## Research

With annual research expenditures of about \$232 million and more than 100 research centers, Virginia Tech consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and in the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's faculty and students are involved in more than 4,000 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to nanotechnology, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

# Virginia Tech's Athletic Success

*Move to the ACC should allow for even greater achievements and visibility for the Hokies*

Virginia Tech has a long and proud tradition in athletics, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. For the ever growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference — a move that is bound to help the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger.

Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle.

The recent success — and bright outlook — of Oliver Weiss' men's soccer program is only part of the story.

Tech's nationally-known football team has had unprecedented success over the past decade. The Hokies have played in 11 consecutive bowl games. The Tech football team won BIG EAST Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl. Last year, the Hokies won eight games and played in the Insight Bowl.

The women's basketball team has averaged 22 wins over the past seven seasons and has made seven consecutive postseason appearances, including advancing to the second round of the NAAs last year.

In 2001, the Hokie golf team won a nation's-best six tournaments, including the BIG EAST Golf Championship, and went on to record an eighth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Golf Championship. In two of the three previous years, the golf team repeated as BIG EAST champs and advanced to the NAAs.

Baseball, tennis and other Tech sports, as well as track and cross country athletes also enjoy success at the conference and NCAA levels.

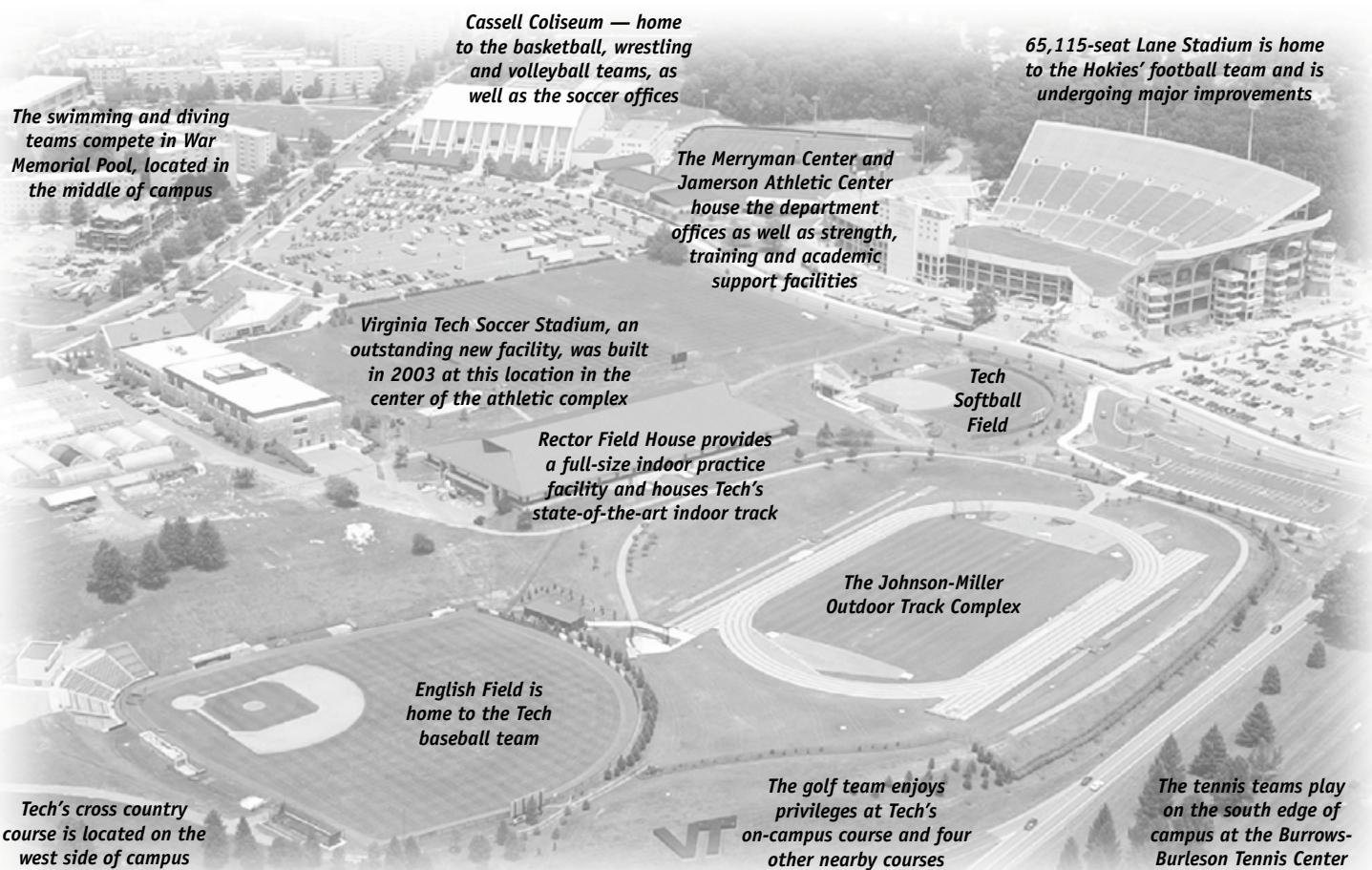

# Student Athlete Academic Support Services

*Providing the tools needed for success in the classroom*

The success of Virginia Tech's soccer program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 70 percent in 2003 as compared to the national average of 62 percent. The 70 percent student-athlete graduation rate marks the second straight year and five in the last 10 years that Tech has reached that level.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, Virginia Tech's student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the sixth consecutive record setting year, 482 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs during the 2003 calendar year. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

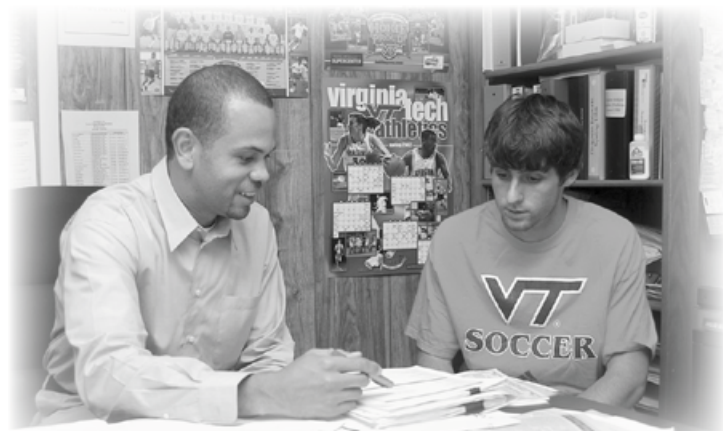
The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with university and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student athlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

- University and NCAA information
- Orientation
- Academic assessment
- The development of an effective student life program
- Appropriate referrals
- Monitored study environments
- Tutorial programs
- State of the art technological learning assistance
- Student Athlete academic performance evaluations

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area, adjacent to the SAASS office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab and its satellite sites house over 40 computers on the second floor and third floors of Cassell Coliseum. Laptop computers are also available

for Tech athletes to use when travelling to away contests. The athletic department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his sixth year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Drew Scales begins his third year with Student-Athlete Academic Support Services as an assistant director. Scales provides academic support for student-athletes in lacrosse, volleyball, men's and women's soccer and wrestling, in addition to overseeing the mentoring program.

Terrie Repass begins her 30th year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office secretary and "first contact" person for the SAASS. She is responsible for organizing special events and meetings for the office. Repass prepares all accounting, purchasing and travel transactions for the office.

# Athletics Office of Student Life

*Assisting in the development of the total person*

The Athletics Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech is committed to developing the total student-athlete. Megan Armbruster, Director of the Office of Student Life, is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through the programs that this office administers.

Last year, each athletic team was encouraged to complete two or more personal development workshops on a variety of different topics. Some subjects included How to Live Off-Campus, Media Relations, Alcohol 101 and Student-Athlete Scrutiny and Community Conduct. In addition, a Women's Sports Summit, attended by seven women's athletics teams, focused on issues such as healthy relationships and healthy body image.

In addition to workshops held by each team, Virginia Tech student-athletes participate in community outreach, with over 500 volunteer available opportunities just last year. Soccer players took trips to local hospitals and nursing homes, in addition to visiting numerous schools in Montgomery County. Players visited local high schools in November for American Education Week, middle schools in March for Read Across America Week and elementary schools in April for Winning Choices Week, impacting over 4,000 students.

A new outreach program, developed by the Office of Student Life, is the team community partners program, where each athletic team selects one local charity on which to focus their philanthropic efforts during the academic year. The soccer team has chosen to work on the Adopt-a-Highway program to help beautify the New River Valley.

Armbruster says, "The goal of our office is to provide students with the total college experience. When athletes graduate, I want them to look back and believe they had full access to a variety of opportunities while at Virginia Tech."

## Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (VT-SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport team who meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports and the department of athletics.

The SAAC encourages their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. The SAAC Representatives help to design and provide programs that encourage academic success, health promotion, social responsibility and general awareness.

Upon entering the Atlantic Coast Conference, one member of the VT-SAAC will be chosen to represent Virginia Tech at the ACC-SAAC. This year, the SAAC representative from the soccer team is junior goalkeeper Chase Harrison.

## Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, programs and workshops are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resume design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing, eRecruiting along with securing internships and co-ops during their college career. Last year, nearly 100 student-athletes attended the Student-Athlete Career Expo and 65 on-campus interviews were conducted as a result of the expo.



# Athletic Performance

*Virginia Tech has one of the nation's top programs*

## Strength & Conditioning

One of the most important aspects of a successful college soccer program is its strength and conditioning program. Before the lights come on and before the first goal is scored, college soccer players work on getting themselves physically prepared for the rigors of the season.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning

program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the soccer program one of the best as well.

One of the main support centers of Tech soccer is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies as they advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time last season.

Tech soccer players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie football player

and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletic Department. Men's soccer also uses the state-of-the-art new weight room on the lower level of the Merryman Center. With the two facilities, the Hokies have more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

## Sports Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspect of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.

She also designs preseason menus, snacks and training table menus for the soccer team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our student-athletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.



**The Bod Pod**

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BOD POD is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

## Sport Psychology

Virginia Tech also offers another important service to all its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

Gentry says, "I've always felt that (sport psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department, and we wanted to and needed to include sport psychology in that model."

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologists if they do not feel

comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A new addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions, and increase peripheral awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

"It is a great resource for our coaches and our athletes," Gentry says. "We've improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and in sport psychology. It's all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping student-athletes. We want to give them all the resources we can, to put them in a position to be successful."

# Sports Medicine

*Providing the Hokies experienced, professional care*

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The department, under the leadership of Gunnar Brolinson, D.O., Delmas Bolin, M.D., and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its second full year in the new 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The new facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is state-of-the-art equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer.

The new room, which nearly doubles the size of the former Merryman Center facility, also allows the staff to utilize that room for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally. In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, will supplement the new training room. This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities, including portable X-ray, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot and cold packs and a lumbar/cervical traction unit. It also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment.

After the sports medicine staff diagnoses and treats an ill or injured athlete, the staff then starts collaborative work with the strength and conditioning staff to give the best injury prevention and performance enhancing programs possible. The training, medical, and strength and conditioning staffs each have a role in bringing the athlete back quickly and ready to play. After an injury, an athlete will go through rehabilitation and physical therapy. Athletes are then moved to weight training, as they become able. The strength and conditioning staff uses specific programs for each injury in an effort to get the athlete back quickly.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized DonJoy prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athlete year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. During this time, the staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program that is followed over a nine-week period between the end of the season and the beginning of spring practice. This same procedure is followed during the summer.

If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen by therapist Mark Piechoski in the Ferrell Training Room. Piechoski, who is a certified athletic trainer, physical therapist and strength and conditioning specialist, plays a large role in the overall program developed to return the injured athlete back to 100 percent. In addition, staff sport psychologist Gary Bennett is available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues. Virginia Tech also has the services of Dr. Greg Tilley, team chiropractor. Dr. Tilley provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine related conditions and also plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Jimmy Lawrence, a 26-year veteran in the athletic department, begins his second season as the men's soccer trainer, after taking over those duties mid-season last year. He has been the baseball athletic trainer for 25 years.

# Dr. Charles W. Steger

University

Most people in the university community are keenly aware of Virginia Tech's aspiration to become a leading national research university. Setting his sights on joining the nation's truly elite universities, President Charles W. Steger intends for Virginia Tech to be ranked among the top research universities by

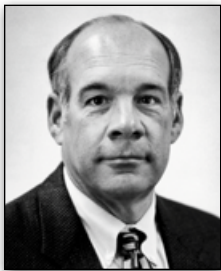
the end of the decade. His vision has energized the entire university community and has led to new educational and research initiatives across campus and throughout the state..

A registered architect and former dean of Virginia Tech's College of Architecture and Urban Studies, Steger was an architect of a different sort as the

leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign that concluded in 1998. Under his leadership, as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech raised \$337 million. Last year, the university raised \$62 million, \$8 million more than it did the previous year.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the College of Architecture and Urban Studies in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his Bachelor of Architecture degree, Master of Architecture degree and Ph.D., in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech.



# Jim Weaver

Director of  
Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 59, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader on behalf of Tech athletics. In his years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes.

Weaver is presiding over Tech's move into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004-05.

Last summer, Virginia Tech and Miami were officially introduced as the 10th and 11th members of the ACC, effective July 1, 2004.

"I'm excited for our fans and our constituency," Weaver said. "This membership is something that the fan base and alumni and friends of Virginia Tech have wanted for a long time. It's home for us. We've had prior relationships with these institutions for many years and this is something our fans are excited about. I'm happy for them, for our coaches and for our student-athletes."

A top personal priority for Weaver is the continuing improvement of Tech's facilities. When it comes to athletic facilities, Weaver has a simple philosophy. "As soon as you sit still in terms of facilities, you have taken a step backward," he says.

The installation of 1,000 permanent seats has been completed on a regulation-size field for the men's and women's varsity soccer teams and the women's lacrosse team. The lighted game field is adjacent to two full-size practice fields.

Major renovations on the west side of Lane Stadium are currently underway. The fencing that surrounds the stadium will be replaced with an actual entrance, additional luxury suites will be constructed, as well as two private club seating areas, new concession stands, a new ticket office, new athletic fund offices, an Athletics Hall of Fame and a new student academic service area.

To meet a growing demand for Virginia Tech football, Weaver spearheaded the construction of the south end zone project to expand seating capacity to 65,115 for the 2002 season. The \$37 million expansion project includes an 11,000-seat double deck and provides 15 luxury suites, as well as club level seating and amenities.

A north end zone addition was completed prior to the 2001 season. That

section added over 5,000 permanent seats.

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver started a coaching career as an assistant at Penn State for six seasons. He later was the offensive coordinator at Iowa State and head coach for one season at Villanova in 1974. He also spent five years as an assistant professor at Clarion State and three years as director of franchise sales at Athletic Attic.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida, which was sanctioned by the NCAA in 1983. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletic director.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons - Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

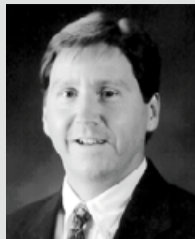

# 2003 REVIEW

## Hokies establish national presence with a first-round NCAA Tournament victory and national rankings

A record-setting season in 2003 laid the groundwork for future Hokie men's soccer teams as the program established itself as one of the country's elite.

In his second year at Virginia Tech, head coach Oliver Weiss led a program with just three senior starters to 14 wins and a second round appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Hokies became a force in their final year in the BIG EAST, securing second place with a 7-3 record and defeating league powerhouse and nationally-ranked foes St. John's and Rutgers in league play.

Tech also garnered regional, conference and national awards for the team and individuals and established a warehouse of school records, both team and individual, as the team played its first year in the new Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium.

Weiss and his staff were named BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year, while freshman Ben Nason, who ranked second in the league with nine assists, won the league's Rookie of the Year award and third-team all-BIG EAST.

Senior Lasse Mertins was named second-team all-BIG EAST, while sophomore Peer Rogge landed a spot on the second team. Mertins and Nason also garnered national postseason recognition.

Mertins was named to the all-South Atlantic Region second team, while Nason earned a spot on the CollegeSoccerNews.com all-Freshman team. Mertins, along with Rogge, were also named to the Academic all-District III team by CoSIDA, and Mertins went on to be named third-team Academic all-America.

Senior Bobby O'Brien and Nason were named to the Virginia SID all-State first-team, while junior Ken Jonmaire and Chase Harrison were on the second team. Weiss was named Coach of the Year.

Other national weekly awards went to sophomore Charlie Howe (Oct. 8), sophomore Dustin Dyer (Oct. 22) and Mertins for the Soccer America Team of the Week. Rogge was named to CollegeSoccerNews.com's National Team of the Week on Sept. 28, while Dyer (Oct. 20), Mertins (Nov. 3), sophomore goalkeeper Harrison (Nov. 3) and freshman Scott Spangler (Sept. 29) each won BIG EAST Player of the Week awards during the year.

Tech began the season with six wins in its first eight matches, including tournament championships at Radford and Dayton. Tech defeated 22nd-ranked Dayton and only lost to third-ranked Wake Forest during the run. After a loss at Georgetown, Tech rebounded with a 2-1 win against 10th-ranked Rutgers at home.

The Hokies added a 5-1 win at Syracuse to push their league record to 3-1 on Oct. 5, then reeled off three straight wins. The Hokies upended sixth-ranked St. John's on Oct. 18, 2-1, marking the highest ranked opponent Tech had ever defeated.

Senior Bobby O'Brien led the way for Tech in a 5-1 win against Radford with a school-record tying four goals and an assist. After a 2-1 loss to 15th-ranked Notre Dame, the Hokies put together another three-match winning streak, defeating Pittsburgh (6-0), Providence (1-0) and Liberty (7-1) to close the regular season 14-4-1.

After claiming second place in the BIG EAST but bowing out in the opening round of the conference tournament to Providence, the Hokies were awarded their first-ever NCAA tournament appearance with an at-large berth and a home match against Clemson. Over 2,200 Hokie fans delivered an electric atmosphere as Tech and the Tigers tied 3-3 after 110 minutes.

The Hokies advanced when sophomore Dustin Dyer connected on Tech's sixth penalty kick to give the Hokies a 6-5 advantage. Facing ninth-seeded VCU in the NCAA second round, Tech saw its season end with a 5-2 loss.

Four seniors, Greg Hermandorfer, O'Brien, Martins and Harold Russell, closed their careers in style, leading Tech to a school record for wins. O'Brien led the core as he wrapped up his four-year stint with a career-high 15 goals along with five assists for a team-high 35 points, ranking him among conference and national leaders. He ranked second in the BIG EAST in points, points per match, goals and goals per match and ranked 21st in the nation in goals per match and 27th in points per match.

As a team the Hokies ranked sixth in the nation in offense, scoring 2.36 goals per match, while also ranking 23rd in won-loss-tied percentage. Tech led the BIG EAST in shots, goals, corner kicks and fewest yellow cards.

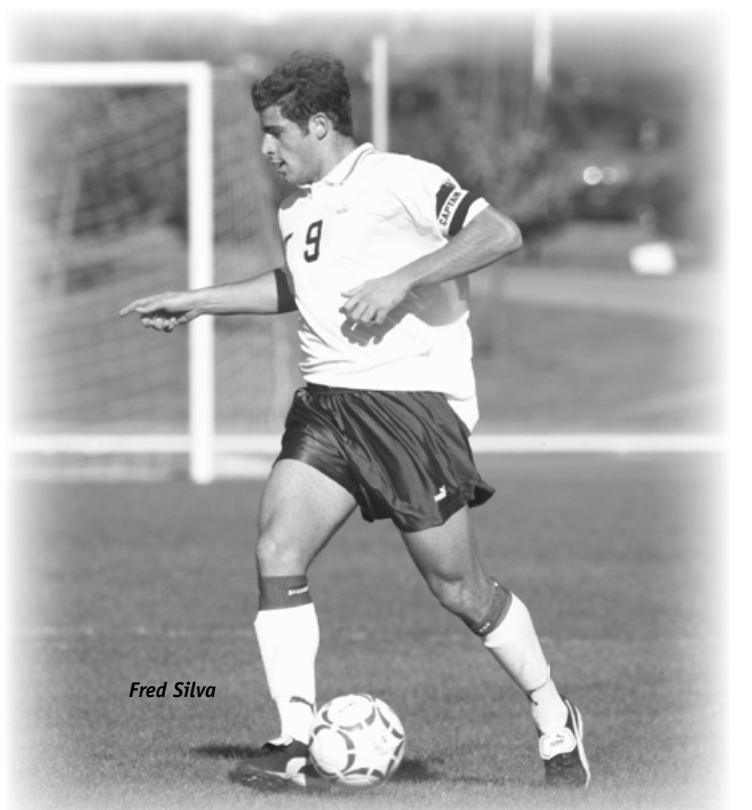

# The Atlantic Coast Conference

## The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 52nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national championships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 times in women's action.

## 2003-04 in Review

The 2003-04 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 48 team titles over the last 14 years.

The ACC's 2003-04 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in women's soccer and Virginia in women's lacrosse. Overall, 66 ACC teams took part in postseason play, compiling a 101-66-4 (.596) record.

A total of 169 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced nine national players of the year, two national rookies of the year and three national coaches of the year.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 17 sports. In all, 31 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

## The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2004-05 academic year – 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.



## A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest – drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.

**VIRGINIA TECH** – Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; withdrew from Southern Conference in June, 1965; became a charter member of the Big East Football Conference in February, 1991; joined the ACC in July, 2004.

**WAKE FOREST** – Joined the Southern Conference in February, 1936, charter member of the ACC in 1953.
