Media Guide Credits

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The Virginia Tech campus is located in Blacksburg, Va., about 40 miles southwest of Roanoke. To reach campus from Interstate 81, take Exit 118-B (Christiansburg) onto U.S. Route 460 West. Follow the 460 Blacksburg Bypass and turn right onto Rt. 314 (Southgate Drive).

VIRGINIA TECH SOCCER STADIUM

Completed in the fall of 2003, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg. The stadium is the home to the men's soccer team. It provides an excellent venue for men's soccer matches and should be filled to near-capacity this fall.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system that can be drained and ready for play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

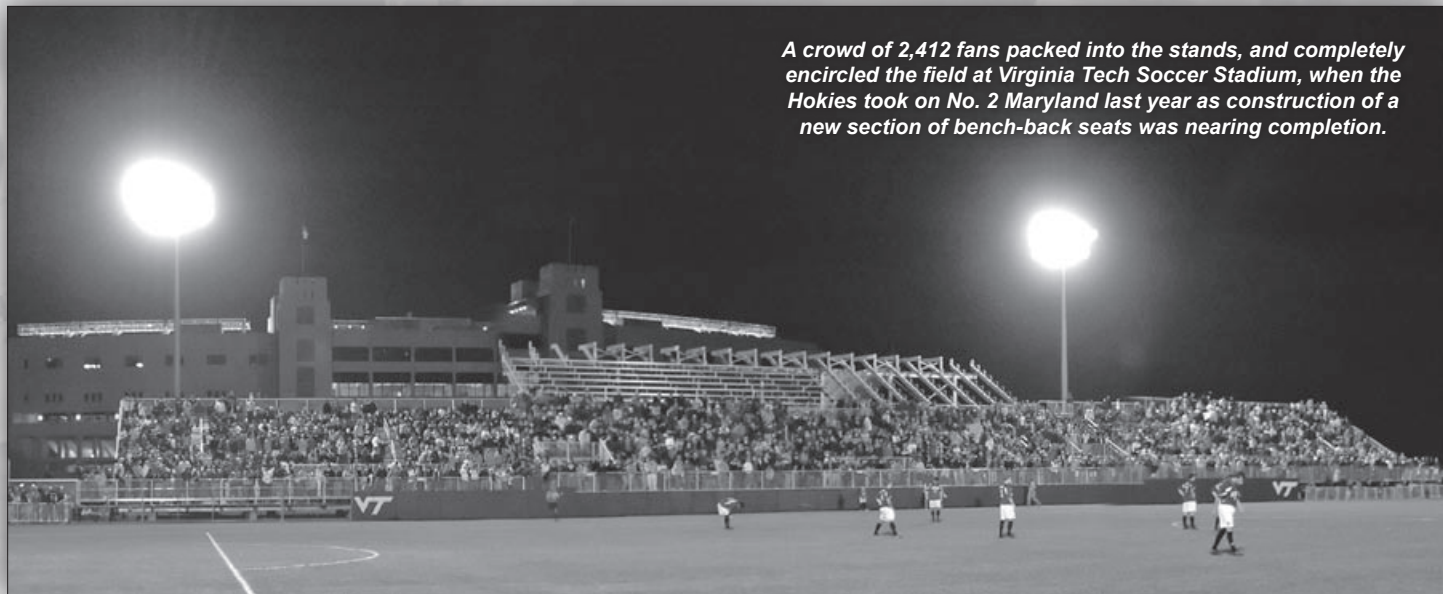
One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games. On Friday, Nov. 4, 2005, the No. 10 Virginia Tech men's soccer team hosted the No. 2-ranked Maryland Terrapins where a record-breaking crowd of 2,412 witnessed a double-overtime match.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. Fully-heated, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system and ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

With a new restroom facility completed last season, and the completion of additional seating, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is one of the best venues to watch the sport.

MEDIA INFORMATION

This media guide is intended to provide members of the media with an in-depth view of Virginia Tech men's soccer. Inside you will find coaches' bios, player bios, schedules and updated records for the 2006 season. Should you need any assistance in covering the Virginia Tech men's soccer team, please contact the Sports Information Office.

Media Services: Media members are encouraged to contact the sports information office for any story ideas, stats, records, or help in accurately covering the Hokies.

Press Box: The Sandy D. Thompson press box is located on the opposite side of the field from the grandstand between the team benches. Additional space, including a film area, is located on top of the grandstand. Media do not need a pass to enter the press box.

Match Services: Media members covering a Virginia Tech men's soccer match are encouraged to contact the sports information office

at least 24 hours in advance. Space is extremely limited in the press box. Also, radio stations broadcasting for the visiting team need to contact the SID office at least three days prior to playing at Virginia Tech to ensure that phone lines and ethernet lines are secured.

Statistics: Media members will be provided with box scores immediately after a match. The press box has an ethernet line for Internet use should any media need to send stories or photos.

Interviews: Media members MUST contact the SID contact to arrange interviews with players and coaches. No interviews will be allowed without at least 24 hours advance notice. At no time will a student-athlete's home phone number be given out.

Hokies online: The SID office compiles weekly notes for men's soccer. They can be accessed through the athletic department's official Web site, hokiesports.com. Also, media and fans can access the latest news and stats on the Hokies at that site.

2006 OUTLOOK

After a record-setting 2005 campaign and a successful spring season, the 2006 Virginia Tech men's soccer team is taking aim at the program's first-ever ACC and national championships. To reach these goals, however, the Hokies will have to get through a daunting non-conference slate in addition to a tough league schedule in order to receive their second-consecutive NCAA Tournament bid.

With nine newcomers and the return of two players who received medical redshirts last season, Tech should again compete for a spot in the NCAA postseason. Redshirt-junior Ben Nason, who was an All-ACC player in 2004, returns after missing nearly all of 2005 with an injury, and should give the Hokies an additional playmaker in the midfield. He will help free up Tech's forwards while keeping the ball away from

opponents, which is key as the Hokies break in a new goalkeeper for the first time in four years.

"This year, we want to continue to improve in all aspects of our program," head coach Oliver Weiss said. "We want to win more games, receive more recognition for our players individually, allow less goals, keep longer possessions and create more chances for our team. We also have to continue our tradition of academic excellence here at Virginia Tech. Therefore, we have high expectations both on the field and in the classroom."

2006 OUTLOOK

FORWARDS

Sophomore Patrick Nyarko, who earned first-team All-ACC honors a year ago and was the conference's Freshman of the Year, returns from a stellar debut campaign that saw him garner several accolades, including being named to two Freshman All-America teams. His eight goals, including four game-winners, were tops among the Hokies in 2005 despite the fact he was only eligible for the final 15 matches. As one of the most experienced players in the attacking half for Weiss' squad, Nyarko's ability to get open and find the back of the net should help take scoring pressure off the Hokies.



BRENT DILLIE

Jimmy Carroll could be big targets in the box.

"We want a collective force when scoring goals," Weiss said. "We want at least two or three goals from multiple players. That way, we can put a line-up out there and people can contribute in multiple ways. It will help us become more unpredictable for our opponents to defend."

MIDFIELD

The graduation of Magnus Einarsson and Greg Roach will change the midfield a bit, but look for Tech to profit from the return of Ben Nason and Charlie Howe, who each missed the majority of last season due to injuries and were granted medical redshirts.

Seniors Brent Dillie and Eric Vickers, along with redshirt-junior Bo Lawrence, will continue to provide leadership to a steady group of players. Fellow senior Brad Collins provided stability in 2005 when injuries plagued the squad and should do so again this year. Look for sophomore Kevin McFadden, Jr., to continue providing great depth in the midfield while adding the ability to move forward and score. Senior Shota Ban and freshman Charlie Campbell will also vie for playing time.

"Several of the players have been around and will help the younger players adjust," Weiss said. "We have the most flexibility and are the most diverse in our midfield."

"Patrick is hungry to improve," Weiss said. "People will be aware of him, but he will be stronger and more prepared. Patrick will be better toward the end of the year, as that is when we will be aiming to peak as a team."

Helping Nyarko on attack will be junior Marcus Reed. He will play not only in the opponents' half, but will also drop back and see time in the midfield.

"The majority of a potent strike force will be back this year," Weiss said.

Two freshmen will also be in the mix for playing time at the forward position. A pair of 6-2 players in Craig Brutus and

Carroll and Reed could drop back from the forward position to create offensive chances in the midfield.

"Chad Steuck and Charlie Howe are two defensive midfielders who have done a terrific job," Weiss said. "Marcus Reed and Ben Nason are more attacking midfielders. Charlie Campbell is a combination of both types of players. He is a newcomer that will share spots with our solid group of veterans."

"The midfield position is the best area of our team. We have different players who balance the area out. We will pay attention to the individual tactics of the opponent and adjust. Our midfield is the heart of our team."

DEFENSE

The defense also returns an experienced cast back from 2005, one that limited opponents' possessions and shot opportunities, forcing the least amount of saves in school history.

Chad Steuck is the only senior in the back and will contribute his experience and leadership to the group. However, sophomores Alexander Baden and Bryan Collier also saw plenty of playing time last year and will again provide Tech with a solid back-line.

"We have nearly everyone returning in the back," Weiss said. "Consistency is important. Several players have played in a lot of matches and we should have a solid core."

Fellow sophomore Scott Dillie saw playing time in the defensive half for much of last season and will vie for a starting spot in 2006. Midfielders Lawrence and (Brent) Dillie could also drop back from their spots to bolster the defense and keep opposing teams from getting scoring opportunities.

Three newcomers could challenge for playing time on defense. Sophomore Taylor Walsh and freshmen Jonathan Collier and James Gilson will get the opportunity to make an impact on a deep position during their inaugural campaign.

"A good start to a season is based on a great core, and that's what we have," Weiss said. "We have great depth and some of the players such as Marcus Reed and Brent Dillie can drop back and help. We also have backups for every position, which will be key."

GOALKEEPING

The departure of four-year stalwart Chase Harrison will be made up with solid play from the other positions, giving the eventual starter time to become accustomed to the collegiate game.

Junior Drew Czেকanski is the only goalkeeper on the roster with any playing experience – and that came during the second half of Tech's 10-1 rout of Charleston last season.

Sophomores Stefan Caulfield and Matt Ells will be in the mix for the starting spot, as will freshman Brendan Dunn, who is the largest of the Tech keepers at 6-2, 190. Regardless of who the eventual starter is, competition for the position promises to be fierce.

"Chase left some big holes to fill," Weiss said. "We will have to see who does better in fall practice. In goal, we need someone to be solid. He doesn't have to be exceptional. It will be critical for our defense and midfield to put us in a good position so our goalie will not have to worry about winning or losing a game."

SCHEDULE, FACILITIES AND EXPECTATIONS

The team placed fourth last year in the ACC following a 3-2-3 conference campaign. This season, several teams remain on the schedule, and just like the Hokies, have several top players returning. The 2006 slate promises to be one of the toughest in school history, but Weiss looks to have his troops ready for battle in the ACC and out of conference.

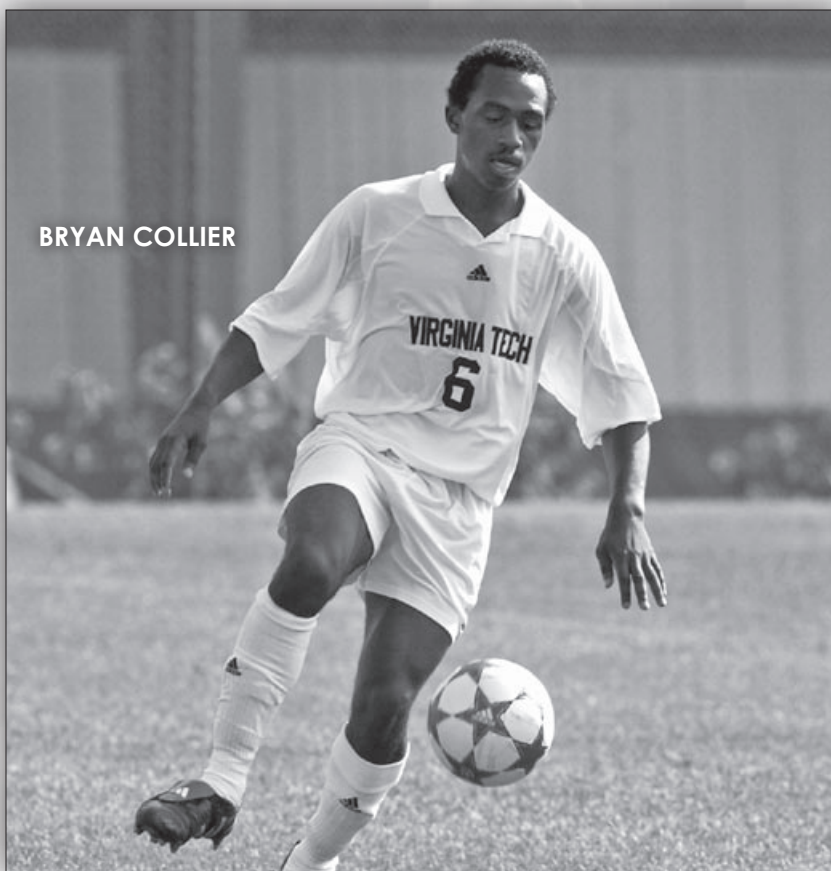
"Again, we are playing a terrific schedule and are looking forward to the challenges in our ACC and non-conference matches," Weiss said.

The Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium capacity increased from 1,000 to 2,028 comfortable bench-back seats in 2005 and with the excitement of being a top-10 team last year, a record crowd of nearly 2,500 fans came out to witness the regular-season finale against Maryland.

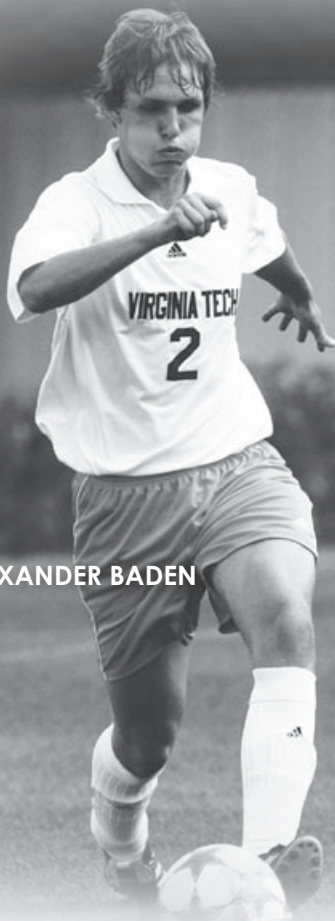
With the community's support, look for the Hokies to continue making a climb up the ACC and national ladders.

"We want to go back to the NCAA Tournament and earn a seed," Weiss said. "We want to advance farther than last year and also advance in the ACC Tournament."

The 2006 schedule is arguably one of the toughest in the country. Weiss' team, however, should be up for any challenges that await it during the regular season, preparing the Hokies for a successful postseason run in the ACC and NCAA Tournaments.

OLIVER WEISS



MEN'S SOCCER HEAD COACH

Since his arrival at Virginia Tech in 2002, head coach Oliver Weiss has elevated the soccer program into the national spotlight by winning matches, recruiting outstanding student-athletes and creating a soccer environment that demands excellence in every aspect of collegiate athletics.

Weiss' four-year career record of 43-27-10, resulting in a .600 winning percentage, reflects not only a strong winning tradition, but also a character and confidence-building experience because of Virginia Tech's extraordinarily strong schedules. The result has been 10 wins over nationally-ranked opponents so far. In 2005, the team reached its highest ranking ever at No. 10 in back-to-back editions of the *Soccer America* poll.

Weiss' drive for excellence has led the program to its first-ever NCAA Tournament bid in 2003 and its first-ever NCAA Tournament seed (No. 12) in 2005. His teams have set or tied the school record in most categories, including wins (14), goals (52) and longest unbeaten streak (10 matches).

Weiss believes strongly in playing nationally ranked teams outside the always difficult ACC, which is dubbed the best soccer conference in the U.S. by many experts.

Weiss has proven himself as one of the most productive young coaches in collegiate soccer. Last season, Weiss' team held opponents at bay, limiting their shots, which produced the lowest amount of saves for any team in school history. His defense proved to be the most staggering in the program's history in 2005, setting a school record for consecutive minutes not scored upon. In 2004, the team defeated No. 1 Duke and No. 2 Virginia during Tech's inaugural Atlantic Coast Conference season. Utilizing Weiss' attacking style, Tech set records for goals, points, shots and corner kicks while ranking among the nation's most prolific offensive teams in 2003. In his first year, 2002, Weiss guided the Hokies to a 10-7-1 record, tying for seventh place in the conference with a 5-5-0 mark in BIG EAST play.

Before coming to Tech, Weiss served as the top assistant at the University of North Carolina from 1999 to 2001. During his three years



in Chapel Hill, the team went 54-14-1 and earned a trip to the NCAA Tournament each season. In 2000, UNC captured the ACC championship and was seeded No. 1 in postseason play. In 2001, the Tar Heels won the national championship.

Weiss also served as an assistant at the College of William & Mary from 1996 to 1998, where he helped the Tribe to a 49-19-3 record and three trips to the national tournament. Before going to William & Mary, Weiss spent a year as an assistant at the University of New Hampshire.

Weiss began his coaching with a Richmond Under-10 team in 1988. A youth coaching career of eight years followed, producing eight consecutive Virginia State Cup championships, along with a Region 1 championship and a trip to the 1995 Snickers USYSA National Championships.

Weiss was selected as the 1990 and 1995 Virginia Youth Soccer Association Coach of the Year. In 1995, he was honored as the NSCAA East Region and the USYSA Region 1 Coach of the Year.

As a standout player at the University of Richmond, Weiss captained the team three out of his four years. He also earned All-Colonial Athletic Association honors twice and South Atlantic honors once during his career with the Spiders. Weiss received a bachelor's degree in history from the university in 1988.

Weiss graduated from Central High School in High Point, N.C., in 1984. He was named North Carolina High School Player of the Year and earned All-America honors.

Weiss holds a USSF 'A' coaching license and a German Soccer Federation 'B' license. He is also the director of the Hokie Soccer Academy for Boys, which is a soccer camp held throughout the summer at Virginia Tech.

A native of Burgdorf (a suburb of Hannover), Germany, Weiss became a United States citizen in 2000. He and his wife, Peggy, have a daughter, Samantha, and a son, Max.

MICHAEL BRIZENDINE

ASSISTANT MEN'S SOCCER COACH



Michael Brizendine begins his third year with the men's soccer program. An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine will work with all aspects of the Hokie program. In addition to his coaching duties, he is the recruiting coordinator.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint at Bridgewater College, a Division III program in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. He was also an assistant men's coach at Ferrum College in 1999.

He was the head men's coach at Bridgewater from 2001 to 2003 and assisted with the men's and women's teams in 2000. Guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program, Brizendine led Bridgewater to a 25-10 mark over two seasons and earned the ODAC Coach of the Year award in 2003.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in religion and a minor in business. In 2005, he earned his M.Ed. at Virginia Tech. Recently, he earned his USSF "B" license. Brizendine also holds an Advanced National Coaching License from the NSCAA.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at JMU from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine and his wife, Lucy, reside in Christiansburg, Va.

SCOTT BLACK

ASSISTANT MEN'S SOCCER COACH



A native of Nottingham, England, Scott Black is entering his first year with the Virginia Tech soccer program. Black brings a wealth of experience to the Hokies after being an assistant soccer coach for five years with the Penn State University men's soccer program.

While at Penn State, Black helped guide the program to the sweet sixteen twice, the elite eight once and once into the round of 32 of the NCAA tournament. Penn State won the Big Ten Championships in 2002 and 2005 and won the Big Ten regular season once.

Black completed his Master's from Penn State in 2006 in adult education. Black graduated in 2000 from the University of Wisconsin at Green Bay, with a bachelor's degree in communications & public relations with a minor in human development.

A four-year varsity starter at Wisconsin-Green Bay, Black was a three-year all Mid-Western Collegiate Conference selection as a central midfielder.

Following his collegiate career, Black played professionally and was captain of the USL D3 Pro-League Cape Cod Crusaders organization. He also served as director of media & public relations for Mass Pro Soccer in Boston, Mass.

Black holds the Premiere, Advanced National and National Coaching Diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

He assists head coach Oliver Weiss in all aspects of the men's soccer program.

Black's wife, Kristin, resides in State College, Pa., where she is completing her Ph.D., at Penn State University.

LASSE MERTINS

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH

Lasse Mertins, a former standout collegiate player with the Hokies, begins his second year with the Virginia Tech staff as a volunteer coach in 2006.

A native of Rotenburg, Germany, Mertins played two seasons with the Hokies under head coach Oliver Weiss (2002-03). He led Virginia Tech to a 24-12-1 record over his two years, tallying seven goals and two assists from his defensive position.

Mertins was a co-captain his senior year and was the program's first Academic All-America honoree, garnering a spot on the third team. He was a two-time all-region selection in addition to earning a second-team All-BIG EAST nod in 2003.

Since completing his eligibility with Tech, Mertins has worked with Campbell Soup in Germany for the last year and a half before joining the Tech coaching staff.

He will work primarily with the goalkeepers as he works toward his Ph.D., in accounting and information systems.

One of America's best college towns, Blacksburg is a perfect setting for a great university like Virginia Tech.

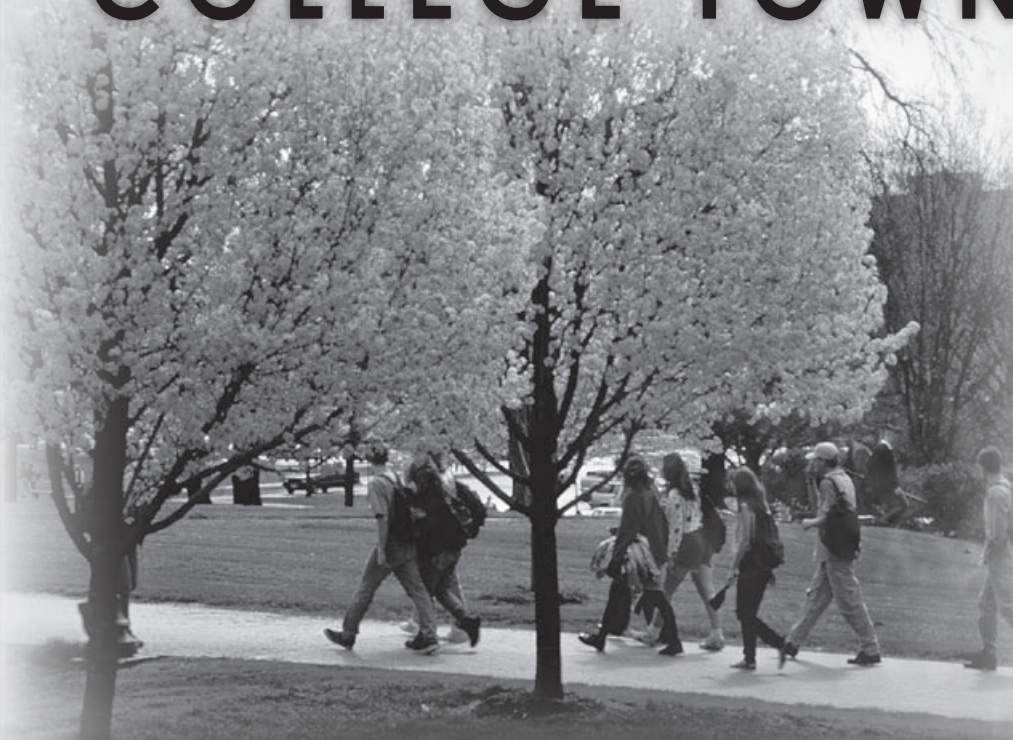
Located in Southwest Virginia on a plateau between the Blue Ridge and Allegheny Mountains, Blacksburg combines the laid-back lifestyle of a small town with the amenities one would expect to find around a major center of higher education. Virginia Tech and the Town of Blacksburg gained national and international attention by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the potential of the quaint town.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that accentuate the area. Since its founding, Blacksburg has grown to become the largest town in Virginia.

Under the tutelage of Oliver Weiss, the Virginia Tech men's soccer program has reached new heights. During two of the four seasons since his arrival in Blacksburg, Weiss has taken his team to the NCAA Tournament. During the 2005 campaign, he helped Tech reach its highest-ever ranking at No. 10 while guiding the team to the program's first-ever first-round bye.

The Hokies were seeded 12th in the NCAA Tournament and hosted UNC-Greensboro on Nov. 22, 2005 in the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium. With both teams playing tremendous defense, the match went into overtime at 0-0. After neither team scored in either overtime session, the teams went to penalty kicks to see who would advance to the third round. Tech came up short, as the Spartans advanced after netting four penalty kicks to three for the Hokies.

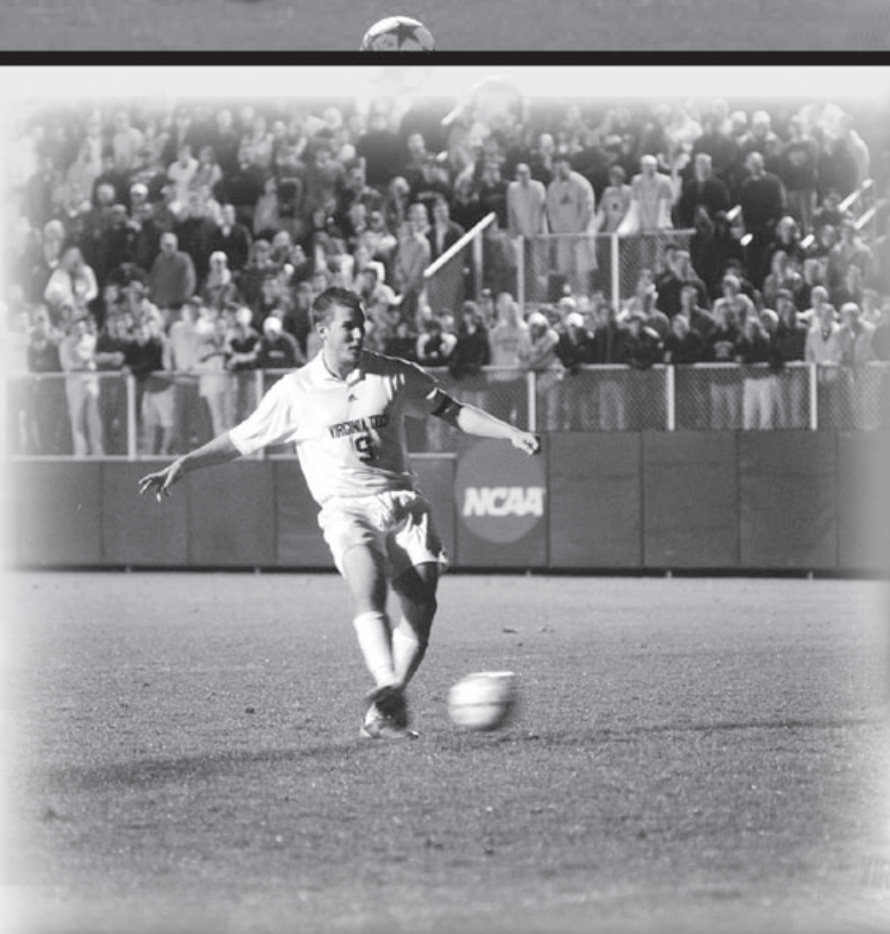
In 2003, Tech entered the NCAA Tournament with a 14-4-2 record, earning an at-large bid. The Hokies hosted the Tigers of Clemson in a first-round match and the teams played to a 3-3 draw on Nov. 21, 2003. After the first five penalty kicks, the teams were tied 5-5. Tech advanced to the second round after Chase Harrison corralled the Tigers' sixth penalty kick and Dustin Dyer connected on his.

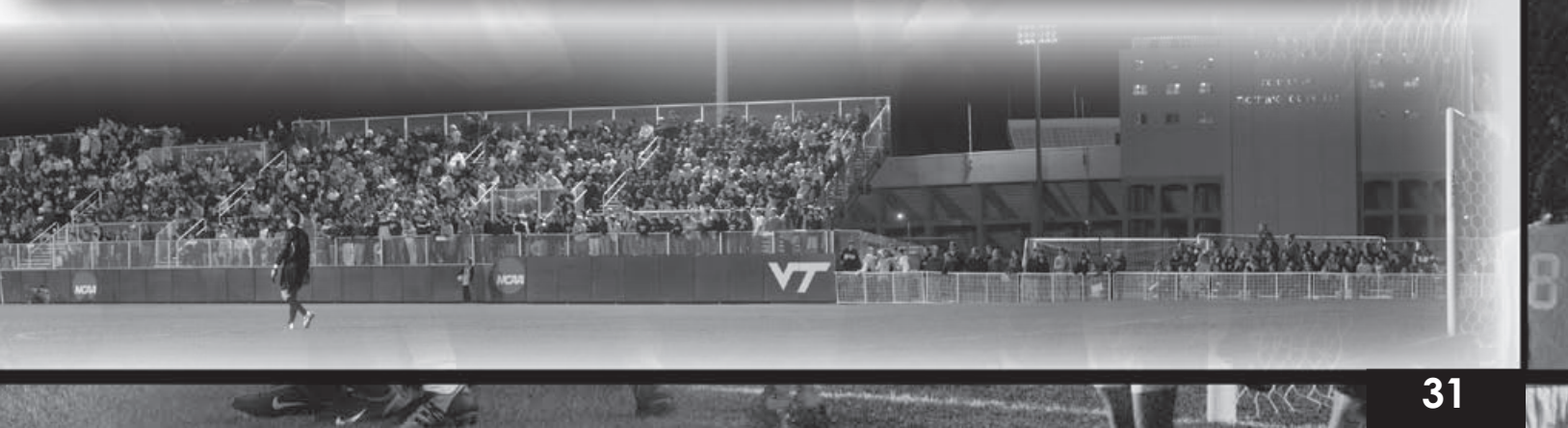

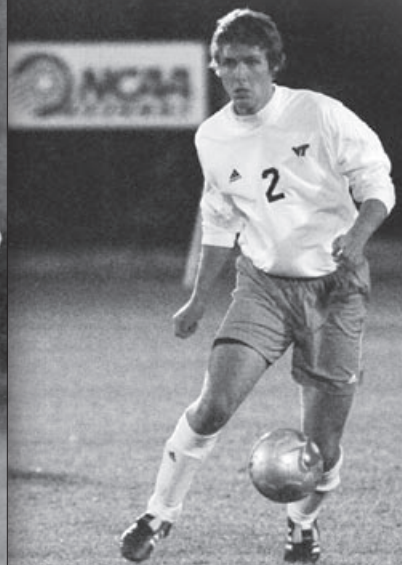

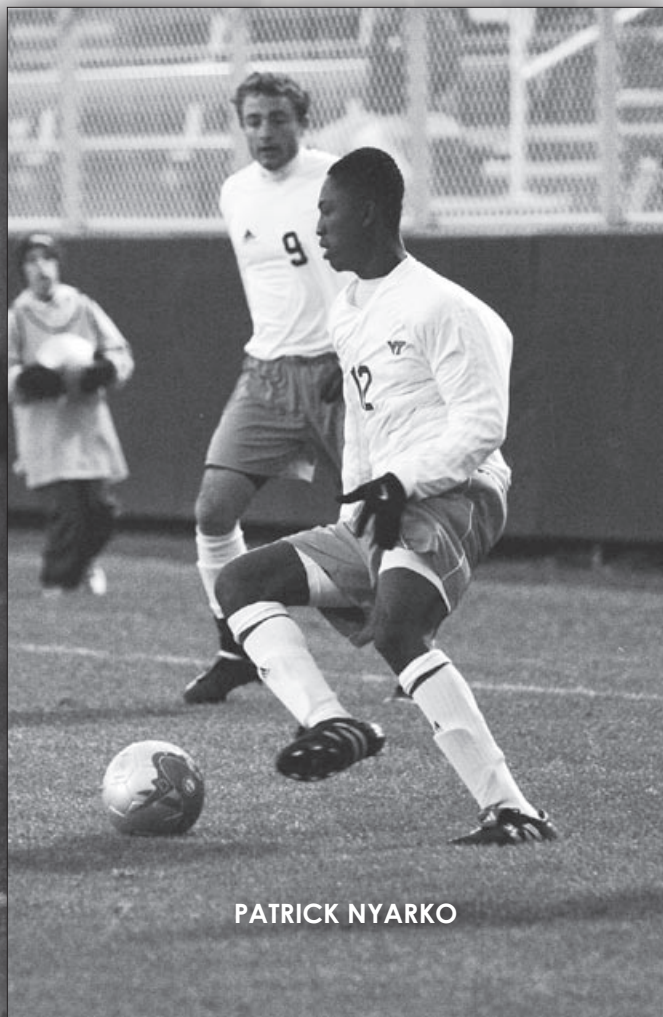

Virginia Tech has a long and proud athletic tradition, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. For the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference – a move that has already helped the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger.

Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle.

The success of Oliver Weiss' soccer program is only part of the story.

Tech's nationally known football team has had unprecedented success over the past decade. The Hokies have played in 13 consecutive bowl games. Last year, the Hokies won 11 games and went to the Gator Bowl after capturing a berth in the first-ever ACC championship game. The Tech football team captured the ACC Championship in its inaugural season in the league, won BIG EAST Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

In 2005, Spyridon Jullien won NCAA titles in the indoor weight throw and the outdoor hammer throw, bringing the school its first-ever NCAA

Championships in any sport. During Jullien's senior year, he again won the weight throw during the indoor season and captured the hammer throw title at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament, while the men's team received a bid to the NIT during the 2004-05 season.

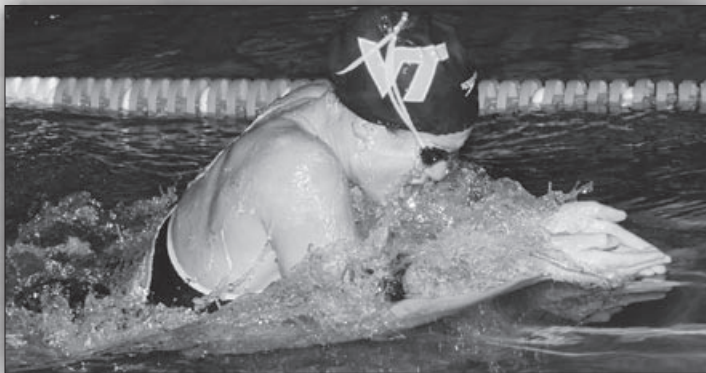
In the fall of 2005, Weiss' team earned its highest ranking ever and received a first-round by in the NCAA Championships. The softball team earned its first-ever NCAA berth during the spring of 2005 and earned its second bid the following spring. The 2006 season featured the program's first All-American. The women's soccer team reached the postseason for the first time in its history during 2004 and earned the ACC sportsmanship award in 2005.

In 2001, the Hokie golf team won a nation's-best six tournaments, including the BIG EAST Golf Championship and went on to record an eighth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Golf Championship.

Tech's baseball team and men's tennis teams have also participated in NCAA postseason competition in recent years, as have individuals from wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and track & field.

Prior to joining the ACC, Virginia Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference since 1991, and a member of the BIG EAST in all other sports except wrestling since 2001.

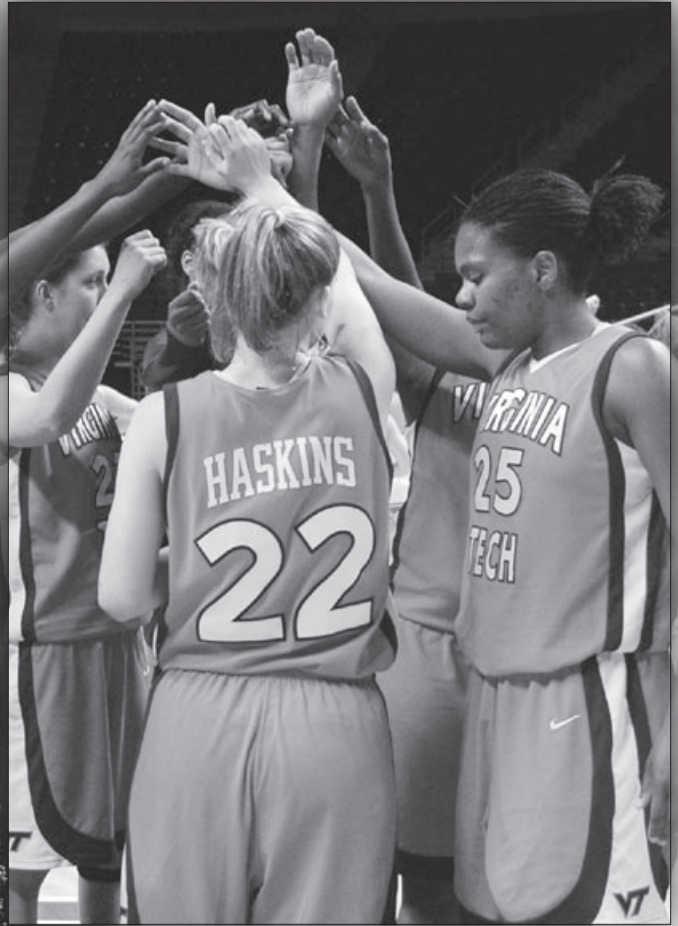

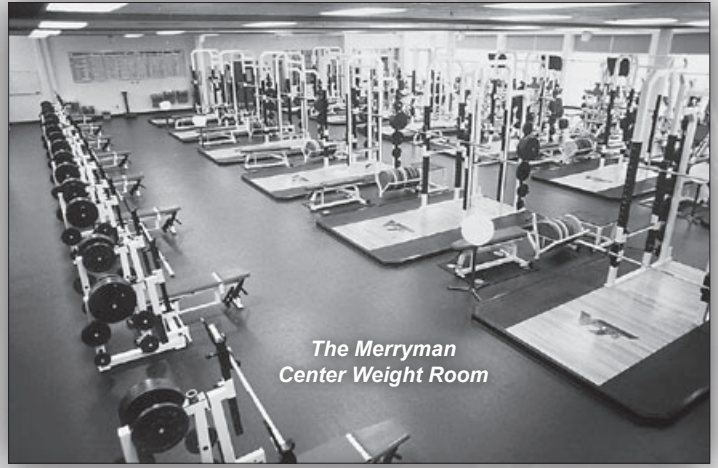

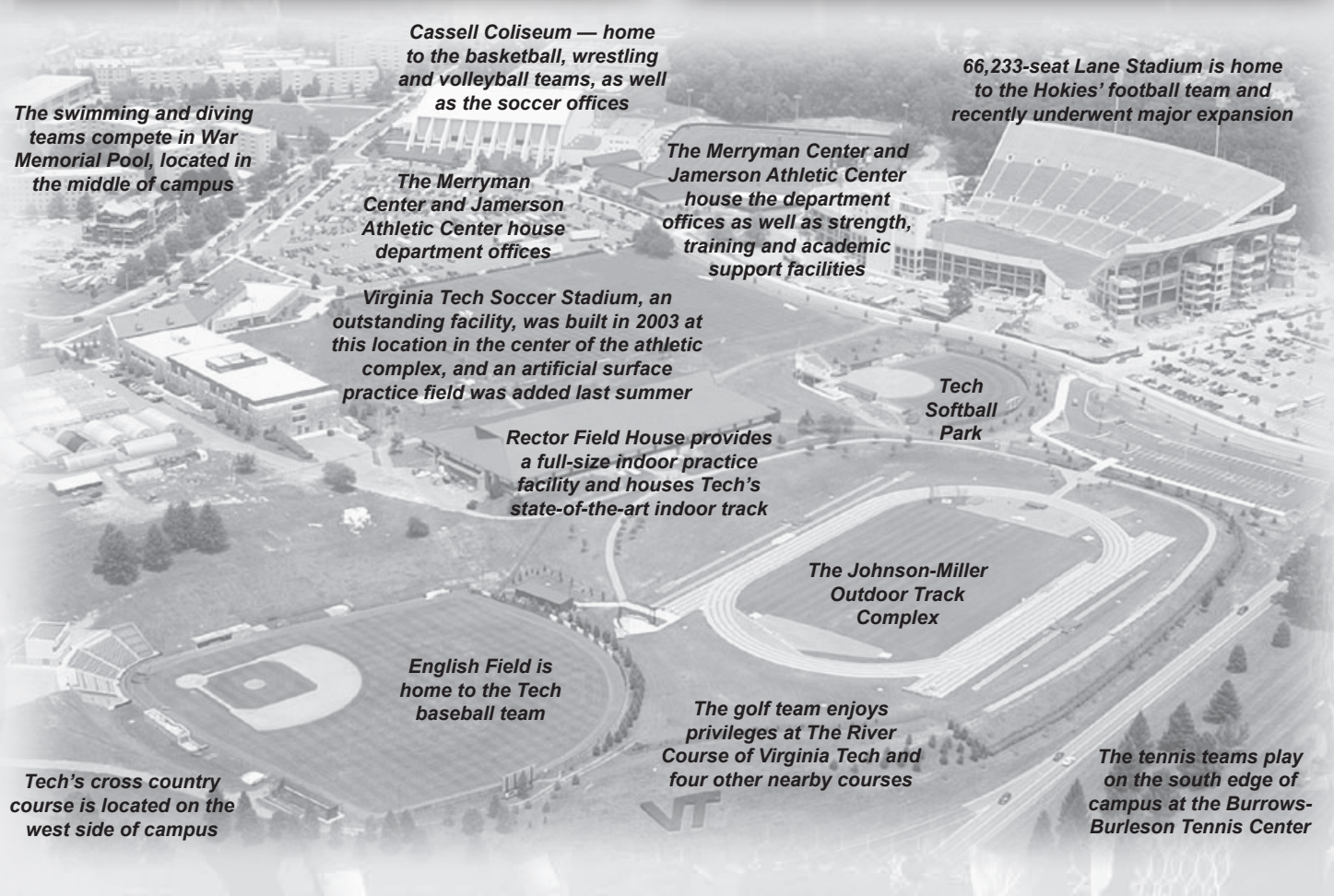

Our eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School offer more degree programs than any other university in the state with 60 undergraduate and 140 graduate offerings. Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in developing and using instructional technologies. Some 85 percent of our departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 60,000 enrollments since 1998.

Discovery

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures of about \$290 million, Virginia Tech is ranked 55th among research universities in the United States. The university, which has more than 100 research centers, also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and near the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in more than 3,500 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

Engagement

As part of our outreach mission and in adherence to our motto, we serve and engage the citizens of the commonwealth, the nation, and the world. Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of economic and community development projects. These efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live.

Professionals, organizations, and communities tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers. Virginia Tech has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques, such as satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing, and Web-based courses, to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.

The Inn at Virginia Tech & Skelton Conference Center on campus and The Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center in Roanoke, both owned by Virginia Tech, support the university's outreach mission by working with faculty to plan and host conferences and continuing education and professional programs.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$30 million in funded economic development projects in 27 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2005-06, about 1,870 students from 117 foreign countries studied at Tech, while more than 800 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for more than 90 years. With 107 city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's soccer program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and is a school best 74 percent for 2005. This marks the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's student athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, current Virginia Tech student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2005 calendar year, 376 GPA's of at least 3.0 were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with University and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student athlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

- University and NCAA information
- Orientation
- Academic assessment
- The development of an effective student life program
- Appropriate referrals
- Monitored study environments
- Tutorial programs
- State of the art technological learning assistance
- Student-athlete academic performance evaluations

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

SAASS provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

During the summer of 2006, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms, and direct access to the SAASS staff.

This new complex is a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides a centralized place for student-athlete services.

Student Athlete Academic Support

Drew Scales enters his fifth year with the Student Athlete Academic Support Services as an assistant director.

Scales provides academic support to each member of the men's soccer team.

During the academic year, he monitors

the athletes' academic progress in every class.

He provides all academic support services to make the men's soccer team as successful in the classroom as it is on the pitch. Scales has one-on-one meetings with students when difficulties arise. This includes school-related issues, adjusting to a new environment or helping the student-athlete find the right career path.

Scales also has administrative responsibilities that include the development and oversight of SAASS's mentor program.

During his time with the men's soccer team, he has worked with Lasse Mertins and Dustin Dyer, who became Academic All-Americans.

Scales is a 1992 graduate of Morehouse College, where he was a four-time letterwinner for the tennis program. He also holds a Master's degree from Michigan State in physical education and exercise science and another from the Arizona School of Professional Psychology in clinical psychology.

The new facility features:

- More than 18,000 square feet of functional space
- 10 Staff Offices
- 18 Private Tutor Rooms
- State-Of-The-Art Classroom
- 45 Station Computer Lab
- Three Reading/Study Rooms
- Conference Room
- Reference Library

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Beginning his eighth year at Virginia Tech, Chris Helms is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office. Helms oversees an office comprised of an associate director, four assistant directors, two learning specialists, a systems analyst, interns, and a secretary forming a group of professionals serving the needs of all student-athletes.

In addition to his duties directing SAASS, Helms serves as a liaison between the academic and athletic communities and is an ad hoc member of the University Athletic Committee.

Helms came to Tech from Michigan State University, where he served as the assistant director of the Student Athlete Support Services office.

support for student-athletes in the soccer programs as well as lacrosse, volleyball, and wrestling. His administrative responsibilities include the development and oversight of SAASS's mentor program. Scales is a former student athlete with an undergraduate degree in Psychology from Morehouse College and Master's degrees from the Arizona School of Professional Psychology and Michigan State University. In addition to his extensive experience providing student athlete academic support, Scales has served as a consultant for sport psychology and performance enhancement training.

COMPUTER SERVICES DEPARTMENT



Another example of Virginia Tech's commitment to providing its student-athletes with the best academic resources possible is the presence of the Computer Services department, under the direction of Brad Tilley.

Because all Tech students are required to own computers, the Virginia Tech athletics department helps its scholarship athletes fulfill that requirement by providing them with computers.

In addition to ordering computers for the athletes, the office also addresses computer service needs for the student-athletes and the entire Virginia Tech athletics staff.

Brad Tilley provides excellent computer services to the department.

ATHLETICS OFFICE OF STUDENT LIFE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is committed to developing the total student-athlete. Director of the Office of Student Life, Megan Armbruster, is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through programs the office administers. The programming implemented by the Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is modeled after the NCAA/CHAMPS Life Skills Program. The five components are Personal Development, Career Development, Academic Excellence, Athletic Excellence and Community Outreach.

Personal Development

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

The Virginia Tech men's soccer team attended the Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration and lecture by Reverend Jesse Jackson. In addition, the team had a workshop based on the up and coming technology for use in the classroom and as a study tool.

Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resume design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and coops during their college careers. In the 2005-2006 academic year, Cintas Corporation, Ferguson and NVR, Inc. hosted workshops providing student-athletes the opportunity to hear job search strategies directly from employers.

Academic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2005 calendar year listed 377 student-athletes with this honor. Neil Savage, men's swimming and diving, and Lindsay Pieper, women's lacrosse, received the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics. The award is given to one male and one female student-athlete who demonstrate leadership, outstanding academic excellence and community involvement. The recipients of the award receive a \$5,000 scholarship donated by Dr. Bill and Peggy Skelton.

Nineteen Hokies made the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2005. Magnus Einarsson was named to the 2005 Virginia Tech All-Academic Team for attaining the highest GPA in 2004 on the men's soccer team.

Athletic Excellence

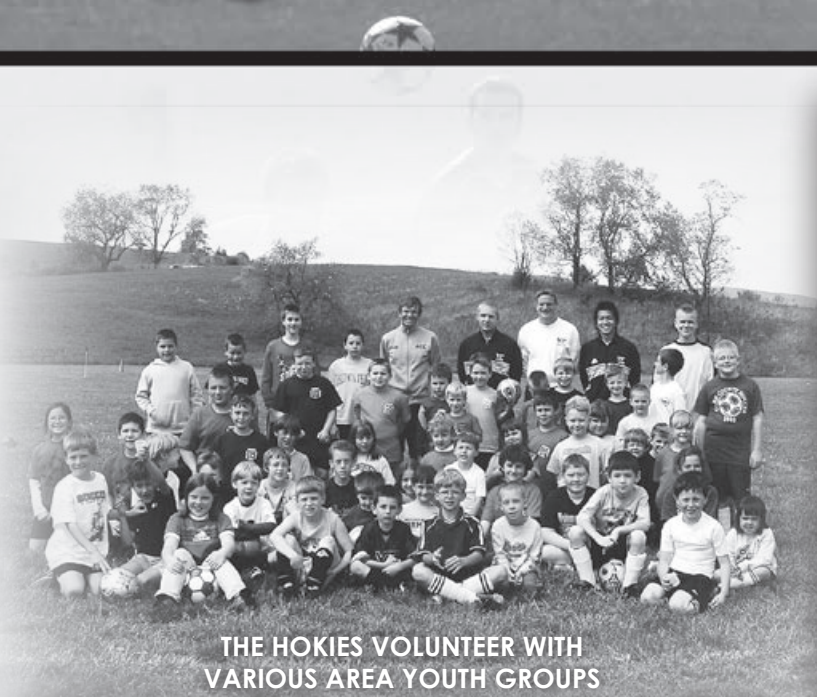
The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season.

Community Outreach

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart." Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. In collaboration with the Virginia Tech Corp of Cadets and student leadership, the "Hokies with Heart" program works together with the Montgomery County Public Schools System to visit with local school kids about the importance of education and character development. In 2005, the student-athletes also volunteered with the Montgomery County Christmas Store, Virginia Tech White Ribbon Campaign and Hokies United Hurricane Relief Campaign.

Each athletic team at Virginia Tech is encouraged to select one local charity on which to focus their philanthropic efforts throughout the year. The men's soccer team works with the Adopt-a-Highway program. Men's soccer picks up trash four times per year on 460 West.

Megan Armbruster is in her fourth year at Virginia Tech as the Director of Student Life. Megan is responsible for coordinating new student-athlete orientation, Hokie career development, the "Hokies with Heart" community outreach programs and

serves as advisor for the Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee. She also nominates student-athletes for academic honors and awards.

Armbruster serves on a variety of campus committees including the Sexual Violence Prevention Committee, S.A.I.L. Leadership Committee, Virginia Tech Orientation Planning Committee, and Hokie Hi Welcome Back Planning Committee. Megan was a team facilitator for the NCAA Life Skills Conference in 2005. In 2004-2005 she was an instructor for the WING program First Year Seminar. This class is taught to first year students living in a co-educational environment in the Slusher Hall WING learning community. This year, she will be a mentor for two new Life Skills programs at University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown and University of Tampa.

Megan was honored by the United Way of Montgomery, Radford and Floyd for 'Exceptional Dedication.' She was also presented with an award from the Virginia Tech Women's Center in appreciation for her contributions to the Violence Against Women Act Grant.

Armbruster came to Tech from the University of Nebraska. At Nebraska, she served as assistant academic counselor at the Hewitt Academic Center for Student-Athletes for two years. She earned her bachelor's in community health education in 1998 and received her master's in educational administration in 2001, both from Nebraska.



SPORTS MEDICINE

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of Tech athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its fifth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes.

Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally. In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility that includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, will supplement the new training room. This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities, including portable X-ray, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot

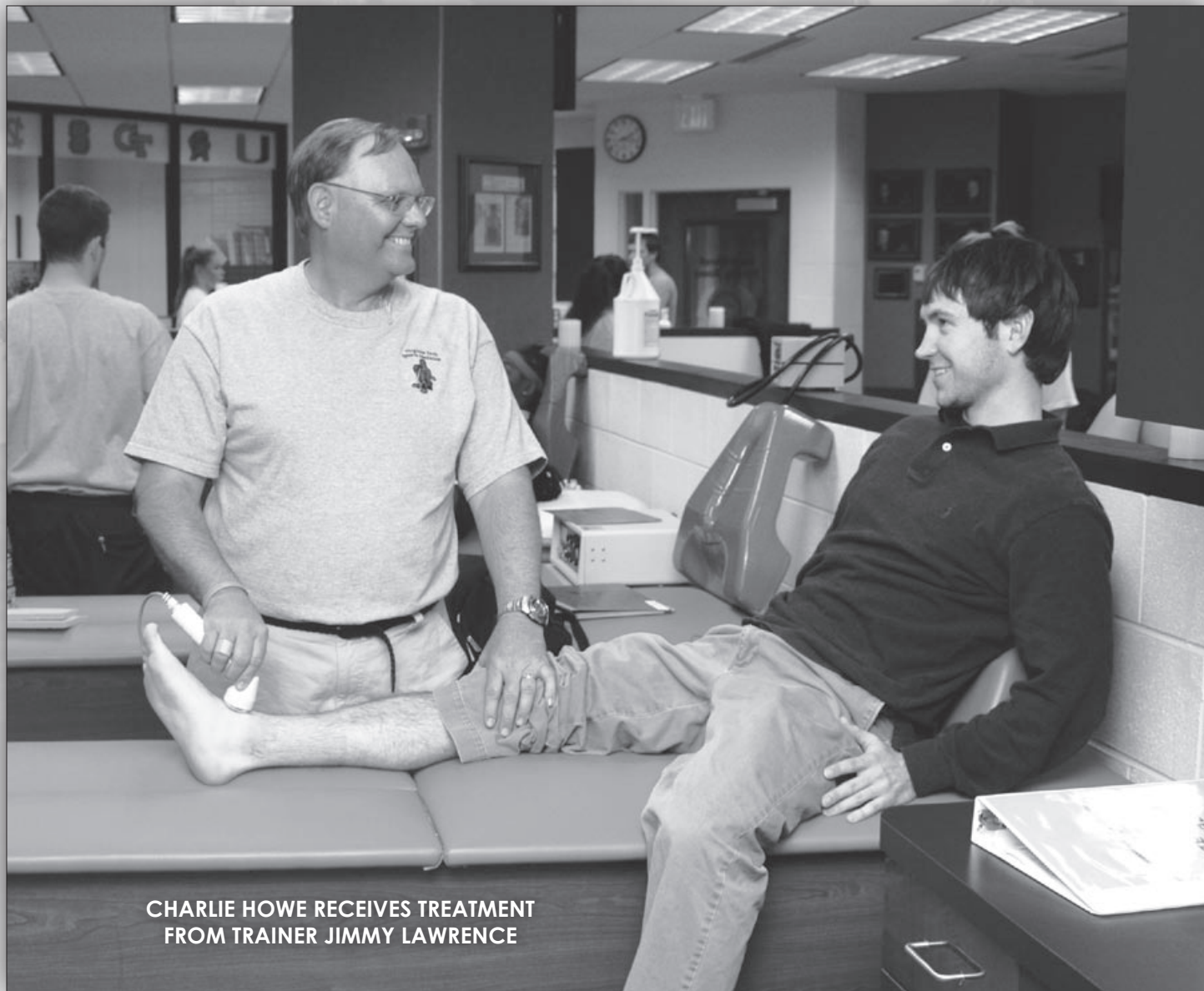
and cold packs and a lumbar/cervical traction unit. It also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized DonJoy prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athlete year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity.

"If our strength and conditioning is so important, and it is, then we owe it to our athletes to provide them with the necessary resources to keep them actively participating," Goforth said. "We basically adopt the attitude that in the fall, our mission is to keep them participating on the field and during the other times of the year, it is our job to keep them participating in our strength and conditioning program."

Their programs consist of strengthening, stretching and most importantly movement pattern analysis and training to help prevent the re-occurrence of injuries.

"We value the off-season greatly within our department," Goforth said. "We have adopted the same mindset as our strength and conditioning staff and look at our off-season time as an opportunity to

get our athletes better as opposed to time off for our staff.”

A vital part of student-athletes services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. The center also has a fully operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen by therapist Mark Piechoski in the Ferrell Training Room. Piechoski, who is a certified athletic trainer, physical therapist, and strength and conditioning specialist plays a large role in the overall program developed to return the injured athlete back to 100 percent. In addition, staff sport psychologist Gary Bennett is available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues. Virginia Tech also has the services of Dr. Greg Tilley, team chiropractor. Tilley provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions and also plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

“Our goal is to provide the same high level of health care that Olympic athletes receive,” Goforth continued. “Our usage of specialist care is modeled after the NFL system and incorporates components of the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.”

Team orthopaedic surgeons Dr. Marc Siegel and Dr. Scott Urch bring a wealth of experience and skills to assist when athletes need orthopaedic surgery to repair certain types of sports-related injuries that occur from time to time.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Jimmy Lawrence, a 28-year veteran in the athletic department, begins his third season as the men’s soccer trainer, after taking over those duties mid-season three years ago. He has been the baseball athletic trainer for 27 years. He will be assisted by several graduate assistants and student trainers.

Athletic trainer Jimmy Lawrence has earned respect and popularity through his outstanding work with Virginia Tech student-athletes over the past 27 years.

Lawrence, who is certified by the National Trainers Association, began working at Tech in 1979 as a graduate assistant trainer for football, basketball, baseball and wrestling. He was promoted to assistant trainer in 1981 and coordinated the training duties for all men’s sports except football for 19 seasons. Lawrence is beginning his fourth full-time season with the men’s soccer program. During his time at Tech, he has supervised a graduate assistant or student trainer with the soccer team for 23 seasons.

While working with the team, Lawrence provides daily practice coverage. He also assists the team with injury prevention and helps the student-athletes with injuries.

A native of Elliston, Va., Lawrence received his bachelor’s in health and physical education from Emory & Henry in 1979 and a Master’s in physical education from Tech in 1981. As an undergraduate, he worked for four years as a student trainer. Lawrence is married to Peg Morse and resides in Prices Fork.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. Always striving to stay on the cutting edge, Virginia Tech has combined strength and conditioning with nutrition and sport psychology to the benefit of its student-athletes. At Tech, these areas are part of the student-athletes' preparation — not just for game days, but also for life after college. Virginia Tech tries to provide the best services, facilities and support staff for all of its student-athletes, to help them become better athletes and better people.

Strength & Conditioning

One of the most important aspects of a successful college soccer program is its strength and conditioning program. Before the lights ever come on, before the players run onto the field for the first game and before the first goal is ever scored for a season, college soccer players work on getting themselves physically prepared for the rigors of a five-month season.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the soccer program one of the best as well.

Tech soccer players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department. With the two facilities, the Hokies have more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches Terry Mitchell, assistant director of strength and conditioning, and Jamie Meyer coordinator for strength and conditioning.



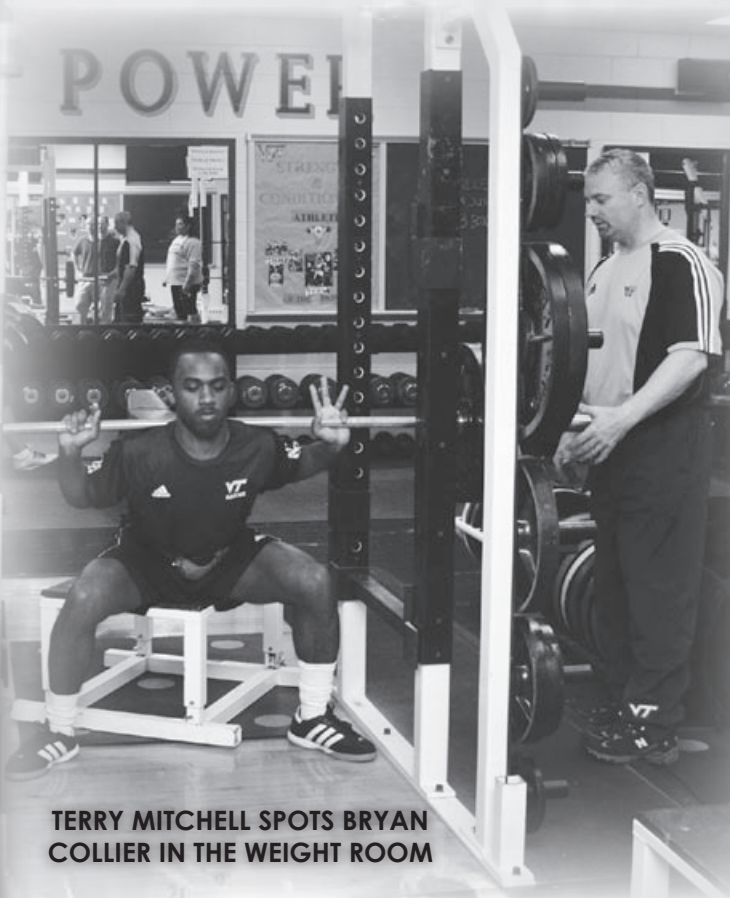

Terry Mitchell, the assistant director for strength and conditioning, is in his fifth year working with the Virginia Tech men's soccer team. A graduate of Lee University, Mitchell earned his master's in community health promotions from Virginia Tech in 2004. He is an NSCA certified strength and conditioning specialist and holds various certifications from U.S. Weightlifting and the Cooper Institute.

In the offseason, the team will have three strength sessions per week and on alternate days, will condition or practice. Each strength workout consists of dynamic flexibility, speed, agility, strength training and mobility work. Mitchell uses an integrated approach in-season, where each training session involves some aspect of the components so players will not lose the benefits of off-season training. Mitchell's experience with professional baseball and personal training allow him to implement functional training that meets the demands of soccer.

Mitchell is a national level powerlifter and frequently competes in competitions along the East coast. He currently holds the drug free, Master's national and world record in the bench press event, which he set at the American Powerlifting Federation nationals in April 2006 with a lift of 529 pounds. He also placed second in the Master's division 220lb weight class for the combined powerlifting competition that consists of the squat, bench and deadlift totals combined.

Mitchell is married to the former Terri Thompson, who serves as Assistant Vice President and Controller for the Virginia Tech Foundation, Inc.

Sports Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.


She also designs preseason menus, snacks and training table menus for the soccer team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our student-athletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very

specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BOD POD is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

Amy Freel begins her fourth year as the sports nutritionist for the men's soccer program.

As the director of sports nutrition, Freel provides sport-specific nutrition education to the men's soccer team. She also provides each individual with nutrition

counseling, which includes learning how to gain muscle weight, lose fat weight, eat well on campus and how to shop for the correct foods at the grocery store.

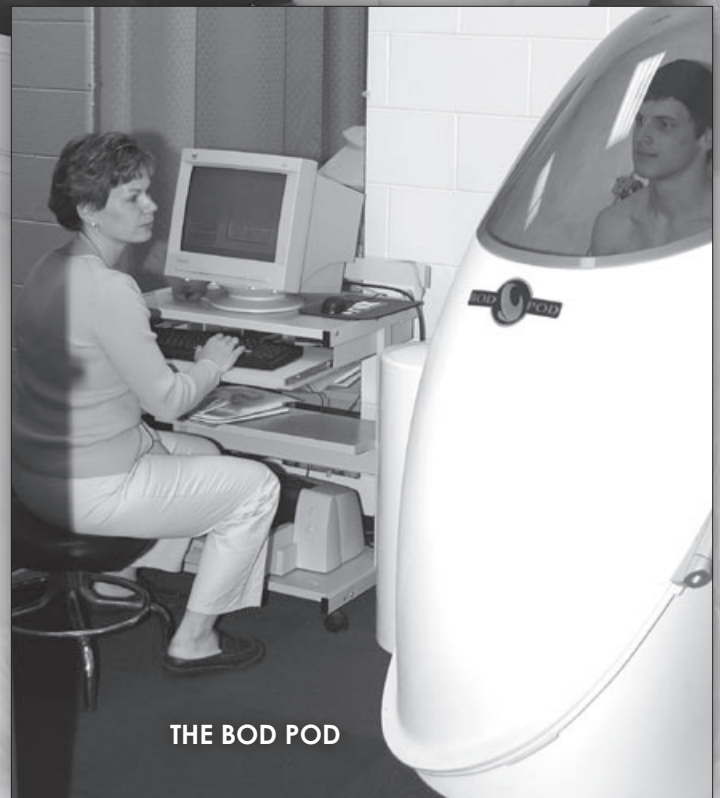
Freel educates the team on supplements and gives a recipe book for all off-campus soccer players.

Four times a year, she provides a body composition test on the athletes with the Bod Pod. The Bod Pod accurately measures the percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass through air displacement within five minutes. She has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

Before coming to Virginia Tech, Freel worked at the Lewis Gale Center in Salem, Va., as a clinical dietitian. From 1999 until 2002, she worked in the student life office.

Freel earned a bachelors in dietetics from Ball State in 1996. In 1998, she earned her Masters in dietetics from her alma mater.

Freel has two sons – Ben (5), Matt (4) and a daughter Ashley, who was born in January. She and her husband Mike, reside in Blacksburg.



THE BOD POD

Sport Psychology

Virginia Tech also offers another important service to all its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

Mike Gentry, assistant AD for athletic performance, says, “I’ve always felt that (sport psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department, and we wanted to and needed to include sport psychology in that model.”

“We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes’ performance on and off the field,” Bennett says. “We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns.”

The sport psychology department also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A new addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions, and increase peripheral awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

The response to the sport psychology program has been very positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

“It is a great resource for our coaches and our athletes,” Gentry says. “We’ve improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and in sport psychology. It’s all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping student-athletes. We want to give them all the resources we can, to put them in a position to be successful.”



DR. GARY BENNETT Sport Psychologist

Dr. Gary Bennett begins his sixth year at Virginia Tech as the Athletic Department’s sport psychologist. Dr. Bennett coordinates the Sport Psychology department, which offers psychological and performance-enhancement services for all student-athletes. He works with


student-athletes on a one-on-one basis dealing with performance-related concerns in addition to off-the-field issues, and also offers various support groups, including injury-recovery groups.

On average, he will conduct 20 individual sessions per week in addition to meeting with teams as the need arises.

Dr. Bennett’s work with teams includes implementing strategies designed to improve concentration and focus, goal-setting, and team cohesiveness.

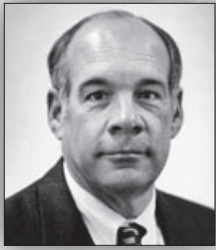

BY THE WAY, WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any

special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

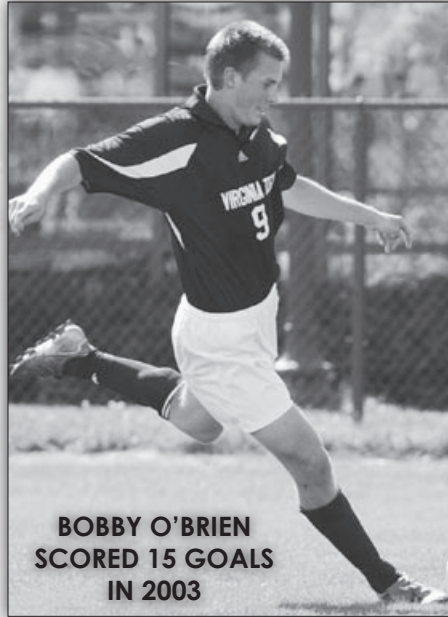

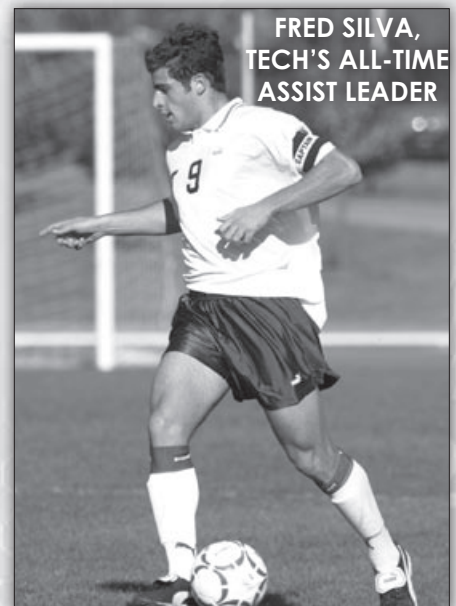

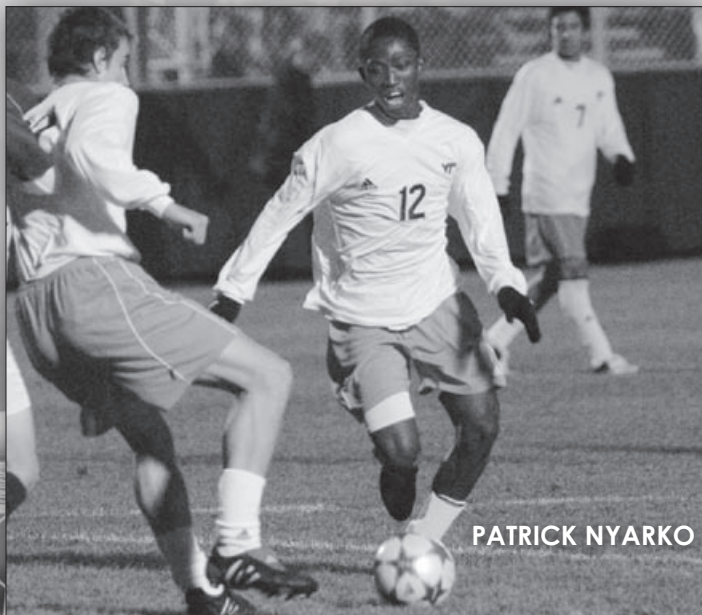

2005 REVIEW

HOKIES CONCLUDE MEMORABLE SEASON

Tech set several records, received many honors on and off the field in 2005

The 2005 Virginia Tech men's soccer season will be looked upon as a year in which the Hokies not only rewrote the record book, but proved to the rest of the country that they could be a contender for the national title under head coach Oliver Weiss.

"We had a good year," Weiss said. "I am very pleased with our players' performance from start to finish, although we were disappointed in not making it beyond the second round of the tournament."

The team not only earned its first-ever first-round bye in the NCAA Championships, but also earned its first-ever top-10 ranking along the way.

After finishing the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament with a 10-5-4 overall record, Tech received a first-round bye in the NCAA Championships, earning the No. 12 seed. On a day filled with snow showers and gusting winds, the Hokies and Spartans of UNC Greensboro played to a 0-0 draw, with the Spartans advancing to the round of 16 after edging Tech 4-3 in penalty kicks.

The Hokies faced nine schools that made the NCAA Championships, including one school, Duke, twice. In the 10 matches that Tech played against those foes, the Hokies garnered a 3-4-3 record. All three wins were against ACC competitors that were ranked in the top 10 nationally at the time. Tech knocked off then-No. 4 North Carolina, then-No. 7 NC State and then-No. 5 Virginia.

On Oct. 8, the Hokies went to Fetzer Field in Chapel Hill, N.C., and did what no team had done all season — defeat North Carolina at home. With just over five minutes remaining, freshman forward Patrick Nyarko netted his third goal of the year, giving Tech a 1-0 lead that senior goalkeeper Chase Harrison would protect with his fourth shutout of the season. The win was Tech's first-ever over the Tar Heels.

Two matches later, on Oct. 15, the Hokies would defeat another program that it had never beaten. NC State came to Blacksburg sporting an 8-3-1 record and went home with a 4-0 loss. Sophomore Marcus Reed broke through the Wolfpack defense with the first goal of the night at the 6:31 mark. Less than two minutes later, redshirt-sophomore Scott Spangler put the Hokies up 2-0. Reed and Nyarko added second-half goals that gave Tech a solid victory.

Continuing its winning ways, Weiss' team headed into Charlottesville to take on a fifth-ranked Virginia squad that was looking for redemption after suffering its first-ever loss to Tech in 2004. The Hokies and Cavaliers battled to a scoreless draw for the first 80 minutes of the match. The Cavaliers' Ian Holder put the home team up 1-0 at 81:14 only to see Nyarko tie the match less than four minutes later off an assist by Harrison. In overtime, Nyarko would strike again, giving Tech its second consecutive 2-1 win over Virginia.

All three of the victories over ACC competition came during the Hokies' school-record 10-match unbeaten streak. The 10-match span also included a school-record setting seven-match winning streak. Posting the three wins over ACC opponents helped the team finish 3-2-3 in the toughest league in the country. The record also earned them a fourth-place finish a conference that featured all nine teams being nationally ranked at one time or another in 2005.

During the record-setting streak, Tech broke another school record that had lasted four years. The Hokies held an opponent without a goal for 495:03, besting the mark that was set in 2001 of 402:35. Tech posted four consecutive shutouts — all wins — including three straight 1-0 victories, which was another first for the program.

In the seventh match of the streak, the Hokies tied two school records in a 10-1 win over the University of Charleston. Tech dished out 10 assists and tallied 30 points on the night.

After beginning the season 1-3-3, Tech won nine of its next 10 matches and went 9-2-2 in its last 13 contests, ending up with a 10-5-5 overall mark. With the team battling season-ending injuries to Ben Nason and Charlie Howe after just two matches, the team persevered and relied on

an influx of new additions to the team as well as the senior leadership of Harrison and midfielder Magnus Einarsson.

Harrison continued to rewrite the Tech record book in his final season between the pipes, amassing just about every record possible for goalkeepers while garnering third-team All-South Atlantic Region honors. He increased his own school record for career shutouts, finishing with 24, while tying his single-season mark of eight shutouts that he set in 2004. Harrison also finished as the leader in minutes played (7181) and the best in goals against average (1.12) for a keeper. In 2005, he made 63 of the squads' 68 saves, which was an all-time low for saves. Harrison ended up with a 0.94 goals against average for the season, which is second only to Colin Kibler's mark in 2001 of 0.90.

Defensively, the Hokies lost seniors Dustin Dyer and Harrison to graduation. The rest of the back line will be strong again in 2006, with seniors Chad Steuck and Brent Dillie leading the way. Alexander Baden started every match in 2005, and the experience should help him in 2006. Bryan Collier started 11 matches in 2005, but went down with an injury halfway through the season before returning for the UNC Greensboro match. Scott Dillie, Brent's younger brother, saw playing time in 16 matches while starting two. The defenders' experience will help the goalkeeper that will replace Harrison adjust to the collegiate game.

Einarsson, completing his graduate degree in mechanical engineering, tallied six goals on the year, including his first career score in the tie with then-No. 7 Duke. He was third on the team in points and second

only to Nyarko for goals scored. Einarsson was one of four players that started in all 20 matches, with the others being Baden, Brent Dillie and Harrison.

Despite losing Einarsson and Roach in the midfield, the return of Howe and Nason should help fill the holes. Alongside the two returning from injury, Brad Collins, Bo Lawrence and Kevin McFadden, Jr., all saw valuable minutes, as did Eric Vickers and Shota Ban in 2005. The group will be relied on heavily to make the transition quickly from defense to offense and serve the forwards for fast-break opportunities in 2006.

On the field, the Hokies' offense was led by Nyarko, who only played in 15 matches after having to sit out the first five before being cleared by the NCAA. Starting 12 matches, Nyarko netted a team-best eight goals while dishing out six assists for a team-leading 22 points. His assist total was good enough for second on the team, just behind Spangler's seven.

Nyarko was honored throughout the season for his play, being named to the *Soccer America All-Freshman First Team*, the *College Soccer News All-Freshman first team*. On two occasions he was named ACC Player of the Week (Oct. 10, Oct. 31), to the *Soccer America Team of the Week* (Oct. 12, Nov. 2) and to the *College Soccer News National Team of the Week* (Oct. 10, Oct. 31). For his efforts against Radford and Virginia, Nyarko was tabbed the *Soccer America Player of the Week* on Nov. 2. He took home the hardware as Tech's only selection to the All-ACC first team. In addition to his first-team accolades, he was named to the All-ACC freshman team and was named the ACC Freshman of the Year. Nyarko was also named to the All-South Atlantic Region second team.

A school-record tying six players were named to the all-state teams. Harrison, Nyarko and Joshua Boateng were named to the first team while Baden, Brent Dillie and Einarsson earned second-team accolades.

Off the field, the Hokies proved to be some of the brightest student-athletes around. Dyer and Einarsson were named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District first-team. Two weeks later, Dyer was named CoSIDA third-team Academic All-America, becoming the second All-American in the program's history, both of which have come under Weiss.

In the final *Soccer America* poll that was released on Nov. 13, before the start of the NCAA Championships, the Hokies were honored with the highest final ranking in school history, grabbing the No. 14 slot. In the NSCAA/adidas final regular-season poll that was released on Nov. 14, Tech was No. 12.

With the return of Nason and Howe back from injury, Nyarko being able to play a full season after having to sit out some of 2005, and with 75 percent of its scoring returning in 2006, the Hokies look like they will improve on their national ranking and contend for their first College Cup berth and national championship.

"I am very optimistic about next year and any season beyond that as we have collected a great core group of returning players," Weiss said. "I feel confident our incoming players will help our proven players and help us reach higher goals in 2006, such as advancing past the second round of the NCAA Championships and eventually to the College Cup."

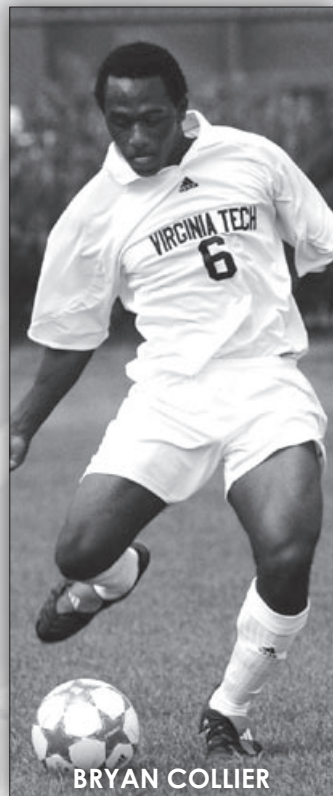

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's inter-collegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 54th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 100 national championships, including 52 in women's competition and 48 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 71 times in women's action.

The conference continued to dominate the national men's soccer field as Maryland claimed its second NCAA title and the league's 11th in 2006. The Terrapins, making their 25th appearance in postseason play, led an ACC record of eight teams to the selected field of 48. The previous high was six, which was set in 2002.

Since 1953, the current ACC schools have made 137 NCAA Tournament appearances. Virginia has laid claim to five national titles over the Cavaliers' 27 showings.

In 2005, six of the eight teams that received a bid also earned a top 16 national seed, including Maryland, which was awarded the No. 1 overall seed. The other five national seeds were No. 4 North Carolina, No. 6 Duke, No. 12 Virginia Tech, No. 13 Virginia, and No. 14 NC State. Clemson and Wake Forest also made their 25th and 10th postseason appearance, respectively.

For the second year in a row, the ACC was represented by three teams in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament. With Maryland, North Carolina and Clemson advancing to the 'Round of 8', the ACC was the only league with more than one of its schools contending in the quarterfinals. It also marked the fifth consecutive year that an ACC team played for a berth in the College Cup.

Duke picked up the 2005 ACC Tournament crown as the No. 5 seeded Blue Devils pulled off a 5-4 win in penalty kicks

over No. 6 seed North Carolina at the SAS Soccer Complex, in Cary, N.C. Duke's Mike Grella netted the game-winning penalty kick in the sudden death portion of the shoot-out, giving the squad their second league title and first since 1999.

Seven ACC teams finished among the top 25 listed in both the Soccer America and NSCAA final 2005 polls. Eight teams tabbed the honor in Soccer America, while three teams were within the top 10. Duke remained in the top 10 throughout the season, finishing fourth. Maryland and North Carolina each earned top 10 finishes in Soccer America as the Terps came in sixth and the Tar Heels at No. 10.

Maryland's Jason Garey was named the 2005 MAC Hermann Trophy recipient after finishing his career as the Terp's all-time leading goal-scorer (60). Joining Garey on the 2005 Soccer America MVP list was the Clemson duo of Phil Marfuggi and Nathan Sturgis. Patrick Nyarko of Virginia Tech was named the ACC Freshman of the Year, while Maryland's Sasho Cirovski recorded his second ACC Coach of the Year recognition and fourth for the Terrapin program.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under than ACC banner have garnered 197 first, second and third team NSCAA All-American distinctions and 65 additional honorable mention nods. The programs boast 19 national Player of the Year accolades, including 13 national Hermann Trophy recipients and five national Rookie of the Year honors.

2005-06 in Review

The 2005-06 academic year concluded with the league pocketing an all-time high six national team titles and 15 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 57 national team titles over the last 16 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 24 of the past 26 years.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2006-07 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

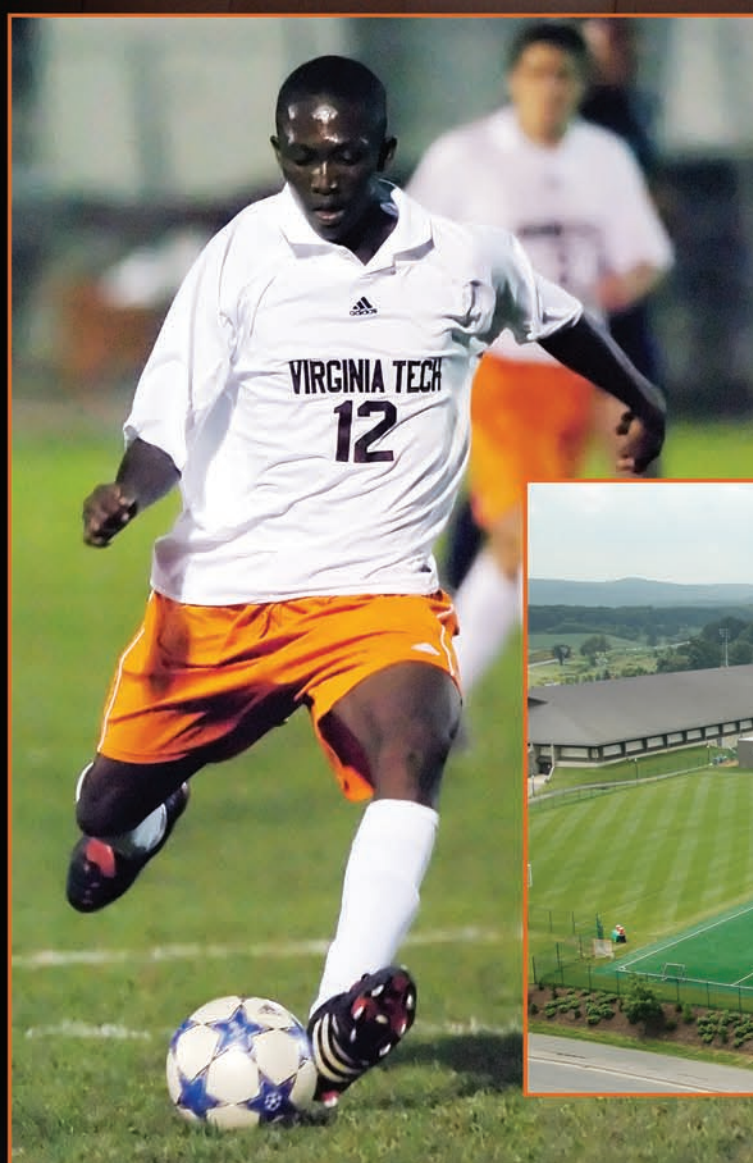

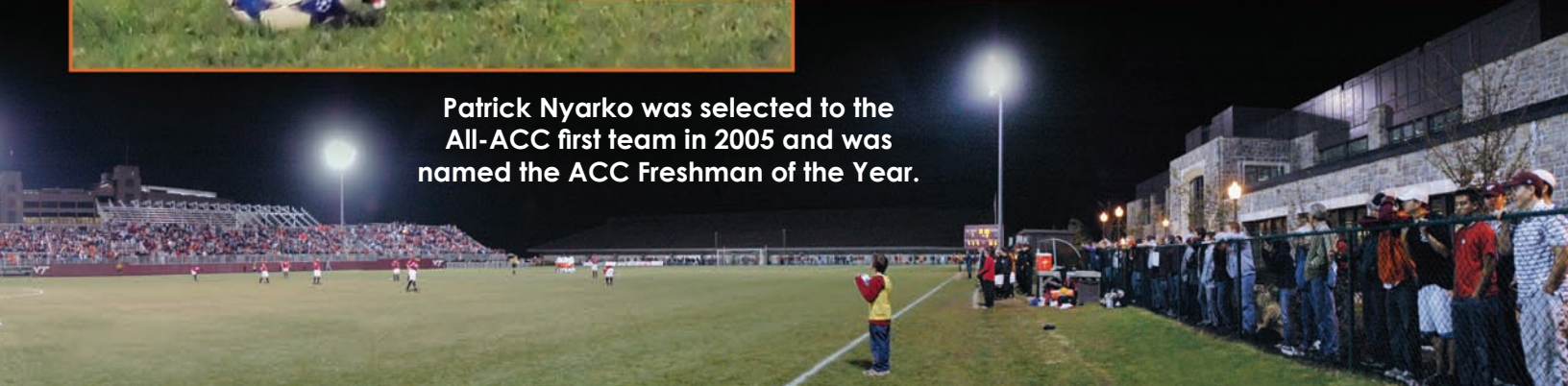
