#### Patience Pays Off

Bo Lawrence, a junior from Haymarket, Va., has been patient during his time at Virginia Tech. This season, his patience and hard work have paid off. Having not played in any matches during his first two season in the Chicago maroon and burnt orange, the 5-10 midfielder/forward has not only played in the first two matches of the season, but he has started both of them as well.

#### Good To Be Back

Redshirt sophomore Scott Spangler saw his first action since the 2003 season in the season-opening win over Towson. Spangler, a native of Media, Pa., redshirted during the Hokies' inaugural season in the ACC. Coming off the bench against the Tigers, the 5-10 midfielder/forward picked up where he left off in 2003. The first time he touched the ball, he ripped a shot past the Towson goalie, netting his seventh career goal.

Also seeing his first playing time since being forced to take a medical redshirt last season was redshirt freshman Bryan Collier. The 5-8 defender from Fayetteville, Ga., played in three games last season, starting two, before he was injured. Collier has started in the first two games this season for head coach Oliver Weiss.

#### Names to Know

So far during the 2005 season, three newcomers to the Tech squad have played in both games. During this time, one has started once while another has started both games. A fourth newcomer has played in one of the two matches.

Alexander Baden, a 6-2 defender from Visselhovede, Germany, has started both matches this year. Junior Shota Ban, a transfer from Creighton, has appeared in both games while starting one. Ban, a 5-8 midfielder originally from Zushi, Japan, played his high school ball in Houston, Texas. Scott Dillie, a freshman from Pittsburgh, Pa., is a 6-3 defender/midfielder who has played in both conests for Oliver Weiss. Another Pennsylvania product, Bryan Matthews, saw his first collegiate playing time against James Madison. Matthews is a 5-10 midfielder from Erie, Pa.

#### The Last Time

In Oliver Weiss' tenure at Virginia Tech, the Hokies have always been 2-1 after the first three games of the season. However, the only other time that Tech has won the season opener under Weiss was in 2003. That season, Tech went on to win a school record 14 games, advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

### Just Virginia Tech, Please

While the full name of the schools is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

# By the way, what is a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

#### Near and Far

Virginia Tech head coach Oliver Weiss and his staff have recruited players from all over the world for the 2005 season. In addition to one incoming recruit from Midlothian, Va., two student-athletes hail from Pennsylvania. Fellow newcomers Joshua Boateng and Patrick Nyarko are natives of Ghana while Alexander Baden is from Germany and Shota Ban is from Japan. In all, seven states and four countries are represented on the roster.

#### Familiar Face

Hokie fans will notice a familar face on the sideline during games. Former defensive standout Lasse Mertins will be an assistant coach, working primarily with the goalkeepers as he works on completing his doctoral degree in Accounting and Information Systems.

#### Familiar Face II

As some new students struggle to find buildings and make friends, at least one incoming freshman will know someone on campus. Scott Dillie will join his big brother Brent, a junior, on the Virginia Tech soccer team.

#### All-Americans

Lasse Mertins and Scott Dillie are the only two Hokies during Weiss' tenure at Virginia Tech that can have All-America after their name. In 2003, Mertins was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America third team while Dillie was named an NSCAA high school All-America during his senior season at Upper St. Clair in Pittsburgh, Pa.

#### Seniors = Experience

This season, Virginia Tech has five seniors on the roster. The five have combined to play in 241 games in the Chicago maroon and burnt orange, while starting in 177.

#### Harrison Tops The Charts

Senior goalkeeper Chase Harrison will be remembered as one of the best net-minders in Hokie history. He already tops the record book for career shutouts with 16. His eight shutouts

in 2004 are a single-season record. Harrison currently holds the top spot for goals against average in a career with 1.17. No goalkeeper has ever been in goal longer than Harrison, tallying 2,062 minutes in 2003 and 5,449 so far during his Tech career. Both are school records.

After posting four saves on six chances at the James Madison Tournament to open his senior campaign, Harrison stands one save shy of fifth place on the all-time career saves list at Virginia Tech. The 6-3 senior has 230 for his career. David Tenney, who played from 1989-1991 recorded 231 as a Hokie. Looking ahead, Harrison has a chance to climb even further up the ladder as Mark Buzzy (1979-1981) stands in fourth place at 298 career saves. Harrison has an outside chance to surpass Brian Bulger (1989-1993), who tallied 305 saves. However, it all depends on how aggressive the Hokies are and how tough the defense plays.

#### Almost Half The Time

The Hokies' schedule looks very similar to the preseason polls. On average, the polls have shown that nearly half of Tech's schedule is ranked. According to the NSCAA, eight are in the top 25. Soccer America and College Soccer News each have seven Tech opponents in their respected preseason polls. CSN also has four other opponents receiving votes, as did Weiss' Hokie team. After the first week of the season, Soccer America and the NSCAA polls each had nine of Tech's opponents in the top 25 at some point during the season.

#### ACC Is The Toughest

When scouting the conferences, College Soccer News rated the Atlantic Coast Conference the toughest in the nation.

According to the Web site, "An easy pick this year. The ACC is loaded from top to bottom. The facts establish that the conference almost always is represented in the Final Four. Last year both Duke and Maryland made it to the Final Four. ACC member Wake Forest has earned the number one seed in the NCAA Tourney two out

of the last three years. Need we say more. The addition of Virginia Tech last year and Boston College this year somewhat super sizes the conference with nine members and makes a very tough league even more competitive. In addition the ACC had another banner recruiting year. The bottom line is that a trip through talent rich ACC country can be very hazardous to an opponents win-loss record. Virginia, North Carolina, Clemson, Virginia Tech and N.C. State round out a league that could have many as seven teams in the big dance in 2005..."

#### Trends

Throughout all the years of varsity soccer by Virginia Tech, the Hokies have won their first game only to lose the second one of the year on 10 occasions. After four games in each of those seasons, Tech went on to lose the next two games twice. Only once did the Hokies win the next two games. Five times Tech split the third and fourth games of the season while the other two times, the Hokies won the third game and tied the fourth.

Coming into the season, Tech was 19-12-2 in season openers, while garnering the same record for home openers. This year, Tech was away for the first game and won a 2-1 decision. The Hokies hope to have an identical home opener record and a season opener record after Friday's match against Tulsa.

# Ranked Teams in Blacksburg

Since 2002, six teams have come to Blacksburg in the top 25. Weiss' team has sent them home with a loss on three occasions. The last team to come into the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium ranked was No. 2 Virginia last season. The Hokies prevailed 2-1. The *NSCAA* preseason poll had both Tulsa and Penn State ranked in the top 25.

#### This Week

The NSCAA regional polls came out this week and Virginia Tech is ninth in the Mid-Atlantic region. In the region, UVa is first, Maryland second, Old Dominion is third and JMU is sixth. All of these schools are on Tech's 2005 schedule.

### Coaches Corner

Head coach Oliver Weiss leads the 2005 Virginia Tech men's soccer team into its second season in arguably the toughest conference in the country - the Atlantic Coast Conference. After placing two teams in the College Cup in 2004, the league looks to be just as competitive this season.

After winning two conference games during their inaugural run through the ACC, Weiss and assistant coach Michael Brizendine set out to recruit the top players in



the game, which would explain the abundance of newcomers to the squad. Of course, during the 2004 season, Tech only knocked off the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams in the country at the time, respectively, as Weiss' squad defeated Duke 1-0 and Virginia 2-1.

With Boston College being thrown into the mix, the Hokies will have their work cut out for them. However, Tech is hoping to build on the successful wins late in the season and get to the NCAA postseason for the first time since 2003. The 2005 Hokies feature five seniors and return nearly everyone from one of the toughest defenses in the country. A new array of scoring options should help Tech become one of the nation's elite in 2005.

#### PREVIEWING THIS WEEK'S ACTION

#### Scouting the opponents

The Hokies will open their home season against the Tulsa Golden Hurricane. Tulsa is coming off a 12-7-4 campaign that was good enough for an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. They are currently 0-1-1 on the season after falling to Oral Roberts 3-1 in the opener and tying UMKC 2-2 on Sunday.

The Golden Hurricane return two of their top three goal scorers in Todd Goddard and Daniel Wasson. Goddard tallied nine goals while Wasson chipped in four in 2004. This season, Goddard, Eric Burkholder and Randy Lopez each have a goal. All three also have an assist.

Tulsa also returns three of its top four assist leaders from last season. Lawson Vaughn led the way for the returners with five while Matt Thomas and Wasson each dished out four. After two games, Thomas has one assist in 2005.

In goal, Dominic Cervi returns for his sophomore season. Cervi

totaled 982 minutes in goal, appearing in 12 games while starting nine. He amassed a 1.47 goals against average while having a .738 save percentage. This year, he has played every second in goal and has a save percentage of .545.

Gone from last year's team are two vital players in Ryan Poore and Terry Boss.

#### SERIES RECORD:

The Hokies' second opponent at the third annual Virginia Tech Classic will be the Nittany Lions of Penn State, who come to Blacksburg with an 0-2 mark. The Nittany Lions fell to No. 8 New Mexico 2-0 and to Marquette, 1-0, last week. Both games were played at the Ohio State Tournament, where Penn State is now 6-3-3 all time

The Nittany Lions return Simon Omekanda, Richard Costanzo,

Brian Devlin and David Walters. Combined, the four tallied 14 goals and 21 assists in 2004, advancing to the NCAA Tournament before bowing out to Tulsa.

In goal, sophomore Conrad Taylor returns. Last year, he played every minute in goal, tallying 75 saves for a .750 save percentage. His 25 goals allowed averaged out to a 1.02 goals against average.

Two key losses for Penn State were Chad Severs and Mike Lindemann.

Severs led the team with nine goals and 21 points while Lindemann amassed a team-best five assists and netting one goal.

This season, Conrad Taylor has played every minute in net, recording seven saves. Penn State has tallied 15 shots to 17 for their first two opponents, but have yet scored a goal.

Hokies Tame Tigers at JMU Tournament, 2-1

**HARRISONBURG, Va. -** The Virginia Tech men's soccer team knocked off the Towson Tigers by a 2-1 margin at the James Madison Tournament Friday evening in the season opener for both teams.

The Hokies improve to 1-0 while the Tigers fall to 0-1.

Tech jumped on the board in the 30th minute when junior Eric Vickers (Fort Worth, Texas) chipped a pass to the far post to redshirt sophomore Scott Spangler (Media, Pa.), who headed it past Towson's goalkeeper, Zak Thompson, for a 1-0 lead. Spangler saw his first action since 2003 after redshirting last season.

The Hokies added their second goal of the match at the 73:33 mark after a corner kick by Magnus Einarsson (Hafnarfjördur, Iceland) was headed out. Senior Dustin Dyer (Ashland, Va.) then took a shot that ricocheted off Thompson. Junior Brent Dillie (Pittsburgh, Pa.) was able to corral it and net what turned out to be the game-winning goal.

Towson put pressure on the Hokies in the closing minutes, and with just under three minutes left, Pat Healey took a rebound and scored a goal past Tech's senior goalie, Chase Harrison (Huntington, W. Va.).

Harrison tallied two saves on the night, while Thompson had five in the loss.

The Hokies return to action on Sunday at 3 p.m., on the second day of the tournament, where they will face James Madison.

**Tech Drops 1-0 Game to JMU** 

**HARRISONBURG, Va. -** Sophomore Lasse Kokko scored the lone goal of the game off a throw in from junior Mike Tuddenham, securing a 1-0 win for host James Madison over the visiting Hokies of Virginia Tech in the final game of the JMU Tournament.

The loss drops Tech to 1-1 on the season while the Dukes rebounded from a 1-0 loss on Friday to Bucknell, evening their record at 1-1.

Tuddenham hit Kokko with a pass, who then played it past Tech's senior goalkeeper, Chase Harrison (Huntington, W. Va.), at the 31:51 mark of the first half.

The Hokies had several chances in the second half, but were unable to convert. For the game, Tech out-shot JMU 11-7, including 9-4 in the final forty-five minutes, but neither squad had many attempts on goal. The Dukes and Hokies each had three shots on goal.

James Madison's Kevin Trapp tallied three saves on the afternoon to two for Tech's Harrison.

"We had a few chances and didn't take advantage of them. We have to learn from our mistakes and focus on our upcoming game against Tulsa," Weiss said.

The Hokies return to action at home on Friday when they face Tulsa at 7:45 p.m., in the Virginia Tech Classic.
