THE OUTLOOK

Hokies looking to step it up in new conference

The end of the 2000 Tech softball season meant the farewell of a senior class that helped build the Tech program from the ground up. While the seniors of a year ago will always be remembered, the show must go on. Returning to this year's team are six starters and two pitchers and in steps one of Scot Thomas' best recruiting classes yet, building the hopes for one of the most successful seasons ever in Blacksburg.

The 2001 version of the Virginia Tech softball squad will feature a young and exciting group that returns five of its six top hitters from a year ago. Included in that group are all-region and two-time All-Atlantic 10 member **Bronwyn Blair**, Tech's all-time

leading home run hitter in **Ali Verbage** and the Hokies' top two pitchers of all-time in **Ashlee Dobbe** and **Clarisa Crowell**.

The combination of Dobbe and Crowell has been one of the most successful around. In their first two years, the two have combined for a 93-35 record with a 1.19 ERA and 854 strikeouts in 860.1 innings pitched. Between the two, they hold over 20 Tech pitching records. Dobbe is coming off a 19-11 season where she led the A-10 in strikeouts. She was named All-Atlantic 10 and tossed three no-hitters, including the first perfect game in school history. Crowell posted a 20-8 record with an ERA of 1.48. At the plate, she broke the school record for home runs in a season with nine.

Also returning is sophomore **Heather Terry**, who was an unexpected bright spot in 2000. She stepped in for an injured Dobbe and posted a 2-2 record. She pitched a complete game against Troy State in helping the Hokies advance in the Florida State Invitational. The coaching staff is expecting big things from freshmen **Ginny Fletcher** and **Catherine Gilliam**. Fletcher, the Virginia State Player of the Year is expected to come in and make a contribution both in the field and at the plate right away. Gilliam will also see action on the

mound and is expected to get better as the season goes along.

The outfield is another solid spot for Tech this year. Blair leads the way in center field. She is Tech's all-time leading base stealer and has been one of the top hitters on the team from her lead-off spot the past three years. Verbage hit seven home runs a season ago and is Tech's all-time home run leader. The senior has been a fixture in right field and is looking to make her final season a memorable one

Also looking for playing time in the outfield are **Heather Todd**, **Crystal Armes**, **Tiffany Hurt** and **Kelli Roznowski**. Todd played in 13 games last season and hit a two-run home run in the regular-season finale. She has a good arm and is a solid option at the plate. Armes is another reliable outfielder who is a good fielder. The senior had five hits and three RBI last season. Hurt is one of the team's best fielders who has very good speed. If she can consistently contribute at the plate, her playing time will increase. Roznowski saw limited playing time a year ago as a freshman, recording one hit in two at-bats. With more experience and practice, her playing time could increase. Freshman **Courtney Brinkman** will also battle for playing time in the outfield as her experience increases.

Mary Lowzinski is a capable outfielder, but has made her biggest contribution as a designated player. The senior, who is Tech's best bunter, came on strong toward the end of the year to finish with a .286 batting average.

Bethany Bird is the lone returning starter at the catcher spot. The junior split time last season behind the plate, appearing in 30 games. She batted .203 with 14 hits and had a fielding percentage of .960. Looking to earn playing time is newcomer Amy Voorhees. The junior college transfer from Florida Community College brings a strong arm and a big bat to the team. Sophomore April Ellenberger made a big contribution as a designated player last

season. The sophomore, who can catch or play first base, had three home runs and 15 RBI.

The infield is the question mark for the Hokies this season after losing three starters from last year's squad. The lone returning starter is Carmen Farmer, who started 61 games at shortstop. The sophomore was one of the best fielders around and surprised many with her play at the plate. She hit .273 with two home runs and three triples. Her play in the field kept many batters off base and runners from scoring. This year, three new faces will surround Farmer. Freshman Mindi Wylie will take over at first base while freshman Shanel Garofalo will start at second base. Crowell, who was an All-Atlantic 10 outfielder last year, will make the move to third base when not pitching. Her strong arm and quick reflexes will be a valuable asset to a young infield.

Sophomore Carmen Farmer was brilliant in the field as a freshman and bigger things are expected this year.

Senior **Michelle Whitaker** is one of the most-beloved members of the team. She is usually the first choice off the bench as a pinch runner and scored 11 runs in 37 games played. Sophomore **Maura Green** was one of the Hokies' most-reliable pinch hitters last season who struck out just once in 14 at-bats. She is a reliable choice at either third or first base who can field the ball well and has a strong arm.

Tech will be taking several new road trips this season as it enters a new conference. The Hokies begin play in the difficult BIG EAST Conference after five seasons in the Atlantic 10. While the A-10 was a good home for the Hokies, the BIG EAST offers up new challenges and opponents. Notre Dame won the conference title last year and went to the NCAA Regionals while Connecticut was one of the top teams in the Northeast Region. Throw in tough Rutgers, Villanova, Boston College, Syracuse, Seton Hall, Pittsburgh and St. John's squads and you have the making of one of the top conferences on the East Coast.

After failing to make the NCAAs last season, this year's team has a renewed drive and hunger to take the next step. With the group returning and the newcomers joining the team this year, the Hokies are counting on 2001 being their year.

THE COACHES



SCOT THOMAS

Head Coach 6th Year • 167-133 ETSU • 1991

Now entering his sixth season, coach Scot Thomas has put Virginia Tech softball on the national map. One of the brightest young minds in the game, Thomas has positioned Hokie softball as one of the top programs in the country. Thomas became Tech's first head softball coach when he was hired on July 7, 1995.

In his first season, he led a team of non-scholarship athletes to a respectable 16-32 record, a total not indicative of the progress made in just one season. An all-conference player, a two-hit shutout and an eight-game winning streak were just some of the highlights of the 1996 season. Melissa Sanderson finished the season ranked eighth in the nation in triples, with eight, on her way to becoming Tech's first All-Atlantic 10 player. Tina Diamond pitched a two-hitter to record the school's first shutout in a 4-0 win over Cornell.

In 1997, Thomas' squad batted nearly .300 for the season, placed two players on the Atlantic 10 All-Conference first-team and won eight more games than during the inaugural season. In its second season, Thomas led the softball team to a 24-32 record and a fifth-place finish in the conference, just two games shy of the four-team league tournament. His first recruited class produced a solid foundation. Freshman shortstop Michelle Meadows and junior college transfer catcher Jennifer McKibben shattered almost every single-season school record and found themselves as members of the All-Atlantic 10 first team. Meadows also became Tech's first softball player named to the ECAC All-State team.

The 1998 season proved to be one of the most decorated in Tech's budding history. With an extremely young squad the Hokies posted the first winning season ever, with a 32-31 record, a second-place finish in the Atlantic 10, two players on the A-10 All-Conference team and two GTE Academic All-Americans. Freshman Ali Verbage was named A-10 Rookie of the Year and an

All-Southeast Region All-American. In total, the Hokies received over 25 academic and athletic awards.

The 1999 season is one that will stand out in Tech history forever. The Hokies finished a spectacular regular season ranked 25th in the nation with a 54-16 record. In just its fourth year as a varsity sport, the team placed second at the A-10 tournament,

falling to UMass for the second year in a row. The Hokies' hopes for a regional at-large bid were denied, but they did receive the national attention they had been working for.

Early games against No. 3
Washington, No. 4
Michigan and No. 20
Florida helped put the Hokies in the driver's seat for the majority of the season. Big wins came over Michigan, Kansas, Tennessee and UVa. Tech finished the year undefeated at home and 14-2 in A-10 play, losing only to

UMass. The Hokies had the third-longest winning streak in the nation at 26, and at one point won 35 of 36 games.

Last season, Thomas' first recruiting class left its mark on the program as the Hokies went 41-22 and finished second in the Atlantic 10 Tournament. All-Conference, A-10 Player of the Year, All-Tournament, GTE District III Academic All-American, Virginia State Co-Player of the Year and GTE National First-Team Academic All-American Michelle Meadows led the team both on

the field and off. Kara Krumhardt was named to the A-10's all-tournament team and Laura Flowers was spectacular most of the season in the field.

Junior all-conference outfielder Bronwyn Blair led the way at the plate while sophomore all-conference performers Ashlee Dobbe and Clarisa Crowell were once again stellar on the mound. Thomas was voted the Virginia Sports Information Director's Coach of the Year for the second year in a row.

Thomas graduated from East Tennessee State University in 1991 with a bachelor's in physical education. He is on the Louisville Slugger advisory staff for the fifth straight year.

A native of Blacksburg, Va., Thomas graduated from Blacksburg High where he was a member of the football and baseball teams.

Thomas is married to the former Carolyn Croy, a Tech graduate from Blacksburg. She is employed as a third-grade teacher at Gilbert Linkous Elementary school. The couple has a son, Andrew Scot, who turned 3 in December.

MONICA TRINER

Assistant Coach 1st Year S. Florida • 1999

Former collegiate All-American and current professional standout Monica Triner begins her first year as the Hokies' assistant coach. Her responsibilities include working with the pitchers, as well as recruiting, conditioning and arranging all travel plans.

Triner comes to Tech after serving as a volunteer assistant coach at her alma mater, South Florida. She was the second overall pick in the 1999 Women's Professional Softball League draft and led the Tampa Bay FireStix to the title. She was the winning pitcher in the championship game, defeating Akron, 2-1. As a rookie, Triner was 10-7 with a 1.74 ERA.

Triner played her college softball at the University of South Florida, where she holds 21 softball records and posted a career record of 92-33 with a school-record 37 shutouts. She had an 0.95 ERA and holds records for career wins, games pitched (154), complete games (109), innings pitched (786) and

strikeouts (641).

Triner batted .390 at USF with a school-record 23 home runs and 158 RBI. She also had 52 doubles and scored 100 runs. She was a two-time All-American and three-time All-Southeast Region selection. Triner graduated from USF in 1999 with a B.S. in criminology.

A native of Gibsonton, Fla., Triner graduated from East Bay High in 1995. At East Bay, she hit over



.400 each of her four seasons and had an ERA of 0.09 her senior year. In her spare time, Triner enjoys fishing, bowling and playing volleyball. Triner is single and resides in Blacksburg.



AL BRAUNS

Assistant Coach 3rd Year Penn State • 1973

Al Brauns begins his third year as an assistant for the Hokies. His responsibilities include working with the outfielders, field maintenance, equipment and recruiting. Brauns is a familiar face in Hokie sports, holding a position with the athletic department for three years prior to joining the softball staff.

Under his direction a year ago, the foursome of Ali Verbage, Bronwyn Blair, Crystal Armes and Tiffany Hurt (four returning players on this year's squad) combined for a fielding percentage of .987. The four committed just two errors in 153 chances.

Brauns started playing fastpitch in the 1960s and finished his career playing with a men's major team from 1970-74. He is originally from Uniontown, Pa., and graduated from Penn State in 1973 with a degree in criminology.

Coach Brauns and his wife, Michelle, have one child, Adam, the Hokies' batboy, who is 9. Brauns also has two other sons, Eric, 32, and Jason, 26. He has two grandchildren, Alaina and Allison.

A solid competitor who started 14 games last season ... Will battle for a starting position in the outfield ... Coaches can go to her without any worries ... One of the hardest workers on the team ... A quality role player ... Coming off a good fall practice ... Can be used in any situation ... Will also pinch hit frequently.

2000: Started in 14 games for the Hokies as a junior ... Played

Hokies post 40+ wins for second straight year

The 2000 edition of the Virginia Tech softball team took on one of its toughest schedules in history head-on in recording an impressive 41-22 record. The Hokies had some ups and downs, but in the end, took second place in the Atlantic 10 and finished with 40 or more wins for the second year in a row.

The Hokies opened the season with a tough 4-3 loss to Ball State at the UNC/Triangle Classic in Raleigh, N.C. In the next game, Ashlee Dobbe struck out 18 Youngstown State batters, including 17 in a row, en route to a 3-0 victory. After downing UNC Greensboro and UNC Charlotte, Tech fell 1-0 in eight innings to Alabama, an eventual Women's College World

Michelle Meadows led the team in batting average last season, as well as fielding percentage.

The Hokies returned home and swept Radford before heading to Bristol, Tenn., for the State Line Classic. In the first game, Bronwyn Blair took the first pitch of the first inning and planted it over the left field fence for a solo home run. The Hokies would go on to beat Kentucky, 6-3, in nine inninas. Sandwiched between two tough losses to Notre Dame was a big 1-0 victory over rival the Tennessee Lady Vols.

Up next was the annual Spring Break Trip, which took Tech to Florida. At the Speedline Classic in Tampa, Tech picked up several big victories. Laura Flowers' home run in the bottom of the seventh sparked a wild comeback against Boston University as the Hokies beat the Terriers, 4-3, in eight innings. Clarisa Crowell crushed a two-run home run as Tech upset No. 17 Oklahoma State to advance to the semifinals, where the Hokies fell to Florida.

After a few days off, the Hokies traveled to Tallahassee for the FSU Invitational. With the pitching staff riddled by injuries, freshman Heather Terry was forced into unexpected action and picked up her first career victory with a complete-game, five-hitter as the Hokies beat Troy State, 2-1. In the tournament, Tech downed Furman, 5-0, before falling to Georgia State in the semifinals of the consolation bracket.

Tech returned home for two games, sweeping George Mason. After a disappointing performance at the Buzz Classic in Atlanta and a split at Marshall, the Hokies went on an impressive run to get their season going into high gear. The Hokies won 13 of their next 15 games, including two wins over No. 24 East Carolina, the Hudson-Hokie Classic championship, a split with Atlantic 10-rival Massachusetts and sweeps of in-state rivals Virginia and Liberty.

The Hokies then stepped into conference play and started a little slow, getting swept by Temple. The next day, Tech swept St. Joseph's and rocked star pitcher Christina Kowalski in the first game. Tech then won six straight Atlantic 10 games

Tournament, Tech faced
Dayton in the first round,
a team it split with in the
regular season. Dobbe
came out and threw her
third no-hitter of the year
as the Hokies won 4-0.
After falling to UMass the
next day, Tech came
back and beat the Flyers,
1-0, with a run in the

bottom of the seventh to advance to the championship game. In the end, the Minutewomen were too much, knocking off the Hokies, 6-0, in the championship game.

After all was said and done, several Hokies raked in numerous postseason awards and honors. Michelle Meadows led the way, earning several athletic and academic awards. She was named a first-team Academic All-American for the second year in a row to top the list. She was also named the Atlantic 10 Player of the Year and was named all-conference and to the all-tournament team. The Richmond native was also voted to the Virginia Sports Information Director's (VaSID) all-state team and was the Co-Player of the Year. She was also voted as the Atlantic 10's Student-Athlete of the Year for softball and was named to the GTE Academic All-District Team. Meadows was also voted to the All-Northeast Region First Team.

Blair, Crowell and Dobbe were also named all-conference while Kara Krumhardt was voted to the A-10 all-tournament team. Along with Meadows, Blair, Crowell and Dobbe were voted to the VaSID all-state team. Crowell made the team as both a pitcher and an outfielder, a first for the state. Coach Scot Thomas was voted the Coach of the Year.

Meadows, Dobbe and Krumhardt were named to the A-10's academic all-conference team while Dobbe was voted to the District III Academic team. Blair was named to the Northeast Region First Team while Dobbe made the second team.

Coming off back-to-back successful seasons, Thomas and the rest of the Hokies are primed and ready to tackle their next challenge — The BIG EAST Conference — head on in 2001.



Academic Enrichment

The success of Virginia Tech's softball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs (SAOAEP).

Last season, the Tech softball program had the ninthhighest GPA in Division-IA softball, with a team average of 3.28. Also, Michelle Meadows was voted a firstteam Academic All-American for the second year in a row.

The SAOAEP provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring and much more.

The coordinator, Chris Helms, is responsible for the development and leadership of SAOAEP.

Lois Berg, who is in her 11th year at Tech, is in charge of the Hokie softball team. She is also in charge of developing

the freshman orientation program, which ensures the student-athlete a smooth transition from high school to the university.

Colin Howlett is in his third year with SAOAEP and is administratively responsible for the tutorial program that includes hiring, training and assigning approximately 60 tutors each semester.

Katie Ammons is charged with the operation of the HEAT lab and other computing resources available for student-athletes.

Terrie Repass is in her 25th year of service at Virginia Tech and serves as the office receptionist and "first contact" person for the SAOAEP.

Strength and Conditioning

For the Virginia Tech softball team, the strength and conditioning program, under the direction of Assistant Athletic Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, plays a very important role.

A Durham, N.C., native, Gentry received a bachelor's in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979. Gentry received his master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981 where he worked as an assistant strength coach. He then went to East Carolina University and was elevated to head strength coach there in 1982. He worked at ECU until he came to Virginia Tech in 1987.

Gentry completed work for his Ph. D., at Virginia Tech in 1999.

Assisting Gentry this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Sonny Sano, director of strength and conditioning, Jay Johnson, strength and

coordinator for women's Olympic sports.

Boswell, who came to Tech after graduating from East Carolina, is in her first year at Tech. She handles strength and conditioning for Virginia Tech's women's Olympic sports, including Tech's softball team.

Sano is in his fourth season at Tech after serving as a G.A., at ECU.

Johnson handles the strength and conditioning program for the the men's Olympic sports teams. He received his B.A., in physical education from Emory & Henry in 1995 and his master's in physical education from Radford in 1998.

THE FACILITIES

The Virginia Tech softball team has the luxury of playing and practicing in some of the finest facilities on the East Coast. Using the Tech Softball Field, Rector Field House and the Jim "Bulldog" Haren weight room, the Hokies train with the best in preparing to win championships.

The Virginia Tech Softball Field is a great complex that became even better in the offseason. The field has a playing surface that is properly maintained and upgraded as needed.

The dugouts, faced with Hokie stone, are complete with bathrooms, water

fountains and equipment rooms. They also are ADA accessible and have access to separate bullpens, making them some of the finest around.

The field, which was completed in the Fall of 1997, has dimensions of 200 feet down the lines and 220 feet to center field. Over the past three seasons at home, the Hokies have compiled a record of 63-13, including a 17-0 campaign in 1999 and a 18-3 performance in 2000.

In 1999, permanent bench-back seats were added. With the new bleachers, the complex can easily hold up to 500 fans.

At the top of the new seats is a prefabricated, 8-by-18 foot press box. Complete with power and phone lines, it accommodates all the needs of the media.

A state-of-the-art scoreboard was installed during the 1998 season, making it easier for coaches, players and fans to keep up with the game.

When weather doesn't allow for outdoor practice, the team doesn't lose practice time by moving into Rector Field House.

Located adjacent to the playing field, the field house has an artificial surface, batting cages and ample room for drills. It is also equipped with a training room.

Locker room renovations and outdoor batting cages are projects in the works.
