He became a full-time employee at Virginia Tech after serving as an intern in the sports information office during the 1999-2000 school year. As the athletics communications director for softball, Johnston oversees the press box at home games, serving as the official statistician. On the road, he keeps the Web site and team stats updated. He has served as both the official scorer and announcer at several NCAA Softball Championships, games involving the U.S. Olympic Softball team, and served as the SID for the gold-medal winning USA Junior National Team, traveling with them to the Netherlands last summer.

A native of Chesapeake, Va., Johnston is a 1999 graduate of the University of South Carolina with a degree in sport administration.

## DIRECTIONS TO BLACKSBURG

From the north or east, take Interstate 81 south to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From the south, take Interstate 81 north to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the signal at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed one-half mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road at the signal, just before the football stadium. Tech Softball Park will then be on the left, across the street from Lane Stadium.

## WHAT IS A HOKIE?

> That's the most often-asked question regarding Virginia Tech.

The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body.

Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any meaning to it, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was only used as an attentiongetter for his yell.

It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those loyal to Tech athletics.

## HEADLINES

- Four starters from last year's infield return, but the positions have been switched up a bit.
- Stephanie Savre returns at first base. She swings a powerful bat from the left side, hitting 22 career home runs. Beth Walker will also be used here, but could also be used at third base. She, too, has a powerful bat and whoever is hitting the best will likely get the nod that day. Transfer Kim Jalm showed some promise in the fall and could also be used here.
- Erin Ota won the starting spot at second base early as a freshman and has held it down since. Ota is a speedy lefty who can power slap to the gaps and is a good contact hitter.
- The shortstop position could see several starters throughout the year depending on the lineup. Transfer Misty Hall will be used here when she's not catching. She has an extremely strong arm and is expected to be dangerous at the plate. Freshman Jess Hodge is a natural fielder who makes plays look effortless, but must continue to improve at the plate. Sophomore Anna Zitt saw a lot of action as the starter last year. She is a versatile player who could also play second base and may be used some in the outfield as well.
- Charisse Mariconda makes the move back to her natural position of third base after rotating between shortstop and third last year. She's a competitive player who leaves it all out on the field. Along with Walker, Dori Nunley is a solid fielder who could also be an option at third base.


## COACH BRAONS ON THE TNFIELDERS

"We're very fortunate to have our core group of starters back this year and we'll base our infield around them. A big key is getting Charisse Mariconda back to her natural position at third base. She took one for the team last year in playing some shortstop, but having Jess Hodge, Misty Hall and Anna Zitt at shortstop will put her back at third and Dori Nunley gives us another option at third. Erin Ota is a gamer at second base and she always gives top effort. It'll be a battle at first base between Stephanie Savre and Beth Walker, so that'll be exciting."

## HEADLINES

- The outfield will return all three starters.
- Caroline Stolle started all 65 games last year in left field and should anchor this spot once again. Last year, she led the team in batting average, home runs and RBI.
- Jessica Everhart will hold down the centerfield spot once again after earning all-state honors last year. She has started every game in centerfield over the past two years. Speedy Jenna Rhodes will battle for playing time as the designated player, but could also be used in centerfield.
- In right field, sophomore Whitney Davis returns after starting 44 games there last year as an invited walk-on. She has the strongest arm of all the outfielders, and is coming on at the plate.
- Anna Zitt, an outfielder in high school who played shortstop last year for the Hokies, will likely be used as a defensive replacement late in games.

> COACH BAYSE ON THE OUTFIELDERS "Defensively, the outfield will probably be one of the best in the ACC. All three starters return to their position. This year there will be good depth provided by defensive specialist Anna Zitt, Jenna Rhodes and possibly some help from Heather Lowry when she isn't pitching. All of the outfielders are capable of being starters, we just need to see who will step up to the plate. Jenna was one of the leading hitters in the fall and she may just take her sister's place as the designated player at the top of the lineup."

- Two veterans and three newcomers will handle the pitching duties this year.
- Senior All-American Angela Tincher returns and is the ace of the staff. She made it through the 2007 season with no major injuries and her numbers showed. She led the nation in ERA and was second in strikeouts.
- Finding a reliable No. 2 pitcher behind Tincher is paramount.
- Elly Gosby transfers in from the University of South Carolina and is expected to help out both in the circle and at the plate. Two years ago, she went 14-0 at Indian River Community College, earning All-America honors.
- Sophomore Heather Lowry is a hard thrower who continues to develop. She was very good in spots last year, but needs to finish games and show a little more consistency.
- Kenzie Roark is a raw talent who performed well in the fall. Her contribution level this year will be determined by how quickly she can continue to adjust to the college game. Kim Jalm could also contribute to the rotation.


## COACH McVAY ON THE PITCHERS

"I like the makeup of this group. They all work hard and expect to do great things this year. Obviously, Angela leads the staff and we know what she can do. Our success this year will be determined by the other four on the staff. All of them are talented and we need them to come along and be able to give us quality outings each time they take the field."

## HEADLINES

- Senior Kelsey Hoffman brings the most experience to the position. She's a strong defensive catcher who calls a great game. Last year, she started 45 games and hit .277. She will be the main backstop behind the plate, especially when Tincher is pitching, and will also provide senior leadership.
- Misty Hall could play several positions, including behind the plate. She will likely see action at shortstop when not catching and even played first base at JUCO. The transfer
has a strong arm and batted .496 as a freshman a year ago at Louisburg College.
- Morgan Harris is a Virginia product who brings a good work ethic to the team. She will help with the pitching staff, serving as the bullpen catcher. She redshirted last year. Amber Walker, the sister of junior Beth, transfers in from Roanoke College and is expected to be a big help to the pitching corps.


## COACH THOMAS ON THE CAICHERS

"With five pitchers, we're fortunate to have four catchers who can get the job done. Kelsey Hoffman is a great leader behind the plate. It's like having another coach on the field with her. She's become a clutch hitter and we're looking for great things out of her. Misty Hall is one of the best overall athletes we've ever had here, but she still needs to learn a little bit about calling games, but we're excited about what she brings to the team. Morgan Harris and Beth Walker also do a great job with our staff and I have confidence in putting all four of them into a game. It's not a situation most teams have, but we're fortunate to be in this spot."

Now entering his 13th season, Scot Thomas has positioned Hokie softball as one of the most respected programs, not only in the state and region, but has put in on the national map as well. With nine winning seasons under his belt, including three straight NCAA Regional appearances, Thomas is looking to lead his veteran team to new heights.

Last year, he saw his team post 49 wins, including the ACC's regular season and conference tournament championships. Those titles were the first in the program's history and helped him earn ACC Coach of the Year honors. He also picked up his 400th career win, a 3-0 victory over Stetson, and saw his team finish ranked 14th in the country, a program high. Additionally, Thomas - along with his three assistants - were named the Northeast Region Coaching Staff of the Year by the NFCA.

In 2006, the Hokies won 39 games and were a No. 2 seed at the Knoxville Regional, despite starting seven sophomores or freshmen down the stretch. He helped coach Tech's first softball All-American, as well as five all-region, four all-conference and seven all-state selections.

In 2005, Tech picked up 44 wins and was selected to the NCAA Tournament, a first in the program's history. After finishing seventh in the conference, the Hokies made a dramatic run to the championship game to secure the bid. Three players earned all-region honors and over two dozen school records were broken by either the team or individuals.

In 2004, he led Tech to its sixth winning season while picking up his 300th win. Three players earned All-BIG EAST honors while two took home all-region accolades as Tech posted a 36-23 record.

Thomas became Tech's first head softball coach when he was hired on

July 7, 1995. Since then, he has recorded 434 wins, averaged 36 wins per season and made the conference tournament championship game six times.

The Hokies finished a spectacular 1999 season ranked 25th in the nation with a 54-16 record. In just its fourth year as a varsity sport, the team placed second at the A-10 tournament, falling to Massachusetts for the second year in a row. For his team's play, Thomas was named the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year. Tech's hopes for a regional at-large bid were denied, but it did receive the national attention it had been working for. An upset of No. 4 Michigan highlighted the season. Tech finished the year undefeated at home and 14-2
in Atlantic 10 play, losing only to UMass. The Hokies had the third-longest winning streak in the nation at 26, and at one point won 35 of 36 games.

In 2000, his first recruiting class left its mark on the program as the Hokies went 41-22 and finished second in the A-10 Tournament. Atlantic 10 Player of the Year and two-time GTE National First-Team Academic AllAmerican Michelle Meadows led the team both on the field and off.

In 2002, Thomas led the Hokies to their third 40 -win season and a runner-up finish at the BIG EAST Softball Championship.

While success on the field is important, Thomas also places a strong emphasis on success in the classroom. In 12 seasons, he has had four players earn Academic All-America honors. Michelle Johnson made the 1998 second-team squad while Meadows was a three-time selection, the last two being on the first team. Following the 2002 season, Ashlee Dobbe earned first-team honors and Angela Tincher is a two-time Academic All-American, to go along with two NFCA/Louisville Slugger All-America honors.

In the 1999-2000 season, the Hokies finished tied for ninth in the nation for team grade point average (3.28).

Respected by many, Thomas has been named the Virginia State Coach of the Year by the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) four times (1999, 2000, 2002 and 2005). He has had over 23 different players named to the all-state team 41 different times, including at least three on every team in nine of the last 10 seasons.

Thomas graduated from East Tennessee State University in 1991 with a bachelor's in physical education. He is on the Louisville Slugger advisory staff for the 13th straight year. He was also selected to be the head coach of a group of local collegiate all-stars who took on the U.S. Olympic Softball Team in Salem, Va., in the summer of 2004 and will do so again in the summer of 2008.

Thomas is also an active ballplayer in the fastpitch world, playing in the ASA Men's B Nationals in 2003 and the NSA World Series in 2004 and 2005.

A native of Blacksburg, Va., Thomas graduated from Blacksburg High where he was a member of the football and baseball teams. He is married to the former Carolyn Croy, a Tech graduate from Blacksburg.

The couple has a son, Andrew Scot, who is 10, and a daughter, Eliza Leigh, who turned 6 in November.

Al Brauns enters his 10th year as an assistant for the Hokies. His responsibilities include working primarily with the infielders, as well as helping with the outfielders and hitters. He also is in charge of field maintenance, travel, equipment and has a heavy hand in recruiting.

Brauns is a familiar face in Hokie sports, holding a position with the Virginia Tech athletics department for three years prior to joining the softball staff. Under his direction, numerous players have earned all-state, all-conference and all-region honors. Bronwyn Blair, a four-year starter in centerfield, was drafted by the Tampa Bay FireStix of the WPSL in 2001. In 2006, he coached Kelly Brown to her third All-Northeast Region squad and freshman Jessica Everhart to All-ACC and all-region honors.

That year, the outfield had a fielding percentage of .952, recording seven outfield assists and committing just six errors all year. Everhart led the way with four assists.

Last year, he showed his versatility by taking over the infielders and will have the luxury of returning all four starters this year, plus several others who have had significant playing time.

Brauns started playing fastpitch in the 1960s and finished his career playing with a men's major team from 1970-74. In the summer of 2003, he coached a men's fastpitch team to a 17th-place national tournament finish.


Brauns is originally from Uniontown, Pa., and graduated from Penn State in 1973 with a degree in criminology. Brauns and his wife, Michelle, have one child, Adam, who is 15 years old. He also has two other sons, Eric, 39, and Jason, 33. He has two grandchildren, Alaina and Allison.


Tiffany McVay is in her second season with the Virginia Tech softball program, serving as the Hokies' pitching coach. The effects she's had on the Hokie program are clearly evident as her staff had the thirdlowest ERA in the country at 1.28 while Angela Tincher earned
 first-team All-America honors with a nation-low 0.56 ERA and 38 wins.

McVay played collegiately at East Tennessee State University, where she was a member of the Bucs' inaugural team. An all-conference player in 2003, she still holds the school's single-season records for lowest ERA, wins, saves, complete games and shutouts. She also holds the career records for innings pitched, strikeouts, shutouts and wins. She was equally talented at the plate, hitting 16 home runs and driving in 68 runs in her career.

She was a three-time MVP of the ETSU squad, earning all-tournament honors at the 2003 SoCon Tournament. McVay, who played from 20012004, spent her two years prior to Tech as a professional pitching coach in Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee.

McVay graduated from East Tennessee State in 2004 with a B.S., in dietetics and food management. She married Derek McVay, who is enrolled in the Virginia College of Osteopathic Medicine (VCOM), in 2002. The couple had their first child, Shepherd Jett, in December of 2007.

Alan Bayse is in his second year as a volunteer assistant coach for the Hokies.

The former head coach at Roanoke College went 289-100 in nine years at the helm, guiding the Maroons to six ODAC titles and to the NCAA Division III Tournament six times in seven years.

The five-time ODAC Coach of the Year is a 1979 graduate of Radford University. In 2000, Bayse and his staff were named Speedline/NFCA Division III Coaching Staff of the Year. Bayse works primarily with the outfielders at Virginia Tech.

Other offerings include individual home pages for each of Virginia Tech's sports. Breaking news and archived releases about all Tech teams can be found, along with media guides containing player and coaching staff profiles, schedules, records, historical information and other pertinent facts for every sport.

Also, accessible on every sport's home page are the rosters, with links to player bios, schedules and results, as well as conference standings. School single-game, season and career records, Tech Softball Park records and directions to the field are found here. Head coach Scot Thomas also makes good use of the "Coaches Notebook," which is updated as the season progresses, providing fans with an inside view of the softball program.

With fast "live stats," fans can view stats as they happen via the Web. These stats are available for all home games, and most away games. Once again this year, Jerry Massey - the Voice of Tech softball - will call all of Tech's home games on hokietv.com and ACC Select.

The in-house site was first launched on Nov. 29, 1999, and in 2006, hokiesports.com averaged 665,000 visits and over two million page views per month. In addition, "Travels With Tinch" was launched to help fans keep up with the progress of All-America pitcher Angela Tincher as she competed in Taiwan. In July of 2006 alone, the site had 17,273 visits and 22,746 page views. The site is run by Damian Salas, who also serves as the sound technician at all of Tech's home softball games.

Because all Tech students are required to own computers, the Virginia Tech athletics department helps its scholarship athletes fulfill that requirement by providing them with state-of-the-art laptops equipped with the most recent software.

In addition to procuring laptops for the athletes, the office also addresses hardware and software needs for the student-athletes and the entire Virginia Tech athletics staff, including repairs, upgrades and virus protection. Laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes when traveling to away contests.

Last summer, the new computer labs in Lane Stadium's west side expansion were opened, featuring nearly 30 brand-new computers. The new academic services center in Lane Stadium is one of the finest

## The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.
However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and


49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

The success of softball in the ACC has increased over the years since the conference began sponsoring the sport in 1992. The league has produced 47 NFCA All-Americans, including Angela Tincher, who was a first-team selection last year. In addition, the ACC has had 175 studentathletes named NFCA All-Region.

The ACC can also measure its achievements in the postseason, as the conference has sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament over the past several years. In 2007, the league's presence in the national event tied an all-time high, as five teams represented the ACC for the second year in a row, and just the second time ever. Prior to 2006, the ACC had four members competing in the NCAA once (2005) and three teams in both 2003 and 2004. In all, ACC schools have combined for 41 all-time appearances in the NCAA Tournament, with 26 of those coming since the year 2000.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, Florida State has established itself as one of the top softball programs in the country. The Seminoles have appeared in the NCAA Tournament in 20 of the last 22 years. Florida State also possesses College World Series experience, having made four of its seven appearances as a member of the ACC.

Over the years, ACC softball has found similar success in the classroom. Over 20 student-athletes have been selected as an NFCA All-American Scholar-Athlete, while several others have been tabbed NFCA Academic AllAmericans or ESPN The Magazine (formerly Verizon) Academic All-Americans. In 2007, two ACC student-athletes were named ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including Virginia Tech's Tincher, while six more were selected to either the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first- or secondteams. In its history, the conference has placed 52 student athletes on the Academic all-district teams.

## 2006-07 in Review

The 2006-07 academic year concluded with league teams capturing five national team titles and 24 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 39 national team titles over the last 11 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 25 of the past 27 years.

A total of 137 ACC teams placed in NCAA post-season competition in 2006-07. League teams compiled a 109-70-7 (.605) mark against nonconference opponents in NCAA championship competition. In addition, the

ACC had 181 student-athletes earn first team All-America honors this past year. Overall, the league had 250 first, second or third team All-Americans. In addition, the ACC produced nine national Player of the Year and six national Coach of the Year honorees.

## The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 24 sports during the 2007-08 academic year - 12 for men and 12 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on Feb. 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing

This year's ACC Softball Championship will be contested on May 8-11, 2008 in College Park, Md., as the University of Maryland will host the event.

## A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed $\$ 200.00$ to pay for conference expenses.

On Dec. 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On Oct. 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

## ACC Championship Highlights Big 2007 Season

After two years, the Virginia Tech softball team finally achieved the goal it had set out to reach when first entering the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004. The squad was crowned ACC champions, clinching the regular season and then, on the strength of Angela Tincher's pitching and clutch hitting from several players, Tech earned its first league title with a 2-0 win
 over Georgia Tech, sending the team into a wild celebration on the field.

The Hokies took on their cross-state rivals, the Virginia Cavaliers, in the first game of the tournament. In the fourth inning of the game, UVa had pushed a run across and Tech's bats were lifeless. However, this would be the only run scored against Tech for the entire tournament. And after sophomore Charisse Mariconda sparked a rally by driving in two of the four runs for Tech, the Hokies were on their way to a title.

After defeating the Cavaliers, Tech then went on to hand Florida State its first loss (4-0) of the tournament, and then knocked the University of North Carolina (3-0) out of the tournament.
On "Championship Sunday" Tech faced the Yellow Jackets of Georgia Tech. In comparison, just two years earlier, the championship game was played by the two teams but it was the other Tech that came out on top that year. This year, however, Virginia Tech came out with a win thanks largely to a big hit from sophomore Kelsy Rokey. Rokey hit a two-run home run to put Tech up 2-0 in the bottom of the second to give them the lead that would last the rest of the game. Strong tournaments from Tincher, Rokey and Jessica Everhart landed them on the all-tournament team.

The ACC crown was a culmination of determination and hard work from the Hokies throughout the season. Virginia Tech won three preseason tournaments: the Georgia State Tournament, the Tiger Invitational and the Knight Games.

In the Tiger Invitational, Tincher broke the Virginia Tech strikeout record, previously held by Ashlee Dobbe (926). Tincher set that new record when facing Notre Dame, earning her 937th strikeout. That would be one of 607 on the year as she went on to break the ACC's career strikeout record as just a junior.

At the NFCA Leadoff Classic, Tech beat a tough Illinois State squad, and the 18th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs before falling 1-0 to No. 13 Michigan in the semifinals.

Before traveling to Florida for the spring break trip, Tech played against Radford for their annual New River Valley face-off. Both games were won by pinch hits in the seventh inning. In the first, junior Kelsey Hoffman hit the game winning run with her pinch hit single up the middle, while in game two, sophomore Beth Walker blasted a two-run home run with two strikes and two out to lift Tech to a 2-1 win.

On the first stop of the spring break trip, head coach Scot Thomas picked up the 400th win of his career when the team beat Stetson 3-0 in the championship game of the Knight Games Tournament.

The next stop for the Hokies was the USF/adidas Spring Break Invitational. Tech faced Ohio State twice, not knowing that these games would prove useful for their third match-up in regionals.

Tech lost the first game to the Buckeyes, but in the championship game of the Silver Bracket, Tech beat OSU 2-0. Freshman Whitney Davis got Tech to the title game with a triple down the right field line to give Tech the win over Western Michigan and Tincher's no-hitter kept the Buckeye bats quiet in the final.

The Hokies started their ACC matchups with a three-game series against Georgia Tech, which was then ranked 18th in the country, taking two games against the powerful Jackets.

Tech won all seven series of ACC play, winning at least two out of the three games. Tech even swept the Cavaliers at Charlottesville to take the season series 4-0 and finish 15-5 in league play.

The Tech squad was also faced with the challenge of playing softball after the campus tragedy of April 16. The scheduled game against ETSU for April 17 was cancelled as the whole campus came to terms with what had happened on their quiet campus.

Maryland came to Tech just five days after the shootings for the series, and the Hokies tried to bring some normalcy back into their lives. The Terps brought the Tech squad T-shirts and key chains in honor of the students and faculty lost, showing true compassion and that will always be remembered by the Tech team.

Tech later clinched the regular season title after beating Boston
 College in their three game series. After the ACC Tournament, Tech received its third consecutive bid to Regionals, this time at Columbus, Ohio.

The Hokies went into the tournament with the No. 1 seed, facing Canisius first. After beating the Golden Griffins 5-0, Tech lost to host Ohio State 2-1 and then to Cal State Fullerton 1-0, bringing the Hokies season to an end with a 49-16 record.

Several members of the 2007 squad were honored for their accomplishments, both on the field and off. Tincher
led the way, being named a first-team All-American and a first-team Academic All-American, to go along with numerous other awards. Her pitching performances in the Florida State conference series won her the NFCA National Player of the Week recognition. She led the nation with a 0.57 ERA and was second in strikeouts. She also threw three no hitters and two perfect games. Over the summer, Tincher was invited to the Olympic Selection Camp in Chula Vista, Calif.

Senior Callie Rhodes and junior Caroline Stolle, along with Tincher, were named All-ACC and all-region. The three also earned first-team VaSID all-state honors, while sophomore Jessica Everhart was named to the second team. The coaching staff was named the NFCA Northeast Region Coaching Staff of the Year.

Some key efforts by the players through out the season included freshman Heather Lowry's big win against No. 24 South Carolina and Mariconda's double down the line which kept Tech ahead of Maryland in a 5-4 win. She also hit a home run in the eighth inning against Villanova to keep Tech's hopes alive in the USF tournament. Everhart singled up the middle to score junior Stephanie Savre in the hard fought 1-0 win against Auburn. It was clutch efforts like these throughout the season that helped the Hokies to the success they had.

Tech first cracked the polls in March with a No. 24 ranking, marking the first time in the polls for the Hokies since April 2006. The team finished out the regular season with the highest ever poll ranking in their history, coming in at an impressive 13th. Another end of the season high was the team RPI finish, as the squad ended up 15th.

## 2007 Louisville Slugger/NFCA First-Team All-American 2006 Louisville Slugger/NFCA Second-Team All-American Position: Pitcher

Angela Tincher put together one of the most prolific seasons in Virginia Tech softball history in 2006, when she became Tech's first All-American in the sport, earning second-team All-America by Louisville Slugger/NFCA. She topped that feat last year, earning first-team honors after leading the nation in ERA.

As a sophomore, she went 26-9 with an ERA of 1.01 and three saves. She recorded 504 strikeouts and finished second in the nation in strikeouts per seven innings with 13.8.

Among the numerous honors she received were: NFCA first-team All-Northeast Region, ACC Pitcher and Player of the Year, first-team All-ACC, first-team all-state and pitcher of the year in the state, as voted on by the state's Sports Information Directors. She was also named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America second-team squad.

As a junior, her numbers were even better. She had the lowest ERA in the country at 0.56 and had a school- and ACC-record 617 strikeouts. The 617 Ks were second in the nation, as was her 13.9 strikeout per seven innings ratio.

She again earned NFCA first-team All-Northeast Region, ACC Pitcher of the Year, ACC Tournament MVP, first-team All-ACC, first-team all-state and pitcher of the year in the state and was named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic AllAmerica first-team squad.

## THCH SORTBALL RACILTITES

The Virginia Tech softball team has the luxury of playing and practicing in some of the finest facilities on the east coast. Using the Tech Softball Park, Rector Field House and the Jim "Bulldog" Haren weight room, the Hokies train with the best in preparing to win championships.

The Tech Softball Park is a great complex that just keeps getting better. This past summer and fall, the park was given an overhaul that fans will instantly notice and appreciate.

In May, six poles featuring permanent lights were installed, but that was just the beginning. Starting last winter, an additional 746 permanent seats were installed, bringing the capacity up from 336 to 1,082 . The bleachers match the ones that were already in place and now extend down to the end of both dugouts.

The roofs of the dugouts were removed and lowered approximately two feet so the bleachers could be built over top of them. The cost of the project was approximately $\$ 900,000$.

Hanbury Evans Wright Vlattas \& Co. from Wytheville handled the project with Tech graduate Keith Storms serving as the project manager for the architecture firm.

The additional seats will allow Tech to be eligible to host NCAA Regional events, something it hasn't been able to in the past. Between the stadium expansion and the $\$ 200,000$ light project, nearly $\$ 1.2$ million in renovations have been done on Tech Softball Park since the end of last season.

Other improvements to the stadium over the years include: a new backstop and padding was installed in 2001 to give fans more protection when enjoying a game; in 2005, the old field was torn up and replaced, complete with a modern drainage system and grass apron around the entire

field; in 2004, thanks to a generous donation, a new batting cage was installed and was moved down by Tech's bullpen this past offseason, giving the Hokies another great tool in helping them achieve their goals. A matching batting cage and new bullpens for both teams were installed last year; a scoreboard was installed during the 1998 season, making it easier for coaches, players and fans to keep up with the game.

In 1999, the first set of permanent benchback seats were added. With the new bleachers added this past offseason, the complex can easily hold up to 1,100 fans and a record 1,977 fans crammed in and around the park for a doubleheader against North Carolina State in 2005.

In 2005, Tech ranked 15th nationally in average attendance and was 17th in 2006, averaging 551 fans per home contest. Last year, the Hokies averaged 546 fans per home event, 21st-best in the country.

The field, which was completed in the fall of 1997, has dimensions of 200 feet down the lines and 220 feet to center field.

Since the Hokies started playing at Tech Softball Park, they have compiled a record
of 135-47 (.741), including a 17-0 campaign in 1999, a 20-3 record in 2000, 18-4 in 2001, 16-3 in 2002, 15-6 in 2004 and 12-4 last year.

At the top of the bleachers are three prefabricated, 8 -by- 18 foot press boxes. Complete with power and phone lines, they accommodate all the needs of the media. The press boxes also have air conditioning and heat, as well as Ethernet cable and wireless connections, which allow for live stats and broadcasts of every home game on Tech's official Web site, hokiesports.com.

On top of the main press box is a camera platform, allowing for video by either team, as well as media covering the event. Two additional press boxes were added at the top of the bleachers during the last phase of renovation, tripling the current capacity.

The main box houses the game operation workers and both SIDs while the other two press boxes are used for working press, radio and television announcers.

When weather doesn't allow for outdoor practice, the team moves into Rector Field House. Located adjacent to the playing field, the field house has an artificial surface, batting cages and ample room for drills. It is also equipped with a training room.

Permanent restroom facilities are also now available for use. On-site dressing rooms, permanent concession stands, a new scoreboard and a plaza are all possible future projects.

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all studentathletes. The department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

Under the leadership of Mike Goforth, assistant director of athletics for athletic training, the department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. Specialists may also be called in as needed for further evaluation of the athletes, such as Motion DNA, which evaluates athletes biomechanical deficiencies using state-of-the-art sensors and computer software.

The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidence by their participation in local and national projects

pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection, high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its sixth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum.

With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally. The $\$ 10$ million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physicianís suite.

The suite is equipped with a state-of-the-art X-ray system, fluoroscopy unit and minor procedure room, while the training room has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces
of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities.

In addition, a training room in Rector Field House serves teams when they practice indoors and the Gordon Family Mobile Sports Medicine Unit is a new portable training room that can be transported to various venues.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the Montgomery Regional Hospitalís SWVA Center for Orthopaedics and Schiffert Student Health Center. Both facilities are staffed with qualified physicians and staff, and have a wide variety of technologies designed to increase the level of care available to our athletes.

If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen by therapist Mark Piechoski in the Ferrell Training Room. Piechoski, who is a certified athletic trainer, physical therapist and strength and conditioning specialist, plays a large role in the overall program developed to return the injured athlete back to 100 percent. Virginia Tech also has the services of team chiropractors, Dr. Dale Reynolds and Dr. Greg Tilley who provide Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions.

Team orthopaedic surgeons Dr. Marc Siegel, Dr. Jim LeBolt and Dr. Demian Yakel bring a wealth
of experience and skills to assist when athletes need orthopaedic consultation for certain types of sports-related injuries that occur from time to time.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Tech's softball trainer is Katie Baer, who is in her second year as a full-time employee at Virginia Tech.


The success of Virginia Tech's softball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and was a school-best 76 percent for 2007. This marks the fourth time in the last six years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, current Virginia Tech student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2006 calendar year, 449 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which

will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

The Virginia Tech SAASS office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with university and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student-athlete's educational experience.

In 2006, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms and direct access to the SAASS staff. This complex is a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides a centralized place for student-athlete services.

The new facility features more than 18,000 square feet of space, 10 staff offices, 18 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 45-station computer lab, three reading/study rooms, a conference room and reference library.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to

their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his ninth year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Colin Howlett is in his 11th year with Tech and serves as an associate director in the SAASS office.

Katie Ammons and Sarah Armstrong are assistant directors of the SAASS staff.

Jessica Hegr, who serves as the contact for the softball team, is in her third year with SAASS.

Terrie Repass is in her 33rd year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office secretary and "first contact" person for the SAASS.

## STUDENT LIFE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is under the direction of Patricia Lovett. The programs
 and services implemented by the Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life are inspired by the NCAA/ CHAMPS Life Skills Program. The program was honored for its commitment to serving the good of the studentathletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association as a Program of Excellence.

## Community Outreach

The Virginia Tech student-athletes have been involved more than ever in the local community. Having volunteered over 1,400 hours in the schools, community groups and hospitals, the student-athletes are setting a high precedent for all involved with the program.

Under the "Hokies with Heart" umbrella, each sports team has a community partner with which it volunteers time and hosts at a
home game to honor the partnership program. The Hokie softball team has a partnership with Prices Fork Elementary School.

## Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for studentathletes.

For the first time, studentathletes had the opportunity to participate in a mock interview night with company representatives from Wolseley North America, Northwestern Mutual Finance and Newell Rubbermaid. In addition to the mock interview night, studentathletes are offered workshops on topics such as resumé design, career fair etiquette, interview attire and mini-career fairs.

## Student Athlete Advisory Committee

 The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues andconcerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation.

Highlights of the 2006-2007 SAAC included a toy drive competition among the sports teams for the Montgomery County Christmas store collecting over 1,200 toys and participating in Virginia Tech's Relay for Life. The softball team representatives are juniors Jenna Rhodes and Beth Walker.

## Personal Development

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy

relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

## Academic Excellence

Athletes are nominated for oncampus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Studentathletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2006 calendar year listed 449 student-athletes with this honor, a 20 percent increase from the 2005 calendar year.

Several athletes from the softball team have received various academic awards. Steffanie Massetti, Karie Morrison, Dori Nunley, Erin Ota, Callie Rhodes, Jenna Rhodes, Kelsy Rokey, Caroline Stolle, Angela Tincher and Anna Zitt were all named to the 2006-07 ACC AllAcademic Honor Roll.

# ATHLETTC PERPORMANCE 

One of the most important aspects of a successful college softball program is its strength and conditioning program. Before the lights ever come on, before the first pitch is thrown and before the first game is played, college softball players work on getting themselves physically prepared for the rigors of a four-month season.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Dr. Mike


Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to

include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

In May 2003, Gentry was honored by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches when he was named a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach.

In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year.

He received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979, his master's from the University of North Carolina in 1981 and his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Tech in 1999.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are four full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches - Terry Mitchell, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Jarrett Ferguson and Keith Short, coordinators of strength and conditioning, and Jamie Meyer, coordinator of strength and conditioning for Olympic sports.

Mitchell, who handles the strength and conditioning for Tech's softball team, has experience in the Texas Rangers farm system. He graduated from Lee (Tenn.) College in 1994 and earned a master's in health promotions from Tech in 2004. Mitchell is married to the former Terri Thompson. This is his sixth year with the softball program.

## Sports Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech studentathlete's life. In July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.
"The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sportspecific goals," Freel said.

nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for healthconscious students and athletes, to design menus
for training tables and daily menu selections.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. It accurately measures body composition (percent
of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance.

## Sport Psychology

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all its studentathetes - sport psychology. Dr.
Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with studentathletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.
"We try to address all the various factors that affect studentathletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions.

On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A new addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions, and increase peripheral awareness.

Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.
