# 2011 PREVEW 

## Hungry Hokies

 Aiming for a Return to PostseasonAfter winning two consecutive ACC Championships and earning a berth in the 2008 Women's College World Series, hopes were high for the future of the Virginia Tech softball program. But over the past two years, the Hokies have felt the sting of injuries, graduation and attrition and have failed to make the postseason both times.

But this year, head coach Scot Thomas has a talented group of upperclassmen and a fresh group of ballplayers ready to step in and make a run at the ACC title and make a triumphant return to the postseason.

With most of the lineup back, including three pitchers, the Hokies have a veteran group ready for a run back at the NCAA Tournament.

## INFIELD

Two of the four starters return from an infield that was playing pretty well defensively as the season came to an end. Granted, the Hokies lose shortstop Misty Hall and her 11 home runs, but the two starters returning started a combined 108 games last year.

Bkaye Smith is a dangerous player at the plate who started all 58 games last year, 57 at second base. The lefty slapper struggled down the stretch last year and finished with a . 260 average, but stole 24 bases and had a . 971 fielding percentage. She is a talented player in the field who makes the tough plays look


routine. She will be backed up by freshman walk-on Nina Compton, who could also be used on the base paths.

At third base will be senior Kristina Cruz who is in her second year after transferring from Santa Fe (Fla.) College. It took her a while to get accustomed to the Division I level last year, but she is a smooth fielder who improved tremendously as the season progressed. She hit just . 174 last year with 16 errors, but after a great fall, the coaching staff is excited to see what the talented Floridian does in her last season.

Alicia Field returns as well at third base. She has been a solid role player the past three years and will continue to help with the pitchers in the bull pen as well.

Tech will have to replace starters at first base and at shortstop. Freshman Dani Anderson will be the starter at shortstop after winning the job in the fall. She is an athletic player who is a standout in the field while Kat Banks is another freshman who could be used here. She has a great speed and is a good bat to have in the lineup. Banks is also going to be counted on for innings in the circle and in the outfield.

First base is a little bit of a question mark for the Hokies. Junior Kristen Froehlich is making the move from the outfield to first base and is the leader heading into the preseason. She came around at the plate last year and is looking to carry that momentum over to this season.

Kelsey Hensel, who could also see playing time at first base, was having a solid season until suffering a broken hand midway through the season. She has also worked at third base, catcher and in the outfield and provides the staff with a good bat and versatility in the field. Sophomore Courtney Liddle will be looked at here as well.
"This infield doesn't have any holes and will probably be one of the best defensive groups we've had in a while,"Thomas said. "We have experience coming back at second and third base and a dangerous freshman at shortstop. At first base, we have several options, all of who we feel can get the job done. Whoever's hitting the best will probably play at that spot."

## OUTFIELD

The Hokies will return several players who saw significant action in the outfield last year, including second-team All-ACC selection Richelle McGarva in centerfield. The senior was hampered by a shoulder injury for much of the season, but still managed to hit . 279 with five home runs and 14 stolen bases. When healthy, she is a lock-down player manning the centerfield position. Freshman Laura Wolff, an all-state selection as a senior last year, could also challenge for playing time here.

Sophomore Sarah Ashby is a speedy player who is the top choice as a pinch runner and provides depth in centerfield as well. The Virginia product stole 15 bases last year in 17 attempts and scored 12 runs. If she continues to improve her slap hitting, she could also challenge for time at the plate.

Leading the way in left field is senior Ashton Ward and freshman Kat Banks. Both Ward and Banks will be counted on for innings in the circle, but are versatile enough to be able to play here as well. Sophomore Stephanie Kujawa could also challenge for playing time here, as well. She saw limited action last season and must improve at the plate after hitting just . 179 as a freshman. She is athletic and has great speed and could be an asset for Tech this season.

Junior Marra Hvozdovic is a solid player in the outfield who will be vying for the vacated right field spot. She brings a little pop at the plate and can play any of the outfield spots. Kristen Froehlich is also a candidate to play here, but is working mainly at first base.
"We've got a lot of speed in this group and we're going to run down a lot of fly balls," associate head coach AI Brauns said. "We've got a lot of different options and we'll go with who's hitting the best and who gives us the best chance to win."

## THE BATTERY

The top three pitchers in terms of innings return to the 2011 team, but the group as a whole has to do a better job in terms of consistency and production.

Senior Kenzie Roark is back in the circle for her final year and has to take control of the staff. She was sensational down the stretch last year, earning a spot on the ACC's All-Tournament Team, but at other times she struggled and needs to gain positive consistency. She went 1020 last year with a 3.06 ERA but had moments of brilliance and the coaches are imploring her to build on the strong finish to last year. Her success in the circle will go a long way in determining how the Hokies fare this year.

Sophomore Jasmin Harrell won a teamhigh 11 games last year, but posted a 3.22 ERA with 93 strikeouts in 141.1 innings. She too had moments of excellence, but gave up 13 home runs and needs to continue to improve.

Ashton Ward was an all-region pitcher her freshman year at Tennessee, but didn't get a chance to pitch a lot last year due to injuries. The senior started at first base, shortstop, pitcher, in left and center field to try and fill in holes in the lineup. The lack of time in the circle hurt her as she posted a 3.61 ERA last year. She
did go 3-0 with 30 strikeouts in 42.2 innings and the coaches are hoping she can get back to her dominating ways this year.

Freshman Kat Banks was an all-state pitcher in Tennessee who will also be looked to for time in the circle. She went 103-10 in the circle for her career with a 0.70 ERA, leading her team to state runner-up finishes her final three years.
"The pitching staff, as a whole, will be fun to watch this year," pitching coach Barb Sherwood said. "Each kid brings something different to the mound. They will complement each other very nicely. I truly believe the experience of Kenzie, Ashton and Jasmin, and the competitiveness of Kat, will help us to be successful this season and I'm looking forward to seeing all four of them compete day in and day out."

Sophomore Courtney Liddle returns behind the plate and gives the Hokies a great leader on the field. She hit 11 home runs last year and threw out 12 runners. Betty Rose is an excellent defensive player with a strong arm. The sophomore is a vocal leader and provides a solid option if inserted behind the plate.
"Courtney and Betty have a year of Division I ball behind them and I expect great things from them this season," Sherwood said. "They both are very good receivers and have a great rapport with the pitchers. I feel confident with them behind the plate and we're very lucky to have two really good catchers."

Virginia Tech will play in several tournaments before jumping into ACC play come mid-March,
including a tough stretch over Spring Break at UCF and Arizona State. Before the conference schedule kicks off, they will play numerous 2010 NCAA Tournament teams such as UCF, Arizona State, Iona, Cornell and Radford.

With so many new faces, it's really anyone's guess as to what to expect this year. But the coaching staff is excited about the team and ready to roll this season.
"I think this group is hungry," Thomas said. "The older kids really want to get back to Regionals. I don't think they enjoyed sitting at home and watching Regionals on television last year. If we can stay healthy, we have great speed and defense and with some solid pitching and offense, I think we can contend for an ACC title and make a run at postseason."

# HEAD COACH SCOT THOMAS 

16th Season • East Tennessee State (1991) Blacksburg, Va. Career Record: 536-368

Anyone trying to understand the reason behind Virginia Tech's unprecedented success on the softball diamond doesn't have to look any further than head coach Scot Thomas. Since taking the job on July 5,1995 , Thomas has personally handled every element of building the program from buying the first pieces of equipment, to hiring the assistants and recruiting the players. The results are nothing short of phenomenal.

Since the first season Tech fielded a softball team in 1996, Thomas has had 11 winning or .500 seasons in 15 campaigns, has led the Hokies to four NCAA appearances, two ACC titles, and in 2008, took Tech to the biggest show in college softball.

Thomas grew up in Blacksburg where he dreamed of one day becoming a coach at Tech. Having faithfully watched Hokie athletics his entire life, along with having parents who

worked at Virginia Tech, he understood the dedication to excellence and the commitment to quality the University demanded, and he was a perfect match for the program's philosophy.

Thomas dreamed of building a nationally recognized program from the beginning. People warned him that it would take years for Virginia Tech to become a player in the region, not to mention on the national scene. Now entering his 16 th season with over 500 wins, Thomas has positioned Hokie softball as one of the most respected programs, not only in the state and region, but has put it on the national map as well. A 2008 Women's College World Series appearance was the latest step as Thomas is perpetually looking to lead his team to new heights.

In 2008, with the best player in the country, he led the Hokies to new levels, culminating with a trip to Oklahoma City for the WCWS. After finishing second in the regular season, the Hokies rolled through the ACC Tournament for the second time in a row, guaranteeing them their fourth-straight NCAA Regional appearance. A 49-19 record, as well as the National Player of the Year in Angela Tincher, secured a special place in the history of Hokie softball. He also led his team to a historic upset of the U.S. National Team, breaking the Red, White \& Blue's 185game, pre-Olympic exhibition tour winning streak with a 1-0 win. This is the same program that had won the previous three Olympic gold medals in the sport and took silver in Beijing. Thomas and his staff were honored for the
second-straight year as the Northeast Region Coaching Staff of the Year for the way they led the team in 2008.

In 2007, he saw his team post 49 wins, including the ACC's regular season and conference tournament championships. Those titles were the first in the program's history and helped him earn ACC Coach of the Year honors. He also picked up his 400th career win, a 3-0 victory over Stetson, and saw his team finish ranked 14th in the country. Additionally, Thomas - along with his three assistants were named the Northeast Region Coaching Staff of the Year by the NFCA.

In 2006, the Hokies won 39 games and were a No. 2 seed at the Knoxville Regional, despite starting seven sophomores or freshmen down the stretch. Thomas helped coach Tech's first softball All-American, as well as five all-region and four all-conference selections that year.

In 2005, Tech picked up 44 wins and was selected to the NCAA Tournament, a first in the program's history. After finishing seventh in the conference, the Hokies made a dramatic run to the championship game to secure the bid.

In 2009, he may have done one of his best coaching jobs as he helped lead the team to 28 wins and a semifinal berth in the ACC Tournament. He did this while dealing with a slow start, injuries and replacing the national player of the year from one year earlier. Jenna Rhodes, who came to Tech as an invited walkon, broke several school records en route to
earning third-team All-America honors. Last year, he again had to deal with numerous injuries and yet still led his team to the semifinals of the ACC Championship for the fourth straight year and to 25 wins.

Thomas became Tech's first head softball coach when he was hired on July 7, 1995. Since then, he has recorded 536 wins, averaged 36 wins per season and made the conference tournament championship game seven times.

The Hokies finished a spectacular 1999 season ranked 25 th in the nation with a 5416 record. In just its fourth year as a varsity sport, the team placed second at the A-10 tournament and Thomas was named the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year. Tech's hopes for a regional at-large bid were denied, but it did receive the national attention it had been working for. An upset of No. 4 Michigan highlighted the season. Tech finished the year undefeated at home and 14-2 in Atlantic 10 play, losing only to UMass. The Hokies had the third-longest winning streak in the nation at 26 , and at one point won 35 of 36 games.

In 2000, his first recruiting class left its mark on the program as the Hokies went 41-22 and finished second in the A-10 Tournament. Atlantic 10 Player of the Year and two-time GTE National First-Team Academic All-American Michelle Meadows led the team both on the field and off.

While success on the field is important, Thomas also places a strong emphasis on success in the classroom. In 15 seasons, he has had five players earn Academic All-America honors. Michelle Johnson made the 1998 second-team squad while Meadows was a three-time selection, the last two being on the first team. Following the 2002 season, Ashlee Dobbe earned first-team honors and Angela Tincher was a three-time Academic All-American, including Academic All-America of the Year honors for softball in 2008. Those classroom honors went along with three NFCA/Louisville Slugger All-America honors, including the National Player of the Year honor in 2008, the Honda Award, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award and an NCAA Top VIII honor. In 2009, Rhodes earned second-team honors, in addition to the third-team All-America honors on the field as given by the NFCA.

As time passes and the program grows, so does his players' impact in the pro league and internationally. Thomas has had three former players play in the National Pro Fastpitch (NPF): Tincher and Kelsey Hoffman with the Akron Racers and Rhodes with the Rockford Thunder/ Tennessee Diamonds.

He has also had six current or former players represent their countries in international events: Tincher (USA), Shanel Garofalo (Italy), Charisse Mariconda (Puerto Rico), Richelle McGarva, Ashlee Dobbe and Jess Hodge (Canada).

Respected by many, Thomas has been named the Virginia State Coach of the Year by the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) a record five times (1999, 2000, 2002, 2005 and 2008). He has had 23 different players named to the all-state team 50 different times, including at least three on

## COACH SCOT THOMAS' PHILOSOPHIES

Priorities: In order to fit into the picture at Virginia Tech, you must have your priorities in line. Academics take precedence over athletics. Our motto is: "In order to take care of business on the field, you must first take care of business off the field." On the other hand, we stress that softball should not suffer for academics either. Being able to manage time wisely and efficiently is the key to the success of balancing academics with athletics at Virginia Tech.

Recruiting: It is our goal to fill the recruiting needs of our program with mature, self-driven/ motivated student-athletes along with the necessary talent to help our team be successful in the Atlantic Coast Conference and on a national level. Recruiting is not a perfect science, however being a state university, we try our best to sign quality players from the state of Virginia first, then broaden our opportunities in other areas of the country and Canada. Players should possess the selflessness to fit into the team concept and the inner drive that guides them to be CHAMPIONS.

Playing the game: Teams that are fundamentally sound are always successful. We try to emulate that style on a game-by-game basis, especially on the defensive side of the ball. Offensively, we have tended to be a program that is fundamentally sound as well. We have shown a knack for hitting the ball for power, both home run and gap power. We have added some speed and hope to provide a more balanced attack. Smart, yet aggressive is our style of play.

Blacksburg and Virginia Tech: As a native of Blacksburg, I have grown to appreciate this special place as I have gotten older and I always look forward to showing it off to new recruits. The small town atmosphere with the major university flair provides a unique academic and social environment. The history and traditions of this great institution make it one of a kind and one that I am very proud to be a part of. I still get chills during the Homecoming Parade when the Alumni Highty-Tighties march through downtown playing TECH TRIUMPH!

Not many people can say they have reached their final destination, but I feel very lucky to be at Virginia Tech and plan on being here for the duration of my coaching career. I am fortunate to be able to raise my children in the same great environment that I grew up in, here in Blacksburg.
every team in 11 of the last 13 seasons. Three players have earned state player of the year honors and one was named rookie of the year, while Tincher was named the pitcher of the year three times.

Thomas graduated from East Tennessee State University in 1991 with a bachelor's in physical education. He is on the Louisville Slugger advisory staff for the 15th straight year and is also on the NCAA Regional Committee. He was also selected to be the head coach of a group of local collegiate all-stars who took on the U.S. Olympic Softball Team in Salem, Va., in the summer of 2004 and did so again in the summer of 2008.

Thomas was an active ballplayer in the fastpitch world, playing in the ASA Men's B Nationals in 2003 and the NSA World Series in 2004 and 2005 and was chosen to play with a team that took on the USA men's national team as part of its tour to prepare for the 2009 ISF World Championships.

Thomas, a US Navy veteran, graduated from Blacksburg High where he was a member of the football and baseball teams.

His mother, Judy Ridinger, worked at Virginia Tech for over 40 years, and his late stepfather, Jack Ridinger, was captain of the Virginia Tech Police Department.

Thomas has a son, Andrew Scot, who is 13 , and a daughter, Eliza Leigh, who is 9 .

A favorite among current and past players, Brauns is also in charge of field maintenance, travel, equipment and has a heavy hand in recruiting. Virginia Tech's summer softball camps, which have seen a huge spike in attendance over the past few years, is also run by the long-time assistant coach.

Brauns is a familiar face in Hokie sports, holding a position with the Virginia Tech athletics department for three years prior to joining the softball staff. Under his direction, numerous players have earned all-state, all-conference and all-region honors. Bronwyn Blair, a fouryear starter in centerfield, was drafted by the Tampa Bay FireStix of the WPSL in 2001. In 2006, he coached Kelly Brown to her third AllNortheast Region squad and freshman Jessica Everhart to All-ACC and all-region honors.

In 2009, Jenna Rhodes was sixth in the country in batting average and the outfielder went on to earn third-team All-America honors, first-team All-ACC accolades and signed with the Rockford Thunder of the NPF. Everhart also had a standout year, batting .344 while earning all-region and secondteam All-ACC honors.

In 2007, he showed his versatility by taking over the infielders early on before returning to his outfielders late in the season. As a team, the Hokies had a fielding percentage of .966 with one of the fewest error totals in program history. Brauns also serves as the first-base coach and is the right-hand man of head coach Scot Thomas. Last summer, he was rewarded for his loyalty and work by being named the associate head coach as the top assistant on the staff.

A tireless worker on the recruiting trail, he played a big role in identifying current and past Hokies like Charisse Mariconda early on in the process as players who could make an impact on the Virginia Tech program.

Brauns, a Vietnam War veteran, started playing fastpitch in the 1960s and finished his career playing with a men's major team from 1970-74.

Originally from Uniontown, Pa., Brauns graduated from Penn State in 1973 with a degree in criminology. Brauns and his wife, Michelle, have one child, Adam, who is 18 years old and a freshman at Tech. He also has two other sons, Eric, 42, and Jason, 36. He has two grandchildren, Alaina and Allison.


# ASSISTANT COACH BARB SHERWOOD 

Third Season • Troy (1999) • Pensacola, Fla.

Assistant coach Barb Sherwood enters her third year on the Hokie coaching staff as the pitching coach. She also doubles as the lead recruiter for the Hokies and in the summer of 2009, she served as the head coach of the NPF's Akron Racers. As the field manager of the Racers, she led the team to a second-place finish in the regular season, leading to the entire staff earning NPF Coaching Staff of the Year honors.

In her first season at Tech, despite having only two healthy arms to work with a majority of the season, she helped lead the Hokies to 28 wins with eight shutouts. She also guided Kenzie Roark to 22 wins and helped lower her ERA almost a full point from the previous season. Last year, Roark came on strong late and earned ACC All-Tournament honors.

Prior to moving to Blacksburg, Sherwood spent a season as the pitching and catching coach at Florida State University, but after longtime head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf retired following the season, she became a top candidate for Tech's open position on the staff. Before her season at FSU, the Pensacola, Fla., native spent two seasons with the University of Wisconsin as an assistant and serving as the pitching and catching coach.

Sherwood began her coaching career at Troy University in 1998 as a student assistant coach, but quickly moved to the graduate assistant level the following year. Upon receiving her Master's degree in education in 2000, the former four-year letterwinning catcher and team captain was named the top assistant at her alma mater. Sherwood also served as the recruiting coordinator for the Trojans, adding top players such as Atlantic Sun Pitcher of the Year Jocelyn McCallum and four-year Canadian National Team catcher Tamra Howren.

During the 2005 season, Sherwood's pitchers achieved a notable 1.45 ERA with two individuals notching 20 wins. That year, both pitchers were named all-conference performers as well. In 2006 Sherwood made the leap from Alabama to Wisconsin, to join the Badgers' coaching staff as an assistant and the pitching and catching coach. While there, Wisconsin's pitching staff ERA was ranked No. 4 in the Big Ten for the 2007 season.

In her lone season at Florida State, she helped senior pitcher Tiffany McDonald earn All-ACC honors as she posted 18 wins and 244 strikeouts in leading FSU to the NCAA Tournament.

Sherwood earned a degree in physical education from Troy in 1999 and a Master's in education in 2000. She was a three-time team captain and helped lead the Trojans to the 1996 Mid-Continent Conference championship and a berth in the 1996 NCAA Tournament.

A native of Pensacola, Fla., Sherwood graduated from Escambia High and was named Miss Escambia in 1994.

## TECH SOFTBALL PARK

The Virginia Tech softball team has the luxury of playing in one of the finest facilities on the east coast, the 1,024-seat Tech Softball Park.

Tech fans have taken a love to their Hokie softball team, as attendance continues to rise. In 2005, Tech ranked 15th nationally in average attendance and was 17th in 2006, averaging 551 fans per home contest. Big crowds are the norm at Tech Softball Park as attendance has gone over the 1,000 mark seven times in program history.

The field, which was completed in the fall of 1997, has dimensions of 200 feet down the lines and 220 feet to center field. Since the Hokies started playing at Tech Softball Park, they have compiled a record of 172-65 (.726), including a 17-0 campaign in 1999, a 20-3 record in 2000, 18-4 in 2001, 16-3 in 2002 and 12-4 in 2007.

When weather doesn't allow for outdoor practice, the team moves into Rector Field House. Located adjacent to the playing field, the field house has an artificial surface, batting cages and ample room for drills.
