
Since its founding in 1872, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, commonly known as Virginia Tech, has grown to become the state's largest university and its top research institution. It has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, its economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has now challenged the university to become one of the nation's top 30 research schools by the end of the decade.

The university is organized into eight colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Arts and Sciences, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Human Resources and Education, Natural Resources, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, they offer about 170 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs.

Many of Virginia Tech's traditions and strengths are rooted in the university's motto, Ut Prosim: "That I May Serve," and its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through public service and outreach activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, Virginia Tech disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. 
Virginia Tech and Blacksburg are nearly indistinguishable, but the town and university really come together to support their beloved Hokies.

Facilities

The Virginia Tech volleyball team plays and trains in some of the finest facilities in the country.

Cassell Coliseum, the 10,052-seat residence of the Virginia Tech volleyball team, is home to a winning tradition. Rivals have had little success playing the Hokies in Cassell, winning only 90 of 301 visits.


Construction for the main portion of Cassell Coliseum began in 1961. It was completed in December 1964, at a cost of \$2.7 million. Built by T.C. Brittain and Company of Decatur, Ga., it houses an arena, locker rooms, two auxiliary gymnasiums, offices and other athletic facilities.

Cassell Coliseum has undergone extensive renovations to both the exterior and interior of the building, as well as the structural systems. Prior to the 1988-89 season, a new spring-loaded playing floor was installed. During 1996-97, the facility was given a new roof and paint application. Recently, the playing floor was resurfaced and given a new look and the seats are now in the process of being replaced.

The Hokies train in the Merryman Athletic Center. The sparkling \$10.6 million facility contains 17,000 square feet of strength and conditioning space.

The Merryman Center was dedicated Sept., 26, 1998, and is named for the F.W. (Sonny) Merryman family of Rustburg, Va., which presented the University with a major gift to kick off a fund-raising campaign.

DIRECTIONS TO BLACKSBURG

From the north or east, take Interstate 81 south to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From the south, take Interstate 81 north to exit 118B, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the signal at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed one-half mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road, just before the football stadium. Cassell Coliseum will then be on the right.

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2001 Outlook

Hokies looking to make noise in new conference

Head coach Greg Smith couldn't have scripted his entrance into The BIG EAST Conference any better. Last year, in his first season as the team's top man, his team finished its independent season strong, won four of its last five and headed into the off-season on a positive note.

This season, he returns all six starters, 11 players who saw action last season and brings in a strong recruiting class who could contribute right away. Throw all these elements into one mix and you have the recipe for what could be a very successful inaugural season in a tough conference.

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

The Hokies return all three players who not only saw extensive action at middle blocker, but who also rotated in the starting position.

Leading the way is junior **Cheryl Stinson**, one of the top hitters in Tech volleyball history. She currently ranks second all-time in hitting percentage and could climb into the top spot by the end of her career. Last season, she led the team in hitting percentage (.282), block solos (20) and block assists (85). She also recorded 300 kills, which was third-best on the team. Stinson made the move to the right side spot late in the season but should return to her natural position this year.


Shubat and Sarah Rogers. Shubat is a senior and is one of the top blockers ever to play at Tech. Entering her final season, the Ft. Wayne, Ind., native ranks 10th all-time with 228 total blocks. Last year she was second on the team in both block assists (68), block solos (13) and hitting percentage

Also returning are Christine

Rogers, who will be a junior, is also very capable of playing in the middle. The Marietta, Ga., native had a productive sophomore season and is looking for more this year. Last season, she had 186 kills and 96 digs. She also had 65 total blocks on the year.

(.221). She also had 235 kills.

The combination that will start is yet to be determined, but all three will definitely see plenty of playing time and will provide good production from the middle blocker spot.

OUTSIDE HITTERS

The combination of Holly Disser and Ana Lang could be one of the best around if the two develop the consistency Smith is looking for. In 2000, when one was on, the other wasn't having her best night. If the two can consistently put together good nights, the Hokies could make some noise in their new conference.

The two had almost identical years, statistically, and will be counted on for big things again this season. How close were their

numbers? Both played in all 109 games, started all 29 matches and both finished with 353 kills on the year.

Lang, who returns for her junior year, had 1,023 attempts, 338 digs and 26 blocks, while Disser, who will be a senior, had

1,006 attempts, 316 digs and 24 total blocks. If the two can keep up their good numbers and crank up their hitting percentages, the Hokies could have a bright first year in The BIG EAST.

Looking to see some playing time as a freshman is **Annie Spicer**. She is a great athlete who could come in here right away and make a big difference.

SETTERS

After a sensational freshman campaign, **Kelli O'Dell** looks to return and run the Hokie offense. Last season, the Kingwood, Texas, native burst into the starting lineup early and never relinquished the spot. She finished the season with 1,134 assists, 65 kills and 51 total blocks. She also set the school record for assists in a match when she handed out 86 against Liberty.

Also returning at the setter spot is senior **Renee Collins**. The Shawnee, Kan., native tore her ACL in the spring prior to last season, but battled back to be ready for the season. Collins is very capable of running the offense and recorded a career-high 194 assists last season.

The two will be locked in a battle throughout the preseason and regular season for the starting job, even though both are capable of starting.

RIGHT SIDE

The right side is the one spot where the Hokies lack a lot of experience. Returning to the position are redshirt sophomore Jamie Meyer and sophomore Jenny Hill. Both saw limited action at the position last year but may be forced to step up this year.

Meyer started 16 matches at the position and recorded 85 kills, 72 digs and 44 total blocks on the year. She possesses a powerful swing and has the potential to be a huge presence on the right

Hill saw her playing time increase as the season progressed. She began the season used mostly for her tough serving, but eventually ended up starting four matches. She finished the season with 19 kills and 58 digs.

Freshman **Emily Smith** is a very athletic player who could help out the program right away. She provides good height and the skills necessary to be successful on the collegiate level.

DEFENSIVE SPECIALISTS

The Hokies return two players who contributed at the defensive specialist spot last year in **Kim Amos** and **Elizabeth Jeffers**. Amos appeared in eight matches and registered 28 digs on the year, including a career-high 11 at Liberty. Jeffers

provides quality serving skills and can contribute defensively as well. She appeared in three matches last year, recording two digs.

Three walk-ons — Ashlee Mennen, Kaitlin McPeak and Jess Quinn — all provide good ball handling and athleticism and will battle for playing time.

THE OUTLOOK

The BIG EAST Conference will certainly provide challenges week-in and week-out for the Hokies. After playing an independent schedule last year, the competition level will increase and will test this group of players.

"We're looking forward to a new challenge in a new conference," Smith said. "We're going to find out quickly how we stack up against these teams. With the group we have this year, we're excited about the possibilities. We're looking to be a much better team this year."

The 2001 season will mark the 25th in Virginia Tech volleyball history. It's only fitting that in the year the Hokies mark a milestone in their program's history, they celebrate another milestone in joining The BIG EAST Conference.

Last year, eight BIG EAST teams posted winning overall records with one advancing to the NCAA Tournament. Notre Dame led the way, finishing the season undefeated in conference play and ranked in the top 25.

The Hokies will also play a tough non-conference schedule, which will only prepare them for the rigors of their new home. Tech will play in tournaments at Western Carolina and Michigan, as well as in the BIG EAST/SEC Challenge. The Challenge, which will be held in Orlando, Fla., will pit the Hokies against perennial power Florida and SEC foe Louisiana State University.

Head Coach Greg Smith

A young and energetic coach, Greg Smith enters his second season as a collegiate head coach with the Virginia Tech volleyball program. Smith came to Virginia Tech from Ohio State, where he served as an assistant coach for three seasons.

In his first year as a head coach, Smith led a young group to a 13-16 record and had three players receive year-end honors for their performances. Ana Lang was named player of the year in the Independent Volleyball Conference while junior Cheryl Stinson and sophomore Kelli O'Dell were named to the all-conference team.

Smith was successful as an assistant at OSU, helping coach the Buckeyes to the NCAA Tournament each year. His duties included assisting in recruiting and training the team, both on the court and in its physical conditioning.

Prior to his stint in Columbus, Smith spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Hofstra University. While at Hofstra, he helped lead the team to two consecutive American East Conference tournament championships and two NCAA tournament appearances. In all, Smith has coached in the NCAA Tournament five of the last six seasons.

Before his coaching duties at Hofstra, he was an assistant

coach at the University of Indianapolis in 1994. During that time he also served as one of the head volleyball coaches for the Circle City Volleyball Club and worked with the Junior National Team Program.

Prior to coaching at the University of Indianapolis, Smith was an assistant varsity coach at Rochester (Ind.) High from September, 1992 through October, 1993. He was also head coach of the freshman squad at Rochester. During his tenure at Rochester, he assisted the varsity team to the regional playoffs in 1992 and state semifinals in 1993.

The Rochester, Ind., native graduated from Westmont College in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in business and economics. He also received a bachelor's degree in education from the University of Indianapolis in April of 1995. A letterwinner in tennis at Westmont College, Smith also served as an assistant basketball coach at his alma mater.

Smith and his wife, Erica, reside in Christiansburg.



Justin Micomonaco begins his first year in the Hokie volleyball program as the team's graduate assistant coach.


A native of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, Micomonaco was a three-year member of the men's volleyball team at Harvard University. He graduated this past June with





Two national championships were added to the BIG EAST's list last year. The Connecticut men's soccer team won the 2000 College Cup and Notre Dame hoisted the trophy at the 2001 Women's Final Four. Additionally, three student-

athletes won individual titles in NCAA competition.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. Ruth Riley, the 2000-01 BIG EAST Female

Scholar-Athlete of the Year, was named the women's basketball national player of the year.

Last year, 19 student-athletes earned academic All-America honors, including nine who were awarded first team accolades.

For three of the last seven years, a BIG EAST student-athlete has won the Honda-

Broderick Cup as Collegiate Woman of the Year.

The conference welcomed Virginia Tech as its 14th full member in 2000-01.


Tech finishes independent 2000 season on high note

The 2000 volleyball team played its season as an independent, faring quite well considering the circumstances. The Hokies entered the season with a new head coach in Greg Smith and no seniors on the squad, but finished the season strong, winning four of their last five matches to complete a 13-16 record.

The new era started on a high note as the Hokies hosted the annual Hokie Classic, winning their first three matches. In Smith's first-career match as a head coach, his team fought back from a 2-1 deficit to win the last two games of the match, including the final game 17-15 over Marshall. The Hokies kept rolling, beating Appalachian State and North Carolina State before falling to a tough Southwest Texas team in the championship. Regardless, the Hokies were off to a great start in the 2000 season.

At the Hokie Classic, Cheryl Stinson and Holly Disser were named to the all-tournament team for helping lead their team to a second-place finish.

The Hokies then took to the road for the first time, traveling to Manhattan, Kan., for the Kansas State Wildcat Classic. The Hokies won one match at that tourney, defeating Air Force 3-0.

After a road match at Radford and a home contest against George Mason, Tech hit the road again, this time to Harrisonburg, Va., for the James Madison Classic. The Hokies got off to a good start, beating Howard 3-0 before falling to Seton Hall and the host Dukes. Christine Shubat was named to the all-tournament team for her play.

After a heartbreaking, 3-2 loss to Tennessee on

the road, Tech travelled to Williamsburg, Va., for the William & Mary Classic where it downed Virginia Commonwealth, 3-1.

The Hokies began the month of October on a high note, defeating a regionally-ranked East Carolina team at home, 3-0 and getting payback against James Madison. The Hokies exacted more revenge, evening the season series with Radford via a 3-0 win at Cassell Coliseum.

After a loss to in-state rival Virginia, the Hokies began a three-match winning streak with a 3-1 victory at Charlotte. The Hokies followed that up with victories at home against East Tennessee State and Liberty. Tech wrapped up the season with another victory over East Carolina, this time winning 3-1 on the road.

Tech played last season as an independent before entering the BIG EAST in 2001. Ana Lang, Cheryl Stinson and Kelli O'Dell were each named to the All-Independent Conference First Team while Lang was named the conference's player of the year.

Kelli O'Dell set a school record against Liberty, handing out 86 assists in the match and several Hokies recorded career highs throughout the season.

While the season as a whole did not produce a winning record, the Hokies can take solace in knowing they finished the season strong and will have everyone back for their inaugural season in the BIG EAST.

In all, the Hokies return all six starters and 11 squad members to next year's team, which will be making its muchanticipated debut in The BIG EAST Conference.

Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

After one season, Villanova was added and began play in 1980-81. Two seasons later, Pittsburgh joined the group and started competition in '82-83.

Miami was admitted in 1990 and began BIG EAST competition in ' 91-92. Rutgers, West Virginia and Notre Dame joined in ' 94 in two separate expansions and began play in 1995-96.

While the membership has increased, the focus of the BIG EAST remains unchanged. It is a group that reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a

leadership role nationally. Its studentathletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic

achievement notably reflect a
balance between intercollegiate
athletics and academics.

Any successful consortium enjoys outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11

years the associate of Dave Gavitt, took over the Commissioner's reins in June, 1990. The expansion in membership is only a portion of Tranghese's achievements. In his first year at the helm, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference in addition to coordinating the four expansions.

BIG EAST sports attract the interest of followers in the nation's largest media markets including New York, Chicago,

Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, D.C., Miami, Pittsburgh and Hartford. The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes.

More than 450 BIG EAST athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well-represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams, with several athletes earning gold medals in the summer Olympiads in Sydney in 2000, Atlanta in '96, Barcelona in '92, Seoul in '88 and Los Angeles in '84.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence, R.I., where the conference administers to more than 5,000 athletes in 21 sports.



Item: Virginia Tech applications up 15 percent. Entering students have highest SAT average ever. Virginia Tech competes for national championship in football. University announces two new mega biotech programs. Things are looking pretty

rosy for Virginia Tech, right?

Enter Charles W. Steger. His assessment? "We have to rev the engines even higher. If you're not moving quickly forward, you might as well be standing still," says the energetic 54-yearold president.

Appointed president by the university board effective Jan. 7, 2000, Steger possesses the breadth and depth of experience to lead Virginia Tech at the point when higher education must learn to cope with major technology changes permeating education.

Steger has lofty goals for Virginia's leading research university. "I would like to see us ranked among the nation's top

30 universities before the end of the decade," says Steger.

A registered architect and former dean of Tech's college of architecture and urban studies, Steger was the architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which concluded in 1998, raised \$337 million, \$87 million over its goal.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his Bachelor and Masters of Architecture and a Ph.D. in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech. He and his wife Janet, have two sons, David and Christopher.



Jim Weaver • Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 56, was appointed on

September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his four years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech entered competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001 season.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field. Already complete is the expansion of the North end zone that totals over 5,000 permanent seats.

Weaver has spearheaded a construction project to expand stadium seating capacity to 65,000 for the 2002 season. The \$37 million expansion project will include an 11,000-seat double deck and provide 15 luxury suites, as well as club level seating and amenities.

Plans are underway for a West side pressbox and suite expansion for 2003. The West side expansion, along with 36 suites, will include an enhanced pressbox tower, as well as office space for ticket operations and the Virginia Tech Athletic Fund.

In the Fall of 2000, Weaver arranged a joint venture with ISP to commit \$2 million to purchase new scoreboards, upgraded sound systems, a 21x28 L.E.D. video display screen at Lane Stadium and two 9x12 wall mount L.E.D. video screens in Cassell Coliseum. A state of the art television control studio provides in-house production and operations for the video screens. The video screens and new sound systems have noticeably

heightened game entertainment and the overall fan experience at Lane Stadium and Cassell Coliseum.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletics department.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletic director.

"Jim Weaver was the unanimous choice of our search committee," retired Tech President Paul Torgersen said at a Blacksburg news conference when the new AD was introduced. "The committee was searching for someone with extensive Division I experience, a commitment to compliance, a commitment to gender equity, a commitment to all 21 varsity sports and a vision for conference alignment."

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's degree in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons - Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

Student-Athlete Academic Support Service

The success of Virginia Tech's volleyball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech studentathletes has improved each year due in part to the Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 67 percent in 2001 as compared to the national average of 58 percent. The projected 2002 student-athlete graduation rate is over 70 percent which will mark the fourth time in the last nine years that Tech has reached that level.

Last spring, the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast paid tribute to a record 337 studentathletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs who posted 3.0 or greater QCAs in the 2000 calendar year.

To accommodate the many facets of assistance needed for student-athletes, Virginia Tech's mission is eight fold:

1. To provide services to all student-athletes, including any student participating in any varsity sport, managers, trainers,

cheerleaders and HighTechs. 2. To provide academic support through tutoring programs, computer facilities and

software which are necessary for the individual needs of each student.

- 3. To require a mandatory study hall for students below expected QCA levels in order that the staff might better assist the atrisk student-athletes.
- 4. To provide adequate study facilities and a computer lab which are conveniently located

near the training areas and coaching areas.

- 5. To provide mentoring. counseling, academic assistance, advising and to work closely with other academic offices on campus for the welfare of the students.
- 6. To work closely with the athletic department for the academic welfare of each studentathlete and to help in the development of an

effective student life program.

- 7. To closely monitor the academic success of each student to help ensure academic progress toward a degree and maintenance of academic and athletic eligibility.
- 8. To encourage former athletes to be actively involved

with our present athletes and to provide our services to former athletes who did not graduate and assist them in their academic planning toward a degree. The ultimate goal is for all student-athletes to successfully complete their degree.

Student Athlete Academic Support Services provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition, and eligibility education.

Chris Helms, in his third year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Assisting him are associate directors Lois Berg and Colin Howlett, Katie Ammons, Renia Edwards, Becky Kolenbrander and Terrie Repass.

ifice of Student Life

The Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech provides assistance to student-athletes in a number of areas. This office, which is run by Jermaine Holmes, director of student life, and Amy Freel, coordinator of student life, is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through many programs it implements.

One program the office sponsors is the HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program (Hokies Turning Opportunities Into Personal Success), which provides a well-rounded program for student-athletes to develop the individual skills necessary to lead successful and productive lives.

This program's goal is to enhance five areas of commitments that are vital to personal growth of studentathletes. Those areas are service; academic excellence; career development; athletic excellence; and personal development.

Hokies With Heart

Hokies With Heart is a new program of the Office of Student Life which promotes involvement of student-athletes in community service activities. In the past year, Virginia Tech athletes were involved in over 45 community

service projects. This program is important because service programs can help to build a positive

relationship between studentathletes and the community.

VT-SAAC

Virginia Tech Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (VT-SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletics administration and studentathletes to better serve their needs. The program is completely run by studentathletes and each team has two representatives. Christine Shubat and Jamie Meyer were the representatives for the Hokie volleyball team last season.

This program also encourages involvement of student-athletes on campus and in the community. The studentathletes help to design and provide programs that encourage academic success, health promotion, social responsibility and general awareness.

Outstanding Student-Athletes

Each month, the Office of Student Life awards recognition to a student-athlete for their participation in community service projects and their dedication to the "Hokies with Heart" program. Last year, Shubat was given this award.

Holmes is in his third year as the director of student life for Virginia Tech and fourth year working in the athletics department.

Holmes oversees the day to day operation of the office of

student life, directs the HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program and serves on various studentrelated committees on campus.

He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing management in 1996 and his master's in consumer studies in 1998, both from Virginia Tech.

Freel is in her third year as

and assists with the development and implementation of alcohol, tobacco, and drug awareness programs.

Freel graduated from Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., with her bachelor's in dietetics in 1996 and received her master's in the same field from Ball State in 1998.

Athletic Performance

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletic Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

The volleyball team trains in the beautiful 17,000-square foot training center on the first level of the Merryman Athletic Center. The weight room facility features new free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer Strength equipment, 12 platforms and a 6,000-square foot state-of-the-art speed and agility room.

New for this year is a 10-by-40-yard sand pit located outdoors and adjacent to the weight room. This new pit will be used for resistive running drills to improve speed.

Tech volleyball players used to train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie football player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletic Department. With the two facilities, the Hokies have over 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Gentry begins his 14th season as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning. As assistant athletics director for athletic performance, his duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received his bachelor's degree in physical

education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981. He received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Virginia Tech in 1999.

Gentry worked as an assistant strength coach at UNC and as the head strength coach at East Carolina University prior to coming to Virginia Tech in 1987.

In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year. Gentry has a son, Roy Christopher, who is 11.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports and Michelle Boswell, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of three graduate assistants — Erin O'Neil, Tim Ralph and Shannon Turly.

Sports Nutrition

A new program was added to the athletics department in July 2000 — sports nutrition.

In addition to her responsibilities as coordinator of student life, Amy Freel also has the duties of being the athletics department's sports nutritionist.

Freel graduated from Ball State University with her bachelor's degree in dietetics in 1996 and received her master's in dietetics from Ball State in 1998.

Freel works one-on-one with studentathletes to provide them with information that they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and how to eat to improve performance.

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge", a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

Sports Psychology

A new addition to the athletics department as of August 2000 is sports psychology. The licensed psychologists, Dr.

The psychologists meet with student-

athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling, performance enhancement and


to discuss the mental aspects of the game. As a team, the sports psychologists work on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

The psychologists also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sports psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions.

The response to the sports psychology program has been very positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sports psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.
