Virginia Tech has advanced to four consecutive NCAA Tournaments and five in the last six years, which continues to generate tremendous excitement in Cassell Coliseum. The Hokies have been ranked among the nation's leaders in attendance the past six years.

By the Way, What Is a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell, which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

Postgame Policy

Coach Beth Dunkenberger and players will be available to the media after each home game.

After a 10-minute cooling-off period, Coach Dunkenberger and requested players will speak to the media in Room 207 in Cassell Coliseum.

For the tenth straight year, the Hokies will have a commercial radio package. All Virginia Tech women's basketball games can be heard throughout the Blacksburg-Christiansburg-Radford market on HOT 100 (100.7 FM). Jerry Massey will handle the play-by-play duties in his second season with the team. 

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

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VIRGINIA TECH AND THE ACC – WOMEN'S HOOPS AT ITS BEST!

The Virginia Tech women's basketball program has been built over the past decade on a sound foundation of success. The Hokies enter the 2006-07 campaign seeking a tenth consecutive postseason appearance and fifth straight bid to the NCAA Tournament. This year's edition features a blend of the old and new with three seniors returning who will be joined by four sophomores and six freshmen.

Beth Dunkenberger guided the Hokies to a 21-10 record in her second season at the helm, as well as the program's second in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Dunkenberger was a Tech assistant during the Hokies' first two NCAA appearances in 1994 and 1995 before becoming an assistant at Florida, and later achieving her first head coaching job at Western Carolina. She has been a successful recruiter as well, signing Tech's first *Parade* All-American, Tere Williams, and coaching five players at Florida who later played in the WNBA.

The ACC became the fourth conference affiliation for Tech following stints in the Metro, Atlantic-10 and BIG EAST conferences. The Hokies finished tied for sixth in the ACC with a 6-8 league record last year in the toughest conference in the nation. Of Tech's 10 losses last year, five were to NCAA Final Four teams and all but one of the defeats were to teams that advanced to the postseason. The Hokies defeated perennial national power Texas Tech for the second consecutive season to finish undefeated at the Caribbean Classic in Cancun, Mexico, and posted wins over NCAA participants Liberty, Old Dominion, Boston College, Florida State and Missouri as well as defeating WNIT participants James Madison and Virginia.

The 2006-07 schedule will be another challenging one, as the Hokies face all four participants from the 2006 Final Four (Duke, LSU, Maryland, North Carolina), eight teams (Duke, Florida State, LSU, Liberty, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, Pepperdine) that made the NCAA Tournament field and five (Charlotte, Iowa State, Miami, Tennessee Tech, Virginia) that participated in the WNIT. In addition, the schedule includes five teams (No. 1 Maryland, No. 2 Duke, No. 3 North Carolina, No. 4 LSU and No. 19 Boston College) that ended the year in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25.

The Hokies will face Duke, Virginia and Wake Forest in home and away series while facing NC State, Florida State, Miami, and Georgia Tech at home. Tech will play ACC road games this season at North Carolina, Maryland, Clemson and Boston College.



Virginia Tech is among the top 40 programs in the nation in both victories and home attendance over the past six seasons. With an enthusiastic roster, an energetic coaching staff,

a solid fan base and a tradition of success, the Hokies eagerly await another season under Beth Dunkenberger in the Atlantic Coast Conference.



CASSELL COLISEUM

An Outstanding College Basketball Arena

Cassell Coliseum has always proven to be a tough arena for opponents, especially over the past nine seasons in which the Hokies are 107-25 (.811) at home.

The 1998-99 home season gave Hokie fans plenty of drama and excitement, as Tech roared to a 15-0 mark in the friendly confines of the Cassell. Going back two games into the 1997-98 season and extending through the 1999-00 opener, Tech won 18 straight at home.

Over the past five seasons, the Hokies have posted a 61-13 record in Cassell with all 13 losses coming against teams which advanced to the postseason. Tech has been especially tough at home versus non-conference foes defeating 34 of the last 35 and 40 of the last 42. The last two non-conference losses ironically both occured on March 23, a 77-72 overtime defeat in 2002 against Houston in the WNIT semifinals and a 61-48 loss to Penn State in the 2004 NCAA Second Round.


the Hokies' play at home has been the tremendous number of people who have come to watch them play. Averaging 5,221 fans per game in 1998-99 and having a sell-out at the 10,052-seat arena, Tech shattered its women's basketball attendance marks. In the last eight years, Tech has played before 413,888 fans at home, an average of 3,478 per game. Last season, the Hokies averaged 3,871 for 14 home contests, which ranked 26th in the nation.

Cassell Coliseum was the site of a subregional in the 1999 NCAA Tournament. In that marquee event, the Hokies played in front of packed houses and picked up wins over St. Peter's and Auburn to advance to the NCAA Sweet 16. Tech also played

host to the 2004 NCAA women's basketball first and second rounds, with the Hokies defeating Iowa 89-76 in the first round, before falling 61-48 to Penn State in the second round in front of 7,128 fans, the eighth largest crowd for a women's game in Blacksburg.

In the past 14 years, Virginia Tech has posted a 160-42 (.792) mark in home games. Overall, the Hokies have compiled a 275-113 record in Cassell Coliseum for a winning percentage of 70.9 in the 30 years they have played in the campus arena.

On Sept. 17, 1977, Virginia Tech officials and friends dedicated the Coliseum in honor of the



late Stuart K. Cassell. Cassell became a member of the University administration in 1945 after 17 years as a student and teacher at Tech. He successfully convinced the Board of Visitors of the need for a modern basketball facility.

Construction for the main portion of the Coliseum began in 1961. It was completed in December 1964, at a cost of \$2.7 million. Built by T.C. Brittain and Company of Decatur, Ga., it houses the basketball arena, locker rooms, two auxiliary gymnasiums, offices and other athletic facilities.

The Jamerson Athletic Center, connected to the rear of Cassell Coliseum, was completed in 1982 and dedicated in the fall of 1983. It is named in honor of J.E. Jamerson and his son, William E. Jamerson, owners of the firm that built the building.

The complex contains administrative and coaching offices, athletic department accounting and business offices, team and coaches' meeting rooms, a weight room and the Gordon D. Bowman Memorial Club Room on the top floor for Hokie Club members.

Prior to the 1988-89 season, a spring-loaded playing floor was installed in the Coliseum. During 1996-97, the facility was upgraded with a new roof and paint application.



During the 2000-01 season, new video boards were added at both ends of the Coliseum, which are used for live action and video replays during all games.

A seating renovation project was undertaken following the 2001-02 season. All of the seats were dismantled and shipped to a plant in Michigan, where the old paint was stripped off and refinished with a clear wood finish.


Through new projects, renovations and maintenance reserve projects, Cassell Coliseum has undergone approximately \$2.5 million in improvements over the past five years.

Prior to the 2003-04 season, the ambulatory was renovated and now features more accessible concession areas, new flooring, video monitors which allow fans to watch the action when not in the arena and the addition of Hokie Stone to many of the entrances to the seating area.


Hokies' Locker Facility Among the Nation's Best

When the final whistle blows after a game or practice, the women's basketball team retires to one of the finest locker room facilities in the nation. The entire locker room underwent a major renovation in the summer of 2000 with other improvements added in 2004 and 2006.

The facility features an entrance directly on to the Cassell Coliseum floor, a team meeting room, a training area and a new video system. The entrance to the area has a wooden floor painted to match the game floor, with a giant image of a Cassell Coliseum crowd as a backdrop.

Another nice touch in the state-of-the-art facility are the vanities located between each of the lockers.

The cost of the 2000 renovation project was approximately \$225,000 and would not have been possible without a generous gift from the Roanoke Valley Hokie Club. In 2004, several new additions were part of a \$45,000 upgrade including a Wall of Fame featuring outstanding players from the past, an Academic Honors Wall, a collage of photos of great moments in Tech women's basketball history, crown molding, Hokie Stone accent, computer desks, a plasma screen television and a new sound system. Funding for the project was provided through the women's basketball foundation.

NOTING THE HOKIES

Tech Success

Virginia Tech has averaged 22 wins over the past nine seasons. The Hokies have advanced to the postseason each year during the streak, including seven NCAA and two WNIT appearances.

Tech has won 182 of its last 257 games (70.8 percent) dating back to Feb. 14, 1998. During that span, the Hokies have only lost to Boston College (two times), Clemson, Connecticut (eight times), Dayton, DePaul, Duke (five times), Florida State (three times), Florida, Florida International, Georgetown, George Washington (two times), Georgia, Houston, LSU, Maryland (two times), Massachusetts, Miami (five times), Minnesota, North Carolina (two times), NC State (two times), Notre Dame (five times), Old Dominion (two times), Oregon, Penn State, Providence, Purdue, Rutgers (four times), Syracuse, Tennessee, Texas Tech, Villanova (three times), Virginia (five times), Wake Forest (two times), West Virginia and Xavier (four times). Of the 75 losses, 35 were against nationally-ranked opponents and 53 occurred either away or at a neutral site.

Traditional Tough Schedule

Once again last season, Tech's schedule was among the toughest in the nation. The Hokies faced three opponents (Duke, Maryland, North Carolina) that advanced to the NCAA Final Four, two others (Boston College, Connecticut) that were in the NCAA "Sweet 16" and played a total of 10 NCAA tournament teams along with three (James Madison, Miami, Virginia) WNIT participants. Tech's opponents had a .627 winning percentage and 13 of the Hokies' 26 opponents advanced to postseason play. Last season, 12 opponents won 20 or more games, with 21 posting non-losing records.

The 2006-07 schedule will be another challenging one, as the Hokies face all four participants from the 2006 Final Four (Duke, LSU, Maryland, North Carolina), nine teams (Duke, Florida State, LSU, Liberty, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, Old Dominion, Pepperdine) that made the NCAA Tournament field and three (Miami, Tennessee Tech, Virginia) that participated in the WNIT. In addition, the schedule includes five teams (No. 1 Maryland, No. 2 Duke, No. 3 North Carolina, No. 4 LSU and No. 19 Boston College) that ended the year in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25.

Tech in the NCAA Tourney

With last year's appearance, the Hokies have earned nine NCAA Tournament bids and have a record of 8-9. Tech's most successful experience in the NCAAs occurred in 1999, when the Hokies reached the Sweet 16. While Tech is 7-2 in first-round games and has won seven of the last eight, the second round has

not been as kind, seeing the Hokies post a 1-6 mark. Tech is 1-1 in second-round games in Cassell Coliseum, defeating Auburn 76-61 in the 1999 tournament and losing 61-48 in 2004 to Penn State. The Hokies are 5-1 in first-round games played on a neutral floor and 2-1 in first-round games in Blacksburg. Five of Tech's ten losses last season were to 2006 NCAA Final Four teams with three other defeats occuring against NCAA Tournament teams.

Postseason Experience

Last season's appearance in the NCAA Tournament marked the ninth consecutive season the program has participated in postseason play and the 11th time in the last 13 years. The appearance last season also marked the first time Tech had received four straight NCAA bids in the program's 29-year history. The Hokies had previously received back-to-back bids following the 1993-94 and 1994-95 seasons, the 1996-97 and 1997-98 seasons, and the most recent 2002-03 and 2003-04 campaigns.

Drop and Give Me Twenty

For Virginia Tech, reaching the magical 20-win mark has become a common occurrence over the last 14 years, achieving the plateau 11 times with last year's squad reaching the magical number with the ACC tourney win over Wake Forest. Tech has posted eleven 20-plus win campaigns, including eight in the last nine years. The 1998-99 squad was the fastest in school history to reach 20 wins, accomplishing the feat in only 21 games. The 1993-94 and 1994-95 teams reached the mark in only 25 contests, the 2002-03 and 2003-04 squads made the mark in 26 games, the 1992-93 and 2000-01 squads took 27 games and the 2001-02 and last year's edition hit the mark in 28 games. The 1997-98 team reached 20 wins in 29 games while the 1999-00 and 2001-02 teams reached the plateau in 30 outings.

Hokies' History

Last season's 21-10 record was the program's 18th winning season in 30 years of varsity competition. The 2003-04 season marked the Hokies seventh straight and tenth 20-plus win season in 12 years, which was snapped with the 2004-05 team's 17-12 mark. Tech has had ten losing seasons and two break-even campaigns. The Hokies' best season was the 28-3 mark in 1999, while Tech's most losses in a season were the 21 defeats in 1996-97.



Tech In Non-Conference Games

In the last nine seasons, Virginia Tech has enjoyed great success in non-conference games, posting a 101-29 (.777) record in non-conference contests overall, 56-6 at home, 27-17 away and 18-6 at neutral sites. Since the 1976-77 season, Tech is 282-202 overall in non-conference games, 160-57 at home, 85-104 away and and 36-41 on neutral floors. The Hokies were 14-1 last season versus non-conference opponents.

Coping with Success

Kirby Copeland is Tech's leading returning scorer, averaging 9.8 points per game last season. Copeland led the team with 87 assists and was second in steals with 58. She scored in double figures 15 times last season and tallied a career-high 19 points against Texas Tech in the Caribbean Classic. Copeland also came up big with 17 points against Southern Methodist in the championship game of the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic. She demonstrated her versatility with a career-high seven assists against Connecticut in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.



A Tall Order

Nare Diawara, the Hokies' tallest player at 6-6, tied for the team high in blocks last season with 25 while averaging only 16 minutes per game. Diawara was credited with a career-high four blocks at Georgia Tech, all in the first half. She tossed in a career-high 12 points against Missouri in the second round of the NCAA Tournament and pulled down a career-high 13 rebounds versus High Point. Diawara's improvement with increased playing was demonstrated at the end of the season as she averaged 6.3 points, 3.8 rebounds and 1.3 blocks over the final eight games.

A Commonwealth Occurrence

In the last nine seasons, the Hokies have posted a 39-10 overall record against teams that hail from the Commenwealth of Virginia. During that period, Tech is 22-2 at home and 17-8 on the road against in-state opposition. Since the 1976-77 season, Virginia Tech has posted a 123-92 record overall vs. in-state foes, 70-26 at home, 51-51 on the road and 2-14 in neutral site games. The Hokies have defeated 22 of the last 27 Virginia opponents. Two of the losses occurred at Old Dominion, a 63-49 defeat on Dec. 21, 2002 and a 87-56 loss on Dec. 27, 2004, with the other defeats coming against Virginia, a 70-67 loss on Jan. 28, 2005 in Charlottesville, a

61-58 defeat on Feb. 13, 2005 in Blacksburg and a 78-59 loss on Jan. 16, 2006 in Blacksburg.

Good Sports

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team was one of seven athletic teams named by the Atlantic Coast Conference as a recipient of the 2005-06 Winter Sportsmanship Award. Teams receiving the award have conducted themselves with a high degree of character and good sportsmanship, as determined by a vote of the league's players and coaches.

The conference presents sportsmanship awards for each of its 25 sponsored sports. The concept of these awards was created by the ACC Student Athlete Advisory Committee

to recognize teams who earned the utmost regard from their peers during competition. As is stated in the conference's Mission Statement, "It [the ACC] strongly

adheres to the principles of integrity and sportsmanship, and supports the total development of the student-athlete and each member institution's athletics department staff, with the intent of producing enlightened leadership for tomorrow."

Six schools — Boston College (2), Duke, Maryland, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest — were recognized by their peers as the sportsmanship award winners for the leaque's seven sponsored winter sports.

"Our players handled both victory and defeat with class and dignity," said Virginia Tech women's basketball head coach Beth Dunkenberger. "They exemplify the true spirit of Hokie athletics."



Young Team Eager to Face Challenging Schedule

Coming off a fourth-consecutive NCAA appearance, the Virginia Tech women's basketball team is eagerly anticipating the upcoming season. The 2006-07 squad will be a young and talented group, featuring seven returnees from last year's 21-10 NCAA Tournament team and six newcomers.

Last season's success included a fourth consecutive NCAA bid — the seventh in the last eight years — and the program's ninth-straight postseason appearance. In fact, the Hokies have advanced to postseason play 11 of the last 13 years. Tech has averaged 22 wins over the past nine seasons, advancing to the NCAA Second Round on five occasions, and to the "Sweet Sixteen" once. Last season's schedule featured 10 NCAA tournament teams, including three of the Final Four participants, as the Hokies finished among the nation's leaders in RPI and strength of schedule.

Graduation hit the program hard, as the Hokies lost five seniors, including three (Dawn Chriss, Kerri Gardin and Carrie Mason) that are members of Tech's 1,000-point club. The Hokies lost 67.7 percent of the offense and 62.4 percent of the rebounding from last season.

"Obviously we have lost the bulk of our scoring and rebounding, but most importantly, our leadership from last year's team," said head coach Beth Dunkenberger. "I think the good news is that we had a group of juniors who are now seniors who have played extensively and developed the necessary leadership skills." This year's edition of the Hokies will be a young group, featuring three seniors, four sophomores and six freshmen. Among the starters Tech will have to replace are third-

team All-ACC member Gardin, who led the league in rebounding, team leading-scorer Chriss and career three-point field goal leader Mason. Megan Finnerty (6.5 points) is the other senior starter the Hokies will be looking to replace.

Kirby Copeland (5-10, Sr., G, Morrow, Ga.), the top returning scorer, averaged 9.8 points and led the team with 87 assists. Copeland was second on the team in steals (58) and had a career-high 19 points against Texas Tech in the Caribbean Classic.

Nare Diawara (6-6, Sr., C, Bamako, Mali) is back after making great strides during her junior season. Diawara tied for the team lead in blocks and was third in rebounding, despite coming off the bench. She scored a career-high 11 points against Missouri in the first round of the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

The offense will be directed this season by Laura Haskins (5-10, So., G, Alexandria, Va.), who spent last season as Mason's understudy at point guard. Near the end of the season, Haskins moved into the point-guard position to allow Mason to slide into the shooting guard spot.

Brittany Cook (6-0, r-So., G, Narrows, Va.), Amber Hall (6-2, So., F, Tallahassee, Fla.) and Britney Anderson (6-0, Sr., F, Blacksburg, Va.) also saw considerable playing time last year. Cook saw action in 30 games and was second on the team in three-point baskets. Hall played in 26 games, starting two, and narrowly missed a double-double at Virginia with nine points and nine rebounds. Anderson played in 30 games and tossed in a dozen points against Southern Methodist in the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic championship game.

A.J. Lemaitre (5-10, So., G, Fairfax, Va.) joined the team last season as a walk-on and played in ten games.

Six newcomers will provide depth for the Hokies this season. Lindsay Biggs (5-11, Fr., G., Midlothian, Va.), Elenor Brentnall (6-4, Fr., C, Melbourne, Australia), Utahya Drye (6-1, Fr., F, Durham, N.C.), Shani Grey (5-8, Fr., G, Windsor, Conn,), Lakeisha Logan (5-8, Fr., G, Scarboro, W.Va.) and Vionca Murray (6-1, Fr., F, Rosedale, N.Y.) should all see action this season. Biggs is a McDonald's All-American nominee who averaged 18 points and six assists per game and was the Richmond-Times Dispatch All-Metro Player of the Year. Brentnall is a two-time member of the Australian National Junior team and averaged 15 points, 10 rebounds and 3.8 blocks for the 2005 squad. Drye is a McDonalds's All-American nominee who averaged 19 points, eight rebounds and four steals and was the Durham Herald-Sun All-Area Player of the Year in both her junior and senior seasons. Grey is another McDonald's All-American nominee and a New Haven (Conn.) Register all-state selection. Logan was an all-state selection in West Virginia after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and nine assists. Murray is a McDonald's All-American nominee and was named a Street & Smith All-American

Dunkenberger's coaching staff will remain intact from last season as Shellie Greenman returns as the Hokies' recruiting coordinator, and Bobbie Kelsey, Stacy Cantley and Director of Basketball Operations Jill Jameson all return to the Hokies for another campaign.

Greenman was on the Tech staff previously as an assistant (1988-93) under Carol Alfano along with Dunkenberger who also was an assistant coach. Kelsey won one national title and participated in three Final Fours as a player at Stanford (1991-96). Cantley was a top-10 rebounder and four-year letter winner at UNC Wilmington. Jameson, a Tech assistant from 1993-97, was the recruiting coordinator at

Marquette prior to assuming the same position in Blacksburg.

Lindsay Reynolds joins the staff this year as a graduate assistant after concluding her playing career at Roanoke College.

"The staff staying together helps us to be consistent in every phase of the game, whether it be on the floor coaching, understanding the personalties of the players, in recruiting and building relationship with high school coaches, and realizing what we need each year to fills the holes left by graduation." said Dunkenberger. "Keeping the same coaches around is a big key, especially when those people are successful and have other opportunities like our staff."



Kirby Copeland is one of three returning seniors for Tech and possibly the quickest player on the court for the Hokies. She can attack off the dribble to either pass or shoot, and she scored in double figures 15 times last season, including a 17-point performance against Southern Methodist in the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic championship game. Copeland demonstrated her passing ability with a career-high seven assists versus Connecticut in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

"Kirby is our leading returning scorer and a two-year starter at guard which provides us with experience at that position," said Dunkenberger. "She is a great competitor and probably our team's best athlete. Kirby will be counted on for not only her scoring ability and great defensive play, but also for leading a young team."

Laura Haskins returns for her sophomore season after serving as the reserve point guard last year. Haskins scored a career-high nine points in Tech's 76-69 win at Florida State and had a career-high seven rebounds against North Carolina.

"Laura was a member of the All-ACC
Academic team last year and a straightA student," said Dunkenberger. "Her
intelligence shows on the court with her great
understanding of the game. She is a fierce
competitor who earned her position as the first
player off the bench last year."



Brittany Cook returned last season after missing all of the 2004-05 season due to a knee injury. Cook opened the season with a bang, scoring 17 points against James Madison in her collegiate debut including three, three-point baskets.

"Brittany is great spot-up shooter and we have to find ways to get her some open shots," said Dunkenberger. "She is a good rebounder and can also create off the dribble."

A.J. Lemaitre saw limited action last season as a walk-on and earned a scholarship after last season.

"A.J. is a very smart and crafty player," said Dunkenberger. "She has a knack for finding the open person and is a fundamentally sound player."

Lindsay Biggs is a newcomer to the Hokies this season, but should see plenty of playing time as a freshman. Biggs was named to the Virginia Associated Press All-Group AAA first team and set the Manchester (Va.) High School career record for points and assists.

"Lindsay is a great outside shooter and brings us height at the guard position," said Dunkenberger. "She is also a very good passer with excellent instincts for the game."

A.J. LEMAITRE Shani Grey, who will miss the season due to a knee injury, joins Tech after scoring over 1,500 career points at Windsor (Conn.) High School. She was named to the Connecticut Coaches Association all-state team as a junior.

"Shani is in the Kirby Copeland mold in that she is a great defender who brings great energy to the defensive end of floor for 40 minutes," said Dunkenberger. "She is a tremendous athlete and a great competitor." Lakeisha Logan was selected as the captain of the West Virginia all-state team and played for her home state in the West Virginia vs. Ohio All-Star game.

"Lakeisha is a point guard who can also score," said Dunkenberger. "She has put up some great numbers in high school and I think she will bring us some versatility at the point-guard position where she can not only direct the offense, but will also put the ball in the basket."



Forwards

Britney Anderson returns for her senior year after appearing in 30 games last season. Anderson scored 12 points in the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic title game and was credited with a career-high five assists against High Point.

"Britney Anderson has worked hard during the offseason to make sure she has a solid senior season,"

said Dunkenberger. "She is a very well-conditioned athlete with a beautiful jump shot and undoubtedly one of the best leaders on our team."

Amber Hall had a solid freshman season earning starts at Virginia and against Duke.

Hall had career-highs of nine points and nine rebounds at UVa in her first collegiate start.

"Amber showed great promise during her freshman year and all she needs is more minutes to demonstrate what she is capable of doing," said Dunkenberger. "She can rebound, score and is very aggressive as well as being an excellent student."

Utahya Drye comes to Blacksburg after scoring 1,261 career points at Northern Durham High School. She narrowly missed a rare quadruple double against Chapel Hill with 27 points, 14 rebounds, 13 steals and nine assists.

"Utahya Drye is a Dawn Chriss-type player in that she is a slasher to the basket with an

excellent outside touch," said Dunkenberger. "She is long and lean at the forward position and a very good rebounder.

Vionca Murray scored over 1,000 career points in only two seasons at Francis Lewis (N.Y.) High School. She was named to the New York Coaches Association All-State first team along with top recruits Tina Charles (Rutgers), Danielle Wilson (Baylor) and Epiphany Prince (Rutgers).

"Vionca is a very physical forward with a knack for getting to the basket and ending up on the foul line for a three-point play," said Dunkenberger. "She is a very strong and aggressive player."

Nare Diawara, the tallest member of the team at 6-6, had a career-high 11 points in the NCAA first-round win over Missouri. Diawara had a career-high 13 rebounds against High Point and was credited with a career-best four blocks against Georgia Tech.

"Nare really evolved last year as a junior," said Dunkenberger. "She has shown a very nice shooting touch and she will be one of the best defensive players on our team, and in the conference, because of her long build as well as her ability to alter the inside game."

Newcomer Eleanor Brentnall had the longest journey to Blacksburg, traveling from

In addition, the schedule includes five teams (No. 1 Maryland, No. 2 Duke, No. 3 North Carolina, No. 4 LSU and No. 19 Boston College) that ended the year in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25.

The non-conference schedule presents the Hokies with many challenges, including home contests against Radford, William & Mary, Charlotte, East Tennessee State and Morehead State. Tech will host its annual holiday tournament, the Lady Luck Classic, featuring Detroit-Mercy, New Hampshire, and Winston-Salem State.

The non-conference away schedule has Tech traveling to Baton Rouge, La., for the Basketball Travelers Classic, a three-day, roundrobin event against host LSU, West Virginia and Howard. Over the Thanksgiving holiday, Tech makes a trip to the West Coast to participate in the Pepperdine tournament featuring the host Waves (NCAA participant) along with Iowa

State and Tennessee Tech (WNIT participant). The remaining away non-conference contests are against in-state rival Liberty and Alabama-Birmingham.

"With the NCAA rule changes which allow us to play a few extra games, we added the Basketball Travelers tournament at LSU," said Dunkenberger. "We will play all of the 2006 Final Four teams this year and the only way to get to the top is to play the best in the nation. Certainly participating in the LSU tournament will provide us with an early measuring stick at the start of the season. The Pepperdine event provides us with the opportunity for our players to see another part of the country while playing some very tough competition."

The ACC schedule will once again present a tremendous challenge as the Hokies battle in the toughest league in the nation. The ACC sent seven teams to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year and dominated the Final Four with three teams. With Miami and Virginia participating in the WNIT, the ACC had 75 percent of its teams in the postseason.

The women will once again play a 14-game regular-season conference schedule, with each team playing each member at least once a year. Primary partners will be utilized, meaning certain teams are guaranteed to play twice — home and away — every year. The primary partners can be changed after a minimum of two seasons of play. Tech's primary partners this year are Duke, Virginia and Wake Forest. The Hokies will play ACC members NC State, Florida State, Miami and Georgia Tech at home and travel to Clemson, North Carolina, Maryland and Boston College.

"The ACC is indisputably the toughest conference in the nation, producing the national champion and three Final Four teams," said Dunkenberger. "We were competitive in the conference last year and what is so exciting is that we won 21 games last year, advanced to the second round of the NCAAs, and half of our losses were to teams in the Final Four. Those facts are a testament to not only how tough the ACC is, but how competitive our team was last season."



The Hokies had much to celebrate last season on their way to a 21-10 record and a fourth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament.





HIS IS VIRGINIA TECH

Beginning in 1872 with 132 students and two programs of study, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With about 25,800 full-time students in Blacksburg and more than 2,000 other students statewide, the university produces world-class scholarship in a challenging academic environment. University tradition is firmly rooted in our motto, Ut Prosim (That I May Serve), and our historic land-grant mission is brought to life through learning, discovery, and engagement.


Learning

Virginia Tech's challenging academic standards attract high-achieving students. Our eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School offer more degree programs than any other university in the state with 60 undergraduate and 140 graduate offerings. Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in developing and using instructional technologies. Some 85 percent of our departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 60,000 enrollments since 1998.

Discovery

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures of about \$290 million, Virginia Tech is ranked 55th among research universities in the United States. The university, which has more than 100 research centers, also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and near the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in more than 3,500 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.



Engagement

As part of our outreach mission and in adherence to our motto, we serve and engage the citizens of the commonwealth, the nation, and the world. Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of economic and community development projects. These efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live.

Professionals, organizations, and communities tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers. Virginia Tech has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques, such as satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing, and Web-based courses, to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.


The Inn at Virginia Tech & Skelton Conference Center on campus and The Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center in Roanoke, both owned by Virginia Tech, support the university's outreach mission by working with faculty to plan and host conferences and continuing education and professional programs.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$30 million in funded economic development projects in 27 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2005-06, about 1,870 students from 117 foreign countries studied at Tech, while more than 800 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for more than 90 years. With 107 city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.

- In its 2006 report, DesignIntelligence, the only national college ranking survey focused exclusively on design, ranked Virginia Tech's undergraduate architecture program seventh nationally and fourth in the East. It also ranked the university's undergraduate landscape architecture program eighth in the nation and second in the East. In addition it ranked the graduate landscape architecture program 14th in the nation and the graduate interior design program ninth.





Now in his seventh year as President of Virginia Tech, Dr. Charles Steger has charted a course to bolster the university's research enterprise and compete among the nation's premier research institutions. Under his direction, the university has adopted a strategic plan, which is guiding the growth of the research enterprise, fostering outreach initiatives and increasing quality across all aspects of the academic community.

Perhaps one of the most memorable contributions of Steger's administration has been his role in the Higher Education Restructuring Act, which has been approved by the Virginia General Assembly and took effect July 2006. Two years ago, Steger joined forces with other university presidents to help define a new relationship between the Commonwealth of Virginia and its institutions of higher education, which enables greater institutional flexibility and potential for growth. This groundbreaking legislation will enable Virginia Tech to perform long-range planning, ensure a stable and predictable revenue stream and ultimately ensure a quality education for its students.

A hallmark of Steger's administration is making the impossible a reality. Steger will be forever credited with negotiating Virginia Tech's entrance into the Atlantic Coast Conference — a 50-year dream come true for Hokie fans.

Under Steger's leadership and vision, research activity continues to steadily increase, and the focus of the research enterprise continues to widen. Shortly after Steger took office, the university launched the Virginia Bioinformatics Institute, which in six years has already secured more than \$54 million in external research funding.

Concurrent with the expanding research agenda, Virginia Tech remains grounded in its land grant roots. Under Steger's leadership, the university has expanded its outreach efforts like never before. For example, Virginia Tech has partnered in a number of initiatives in Southside Virginia, including the renowned Institute for Advanced Learning and Research (IALR), which are advancing both educational and economic development opportunities.

CHARLES STEGER

University President

Virginia Tech is helping to provide educational opportunities for working professionals. With Steger's guidance, Virginia Tech has tripled its on-line course offerings. Today, through distance education, the university offers more than 30 graduate degree and certificate programs, which can be accessed across the globe.

With Steger's leadership, the university has reaffirmed its core mission of undergraduate education. The university is dedicated to fostering a research intensive environment that offers students an opportunity to learn the scientific process while enhancing their critical-thinking skills.

In his previous role as Vice President for Development and University Relations, Steger built a critical base of private support when he led the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which raised more than \$337 million. Today, private support from Virginia Tech's alumni and friends continues to play an essential role in this university community. Last year, the university raised more than \$67 million, a 23.5 percent increase over the previous year.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span five different decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the College of Architecture and Urban Studies in 1981, he was, at age 33, the youngest architecture dean in the nation. His most recent publications include book chapters on the topics of the business of education and the university presidency.

Steger is immediate past-Chairman of the Virginia Council of Presidents and is currently chair of the Virginia Space Grant Consortium. He is a member of the National Council on Competitiveness and the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges. For his significant contributions to the mission of The National Conference for Community and Justice, he received the NCCJ Humanitarian Award in 2002. The New Century Technology Council awarded him its 2004 Compass Award for visionary thinking and leadership in the field of information technology.

Steger also serves on the boards of several organizations including the Carilion Biomedical Institute, the Council of Higher Education's General and Professional Advisory Committee, the Virginia Business Higher Education Council, the World Institute for Disaster Risk Management and the Roanoke Economic Development Partnership.

He is a Fellow in the American Institute of Architects, and holds the William C. Noland Award for distinguished service and accomplishments from the Virginia Society of the AIA. The First Virginia Chapter of the National Society of Fundraising Executives recognized him as the Outstanding Fundraising Executive in 1999.

Steger received his Bachelor of Architecture degree, Master of Architecture degree and Ph.D., in environmental science and engineering from Virginia Tech.

CAMPUS LANDMARKS




Col. William B. Preston established the Smithfield estate -— named for his wife, Susanna Smith — in 1772 after an earlier settlement known as Draper's Meadow was wiped out in an Indian massacre. The Duck Pond provides a peaceful respite for students, faculty, staff and visitors — as well as for flocks of ducks and geese. The pond was created in 1937. A smaller lake, just north of the Duck Pond, is known as the Ice Pond — so called because it was the source of ice for the campus until a refrigeration plant opened in 1898-99.

Torgersen Hall, home to Virginia Tech's Advanced Communications and Information Technology Center, provides a high-tech environment in which researchers, teachers and students can interact in innovative and effective ways. The building includes high-tech auditoriums, observational booths for watching and taping experimental teaching techniques, the CAVE — Tech's sophisticated virtual reality environment for advanced research and learning, and an electronic reading room occupying the arch that spans Alumni Mall.



JIM Weaver

Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators,

is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 61, was appointed on Sept. 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader on behalf of Tech athletics. In his years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting studentathletes.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the continuing improvement of Tech's facilities.

A major addition to the west side of Lane Stadium opened this summer. In addition to luxury suites and other game day amenities, the structure houses a ticket office, athletic fund offices, an Athletics Hall of Fame and a new student academic services area.

Weaver presided over Tech's move into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004-05, when Virginia Tech and Miami were officially introduced as the 10th and 11th members of the ACC, effective July 1, 2004.

Weaver renegotiated Tech's multimedia rights contract with ISP Sports, creating a new business relationship and enhanced revenue for the athletics department. In the Fall of 2000, Weaver arranged a joint venture with ISP to commit \$2 million to purchase new scoreboards, upgrade sound systems, install an L.E.D. video display screen at Lane Stadium (which was enlarged for the 2005 season) and place two wall-mount L.E.D. video screens in Cassell Coliseum

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Weaver brings a "Penn State mentality" to the position. He says that various schools' interest in him as a reformer through the years can be traced to Penn State and its reputation for how it conducts business in intercollegiate athletics.

It was with the Nittany Lions' football team that Weaver first made a name for himself in athletics. He was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was recruited to Penn State by Engle. He played three seasons under Engle and one under Paterno, who is still the coach of the Nittany Lions.

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver started a coaching career as an assistant at Penn State for six seasons.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletics director.

Weaver drew rave reviews at UNLV for his fund-raising expertise. He generated nearly \$15 million in his time there.

While at Western Michigan, Weaver announced creation of a \$7 million football center, stabilized fluctuating revenues and installed a CHAMPS Life Skills program.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons

— Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

Of Note: As recruiting coordinator, McCloskey proved to be one of the most innovative people in the field. She completely reorganized the schedule for official recruiting visits by making academics the highlight of the visit. All aspects of university life were included in the visit for the prospective student-athlete. She lined up various meetings with professors and department heads, and key figures on campus.

McCloskey is one of the few women in college athletics who has been an advance person for away football games. It is her responsibility to arrange for hotel rooms, meals, meeting rooms, police escorts and air and ground transportation for the team.

As Tech's liaison for NCAA certification, a process the NCAA uses to ensure integrity in collegiate athletics, McCloskey coordinates periodic department self-study and review teams.

She served as tournament manager for the first two rounds of the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship in 1999 and again in 2004.



Tim East Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs

Responsibilities: Directly supervises marketing and promotions, sports information, the ticket office, hokiesports.com and hokiesports the newspaper. East is the department's liaison with ISP Sports, the exclusive multi-media and advertising rights holder for Virginia Tech athletics. East helps the department to identify and pursue new business opportunities.

Joined VT Staff: 1994

Prior to Virginia Tech: Marketing manager, VP International (publisher of Golf Illustrated manazine); Associate athletic development and marketing director, Long Beach State (1988-91); Assistant director of marketing and promotions, Miami (1986-88)

Education: St. Thomas University; Florida State University, 1985 (undergraduate)

Of Note: East joined the staff as director of promotions in

1994 and was promoted to director of marketing and promotions in 1995. Only one year later he was named assistant athletics director for marketing and promotions. During his 12 years on the staff, East has overseen all marketing and promotional aspects for the Hokies 21 varsity sports.



Randy Butt Associate Athletics Director for Financial Affairs

ACC Allows Great Achievements and Visibility

Virginia Tech has a long and proud athletic tradition, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. For the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference – a move that has already helped the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger.

Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle.

The success — and bright outlook — of Beth Dunkenberger's women's basketball program is only part of the story.

Tech's nationally known football team has had unprecedented success over the past decade. The Hokies have played in 13 consecutive bowl games. Last year, the Hokies won 11 games including the Gator Bowl after capturing a berth in the first-ever ACC championship game. The Tech football team captured the ACC Championship in its inaugural season in the league, won BIG EAST Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

In 2005, Spyridon Jullien won NCAA titles in the indoor weight throw and the outdoor hammer throw, bringing the school its first-ever NCAA Championships in any sport. During Jullien's senior year, he again won the weight

throw during the indoor season and captured the hammer throw title at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament last year, marking the 11th time in the past 13 years that the Hokies have made it to the postseason. The men's basketball team received a bid to the NIT following the 2004-05 season, and is looking to make it back to the NCAAs.

In the fall of 2005, the men's soccer team earned its highest ranking ever and received a first-round bye in the NCAA Championships. The softball team earned its first-ever NCAA berth during the spring of 2005 and earned its second bid the following spring. The 2006 season featured the program's first All-American. The women's soccer team reached the postseason for the first time in its history during 2004 and earned the ACC sportsmanship award in 2005.

In 2001, the Hokie golf team won a nation's-best six tournaments, including the BIG EAST Golf Championship and went on to record an eighth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Golf Championship.

Tech's baseball team and men's tennis teams have also participated in NCAA postseason competition in recent years, as have individuals from wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and track & field.

Prior to joining the ACC, Virginia Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference since 1991, and a member of the BIG EAST in all other sports except wrestling from 2001 to 2004.



Blacksburg's location (adjacent to major interstate highways) provides convenient access to most points in the southern and eastern parts of the country.



SERVICES

Providing the Tools for Success in the Classroom

The success of Virginia Tech's women's basketball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech studentathletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and is a school-best 74 percent for 2005. This marks the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

The Virginia Tech women's basketball program has been an integral part of this recent academic success.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, current Virginia Tech student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2005 calendar year, 376 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and

HighTechs. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental

programming, consistent with University and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each studentathlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student-athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

- University and NCAA information
- Orientation
- Academic assessment
- The development of an effective student life program
- Appropriate referrals
- Monitored study environments
- Tutorial programs
- State of the art technological learning assistance
- Student Athlete academic performance evaluations

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

SAASS provides programming for studentathletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

During this past summer, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms and direct access to the SAASS staff. This complex is a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides a centralized place for student-athlete services.

The new facility features:

- More than 18,000 square feet of functional space
- 10 Staff Offices
- 18 Private Tutor Rooms
- State-Of-The-Art Classroom
- 45 Station Computer Lab
- Three Reading/Study Rooms
- Conference Room
- Reference Library

Together, these spaces provide the studentathlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his eighth year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Colin Howlett begins his 10th year with Virginia Tech and serves as an associate director in the SAASS office.

In addition to assisting the director in all facets of the program, Howlett oversees the advisement of football student-athletes with regard to satisfactory progress, eligibility and degree completion as set forth by the NCAA, ACC and Virginia Tech.

He also helps coordinate support services for the football program, including tutorial support, mentoring, organized study table and major and career counseling. In addition to these responsibilities, Howlett assists in the recruitment, academic evaluation and student-athletes. Ammons is a former standout Hokie student-athlete.

Katie Ammons is an assistant director who begins her eighth year and works with the men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country and men's and women's track programs. Ammons is also in charge of the operation of the computer labs and other computing resources available for student-athletes. Ammons is a former standout Hokie student-athlete.

Sarah Armstrong, assistant director, begins her second year as a full time member of the SAASS staff. Armstrong has undergraduate and graduate degrees from Virginia Tech and has served as SAASS's intern for the past two academic years. She works alongside Howlett and is responsible for providing academic programming for the freshman football students. Armstrong is also

in charge of coordinating SAASS's tutorial program.

Drew Scales begins his fifth year with Student Athlete Academic Support Services as an assistant director. Scales provides academic support for student-athletes in lacrosse, volleyball, men's and women's soccer and wrestling, in addition to overseeing the mentor program.

Jessica Hegr begins her second year with SAASS and will work with student-athletes from the sports of baseball, softball, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, as well as the managers, trainers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

Peggy Weiss serves as the learning specialist for the SAASS unit and is currently developing the Learning Assistance Program to help support student athletes and teach them more effective ways to study and perform well academically. Dr. Weiss will work in collaboration with the office of Services for Students with Disabilities and with all of the SAASS Academic Coordinators.

Joseph Goodman, systems administrator, is in his second year with the SAASS program. He provides SAASS and student athletes with the expertise to maintain and secure the windows computer lab and linux servers, develop web-based applications to enhance SAASS programming, and apply web-based applications using open source products to enhance education.

Terrie Repass begins her 32nd year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office secretary and "first contact" person for the SAASS. She is responsible for organizing special events and meetings for the office. Repass prepares all accounting, purchasing and travel transactions for the office.

Study Hall



Study Hall is mandatory for all freshman, transfer, and currently enrolled students with an overall GPA below 2.30.



COMPUTER SERVICES DEPARTMENT



Another example of Virginia Tech's commitment to providing its student-athletes with the best academic resources possible is the presence of the Computer Services department, under the direction of Brad Tilley (left) and Chris Mayer.

Because all Tech students are required to own computers, the Virginia Tech athletics department helps its scholarship athletes fulfill that requirement by providing them with state-of-the-art laptops equipped with the most recent software.

In addition to procuring laptops for the athletes, the office also addresses hardware and software needs for the student-athletes and the entire Virginia Tech athletics staff. Both Tilley and Mayer are graduates of Virginia Tech.

STUDENT LIFE

Assisting in the Development of the Total Person

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is committed to developing the total student-athlete. The director of the office of student life, Megan Armbruster, is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through programs the office administers. The programming implemented by the Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is modeled after the NCAA/CHAMPS Life Skills Program. The five components are personal development, career development, academic excellence, athletic excellence and community outreach.

Personal Development

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers.

Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations and manners and etiquette dinners.

Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resume design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and coops during their college careers.

In the 2005-2006 academic year, Cintas Corporation, Ferguson and NVR, Inc., hosted workshops providing student-athletes the opportunity to hear job search strategies directly from employers.

Academic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for oncampus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2005 calendar year listed 377 student-athletes with this honor. Neil Savage, men's swimming and diving, and Lindsay Pieper,

women's lacrosse, received the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics. The award is given to one male and one female student-athlete who demonstrate leadership, outstanding academic excellence and community involvement. The recipients of the award receive a \$5,000 scholarship donated by Dr. Bill and Peggy Skelton.

Several athletes from the Virginia Tech women's basketball team have received various academic awards. Eight Hokies made the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2005. Brittany Cook was named to the 2005 Virginia Tech All-Academic Team for attaining the highest GPA on the women's basketball team. Laura Haskins and Carrie Mason were named to the 2006 All-ACC Academic Basketball Team. Additionally, Mason was named as a recipient of the ACC Postgraduate Scholarship.

Athletic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year, SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season. The women's basketball team SAAC representatives are Britney Anderson and Amber Hall.

Community Outreach

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart."
Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer

throughout their college experience. In collaboration with the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets and student leadership, the "Hokies with Heart" program works together with the Montgomery County Public Schools system to visit with local students about the importance of education and character development.

In 2006, student-athletes also volunteered with the Montgomery County Christmas Store, Virginia Tech White Ribbon Campaign and Hokies United Hurricane Relief Campaign.

Each athletic team at Virginia
Tech is encouraged to select one local
charity or group on which to focus its
philanthropic efforts throughout the
year. The women's basketball team
partners with Shawsville Elementary
School.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. Always striving to stay on the cutting edge, Virginia Tech has combined strength and conditioning with nutrition and sport psychology to the benefit of its student-athletes. At Tech, these areas are part of the student-athletes' preparation — not just for game day, but also for life after college. Virginia Tech tries to provide the best services, facilities and support staff for all of its student-athletes, to make them better athletes and better people.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

One of the most important aspects of a successful college women's basketball program is its strength and conditioning program. Before the lights ever come on, before the players run out of the tunnel and through the smoke for the first game and before the first basket is ever scored for a season, the Hokies work on getting themselves physically prepared for the rigors of the season.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry and Jamie Meyer, strength and conditioning coordinator for Olympic sports, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the women's basketball program one of the best as well.

One of the main support centers of Tech women's basketball is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends for the program.

The team trains in the 17,000-square foot training center on the first level of the Merryman Athletic Center. The weight room facility features free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer strength equipment, 12 platforms and a 6,000-square foot state-of-the-art speed and agility room.

Tech also has the use of a 10-by-40-yard sand pit located outdoors and adjacent to the weight room. This pit is used for resistive running drills to improve speed. The Hokies also have the practice fields for use in running drills.

Virginia Tech student-athletes also have access to the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie football player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department. With the two facilities, the Hokies have more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Meyer, who primarily works with the women's basketball team, is a graduate of Virginia Tech and received her B.S. in human development in 2003. She finished her master's degeree in sports sciences at Ohio University in 2004. Meyer also holds a CSCS certification and is a USA weightlifting coach.



ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Helping Student-Athletes in All Aspects of Life

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all its student-athletes — sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

Mike Gentry, assistant AD for athletic performance, says, "I've always felt that (sport psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department, and we wanted to and needed to include sport psychology in that model."

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."


The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologists. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A recent addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions and increase peripheral

awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.

The response to the sport psychology program has been very positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

"It is a great resource for our coaches and our athletes," Gentry says. "We've improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and in sport psychology. It's all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping student-athletes. We want to give them all the resources we can, to put them in a position to be successful."



SPORTS NUTRITION

Educating Student-Athletes About a Healthy,

Performance-Enhancing Diet

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with studentathletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.

She also designs preseason menus, snacks and training table menus for the women's basketball team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our studentathletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BodPod body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BodPod is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.





SPORTS MEDICINE

Providing Experienced, Professional Care

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine
Department is an ever-changing and developing
unit that strives to provide the most current and
comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The
department is constantly evolving to incorporate
new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the
betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of Tech athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its fifth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is top-


of-the-line equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer.

The Ferrell Training Room, which nearly doubles the size of the former Merryman Center facility, allows the staff to utilize that room for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally. In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility that includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, supplements the new training room. This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities, including portable X-ray, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot and cold packs and a lumbar/ cervical traction unit. It also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized DonJoy prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athletes year-round.

Special attention is paid to off-season activity. During this time, the staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program. This same procedure can be followed during the summer.

"If our strength and conditioning is so important, and it is, then we owe it to our athletes to provide them with the necessary resources to keep them actively participating," Goforth said. "We basically adopt the attitude that in the fall, our mission is to keep them participating on the field and during the other times of the year, it is our job to keep them participating in our strength and conditioning program."





Their programs consist of strengthening, stretching and — most importantly — movement pattern analysis and training to help prevent the re-occurrence of injuries.

"We value the off-season greatly within our department," Goforth said. "We have adopted the same mindset as our strength and conditioning staff and look at our off-season time as an opportunity to get our athletes better as opposed to time off for our staff."

Most of the off-season activity is based on programs that are designed to detect movement patterns that might lead to injury or could be causing a drop in performance.

A vital part of student-athlete services is access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

If physical therapy is needed, studentathletes can be seen by therapist Mark
Piechoski in the Ferrell Training Room.
Piechoski, who is a certified athletic
trainer, physical therapist and strength and
conditioning specialist, plays a large role
in the overall program developed to return
the injured athlete back to 100 percent.
In addition, staff sport psychologist Gary
Bennett is available to all student-athletes
for personal and performance issues. Virginia
Tech also has the services of Dr. Greg Tilley,
team chiropractor. Tilley provides Tech athletes
with specialized treatment for spine-related

conditions and plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

"For us as certified athletic trainers, to have the resources of folks like Mark Piechoski, Greg Tilley and Gary Bennett is a tremendous asset," Goforth said. "The knowledge and skill that they bring is invaluable.

"Our goal is to provide the same high level of health care that professional and Olympic athletes receive," Goforth continued. "Our usage of specialist care is modeled after the NFL system and incorporates components of the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs."


Team orthopaedic surgeon Dr. Marc Siegel brings a wealth of experience and skill to assist

when athletes need orthopaedic surgery to repair certain types of sports-related injuries that occur from time to time.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-theart equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

This year, the staff will consist of three graduate assistant athletic trainers: Richard Stewart, Carrie Hendrick and Jacob Botts.

Over the past 10 years, Virginia Tech has developed the reputation for producing top-level certified athletic trainers. Graduates are now employed in positions across the country at various levels of the profession.

hokiesports.com is the lead site of six official Virginia Tech athletics auxiliary sites. These include hokiephotos.com, hokieTV.com, hokietickets.com, hokiepages.com and hokieshop.com.

There is also a direct link to the popular online version of *hokiesports the newspaper*.

hokiephotos.com allows fans to purchase select athletics department photos of some of the most memorable athletes and moments in Virginia Tech history.

hokieTV.com provides streaming video clips that are exclusive to the site. One-of-a-kind coach and player interviews as well as video coverage of events are available. hokietv.com broadcasts the weekly Hokie Hotline radio show, football media conferences and postgame interviews in the live streaming format for the 2006 season.

hokietickets.com contains links and updates about tickets for Hokie athletics events, while the popular hokiepages.com provides the user with great wallpapers to add to their computers, extra photo scrapbooks, on-line greeting cards and many new features which change every day.

On the main site, hokiesports.com, one can find an array of information on Tech athletics. Through the efforts of the sports information department, pregame releases, game stories and individual features, as well as up-to-date statistics and results for all 21 athletic teams are posted, providing the fastest, most complete source for Hokie news on the Web. Other offerings include individual home pages for each Virginia Tech sport. Breaking news and archived releases can be found, along with media guides containing player and coaching staff profiles, schedules, records,


historical information and other pertinent facts for every sport.

HOKIESPORTS THE NEWSPAPER

In-House Publication Provides In-Depth Coverage

Tech enjoyed its second season in the ACC and one entity brought fans coverage of all 21 sports every step of the way

- hokiesports the newspaper.

But then, the newspaper has been serving Tech fans for more than 20 years. Formerly The Hokie Huddler, the idea of a newspaper came about in 1984 when then director of athletics and football coach Bill Dooley wanted an in-house publication devoted to coverage of all of Tech's sports, primarily football. Since then, the newspaper has undergone numerous changes, including a name change and a move to the Internet. But providing accurate, timely and quality information remains the constant for the newspaper staff.

Today, there are more than 7,500 devoted subscribers to the print version, and more than 100 registered for the on-line version of the paper, which became available to Hokie fans in the fall of 2000. hokiesports the newspaper is a colorful publication that is printed 33 times per year (weekly during football and basketball seasons and bi-monthly during the spring). The newspaper consists of the ever-

popular "Inside Tech Sports" section, which is a page of short notes on the latest events within the Tech athletics

department. With hokiesports the newspaper being owned by the athletics department, it allows the staff to be closer to coaches and players to get that "inside" information. Most

> sports publications of this kind are independent of their school's athletics departments.

ATHLETIC FUND

Virginia Tech's second season in the ACC was successful, both in competition and fundraising. Donors gave a record \$24.7 million in support of the athletics program. 
HOKIE HARDWOOD CLUB

support of the





Head Women's Basketball Coach


Beth Dunkenberger begins her third season as the head coach of the Virginia Tech women's basketball team after guiding the Hokies to two NCAA Tournament appearences in her first two seasons. Dunkenberger has compiled a 38-22 record at Tech and is 103-72 in six seasons overall as a head coach.

Dunkenberger was named the fifth head women's basketball coach at Virginia Tech on April 6, 2004.

"I believe Beth Dunkenberger is the right person to lead the Virginia Tech women's basketball program into the Atlantic Coast Conference," Virginia Tech Director of Athletics Jim Weaver said. "She is a personable and energetic young woman who is committed to building upon the momentum Virginia Tech has in place in women's basketball."

Dunkenberger has a long association with the Virginia Tech women's basketball program, having served on Carol Alfano's staff for nine years. (1988-97). She worked as a graduate assistant for two years before being promoted to a full-time assistant position. She helped lead the Hokies to the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Tournaments, the first two appearances in school history. Dunkenberger not only helped lead Tech to two NCAA Tournaments, but also to the Metro Conference Tournament Championship in 1994 and the Metro Conference regular season championship in 1995. She served three years as recruiting coordinator and was responsible for signing Tere Williams, the first Parade All-American in the school's history. In addition, Dunkenberger assisted in recruiting seven members of the Tech 1,000-point club and four of the top six scorers in the program's history.

Dunkenberger came to Blacksburg in 2004 after guiding Western Carolina to a 65-50



record, including a 14-17 mark in her final season when the sixth-seeded Catamounts won three games to advance to the Southern Conference Tournament finals. The program had only won a total of four tournament games in its 20 years in the Southern Conference prior to the historic run in the event.

The Catamounts came up with huge wins during the 2002-03 season, including a 73-69 victory over Chattanooga on the road and clinching second place in the SoCon heading into the league tournament with a 64-54 win over UNC Greensboro. Dunkenberger's efforts earned her 2002-03 Southern Conference Coach of the Year honors as the Catamounts finished the season with a 21-7 record, the program's best since beginning NCAA Division I competition in 1981-82. It was the first time a WCU women's basketball coach had received the recognition.

In Dunkenberger's first season (2000-01), the Cats posted a 13-15 record, marking the program's most wins in 12 seasons. She backed that up with a 17-11 scoresheet in the 2001-02 season. Dunkenberger reached 50 wins faster than any other head coach in the program's history.

Not only have her teams been successful, but her student-athletes themselves garnered several awards and recognition during the Dunkenberger era at Virginia Tech and Western Carolina. In 2005, Erin Gibson and Carrie Mason were named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America District III University Division team. Gibson was also selected as one of 29 ACC scholar-athletes to be named as a recipient of the ACC Postgraduate Scholarship which is awarded to indivituals who have performed with distinction in both the classroom and in their respective sports, while demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community. Mason also received the scholarship following the 2005-06 season.

In 2003-04 at Western Carolina, Tiffany Hamm was named to the SoCon All-Conference team after being voted the 2002-03 Player of the Year by the SoCon Sports Media Association. Hamm also earned 2002-03 all-conference honors along with teammate Jennifer Gardner, while Erin May graced the all-freshman team this season. It was the fourth consecutive year a WCU athlete was represented on the all-rookie list

In addition to the athletic honors, Yoneko Allen was named to the 2004 Verizon Academic All-America third team after being named to the All-District III team for the third consecutive season. She is also a two-time Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar along with teammate Christy Blackwell who received the honor last year. Laura Echols racked up quite a number of honors in her last two seasons under Dunkenberger's tutelage. Echols was named to the 2001 and 2002 Verizon Academic All-District III teams, the 2001 and 2002 all-conference teams and a SoCon Player of the Week three times.

Other Catamounts receiving honors under Dunkenberger's guidance include 2001 Conference Freshman of the Year Tiffany Hamm, who was the SoCon rookie leading scorer that year with 12.0 ppg; Ki-Ki Glass, who was named to the 2002 SoCon All-Freshman team; Jennifer Gardner, who was named a SoCon Player of the Week in 2002; and Yoneko Allen, who was named to the 2002 Verizon Academic All-District III second team, an Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar and Western Carolina's 2002 Female Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Dunkenberger's emphasis on the importance of academics is easily recognized. Her 2000-01 squad finished in the top 25 in the nation for women's basketball programs academically, ranking sixth with an overall team GPA of 3.313.

During Dunkenberger's three-year tenure as an assistant coach, the last as recruiting coordinator, at the University of Florida, she helped the Gators to a 63-36 overall record. The Lady Gators advanced to postseason play all three years she was there, with the 1997-98 team making an appearance in the Sweet Sixteen. While in Gainesville, Dunkenberger had the opportunity to help coach five players who are currently, or were previously, on rosters in the WNBA.

Dunkenberger was valedictorian at Shawsville High School and graduated cum laude from Randolph-Macon College with a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics in 1988. She was named academic all-district as well as all-conference. She continued her education by earning a Master of Science degree in education at Virginia Tech in 1990. Dunkenberger also served as the commencement speaker at both her high school and her undergraduate graduation ceremonies. A native of Shawsville, Va., she is the daughter of Tom and Rebecca Dunkenberger.

A TALK WITH BETH DUNKENBERGER

After two years at Virginia Tech, what is your evaluation of where the program stands in the ACC as well as on the national level?

I'm very pleased with the program at this point. We've gone to the NCAA Tournament for two consecutive years, advanced to the second round last season, and won 21 games. I think we have done a nice job with recruiting, which is the key to being competitive in the strongest conference in the nation.

What are some of your general thoughts about last season?

We lost a close contest to the eventual national champion (Maryland), a team we have defeated in four of the last five meetings — a fact that demonstrates the competitiveness of our basketball program. Last year was the second time in the history of the program that the team went through the regular-season non-conference schedule undefeated. That included winning the Caribbean Classic in Cancun, Mexico, with our second win in as many years over Texas Tech.

The team was very streaky last year, opening the season with 12 consecutive wins before dropping five of seven, then rebounding to advance to the NCAA Tournament. To what do you attribute the resiliency of last year's team?

When you play in the toughest conference in the nation and have a bad game, you're going to lose. The good news is that if your team stays the course and is consistent, they'll win some games against tough opposition. When our backs were up against the wall, we managed to play some of our best basketball. Our seniors helped tremendously in getting us back on track, but we also received some very valuable performances down the stretch from the freshmen. When we needed a boost to get us through some of the tight spots, several of the rookies stepped up and played some very valuable minutes and made significant contributions.

The loss of five seniors, including four starters, leaves some big holes to fill. How do you plan on developing the younger players while competing in the toughest conference in the nation?

This season we'll do a lot of things by committee instead of relying on one person to step up and provide the bulk of the scoring. I



think the good thing about last year's seniors is that they all brought something different to the table. Our six newcomers are similar in that they all bring different specialities to this team.

Kirby Copeland is obviously a player you will count on heavily this season on both ends of the floor. How has she developed in your two seasons, and what are your expectations for Kirby this year?

Kirby's speed and quickness are definite assets to her game. She's always been a tough defender, but her offensive skills have improved greatly. Not only is she a good scorer, but last year she led our team in assists. I think a role she will fill this year will be assuming a position of leadership for the Hokies.

Nare Diawara really showed tremendous improvement last season. What do you see as her role on this year's team?

We have several young post players and Nare needs to be a leader for us in the paint. She needs to lead by example and do all of the little things that make a difference. Nare is a very smart player who really understands the game. We'll not only call on her to teach the younger players, but to also step up her play on the court.

Laura Haskins saw valuable playing time during her freshman year at the point. How has she developed after one year and what areas of her game need improving?

Laura worked her way into becoming our first guard off the bench because she was a great defender and she has that ability to get the ball to the open player. As the season progressed, she stepped up and looked for opportunities to score. Laura needs to keep bringing that defensive intensity every game and to step up and lead our team as well.

Brittany Cook missed a year due to injury and after getting off to a good start last year, really struggled with her shot. What does she need to do to get her confidence back, and how will she fit into the offense?

The key for Brittany is to find success in many other areas and let the offense come to her. If you play great defense, rebound the ball and find the open person, you'll find a way to stay on the floor which will lead to opportunities to knock down shots — something Brittany can do very well.

What are your expectations for this year's recruiting class?

We recruited this group to help us climb ladders and cut down nets and to get us back to championship form. This program has won four conference championships and I think you have to bring in players with a winning attitude, which is something these six freshmen have developed in their playing careers.

The ACC won the national title and had three Final Four teams last season. What does this year's young team have to do in order to compete in the nation's toughest conference?


This team has to play hard on the defensive end of the floor every night. The players have to work hard to learn about each other offensively so we can establish some rhythm and flow. We have some great scorers on this team, but the trick is going

to be learning to play together while figuring out ways to get open looks at the basket.

Last year the Hokies were 10-4 at home with three of the losses against the national champion and two other Final Four teams. The program was 26th in the nation in attendance, marking the fifth straight year in the top 30. What does it mean to play in the Cassell?


I think it is such a boost for our team to play at home. When you walk out of the tunnel and see thousands and thousands of fans cheering us on, it is a real boost. I believe the big task is for us to keep the games fun to watch in order to keep people coming back, and to have them bring a friend with them to the next game. That way we advance from being a Top 30 attendance team into the Top 10 in attendance.

A Talk With SHELLIE

How has affiliation with the ACC enhanced the program's exposure to recruits?

Being in the ACC, which is the number one women's basketball conference in the country, has made a tremendous impact on recruiting. Propsective student-athletes growing up in the southeast dream of playing in the ACC. It fits for us now and we have a much better chance of getting the higher profile athletes in this region and along the eastern seaboard. Television exposure is huge for us as well. Before, I think Virginia Tech had one game televised in it's last year in the Big East. We usually have six to eight regular-season games on television and that doesn't include the ACC and NCAA tournaments.

What are some of the deciding factors today's recruits look at when making their final decision on which school to attend?

I think that is going to vary from person to person. Different kids have different priorities in terms of what will fit for them. Ultimately, they put a lot of stock in how successful the program has been, what the school has to offer academically, the coaching staff, and how they fit in with the current players.



BOBBIE KELSEY

Assistant Women's Basketball Coach

Bobbie Kelsey, a native of Decatur, Ga., is in her fifth year on Beth Dunkenberger's staff and third at Virginia Tech.

As a player, Kelsey had an outstanding collegiate career at Stanford University. She helped the Cardinal to three Final Four appearances in five years and was a member of the 1992 National Championship team. Kelsey was a team co-captain in 1995 and 1996, voted the team's most inspirational player in 1992 and 1996, and named the team's most improved player in 1993. She earned her B.A. in communication from Stanford in 1996.

While at Western Carolina, Kelsey coached the post players and assisted with recruiting and camps. She coached 2002-03 SoCon Player of the Year Tiffany Hamm as well as Jennifer Gardner, the league's most accurate shooter that same year, making over 51 percent of her shots.

Kelsey spent the 2000-02 seasons as the top assistant and recruiting coordinator for the University of Evansville. Prior to her stint with the Aces, she was an assistant coach at

the University of Florida for two seasons where she was responsible for film exchange, scouting and coaching the posts. Kelsey helped the Lady Gators to back-to-back post-season appearances, including an NCAA Tournament trip in 1999 and a trip to the WNIT Championship game in 2000.

Prior to her tenure at Florida, Kelsey served as a practice player for the Atlanta Glory of the American Basketball League for one year and as an assistant at Boise State University for one season.

"We are extremely pleased to have Bobbie here with us," said Dunkenberger. "I had the opportunity to work with her at Florida for two years and know that she brings a strong competitive attitude to our program. Having played in three Final Fours and been a part of a National Championship team at Stanford, she brings a wealth of successful experience to our team."

A Talk With BOBBIE

What are some of the factors you consider when putting together the non-conference schedule?

We consider a number of factors when putting together our non-conference schedule. Some of them include location, RPI, previous season conference record, number of starters returning, conference affilation, and traditional rivalries. Some schools like to postpone starting a home and home series until they have a better team. We will do the same thing if we have a young squad like this coming season. The ACC is the best conference in the country so we have our work cut out for us in our conference. Therefore, we do not want to schedule too many Top 25 teams for non-conference.

What are the advantages to scheduling games in another region of the country?

The advantage to scheduling games in another region of the country is two-fold. First, it gives the players an opportunity to see other parts of the country as well as play teams they would not otherwise compete against during the regular season. Secondly, we are able to return some of the players to their home states for family and friends to watch them play. It is fun to see all the hometown folk come out to support not only the player, but Virginia Tech as well. We have fans all over the country rooting for us to do well, so that is a plus. A Talk With STACY

What is your role in the monitoring of academic progress of the student-athletes and what methods do you utilize?

Every year the team is split up among Shellie, Bobbie and myself. We each get four or five athletes and are responsible for keeping track of their progress throughout the year. All students are required to meet with us once every two weeks. When they come to these meetings, they are required to bring all notebooks, and any returned papers or tests that they have taken during those two weeks. We will also try to do surprise visits to class, just to make sure our players are in attendance and that they are making it on time. As their academic coach, if we feel that a student may need extra time for their studies, then we will either put them back in study hall, or add to their study hall hours. Each semester we have a competition, and whichever academic group has the highest GPA is the winner. The winners get to pick what we want for dinner and the losers have to do all of the cooking and the clean up while the winners eat and watch. I don't think my group has had to cook yet!

When organizing summer camps, what are your goals for each camper?

We have three main goals for our campers — have fun, learn something new and be positive. If you're positive and have a great attitude, then you will have fun and hopefully will learn something new. If we can accomplish each of these goals, then we will consider our camps to be a success.

Lindsay Reynolds Graduate Assistant

Lindsay Reynolds will serve as a graduate assistant with the women's basketball program this season. Reynolds is responsible for film exchange as well as the team's student managers. She also assists with recruiting in the preparation of mailouts, on-campus visits, and tracking recruits playing schedules. Reynolds will also assist with all phases of the summer camps.

Reynolds comes to Virginia Tech from Roanoke College where she was a four-year starter for the Maroons and served as team captain during her senior season in 2005-06. As a freshman, Reynolds scored a career-high 26 points in the Maroons' win over Eastern Mennonite in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) tournament. During her career, she scored 639 points, pulled down 257 rebounds, handed out 172 assists and nailed 70 three-point baskets.

She is enrolled in graduate school majoring in health promotions.



Megan Rittler Certified Athletic Trainer

Megan Rittler begins her fourth year as the athletic trainer working directly with the women's basketball team. Rittler graduated from Salisbury University in May of 2002 with a dual degree in athletic training and physical education. She began her Hokie experience in the fall of 2001 as an intern for the Virginia Tech football team. After completing her internship,

Rittler accepted a graduate position at Tech in fall 2002 working with the volleyball and lacrosse programs. While a graduate assistant, she completed her Master's degree in December of 2003 in health promotions. In January of 2004, Rittler assumed a full-time position in the Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department, working primarily with the women's basketball team.

Rittler's role with the women's basketball is to be the "gatekeeper" of all medical conditions. She coordinates all injury and illness evaluations, referrals to physicians and surgeons, and the rehabilitation of injuries. Rittler also plays a role in advocating and encouraging the use of other professionals in the Athletic Performance Department such as nutritionist Amy Freel and sport psychologist Gary Bennett. Her daily function is to treat athletes before activity and evaluate as well as treating injuries after activity (including practice, conditioning and strength training). Athlete playing status is determined jointly with the medical staff and Rittler. The daily reporting of injury progression and playing status and alternative conditioning for injured players is the main function of her day-to-day role, along with presence at all practices for immediate medical attention.



Torye HurstAssistant Sports Information Director

Torye Hurst is in his seventh year as assistant sports information director and working with the women's basketball program. Hurst is responsible for the day-to-day promotion of the women's basketball and men's and women's tennis programs.

During his tenure at Virginia Tech, Hurst has served as the media coordinator for the

2004 NCAA Women's Basketball First- and Second Round in Blacksburg, Va. Additionally, Hurst has handled the play-by-play duties for the Tech baseball program for the past four years as well as serving in the same capacity on webcasts for the past two years for the ACC at the annual baseball championships.

Prior to arriving in Blacksburg, Hurst was the Director of Marketing and Media Relations for the Peach Belt Conference in Augusta, Ga. for eight years. At the Peach Belt, he was responsible for the publicity of the 12-member Division II conference. While in Augusta, he also served as the public address announcer for the Augusta GreenJackets Class A minor league baseball team.

In 1996, Hurst was selected to serve in press operations as a venue interview room manager for the Centennial Olympic Games. He was supervisor of the interview room for the tennis competition at the Stone Mountain Tennis Center.

Hurst completed a bachelor's of science degree in radio, television, and film in 1982 from the University of Southeren Mississippi and worked for the university for eight years as the program manager of WUSM-FM. While at USM, he received the "Best Sports Story Award" in 1991 from both the Mississippi Associated Press Broadcasters Association and the Mississippi Broadcaster's Association. Hurst completed a master's degree in sports admininstration from USM in 1992.



Jerry Massey Play-by-Play Announcer

Jerry Massey is in his second season as the play-by-play broadcaster for the Virginia Tech women's basketball program on the Virginia Tech ISP Sports Network. Massey also handles play-by-play duties for most of Virginia Tech's Olympic sports on hokiesports.com. He also served as the lead softball play-by-play broadcaster on the 2006 ACC Softball Championships on theacc.com

A graduate of Radford University, Massey served as the Assistant Director of Radio Operations for two years before coming to Virginia Tech. He was the play-by-play broadcaster for the Radford women's basketball program and served as the primary back-up play-by-play broadcaster for the Highlanders' men's basketball program. In addition to his play-by-play responsibilities, Massey was the public address announcer for many of Radford's Olympic sports.

The Spotsylvania, Va., native worked for two years in Radford's sports information department and began his collegiate broadcasting career during that time. He served as a play-by-play broadcaster and color commentator for the Highlanders' limited number of women's basketball and baseball broadcasts alongside now-current Oklahoma State broadcaster Dave Hunziker. In addition, Massey was a regular fixture on the campus radio station, WVRU, and handled duties as the sports director and anchor of Radford's weekly television show, NRV News.

Massey has called high school football in the New River Valley for several years and has worked as the public address announcer for the New River Valley Speedway as well as for the Pulaski Rangers, a Class Amember of baseball's Appalachian League. He also has handled fill-in duties for multiple sports talk shows in the New River Valley and has contributed morning sports updates for several radio stations.

In 2003, Massey was called upon at Radford to become their women's basketball play-by-play broadcaster. He would stay in that capacity until September of 2005 when accepted the same position at Virginia Tech.

In addition to his play-by-play duties for the Virginia Tech women's basketball program and for many of the Hokies' Olympic sports programs, Massey provides live, nationwide updates for all Virginia Tech home football games on ESPN Radio, Fox Sports Radio and Sporting News Radio. He began this part of his career in 2000 when he was called upon to give updates for the championship game of the Big South Men's Basketball Tournament.

Tech Continues NCAA and Postseason Streaks

The Virginia Tech women's basketball program has established a tradition of excellence in recent years and the 2005-06 edition of the Hokies continued that trend by advancing to the NCAA tournament. Tech received an NCAA bid for the fourth consecutive season and advanced to the postseason for the ninth straight year. In fact, the Hokies have made the postseason 11 times in the past 13 years, including nine NCAA bids and two berths in the WNIT.

Tech concluded the year with a 21-10 record, marking the eighth time in nine years — and 11th in the past 14 — that the Hokies have won at least 20 games. Last year was also the 18th winning season in the 29 years of the women's basketball program. Tech was also successful in regular season tournament play, winning the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic, the Caribbean Classic and their own Lady Luck

Classic for the eighth consecutive season. In the past two seasons, the Hokies have won five consecutive in-season tournaments, including two victories over Texas Tech. In addition, Tech won its 14th-consecutive home opener with an 86-71 win over James Madison.

Tech completed a perfect regular season against non-conference teams, earning a 13-0 record. The Hokies again were among the national leaders in attendance drawing an average of 3,871 fans to home contests, which ranked 26th in the nation. This tremendous fan support helped Tech post a 10-4 record in Cassell Coliseum. Three of the home losses were to Final Four teams — national champion Maryland, national runner-up Duke, and ACC champion North Carolina.

Last season, the Hokies were a veteran team led by five seniors. Four of them — Dawn Chriss, Megan Finnerty, Kerri Gardin and Carrie Mason — became the first Tech class to appear in four NCAA Tournaments and were the most successful class in the history of the program, with 84 victories in four years. In addition to their collective achievements, the seniors also reached many individual milestones during the season.

Mason ended her career as Tech's all-time 3-point field goal leader (200) and set career standards for starts (121) and minutes played (4,179). She totaled 1,369 points, putting her seventh on the Tech scoring list and she became the 17th member of the Virginia Tech 1,000-point club in the first game of season against James Madison. Additionally, she was credited with 364 assists — seventh on the career list. Mason was named to the 2006 ESPN The Magazine Women's Basketball University Division District III first team, and earned an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship.

Chriss became the 18th member of the 1,000-point club and led the team in scoring while placing second in rebounds. She completed her Tech career ranked fifth on the career steals list. Chriss led the Hokies with 21 points in their NCAA first-round victory over Missouri.

Gardin concluded her career as one of the most prolific rebounders in Virginia Tech history. She is sixth on the career rebounds list and led the ACC in rebounding while averaging a double-double. Gardin was named to the All-ACC third team and became the 19th member of the 1,000-point club in the final regular-season game against Wake Forest. She capped off her year by being drafted by the Chicago Sky in the third round of the WNBA draft.

With expectations running high, Tech opened the 2005-2006 season with a convincing 87-71 win over James Madison. Mason led the way with 20 points, joining the 1,000-point club in the process. In her first collegiate game after sitting out the previous season due to injury, redshirt-freshman Brittany Cook reached double figures with 17 points. The victory marked the ninth consecutive time the Hokies had opened the season with a victory and was the eighth straight win in the series with the Dukes.

Old Dominion was next on the schedule and Gardin and Mason tallied 16 points each as the Hokies overcame a poor night at the free throw line to edge the Lady Monarchs 76-69. The Hokies led by as many at 12 points in the second half but saw ODU put together a 10-1 run to cut the lead to 67-64 with just under four minutes remaining in the game. From that point on, Tech hit the boards and grabbed five offensive rebounds in the waning moments to preserve the win. The Hokies shot 49.1 percent (28-57) from the field, but only 48.5 percent (16-33) from the charity stripe.

A trip to the Lone Star state was next on the agenda as the Hokies traveled to Dallas over the Thanksgiving holiday to participate in the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic. Tech used a suffocating defense and the steady play of Gardin to overcome a 26-21 halftime deficit en route to a 56-40 win over the Denver Pioneers. In the second half, the Hokies held Denver to only 14 points, allowing the Pioneers only one basket over the final 11:03 of the game. Gardin led the way with her first double-double of the season (15 points, 12 rebounds) as Tech held a commanding 44-31 advantage on the boards.

A huge second-half run and a monster game from Gardin propelled the Hokies to an easy 87-61 win over SMU in the championship game on the Mustangs' home court. Leading 36-27 at the half, Tech opened the second frame with an 18-3 run to put the contest away. In fact, the Hokies shot 62.5 percent (20-32) from the field in the second half, again controlling the boards, 47-32. Gardin

had her second consecutive double-double with 20 points and 17 rebounds as Tech placed five players in double figures. For her efforts, Gardin was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Virginia Tech returned to Cassell Coliseum and used an 18-0 run in the first half to pull away from Evansville en route to a 79-59 victory. With the contest tied at four in the early going, the Hokies put together the big run and cleared the bench with every player seeing action in the contest. Chriss led the way with her second career double-double, scoring 12 points and pulling down 12 rebounds.

Tech's next outing proved to be a real struggle on the road at Richmond. The Hokies trailed 37-29 with just over 12 minutes remaining before rallying for a 54-47 victory. Tech shot only 35.6 percent from the field and just 29 percent in the first half. The Hokies could manage only 1-for-11 from three-point range. Mason, who led the way with 14 points, connected on the only trey.

The Hokies needed some clutch free throw shooting, timely offensive rebounds and a little luck in to escape an upset bid by New River Valley rival Radford, 58-52. After leading 37-29 at the half. Tech opened its biggest lead, 43-32, early in the second half. The Highlanders responded with a 13-5 run to draw within three points, 48-45. A Cook three-pointer extended the Tech lead, but with just under three minutes remaining, Radford cut the lead to 52-50. From then on, Tech nailed six free throws and extended possession time with four offensive rebounds to pull out the victory. Cook and Copeland were the only Hokies in double figure scoring, with 12 and 11 points respectively.

Tech continued to struggle, but found a way to win against in-state opponent Liberty with a 70-60 victory. The Hokies found themselves trailing 25-24 with just under five minutes left in the opening half before putting together a 9-0 run to lead 33-25 at intermission. Tech maintained the lead in the second half before the Flames cut the lead to 59-54. The Hokies responded with a 7-2 run to put the game out of reach. The win improved Tech's all-time record against Liberty to 12-0 as the Hokies converted 18 Flame turnovers into 22 points. Gardin led the way with 20 points and 14 rebounds, while Finnerty chipped in with 11 points and eight boards.

A trip to Cancun, Mexico, was next on the Tech schedule as the Hokies participated in the Caribbean Classic. Tech held a commanding 62-40 lead over Western Michigan in the first round with six minutes left before withstanding a furious Bronco comeback. Western Michigan closed to within 67-62 with 19 seconds remaining in the game. Mason worked 12 seconds off the clock before being fouled and calmly sank two free throws to secure the win. Gardin and Mason led Tech with 15 points each, while Finnerty had her second consecutive strong outing with 12 points.

The title game of the classic was a rematch with Texas Tech. The Hokies had previously defeated the Lady Raiders in overtime in the championship of the 2004 Duel in the Desert tournament. Tech led by as many as 14 points in the first half, but found themselves in a tight battle, leading only 44-43 with 11 minutes left in the game. The Hokies responded with a 13-4 run over the next five minutes to lead 57-47. Texas Tech would get no closer than five points the rest of the way. Chriss led Tech with 20 points while Copeland chipped in with 19.

Tech returned home after Christmas to host the Lady Luck Classic after receiving its first national ranking of the year, debuting at No. 25. Solid defense and a strong inside game proved to be more than enough for the Hokies as they cruised past Longwood 89-70 in the opening round. Every Tech player scored in the one-sided affair as Copeland and Finnerty each tallied 14 points.

The Hokies captured their eighth consecutive Lady Luck Classic in a tough 76-64 battle with Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in the title game. Tech trailed 31-30 at the half, and

the contest remained tight until the Hokies finally put the Islanders away with a late 11-0 run. Chriss, the tourney MVP, led the way with 26 points.

Tech saw its undefeated season come to an end in the ACC opener at NC State. Turnovers and poor shooting led to the loss as Tech committed 28 turnovers and shot only 27.7 percent from the field. The Hokies led 15-10 in the first half before the Wolfpack went on a 17-4 run, building a 27-19 halftime advantage. NC State put the game away by opening the second frame on a 12-2 run. Chriss and Gardin were the only Tech players in double figures netting 14 and 11 points respectively.

Coming off their first loss of the year, the Hokies exacted their frustrations on High Point with a 91-52 victory. Tech shot 57.6 percent (34-59) from the field and dominated the boards, 48-29. Every player scored in the one-sided affair and Nare Diawara pulled down 13 rebounds.

A return to ACC action was next on the schedule as the Hokies renewed their series with former BIG EAST member No. 19 Boston College in a battle of ranked teams in Cassell Coliseum. Tech rallied from an eight-point second-half deficit, then gave up an eight-point lead, but closed the game on a 9-2 run to win 67-62. The Eagles shot 56.5 percent from the field and dominated the boards 35-21, but the Hokies forced 30 turnovers and converted 16-of-17 free throw attempts.

After an eight-day layoff, Virginia Tech could not shake off the rust and suffered a 78-59 home loss to arch-rival Virginia. The Cavaliers built a 39-24 halftime advantage and the Hokies never got closer than 12 points the rest of the way. Only two Hokies managed to get into double figures, with Chriss and Gardin tallying 16 and 10 points respectively.

The struggling Hokies traveled to Winston-Salem, N.C., and built an 11-point halftime lead over Wake Forest, only to lose 77-71 in overtime. Mason sank two free throws with ten seconds remaining in regulation, but the Demon Deacons' Cotelia Bond-Young responded with a jumper to force overtime. Wake scored the first seven points of the extra session to seal the victory.

Eventual national champion Maryland extended the Hokie losing streak to three games with a 68-62 victory in Blacksburg. Tech hung tough all game long and tied the contest at 54 with less than five minutes remaining. Maryland put together an 8-2 run and hit free throws down the stretch to preserve the win. The Hokies struggled at the line, connecting on only 16 of 26 free throws. Chriss led Tech with 19 points.

Virginia Tech dropped its fourth straight game, 77-62, at Miami. The Hurricanes jumped out to a 20-4 lead in the first five minutes of the contest and never looked back, holding a commanding 46-27 advantage at the half. Miami connected on eight three-point shots in the game and shot 56 percent from the field. Tech had four players in double figures and Mason tied a career-high with four treys.

Suffering from a four-game losing streak, the outlook for the Hokies looked bleak as they headed to Charlottesville, Va., for a return engagement with the Cavaliers. Tech entered the contest short-handed, playing without both Gardin and Copeland. Seniors Mason and Chriss responded to the challenge with 24 and 17 points, respectively, as Tech pulled away in the second half en route to a 65-54 victory. A key in the win was the play of freshman Amber Hall, who scored nine points, pulled down nine rebounds and was credited with three blocks in her first collegiate start.

After snapping the losing streak with the big win at Virginia, the Hokies returned home to face second-ranked Duke. The eventual national runner-up Blue Devils found themselves trailing Tech 19-18 twelve minutes into the contest, but put together a 21-6 run to lead 39-25 at the break. The Hokies could get no closer than seven points in the second half, and lost 73-62. Mason again led the way with 18 points, while Copeland added 17.

Tech got back on the winning track with an 82-70 win over Clemson in Cassell Coliseum. An early 16-2 run built a 23-6 lead as the Hokies built a 37-24 halftime edge. Tech led comfortably the rest of the way, with the final

margin of victory being the closest the Tigers would get in the second half. Chriss had 19 points, while Gardin produced another doubledouble with 15 points and 11 boards.

Tech looked for revenge in its next game at Florida State. The Seminoles and Hokies had played a double- and a triple-overtime game the previous season, with FSU winning both games. This year would be different, as Tech played one of its best games of the year, knocking off the Seminoles in Tallahassee, 76-69. Mason led the way with a career-high 27 points, including a career-best six treys, while Chriss added 17.

The Hokies faced a major challenge as second-ranked North Carolina made its first visit to the Cassell for an ACC contest. Tech fell behind early, battled back, but eventually lost 84-75. After trailing by 20 points in the second half, the Hokies turned up the defensive pressure, and closed to 82-75 before running out of time. Tech forced the Tar Heels into 21 turnovers, but UNC shot 53.3 percent from the floor. Chriss led the Hokies with 17 points, followed by Copeland's 16.

A trip to Atlanta was next as the Hokies completely dominated Georgia Tech on the Yellow Jackets' senior day, 70-54. The victory was the 100th in Beth Dunkenberger's career, as Tech shot 50 percent from the field. Gardin paced the offense with 19 points, and Diawara proved to be a force on the defensive end with four blocks.

The trip to Durham, N.C., for Duke's senior night led to the Hokies' worst loss of the season as the top-ranked Blue Devils cruised to a 93-51 victory. Chriss was the only Tech player in double figures, with a dozen points as Duke shot 60.9 percent from the floor and nailed seven treys in the game.

Senior night arrived for the five Hokies who took the floor for their final game in Cassell Coliseum as Tech rolled Wake Forest 76-42. A 21-4 run in the first half enabled the Hokies to build a 44-22 halftime lead, and the Demon Deacons never threatened. Gardin tallied 11 points and joined teammates Mason and Chriss in the career 1,000-point club. Tech forced 26 Wake Forest turnovers and limited the visitors to only 26.4 percent shooting from the field.

In Tech's ACC tournament debut in 2005, the Hokies were upset by Wake Forest. Tech was determined not to make the same mistake twice. While the Hokies' win was not the 34point margin enjoyed just four days earlier, Tech produced a solid 73-60 victory over the Demon Deacons. Defense again was the key to the victory as the Hokies limited Wake to only 39 percent shooting while Tech shot 52.5 percent. Chriss led the attack with 18 points, followed by Copeland and Gardin, who tossed in 17 and 13 points respectively.

A third meeting with Duke in the ACC tournament quarterfinals proved to be a tough, hard-fought contest, as the Blue Devils led only 28-22 at the half before pulling away to win 69-56. Tech forced Duke into 31 turnovers, but the Blue Devils were able to shoot 54.3 percent from the field. Chriss and Mason each had 13 points, while Gardin added 11 and Diawara contributed nine.

The Hokies received a fourth straight NCAA bid following their performance in the ACC tournament and made their ninth consecutive postseason appearance. Tech traveled to University Park, Pa., for an NCAA first-round meeting with Missouri. The contest was the first-ever meeting between the two programs, and the Hokies dominated from the

start, blasting the Tigers 82-51. The Hokies raced to a 17-4 lead and finished with a 26-3 run in the final minutes of the one-sided affair. Tech shot 51.5 percent for the game, including a blistering 62.5 percent (20-32) in the second half. Chriss paced five Hokies in double figures with 21 points, while Gardin had 17 points and 13 boards.

Tech renewed acquaintances with Connecticut in the NCAA second round and after trailing early, the Hokies put together an 11-0 run to pull within 38-32 before the Huskies' Ann Strother nailed a three-pointer just before the halftime buzzer. UConn put the game away in the second half with a 19-3 run and cruised to a 79-56 win. In their final game as Hokies, Chriss and Gardin tallied 16 points each while Mason added 13.



Game 1 Virginia Tech 86, James Madison 71 Blacksburg, Va. • Nov. 20, 2005

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Behind four players in double figures, Virginia Tech opened its season with an 87-71 win over James Madison in Cassell Coliseum.

Senior Carrie Mason led the Hokies with 20 points. With her first basket of the game, a lay-up at the 16:50 mark, Mason became the 17th Hokie to reach the 1,000 point mark. Mason went 7-for-10 from the floor, and had five rebounds.

In her first collegiate basketball game, freshman Brittany Cook reached double figures, scoring 17 points. Senior Kerri Gardin just missed a doubledouble, with 15 points and pulled down a team-high eight rebounds, while senior Dawn Chriss added 12 points.

As a team, Tech (1-0) shot 51.6 percent from the floor, with 69.2 shooting in the second half. The Dukes (1-1) shot 43.1 percent in the game.

Led off the bench by Cook, junior Britney Anderson scored nine points and junior Nare Diawara added two points, as the Tech bench outscored the Dukes 28-2.

The Dukes had four starters in double figures, led by Meredith Alexis, who had a double-double.

Up by one point, 17-16 at the 10 minute mark, the Hokies took a 10-point lead off a 15-6 run over the next five minutes that was led by five points from Cook. Tech held a 40-32 halftime lead.

In the second half, Tech led by as many as 18 points and after the first 15 minutes, never trailed by less than 10. The Hokies went on an 8-0 run to put the game out of reach, 60-42.

The victory marked the 14th straight home-opening win, and the ninth consecutive time the team has opened the season with a victory.

Tech has won eight straight games in the series against James Madison.

Game 2 Virginia Tech 76, Old Dominion 69 Blacksburg, Va. • Nov. 22, 2005

BLACKSBURG, VA. - Kerri Gardin led Virginia Tech in scoring with 16 points in a 76-69 win over Old Dominion on Nov. 22 at Cassell Coliseum. The win improved Tech to 2-0 on the season and dropped ODU to 0-2 in front of 3,421 fans.

The Hokies led 39-35 at the break. Tech took its largest lead of the first half when Carrie Mason hit a shot to cap a 7-0 Hokie run and give the home team a 33-20 advantage.

After intermission, the Lady Monarchs closed to within two points on a 3-pointer by Lawona Davis at the 18:10 mark. The Hokies responded with a 10-2 run over the next 5:10 to push the lead back to 10 points, 53-43.

Old Dominion committed six fouls in that span and Tech was in the bonus with just a little over seven minutes gone in the second half. The Hokies were in the double bonus by the 8:00 mark. Old Dominion committed 28 fouls in the game, but Tech's poor free-throw shooting (16-of-33) kept them from taking advantage.

Tech extended the lead to 12 points on a Megan Finnery layup with 7:06 remaining. Although a 10-1 Lady Monarch run cut the lead to 67-64, the Hokies crashed the boards in the final 3:45, grabbing five offensive rebounds that helped them maintain possession and burn the clock.

Gardin scored 14 of her points in the second half, and Mason matched her with 16 points for the game. Megan Finnerty scored 11 points and was the lone Hokie who shot over 50 percent at the free-throw line, going 5-of-6. Dawn Chriss scored nine points and grabbed seven rebounds.

Tech had a 29-13 advantage in points off of turnovers, and a 42-26 advantage scoring in the paint.

Game 3 Virginia Tech 56, Denver 40 Dallas, Tex. • Nov. 25, 2005

DALLAS, TEXAS - Kerri Gardin recorded her 12th career double-double and Virginia Tech held Denver scoreless for 7:45 of the second half in the Hokies 56-40 come-from-behind victory over the Pioneers in the first round of the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic.

Tech used a suffocating defense and the steady play of Gardin (Sr., Morganton, N.C.) to overcome a 26-21 halftime deficit. The Hokies limited the Pioneers to only 14 second half points while Gardin tallied 10 of her game-high 15 points to go along with 12 boards.

Tech played a very sluggish first half but led 18-16 on a Nare Diawara (Jr., Bamako, Mali) layup at the 11 minute mark. It was to be the Hokies' last points for the next 10:07 as Denver took a 23-18 advantage. The teams combined to connect on only 7-of-34 field goal attempts in the final 11 minutes of the first half. The Hokies forced Denver into 11 turnovers in the opening frame and the Pioneers were only 4-of-10 at the charity stripe. Despite its' poor play, Tech trailed only 26-21 at intermission.

Tech opened the second half on a 9-4 run in the first four minutes to tie the game at 30, then took the lead for good on a Carrie Mason (Sr., Seneca, Pa.) three-pointer at the 13:36 mark. A Kirby Copeland (Jr., Morrow, Ga.) jumper extended the lead but Sara Benham responded with a jumper of her own to draw the Pioneers to within one, 35-34. However, Denver would score only one bucket over the next 11:03 as Tech blew the contest open with a 19-2 run.

In addition to Gardin, Mason added 13 points, including three treys, and Copland chipped in with 10 points. For Mason, it was her third consecutive game with three treys.

Game 4 Virginia Tech 87, Southern Methodist 61 Dallas, Tex. • Nov. 26, 2005

DALLAS, TEXAS - Virginia Tech used a huge second half run and a monster game from Kerri Gardin to defeat SMU, 87-61, in the championship game of the SMU Hoops for the Cure Classic in Moody Coliseum. The Hokies improved to 4-0 as they won their third consecutive in-season regular season tournament after winning the Duel in the Desert and Lady Luck Classic events last season. SMU fell to 2-3 with the loss.

Tech led 36-27 at halftime and put the game away with an 18-3 run to open the second half. Gardin (Sr., Morgonton, NC), the tournament MVP, led the Hokies with 20 points and 17 rebounds, her second consecutive double-double and the 13th of her career. Kirby Copeland (Jr., Morrow, Ga.) followed with a career-high 17 points, while Carrie Mason (Sr., Seneca, Pa.) and Britney Anderson (Jr., Blacksburg, Va.) added 12 points each. Megan Finnerty (Sr., Atlanta, Ga.) tossed in 10.

The Hokies jumped out to a 9-2 lead before the Mustangs responded to pull within 15-14 ten minutes into the contest. From that point on, Tech was in complete command as the Hokies closed the half outscoring SMU 21-13 to build a 36-27 advantage.

Tech opened the second half connecting on 14 of its' first 19 shots and completely shut down the SMU offense. Copeland led the surge with seven points while Mason followed with five. During the offensive surge, the Hokies limited the Mustangs to only 2-of-14 from the field and forced a couple of turnovers.

The Hokies shot 58.3 percent (35-60) from the field, including 20-of-32 in the second half, and dominated the boards holding a commanding 47-32 advantage. Tech limited the Mustangs to 33.9 percent (21-62) for the game and held Mustang center Janielle Dodds, who entered the game averaging over 10 rebounds per contest, to just four boards.

Game 5 Virginia Tech 79, Evansville 59 Blacksburg, Va. . Nov. 29, 2005

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Virginia Tech used an 18-0 run in the first half to pull away from Evansville, and the Hokies cruised the rest of the way en route to a 79-59 non-conference victory over the Purple Aces.

With the game tied at 4, Tech embarked on its 18-0 tear to take a 22-4 lead. The Hokies connected on eight consecutive shots, with reserve center Roshana Jackson hitting two shots and Kirby Copeland hitting two. Six different players scored in the run, which ended on Brittany Cook's 3-pointer with 11:34 left in the first half.

Evansville went on a 9-2 run right after that to cut the Tech lead to nine, but the Purple Aces got no closer as poor shooting plaqued them. They shot just 30 percent in the first half and turned the ball over 10 times.

In the second half, it was much of the same. Evansville cut Tech's lead to 10 on two occasions only to see the Hokies go on runs both times to build up the lead. The first time, with the score 34-24, the Hokies went on an 8-0 run, with four different players scoring in the run. The second time, with the score 52-42, the Hokies went on a 12-0 run, with five different players scoring.

Only two players scored in double figures for Tech, led by Dawn Chriss, who scored 12 points and grabbed a career high-tying 12 rebounds for the second doubledouble for her career. Tech's top two leading scorers, Kerri Gardin and Carrie Mason, scored just eight and five points, respectively. But seven players scored at least seven points for the Hokies, and Tech's bench outscored Evansville's bench 39-16.

Cook led Tech's bench parade, coming off the bench to score 11. Britney Anderson added eight off the bench, while starters Gardin and Megan Finnerty also scored eight. Gardin added 10 rebounds for the Hokies, who outrebounded Evansville 47-37.

The Hokies shot 48.5 percent from the floor, while holding the Purple Aces to just 31.3 percent.

Virginia Tech needed a 25-10 run in the final 12 minutes to overcome an eight-point deficit in nipping Richmond 54-47 Sunday afternoon at the Robins Center on the University of Richmond campus. Tech, trailing 37-29 with 12:15 remaining, put together an 8-0 run to tie the game then took the lead on a Carrie Mason (Sr., Seneca, Pa.) three-pointer to put the Hokies in front briefly. RADFORD, Va. - The Virginia Tech Hokies needed some clutch free-throw shooting, some timely offensive rebounds, and a little bit of luck to escape from Radford with a 58-52 win.

The two teams swapped the lead seven times in the first half, but the Hokies took the lead for good on two Kirby Copeland free throws at the 9:22 mark. Those shots gave Tech a 21-20 lead. A 10-2 Tech run late in the half gave the visitors some breathing room and helped the Hokies to a 37-29 halftime advantage.

The Hokies shot nearly 47 percent in the first half compared to just 30 percent for Radford.

Both teams came out sluggish in the second half. Radford committed three turnovers and missed its first six shots from the floor in the first four minutes of the half, managing a lone free throw in that span. Tech went 1-of-4 to start the second half, but also committed four turnovers, which prevented the Hokies from capitalizing on Radford's drought.

The Hokies eventually built their lead to a gamehigh 11-points, 43-32, before the Highlanders went on a 13-5 run to make it a one possession game, 48-45.

The Hokies came back down and Brittany Cook drained a 3-pointer to give the Hokies a 51-45 lead.

Two Shavon Earp free throws with just under three minutes remaining cut Tech's lead to 52-50. From there, the Highlanders missed their next five shots.

Tech's final seven points all came from the free throw line. The Hokies converted 6-of-8 in the final 90 seconds to finally capture the 58-52 win. They also grabbed four offensive rebounds in the final four minutes.

Cook led the Hokies with 12 points and Copeland added 11, including three critical late free throws. Kerri Gardin pulled down 10 rebounds. Darden and Earp led Radford with 14 points apiece.

After shooting 47 percent in the first half, Tech's shooting plunged to 26 percent in the second half. The Hokies also committed 24 turnovers.

Game 8 Virginia Tech 70, Liberty 60 Blacksburg, Va. • Dec. 10, 2005

RADFORD, Va. - Virginia Tech rebounded from a subpar effort in its last outing against Radford to defeat the Liberty Flames 70-60 on December 10 at Cassell Coliseum. The Hokies improved to 8-0 while Liberty dropped to 3-3 in front of 3,230 fans.

The game was nip-and-tuck early with the two teams exchanging the lead eight times in the first half. Liberty led 25-24 after scoring on four of five possessions, which prompted Tech head coach Beth Dunkenberger to call a timeout with 4:52 left until halftime.

Following the timeout, the Hokies closed out the half on a 9-0 run. The Hokies also scored the first basket of the second half to extend the run to 11-0 and make their lead 35-25. The Hokies scored on nine of their first 11 possessions in the second half, but the Flames managed to keep pace, converting on nine of their first 14 possessions.

The lead bounced back and forth around that 10point Tech advantage for much of the second half until Liberty scored on five straight possessions to cut the Hokie lead to 59-54. However, Tech came up with four straight defensive stops and ran off a little 7-2 run to recapture the momentum and put the game out of reach.

The win kept the Hokies perfect both on the season and all-time against Liberty. Tech has never lost to the Flames in 12 contests. The Hokies also reinforced their reputation as a tough team to beat at home, winning 31 of their last 32 non-conference games at home. Tech has also won 21 of 22 home games against teams from the state of Virginia over the past nine seasons.

Tech won by executing in phases where it has struggled at times this season. The team shot the ball better than its 59 percent season average from the free-throw line, making good on 21 of 31 attempts, 68 percent. Dunkenberger's crew also made a concerted and consistent effort to pound the ball inside, outscoring the Flames 42-22 in the paint. And the Hokies played good defense, forcing 18 turnovers, which they then rolled over into a 22-2 advantage in points off of turnovers.

Three Hokies scored in double figures, led by Kirby Copeland (Sr., Morrow, Ga.), with 14 points, 13 of which came in the second half; and Megan Finnerty (Sr., Atlanta, Ga.), with a career-high 14 points. Dawn Chriss (Sr., Hilcrest Heights, Md.) totaled 11 points. Every Tech player that saw time on the floor scored at least two points.

Tech scored most of its points under the basket, outscoring Longwood 50-32 in the paint.

Tech (11-0) dominated the boards out-rebounding the Lancers (3-9) 52-27. Nare Diawara (Jr., Bamako, Mali) and Roshana Jackson (Sr., Norton, Va.), who returned to the court after two games off for an injury, each pulled down nine rebounds. The Hokies also tied the Lady Luck Classic record for steals, with 18. The record was set by Tech against Colgate in 1993.

Gardin, who leads the Hokies with 13.4 points and 10.6 rebounds per game, did not play with a foot injury. She will be re-evaluated Thursday morning.

Leading 43-36 at the half, Tech used a pair of runs in the second half to take a commanding 20-point lead. Over the first four minutes of the half, a 12-3 run that included four straight baskets from Copeland gave Tech a 55-39 lead.

The deciding stretch of the contest came at the 13 minute mark as Tech put together a four minute, 13-1 run, that was capped by a layup from Jackson which widened the Hokie lead out to 20 points. Longwood would come no closer than 15 points for the remainder of the contest.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Virginia Tech remained undefeated on the season and won its eighth consecutive Lady Luck Classic with a hard-fought 76-64 victory over the Texas A&M Corpus Christi Islanders. The Hokies improved 12-0 on the season, while the Islanders fell to 6-6.

This championship contest was truly a see-saw affair as neither team succeeded in claiming a decisive advantage until late. The Islanders led by as many as six early in the first half, but the Hokies erased that deficit with a 6-0 run. From that point onward - the 10:45 mark of the first half until the 5:41 mark of the second - the game essentially remained a one-possession affair. The Hokies held a brief four-point lead in the second, but other than that, the lead for either team never exceeded three points.

Tech trailed 31-30 at the half, just the second time it trailed at intermission this season. The Hokies took their four-point lead on a Kerri Gardin layup with 14:55 left in the game. At that point, the offenses took over. The Islanders scored on 10 of their next 12 possessions. The Hokies didn't blink, though, scoring on nine of 13 trips. Corpus Christi held a 56-53 advantage with under nine minutes remaining when the Hokies finally made their run. An 11-0 spurt, comprised of six points from Dawn Chriss and five from Nare Diawara, gave Tech a 64-56 lead that it would not relinquish.

Four Hokies scored in double figures, paced by 26 points from Chriss, 21 of which came in the second half. Chriss took home the tournament MVP award for her efforts. Diawara scored 11 points while Carrie Mason and Megan Finnerty each tallied 10. Terra Andrews spearheaded the Islander attack with 20 points.

Chriss was the only Hokie on the Lady Luck alltournament team. Longwood's Ashley Mason, Marshall's KaShawna Curry, and Corpus Christi's Andrews and Kirbria Lewis rounded out the team.

The 12-0 start is the second-best in the program's history, trailing only the 1998-99 squad that began the season 18-0.

RALEIGH, N.C. - Virginia Tech suffered its first loss of the season at the hands of NC State on Monday evening, falling 65-44 to the Wolfpack to begin the Hokies' Atlantic Coast Conference season.

Turnovers and poor shooting by the 25th-ranked Hokies contributed to the loss. Tech committed 28 turnovers, and shot 27.7 percent (18-65) from the field. Play off the bench was also a key in the contest, with the Wolfpack bench outscoring the Hokie nonstarters 22-8 in the game.

"It was really frustrating," said Virginia Tech head coach Beth Dunkenberger. "They switched to the zone defense and our offense really stalled. We just weren't able to get back in the game."

Dawn Chriss led Tech with 14 points, followed by Kerri Gardin's 16th career double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds. Carrie Mason hit two treys in the game to become Tech's all-time three-point field goal leader with 158.

Tech held a five point lead, 15-10 at the 8:07 mark in the first half. However, NC State (10-3, 1-0 ACC) controlled the ball game from that point on, going on a 17-4 run to close out the half with a 27-19 lead.

The Wolfpack kept the momentum in the second half, starting with a 12-2 surge through the first four minutes for an 18-point lead. The Hokies were outscored 38-25 in the second half. Tiffany Stansbury and Ashley Key combined to score 23 of NC State's 38 second half points.

Five players were in double figures for NC State, led by Stansbury with 14 points. Khadijah Whittington totaled 10 points with 11 rebounds.

It is the fewest points that Tech has scored in a game since falling 61-48 to Penn State in the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2004.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Behind 57.6 percent shooting from the field, 25th-ranked Virginia Tech rebounded from its first loss of the season with its largest victory of the year, defeating High Point 91-52 on Wednesday

Tech (13-1) went 34-of-59 from the floor, including four-for-six from three-point range. Solid play in the paint was a key to the win, with the Hokies outrebounding the Panthers 48-29. Tech also outscored High Point in the paint 48-16.

All 12 Hokie players scored at least two points on the evening. Senior Kerri Gardin had a team-high 15 points, while junior Nare Diawara led Tech with a career-high 13 rebounds. Senior Dawn Chriss scored 13 points.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - The No. 25 Hokies rallied from an eight-point second half deficit, then surrendered an eightpoint lead, but closed the game on a 9-2 run to defeat the No. 19 Boston College Eagles. The Hokies played tough defense and got some key Eagles in foul trouble.

The Eagles shot an unbelievable 69.6 percent from the floor in the first half, hitting 16 of 23 shots, and led 36-30 at halftime.

The Hokies came into the game with two keys to - run in transition and get the Eagles in foul trouble. BC's leading scorer, Brooke Queenan, and Aja Parham, who came in averaging just under 10 points a game, picked up their fourth fouls early in the second half.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Although 18th-ranked Virginia Tech jumped out to a strong first-half lead, the Wake Forest Demon Deacons used solid play in the second half to push the game into overtime and take a 77-71 win over the Hokies at Joel Coliseum in Winston-Salem on Thursday evening.

With four minutes remaining in regulation and the score tied 56-56, each basket the Hokies made was answered with a similar shot by Wake Forest. BLACKSBURG, Va. - The Virginia Tech Hokies played one of their best games in some time, but poor free throw shooting spoiled the team's bid to upset the No. 6 Maryland Terrapins. The Hokies (14-4, 1-4 ACC) hit just 3-of-8 free throws with under six minutes to play, allowing the Terps (17-2, 4-1 ACC) to escape from Cassell Coliseum with a 68-62 victory.

Game 22 Virginia Tech 82, Clemson 70 Blacksburg, Va. • Feb. 9, 2006

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Virginia Tech used a 16-2 run early in the game and never looked back the rest of the way in defeating the Clemson Tigers 82-70 in front of 3,251 fans at Cassell Coliseum. The win was Tech's second in its past three games and bumped the team's record to 16-6 overall, 3-6 in the ACC. Clemson fell to 8-15 and 2-7 in league action.

The Hokies scored the first five points of the game and never trailed in this one. With the score 7-4, the Hokies distanced themselves with the 16-2 run that occupied 6:33 of the first half. Tech reserve Nare Diawara scored five points and pilfered two steals to spark the run that gave Tech a 23-6 lead.

Tech built the lead to as many as 18 points in the first, but Clemson ran off eight unanswered to cut the lead to 10 points. However, the Hokies took a 37-24 lead into the locker room at intermission.

A 7-2 Hokie spurt to open the second half got Tech its 18-point lead back, and the Hokies eventually extended it to as many as 22 points. The Tigers got hot in the last couple of minutes, though, hitting their last four shots in the game, three of them 3-pointers, to make the final score respectable. The 12-point deficit at the end of regulation was the closest the Tigers came in the second half.

Clemson shot over 62 percent in the second half, but the Hokies kept pace by shooting over 57 percent. Clemson really warmed up from 3-point range after going 0-for-5 in the first half. The Tigers knocked down 8-of-9 treys in the second half.

Dawn Chriss led the Hokie attack with 19 points, 15 of which came in the second half. Kerri Gardin recorded her 19th career double-double with 15 points and 11 rebounds. Carrie Mason also hit double figures with 14 points. She was 2-of-4 from 3-point range, making her 21-of-34 from beyond the arc in Tech's past six games.

Clemson was paced by Maxienne White who scored 21 points. Amanda Frist and Tasha Taylor contributed 16 and 12 points, respectively.

The Hokies tied their team record for steals in an ACC game with 17, a record they initially set last season against

Game 23 Virginia Tech 76, Florida State 69 Tallahassee, Fla. • Feb. 13, 2006

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Last season the Virginia Tech Hokies and the Florida State Seminoles played five overtime periods in two games. This season, Carrie Mason assured that there would be no overtime with a career-best 27 points in leading the Hokies to a crucial 76-69 ACC win.

The win improved Tech's record to 17-6 and 4-6 in the ACC, and snapped FSU's four-game winning streak. The Seminoles dropped to 15-8 and 6-4 in conference action.

The Hokies held a double-digit lead at intermission thanks to hot shooting from Mason and freshman Laura

Mason hit 3-of-4 in the first half, all 3-pointers, to lead Tech's effort. Haskins also hit 3-of-4, draining her first three shots, all mid-range jumpers. As a team, the Hokies shot 55.2 percent in the first half while holding the 'Noles to 34.4 percent. Tech dished out 11 assists before the break.

The Hokies came out firing away to start the second half as well. Dawn Chriss hit her first 3-pointer of the season and Mason added another as the visitors went on an 8-2 run, taking their largest lead of the game to that point, 44-28.

The Seminoles whittled away at the Tech lead, but it seemed as though every time they made a run, Mason found a way to stop the bleeding. When the Seminoles came within eight points, Mason drove the lane hit a shot, got fouled, and finished the three-point play. When FSU got within six points later in the game, Mason drilled a stepback 3-pointer, her sixth of the game.

FSU would not go away, though. Head coach Sue Semrau began fouling Tech with three minutes to play in the game, forcing the Hokies to beat them with their sometimes suspect free-throw shooting. The strategy appeared to be working at first as Tech hit 2-of-7 free throws over the next minute and allowed FSU eventually to climb to within four points. The Hokies managed to get the ball into Mason's hands and the senior knocked down all six of her free throw attempts in the final two minutes. That, and a critical late offensive rebound by Kerri Gardin off of a Haskins' missed free throw carried Tech to the win.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Virginia Tech overcame an early run by the No. 2-ranked UNC Tar Heels, but the Hokies ended up succumbing to the Tar Heels 84-75 at Cassell

The loss drops Tech to 17-7 overall and 4-7 in the ACC. The No. 2-ranked Tar Heels improved to 24-1 and 11-1 in the league.

The Hokies hung with UNC for much of the first half despite an 8-2 Tar Heel blitz in the first two minutes of the game. After a timeout by head coach Beth Dunkenberger to settle her troops, Tech outscored UNC 17-10 over the next 8:30 to take a brief 19-17 lead, Tech's only lead of the game.

After trading baskets, the Tar Heels closed out the final 7:23 of the half with a 19-8 run to claim a 40-29 advantage at the break.

UNC punished the Hokies on the interior for the entire first half, which resulted in the Tar Heels shooting 53.1 percent from the floor (17-of-32). Fourteen of UNC's 17 made baskets came from in the paint as the Tar Heels outscored the Hokies 28-12 from that area of the court. In fact, every Tar Heel basket that didn't come from beyond the 3-point arc came from the paint. There was nothing in-between.

The second half began much the same way as the first half, with a 10-2 UNC run that extended the Tech deficit to 50-31. Between that run and an 11-2 spurt to close the first half, the Tar Heel run totaled 21-4.

Trailing 68-48 later in the half, the Hokies turned up the defensive pressure and forced three consecutive UNC turnovers. That helped Tech score eight unanswered points and cut the Tar Heel lead to 68-56. A threepoint play by Erlana Larkins stopped Tech's momentum, though. UNC point guard Ivory Latta followed that with back-to-back 3-pointers that pushed the lead back to 20 points, 77-57.

The Hokies had one more rally left in them, going on a 14-2 run in the closing minutes of the game to cut the deficit to 82-75, but it was too little, too late.

ATLANTA, Ga. - Behind 50 percent shooting from the field, Virginia Tech defeated Georgia Tech 70-54 on Sunday afternoon in Alexander Memorial Coliseum.

The victory marked Dunkenberger's 100th career win. She has won 35 games in her second year as the head coach at Virginia Tech, and she won 65 games at the head coach at Western Carolina.

The Hokies (18-7, 4-7 ACC) never trailed in the contest, and held as much as a 20 point lead in the second half. Virginia Tech exhibited solid ball control, turning the ball over 15 times, and dishing out 18 assists. Virginia Tech also held an 11-4 advantage in steals.

With a 29-18 lead through the first half, the key run for the Hokies came midway through the second half. A 13-3 drive over nearly seven minutes that was capped from two free throw shots by Carrie Mason at the 7:32 mark gave Virginia Tech a 54-37 lead. Thev would hold a double-digit advantage the remainder of the contest.

Virginia Tech was led by Kerri Gardin with 19 points and eight rebounds. Kirby Copeland had 13 points and five assists, while Dawn Chriss, the newest member of the 1,000 point club, totaled 12 points. Nare Diawara had a career-high four blocks, all which came in the first half.

For the Yellow Jackets, Chioma Nnamaka had a team-high 25 points. Stephanie Higgs scored 11 points, and Kasha Terry and Nnamaka each pulled down eight rebounds.

DURHAM, N.C. - With a strong shooting night, No. 1 ranked Duke defeated Virginia Tech 93-51 at Cameron Indoor Stadium.

The Blue Devils (25-1, 12-1 ACC) shot 60.9 percent (39-for-64) from the field in the game, while the defense held the Hokies (18-8, 5-8 ACC) to 30.9 percent (21-for-68) from the floor. Duke forced Tech into 23 turnovers, which the Blue Devils converted into 30 points.

Tech did outrebound Duke 41-34 behind senior Kerri Gardin's 11 boards, marking the 14th time this year that she has pulled down double digit rebounds. Senior Dawn Chriss and junior Kirby Copeland each had seven rebounds.

Tech was led in scoring by Chriss, with 12 points. Copeland totaled nine, while senior Carrie Mason and junior Nare Diawara each had seven.

Gardin, who scored six points, needs just seven more points to become the 19th member of the 1,000 point club.

A strong first half gave Duke a lead they would not relinquish. With 12:30 remaining in the first half, Duke went on a 17-0 run through the next 4:18 to take a 29-9 lead at the 8:12 mark. The Blue Devils shot 61.3 percent in the first half (19-for-31) to take a 40-19 lead into the locker room.

The onslaught continued in the second half, as Duke outscored Tech 53-32 in the half.

The first time Duke and Tech met this season, Duke was ranked at No. 2 and defeated the Hokies 73-62.

Five Blue Devils scored in double figures, led by Mistie Williams and Monique Currie, who each totaled 14 points.

Game 27 Virginia Tech 76, Wake Forest 42 Blacksburg, Va. • Feb. 26, 2006

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Virginia Tech's seniors made their last performance in Cassell Coliseum a memorable one, dismantling the Wake Forest Demon Deacons 76-42. Three of Tech's five seniors scored in double figures in their last appearance at Cassell.

The Hokies (19-8, 6-8 ACC) avenged a loss earlier in the year to Wake (12-15, 3-11 ACC) with the win.

The Hokies came out hot, scoring the first eight points of the game, but Wake fought back to tie the game at 10-10 on a layup by Corinne Groves. From that point onward, it was all Tech. The Hokies embarked on a 21-4 run to take a commanding 31-14 lead. Five different Hokies scored in the run, led by seven points from Carrie Mason. A three-point play by Kerri Gardin with 1:03 left in the half gave the Hokies a 44-22 halftime advantage and also gave Gardin her 1,000th career point.

Gardin became the 19th player in Virginia Tech history to surpass the 1,000-point milestone.

The second half was more of the same as the Hokies extended their lead to as many as 38 points. Tech dominated Wake in points off of turnovers (32-14) after forcing 26 Demon Deacon turnovers. The Hokies also ruled in the post, outscoring Wake 54-12 in points in the paint. And defensively, the Deacs did not crack 30 percent shooting in either half, settling for 28 percent in the first and 25 percent in the second. Wake shot 26.4 percent for the game while the Hokies tripped the nets at a 53.3 percent clip.

Chriss led the scoring with 15 points. Mason scored 13 while Gardin recorded the 21st double-double of her career and 10th this season, registering 11 points and 13 boards. Only one Wake player reached double figures - Deirdre Naughton who scored 10 points. The trio of Cotelia Bond-Young, Liz Strunk and Corinne Groves, who combined for 56 points in the first meeting this season, mustered just a combined 18 in the rematch.

The Hokies responded with four consecutive scores to extend the advantage to 43-33, Tech's largest of the game to that point.

A jumper by Kirby Copeland kept the Hokies up by 10 points, 50-40, with 11:32 left in the game. The pesky Deacons would not quit, though, going on a 9-2 run to cut the lead to 52-49. Every time Wake scored, the Hokies had a reply. Copeland finally put an end to Wake's scoring when she slammed a Yolanda Lavender layup attempt back in her face and pitched it ahead to Dawn Chriss for a Tech layup. That gave the Hokies a 63-56 lead with 5:26 left in the game.

GREENSBORO N.C. - After a 73-62 home loss to the Duke Blue Devils earlier this season, head coach Beth Dunkenberger said her team would need to hold Duke in the 60s to have a shot to beat them. On March 3, in the second round of the ACC tournament, the No. 7-seeded Hokies accomplished that feat but still came out on the losing end, 69-56, to the No. 2-seeded Blue

Tech got the defensive effort that it needed in the first half to make an upset look like a possibility. After the Blue Devils scored five points in the first two minutes, the Hokies matched them basket for basket over the remaining 18 minutes before the break and trailed just 28-22 at intermission.

Duke's 28 points was its third-lowest one-half tally of the season and the Hokies managed it by forcing 17 Blue Devil turnovers and keeping them off the offensive glass. Duke only had two offensive rebounds in the game, and forced 31 total turnovers.

Both Gardin and Diawara had been unstoppable in the first half, registering identical eight-point, fiverebound lines.

Both teams scored six points coming out of the break, but an 8-0 Duke run over four minutes gave the Blue Devils the breathing room they needed, 42-28. Duke scored on seven of eight possessions at one point in extending its advantage to 17 points, 52-35, with 10 minutes remaining in the game.

Five straight points by Dawn Chriss got the Hokies back to within 12; however, Duke pushed the lead back to 17 points on two separate occasions. A 9-3 Hokie run, in which Carrie Mason scored seven of the points, brought Tech to within 11 points, 60-49, but the Hokies could not break the double-digit deficit barrier. Tech cut the deficit to 11 on two more occasions in the final minute, but Duke's Jessica Foley put the game on ice with a 3-pointer and two free throws to provide the final score.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The No. 7-seeded Virginia Tech Hokies jumped on the No. 10-seeded Missouri Tigers with a 17-4 run to open the game, then finished them off with a 26-3 run near the end to go to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The win improves Tech's record on the season to 21-9 and 7-3 all time in first-round NCAA Tournament games. Mizzou finished its season 21-10.

The Hokies led 32-25 at halftime after watching Mizzou whittle away what had been a 15-point advantage. Tech built a 17-4 lead in the first seven minutes of the game by forcing five Tiger turnovers. Missouri closed out the half outscoring Tech 13-5 behind a strong boost from an unlikely source, back-up guard Alyssa Hollins.

While Hollins did manage to hurt the Hokies, Tech did succeed in clamping down on Mizzou's dangerous starting guard combo of LaToya Bond and Tiffany Brooks in the first half. That backcourt tandem came in averaging 26.4 points per game, but hit just 2-of-13 from the floor in the first half.

In the second half, a Carrie Mason 3-pointer at the 12:26 mark opened the floodgates on a Tech deluge that would eventually drown the Tigers. The Hokies went on a 26-3 run, holding Mizzou scoreless for a stretch of 6:30 at one point, to essentially close out the game. What was a 45-40 Tech lead turned into a 71-43 blowout that led to the 82-51 win.

The Hokies manhandled Missouri in all phases of the game. In the paint, Tech outscored the Tigers 58-20, and in transition the Hokies held a 32-10 scoring advantage. After losing the rebounding battle in the first half, 26-20, the interior limited Missouri to just nine second half rebounds and ultimately won the battle of the boards 41-35. Missouri's lack of rebounds in the second half can be largely attributed to the hot shooting of the Hokies, who connected on 20 of 32 shots (62.5 percent) in the second half.

Game 31 Connecticut 79, Virginia Tech 56 University Park, Pa. • March 21, 2006

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The University of Connecticut out-shot, out-rebounded, and out-hustled the Virginia Tech Hokies, ousting the No. 7-seeded Hokies from the NCAA Tournament, 79-56. UConn improved to 31-4 with the win while the Hokies ended their season with a 21-10 record.

UConn moves on to the Sweet Sixteen where the Huskies will play Georgia.

UConn used a suffocating 2-3 zone to stymie the Hokies early in the first half. Tech trailed just 9-8 at the 15:10 mark; until the Huskies went on a 20-2 run over the next 8:20 of the game.

Point gaurd Carrie Mason then scored eight straight points, initiating an 11-0 Hokie run that cut the UConn lead to 38-32. A 3-pointer by Ann Strother in the waning seconds of the half gave Connecticut a 41-32 lead heading into the locker room.

Offensive rebounding proved to be the critical statistic of the first half. UConn ripped down 11 of them while the Hokies managed just four. The Huskies parlayed their extra possessions into nine secondchance points while the Hokies did not manage any.

The two teams swapped baskets early in the second half until a 19-3 UConn run gave the Huskies a 74-47 lead. Eight Hokie turnovers aided the Husky cause during that stretch that effectively spelled the end for Tech.

UConn outshot the Hokies 48 percent to 42 percent and dominated the glass with 43 rebounds compared to Tech's 29. The Huskies also racked up 14 steals and dished out 21 assists.

Gardin, Chriss, Mason and fellow seniors Megan Finnerty and Roshana Jackson played their last game as Hokies, going out as the only class to reach four straight NCAA Tournaments.



The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 54th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 100 national championships, including 52 in women's competition and 48 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 71 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2005-06 season elevated the stage yet again, marking the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006.

Nine ACC teams earned postseason bids in 2006, including seven NCAA Tournament berths, the second consecutive year the league has tallied seven bids to the Big Dance. With 75 percent of its membership competing in the postseason play, the ACC boasted the highest league participation amongst the nation.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2005-06 schedule features 47 televised games, the most in ACC women's basketball history. The television package includes 84 television appearances, including Michigan State at Maryland (1/6) on CBS and Tennessee at North Carolina (12/3) on ESPN. In addition, the ACC will broadcast nine games on ESPN2 and five on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Twenty-nine match-ups will be featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Spots Net South,



SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN).

The ACC was 66-51 (.564) in front of a national televised audience last season. Duke, Maryland and North Carolina all pitted over a 70 percent winning percentage when showcased on television. The Tar Heels boasted an ACC-best overall record with a 17-1 mark (.944) on the big screen, while the Terrapins wrapped up a five-game win streak on ESPN at the NCAA Championship tilt last season.

The league's women's basketball programs rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 132 appearances and won 156 games in the last 29 years, 20 of them as a number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same final four for the first time in history, the league boasts such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 18 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 10 of the last 18 years. The conference has also made 13 trips to the Final Four in the last 25 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since 1989, the ACC has placed 14 players on the All-Final Four team, while Maryland's Laura Harper joined the ranks of Virginia's Dawn Staley and North Carolina's Charlotte Smith, who was dubbed the NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player in 2006. In all, 56 ACC players have been named to the NCAA Tournament All-Region teams, with nine Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Four players have garnered National Player of the Year accolades while competing under the ACC banner. Staley was a back-to back selection in 1991 and 1992, while Smith received the ESPY award in 1995. Duke's Alana Beard was recognized with National Player of the Year honors in both 2003 and 2004, while UNC's Ivory Latta, who returns for her final collegiate season, earned ESPN.com National Player of the Year last season.

Five league coaches have combined to earn 12 national coach of the year awards. Duke's Gail Goestenkors, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell, Virginia's Debbie Ryan, Maryland's Chris Weller and NC State's Kay Yow have all garnered national recognition.

Seven ACC representatives, including coaches and student-athletes, have participated in the Olympics.

NC State's Kay Yow, assisted by Sylvia Hatchell of UNC, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team.

Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams. Staley, a three-time Olympian, struck gold in Athens as a member of the 2004 title squad. Duke's Gail Goestenkors served as an assistant coach on the gold medal-winning team in Athens.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Fifty-two former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches.

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Since 1983, 482 women's basketball players have received ACC Academic Honor Roll recognition. The 2005-06 academic year included 47 selections.

In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors six times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a flawless 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

2005-06 in Review

The 2005-06 academic year concluded with the league pocketing an all-time high six national team titles and 15 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 57 national team titles over the last 16 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 24 of the past 26 years.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2006-07 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-

Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

THE ACC TOURNAMENT

ACC Tournament Seeding

Seeding for the Basketball Championship will be determined by the regular season Conference standings. In case of a tie, the following formula will be used:

- (1) When two teams are tied in the standings, regular season head-to-head results are used as the tiebreaker.
- (2) If the tied teams played each other twice in the regular season and split their games, then each team's record vs. the team occupying the highest position in the final regular season standings (or in case of a tie for first place, the next highest position in the regular season standings) and then continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.
- (a) When arriving at another pair of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to their own tie-breaking procedures), rather than the performance against the individual tied teams.
- (b) When comparing records against a single team or a group of teams, the higher winning percentage shall prevail, even if the number of games played against a team or group is unequal (i.e., 2-0 is better than 3-1; 1-0 is the same as 2-0; 2-0 is the same as 4-0; 2-1 is the same as 4-2; 1-0 is better than 1-1; 0-1 is the same as 0-2; 0-2 is the same as 0-4). If the winning percentage of the tied teams is equal against a team, or a group of tied teams, continue down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.
- (3) If three or more teams are tied in the standings, the following procedures will be used:
- (a) The combined record of conference games between the tied teams involved will be compiled. Ties will be broken and seedings assigned based on the winning percentage of the combined conference records. The higher winning percentage shall prevail, even if the number of games played against the team or group is unequal (i.e., 2-0 is better than 3-1; 1-0 is the same as 2-0; 2-0 is the same as 4-0; 2-1 is the same as 4-2; 1-0 is better than 1-1; 0-1 is the same as 0-2; 0-2 is the same as 0-4)
- (b) If procedure (a) fails to break the tie, then each tied team's record shall be compared to the team occupying the highest position in the final regular-season standings, continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage by a higher winning percentage.
- (c) If the tie is broken by (a) or (b) regarding one or more teams, but three or more teams remain tied, then procedures (a) and (b) will be re-applied among those tied teams only.
- (d) If two teams remain tied, procedures (1) and (2) will be followed.
- (4) If there is more than one tie in the standings, and when utilizing the tie-breaking procedures there are a pair of teams tied, a

team's record against the combined tied teams (prior to their own tie-breaking procedures) is used, rather than performance against the individual tied teams.

- (5) If procedures (2) and/or (3) fail to establish an advantage, a coin flip to break the tie will be conducted by the commissioner after the final regular season game before the Conference Championship.
- (6) If a coin flip or draw (for a three or more team tie) is required, the procedure takes place immediately following the conclusion of the last regular season game prior to the Conference Championship.

The procedure is administered by the commissioner or a designated assistant. This session is open to the media and to athletics department representatives from the tied teams.

The Buildings

In the past 29 years of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, there have been eight

different sites. The inaugural tournament was held in 1978 at University Hall on the campus of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. The Tournament then moved to Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh, N.C., in 1979, hosted by North Carolina State University. The University of Maryland's Cole Field House in College Park was the site of the 1980 Tournament, while Clemson University's Littlejohn Coliseum, was home to the 1981 event. It returned to Reynolds Coliseum in 1982.

The Conference Tournament remained in North Carolina from 1983 to 1991, hosted by Fayetteville's Cumberland County Memorial Arena. The Tournament then moved to Winthrop Coliseum in Rock Hill, S.C. for a four year span (1992-96), until the 1997 move to Independence Arena in Charlotte, N.C., which hosted the event for three years.

Over the last seven years, the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament was held in the Greensboro Coliseum, which will also serve as its home through the 2009 Tournament.

VIRGINIA TECH HOKIES

JOHN SWOFFORD

Atlantic Coast Conference Commissioner

Now in his tenth year as commissioner, John Swofford has made a dramatic impact on the Atlantic Coast Conference and college athletics and is regarded as one of the top administrators in the NCAA.

Swofford assumed his role as the fourth fulltime commissioner in the 52-year history of the Atlantic Coast Conference in July of 1997. He follows James H. (Jim) Weaver, the league's first Commissioner from 1954-1970, Robert (Bob) James, who served from 1971-1987 and Eugene F. (Gene) Corrigan, who held the position from 1987 to 1997.

In addition to overseeing one of the nation's largest athletic conferences, Swofford has been pivotal in positioning the Atlantic Coast Conference for the future. In 2003, on behalf of the nine league institutions and the ACC Council of Presidents, he introduced Miami, Virginia Tech and Boston College as the newest members of the ACC.

The 2005-06 academic year marked the ACC's first year as a 12-member conference. In addition to the Inaugural ACC Football Championship Game in Jacksonville, Fla., the league claimed an all-time high six national titles and established new conference standards for excellence in the NFL draft, Women's Basketball Final Four, College World Series, television ratings and numerous Olympic Sport national successes.

With the expansion, Swofford's leadership and negotiating skills helped bring the conference extended and enhanced television contracts in both football and basketball. In May of 2004, the league extended its relationships with ABC, ESPN and Jefferson-Pilot by renegotiating its football television agreements. Highlights include the rights to the Inaugural ACC Football Championship Game and significant increases in the number of televised games through 2010.

In May of 2000, Swofford negotiated one of the nation's most lucrative basketball television contracts with Raycom/Jefferson-Pilot Sports through the 2010-11 season. After the addition of the three new conference members, under Swofford's guidance, Raycom/Jefferson-Pilot increased its financial commitment to the ACC basketball package in May of 2004. During his tenure, the ACC has become the only conference to have television packages with two national cable networks - ESPN and Fox Sports Net. The results of these packages increased the television audience of ACC basketball by over 25 percent.

In order to reach the expanding audience of ACC fans, Swofford also negotiated an agreement with XM Satellite Radio, to broadcast the league's football, men's and women's basketball games nationally.

The North Wilkesboro, N.C., native was a prime mover in the creation of the ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge, a three-day series matching

two of the nation's premiere college basketball conferences.

Highly respected by his peers, Swofford was a force in the development and growth of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) to determine an annual national champion in Division I football. In addition to being involved with the BCS since its inception, he served as Coordinator of the BCS for the 2000 and 2001 college football seasons and is currently the chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners Association.

Since becoming Commissioner in 1997, Swofford has been responsible for securing increased bowl opportunities for the ACC. This past year a league-record eight teams earned bowl bids and in 2002, the conference set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (78%) participated in bowl play.

In January of 2001, the Triangle Chapter of the College Football Hall of Fame named Swofford the recipient of its "Outstanding American Award." In the fall of 2002, he was named to the North Carolina High School Athletic Association's Hall of Fame and in December of 2003 he was inducted into the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl Hall of Fame. In 2003, The Sporting News named Swofford the fifth most influential person in sports in the United States. The Atlanta Sports Council presented Swofford with the 2004 Horizon Award, recognizing him as the national Sports Business Executive of the Year.

During Swofford's first nine years as Commissioner, ACC teams have won 31 national titles while participating in 45 national championship games. In addition, 798 ACC teams have participated in various NCAA championships during his nine years - an average of over 88 NCAA teams per year.

A long-time advocate of the importance of academics and student-athlete welfare, Swofford stimulated the formation of the league's first-ever ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. This group of current ACC student-athletes gives the conference direct feedback on their experiences participating at the highest level of college athletics.

Swofford placed an added emphasis on the development of women's basketball in the ACC with the hiring of an Associate Commissioner for Women's Basketball to oversee all aspects of the sport on both a conference and national level.

In addition to his influence and presence in the ACC, Swofford has been a prominent leader in intercollegiate athletics, serving as President of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 1993-94. In 2002, Swofford was appointed as a member of the NCAA Football Oversight Committee. In addition, he has served as a member of the prestigious NCAA Executive Committee. He was named chairman of the NCAA Football Television Committee in 1984 and



was also chairman of the NCAA Communications and NCAA Special Events/Post-season Bowl Committees. Swofford is a past chairman of the NCAA Division I Championship Committee and was appointed to the NCAA Special Committee to Study a Division I-A Football Championship.

During his 21 years as an athletics director and assistant athletics director in the league, Swofford chaired numerous ACC committees, including five terms as chair of the ACC Television Committee.

The Director of Athletics at the University of North Carolina from 1980 to 1997, Swofford was instrumental in building North Carolina's athletics department into one of the country's most respected programs. During his tenure, Tar Heel athletic teams claimed 123 ACC championships and 24 national collegiate titles, including two in men's basketball and one in women's basketball. During the 1993-94 year, the Tar Heels captured the inaugural Sears Directors' Cup, emblematic of the collegiate all-sports champion. North Carolina finished in the Top Six of the Sears Cup standings in each year of Swofford's tenure that the award was given. Four of Swofford's coaching hires at UNC went on to win national championships at the school.


The University chose to recognize his many accomplishments by establishing the John D. Swofford women's athletics scholarship and naming an auditorium in the school's football complex in his honor.

Swofford began his administrative career when past ACC Commissioner and then University of Virginia Athletics Director Gene Corrigan hired him as the school's athletic ticket manager and assistant to the director of athletic facilities and finance in the fall of 1973.

He returned to Chapel Hill in May 1976 as assistant athletics director and business manager, handling all of the athletic department's business affairs. Swofford dropped the business manager title in January 1979, and was named assistant executive vice-president of the Educational Foundation.

Swofford became the school's athletic director on May 1, 1980. At the age of 31, he was the youngest major college Athletics Director in the nation at the time.

John and his wife Nora reside in Greensboro, N.C. Together they have three children, Autumn and Chad Swofford and Nora's daughter, Amie, who is married to Keith Furr.

HOKIE HOOPS HISTORY



The Beginnings

Women's basketball at Virginia Tech began in 1970 as a club sport under the direction of coach Ganna Roberts. John Ristroph coached the squad during the 1972-73 season. In 1973, Joe Sgro, a professor at Tech, took over the team until 1976 when John Wetzel was named head coach. The women's basketball team gained full varsity status beginning with the 1976-77 season.

Tech's Varsity Coaches


The Hokies' first varsity coach was former Tech player and former assistant coach of the Portland Trail Blazers, John Wetzel. He played on the men's team from 1963-66 then went on to play pro ball with the Lakers, Suns and Hawks before coming back to Tech to finish his education and coach the women's squad. In his first and only season his team recorded a 7-9 record.

Taking over for Wetzel in 1977 was Carolyn Owen, whose team registered an 8-16 mark. In 1978, Carol Alfano came on the scene and in just her second season she guided the Tech women to their first winning record. Bonnie Henrickson became the Hokies' fourth head coach in 1997, taking over for Alfano, who had served as Tech's coach for 19 seasons.

Beth Dunkenberger became head coach in 2004 and guided Tech to a 17-12 record and an NCAA Tournament appearance in the Hokies' first season as members of the ACC. Dunkenberger followed up last year with a 21-10 worksheet and led the Hokies into the NCAA Second Round.

First Scholarship Players

The first women's basketball player to earn any kind of scholarship was Helena Flannagan in 1977, when she received partial aid. Kim Albany (1978-82), who was recruited by Carolyn Owen, was Tech's first full scholarship player. Also in 1978, Sis Spriggs received a full grant, and partials went to Donna Cooper, Pauline Landis and Sandy Berry.

Kerri Gardin was selected in the third round of last year's WNBA Draft.

Retired Jersey

Renee Dennis' No. 44 jersey was retired at the conclusion of her career in 1987. Dennis, from Bridgeport, Conn., is one of only 14 athletes in Tech athletic history to have his or her jersey retired. She was the first female athlete to receive that honor, and one of only two so far in Hokie history.

The others to have their jerseys retired are football coach Frank Beamer, football players Cornell Brown, Carroll Dale, Jake Grove, Frank Loria, Jim Pyne, Bruce Smith and Michael Vick, men's basketball stars Dell Curry, Vernell "Bimbo" Coles, Allan Bristow and Ace Custis, baseball coach Chuck Hartman, baseball player Johnny Oates, and volleyball standout Lisa Pikalek.

Professional Players

Renee Dennis played professionally in Australia where she was her division's Player of the Year in 1989-90. Wendy Sanders played professionally in Belgium.

Tere Williams became the first Hokie to be selected in the WNBA Draft when she was picked in the third round by the Phoenix Mercury. Ieva Kublina was drafted in the third round (31st overall) in the 2004 draft by the Indiana Fever.

At the conclusion of the 2005-06 season, the Hokies' Kerri Gardin was selected in the third round (34th overall) of the WNBA Draft by the Chicago Skv.

Dawn Chriss, Gardin, Kublina and Williams are currently playing professionally in Europe.

VIRGUNIA LE CHARLES

Academic Excellence

Christi Osborne was named to the GTE Academic All-America first team in 1994-95 and was a second-team member in 1993-94. Several Hokies have been named to the GTE District III Academic All-America team, including Amy Byrne (1988-89), Christi Osborne (1992-93, 1993-94, 1994-95), Maria Albertsson (1997-98, 1998-99), Amy Wetzel (1998-99, 1999-00) and Sarah Hicks (2001-02). Osborne also was a recipient of the Rawlings Scholarship Award (1994-95).

Best of the Metro

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team won two championships as a member of the Metro Conference. Tech won the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament by knocking off Virginia Commonwealth, UNC Charlotte and Southern Mississippi in succession. The Hokies captured the 1995 Metro regular season championship with a 10-2 league record.

Atlantic 10 Champs

The Hokies captured the Atlantic 10 Tournament championship in 1998 with a thrilling 66-64 overtime win over host Massachusetts. Virginia Tech won the Atlantic 10 regular season title in 1998-99 with a 15-1 league record.

National Honors

Tere Williams and Lisa Witherspoon were named as honorable mentions to the 1999 Associated Press All-America teams. In 1995, Jenny Root was an honorable mention selection to the Kodak All-America team. The Women's Basketball News Service named Tere Williams to the 1998 Freshman All-America third team.

All-Atlantic Coast Conference

Kerri Gardin represented Virginia Tech on the All-Atantic Coast Conference team, earning honorable-mention honors during the 2004-05 season. Gardin averaged a double-double against the rest of the league, with 12.2 points per game during ACC play while pulling down 10.1 rebounds a contest. Both were team-highs during the conference slate.

Gardin again earned all-conference honors during the 2005-06 season. She was second on the team in scoring with 12.4 points per game. Gardin led the league in rebounds per contest, pulling down 10.0 per game.

All-BIG EAST Conference

Tere Williams was the first Hokie to be selected for All-BIG EAST honors after being named to the all-conference second team following the 2000-01 season. Ieva Kublina was selected the 2001-02 BIG EAST Conference Most Improved Player and was named to the all-conference second team. Sarah Hicks was a member of the 2001-02 all-conference third team. Kublina became the first Tech player to be named to the All-BIG EAST first team in 2002-03 and Carrie Mason was named to the 2003 BIG EAST All-Rookie team. Kublina was a selected to the 2004 All-BIG EAST second team.



All-Atlantic 10 Conference

The Hokies were well represented on the All-Atlantic 10 Conference teams during their five years in the league. Michelle Houseright was the first Virginia Tech player named to the All-Atlantic 10 team in 1996 as a second-team selection and Lisa Witherspoon was a second-team pick in 1999. Other Hokies named to the team include Tere Williams, a first-team selection in 1999 and 2000 and a second team member in 1998, Amy Wetzel, a second-team choice in 1999 and 2000, and Chrystal Starling, a member of the third team in 2000.

All-Metro Conference

In 14 seasons as a Metro Conference member, Virginia Tech placed 12 players on the all-conference team, including Jenny Root, who was honored as the 1994-95 Player of the Year. Hokies named to the first team include Taiqua Brittingham (1984), Renee Dennis (1986, 87), Susan Walvius (1986), Amy Byrne (1989), and Jenny Root (1994, 95). Second-team selections include Angie Kelly (1986), Maureen Donovan (1987), Michelle Bain (1988), Amy Byrne (1989), Missy Sallade (1989, '90), Jeni Garber (1991), Lisa Griffith (1992), Christi Osborne (1993, '94, '95) and Jenny Root (1993).

Tournament Stars

Virginia Tech players have left their mark in postseason play through the years. Ieva Kublina was named to the 2003 BIG EAST All-Tournament Team and to the 2002 WNIT All-tournament team. Tere Williams (1998) and Amy Wetzel (1999) were named to the All-Atlantic 10 Tournament team, as was former Tech standout Michelle Houseright (1998). Christi Osborne was a three-time member of the All-Metro Tournament team (1992, 93, 94) and was selected as the 1994 Most Valuable

Player. Two-time All-Metro tournament members include Taiqua Brittingham (1983-84), Renee Dennis (1986-87), Jeni Garber (1988-89) and Sue Logsdon (1993-94).

Freshmen Phenoms

Freshmen have made an immediate impact on the women's basketball program through the years. After the 2002-2003 season, Carrie Mason was named as an Honorable Mention selection to the WomensCollegeHoops.com All-American Freshman team and was a member of the BIG EAST All-Rookie Team. Tere Williams was named to the 1998 Women's Basketball News Service Freshman All-American third team as well as being named Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Year. Virginia Tech placed one player on the Atlantic 10 All-Rookie team in each of its five seasons in the league. Three Hokies, Jeni Garber (1988-89), Sue Logsdon (1990-91) and Christi Osborne (1991-92), were named to the Metro Conference All-Rookie team.

1.000-Point Club

Nineteen Virginia Tech women's basketball players have reached the 1,000-point plateau, with the most recent being Kerri Gardin, who joined the club during the 2005-06 season. Tech's all-time leading scorer is Renee Dennis. Dennis totalled 1,791 points during her Tech career. Other Hokies who have reached the 1,000-point plateau are, Tere Williams (1,750), Ieva Kublina (1,647), Jenny Root (1,582), Christi Osborne (1,500), Amy Wetzel (1,444), Carrie Mason (1,369), Chrystal Starling (1,340), Amy Byrne (1,291), Susan Walvius (1,161), Robin Lee (1,147), Dawn Chriss (1,121), Erin Gibson (1,117), Michelle Houseright (1,112), Sarah Hicks (1,092), Angie Kelly (1,092), Michelle Bain (1,068), Kerri Gardin (1,061) and Lisa Griffith (1,033).

POSTSEASON APPEARANCES

1994 NCAA

• In 1994, Virginia Tech, with a 24-5 record, captured the Metro Conference Tournament title and advanced to the Hokies' first NCAA Tournament. Tech was seeded eighth in the East Region and played host to Auburn in a first-round game at Cassell Coliseum. Auburn, on the strength of 24 points and 12 rebounds from Danielette Coleman, defeated the Hokies 60-51. Tech guard Christi Osborne led the Hokies with 22 points and seven rebounds.

1995 NCAA

• Tech kept up its success in 1995 by claiming the Metro Conference regular season championship with a 21-8 record. The Hokies, again seeded eighth in the East Region, faced St. Joseph's in the first round at the University of Connecticut's Gampel Pavilion. The Hokies downed the Hawks, 62-52, behind 18 points from Christi Osborne. The Hokies' second-round opponent, UConn, ended up as the 1995 NCAA champion. Guard Jennifer Rizzotti burned the Hokies for 20 points as the Huskies advanced, 91-45.

1998 NCAA

• With former Tech assistant coach Bonnie Henrickson back in Blacksburg as the head coach, the Hokies posted their third trip to the NCAA Tournament in five years in 1998. Tech traveled to Gainesville, Fla., as the No. 11 seed in the NCAA West Region. The Hokies, behind a record-breaking performance from guard Amy Wetzel, surprised sixth-seeded Wisconsin, which was ranked No. 23 at the time, 75-64. Wetzel set a Tech record and tied an NCAA West Region free throw mark by converting 16 free throws for a career-high 28 points. The Hokies, however, would bow out after round two as host Florida, ranked No. 12, won 89-57. Wetzel again led all scorers with 24 points.

1999 NCAA

• The Hokies used the 1999 season to establish themselves as one of the nation's elite programs. Henrickson led Tech to a school-record 28-3 finish, including a 15-1 Atlantic 10 mark. Cassell Coliseum was the site for NCAA first- and second- round games. The Hokies dispatched Saint Peter's, 73-48, before defeating Auburn, 76-61, to earn the program's first "Sweet 16" appearance. Tech traveled to Greensboro, N.C., to face second-ranked Tennessee in the NCAA East Regional. Behind 27 points from national player of the year Chamique Holdsclaw, the Volunteers eliminated Tech, 68-52, to advance.

2000 WNIT


• Virginia Tech posted its third consecutive 20-win season under Henrickson in 2000. The Hokies posted a 20-11 record and made their first appearence in the Women's National Invitational Tournament. Cassell Coliseum was the site of the first-round matchup against Georgia State. The Hokies used a 12-3 run midway through the second half to break open a close contest and went on to win 80-56. Maryland was the WNIT "Sweet 16" opponent two days later and the two teams battled into overtime. The Terrapins used a 10-2 run in the last 3:11 of the extra session to eliminate the Hokies, 68-60.

2001 NCAA

• In 2001, Tech received an at-large bid to the NCAA Mideast Regional as a No. 7 seed. The Hokies had compiled a 21-8 record entering the tournament in their first season in the BIG EAST Conference. Tech had finished fourth in the league with an 11-5 record and advanced to the tournament semifinals before being eliminated by eventual national champion Notre Dame.


Tech's fourth consecutive postseason appearance and third to the NCAA Tournament in the past four seasons, began with a resounding 77-57 victory over Denver in the

first round at Lubbock, Texas. Chrystal Starling led five Hokies in double figures with 20 points as Tech shot 55.3 percent from the field. In the second round, Tech faced Texas Tech on the Lady Raiders' home floor in front of 12,161. The Hokies played a great first half and took a 25-18 lead into the locker room at the intermission. The Lady Raiders exploded in the second half, shooting 63.0 percent and scoring 55 points to defeat the Hokies 73-52.

2002 WNIT

• Virginia Tech received an invitation to the WNIT in 2002 and the bid marked the Hokies' second venture to the tournament and its most successful to date.

The Hokies compiled an 18-10 record entering the WNIT after posting a 15-2 record at one point in the season, the second best start to a season in the program's history. The two losses were by a total of three points.

Tech's four-game run, all in the Cassell, in the tournament opened with a tight 51-45 win over UNC Greensboro.

The second-round contest was a renewal of the rivalry with George Washington from when the Hokies were a member of the Atlantic 10. Trailing 32-27 at the half, Tech played one of its best halves of the year to win 68-52.

Vermont was the Hokies' quarterfinal opponent, and the night belonged to senior Sarah Hicks who had 22 points, including four treys. Kublina added 13 points and nine boards as Tech won 76-48.

Tech's run in the tournament ended in a thrilling 77-72 overtime loss to Houston in front of 5,409 Hokie faithful. Kublina erupted for a career-high 32 points, which was the fourth highest single-game total by a Tech player. For her efforts, Kublina was named to the all-tournament team.

2003 NCAA

• Tech made its sixth consecutive postseason appearance in 2003 following a 21-9 regular season. The Hokies, who lost in the BIG EAST Tournament semifinals to eventual national champion Connecticut, were seeded seventh in the East Regional at West Lafayette, Ind. Freshman Carrie Mason hit a running layup with 1.1 seconds remaining to give Tech a 61-59 win over Georgia Tech. Ieva Kublina led the way with 18 points followed by Chrystal Starling's 15-point effort. In the second round, the Hokies faced No. 10 Purdue on the Boilermakers' home floor. Despite shooting 54.9 percent from the field, Tech fell 80-62 as the Boilermakers nailed eight three-point shots and forced 20 turnovers.

2004 NCAA

· Tech made its seventh consecutive postseason appearance and seventh NCAA Tournament in the past eleven seasons in 2004, following a 22-8 regular season in its final season as a member of the BIG EAST Conference. The Hokies, who lost in the BIG EAST Tournament quaterfinals to eventual national champion Connecticut, were seeded eighth in the East Regional and hosted the first two rounds in Cassell Coliseum. Ieva Kublina scored 26 points to lead the hotshooting Hokies to an 89-76 first-round win over Iowa. Tech built a 40-27 halftime lead by connecting on 51.7 percent from the field and shot a sizzling 67 percent (20-30) in the second half. In addition to Kublina's outburst, Carrie Mason followed with 19 points, including two treys.

The Hokies matched up with the region's top seed and fifth-ranked Penn State in the

second round. After leading 28-25 at the half, Tech saw the Nittany Lions put together a 27-5 outburst in the second half to eliminate the Hokies, 61-48, before 7,128 fans, the eighth-largest crowd for a women's contest in Blacksbsurg. Mason and Kublina again led the way with 16 and 15 points, respectively.

2005 NCAA

• Virginia Tech made its eighth consecutive postseason appearance and eighth NCAA Tournament in the past 12 seasons following a 17-10 regular season. The Hokies, who lost to Wake Forest in the ACC Tournament, received an at-large bid as the No. 12 seed in the College Park, Md., Regional. Dawn Chriss netted 20 points, but Tech could not overcome a 17-point first-half deficit, falling 79-78 in front of 3,745 fans. In addition to Chriss' 20, Kirby Copeland, Erin Gibson and Kerri Garden all reached double figures.

2006 NCAA

• Virginia Tech made its ninth consecutive postseason appearance and ninth NCAA Tournament in the past 13 seasons last year following a 19-10 regular season. The Hokies posted their first-ever ACC Tournament win, defeating Wake Forest, before falling to Duke in the quarterfinals. Tech earned an at-large bid as the No. 7 seed in the University Park, Pa., Regional.

The Hokies had five players in double figures in the opening round, helping them knock off No. 10 seed Missouri, 82-51. Tech then fell to the No. 2 seed, Connecticut Huskies, 79-56. Dawn Chriss and Kerri Gardin each posted a team-high 16 points while Carrie Mason chipped in 13.

Virginia Tech's Wins Over Nationally-Ranked Teams


- In 1984, Tech shocked No. 20 North Carolina, 74-73, behind Renee Dennis' 17 points.
- In 1984, the Hokies defeated No. 16 Louisiana State, 86-77, in the Marriott-Converse Christmas Classic in Blacksburg.
- One of the biggest wins in Tech women's basketball history came in 1985 when Tech upset No. 5 Old Dominion, 73-72. It was the first win over the Lady Monarchs in 11 games.
- In 1987, the Hokies upended 16th-ranked James Madison, 63-61, behind a 16-point, 13-rebound performance from freshman Amy Byrne.
- In the middle of what was then the longest winning streak in school history, the Hokies upset No. 13 South Carolina in 1987 in Blacksburg, 63-59. Amy Byrne led the Lady Hokies with 16 points and 12 rebounds.
- Virginia Tech upset No. 18 Southern Mississippi, 60-59, in a Cassell Coliseum barnburner Feb. 28, 1994. Guard Lisa Leftwich, who led Tech with 18 points, hit a key finger roll with 42 seconds remaining.
- In one of the biggest games in the program's history, Tech defeated No. 19 Southern Mississippi in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament, 83-76. The win gave Tech its first Metro Tournament title and sent the Hokies to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in their history.



- The Hokies knocked off No. 9 Virginia, 69-62, in Cassell Coliseum Jan. 13, 1995. The win propelled Virginia Tech into the national rankings for the first time. Christi Osborne, Angela Donnell, Jenny Root and Terri Garland all scored in double figures for the Hokies.
- Tech downed No. 24 Wisconsin, 75-64, in the first round of the 1998 NCAA Regional in Gainesville, Fla. Guard Amy Wetzel converted a school record 16-of-17 free-throw attempts and scored 28 points to pace the Hokies.
- The Hokies travelled to "Tobacco Road" on Nov. 17, 1998, to knock off sixth-ranked and eventual national runner-up Duke, 72-70, at Cameron Indoor Stadium. An injured Kim Seaver came off the bench to lead Tech with 14 points and nine rebounds.
- Tech defeated in-state rival and 17th-ranked Virginia, 81-65, on Nov. 30, 1998, at Cassell Coliseum. Tere Williams recorded her second-straight double-double of the season with 21 points and 10 rebounds.

- On Nov. 30, 2000, Amy Wetzel hit a running 10-footer off the glass with 3.7 seconds remaining to give the Hokies a 57-56 win over 17th-ranked Virginia. The win marked the second consecutive time the Hokies had beaten the Cavaliers in Cassell Coliseum.
- Virginia Tech used a 13-0 run over the final five minutes to pick up a come-frombehind 65-59 win over No. 24 Villanova on Jan. 23, 2001. Tere Williams led Tech with 22 points followed by Amy Wetzel with 18.
- The Hokies made an impressive debut in the BIG EAST Tournament on Mar. 4, 2001, as they knocked off 23rd-ranked Villanova for the second time during the 2000-01 season with a 73-67 win in the tournament quarterfinals in Storrs, Conn. Chrystal Starling came off the bench to lead Tech with 21 points while Williams chipped in with 20.
- On Nov. 19, 2001, Tech used a stingy defense and clutch free-throw shooting in the closing seconds to defeat No. 16 Old Dominion 68-62. The Hokies held the Monarchs to only 37.7 percent from the field. Chrystal Starling led Tech with 20 points while Sarah Hicks added 14.

- The Hokies put together one of their best performances of the season on Jan. 9, 2002, with a 72-53 win over 24th-ranked Boston College. Tech shot a sizzling 59.1 percent from the field while holding the Eagles to only 31.1 percent. Ieva Kublina led the way with 19 points, 11 rebounds and five blocks while Chrystal Starling also contributed 19 points.
- Chrystal Starling, second in career freethrow and field-goal percentage, came through in the clutch on Jan. 22, 2003, in Tech's 66-64 overtime win over No. 23 Rutgers. She was fouled with 1.2 seconds remaining in overtime and the senior calmly drained both free throws for the victory. Starling led Tech with 21 points, 16 of which came in the second half and overtime.
- The Hokies used long-range shooting to pull off a 74-70, overtime victory against 23rd-ranked Boston College on Mar. 9, 2003, in the BIG EAST quarterfinals. After forcing the extra period with some clutch free-throw shooting, Tech nailed three treys in the extra session to seal the win. Kublina registered 20 points, including two three-point baskets, while Starling added 18 and Dawn Chriss chipped in with 14 points.
- Tech proved there is a first time for everything as the Hokies defeated 24th-ranked Virginia 63-62 on Nov. 23, 2003, for their first win in Charlottesville as a varsity team. The Hokies survived a furious Cavalier rally in the second half after leading by as many as 14 points. UVa had two game-winning attempts in the final five seconds that missed their mark and gave Tech its historic win. Carrie Mason led the way with 18 points, including three treys.

- Virginia Tech jumped out to an early 27-9 lead and never looked back in a 63-50 win over No. 19/24 Villanova on Jan. 14, 2004. Tech dominated the boards holding a commanding 39-24 advantage and shot 51.1 percent from the field. Kerri Gardin and Dawn Chriss led a balanced attack with 14 and 12 points respectively.
- Tech placed five players in double figures in cruising to a 80-64 win over 24th-ranked Boston College on Jan. 24, 2004. After trailing 33-31 at the half, the Hokies exploded for 49 second-half points, securing the win. Ieva Kublina led the way with 17 points followed by Carrie Mason with 16, Erin Gibson and sophomore Dawn Chriss had 14 each and Kerri Gardin added 13.
- The Hokies stunned No. 12 Texas Tech in Las Vegas 71-70 in overtime on Dec. 19, 2004. After trailing by eight in the first half, Tech tallied 41 points in the second half and shot 60 percent in overtime for the victory. Carrie Mason had 12 points, while Erin Gibson and Nare Diawara each hit for 11.
- Tech closed out its final regular-season away game with an 87-79 upset of No. 22/23 Maryland on Feb. 24, 2005. The Hokies connected on 54 percent of their attempts in the game, while holding the Terps to 46 percent from the floor. Tech netted 48 points in the first half en route to a nine-point halftime lead. Kerri Gardin posted a double-double with 19 points and 12 rebounds while Dawn Chriss also tallied a team-high 19 points in the win.
- On Jan. 8, 2006, the 25th-ranked Virginia Tech Hokies upended No. 19 Boston College, 67-62, in Blacksburg, Va. The Hokies rallied in the second half, outscoring their counterparts by 11 in the final 20 minutes for the win. Tech's defense stymied the Eagles, forcing them into 30 turnovers in the first ACC matchup of former BIG EAST foes.

MILESTONE WINS

First Varsity Win

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team earned its first win as a varsity sport by defeating Bridgewater College, 59-55, on Dec. 14, 1976. The Hokies, who overcame a five-point deficit, outscored the Eagles by nine points down the stretch to clinch the win. Sophomore Gail Kelley led the way with 17 points, followed by Karen Garbis' 13.

50th Win

Tech's 50th win came on Jan. 28, 1981, against James Madison. Sis Spriggs

was one of three Hokies in double figures with 15 points as Tech downed the Dukes, 66-58. Also in double figures were Tammie Edwards with 13 and Maureen Corrigan, who had 10 points as well as 10 rebounds.

100th Win

The Hokies picked up their century win by upsetting nationally-ranked North Carolina, 74-73, in a thriller at Roanoke, Va., on Dec. 1, 1984. Tech was paced by Renee Dennis' 17-point performance, but a number of players shined in the upset victory. Susan Walvius, a 6-2 center, added 16 points and five rebounds, guard Angie Kelly chipped in 15 points, and guard Maureen Donovan contributed seven points and six rebounds.

150th Win

Tech registered win No. 150 on Jan. 16, 1988, when it squeaked past Louisville in Blacksburg, 68-67. Keying the victory was center Michelle Bain, who tallied 19 points and nine rebounds, while forward Wendy Sanders pumped in 16 points. Point guard Denise Kayajian had a career-high (at the time) eight assists to go along with nine points against the Lady Cardinals.

200th Win

Tech won its 200th game on Dec. 30, 1991, in the final of the 1991 Diamond Club Classic when it downed UNC Greensboro 84-65 in Cassell Coliseum. Phyllis Tonkin scored 20 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead the Tech women. Lisa Griffith kicked in 17 points while Dayna Sonovick had nine rebounds and six assists.



Virginia Tech's 250th win was one of the biggest in its history, as the Hokies knocked off Southern Mississippi in the final game of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament to earn the program's first bid to the NCAA Tournament.

250th Win

The Hokies won their 250th career game on Mar. 9, by knocking off 19th-ranked Southern Mississippi, 83-76, in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament in Biloxi, Miss. Southern Miss was the tournament's top seed. Christi Osborne led the way with 19 points while Sue Logsdon had 18, Lisa Leftwich pitched in with 17 and Jenny Root contributed 14 points.

300th Win

Tech posted its 300th win in the program's history on Jan. 2, 1998, in a 84-60 win over Rhode Island in the Hokies' 1997-98 conference opener. The Cassell Coliseum crowd witnessed an outstanding performance from guard Amy Wetzel, who finished with 14 points and three steals. The win also marked Bonnie Henrickson's first Atlantic 10 Conference win as a head coach.

350th Win

Tech picked up win No. 350 on Jan. 6, 2000, when it coasted to a 81-38 win over Rhode Island. The victory also was Tech's 200th in Cassell Coliseum. The Hokies opened the game on a 12-0 run and cruised to a 42-16 halftime lead. The Hokies placed five players in double figures led by Nicole Jones, Kim Seaver, Chrystal Starling and Tere Williams with 12 points each. Tech outrebounded the Rams 44-24 and blocked seven shots in the victory.


400th Win

The Hokies recorded win No. 400 on Jan. 19, 2002, with a 69-50 win over St. John's. Tech jumped out to a 39-20 halftime lead and

cruised to the victory behind 16 points from Chrystal Starling along with Nicole Jones' 12 points and Sarah Hicks with 11. The Hokies held the Red Storm to only 30.8 percent from the field while Tech shot a sizzling 64.0 percent in the first half.

450th Win

Win No. 450 on March 6, 2004 did not come easy as Tech found itself trailing Georgetown 40-28 early in the second half of the 2004 BIG EAST Championship first round contest. The Hokies cut the deficit to six points, 43-37, they then ripped off 17 unanswered points and went on to a 56-47 victory. In fact, Tech outscored Georgetown 28-7 over the final 14 minutes of the contest. Carrie Mason and Kerri Gardin led the comeback with 14 points each.

CONFERENCE TIMELINE

- Oct. 21, 1892 Tech played its first football game, recording a 14-10 win over St. Albans, a private boys' prep school in Radford.
- Feb. 25-26, 1921 Tech, under the leadership of athletics director C.P. "Sally" Miles, joined the Southern Intercollegiate Conference as a charter member. Other members included Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn), Clemson, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology (Georgia Tech), Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College (Mississippi State), North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia and Washington and Lee. In 1922, Louisiana State, Mississippi, South Carolina, Vanderbilt and Tulane joined the conference.
- December 1923 The name of the conference was officially changed to the Southern Conference. Also, conference officials added the University of the South to the conference. The following year, VMI joined the conference, and, in 1929, Duke joined.
- 1932 It was agreed that the 13 southern-most members should form a separate conference. The Southeastern Conference, thus, was formed with Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt as the members.
- 1953 Seven colleges withdrew to form the Atlantic Coast Conference: Clemson, Duke, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Maryland, South Carolina and Wake Forest College.
- June 1965 Tech withdrew from the Southern Conference.
- July 1965-May 1978 Tech competed as an independent in virtually every varsity sport.
- May 1978 Tech ended its 13-year status as a major independent by accepting a bid to join the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference (a.k.a. the Metro) for all sports except football.

The Hokies joined Cincinnati, Florida State, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane in the Metro, which was founded in 1975.

"Affiliation with the Metro Conference is beneficial from the standpoint of scheduling, national identity and postseason activity," Tech president William Lavery said. "It will provide us with national exposure and television coverage, as well as improve the basketball schedule and bring good teams to Blacksburg."

• Feb. 5, 1991 — After 26 years as a football independent, Tech officially accepted a bid to join the newly-created BIG EAST Football Conference. Tech joined Miami, Syracuse,

Boston College, Pittsburgh, West Virginia, Temple and Rutgers as charter members of the conference.

- January 1995 Five Metro members UNC Charlotte, Tulane, Louisville, Southern Miss and South Florida voted Tech and Virginia Commonwealth out of the league. At the time, those schools were planning merger with other Midwestern schools (hence, the birth of Conference USA) and the Hokies and Rams were not interested in such a merger. As a result, those five league members decided to vote them out of the league.
- Feb. 3, 1995 Tech, VCU and the Metro agreed to a \$2.27 million settlement which the Hokies and Rams split. A portion of conference revenue was going to be withheld from the two schools, but this settlement put an end to the issue.
- Two weeks later, 1995 Tech joined the Atlantic 10 Conference for all sports except football, which was in the BIG EAST, and wrestling, which was in the Colonial. (Tech wrestling later began competition in the Eastern Wrestling League in 1997.)

Tech AD Dave Braine picked the Atlantic 10 over the Colonial because of three factors.

"No. 1 was Northeast exposure," Braine told Bill Roth in the Feb. 17 issue of The Hokie Huddler. "No. 2 were the basketball rankings of the Atlantic 10 and the high level of play in the league. And No. 3, most of our out-ofstate students are from the Northeast."

- June 24, 1999 Tech received a proposal from the BIG EAST Conference, inviting the school to join the conference for all sports.
- July 20, 1999 Tech submitted a counterproposal, addressing financial issues that the school had with the original proposal. BIG EAST athletic directors addressed those concerns at the athletics directors' meetings in mid-July and submitted the proposal to each school's respective president for a vote.
- Aug. 24, 1999 Tech and the BIG EAST announced that the Hokies would join the conference for all sports beginning in 2001-02.

"Virginia Tech is thrilled to become a full member of the BIG EAST Conference and looks forward to its academic and athletic associations with the entire conference membership," Tech president Paul Torgersen said.

- November 2, 1999 BIG EAST Conference presidents voted to advance Virginia Tech's participation as a full member to July 1, 2000.
- June 18, 2003 In a surprise move, presidents of Atlantic Coast Conference schools

privately dropped a plan to invite Miami, Boston College and Syracuse; and instead voted on inviting Virginia Tech and Miami. This came after five weeks of negotiations with the other three schools for ACC invitations.

- June 19, 2003 Responding to speculation that Virginia Tech has been invited to join the ACC, the university issued a release stating that no offer had been extended officially or unofficially.
- June 24, 2003 Presidents of Atlantic Coast Conference schools held a teleconference and voted to begin the official process of offering invitations to Virginia Tech and Miami.
- June 25, 2003 Atlantic Coast Conference officials made an official site visit to Virginia Tech, which the Hokies passed with flying colors. This was the final step before an official invitation could be extended.
- June 27, 2003 Virginia Tech President Charles Steger announced that the Hokies had officially accepted the ACC's invitation to join the conference.

"Today we have received the formal offer of membership, which we will accept," Steger said. "We know that this affiliation will be good for our students, athletes, fans and communities for many years to come."

• July 1, 2003 — Virginia Tech and Miami were officially introduced as the 10th and 11th members of the Atlantic Coast Conference at a press conference in Greensboro, N.C.

"I'm excited for our fans and our constituency," athletics director Jim Weaver said. "This membership is something that the fan base and alumni and friends of Virginia Tech have wanted for a long time. It's home for us. We've had prior relationships with these institutions for many years and this is something our fans are excited about. I'm happy for them, for our coaches and for our student-athletes."

• July 1, 2004 — The Hokies officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2004 and began play in the 2004-05 academic year in all sports.

Lee is tenth on the all-time scoring list, and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Nov. 25. 2005.


Osborne is the latest women's basketball player to be honored. She scored 1,500 points in her career and was enshrined on Nov. 10, 2006.


