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Hokies in Postseason Play NCAAREGULARS

Tech's 2001 NCAA trip is the latest in a streak of postseason appearances

Virginia Tech's visit to the second round of the NCAA Tournament last season caps a recent run of postseason success for the Hokies. Tech has participated in the NCAA Tournament three of the past four years and in five of the last eight, advancing as far as the "Sweet 16" in 1999.

Last March, Tech received an at-large bid to the NCAA Mideast Regional as a No. 7 seed. The Hokies had compiled a 21-8 record entering the tournament in their first season in the BIG EAST Conference. Tech had finished fourth in the league with an 11-5 record and advanced to the tournanment semifinals before being eliminated by eventual national champion Notre Dame.

Tech's fourth consecutive postseason appearance and third to the NCAA Tournament in the past four seasons, began with a resounding 77-57 victory over Denver in the first round at Lubbock, Tex. Chrystal Starling led five Hokies in double figures with 20 points as Tech shot 55.3 percent from the field.

In the second round, Tech faced Texas Tech on the Lady Raiders' home floor in front of 12,161. The Hokies played a great first half and took a 25-18 lead into the locker room at the intermission. The Lady Raiders exploded in the second half, shooting 63.0 percent and scoring 55 points to defeat the Hokies 73-52.






The Hokies' latest postseason experience saw the team fly via chartered jet to Lubbock, Texas. Chrystal Starling scored 20 points as Tech won its NCAA First Round game over Denver, 77-57. In the second round, the Hokies' couldn't overcome the 12,161 partisan fans at Texas Tech's United Spirit Arena, and the Lady Raiders won to advance to the "Sweet 16."

TECH'S OTHER APPEARANCES

• In 1994, Virginia Tech, with a 24-5 record, captured the Metro Conference Tournament title and advanced to the Hokies' first NCAA tourney. Tech was seeded eighth in the East Region and played host to Auburn in a first-round game at Cassell Coliseum. Auburn, on the strength of 24 points and 12 rebounds from Danielette Coleman, defeated the Hokies 60-51. Tech guard Christi Osborne led the Hokies with 22 points and seven rebounds.

• Tech kept up its success in 1995 by claiming the Metro Conference regular season championship with a 21-8 record. The Hokies, again seeded eighth in the East Region, faced St. Joseph's in the first round at the University of Connecticut's Gampel Pavilion. The Hokies downed the Hawks, 62-52, behind 18 points from Christi Osborne. The Hokies' second-round opponent, UConn, ended up as the 1995 NCAA National Champion. Guard Jennifer Rizzotti burned the Hokies for 20 points as the Huskies advanced, 91-45.

• With former Tech assistant coach Bonnie Henrickson back in Blacksburg as the head coach, the Hokies posted their third trip to the NCAA Tournament in five years in 1998. Tech traveled to Gainesville, Fla., as the No. 11 seed in the NCAA West Region. The Hokies, behind a record-breaking performance from guard Amy Wetzel, surprised sixth-seeded Wisconsin, which was ranked No. 23 at the time, 75-64. Wetzel set a Tech record and tied an NCAA West Region free throw mark by converting 16 free throws for a careerhigh 28 points. The Hokies, however, would bow out after round two as host Florida, ranked No. 12, won 89-57. Wetzel again led all scorers with 24 points.

• The Hokies used the 1999 season to establish themselves as one of the nation's elite programs. Henrickson led Tech to a schoolrecord 28-3 finish, including a 15-1 Atlantic 10 mark. Cassell Coliseum was the site for NCAA first and second round games. The Hokies dispatched Saint Peter's, 73-48, before defeating Auburn, 76-61, to earn the program's first "Sweet 16" appearance. Tech traveled to Greensboro, N.C., to face second-ranked Tennessee in the NCAA East Regional. Behind 27 points from national player of the year Chamique Holdsclaw, the Volunteers eliminated Tech, 68-52, to advance.

• Virginia Tech posted its third consecutive 20-win season under Henrickson in 2000. The Hokies posted a 20-11 record and made their first-ever appearence in the Women's National Invitational Tournament. Cassell Coliseum was the site of the first round matchup against Georgia State. The Hokies used a 12-3 run midway through the second half to break open a close contest and went on to win 80-56. Maryland was the WNIT "Sweet Sixteen" opponent two days later and the two teams battled into overtime. The Terrapins used a 10-2 run in the last 3:11 of the extra session to eliminate the Hokies, 68-60.

Henrickson's Hokies

The Virginia Tech women's basketball program has enjoyed tremendous success in Bonnie Henrickson's four years as head coach, averaging 23 wins a season and playing in the postseason each of those seasons.

Under Henrickson, the Hokies have won 78 of their last 102 games (76.5 percent), dating back to Feb. 14, 1998. Henrickson's 1998-99 squad was the fastest in school history to reach 20 wins, doing it in 21 games. The 1997-98 team needed 29 games to accomplish the feat and the 1999-00 team did it in 30 games. Last season the Hokies reached the 20-win plateau in 27 games.

Across the State

Under Coach Bonnie Henrickson, the Hokies have posted a 16-3 overall record against teams that hail from the state of Virginia, 10-0 at home and 6-3 on the road. Henrickson's teams have won eight consecutive games against in-state rivals.

Hokies History

With the 22-9 record in 2000-2001, Virginia Tech posted the school's 13th winning season. Last year the Hokies registered their fourth straight and seventh 20-plus win season in the past nine years. Henrickson has been part of all seven 20-win squads, three as an assistant and four as head coach. Tech's best-ever season was the 28-3 mark registered by Henrickson's 1999 team.


Tech in the Polls

Under Coach Bonnie Henrickson, the Hokies were ranked 20 straight weeks in the nation's Top 25, dating from Dec. 7, 1998 to Dec. 20, 1999. Since Henrickson became the head coach in 1997, the Hokies were ranked for the first time in a 1998-99 preseason poll, ranking 22nd in *Street & Smith's* preseason publication. The Hokies also received 23 votes in The Associated Press Top 25 poll and 18

votes in the USA Today/ESPN poll. Tech continued to receive votes until reaching Top 25 status in both polls, ranking 22nd. The Hokies stayed in both polls the entire season, reaching as high as ninth in the Associated Press Poll and 11th in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll on February 15.

Tech received its first-ever ranking on January 17, 1995, when the Hokies entered the USA Today/ CNN/Coaches Poll at No. 24. Tech was ranked 23rd the following week and entered The Associated Press poll at No. 25.

The Hokies were ranked No. 25 in the final 2000-01 Associated Press poll. Virginia Tech received votes in the 2000-01 USA Today/ ESPN/WBCA Coaches' Preseason and Nov. 20 polls. After not receiving votes in the Nov. 27 polls, the Hokies were included in those receiving votes in all subsequent polls including the final poll with 16.

The BIG EAST Conference

One of the most significant events in Virginia Tech athletic history occurred when the it became the newest member of the BIG EAST Conference in July, 2000. This is the Hokies' third conference affiliation since 1981, when they became affiliated with the old Metro Conference. Tech held membership in the Metro from 1981 to 1995 and was in the Atlantic 10 Conference from 1995 to 2000. The current members of the BIG EAST ---regarded as perhaps the top women's basketball league in the country - are Boston College, Connecticut, Georgetown, Miami, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Providence, Rutgers, Seton Hall, St. John's, Syracuse, Villanova, Virginia Tech and West Virginia.



Hokies Face Tough Schedule

The 2001-2002 schedule is loaded with successful women's basketball programs. The Hokies face six teams that appeared in the final USA Today/ESPN/WBCA coaches poll. Tech's competition includes 2001 national champion Notre Dame, 2000 national champion and No. 3 Connecticut, No. 17 Rutgers, No. 20 LSU, No. 22 Clemson and No. 24 Villanova. The schedule also includes NCAA participants Liberty, Virginia, Old Dominion and WNIT participants James Madison and Georgetown. Last season, sixteen of the Hokies 31 games were against teams that went on to appear in the postseason. Tech had a rating of 25th in the WBCA/Summerville RPI, with a strength of schedule rated 43rd toughest in the nation. This season's opponents posted a winning percentage of .571 last year.

Beautiful Lake Geneva, in Switzerland, and the Cathedral de Notre Dame in Paris, France, were highlights of Tech's 2000 trip to Europe.

International Hokies

The Virginia Tech women's basketball program made its first international trip in the Bonnie Henrickson era when the Hokies travelled to Europe in the summer of 2000. The Hokies comfortably won all four games against competition from France and Switzerland, and enjoyed 11 days of touring Europe. Tech is scheduled to make a



summer trip to Australia in 2004. Chrystal Starling was a member of the BIG EAST All-Star team which toured Germany this summer. Starling was injured during a pre-tour practice and did not appear in any of the six games.

Love Those Hokies

The play of the Virginia Tech women's basketball program at home has not gone unnoticed by the Hokie faithful. The following has paid huge dividends for the team in its performances at the Cassell, serving as the team's sixth man on the court.

Over 7,400 fans attended the Connecticut game on Feb. 7, 2001, marking the sixth largest crowd in the history of Cassell Coliseum.

In 1999, Tech set eight of the program's ten best single-game attendance marks and averaged a record 5,221 fans per game, ranking 13th nationally. In Tech's first round NCAA Tournament win over St. Peter's, the Hokies recorded the program's first sell-out crowd with 10,052 on hand. Last season the Hokies averaged 2,826, which was 33rd best in the nation.

Defending the Cassell

Under Coach Bonnie Henrickson, the Hokies have posted a 46-12 record (.793) at Cassell Coliseum. Overall, the program has posted a 214-100 (.682) home record since the addition of women's basketball as a varsity sport in 1976-77. The Hokies were 15-0 at home in 1999 and won 18 straight regular-season home games until losing to Georgia on November 17, 1999.

Virginia Tech Athletics ASUCCESS



Virginia Tech has a long and proud tradition in athletics, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. And for the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that everything seems to be in place to allow the momentum to continue and the future looks even brighter.

The winning ways of Coach Bonnie Henrickson's Hokies, including four consecutive postseason appearances and a top 25 ranking last season, along with the skyrocketing interest in the women's basketball program are only part of the story.

Tech has gained immeasurable visibility through the recent success of Coach Frank Beamer's football team, which played for the national championship in the 2000 Sugar Bowl, and has become a perennial top 10, nationally-ranked program.

In the 1999-2000 academic year, Tech teams won conference championships in eight sports and won the Atlantic 10 Conference Commissioner's Cup for the best overall success. The 2001 men's golf team captured Tech's first non-football BIG EAST championship and finished eighth nationally. Hokie teams and individuals from a variety of sports compete every year in NCAA championships.

Tech's move into the BIG EAST Conference as a full member last year has further enhanced the quality and visibility of the Hokies' athletic program.

2001-2002 Outlook Continuing a Winning Tradition

The Hokies set their sights on another successful BIG EAST season and a fifth consecutive postseason appearance

Winning has become synonymous with every program Bonnie Henrickson has been associated with both as a player and a coach. In four seasons at Virginia Tech, Henrickson has developed the program to the point where winning and postseason play have become the rule rather than the exception.

Henrickson has guided the Hokies to a 92-33 record, three trips to the NCAA Tournament and one appearance in the WNIT, four 20+ win seasons and a fourth-place finish in their inaugural season in the BIG EAST Conference.

Tech won its first-round NCAA Tournament game in 1998, finished in the "Sweet 16" in 1999, advanced to the WNIT "Sweet Sixteen" in 2000 and advanced to the NCAA Second Round last season. The program also garnered national attention with a No. 25 ranking in the Associated Press final ranking just prior to the NCAA Tournament.


With each year's success, the expectations for the following season have risen and this season is no exception. The Hokies will look to improve their BIG EAST success in one of the toughest conferences in the nation and advance to the postseason for a fifth consecutive season.

Henrickson will have to replace two of the best players in the program's history in Tere Williams and Amy Wetzel. The duo played an instrumental part in the rise of Tech women's basketball the past four years. Williams is the school's all-time rebounding leader and finished her career second in career scoring. She also became the first Virginia Tech women's player drafted by the WNBA after being selected in the third round by the Phoenix Mercury. Wetzel is Tech's career leader in minutes played and free throws made. She was probably best known for her outstanding defensive play and was named the 2000 Atlantic10 Defensive Player of the Year following her junior season.

"I have said all along that we will not replace Amy and Tere with two players but with several players," said Henrickson. "They were both special players who had very different playing styles and different leadership abilities and we will look to fill their void by committee."

Three starters and nine letterwinners return from last year's 22-9 squad, including five seniors. That group, along with two juniors and a talented group of newcomers, will present several different looks to the Hokies' opponents this season.

"Our strength will be the ability to spread the wealth to where the opposition will not be able to key in on one player and hope to stop us," said Henrickson. "We have players who bring very different styles

to the table. We have balance and depth with players who are spot-up shooters, slashers, post players who can shoot from the perimeter as well as post-up down low, so I think we bring a wide variety of an attack offensively."

Defense has also been a key component to the success of the program under Henrickson and this year's edition of the Hokies will look to continue that tradition. "Defense starts with guarding the ball-handler and we are looking for someone to step up and fill that role which is where Amy excelled for us," said Henrickson. "With our added depth, we will look to extend the floor defensively with the hope of wearing the opposition down with our bench and forcing them to use their bench. I have said all along that I would like to do that defensively, and this may be the first year that we have had the depth to do just that."

Sarah Hicks (6-0, Sr., G/F, Roanoke, Va.) and Chrystal Starling (5-11, Sr., G, Syracuse, N.Y.), both All-BIG EAST candidates, head the list of returnees for the 2001-02 season. Hicks, a pure shooter who is second on the Virginia Tech career three-point field goals made list with 93, was third on the team in scoring (9.7), first in three-point field goals (42), second in field goals made (107), second in minutes (28.9), second in assists (2.7) and tied for second in steals (29). Hicks has also developed into an outstanding rebounder, finishing second on the team last year in rebounds (5.3) and first in defensive rebounds (4.0)

Starling was second in scoring (10.5) coming off the Tech bench last season. She scored in double figures 17 times and led the BIG EAST in free throw percentage (93-107, .869). Starling was second in field goals made (108) and tied for second in three-point field goals (15) in addition to finishing third on the team in free throws made (93), steals (27) and blocks (14). She also pulled down five of more rebounds in a game 12 times. Starling came up big for the Hokies late in the season scoring 21 points against No. 23 Villanova in the BIG EAST Tournament and leading Tech with 20 points in the NCAA First Round victory over Denver.

Perhaps the biggest surprise last season was the play of leva Kublina (6-4, So., C, Riga, Latvia). As a freshman, Kublina played in all 31 games and scored in double figures 11 times. She led the team and was among the BIG EAST leaders in blocks (35), was fifth on the team in scoring (7.8), third in rebounds (5.0), second in offensive rebounds (1.8), fourth in three-point field goals (13) and fourth in free throws made (55). Kublina made her presence felt in the first of three meetings with eventual national champion Notre Dame. Coming off the bench, Kublina scored 11 points, including three treys, with three rebounds and one assist playing against Ruth Riley, the 2001 National Player of the Year.

Nicole Jones (6-1, Sr., F/C, Vienna, Va.) returns for her senior season. Jones underwent emergency appendectomy surgery on Feb. 13 and missed the West Virginia and Boston College games. She was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2000 Lady Luck Classic and has recorded 28 career double figure scoring games. She was sixth on the team in scoring (5.1) and rebounding (3.4) and fourth in total blocks (9).

Other returning letterwinners include Lisa Guarneri (5-8, Sr. G, Piscataway, N.J.), Emily Lipton (5-7, Jr., G, Crofton, Md.), Christina Strother (6-2, Jr., C, Capitol Heights, Md.), Mollie Owings (5-9, Sr., G, Hyattsville, Md.) and Davina Simmons (6-0, So., F, Winston-Salem, N.C.). Guarneri, who sat out the first eight games of the season to fulfill NCAA residency requirements after transferring from Illinois, and

Lipton split time at the point guard position for much of the year. Guarneri saw action in 23 games with 15 starts and handed out a career-high 10 assists at West Virginia. Lipton, who will see considerable playing time again this season, scored a career-high 11 points against Liberty in the season opener. Strother, who had arthroscopic surgery on her right shoulder on March 20, will provide depth at both the power forward and center positions this season. Owings will be used mostly at shooting guard after seeing action in 18 games last season. Simmons, who missed most of the season after undergoing surgery on her right knee in mid-January, will add depth at the small forward position.

Five newcomers have been added to the Tech roster for the upcoming season. Rayna Dubose (6-3, Fr., C, Columbia, Md.), Erin Gibson (6-2, Fr., C, Galax, Va.), Kacy O'Brien (5-11, Fr, G, Pittsburgh, Pa. and Fran Recchia (5-7, Fr., G, Flower Mound, Tex.) form one of the Hokies' best recruiting classes. Amy Lingenfelder (5-8, So., G, Fairfax, Va.), a transfer from Georgia Tech, will be eligible to play Dec. 21 against James Madison after fulfilling the NCAA residency requirements.

The 2000-01 schedule was one of the toughest in school history and this season's lineup will be just as difficult featuring some of the top teams in the nation. The non-conference slate will be similar to last year including home dates against NCAA participants Clemson and Old Dominion along with Richmond. The Hokies will once again host the Lady Luck Classic featuring Elon, Gardner-Webb and Hampton.

The non-conference away schedule sends the Hokies to Liberty (five-straight NCAA Tournament appearances), James Madison (WNIT semifinalist), Radford (New River Valley rival) and at archrival and NCAA participant Virginia. The Hokies will travel to Baton Rouge, La., to participate in the LSU Thanksgiving tournament hosted by the Lady Tigers who advanced to the NCAA Second Round before losing to national runner-up Purdue by three points. Middle Tennessee State and Northwestern (La.) State round out the tournament field. The non-conference home schedule includes Richmond, Old Dominion, Clemson and the Lady Luck Classic.

"We are excited about the non-conference schedule with return games against most of last season's opponents," said Henrickson. "We have added the LSU Thanksgiving tournament which gives our schedule the SEC presence that we have looked for the last couple of years. Exposing our players to different styles and different areas of the country will, in the long run, make us better."

The BIG EAST Conference schedule will once again present the Hokies with the challenge of facing some of the top teams in the nation. Defending national champion Notre Dame, 2001 Final Four and 2000 national champion Connecticut along with nationally-ranked programs including Rutgers and Villanova comprise just a part of the demanding 16-game conference schedule. Tech's away opponents include Connecticut, Miami, Georgetown, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Providence, Syracuse and Villanova. Tech will host Boston College, Connecticut, Miami, Rutgers, St. John's, Seton Hall,

Villanova and West Virginia in Cassell Coliseum where the Hokies are 46-12 (.793) under Henrickson.

"The BIG EAST will be tough once again and like last year will present us with the opportunity to compete against some of the best teams in the nation," added Henrickson. "We were exposed to the BIG EAST style of play and travelled to cities we had never been to before so I was pleased with our overall play in the conference. This season we will know what to expect which should help us be even more prepared for the conference portion of our schedule."

The women's basketball staff underwent some changes during the off-season. Top assistant and recruiting coordinator Joe Mathews was selected as the women's head coach at Towson University and second assistant Tisha Hill left the staff to pursue other coaching interests. Angie Lee, a long-time colleague of Henrickson, will serve as the recruiting coordinator. Lee and Henrickson were members of the same coaching staffs at both Western Illinois and Iowa. Karen Lange has been promoted to the second assistant position and Katie Patton (formerly O'Connor) has been promoted from administrative assistant to third assistant. Kyra Elzy, a member of two University of Tennessee national championship teams, will serve as administrative assistant for Tech this season.

"I am very excited about the two additions and the two promotions that we made with our staff," said Henrickson. " I believe we have a group that is committed to young women and developing them as people and players. The returning players were able to meet the new staff members before the end of the spring semester and I feel the transition will be a smooth one for our team."

Point Guard

Lisa Guarneri and Emily Lipton will again battle for the starting point guard position with both seeing considerable playing time. Both players had good spring and summer workouts and will counted on to


direct the Hokies offensively this year. Lipton played in 30 games last season, 15 as a starter, averaging 15.2 minutes per game. She was third on the team in assists (1.6) and will look to step up both her assists and her scoring this season.

Guarneri handed out 82 assists (3.6/ gm) while averaging 2.6 points per game after transferring from Illinois. She suffered a broken thumb just prior to her Virginia Tech debut at Clemson but still saw action against the Tigers. Guarneri worked on her outside shooting during the off-season and will be looked upon to provide a scoring threat from the perimeter.

"The point guard position is still somewhat of a question mark for us," said Henrickson. **The Hol** "I have said all along **Guarne** that either Lisa or Emily can step up and rise to the occasion to win the starting job or it can be done by committee. I really don't have a preference other than we have to get better at the position than we have been the last two years."

"I believe that either one or both are capable of improving their ball-handling skills, making better passing decisions and in general taking control of the team on the floor. They need to assume the responsibility and accountability of playing the point guard position for a top 25 basketball program which both have the ability to accomplish."

Fran Recchia could also see playing time at the point as a freshman. She averaged 15.8 points and 4.8 steals her senior year and was named to the *Fort Worth Star Telegram* "All Area" First Team. Recchia is a definite scoring threat from the outside, as she set a school

record at Marcus (Tex.) High School with nine three-pointers in a game.

"Fran has had the best high school experience to prepare a player to play the point guard position at the collegiate level," said Henrickson. "The system Fran played in high school is similar to what she will see in college where she was required to call various patterns. Fran understood where each player was supposed to be in the offensive set which is essential for a point guard."

"She is an offensive threat and shoots the ball well from behind the arc which is an added bonus that might allow us to play her at the shooting guard position as well. We understand the transition for a freshman player to the collegiate game is tough and even tougher at the point guard position so we will not rush Fran into the lineup until she is ready."

Shooting Guard

Chrystal Starling will see the bulk of the playing time at the shooting guard position after coming off the bench last season to finish as the Hokies' second-leading scorer. Mollie Owings will provide depth at the position as well.

Starling provides instant offense for Tech as she possess the ability to shoot the pull-up jumper or drive to the basket. She proved equally effective in drawing fouls on drives to the basket and getting to the free throw line where she led the BIG EAST in shooting percentage. Starling made 56 of her last 60 free throw attempts (.933) last season and led the Hokies in scoring and rebounding six times.

Owings saw action in 18 games last season and will be looked upon to back up Starling and distribute the ball to the post.

"Chrystal and Mollie give us the ability to not only create shots for themselves but also to create shots and drop passes to their teammates," said Henrickson. "Both also have the ability to help defensively by picking up the opponent's point guard and exerting more pressure."

Amy Lingenfelder will add another scoring threat from behind the arc. She averaged 7.9 points as a freshman at Georgia Tech and started 11 of the Yellow Jackets' last 12 games.

"Amy will add much needed help to our three-point attack," said Henrickson. "Her ability to shoot the three will open up the paint for our post players."

Small Forward

Sarah Hicks returns for her senior season following a tremendous junior year. The Roanoke, Va., native once again led the Hokies from behind the arc with 42 treys, including four in back-to-back games at Richmond and Rutgers. Hicks had perhaps her best game of the year in Tech's BIG EAST debut at Rutgers against the nationally-ranked Scarlet Knights. She scored 18 points, had nine rebounds and four assists to go along with the four three-pointers. Hicks continued her improvement as a rebounder, pulling down five or more rebounds 18 times last season and averaging 6.9 rebounds in the final 13 games of the season.

"Sarah had a fantastic junior year and matured as a player in understanding that she was more than just a shooter," said Henrickson. "She became a better defender and rebounder and we expect her to have an even better senior year with the growth and maturity she exhibited at the end of last season."

Starling may also see time at small forward along with sophomore Davina Simmons and freshman Kacy O'Brien, who scored over 2,000 points at Carlynton (Pa.) High School. Simmons missed most of last season after undergoing surgery on her right knee in mid-January.

"Davina has worked hard in the off-season to rehabilitate her knee and we look for her to contribute this season," said Henrickson. "She can penetrate off the dribble and is a good rebounder and brings great athleticism to the position when she is healthy."

O'Brien is a versatile player on both the offensive and defensive ends of the floor. She could see increased playing time as the season progresses in order to give Hicks a rest.

"Kacy has a tremendous basketball I.Q.," said Henrickson. "I like the intensity she displayed in high school and she is a great defender as well as a scorer. Kacy will give us some much needed depth at small forward. There were times last year when Sarah had to play too many minutes and she will help us in this area."

Power Forward

Nicole Jones returns for her senior season and will look to be more of a force on the inside this year. Jones, the Most Valuable Player in the 2000 Lady Luck Classic, saw her production fall off last season battling against some of the best post players in the nation in the BIG EAST Conference. Jones tallied 17 points and eight rebounds in the Lady Luck championship game vs. Maine and pulled down five or more rebounds in nine games. Just one week after undergoing emergency appendectomy surgery, Jones returned to the lineup to score seven points against Providence.

"I think Nicole Jones is ready to have a great senior year," said Henrickson. "I really liked what I saw from Nicole last year when she stepped up and had good performances in the games that Tere Williams was injured. She had a good spring and worked hard on improving her play facing the basket, which will help open up the inside for us."

A pleasant surprise for the Hokies last season was the rapid development of freshman leva Kublina, who proved to be a force on both ends of the floor. Kublina brings versatility to the Tech lineup, where opponents have to guard her both on the perimeter as well as on the inside. Kublina shot 34.2 percent from behind the arc last season and connected on three treys in games against both Notre Dame and Georgetown. In her first collegiate start, at West Virginia, she responded with 11 points, 11 rebounds and four blocks.

"leva is very skilled on the perimeter which will allow her to play at either the power forward or center positions," Henrickson said. "We feel like she can have similar numbers to those Tere Williams had as a sophomore but acquire them in much different way. With all of the things she had to overcome last season, such as the language barrier, being away from home and adjusting to how much more physical and faster the game is played at this level, I thought she handled those things very well and had a great freshman season."

A couple of freshmen will provide depth at the position. Erin Gibson and Rayna Dubose, while having the height for the post position, could also see playing time at small forward with each contributing in a different manner. Gibson is an excellent passer and has the ability to distribute the basketball from the high post while Dubose, much like Kublina, has three-point

Continued from previous page range which can be used to draw the defense out of the paint.

"Erin and Rayna have the necessary skill level to face the basket but they have different offensive talents," said Henrickson. "All of our post players have the ability to also play power forward which gives us the flexibility on offense to attack the basket in a number of ways."

Center

In addition to the small forwards who will also see time in the post, Christina Strother returns for her junior season. Strother was hampered by a shoulder injury all of last year and underwent arthroscopic surgery on her right shoulder just after the 2001-02 campaign. She is expected to be at full strength by the start of the season. With Williams out of the lineup and Jones playing in her first game since the emergency appendectomy, Strother played one of her best games of the year against Providence, scoring nine points with seven rebounds, two blocks and one steal.

"Chrissy has the potential to be a rebounding force when she is healthy and we will look for her to continue to make strides in her post play," said Henrickson. "Also, as the freshmen grow accustomed to the physical play on the inside at the collegiate level, our overall depth will improve greatly and allow us to use different rotations as the situation dictates."

Outlook

The loss of Tere Williams and Amy Wetzel will present this year's edition of the Virginia Tech women's basketball team with big shoes to fill both on and off the court. A returning class, including three starters and nine letterwinners, will provide the Hokies with an experienced group that realizes what it takes to compete on the national level. The returnees, along with the outstanding recruiting class, will provide Tech with one of its most versatile and athletic rosters to date.

The combination of experience and youth along with a winning tradition makes the possibility of a fifth 20-win season and another postseason appearance a very obtainable goal. The foundation is in place for continued success as the Hokies head into the season.

"Our seniors had great spring and summer practices and are ready for outstanding seasons," said Henrickson. "We have a combination of players who are willing to lead and those who are willing to be led and you have to have those two components in a team. Our young players respect what the upperclassmen have been through and what it has taken for them to be successful."

"Leaders will emerge as the year progresses and each of our seniors brings something a little different to the table. The seniors have prepared themselves to be leaders and I'm excited about all of our player's efforts as we prepare to start the season."

Bonnie HEAD WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH One of the Best

Bonnie Henrickson bas guided ber team to at least 20 wins and into postseason play in each of ber four years as a bead coach

Bonnie Henrickson is no stranger to success, and she continues to establish herself as one of the nation's brightest young coaches.

In four seasons as the head mentor at Virginia Tech, Henrickson, 38, has led the Hokies to a 92-33 record, three trips to the NCAA Tournament and their first trip the Women's National Invitation Tournament in 2000. Henrickson's 2000-01 team became the seventh 20plus win team in Hokie history and her fourth straight as the Virginia Tech head coach.

Last year Henrickson may have given her best performance as a head coach, leading the Hokies to a 22-9 overall record. The Hokies posted an 11-5 record and a fourth-place finish in Tech's inaugural season in the BIG EAST Conference.

In July 2000, she was the head coach of the women's USA Basketball R. William Jones Cup team that traveled to Taiwan for the Jones Cup competition and won the gold medal. This appointment marked her second stint working with a USA Basketball team, but first as the head coach.

In 1999, after losing one of the best senior classes to graduation and battling injuries all year long, Henrickson did an outstanding job keeping the squad together and focused on its goals. Her team advanced to the second round of the WNIT with a 20-11 record overall, marking the thirdstraight winning season in as many years, third trip to postseason play and third 20win season for Tech.

Her 1998-99 Hokies posted a school-best 28-3 record, including a trip to the NCAA Sweet 16. For her efforts, Henrickson was singled out as Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year after the Hokies finished 15-1 in conference play. She also was a finalist for national coach of the year honors. She was selected to be an assistant coach on Team USA that won the silver medal in Spain in the summer of 1999, competing in the World University games.

Entering the Tech position in 1997-98 with 10 years of collegiate coaching experience, Henrickson led the Hokies to a 22-10 mark, the second round of the NCAAs and the biggest turnaround in school history.

Her first season in Blacksburg also brought the school's first Atlantic 10 championship, its 300th win and two All-Americans. Henrickson's success didn't just begin with the 1997-98 season. Her previous four years as an assistant coach produced four trips to the NCAA Tournament and four conference titles — two each with Tech and the University of lowa.

Bonnie Henrickson

Henrickson's stint at Iowa also produced a Sweet 16 appearance by the Hawkeyes in 1996 and two Big 10 Conference Championships. In her two years, Iowa was a combined 45-14, 27-4 in 1996 and 18-10 in 1997. Her final contribution to Iowa before leaving for Tech was the signing of a recruiting class that ranked 18th in the nation.

Prior to taking the Iowa position, Henrickson helped the Hokies enjoy their greatest success to that point in her seven years as Carol Alfano's top assistant. Tech registered three consecutive 20-win seasons from 1993 to 1995 and earned the school's first NCAA appearances in 1994 and 1995 while Henrickson served as associate head coach.

While she served as Tech's recruiting coordinator during her stay in Blacksburg, Henrickson was credited with signing some of the Hokies' biggest stars. Included in her list of impressive signees are former Hokies Christi Osborne and Jenny Root. Osborne was a three-time GTE Academic All-American while Root finished her career as the Hokies' alltime leading rebounder and earned Kodak Honorable

Mention All-America honors. Root also was tabbed 1995 Metro Conference Player of the Year.

Henrickson recruited All-American Lisa Witherspoon as well as such career statistical leaders as Michelle Houseright and Katie O'Connor. She was also the first Tech coach to evaluate Tech standout Tere Williams.

Henrickson, a Willmar, Minn., native, graduated from St. Cloud State University in 1986. As a player, she helped SCSU win three Northern Sun Conference championships and advance to three NCAA Division Il quarterfinals. In her four years as a player, Henrickson helped SCSU compile a 97-25 overall record including a 31-4 mark in her sophomore season. She still ranks among the school leaders in points (4th - 1,731), rebounds (3rd - 995), free throws (1st - 507) and free throw percentage (4th - .790). She also was named to the allconference team three times. Henrickson served as team captain as a junior and senior.

She later earned her master's in physical education from Western Illinois University in 1988 while serving as a graduate assistant coach with the women's basketball team.

Virginia Tech has made four consecutive postseason appearances, including three trips to the NCAA Tournament. To what do you attribute this continued success at such a high level?

We have been fortunate to have very talented players in the program who are committed to accepting the philosophy and the challenges that were set by the staff. The tremendous leadership provided by the juniors and seniors every year has been extremely important and has allowed us, in a very short period of time, to create a history and tradition of what is expected of every team each year. Also, the athletic department has made a tremendous commitment to the program by providing us with all the resources necessary to develop a great schedule and recruit on a national level.

Given the great success of the program, how do you think this year's team will respond to such high standards?

This group of players has never experienced anything but winning, so they don't expect to be anything but successful. You hope this attitude is passed along from class to class and I believe this year's team has a full understanding of what it takes to get to the postseason. The challenge for the upperclassmen is to communicate to the incoming players the amount of commitment, hard work and unselfishness they must have to continue our success. I think we have demonstrated this winning attitude with every team where our best players have given us the best effort. When you do that you can be successful and I feel like we still have that attitude in place with our upperclass this season.

After finishing fourth in Tech's inaugural season in the BIG EAST, what were your impressions of the league and how will last year's experience help in your second season in the conference?

I was pleased with the fourth-place finish in the BIG EAST. I thought we handled all of the newness in the league very well since we had never played anyone in the conference before last year. The last two games of the regular season were on the road against teams we had never seen before in unfamiliar surroundings. That creates a situation where the players have a great deal of information to absorb in a short time. This year we will have a comfort level in that we will know the opponents better and we will be more familiar with their facilities.

The conference was as good as it was touted to be and was competitive for us from top to bottom. Our fourthplace finish was where I thought we should be going into the season so I was pleased we were able to reach that expectation. I thought we continued to get better and



competed very well in the league. We played well at home against Notre Dame and at Rutgers early in the season so I think we proved we belonged and were capable of competing against the top programs in the conference. Our challenge now is to move up in the league.

How do you replace two of the Hokies best-ever players in Tere Williams and Amy Wetzel?

I have said all along that we will not replace Amy and Tere with two players but with several players. They were both special athletes who had very different playing styles and different leadership abilities. It would be asking too much to ask two players to step in and replace them, but we have some young players who have played major roles in the past and those roles will be increased this season. Our returning group of players has worked hard to prepare for the season and they knew the time would come when Amy and Tere would not be there. The experience Amy had in handling pressure situations at the end of games can only be duplicated by our younger players experiencing that same kind of pressure. We will have to replace Tere's numbers differently by having everyone rebound better and we will put some new things into the offense and be better at the things we have done in the past. We have a chance to be a better defensive team which hopefully will create more offensive opportunities and we bring a wide variety of offensive skills to the table.

How has the team reacted to the coaching staff changes?

We were fortunate to be able to handle the transition as smoothly as we did in that we were able to get the staff in place before the players left for the summer. The players had a least a couple of weeks to work with the two new members of the staff as well as learning the new roles of the two internal promotions. The staff did a good job of communicating with the players over the summer through working the summer camps, phone conversations and email. Kyra Elzy brings the experience of working with a program that competes for national championship every year. She also has a master's degree in sports psychology and has some great ideas which will help our players focus even better. Angie's experience as a head coach as well as our friendship and professional relationship for the last 13 years made the decision to bring her into the program an easy one. She brings both a wealth of experience and enthusiasm to the team. It has been interesting to watch the players reaction to her because she has a very different style than any other member of the staff but she has already had a positive effect on the team. Karen played for both Angie and I at Iowa and Katie played for me at Tech, so the four of us have been through some battles together. I am very excited about working with the staff and look forward to the season ahead.

How has affiliation with the BIG EAST Conference helped in your recruiting efforts?

The opportunity to sell the BIG EAST has played a major role in our ability to attract a better player to the program. Great players want to play both with and against great players in front of great fans. We bring all three of those components together at Virginia Tech. We believe the affiliation with the BIG EAST was the final piece of the puzzle in the development of the program.

Why should a student-athlete consider playing at Virginia Tech?

We are fortunate to have the opportunity to be a part of one of the finest academic institutions in the nation. Virginia Tech offers a diversity in its academic curriculum that is hard to match by anyone. Whatever academic interests a

BONNIE'S PHILOSOPHY

"When I was hired in the spring of 1997, I communicated very clearly to our team that we would compete in the classroom just as we do on the basketball court In our first team meeting in the fall we established goals for the year. The first goal was to achieve the highest GPA of any team in our program's history. Upon researching the numbers, we achieved the goal after our first academic semester. The quality of education at Virginia Tech is and has been nationally recognized for years. Our student athletes have the opportunity to use the resources on campus and we believe our best resources are our faculty. Over 90% of our classes are taught by full-time faculty who are attracted to Virginia Tech because of its commitment to research. Last spring over 60% of our team was recognized by the Athletic Department at a spring luncheon after having achieved a GPA of 3.0 or better. They were then named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll.

"As we recruit student athletes, not only is the quality of play a priority but the quality of the person. We have first class citizens who are tremendous role models to the young children in this community. The qualities we look for are honesty, integrity and self-discipline. We select people who are overachievers and who won't settle for less from themselves or those around them. Our student athletes are outstanding representatives of Virginia Tech.

"On the court, we look for young women who possess qualities that are the backbone of every great team. Communication, trust, collective responsibility, caring and pride. We want players who are unselfish; who expect to work hard; who play with a huge heart and who are willing to pay the price for our team to be successful. These young women realize they are part of something bigger than themselves.

"Our family here in Blacksburg is a unique makeup of people from very diverse backgrounds. The common thread that runs through every family member is loyalty to each other. The people in our program are caring, giving, respectful and committed to each other not just as teammates and coaches but as sisters, brothers, dads and moms. The life skills we learn everyday on the basketball court, in lockerrooms, airports and hotels will forever be a part of how we react to employers, employees, husbands and children. We are learning and creating habits that last a lifetime.

"There isn't a day that goes by that I don't get an email, note, phone call or stopped for a conversation by an individual about the impact one of my players has had on them or someone in their life. I am proud to have my players as daughters for the rest of my life."

prospective female studentathlete might have will be offered on our campus. The quality of the degree as well as the opportunity to network nationally after graduation with alumni who are in hiring positions is fantastic here. We continue to receive feedback on how surprised our recruits are to see how many Virginia Tech graduates they come in contact with throughout the country and how many Tech stickers they now see. The climate of the campus and the surrounding area make this a true college town. We are one of the top entertainment opportunities for people in Southwest Virginia which excites players in knowing they are going to perform in front of large crowds every night.



Angie Lee joined the Virginia Tech staff in May of this year and brought with her an impressive resume.

Lee was a member of the University of Iowa women's basketball staff for 11 years as both an assistant and head coach. After serving as assistant coach from 1989-1995, Lee was named as the head coach and quickly made her presence felt throughout the Big Ten Conference.

In the first three seasons under Lee, the Hawkeyes captured the Big Ten regular season championship in '96 and '98 and won the Big Ten tournament in 1997. Lee was named the 1996 Associated Press Division I Coach of the Year after guiding Iowa to a 27-4 season and an appearance in the NCAA "Sweet 16."

Lee served as an assistant coach for the 1998 USA Basketball Jones Cup team which posted a 5-0 record in Taipai, Taiwan. In her career, Lee has coached four WNBA and ABL players.

Prior to her years at Iowa, Lee was an assistant coach at Western Illinois University. At WIU, Lee met Tech head coach Bonnie Henrickson who was a



graduate assistant. Henrickson served for two years on Lee's staff at Iowa before becoming head coach at Virginia Tech.

At Tech, Lee oversees the Hokies' recruiting efforts. She served in similiar positions as an assistant coach at both Western Illinois and Iowa.

A few moments with Coach Lee

What attracted you to become an assistant coach at Virginia Tech?

First and foremost was my friendship and working relationship with Bonnie. I have tremendous respect for her as a person and also for the vision that she has for this program. Our beliefs and philosophies are very similar. Second, it was important to see that the administration here has made a commitment to the women's basketball program not only from a financial standpoint, but also in their support of Bonnie's vision for the program, which must be in place to compete at the highest level. Third, this is a great academic institution in a wonderful community where young adults have a great opportunity to learn and grow.

What is your recruiting philosophy?

Recruiting is about balance and getting the right fit. It is taking the time to know them not only as players but also as people. Recruiting is like putting a puzzle together, you can't force the pieces to fit and then expect it to stay together, you have to work with the pieces until they naturally fit in place, and once in place they hold together to make the big picture.

What are the keys to being a successful recruiter?

A successful recruiter is someone that totally and completely believes in the head coach and the vision that coach has for the program. A successful recruiter is someone who can be themselves, who is honest, dedicated and cares about something bigger than themselves. A recruiter must be persistent and have the ability to talk with all kinds of people, from all walks of life, and care about those people and their life.

Lee also is responsible for coaching Tech's talented post players.

A 1984 graduate of the University of lowa, Lee has a bachelor's degree in physical education and received a master's degree in athletic administration and philosophy of sport from lowa in 1987.

Since joining the Tech staff, Karen Lange has been a part of four of the Hokies' most memorable seasons including last year with the Hokies' entrance into the BIG EAST Conference.

Lange, formerly Clayton, underwent a name change in June 2000 when she was married to Cory Lange.

Lange, now in her fifth season on the Hokies' bench, came to Tech after a standout career at the University of Iowa. In her time as the Hawkeyes' point guard, Lange received All-Big Ten Conference and academic all-conference nods, in addition to leading Iowa to an appearance in the NCAA Final Four in 1993.






What aspect of your new position do you look most forward to?







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BIGEAST DEDUT

Hokies' first year in new conference a big success, with 22 wins and a trip to the NCAA tourney

The challenges awaiting the 2000-01 Virginia Tech squad entering the season would have been intimidating to many teams. However, the difficulty of competing for the first time in the BIG EAST Conference, one of the strongest leagues in the nation, and meeting the high standards set by the three previous teams were not only met but exceeded by head coach Bonnie Henrickson's fourth edition.

The luxury of having five starters returning from the 1999-00 team, which produced a 20-11 record and advanced to the "Sweet 16" of the WNIT, proved invaluable. The Hokies were ready to embark on a journey through a regular season schedule which would feature 14 games vs. teams that advanced to the 2001 NCAA Tournament as well as one contest against a WNIT Final Four participant.

Tech responded to the challenge with a 22-9 overall record, an 11-5 mark and fourth-place finish in the BIG EAST Conference, a first-round bye in the conference tournament, and the Hokies' third appearance in the NCAA Tournament in the past four years. The program continued to make an impact on the national level with victories over Top 25 teams Virginia and Villanova (twice) and wins over NCAA participants Liberty and Old Dominion. The Hokies also were ranked No. 25 in the March 11 Associated Press Poll The Hokies celebrate a big win during their first season in the tough BIG EAST.

just prior to the start of the NCAA Tournament.

For the third consecutive season, Tech opened its season against in-state rival Liberty. Senior Tere Williams scored a game-high 17 points and pulled down eight rebounds as Tech broke open a tight game in the second half to win, 72-51. Liberty would go on to win the Big South Conference Tournament and advance to the NCAA Tournament.

James Madison was next on the schedule and the Hokies placed four players in double figures, led by senior Amy Wetzel's 18 points and six assists, to defeat JMU, 78-60. Williams again played an instrumental role as she recorded the 24th doubledouble of her career with 13 points and 10 rebounds against the Dukes. JMU would go on to post a 23-10 record and advance to the WNIT Final Four.

Tallahassee, Fla., was the site for Tech's first road trip of the season as the Hokies played in the Tallahassee Democrat Classic hosted by Florida State University. Michigan State was the firstround opponent and the Spartans could manage only 21.7 percent from the field and 36 points against the tough Tech defense as the Hokies cruised to a 50-36 win. However, the Thanksgiving visit to the Sunshine State turned cloudy in the championship

game with a 77-57 loss to Florida State. The Seminoles shot 51.9 percent and controlled the boards 35-25 to hand Tech its first loss of the season. Williams and junior Sarah Hicks were named to the All-Tournament team.

Next up for the Hokies was the annual showdown with arch-rival Virginia. Tech trailed 45-33 with 11:32 remaining but responded with a 24-11 run, including Wetzel's running, 10footer off the glass with only 3.7 seconds remaining, to give the Hokies a 57-56 win over the 17th-ranked Cavaliers.

Williams and Hicks each recorded double-doubles in Tech's next outing at Richmond, and the Hokies needed both performances to narrowly pick up a 77-74 victory. Junior Chrystal Starling hit two free throws with one second left to seal the win. Williams scored 19 points with 11 rebounds while Hicks dropped in 16 points, including four treys, and tied a careerhigh with 10 rebounds. Hicks also handed out a career-high seven assists in the victory.

The schedule-makers did Virginia Tech no favors as the Hokies made their BIG EAST Conference debut at No. 7 Rutgers. Tech trailed by as many as 17 points in the second half but used a 12-0 run to get back in the game with 10:23 left. The Hokies, however, could get no closer and dropped a 61-53 decision. Hicks had another outstanding performance with an 18-point, nine-rebound effort including four treys.

New River Valley rival Radford proved to be no match for the Hokies as Tech opened the game with a 15-0 run and never looked back in crushing the Highlanders, 71-45. Christina Strother led the way with 16 points and freshman leva Kublina had seven rebounds and three blocks.

The Hokies were anxiously awaiting the arrival of Lisa Guarneri who transferred to Tech in January from Illinois and would be eligible after fulfilling NCAA transfer requirements following the fall semester. Only days prior to her scheduled debut at Clemson, however, Guarneri broke the thumb on her right (non-shooting) hand. She still managed to play 19 minutes vs. the Tigers, but even with Guarneri, Clemson won 80-59 to hand Tech its third loss of the year.

With the BIG EAST Conference schedule looming at the start of the new year and following the loss at Clemson, the Hokies faced a pivotal game at Old Dominion. Tech responded with perhaps its best half of the season shooting 60.9 percent from the field after intermission and connecting on 17-of-19 free throws to pull away for a 69-57 victory. Williams led the Hokies with 19 points and Starling came off the bench to add 17 points.

The 11th Annual Lady Luck Classic was next on the schedule and the Hokies proved to be too much for the competition defeating UNC Asheville, 85-47 in the first round and beating Maine 79-68 in the championship game. The Hokies captured the event for the eighth time in 11 years and have now advanced to the championship game of their tournament every year. Nicole Jones was voted the Most Valuable Player after her 17point, eight rebound effort in the championship game and Tere Williams was named to the All-Tournament team.

With the coming of the new year, eventual national champion Notre Dame made its first appearance in Blacksburg. The game also marked Tech's first-ever BIG EAST home game and the Hokies proved to be up to the task. Despite Notre Dame connecting on 16-of-18 free throws and shooting 52.8 percent from the field, the Hokies still had a chance for victory in the game's waning moments.

After trailing by 10 at the half, Tech pulled to within three points with 3:34 remaining before the Irish closed the game on an 11-3 run to win, 75-64. All-America center Ruth Riley was dominant on the inside, leading the Irish with 27 points and eight rebounds. Williams led the Hokies with 17 points but the surprise of the

game was the play of Kublina who had 11 points, including three, three-point baskets, in only 15 minutes of action against Riley who would be voted the National Player of the Year at the end of the season.

Tech picked up its first BIG EAST victory with a dominating 64-51 win over Miami. The Hokies led by as many as 26 points in the second half behind Williams' 25th career double-double. The Chapel Hill, N.C. native dropped in 22 points and pulled down 12 rebounds to lead the way.

A return trip to South Bend, Ind. to face Notre Dame for the second time in 10 days was next on the agenda. However, the afternoon proved to be a long one as the Fighting Irish jumped out to a 19-4 lead on the way to a 75-55 win.

Despite a 1-3 conference record, the Hokies had played three of their first four BIG EAST games against top-10 opposition. Tech was set to begin to make its mark on the league by winning 10 of its last 12 regular season games.

The Hokies captured their initial BIG EAST road win with a 64-52 victory at Boston College behind a balanced scoring attack that featured four players in double figures. Following the win at Boston College, Tech evened its conference mark at 3-3 with a solid 79-50 home win over Georgetown. Kublina led the way with career-high 19 points, seven rebounds and three treys.

The first of two showdowns with nationally-ranked Villanova proved to be a true battle. Tech took a 29-24 lead into the locker room at halftime but the 24th-ranked Wildcats came out smokin' in the second half. Villanova shot 52.0 percent in the half and built a 59-52 lead with only 5:28 remaining. From that point on, the Hokies clamped down on defense and outscored the Wildcats 13-0 the rest of the way to win, 65-59.

Tech picked up two key road wins with a narrow 48-46 victory at Syracuse and a 65-54 win at Providence. After making only 2-of-5 free throws against the Orangewomen, the Hokies connected on 26-of-30 at Providence. The free throw performance against the Friars proved to be the start of some key performances by Tech at the charity stripe for the remainder of the season.

Defending national champion and third-ranked Connecticut made its Cassell Coliseum debut before 7,402 fans, the sixth-largest home crowd to witness a women's basketball contest. However, the Huskies took the crowd out the game early with a 24-4 run at the start and connected with a school record 14 treys en route to the 90-38 win.

The Hokies quickly shook off the Connecticut loss with an easy 86-50 win over Pittsburgh as Williams again led the way with 20 points. The win over the Panthers was followed by an even larger win at West Virginia where Tech used a 19-0 run late in the first half to blow the game open en route to a 92-53 victory. Starling led five players in double figures with 23 points and Hicks added 18 points and nine rebounds. Tech played without starting center Nicole Jones who had emergency appendectomy surgery the day before the game. Jones replacement, Kublina, responded by posting her first career double-double in her first collegiate start with 11 points and 11 rebounds.

The five-game winning streak came abruptly to a halt with a 65-59 overtime home loss to Boston College as Tech played again without Jones and lost Williams late in regulation after she suffered a Grade Two MCL strain to her left knee.

Senior night arrived with the availability of Jones and Williams in doubt as the Hokies hosted Providence. Jones was cleared to play early in the afternoon on game day but Williams would have to view the game from the bench in street clothes. Even though she couldn't play, Williams still made her presence known as she received a huge ovation after performing the national anthem prior to tip-off. Starling and Kublina guided Tech to a 71-64 victory with 18 points each and Kublina recorded her

second career double-double with 11 rebounds.

The battle for fourth place and a first round bye in the conference tournament was between Tech, Villanova and Seton Hall. Since the Hokies owned the tiebreaker over the Wildcats by virtue of their 65-59 win, the game at Seton Hall was critical. Only a few minutes before the game, Williams said she could play and with a brace on her left knee led the Hokies to a 52-46 win with 16 points. Wetzel also came through in the big game with 14 points. Tech connected on 26-of-30 free throws including 10-of-12 in the final five minutes to seal the victory.

The Hokies clinched fourth place in the regular season finale with a tougher than expected 62-54 win at St. John's. Once again, free throws proved to be the difference as Tech hit 16-of-21 for the game.

Virginia Tech travelled to Storrs, Conn., to make its BIG EAST Tournament debut in the

quarterfinals against No. 23 Villanova. Again the Hokies and the Wildcats played a classic game that Tech led 62-59 with 2:14 remaining in the game. Just like the earlier meeting with the Wildcats, the Hokies were

clutch in the waning moments of the game, hitting nine of 11 free throws in the final two minutes. In fact, Tech made 19 of 21 free throws for the game and was led by Starling's 21 points off the bench and Williams' 20-point, nine-rebound performance. Prior to the start of the tournament, Williams was named to the BIG EAST all-conference second team.

The Hokies were eliminated from the tournament in the semifinals by No. 1 Notre Dame, 67-49. Tech was able to limit BIG EAST Player of the Year Ruth Riley to only two points and without a field goal, however, Tech shot only 26.6 percent from the field which proved to be the Hokies undoing.

After finishing the regular season with a 21-8 record and a 11-5 mark in one of the toughest conferences in the nation, Virginia Tech was rewarded with its fifth NCAA Tournament invitation and third in the last four years. Tech was given a No. 7 seeding and traveled to Lubbock, Tex., to face 10th-seeded Denver in the first round.

The Hokies, who had broken into the Associated Press Top 25 for the first time all season at No. 25 following the BIG EAST tournament, jumped out to a 15-0 lead and never let the Pioneers into the game, winning 77-57. Tech shot 55.3 percent from the field and was 22-of-24 from the charity stripe in the victory.

The NCAA Second Round opponent was No. 13 Texas Tech on the Lady Raiders home floor. To the disappointment of a United Spirit Arena crowd of 12,161, Tech held a 25-18 lead at the half behind a suffocating defensive effort. The second half proved to

The BIG EAST Conference

Winning on the athletic fields, in the arenas and in the classroom, The BIG EAST Conference continues its mission to be successful at the highest levels.

In 2000-01, the league again was well represented on the national scene by its student-athletes for accomplishments in academics and in athletic competition.

Two national championships were added to the BIG EAST's list last year. The Connecticut men's soccer team won the 2000 College Cup to give the league its second men's soccer title in the last five years. In women's basketball, the BIG EAST became the first conference to have two different teams win the national crown in back-to-back seasons when Notre Dame hoisted the trophy at the 2001 Final Four. Connecticut had won in 2000.

Additionally, three studentathletes won individual titles in NCAA competition. Providence's Keith Kelly became the league's first NCAA men's cross country champion. Boston College runner Shannon Smith took the 3,000-meter title at the 2001

NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship and Notre Dame's Ryan Shay was the 10,000-meter champion at the outdoor meet.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. Ruth Riley, the 2000-01 BIG EAST Female academic All-America honors, including eight who were awarded first team accolades.

For three of the last seven years a BIG EAST studentathlete has won the Honda-Broderick Cup as Collegiate Woman of the Year. Notre Dame soccer player Cindy Daws won in 1997-98. She



Scholar-Athlete of the Year, was named the women's basketball national player of the year. She was also honored as the Verizon/ CoSIDA Academic All-American Team Member of the Year. Boston College soccer player Chris Hamblin, the 2000-01 BIG EAST Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year, also earned first team All-America honors. Last year, 18 student-athletes earned followed Connecticut basketball players Rebecca Lobo ('94-95) and Jennifer Rizzotti ('95-96).

BIG EAST student-athletes have continued their success after leaving the classrooms and playing fields. Former Connecticut women's basketball standout Dr. Leigh Curl was inducted into the Verizon Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1999. Former Georgetown men's basketball star Dikembe Mutumbo was named a winner of the President's Service Award, the highest honor in the U.S. for volunteer service.

Whether it's the studentathletes or the league as an entity, moving forward successfully and exploring new horizons have been the norm rather than the exception for the conference that opened its doors in 1979.

The conference welcomed Virginia Tech as its 14th full member in 2000-01. In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse to its growing list of sports.

When the 1990s began, The BIG EAST Conference had just completed its eighth season with nine members. The league was arguably as healthy as a conference could be. The BIG EAST was a headline-grabber immediately, especially in men's basketball, its signature sport. The BIG EAST Football Conference did not exist.

The '90s was a decade of enormous change in college

athletics with conferences adding new members and new leagues beginning. The BIG EAST was no different than most groups. The league has had four separate expansions in the past 10 years. The BIG EAST Football Conference, with eight members, became a major player in college football immediately after its inception in 1991.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

After one season, Villanova was added and began play in 1980-81. Two seasons later, Pittsburgh joined the group and started competition in '82-83.

Miami was admitted in 1990 and began BIG EAST competition in '91-92. Rutgers, West Virginia and Notre Dame joined in '94 in two separate expansions and began play in 1995-96.

While the membership has increased, the focus of the BIG EAST remains unchanged. It is a group that reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation

rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably reflect a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful consortium enjoys outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate of Dave Gavitt, took over the Commissioner's reins in June, 1990. The expansion in membership is only a portion of Tranghese's achievements. In his first year at the helm, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference in addition to coordinating the four expansions.

BIG EAST sports attract the interest of followers in the nation's largest media markets including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, D.C., Miami, Pittsburgh and Hartford. The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. Exclusive long-range television contracts with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC provide BIG EAST basketball and football with more television exposure.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 450 BIG EAST athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well-represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams, with several athletes earning gold medals in the summer Olympiads in Sydney in 2000, Atlanta in '96, Barcelona in '92, Seoul in '88 and Los Angeles in '84.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,000 athletes in 21 sports.

2002 BIG EAST CHAMPIONSHIP

Rutgers University will host the 20th BIG EAST Women's Basketball Championship Saturday-Tuesday, March 2-5, at the Louis Brown Athletic Center in Piscataway, N.J. The Scarlet Knights hosted the 1998 and 1999 conference tournaments. For the second consecutive season, not all teams will play in the conference tournament. The top 12 institutions will participate, with seeding based on regular season finish. The top four teams seeds will earn byes into the quarterfinal round. The BIG EAST Tournament champion earns the league's automatic bid to the 64-team NCAA Tournament field.

When Notre Dame and Connecticut advanced to the 2001 Final Four with the Irish taking home the title, it was the end of a season of impressive firsts for the BIG EAST Conference:

- First conference to have two different teams win the NCAA title in consecutive seasons.
- First time two BIG EAST teams met in NCAA play (Connecticut and Notre Dame in the national semifinal)
- First time five teams played in the NCAA Tournament (Connecticut, Notre Dame, Rutgers, Villanova and Virginia Tech)
- First time five teams had 20 or more wins
- First time two BIG EAST teams occupied the No. 1 spot in the national polls
- First time two BIG EAST teams faced each other ranked No. 1 &No. 2 in the national polls (No. 1 ND vs. No. 2 UConn, March 6, 2001)
- First conference to have different teams occupy the No. 1 spot in the final polls (UConn AP, ND- USA Today)

WNBA Drafts 11 from BIG EAST Teams

On April 20, the WNBA drafted a record 11 BIG EAST players. Notre Dame's Ruth Riley, the 2000-01 national player of the year, was the first league player selected, by the Miami Sol as the fifth pick overall. UConn's Svetlana Abrosimova (7th, Minnesoty Lynx) and Kelly Schumacher (14th, Indiana Fever) were the additional first-round selections. Virginia Tech's Tere Williams was selected in the second round, by the Phoenix Mercury, as the 54th overall pick.

Tech Basketball History Taking It to the Next Leve

From a humble beginning more than 30 years ago, the Hokies bave continuously made improvements that bave lifted the program toward the top of the women's college basketball world

The Beginnings

Women's basketball at Virginia Tech began in 1970 as a club sport under the direction of coach Ganna Roberts. John Ristroph coached the squad during the 1972-73 season. In 1973, Joe Sgro, a professor at Tech, took over the team until 1976 when John Wetzel was named head coach. The women's basketball team gained full varsity status beginning with the 1976-77 season.

Tech's Varsity Coaches

The Hokies' first varsity coach was former Tech player and former assistant coach of the Portland Trail Blazers, John Wetzel. He played on the men's team from 1963-66 then went on to play pro ball with the Lakers, Suns and Hawks before coming back to Tech to finish his education and coach the women's squad. In his first and only season his team recorded a 7-9 record.

Taking over for Wetzel in 1977 was Carolyn Owen, whose team registered an 8-16 mark. In 1978, Carol Alfano came on the scene and in just her second season she guided the Tech ladies to their first winning record. Bonnie Henrickson became the Hokies' fourth head coach in 1997, taking over for Alfano, who had served as Tech's coach for 19 seasons.

First Scholarship Players

The first women's basketball player to earn any kind of scholarship was Helena Flannagan in 1977 when she received partial aid. Kim Albany (1978-82), who was recruited by Carolyn Owen, was Tech's first full scholarship player. Also in 1978, Sis Spriggs received a full grant, and Donna Cooper, Pauline Landis and Sandy Berry received partial grants.

Retired Jersey

Renee Dennis' No. 44 jersey was retired at the conclusion of her career in 1987. Dennis, from Bridgeport, Conn., is one of only 10 athletes in Tech athletic history to have his or her jersey number retired. She was the first woman athlete to receive that honor. The others to have their jerseys retired are footballers Carroll Dale (89), Frank Loria (10), Jim Pyne (73) and Bruce Smith (78), men's basketball stars Dell Curry (30), Vernell "Bimbo" Coles (12), Allan Bristow (44) and Ace Custis (20), and volleyball standout Lisa Pikalek (12).

Professional Players

Renee Dennis played professionally in Australia where she was her division's Player of the Year in 1989-90. Wendy Sanders played professionally in Belgium.

Tere Williams became the first Hokie to be selected in the WNBA Draft when she was selected in the third round by the Phoenix Mercury.

Best of the Metro

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team won two championships while a member of the Metro Conference. Tech won the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament by knocking off Virginia Commonwealth, UNC Charlotte and Southern Mississippi in succession. The Hokies captured the 1995 Metro regular season championship with a 10-2 league record.

Atlantic 10 Champs

The Hokies captured the Atlantic 10 Tournament championship in 1998 with a thrilling 66-64 overtime win over host Massachusetts. Virginia Tech won the Atlantic 10 regular season title in 1998-99 with a 15-1 league record.

The 1,000-Point Club

Twelve Virginia Tech women's basketball players have reached the 1,000-point plateau, with the two most recent players being Tere Williams and Amy Wetzel, who joined the club during the 1999-2000 season. Tech's all-time leading scorer is Renee Dennis. Dennis totalled 1,791 points during her Tech career. Other Hokies who have reached the 1.000 point plateau are, Tere Williams (1,750), Jenny Root (1,572), Christi Osborne (1,500), Amy Wetzel (1,444), Amy Byrne (1,291), Susan Walvius (1,161), Robin Lee (1,147), Michelle Houseright (1,112), Angle Kelly (1,092), Michelle Bain (1,068) and Lisa Griffith (1,033).

National Honors Tere Williams and Lisa Witherspoon were named as honorable mentions to the 1999 Associated Press All-America teams. In 1995 Jenny Root was a honorable mention selection to the Kodak All-America team. The Women's Basketball News Service named Tere Williams to the 1998 Freshman All-America third team.

Academic Excellence Christi Osborne was named to the GTE Academic All-America first team in 1994-95 and was a second-team member in 1993-94. Several Hokies have been named to the GTE District III Academic All-America team, including Amy Byrne (1988-89), Christi Osborne (1992-93, 1993-94, 1994-95), Maria Albertsson (1997-98, 1998-99) and Amy Wetzel (1998-99, 1999-00). Osborne was also a recipient of the Rawlings Scholarship Award (1994-95).

All-BIG EAST Conference

Tere Williams was the first Hokie to be selected for All-BIG EAST honors after being named to the all-conference second team following the 2000-01 season.

All-Atlantic 10 Conference The Hokies were well represented on the All-Atlantic 10 Conference teams during their five years in the league. Michelle Houseright was the first Virgina Tech player named to

All-Atlantic 10 team in 1996 as a second-team selection and Lisa Witherspoon was a second-team pick in 1999. Other Hokies named to the team include Tere Williams, a first-team selection in 1999 and 2000 and a second team member in 1998, Amy Wetzel, a second-team choice in 1999 and 2000, and Chrystal Starling, a member of the third team in 2000.

THE HOKIES' MILESTONE WINS

First Varsity Win

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team earned its first win as a varsity sport by defeating Bridgewater College, 59-55, in 1976. The Hokies, who overcame a fivepoint deficit, outscored the Eagles by nine points down the stretch to clinch the win. Sophomore Gail Kelley led the way with 17 points, followed by Karen Garbis' 13.

50th Win

Tech's 50th win as a varsity sport came on Jan. 28, 1981 against James Madison. Sis Spriggs was one of three Hokies in double figures with 15 points as Tech downed the Dukes, 66-58. Also in double figures were Tammie Edwards with 13 and Maureen Corrigan, who had 10 points to go with 10 rebounds.

100th Win

The Hokies picked up their century win by upsetting nationally ranked North Carolina, 74-73, in a thriller at Roanoke Va., on Dec. 1, 1984. Tech was paced by Renee Dennis' 17-point performance, but a number of players shined in the upset victory. Susan Walvius, a 6-2 center, added 16 points and five rebounds, guard Angie Kelly chipped in 15 points, and guard Maureen Donovan contributed seven points and six rebounds.

150th Win

Tech registered win No. 150 on January 16, 1988 when it squeaked past Louisville in Blacksburg, 68-67. Keying the victory was center Michelle Bain, who tallied 19 points and nine rebounds, while forward Wendy Sanders pumped in 16 points. Point guard Denise Kayajian had a career-high (at the time) eight assists to go along with nine points against the Lady Cardinals. 200th Win

Tech won its 200th game in the final of the 1991 Diamond Club Classic when it downed UNC Greensboro 84-65 in Cassell Coliseum. Phyllis Tonkin scored 20 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead the Tech women. Lisa Griffith kicked in 17 points while Dayna Sonovick had nine rebounds and six assists.

250th Win

The Hokies won their 250th career game by knocking off 19th-ranked, Southern Mississippi, 83-76, in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament in Biloxi, Miss. Southern Miss was the tournament's top seed. Christi Osborne led the way with 19 points while Sue Logsdon had 18, Lisa Leftwich pitched in with 17 and Jenny Root contributed 14 points.

300th Win

Tech posted its 300th win in the program's history in a

84-60 win over Rhode Island in the Hokies' 1997-98 conference opener. The Cassell Coliseum crowd witnessed an outstanding performance from guard Amy Wetzel, who finished with 14 points and three steals. The win also marked Bonnie Henrickson's first Atlantic 10 Conference win as a head coach.

350th Win

Tech picked up win No. 350 on January 6, 2000 when it coasted to a 81-38 win over Rhode Island. The victory was also Tech's 200th in Cassell Coliseum. The Hokies opened the game on a 12-0 run and cruised to a 42-16 halftime lead. The Hokies placed five players in double figures led by Nicole Jones, Kim Seaver, Chrystal Starling and Tere Williams with 12 points each. Tech outrebounded the Rams 44-24 and blocked seven shots in the victory.

All-Metro Conference

In 14 seasons as a Metro Conference member, Virginia Tech placed 12 players on the all-conference team, including Jenny Root being honored as the 1994-95 Player of the Year. Hokies named to the first team include Taiqua Brittingham (1984), Renee Dennis (1986, 87), Susan Walvius (1986), Amy Byrne (1989), and Jenny Root (1994, 95). Second-team selections include Angie Kelly (1986), Maureen Donovan (1987), Michelle Bain (1988), Amy Byrne (1989), Missy Sallade (1989, 90), Jeni Garber (1991), Lisa Griffith (1992), Christi Osborne (1993, 94, 95) and Jenny Root (1993).

Tournament Stars

Virgina Tech players have left their mark in postseason play through the years. Tere Williams (1998) and Amy Wetzel (1999) were named to the All-Atlantic 10 Tournament

team as was former Tech standout Michelle Houseright (1998). Christi Osborne was a three-time member of the All-Metro Tournament team (1992, 93, 94) and was selected as the 1994 Most Valuable Player. Two-time All-Metro tournament members include Taiqua Brittingham (1983-84), Renee Dennis (1986-87), Jeni Garber (1988-89) and Sue Logsdon (1993-94).

Freshman Phenoms Freshmen have made an immediate impact on the women's basketball program through the years. Tere Williams was named to the 1998 Women's Basketball News Service Freshman All-American Third Team as well as being named Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Year. Virginia Tech placed one player on the

Atlantic 10 All-Rookie team in each of its five seasons in the league. Three Hokies, Jeni Garber (1988-89), Sue Logsdon (1990-91) and Christi Osborne (1991-92), were named to the Metro Conference All-Rookie team.

• In 1984, Tech shocked No. 20 North Carolina, 74-73, behind Renee Dennis' 17 points.

• In 1984, the Hokies defeated No. 16 Louisiana State, 86-77, in the Marriott-Converse Christmas Classic at Blacksburg.

• One of the biggest wins in Tech women's basketball history came in 1985 when Tech upset No. 5 Old Dominion, 73-72. It was the first win over the Lady Monarchs in 15 games.

• In 1987, the Hokies upended 16th-ranked James Madison, 63-61, behind a 16point, 13-rebound performance from freshman Amy Byrne.

• In the middle of what was then the longest winning streak in school history, the Hokies upset No. 13 South Carolina in 1989 in Blacksburg, 63-59. Amy Byrne led the Lady Hokies with 16 points and 12 rebounds.

• Virginia Tech upset No. 19 Southern Mississippi, 6059, in a Cassell Coliseum barn-burner Feb. 28, 1994. Guard Lisa Leftwich, who led Tech with 18 points, hit a key finger roll with 42 seconds remaining.

• In one of the biggest games in the program's history, Tech defeated No. 19 Southern Mississippi in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament, 83-76. The win gave Tech its firstever Metro Tournament title and sent the Hokies to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in their history.

• The Hokies knocked off No. 9 Virginia, 69-62, in Cassell Coliseum Jan. 13, 1995. The win propelled Virginia Tech into the national rankings for the first time. Christi Osborne, Angela Donnell, Jenny Root and Terri Garland all scored in double figures for the Hokies.

• Tech downed No. 23 Wisconsin, 75-64, in the first round of the NCAA regional in Gainesville. Guard Amy Wetzel converted a school record 16-17 free throw attempts and scored 28 points to pace the Hokies.



• The Hokies travelled to "Tobacco Road" to knock off sixth-ranked and eventual national runner-up Duke, 72-70, at Cameron Indoor Stadium. An injured Kim Seaver came off the bench to lead Tech with 14 points and nine rebounds.

• Tech defeated in-state rival and 17th-ranked Virginia, 81-65, at Cassell Coliseum. Tere Williams recorded her second straight doubledouble of the season with 21 points and 10 rebounds.

• Amy Wetzel hit a running 10-footer off the glass with 3.7 seconds remaining to give the Hokies a 57-56 win over 17th-ranked Virginia. The win marked the second

consecutive time the Hokies had beaten the Cavaliers in Cassell Coliseum.

• Virginia Tech used a 13-0 run over the final five minutes to pick up a comefrom-behind 65-59 over No. 24 Villanova. Tere Williams led Tech with 22 points followed by Amy Wetzel with 18.

• The Hokies knocked off the 23rd-ranked Wildcats for the second time during the 2000-01 season with a 73-67 win in the BIG EAST Conference Tournament quarterfinals in Storrs, Conn. Chrystal Starling came off the bench to led Tech with 21 points while Williams chipped in with 20.

Tech's Conference History Hokies at home in the BIG EAST after varied affiliation past

The 2000-2001 academic year was Virginia Tech's first in the BIG EAST Conference as an all-sports member.

The BIG EAST has long been recognized as one of the strongest women's basketball conferences in the nation. Virginia Tech's women's basketball program made an immediate impact on the league, finishing fourth in the regular season with an 11-5 record, advancing to the semifinals of the conference tournament and advancing for the third time in four years to the NCAA Tournament. The BIG EAST has posted a 74-44 record (.633) in the NCAA Tournament since 1991, including national championships in 1995 and 2000 by Connecticut and last year by Notre Dame. Last year was the first time the conference received five bids to the NCAA Tournament and marked the second consecutive season that the BIG EAST had two teams advance to the Final Four. The conference also had five teams with 20 or more wins and last season the BIG EAST became the first conference to have two different teams win the NCAA title in consecutive seasons.

Virginia Tech, a charter member of the BIG EAST football conference which was formed in 1991, became the 14th member of the conference, which conducts 20 championships in 16 men's and women's sports. Virginia Tech conducts varsity programs in 15 BIG EAST sports.

"Our directors of athletics strongly believe Virginia Tech's full membership will enhance our championship programs," BIG EAST Commissioner Michael Tranghese said.

Tech's conference membership has been an evolving process since Feb. 13, 1872, when Tech was founded. Tech didn't compete in an intercollegiate sporting event for 20 years. In the spring of 1892, the Tech baseball team took on Newport, winning 18-8 in the first sporting event ever at Tech.

On Feb. 25-26, 1921, Tech, under the leadership of athletics director C.P. "Sally" Miles, joined the Southern Intercollegiate Conference as a charter member. Other members included Alabama,

Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn), Clemson, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology (Georgia Tech), Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College (Mississippi State), North Carolina. North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia and Washington & Lee. In 1922. Louisiana State, Mississippi, South Carolina. Vanderbilt and Tulane joined the conference.

In December, 1923, the name of the conference was officially changed to the Southern Conference. Also, conference officials added the University of the South to the conference. The following year, VMI

joined the conference, and in 1929, Duke joined.

In 1932, it was agreed that the 13 southernmost members should form a separate conference, starting a domino effect that would eventually lead to Tech becoming an independent. The Southeastern Conference, thus, was formed with Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt as the members.

Twenty-one years later, in 1953, Clemson, Duke, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Maryland, South Carolina and Wake Forest College all withdrew to form the Atlantic Coast Conference.

In June, 1965, Virginia Tech withdrew from the Southern Conference and competed as an independent in virtually every sport until 1978.

"Joining the BIG EAST is tremendous not just for our women's program but for the entire athletic department. In particular for our program it means competing at the highest level and on a national level. The affiliation provides us with the opportunity to recruit players who want to compete at that high level which is something that we felt very talented players want to do. They want to play with great players, which we have in our program, and to play against great players, which we certainly have in our league. In the long run, this is the best thing to happen in our program's history." - Bonnie Henrickson

> In May, 1978, Tech ended its 13-year status as a major independent by accepting a bid to join the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference, also known as "the Metro," for all sports except football. The Hokies joined Cincinnati, Florida State, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane in the Metro, which was founded in 1975.

On Feb. 5, 1991, after 26 years as a football independent, Tech officially accepted a bid to join the newly-created BIG EAST Football Conference. Tech joined Miami, Syracuse, Boston College, Pittsburgh, West Virginia, Temple and Rutgers as charter members of the conference.

In January, 1995, five Metro members — UNC Charlotte, Tulane, Louisville, Southern Miss and South Florida — voted Tech and Virginia

> Commonwealth out of the league. At the time, those schools were planning on a merger with other Midwestern schools (hence, the birth of Conference USA) and the Hokies and Rams were not interested in such a merger. A month later, on Feb. 3, Tech, VCU and the Metro agreed to a \$2.27 million settlement in which the Hokies and Rams split.

Tech wasted little time in moving on, as just two weeks later it joined the Atlantic 10 for all sports except football, which is in the BIG EAST, and wrestling, which was in the Colonial.

During the summer of 1999, Virginia Tech received a proposal from the BIG EAST to join the conference as an allsports member except for wrestling, which will remain in the prestigious Eastern Wrestling League. And finally on Aug. 24, 1999, Tech and the BIG EAST announced that the Hokies would join the conference for all sports.

"Virginia Tech is thrilled to become a full member of the BIG EAST Conference and looks forward to its academic and athletic associations with the entire membership," Tech president Paul Torgersen said.



Putting Knowledge to Work

Outstanding university adapts to challenges of the future

Since its founding in 1872, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, commonly known as Virginia Tech, has grown to become the state's largest university and its top research institution. It has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, its economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has now challenged the university to become one of the nation's top 30 research schools by the end of the decade.

Even before Steger's challenge, Tech was making sure it wasn't standing still. Among recent innovations, Tech teamed with the University of Virginia and Carilion Health System to form the Carilion Biomedical Institute to improve health care worldwide and to increase economic development opportunities in Southwest Virginia. The Virginia **Bioinformatics Institute is** leading the way in helping scientists merge computers and biotechnology to sort through complicated genetic material to speed research. And Torgersen Hall brings together campus organizations

devoted to developing and applying instructional, communication, and information technologies.

Virginia Tech was established as an all-male military school dedicated to the original land-grant mission of teaching agriculture and engineering. Today it is a coeducational, top-50 research institution with recognized programs in music, business, architecture, and the into eight colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Arts and Sciences, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Human Resources and Education, Natural Resources, and

Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, they offer about 170 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs.

The university's 2,600-acre main campus has more than 100 campus buildings, hundreds of research laboratories, the Donaldson Brown Hotel and Conference Center, and an airport. Next to campus is the 120-acre Corporate Research Center, home to more than 100 companies. Within five miles of campus is a 1,700-acre research farm.

Many of Virginia Tech's traditions and strengths are

rooted in the university's motto, Ut Prosim: "That I May Serve," and its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through public service and outreach activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, Virginia disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. It is a university that puts knowledge to work.

Instruction

Eight colleges offer more degree programs than any other university in the state, with 60 undergraduate and about 110 graduate programs. In addition, Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in integrating instructional technology into the curriculum through its nationally recognized Faculty Development Institute. The university's effort to restructure the teaching of core mathematics courses has been hailed as an innovative way to break the credit-for-contact model of classroom instruction.

Research

With annual research expenditures of about \$192.7 million, Virginia Tech consistently ranks among the top 50 research universities in the United States. With more than 100 research centers, the university also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industrysupported research and in the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's faculty and students are involved in more than 3,700 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

Public Service

As part of its public service mission, Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of outreach projects. For example, it spawns economic development, helps global marketing efforts, investigates better uses for stripmined land, helps clean the Chesapeake Bay and other state waterways, and directs reforestation in Senegal. University scientists developed the vaccine that is the standard for preventing brucellosis in cattle around the world.

Outreach efforts also focus on education and distance learning techniques — satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing, webbased courses, etc. — to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students. Professionals, organizations, and communities also tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through the Division of Continuing Education, which offers hundreds of programs annually.

The Cooperative Extension Service, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well-being for more than 85 years. With 107 city/ county offices and more than 44,000 volunteers and 160 programs, Extension has more than 4.6 million participants annually.

VIRGINIA TECH ON THE LEADING EDGE

Attracting talented faculty members and students, creating partnerships and alliances, and leading the world in communications, information and instructional technology, has enabled Virginia Tech to put knowledge to work in a variety of ways. Here are a few examples:

The Wireless Internet

In early 1998, Virginia Tech became the first university in the nation to participate in a Federal Communications Commission spectrum auction and was awarded four LMDS licenses covering 16,507 square miles of Virginia, and portions of North Carolina and Tennessee.

Known as the Local Multipoint Distribution Service, LMDS offers the promise of broad-bandwidth Internet access through the wireless spectrum. Working with other licensee holders and LMDS service providers, Virginia Tech has established a consortium to research the equipment and technology necessary to fully exploit LMDS applications in both rural and urban communities. Virginia Tech intends to develop this technology for the benefit of rural and mountainous regions of the country.

Net.Work.Virginia

In 1996, Virginia Tech, Bell Atlantic, and Sprint announced the deployment of what was the most sophisticated high-speed computing network in the United States. Net.Work.Virginia is the architectural prototype for the Internet II initiative. More than 200 state or local government agencies have signed up on the network.

Fiber and Electro-Optics Research Center

The FEORC is home to the nation's largest educational fiberoptics group. The center is supported by more than 30 research sponsors and has received significant grants, including a \$9.6million grant in 1998 from the Naval Research Laboratory. Projects involve fiber devices, materials, and sensors, with an emphasis on high-speed data transmission.

Transgenic animals

Virginia Tech was one of the first universities in the world to develop a transgenic animal and the first to create a transgenic pig. This effort made Tech one of the first to produce a human pharmaceutical protein in the milk of pigs. Virginia Tech biotechnology leadership has made it a mecca for the world's foremost biotechnology companies.

Transportation

Virginia Tech and the Commonwealth of Virginia are building the nation's first "Smart Road" from the ground up. The 6-mile highway is a test bed for new transportation technology and, in time, will be a special corridor route for public transportation in Southwest Virginia. In addition to implanted sensing devices in the highway, the road will be able to generate snow, sleet, rain and fog on demand.

The Virginia Tech Transportation Institute, the largest research center at Virginia Tech, is manager of the "Smart Road."

Campus Landmarks

Burruss Hall

The cornerstone for Virginia Tech's main administration building (named for Julian Ashby Burruss, who was the university's eighth president, from 1919-45) was laid at the 1935 commencement. The building, which includes a 3,000-seat auditorium, has been expanded twice over the years.

Drillfield

Throughout its history, the Drillfield has been used for a variety of purposes, including horticulture gardens and playing fields. It was known by various names until 1926, when it officially became the Drillfield. Strouble's Creek, which once ran open through the southern portion of the field, was covered in 1934.

Duck Pond

The Duck Pond provides a peaceful respite for students and visitors — as well as for dozens of ducks and geese. The pond was created in 1937. A smaller pond, just north of the Duck Pond, is known as the Ice Pond — so called because it was the source of ice for cadets until a refrigeration plant opened in 1898-99.

The Grove

This stately house was built in 1902 to serve as the residence for Virginia Tech presidents and their families. Today, besides fulfilling its original function, it also serves to house visiting dignitaries and as a reception facility.







FUN FACTS

Memorial Chapel

This 350-seat chapel was completed in 1960. The upper level contains eight pylons sculpted from Indian limestone. They represent Brotherhood, Honor, Leadership, Sacrifice, Service, Loyalty, Duty and Ut Prosim, which is the university's motto: "That I May Serve."

Smithfield Plantation House

Col. William B. Preston established the Smithfield estate — named for his wife, Susanna Smith — in 1772 after an earlier settlement known as Draper's Meadow was wiped out in an Indian massacre. The oldest part of the existing house was built in 1790. Smithfield is a state historic landmark and is open for tours April through November. Call (540) 951-2060 for more details.

Squires Student Center

Squires is the focus of campus student activity as well as the hub of much of the performing and visual arts at the university. It contains theaters, the Perspective Art Gallery, the Black Cultural Center, pool tables, bowling lanes, restaurants, and the administrative offices for most of the student organizations. The original Squires was built in 1937 and it has undergone major renovations since, but the facade of the original building is visible in the secondfloor lobby area.

Raising the bar for Virginia Tech

Though I think it is now generally accepted, it bears repeating that today, more than anytime in our history, education and particularly higher education is a key force behind the quality of modern American life, our economic competitiveness, and indeed, our democratic form of government.

Higher education fulfills many roles in contemporary society. Research, economic development, or preparation for careers are the most readily understood. However, perhaps the more powerful role and in certain ways the least visible role, is the transformative effect college has on the lives of students. The learning that takes place inside and outside the classroom, between faculty and student, and among students who come from around the country and around the world forges a dynamic that lasts a lifetime. In this respect, few jobs are more satisfying than being a college president.

During my first two years as Virginia Tech's president, I have been gratified by the general excitement of the university community as we chart our path toward greater educational and scholarly achievement — to be among the nation's best.

Recently I challenged the university community to be ranked among the nation's top 30 universities by the end of the decade. Why does this matter, why should you care, and how will we do it?

While simple in concept, our goal represents a significant challenge. Moreover, alumni, friends, and even the university community may not fully understand the underlying rationale. Indeed, this quest transcends the research enterprise within the university. It is nothing less than the pursuit of pervasive quality ... expanding the quality and impact of everything we do.

The immense change we have witnessed in the ability to travel and to communicate with every quarter of the world over the Internet has given new wings to the mobility of intellectual capital. The best information, the brightest faculty members, and the most effective coursework can be accessed from anywhere on the planet. Therefore, the quality standard to which we must aspire is set not by what may be best in the state, region, or even the nation, but what is best in the world. This is the challenge the communication revolution poses to Virginia Tech — to set standards commensurate with standards of global excellence ... and to provide leadership on a global scale.

In order to be among the very best, we must provide a high- quality instructional experience for our students and our faculty. We assert that faculty members who are on the leading edge of their professions enable the highest quality educational experience. A robust environment for research and scholarship attracts the best faculty and the best students, and permits us to provide cutting-edge technical assistance to communities and businesses. The nation's leading scholars engender the economic stimulus that so many sectors of government and industry expect of us.

Beyond the classrooms, university research touches the lives of almost every American. University research promotes better health, saves lives through new medicines, and helps develop life saving medical equipment and procedures. University researchers help clean our environment, create more efficient energy supplies, find ways to feed more people, and have helped to bring the world together by creating the Internet.

From our earliest days as a land-grant university, we have helped communities and have advanced economic development by taking knowledge to the people to solve their problems. This links the research leg of our mission with outreach.

A thriving research program not only engages the university with societal issues, it hones the skills of the faculty. And professors at the forefront of their professions challenge students to, in turn, engage their minds in the world around them. The very nature of research questioning, experimenting, and seeking answers — is grounded in the earliest scholarly inquiry of the ancients.

When the intellectual climate is buzzing, the world beats a path to your door. Virginia Tech faculty and students regularly interact with leading corporations including Boeing, General Electric, Lucent Technologies, IBM, Sun Microsystems, and hundreds more. Job opportunities for graduates abound when faculty and students push the envelope of academic discovery and inquiry.

Recently the head of the National Science Foundation described her vision for the country as "enabling the nation's future through discovery, learning, and innovation." She described their three strategic goals in three key words: People, Ideas, and Tools. When I hear that, I think the NSF is speaking about the nation's colleges and universities.

So where is the university going? At the undergraduate level, we plan to increase

undergraduate opportunities for high level scholarship and research. Information technology will pervade teaching and learning activities. Becoming thinking and productive citizens of the world will be our goal for all graduates.

Education nourishes the information society. We will expand graduate education opportunities around the Commonwealth.

The expansion of Virginia Tech's research agenda will likely include advances in critical technologies such as nano-materials, polymers, computing systems, microelectronics, and more. Our expanding biotechnology sector has already embraced the production of human pharmaceuticals using animals and plants. Bioinformatics, a new tool to analyze the avalanche of scientific data arising from genomic sequencing, will anchor our foray into biomedical applications. The life sciences will continue to arow.

Each generation marvels at the changes wrought by their predecessors. Many living alumni have seen the transformation from VPI, a military school for men, to Virginia Tech, the Commonwealth's largest university with comprehensive degree programs and students and faculty from around the globe. It is fair to say that the next generation will observe another transformation into a university of world class dimensions creating and using the power of knowledge.

Charles W. Steger has been university president since January 2000. His Hokie credentials include 12 years as dean of Tech's college of architecture and urban studies, seven years as vice president for development and university relations, and three degrees from Virginia Tech. He is a registered architect and fellow of the American Institute of Architects.



James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 56, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his four years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting studentathletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech entered competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001 season.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Already complete is the expansion of the North end zone that totals over 5,000 permanent seats.

To meet a growing demand for Virginia Tech football, Weaver has spearheaded the construction project to expand to a seating capacity of 65,000 for the 2002 season. The \$37 million expansion project will include an 11,000-seat double deck and provide 15 luxury suites, as well as club level seating and amenities.

Plans are underway for a West side press box and suite expansion for 2003. The West side expansion, along with 36 suites, will include an enhanced press box tower, as well as office space for ticket operations and the Virginia Tech Athletic Fund. Under Weaver's direction, lighted football practice fields — conveniently located in the center of the athletics complex — were completed during the spring. Virginia Tech contracted with GreenTech, Inc., of Richmond, Va., to install its highly innovative, ITM natural grass sports field system in Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field for the 2001 season

Weaver was the key figure in reaching a four-year agreement with Virginia in bringing the men's basketball games back to campuses for the first time since 1976. He also realigned the senior administrative staff to further promote the development of a broad-based athletics department. A dormant Monogram Club was revitalized under his direction, providing Hokie letterwinners of all eras a renewed link to Tech athletics. He also toughened the Hokies' nonconference football schedules, a move that gained real favor from Tech fans.

Weaver renegotiated Tech's multimedia rights contract with ISP Sports, creating a new business relationship and enhanced revenue for the athletics department.

In the Fall of 2000, Weaver arranged a joint venture with ISP to commit \$2 million to purchase new scoreboards, upgraded sound systems, a 21x28 L.E.D. video display screen at Lane Stadium and two 9x12 wall mount L.E.D. video screens in Cassell Coliseum. A state-of-the-art television control studio provides in-house production and operations for the video screens. The video screens and new sound systems have noticeably heightened game entertainment and the overall

fan experience at Lane Stadium and Cassell Coliseum.

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

"Jim Weaver was the unanimous choice of our search committee," retired Tech President Paul Torgersen said at a Blacksburg news conference when the new AD was introduced. "The committee was searching for someone with extensive Division I experience, a commitment to compliance, a commitment to gender equity, a commitment to all 21 varsity sports and a vision for conference alignment."

Weaver brings a "Penn State mentality" to the position. He says that various schools' interest in him as a reformer through the years can be traced to Penn State and its reputation for how it conducts business in intercollegiate athletics.

It was with the Nittany Lions' football team that Weaver first made a name for himself in athletics. He was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was recruited to Penn State by Engle. He played three seasons under Engle and one under Paterno, who is still the coach of the Nittany Lions.

"I learned a lot from Joe Paterno," Weaver says. "One thing he said certainly has stuck with me. 'You either get better or you get worse. You never stay the same.""

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a

bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's degree in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver started a coaching career as an assistant at Penn State for six seasons. During that time, the Lions played in five bowl games — the Cotton, Gator, Sugar and Orange (twice).

He later was the offensive coordinator at Iowa State and head coach for one season at Villanova in 1974. He also spent five years as an assistant professor at Clarion State and three years as director of franchise sales at Athletic Attic.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida which was sanctioned by the NCAA in 1983. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletic director.

Weaver was hired at UNLV after a series of NCAA infractions were made public. He implemented a compliance and monitoring program, produced a departmental policy manual and initiated a Life Skills program. He also oversaw the construction of an \$8.5 million athletic complex and a \$1.4 million baseball stadium at UNLV.

He drew rave reviews at UNLV for his fund-raising expertise. He generated nearly \$15 million in his time there.

While at Western Michigan, Weaver announced creation of a \$7 million football center, stabilized fluctuating revenues and installed a CHAMPS Life Skills program.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons — Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

first woman in college athletics to hold position of recruiting coordinator in Division I (1988-92); Virginia Tech football office receptionist and recruiting secretary (1984-88) **Education:** Virginia Tech, 1979 **Of Note:** As recruiting coordinator, McCloskey proved to be one of the most innovative people in the field. She completely reorganized the schedule for official recruiting visits by making academics the highlight of the visit. All aspects of university life were included in the visit for the prospective studentathlete. She lined up various meetings with professors and department heads and key figures on campus.

McCloskey may also be one of the few women in college athletics who has been an advance person for away football games. It is her responsibility to arrange for hotel rooms, meals, meeting rooms, police escorts and air and ground transportation for the football team.

As Tech's liaison for NCAA certification, a process the NCAA uses to ensure integrity in collegiate athletics, McCloskey coordinates periodic department self-study and review teams.

McCloskey is a member of the President's Strategic Planning Steering Committee.



Student Athlete Academic Support Services

The success of the Virginia Tech women's basketball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech studentathletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

Last spring, the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast paid tribute to a record 337 studentathletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs who posted 3.0 or greater QCAs in the 2000 calendar year.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

To accommodate the many facets of assistance needed for student-athletes, Virginia Tech's mission is eight fold:

1. To provide services to all student-athletes, including any student participating in any varsity sport, managers, trainers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

2. To provide academic support through tutoring programs, computer facilities and software which are necessary for the individual needs of each student. 3. To require a mandatory study hall for students below expected QCA levels in order that the staff might better assist the at-risk student-athletes.

4. To provide adequate study facilities and a computer lab which are conveniently located near the training areas and coaching areas.

5. To provide mentoring, counseling, academic assistance, advising and to work closely with other academic offices on campus for the welfare of the students.

6. To work closely with the athletic department for the academic welfare of each student-athlete and to help in the development of an effective student life program.

7. To closely monitor the academic success of each student to help ensure academic progress toward a degree and maintenance of academic and athletic eligibility.

8. To encourage former athletes to be actively involved with our present athletes and to provide our services to former athletes who did not graduate and assist them in their academic planning toward a degree. The ultimate goal is for all student-athletes to successfully complete their degree.

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

Student Athlete Academic Support Services provides programming for studentathletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition, and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAASS office in

Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab houses over 26 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum and laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes to use when travelling to away contests. The athletic department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Additionally, student-athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site offices, located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice, or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his third year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Lois Berg, associate director, begins her 13th year at Tech. She is primarily in charge of developing the freshman orientation program, which ensures the student-athlete a smooth transition from high school to the university.

She is also responsible for providing programming to assigned student-athletes from the sports of baseball, men's basketball, softball, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, managers and trainers.

Colin Howlett begins his fifth year with Virginia Tech with the new title of associate director in the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office. In addition to assisting the director in all facets of the program, Howlett oversees the advisement of football studentathletes with regard to satisfactory progress, eligibility and degree completion as set forth by the NCAA, BIG EAST and Virginia Tech.

He also helps coordinate support services for the football program, including tutorial support, mentoring, organized study table and major and career counseling. In addition to these responsibilities, Howlett assists in the recruitment, academic evaluation and admissions of prospective student-athletes.

Howlett came to Tech from the University of Maine, where he served for a year and a half as an academic advisor for the athletic department.

Some of his other experience includes academic advisement for student-athletes at Austin Peay State University and the University of Southern Mississippi.

Howlett earned his bachelor's degree in business administration at Susquehanna University and received his master's in athletic administration from Southern Miss. A native of Allentown, Pa., he and his wife, Lisa, have a daughter, Natalie.

Katie Ammons is an assistant director who begins her third year and works with the women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's track, cheerleader and HighTech programs.

Ammons is also in charge of the operation of the HEAT lab and other computing resources available for student-athletes. Ammons is a former standout Hokie student-athlete.

Renia Edwards joined the staff last year as assistant

Office of Student Life

The Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech provides assistance to student-athletes in a number of areas. This office, which is run by Jermaine Holmes, director of student life, and Amy Freel, coordinator of student life. is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through many programs it implements.

One program the office sponsors is the HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program (Hokies Turning **Opportunities Into** Personal Success), which provides a well-rounded program for studentathletes to develop the individual skills necessary to lead successful and productive lives. This program's goal is to enhance five areas of

commitments that are vital to personal growth of studentathletes. Those areas are service; academic excellence; career development; athletic excellence; and personal development. This program attempts to build individual confidence, promote respect for diversity, enhance interpersonal relationships, develop leadership skills and enable each one to make a valuable contribution to the community.

Hokies With Heart

Hokies With Heart is a new program of the Office of Student Life which promotes involvement of student-athletes in community service activities. In the past year, Virginia Tech athletes were involved in over

Hicks has become very involved in programs including Hokie Readers, Virginia Tech nights at local elementary and secondary schools and has spoken at several high school mini-camps. She has also been involved with volunteer work at the Warm Hearth Retirement Facility and the Relay for Life supports cancer research.

"I feel that it is extremely important for the studentathletes to give back to the community," Hicks says. "Our being active in the community is just one way for studentathletes to demonstrate how much we appreciate their support of Virginia Tech athletics."

Athletic Performance

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. Always striving to stay on the cutting edge, Virginia Tech has added two more services for its student-athletes in the past couple of years. At Tech, nutrition and sports psychology are also a part of the student-athlete's preparation – not just for game day, but also for life after college. Virginia Tech tries to provide the best services, facilities and support staff for all of its student-athletes, to make them better athletes and better people.



Under the direction of Assistant Athletic Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, thus helping to make the women's basketball program one of the best as well.

One of the main support centers of Tech women's basketball is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by not only the staff but the studentathletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies have continued their streak of fourstraight postseason appearances.

"Our strength and conditioning program is designed to help our studentathletes build overall strength and endurance, while helping them develop self-discipline and realize their potential as

athletes," says Gentry. "We have a comprehensive program utilizing strength, power and flexibility training as well as plyometrics and sprint conditioning."

The women's basketball team trains in the beautiful 17,000-square foot training center on the first level of the Merryman Athletic Center. The weight room facility features new free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer Strength equipment, 12 platforms and a 6,000-square foot state-of-theart speed and agility room.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports and Emily Chones, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of three graduate assistants — Erin O'Neil, Tim Ralph and Shannon Turly.

"Strength and conditioning here at Tech is the foundation of our team," says Coach Bonnie Henrickson. "We need our players to be physically able to compete with the nation's elite teams and Coach Gentry and his staff have accomplished just that."

Assistant Athletics Director For Athletic Performance

Dr. Mike Gentry is in his 14th season as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning. As assistant athletics director for athletic performance, his

duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech. He is directly involved in the training of the women's basketball and football teams and manages programs for nutrition.

A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981. He received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Virginia Tech in 1999.

Gentry worked as an assistant strength coach at UNC and as the head strength coach at East Carolina University prior to coming to Virginia Tech in 1987.

In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year. Gentry has a son, Roy Christopher, who is 11.

Sports Nutrition

A new program was added to the athletics department in July 2000 — sports nutrition.

In addition to her responsibilities as coordinator of student life, Amy Freel also has the duties of being the athletics department's sports nutritionist.

Freel graduated from Ball State University with her bachelor's degree in dietetics in 1996 and received her master's in dietetics from Ball State in 1998.

Freel works one-on-one with student-athletes to provide them with information that they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and how to eat to improve performance. "It is extremely

beneficial for our studentathletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition educations allow me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport specific goals."

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge", a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

A new addition to the athletics department as of August 2000 is sports psychology. The licensed psychologists, Dr. Brenna Chirby, Dr. Gary Bennett, and Dr. Robert Miller, Associate Director of the Thomas E. Cook Counseling Center, counsel student-athletes either individually or as a team.

The psychologists meet with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling, performance enhancement and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. As a team, the sports psychologists work on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

Mike Gentry, assistant AD for strength and conditioning, says, "I've always felt that (sports psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department and we wanted to and needed to include sports psychology in that model."

"One of the dangers of sports psychology is that it can be totally about sports and there is that perception," Miller says. "We try to be more holistic and talk about a variety of issues, such as nutrition or academics. We want to be broader and help the person as a whole, not just with performance."

"We see those other outside things as interfering with an athletes' ability to perform," Bennett says. "We feel we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The psychologists also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sports psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions a week.

One injured player who took advantage of the sports psychologists after he tore the anterior cruciate ligament of his knee last year was glad to have the services of the sports psychology program. The student-athlete met with Dr. Miller several times before and after his surgery.

"When I first got hurt, I thought I needed to talk to someone," the player said. "As the weeks go by, you learn to deal and cope with it. But I think it helps to talk to someone."

The response to the sports psychology program has been very positive. The studentathletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sports psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

"It is a great resource for our coaches and our athletes," Gentry says. "We've improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and in sports psychology. It's all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping student-athletes. We want to give them all the resources we can to put them in a position to be successful."

Sports Medicine

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes.

The department, under the leadership of Dr. Duane Lagan, director of sports medicine, and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes. A staff including general practitioners, orthopedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists, are available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, the department is completing the first year of development and data collection for a strategic health care planning grant. This grant, titled "The Center for Performance and Sports Medicine Excellence," was initiated by Dr. Charles Baffi, Dr. Kerry Redican, Dr. Mike Gentry and Goforth and was awarded last fall to develop a multidisciplinary model for Division I health care.

"Our goal with this program is to formally provide our athletes with the most effective and efficient health care delivery system possible," Goforth said. "This grant will serve as a framework for universities

across the country to provide high-level health care services for their athletes, and at the same time, creates the first collaboration between academic research and athletics here at Virginia Tech."

Another aspect of this constantly evolving department is a new athletic training room in the Jamerson Athletic Center. When completed sometime after the first of the new year, the 4,300 square foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room will consolidate existing training rooms in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The new facility will give the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There will be state-of-the-art equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA. Larry Perry was the consulting engineer.

The new room, which will nearly double the size of the current Merryman Center facility, will also allow that training room to be used for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. When completed, Virginia Tech will have more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally.

The training and medical complex currently is located in the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes 2,400 square feet of medical space supplemented by training rooms in Cassell Coliseum.

This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities including electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot packs and interferential current. It also has an office for the staff, dozens of training tables, whirlpools, rehabilitation equipment and an eight-foot cold tub.

"We, as a staff, are very excited about our new facility and the opportunity for all of us to come together for the benefit of our athletes," Goforth said.

The philosophy of the program involves large volumes of research that shows that a properly maintained overall fitness program reduces the chance of injury.

After the sports medicine staff diagnoses and treats an ill or injured athlete, the strength and conditioning staff works to give the best injury prevention and performance enhancing programs possible.

The training, medical and strength and conditioning staffs each have a role in bringing the athlete back quickly and ready to play. After an injury, an athlete will go through rehabilitation and physical therapy. Athletes are then moved to weight training as they become able. The strength and conditioning staff

Dr. Duane Lagan begins his 14th season as the Tech team physician. He has had a varied medical career, having maintained a private practice in Okeene, Okla., for 16 years and having served as

Texas A&M's team physician for five years.

At Tech, Dr. Lagan serves as a physician at Student Health Services in the mornings and then works in athletics in the afternoons, either in his Merryman Center office or on the court or field.

Dr. Lagan and his wife, Dee, have four children — Dee, Lynn, Tim and Lee.

Ron Esteban begins his second year as the athletic trainer for the Hokies but he is no stranger to the Virginia Tech athletic program. He earned a both a bachelor's degree in Sports Medicine in

1991 and a Master's degree in Athletic Administration in 1993 from Tech. Esteban works directly with the women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, women's lacrosse and volleyball teams.

Prior to returning to Blacksburg, Esteban spent three years in Orlando, Fla. working at Florida Hospital as Manager of Community and Sports Medicine. While in Florida he worked with many elite athletes from the NBA, WNBA and collegiate athletics. Esteban also served as the medical coordinator for the Disney World Marathon for three years as well as serving as the medical coordinator for the 1999 and 2000 All-Star Gridiron Classic, a college senior all-star football game held in Orlando. He also was a co-host of a weekly radio show, "The Sports Medicine Specialists." Esteban was an Associate Board Member with Florida Citrus Sports and was a Board Member with The Orlando Downtown Athletic Club.

Esteban served as marketing director for HealthSouth in North Carolina for two years before moving to Florida. During this period he also worked at the Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta.



uses specific programs for each injury in an effort to get the athlete back quickly.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athlete year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity.

"If our strength and conditioning is so important and it is — then we owe it to our athletes to provide them with the necessary resources to keep them actively participating," Goforth said. "We basically adopt the attitude that during the season, our mission is to keep them participating on court, and during the other times of the year it is our job to keep them participating in our strength and conditioning programs."

Their programs consist of strengthening, stretching and most importantly movement pattern analysis and training to help prevent the re-occurrence of injuries.

"We value the off-season greatly within our department," Goforth said. "We have adopted the same mindset as our strength and conditioning staff and look at our off-season time as an opportunity to get our athletes better as opposed to time off for our staff."

A vital part of studentathletes services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully-operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

Dr. Lagan has office hours at Schiffert in the mornings and is usually in the athletic complex in the afternoons.

Student-athletes can also go to Schiffert Student Health Center to be seen by a practitioner or see an

orthopedic surgeon, if necessary. If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can rehab at the Merryman Center. Staff psychologists, located in the Cook Counseling Center, are also available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues.


"Our goal is to provide the same high level of health care that professional and Olympic athletes receive," Goforth said. "Our usage of specialist care is modeled after the NFL system and incorporates components of the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs."

Dr. Lagan, along with athletic trainer Ron Esteban and team orthopedic surgeon Dr. Marc Siegel, care for the medical needs of athletes on Tech's women's basketball team.

These practitioners are assisted by a staff of seven graduate assistants and 15 student trainers in caring for Tech's 20 other varsity sports.

always proven to be a tough arena for opponents, especially in the past four seasons where the Hokies are 46-12 (.793) under Coach Bonnie Henrickson.

The 1998-99 home season gave Hokie fans plenty of drama and excitement as Tech roared to a 15-0 mark in the friendly confines of the Cassell. Going back two games into the 1997-98 season and extending through the 1999-00 opener, Tech won 18 straight at home.

Equally as impressive as the Hokies' play at home has been the tremendous numbers of people that have come to watch them play. Averaging 5,221 fans per game in 1998-99 and having a sell-out at the 10,052seat arena, Tech shattered it's women's basketball attendance marks. In the Bonnie Henrickson era Tech has played before 180,047 fans at home, an average of 3,104.

Cassell Coliseum was the site of a sub-regional in the 1999 NCAA Tournament. In that marquee event, the Hokies played in front of packed houses and got wins over St. Peter's and Auburn to advance to the NCAA Sweet 16. In the past nine years, Virginia Tech has posted a 99-29 (.773) mark in home games. Overall, the Hokies have compiled a 214-100 record in Cassell Coliseum for a winning percentage of 68.2 in the 25 years they have played in the campus arena. The Tech women have won 40 of their last 50 home games.

On September 17, 1977, Virginia Tech officials and friends dedicated the Coliseum in honor of the late Stuart K. Cassell. Cassell became a

member of the University administration in 1945 after 17 years as a student and teacher at Tech. He successfully convinced the Board of Visitors of the need for a modern basketball facility.

Construction for the main portion of the Coliseum began in 1961. It was completed in December, 1964, at a cost of \$2.7 million. Built by T.C. Brittain and Company of Decatur, Ga., it houses the

is named in honor of J.E. Jamerson and his son, William E. Jamerson, owners of the firm that built the building.

The complex contains administrative and coaching offices, athletic department accounting and business offices, team and coaches' meeting rooms, a weight room and the Gordon D. Bowman Memorial Club Room on the top floor for Hokie Club members.

Prior to the 1988-89 season, a modern, new spring-loaded playing floor was installed in the Coliseum. During 1996-97, the facility was upgraded with a new roof and paint application. During the 2000-01

season, new video boards were added at both ends of the coliseum which are used for live action and video replays during all games. A \$900,000 seating renovation project was undertaken following last season. All of the seats were dismantled and shipped to a plant in Michigan where the old paint was stripped off and refinished to the natural look of the elm wood.

The Hokies' Locker Room

When the final whistle blows after a game or practice, the Hokie basketball team retires to one of the finest locker room facilities in the nation. The entire locker room underwent a major renovation in the summer of 2000 and now features all of the comforts of home and then some.

The facility features a new entrance on to the playing floor,


a team meeting room, a trophy case, a shower room, a training area and a new video system. The locker room also includes new floors, ceiling and lights. The entrance to the area has a wooden floor painted to match the game floor.

Another nice touch in the state-of-the art facility are the vanities located between each of lockers.

The cost of the renovation project was approximately \$225,000 and would not have been possible without a generous gift from the Roanoke Valley Hokie Club.

The Merryman Center

Virginia Tech is very proud of the Merryman Center, a \$10.6 million all-purpose building that ranks as one of the finest facilities of its kind in college athletics.

The beautiful facility is the home of the Hokie women's basketball program.

Located directly behind Cassell Coliseum and the Jamerson Athletic Center, Merryman opened its doors to athletes in the fall of 1997 and officially was dedicated Sept. 26, 1998 in a university ceremony.

The facility is named for the F.W. (Sonny) Merryman family of Rustburg, Va., which presented the university with a major gift, kicking off a fundraising campaign that saw Tech supporters dig deep into their pockets.

The result is a streamlined 40,000-square-foot facility that includes:

On the first floor: A sports medicine complex complete with training rooms and doctors offices; a strength and conditioning complex that



is magnificent; and a speed and agility gym.


And on the second floor: The women's basketball offices, a 130-seat auditorium; a video department; football meeting rooms; offices; and a new entrance way to the athletic department which provides visitors with a brilliant display of Tech football memorabilia.

The exterior of the building is streamlined, too, and has a definite Hokie motif. Even the roof, the only maroon one on the Virginia Tech campus, adds a touch of school spirit. The outside of the Merryman Center is a combination of Hokie stone and a more simplified stone that matches that on Cassell Coliseum, the building next door.

"This is a facility that is really special in every way," says Tech Director of Athletics Jim Weaver. "When everything is in place, there is no doubt in my mind that the Merryman Center will rank right at the very top among the great buildings in college athletics."

The building represents a commitment on behalf of the university. The construction of Merryman clearly demonstrates the university's determination to maintain a top athletic program year in and year out.

Weaver expressed appreciation to the Merryman family on behalf of Tech athletes, staff members and fans everywhere. The Tech AD also thanked the hundreds of others whose contributions have made possible this great building.

Virginia Tech Athletic Fund

Buoyed by full membership in the BIG EAST Conference, another 11-1 season by the Hokie football team and a Gator Bowl victory, and the planned expansion of Lane Stadium, the Virginia Tech Athletic Fund realized new levels of financial support from its ever-expanding donor base of over 12,000 members. In 2000 a new record for giving was set as gifts exceeded \$10 million.

The Hokie Club is charged with raising funds to support the scholarship, capital and programmatic needs of the Athletic Department.
