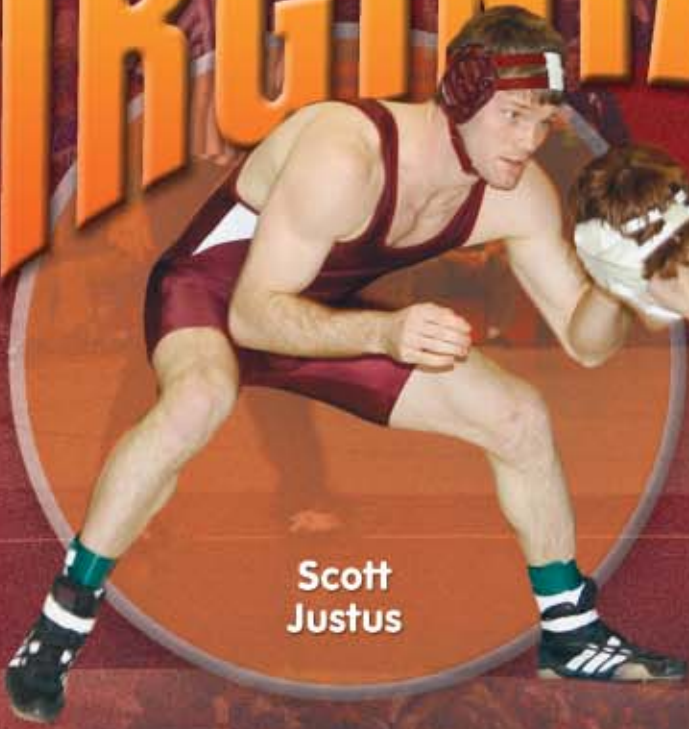
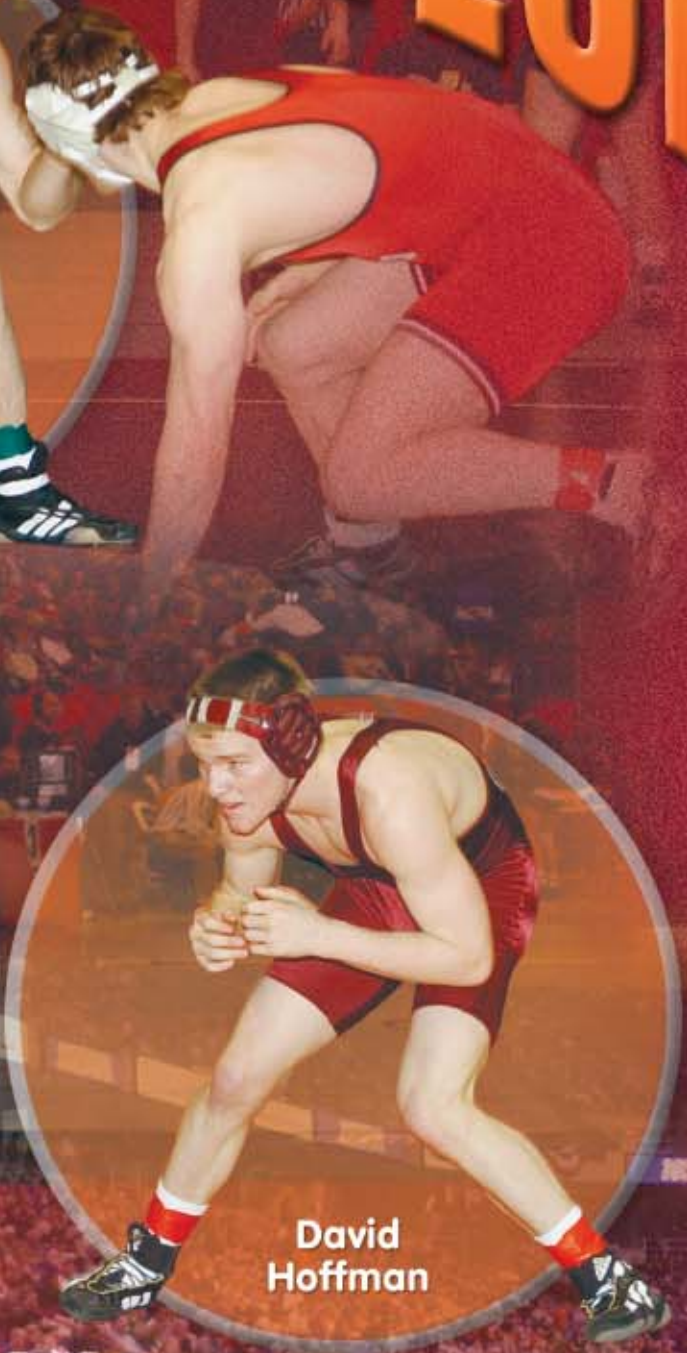

Since its founding in 1872, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has grown from a small college of 132 students into Virginia's largest university and its top research institution. During its 130 years of existence, Virginia's premiere land-grant institution has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, our economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has challenged the university to become one of the country's top 30 research institutions by the end of the decade.

Virginia Tech is organized into eight colleges — Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Arts and Sciences, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Human Resources and Education, Natural Resources, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Plans have been approved to restructure the university, which will result in the creation of a College of Biological, Mathematical, and Physical Sciences next year. Together, the colleges offer about 175 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs to approximately 26,000 undergraduate and graduate students.

Many of Virginia Tech's traditions and strengths are rooted in the university's motto, *Ut Prosim* ("That I May Serve") and its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and outreach. By generating new knowledge through research and through its outreach mandate, Virginia Tech disseminates practical knowledge both in and out of the classroom, reaching beyond its student body to affect society as a whole. Virginia Tech — a university that puts knowledge to work.

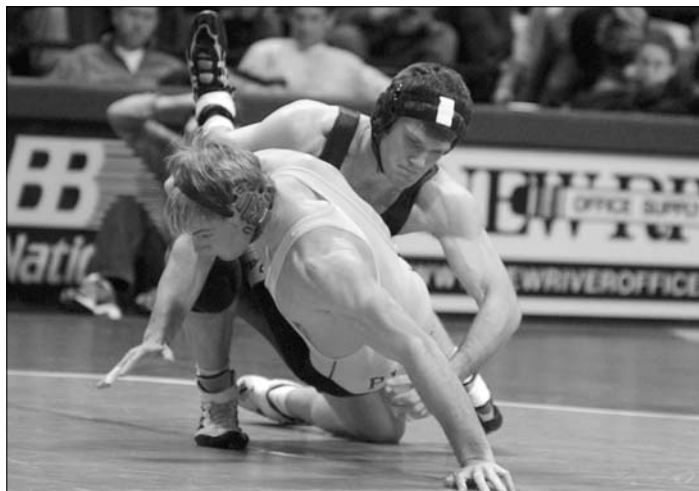

THE OUTLOOK

Young Hokies Looking to Step Up This Year

The Virginia Tech wrestling team will face a tough challenge this year. Not only does it tackle a tough schedule, one that features defending national champion Minnesota and an always-challenging Eastern Wrestling League slate, but head coach Keith Mourlam must replace all-everything Sean Gray, who broke just about every school record en route to earning All-America honors twice.

The good news is Mourlam returns nine starters from last year's squad, including two NCAA qualifiers. Mourlam also brings in a strong recruiting class that includes three wrestlers who could see action right away.

"We have a very young team, but I think it's a talented team," Mourlam says. "I'm excited about this season. I think we should have a much better dual season and hopefully we'll have a better national tournament than we had last year."

In all, seven wrestlers are expected to retain their starting jobs at their respective weight classes, but could face serious challenges.

Here's a look at each weight class and who figures into the mix:

125 — **Geoff Head** is the leader for the starting job. The junior transfer went 16-12 last year as the starter and is looking to improve on a solid first year in Blacksburg. He will be challenged by freshman **Kyle Graham**, who set the Virginia High School League record for career victories with 181.

133 — **David Hoffman** is the leader at this spot after a stellar freshman campaign. He went 29-10 overall and made a lot of noise at the NCAA Championships, pulling off several upsets. For his performance, he was named a Freshman All-American by *Amateur Wrestling News*. Sophomore **Dalton Head**, who redshirted last year after transferring, will also see some action.

141 — Replacing Gray is not going to be easy, but **Tyde Prater** will likely draw this assignment. The freshman from Grundy was a three-time state champion and will be a good addition to the team. **Aaron Brown** could also challenge for time here. The transfer from George Mason went 137-13 while in high school and wrestled with Hoffman at The Hill School. **Jim Miller** and **Stephen Goldenzweig** will provide depth at this weight class.

149 — Freshman **Andrew Donofrio** is the top man at this weight class headed into the season. The four-time state champion and high school All-America selection brings impressive credentials to Blacksburg and is expected to contribute immediately. **Reed Carpenter** will also battle for the spot. The sophomore went 14-17 last year as the starter here.

157 — **Chris Stith** will likely be the man here. The JUCO transfer is a physical presence who will be a good addition to the lineup. He placed seventh last year at the National Junior College Championships at 157 pounds. **Shaun Guttridge**, who saw some action last year at this weight, will push for time on the mat.

165 — Senior **Mike Cox** will likely be the starter here, returning after a 9-18 campaign a year ago. He is looking to make the most of his final year and improve on his record. **Justin Knapp** and **Chris Engle** will provide depth at this weight class.

174 — **Steve Borja**, a freshman from Pennsylvania who won a state championship as a senior, will likely win the starting job. Sophomore **Tomas Ovale** went 5-21 in his first season, but is looking to turn it around this season. Junior **Jerome Villanueva** is also capable of wrestling at this spot.

184 — There's no doubt as to who the starter is here as senior **Scott Justus** is coming off a record-setting season. Justus, who won the EWL Tournament at this class, posted a perfect 29-0 regular-season record and headed into the NCAA Championships seeded No. 1, a first in school history. Unfortunately, he ran into some tough competition and fell short of his goal of All-America status. He has one last chance at that goal this year and will stop at nothing to achieve it.

197 — Sophomore **Canaan Prater** was scheduled to redshirt last season, but injuries forced him into action. He ended up posting a 12-12 mark and will be the starter again this year. With a year of experience under his belt, look for big things from the Grundy, Va., native.

Heavyweight — Junior **Michael Carr** held the job at 197 pounds last year until a nagging shoulder injury cut his season short after posting a 5-4 mark. He bumps up to the heavyweight spot this year and will likely be the starter. **Pete Pool** held this spot last year and posted a 10-20 overall mark. Both he and junior **Kris Wiedegreen** will provide good depth and will push for mat time here.

Mourlam put together a rugged schedule for this team, including appearances at the Virginia Duals and the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Open. Those two events feature some of the best wrestlers in the country and should prepare the Hokies for what they'll see come tournament time.

Toss in a tough EWL schedule and this young squad will be tested every time it steps on the mat. With a tough dual meet and tournament schedule, Mourlam has his hands full. A strong recruiting class that is expected to contribute right away helps, but Tech is still a young team.

Justus and Hoffman will have to be the anchors of the lineup with more wrestlers stepping up in big matches. If some wrestlers do this, the Hokies have the chance to be a good team.

"We could be very good, or we could struggle," Mourlam says. "It all depends on how our young guys perform over the course of a long season. But I'm excited about the prospects of this year."

HEAD COACH KEITH MOURLAM

Since taking over the Virginia Tech wrestling program prior to the 1997 season, head coach Keith Mourlam has turned Tech into a national-caliber program, capable of contending for conference titles and putting top-notch wrestlers on the mat against quality opponents.

In five years, he has led the Hokies to league championships, coached numerous league champions and helped Sean Gray and Chris Martin earn All-America honors.

Recognized nationally for his feats, Mourlam was named *Amateur Wrestling News*' Rookie Coach of the Year in 1997 and Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year in 1998.

He led the Hokies to back-to-back top-25 finishes at the NCAA Championships in both 2000 and 2001. Last season, he had three wrestlers qualify, including top-seeded Scott Justus and third-seeded Gray. NCAA qualifier David Hoffman earned Freshman All-America honors from *Amateur Wrestling News*.

Under his tutelage, Gray became Tech's all-time greatest wrestler, leaving the school with several records, including career wins, pins, pins in a season and career winning percentage. Gray is also the only two-time All-American in wrestling at Tech.

With a final record of 10-8 in 1997, Mourlam became the first

Tech head coach to lead his squad to a season finish above .500 and earn double-digit wins in his first year.

In the 1999-2000 season, Mourlam led the Hokies to a 10-7 overall record, a third-place finish in the EWL and a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Five of his wrestlers qualified for the NCAAs while Gray and Martin earned All-America honors. For his efforts, Mourlam was named both the Virginia state and EWL Coach of the Year.

In the 2000-01 season, four wrestlers qualified for the NCAAs and led the Hokies to a tie for 23rd place as Gray once again earned All-America status.

A championship wrestler at the University of Iowa — one of the top wrestling programs in the nation — Mourlam began his first year as the head wrestling coach at Virginia Tech after serving as coach Jerry Cheynet's top assistant during the 1995-96 season.

As the recruiting coordinator during that year, Mourlam signed an outstanding recruiting class which earned accolades from *Amateur Wrestling News* as the 21st-best incoming class in the nation, a first for a Tech wrestling team.

In the 1997-98 season, Mourlam guided Tech to a 9-4 record, a perfect 5-0 mark in the CAA, the CAA dual-meet title, the CAA Tournament title and sent four wrestlers to the NCAAs.

Mourlam continues to put Virginia Tech wrestling on the map as the Hokies accepted an invitation five years ago to join the highly-competitive Eastern Wrestling League.

Mourlam had the opportunity to use his coaching expertise in national competition as he served as the head coach for the United States freestyle team at the Pan American Games in

Winnipeg, Canada in 1998. The previous year he served as the assistant coach for the United States Senior team at the Pan American Games in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Mourlam came to Tech as a standout coach and collegiate wrestler. The 1977 Iowa graduate has been a part of four NCAA Championship teams — two as a student-athlete in 1975 and '76, and two as the assistant coach at his alma mater in 1985 and '86. During his senior year, Mourlam was the Big Ten Conference champion and runner-up for the NCAA title at 126 pounds.

Following his illustrious college career, Mourlam continued competing and was a two-time United States Wrestling Federation freestyle champion in 1981 and '82. During those two years, he traveled as a member of an international team competing in Germany, Cuba and Hungary.

Immediately out of college, Mourlam became the assistant coach at the University of Northern Iowa for a two-year stint. He then moved on to assist nationally-recognized head coach Dan Gable at his alma mater, Iowa, for three years. Gaining considerable experience with a highly-respected coach and collegiate program, Mourlam worked as an assistant from 1984 until 1987 when he took over the position of administrative assistant. In that position, Mourlam had the opportunity to run the Dan Gable Training Camps.

"Keith is very intense and knows the sport inside and out," former Iowa head coach Dan Gable said. "He is an excellent teacher and has a great ability to communicate his knowledge of the sport to his athletes. Keith has been around championship teams and knows what it takes to win. He will do an excellent job at Virginia Tech."

Mourlam was named the Wrestling Coach of the Year for Division II & III Virginia collegiate state champion Newport News Apprentice School for two consecutive years in 1994 and 1995. He was head coach there until accepting the assistant job at Tech.

Mourlam expanded his coaching expertise from the collegiate ranks to international competition beginning in 1992 when he was the assistant coach of the Senior United States wrestling team. Among his long list of coaching accomplishments, Mourlam has acted as the head coach of the championship East team in the 1994 Olympic Festival, head coach of the 1995 USA Senior Freestyle team and head coach of the 1995 USA World Espior Freestyle team.

Wes HAND



Two-time collegiate All-American Wes Hand begins his first year as the top assistant for the Hokie wrestling program. He comes to Tech after serving as a volunteer assistant coach the past two seasons at the University of Iowa, his alma mater.

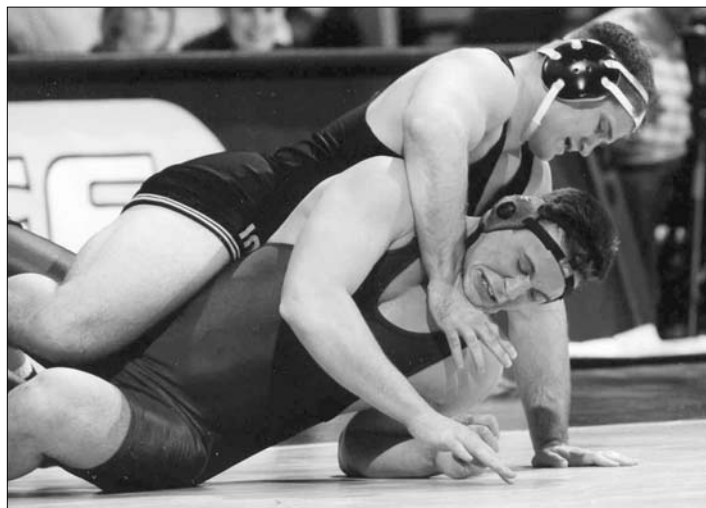
While wrestling at Iowa, Hand recorded a career record of 102-32 with 18 falls while earning four letters. He was a runner-up at heavyweight in 2000 and placed eighth in the country in 1998.

As a senior, Hand also was the runner-up at the Big Ten Championships, posting a 31-3 season record. He went 17-1 in dual meets and 8-0 in Big Ten duals. Hand won the title at the Midlands Open and the Central Missouri Open. Two of his losses were to eventual national champion Brock Lesnar of Minnesota. He avenged his only other loss to Trent Hynek of Iowa State with an 8-3 victory in the semifinals of the NCAA Championships. He also defeated Lesnar, 5-3, in the final dual match of his career. In addition, he was the winner of the Mike Howard Most Valuable Wrestler Award at Iowa.

As a junior, in 1999, Hand placed eighth at the Big Ten Meet. He posted a 27-7 season record, going 9-2 in dual meets. He was 3-2 in Big Ten duals, but missed the last nine dual meets of the season due to an ankle injury. He placed first at the Northern Iowa Open, third at the Ryan-Kaufman Brand Open and fourth at the Midlands Championships. Hand started the season strong, winning the first 19 collegiate matches. He also scored four major decisions and three technical falls during the season and won the Team Contribution Award.

In 1998, Hand earned his first All-America honors after placing eighth at the NCAA Meet. He placed fourth at the Big Ten Meet, won the title at the Northern Iowa Open and placed fourth at the Midlands Championships. For the season, he posted a record of 23-12, 10-6 in dual matches, with two pins.

As a redshirt freshman in 1997, he placed seventh at the Big



Ten Meet. His season record was 21-9 with three pins and he placed fourth at the Midlands Championships, winning five consecutive wrestleback matches. That year, he won a 3-2 decision over Iowa State's Trent Hynek to seal a 20-18 Hawkeye dual victory in Ames. For his effort, he won the Team Contribution award.

In 1996, Hand redshirted. He recorded a 6-4 mark with three falls while wrestling unattached.

At South Tama High School, Hand was a Second-Team All-American and first-team all-state as a senior. He compiled a career record of 163-16 with 87 falls. As a senior, he was a state champion, posting a 44-0 mark with 32 pins. He also won the Junior Nationals title as a senior. Hand lettered in football as well, and was an honor roll member.

A native of Tama, Iowa, Hand, 26, graduated from the University of Iowa in 2001 with a B.S. in health, leisure and sport studies.

Andre DREHER



Andre Dreher begins his first year with the Virginia Tech wrestling program. Dreher comes to Blacksburg after serving as an assistant coach at the University of Virginia for two seasons. He also was the head wrestling coach at T.L. Hanna High School in Anderson, S.C., from 1996-1999.

Dreher was previously an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Clemson University from 1994-1996, where he worked with the football and

track and field teams.

Dreher brings hands-on experience to Virginia Tech after wrestling at Anderson (S.C.) College, where he was a 1995 NCCAA wrestling champion and served as the team captain from 1992-95.

He toured Hungary in 1993 on a national team and was the 1989 and 1990 two-time state wrestling runner-up in South Carolina for Lexington High.

Dreher received his B.A. from Anderson College in 1996 with a minor in history and a special emphasis in language and religion.

2001-02 SEASON IN REVIEW

Several Records Fall in Up and Down Season

The 2001-02 version of Virginia Tech wrestling experienced the ups and downs expected of a youthful team. Sure, there was experience returning, but there were also several question marks. The young team featured only two returning starters from the 2001 squad and seven of the regular starters weren't even at Tech before last season.

The Hokies went 5-10 overall and 1-6 in the tough Eastern Wrestling League. Three wrestlers — David Hoffman, Sean Gray and Scott Justus — advanced to the NCAA Championships at Albany, N.Y., and helped the Hokies come away with a 44th-place finish.

Tech started the season out on the road at No. 11 Edinboro. The Hokies made it surprisingly close, but fell 22-15 to the heavily-favored Fighting Scots. Tech rebounded by defeating Gardner-Webb, 43-7, on the road.

The annual trip to the Navy Classic yielded a third-place team finish while Justus won the 184-pound weight class.

At the Penn State Open, Justus again won his weight class while Gray was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler after winning his 141-pound class.

After a 42-9 loss to top-ranked Minnesota and a tough 23-18 setback to No. 12 Lock Haven, the Hokies bounced back to down Bloomsburg, 28-13, in Blacksburg. The highlight of the Minnesota match came when Justus came from behind to beat nationally-ranked Damion Hahn, 3-1, in sudden victory. The win marked the second in as many tries for the Grundy native over Hahn.

At the Virginia Duals in Hampton, the Hokies opened with a loss to North Carolina, but came back to beat Virginia, 21-18, when Hoffman came from behind to win his match in the final bout. The Hokies finished the Duals with a 30-13 setback to No. 20 Pittsburgh.

At the Virginia State Meet, five Hokies (Gray, Hoffman, Justus, Geoff Head and Canaan Prater) won their respective weight class as Tech cruised to the team title. Head coach Keith Moulam was named the Virginia State Coach of the Year for the second time in his career following the tournament.

Following a 26-16 loss to No. 21 Pittsburgh at home, the Hokies trounced Appalachian State on the road, winning 37-12. After a tough loss to Division II power Pitt-Johnstown and a 29-9 loss to No. 11 West Virginia, the Hokies took to the road for another match against in-state rival Virginia.

With pins from Justus, Hoffman and Gray, as well as a decision from Prater, the Hokies led 21-6 with four matches to go. The Cavaliers fought valiantly, but in the end, the Hokies held on for an exciting 21-19 victory.

Tech ended the regular season on the road, falling to Clarion and Cleveland State.

At the EWL Tournament, Tech had five wrestlers place,

including championships from Gray and Justus. Hoffman faltered early, but came back to take sixth place. Prater and Mike Cox (165 pounds) also took sixth place in their respective weight classes.

Gray and Justus automatically qualified for the NCAA Championships, and Hoffman was granted one of nine coaches' wild-card slots. The three headed to Albany, N.Y., to represent both Tech and the EWL.

Justus entered the Championships with a perfect 29-0 record and was seeded No. 1 at 184 pounds. In the first round, he came out sluggish and fell to unseeded Rowdy Lundegreen of Cal-State Bakersfield. He fought through the disappointment to come back and beat Jeremy Wilson of Portland State, 8-6 in sudden victory.

His season was ended with a 5-3 loss to No. 11 Travis Pascoe of Nebraska, in his first match of the third session. With the loss, Justus ended his season with a 30-2 record. The .938 winning percentage for Justus set a new Tech record (minimum of 24 wins). It replaced Gray's .930 percentage (40-3 record) from the 1999-2000 season.

Gray entered the Championships seeded fourth at 141 pounds and easily won his opening round pigtail match, pinning Brown's Clinton Frease in 2:43. He came back to advance to the round of 16 with a 6-0 win over Oregon's Brian Watson.

In the second session of competition, Gray's dream of a national championship was dashed when he fell to unseeded Nate Parker of Oklahoma, 6-3. On the second day, Gray bounced

back to beat Chad Caros of Edinboro, 9-2, before falling to 11th-seeded Robert Sessley of OSU, 12-5, to end his record-setting career.

Gray finished his career with a record of 133-19, the best ever at Tech. He recorded 45 pins in his career, also a school best. He left as Tech's only two-time All-American in wrestling and leaves as the school record holder in career wins, career pins, pins in a season and career winning percentage.

Hoffman made big waves in his first appearance at the Championships. After falling to David Douglas of Arizona State, 12-5, in the first round, he came back to upset 12th-seeded Rad Martinez of Clarion, 5-3. The win made Martinez the first ranked wrestler to be eliminated from the tournament in any weight class.

Hoffman continued to wrestle well, beating Chris Spaeller of Lock Haven, 9-7 in sudden victory, on the second day. His season came to an end with a 3-1 loss to 10th-seeded Phil Mansueto of Cleveland State. He finished his rookie campaign with a 29-10 record, garnering freshman All-America honors.

Hokie Wrestlers in the Tech Sports Hall of Fame

The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to honor and preserve the memory of athletes, coaches, administrators and staff members who have made outstanding contributions to athletics at the university. A total 111 individuals have been inducted to the Tech Hall of Fame during special ceremonies held each fall. Following is a list of those in the Hall Of Fame who were inducted and their list of accomplishments. Some of the following were inducted for other sports, but all have ties to the Virginia Tech wrestling team. Gene Breen, a Southern Conference heavyweight champion in the 1960s was inducted this past November.

Milton Andes, inducted in 1994

A 125-pound wrestling champion of 1920s who went on to fame as a National AAU champion.



Frank Teske, inducted in 1995

He led Tech to seven Southern Conference wrestling championships in a 23-year coaching stint.



Brandon Glover, inducted in 1988

One of Tech's All-American wrestlers. He was a four-time Southern conference champion who lost only one match in his college career.



Sherman Vandevender, inducted in 2001

A four-time Southern Conference wrestling champion who advanced to the final Olympic tryouts in 1956.



Don Oakes, inducted in 2001

His contribution as a lineman for the Hokies from 1957 through 1960 paved the way for a successful career as a pro football player and high school coach. He also wrestled for Tech in the late 1950s.



Ken Whitley, inducted in 1990

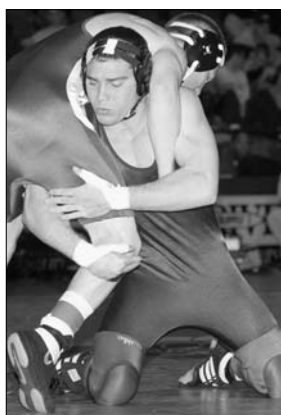
A dynamic football star and heavyweight wrestler of the 1960s.

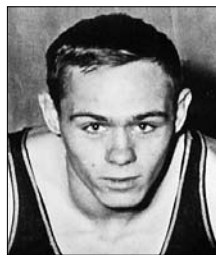

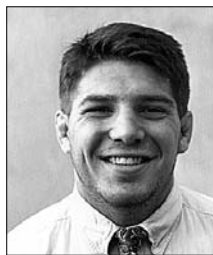

Brandon Glover, from Norfolk, Va., became Tech's first All-American in wrestling when he took third place in the 130-pound weight class at the 1959 NCAA Championships in Iowa City.

A four-time Southern Conference champion (1957-60), Glover went undefeated in his career except in the semifinals of those Championships.

For his career, the Granby High graduate went 26-0 in career dual meets and was a 1988 inductee into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame.

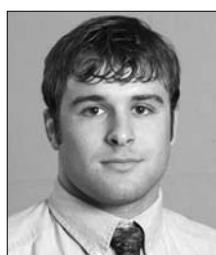

Josh Feldman became Tech's second All-American in wrestling when he took seventh place in the 1994 NCAA Championships at the heavyweight division in Chapel Hill, N.C.

A three-time Colonial Athletic Association champion (1992-94), the native of Dunwoody, Ga., is currently fifth all-time at Tech in career pins with 23 and sixth in all-time wins.

The graduate of Dunwoody High posted a career record of 85-23-1 for the Hokies.

Chris Martin became Virginia Tech's third All-American in wrestling when he took fourth place at the 2000 NCAA Championships at 165 pounds in St. Louis.

Also an Eastern Wrestling League Champion in 2000, the native of Norfolk, Va., posted a career record of 126-25, second-best all-time at Tech.

He is tied for the career dual meet wins mark at Tech with 58 victories and is fifth all-time at Tech in career pins with 25.

The graduate of Granby High is also third in career winning percentage, finishing with a .824 clip, as well as second on the all-time victories list with 126 wins.

Sean Gray became Tech's first two-time All-American in wrestling when he finished seventh at 141 pounds at the 2001 NCAA Championships in Iowa City.

He became Tech's fourth All-American when he placed sixth at the 2000 Championships in St. Louis.

The Flemington, N.J., native was a three-time EWL Champion and holds the school record for career wins (133), career winning percentage (.875), pins in a season (15) and career pins (45).

For his career, the graduate of Blair Academy posted a career record of 133-19.

He also finished his career tied for the most career dual meet wins at Tech with 58 victories.

WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question at Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body.

Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any meaning to it, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was only used as an attention-getter for his yell.

It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

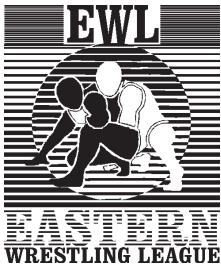

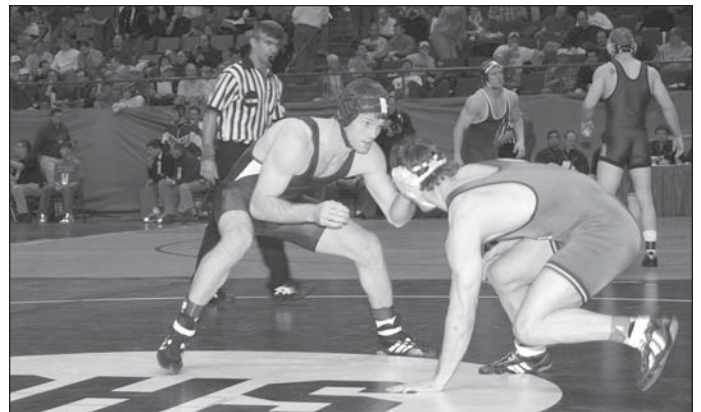

qualifiers for the NCAA Wrestling Championships, the third most qualifiers in the country behind the Big Ten and Pac-10 Conferences.

This past season, the EWL crowned four All-Americans and a national champion in West Virginia's Greg Jones at 174 pounds. The league had three teams finish in the top 30.

The EWL was formed in 1976 with Bloomsburg, Clarion, Lock Haven, Penn State, Pittsburgh and Buffalo as its charter members. After Buffalo left the league in 1978, Cleveland State and West Virginia were added. Millersville was briefly a member from 1982 to 1984. In 1989, Edinboro was added before Penn State left for the Big Ten at the conclusion of the 1992 season.



Senior Scott Justus won the 184-pound class at the 2002 EWL Championships. He went on to represent both Tech and the conference at the NCAA Championship, entering the event seeded No. 1 in the nation.

Virginia Tech is a member of the BIG EAST Conference in all sports other than wrestling, which competes in the Eastern Wrestling League. The Virginia Tech Athletics Department administers 21 Division I sports.

This year's Eastern Wrestling League Championships will be held at West Virginia University in Morgantown, W.Va.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes.

The department, under the leadership of Gunnar Brolinson, D.O., Delmas Bolin, M.D., and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed the Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This 4,300-square-foot area consolidated the training rooms

that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The new facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is state-of-the-art equipment and a unique style of architecture in the facility.

The new room, which nearly doubles the size of the former Merryman Center facility, also allows the staff to utilize that room for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally.

In addition, the \$10 million Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, will supplement the new training room.

This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities including electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot packs and interferential current. It also has

an office for the staff, dozens of training tables, whirlpools, rehabilitation equipment and two cold tubs. In addition, a new training room has been constructed in Rector Field House and serves the teams when they practice there.

The training, medical and strength and conditioning staffs each have a role in bringing the athlete back quickly and ready to play. After an injury, an athlete will go through rehabilitation and physical therapy. Athletes are then moved to weight training as they become able. The strength and conditioning staff uses specific programs for each injury in an effort to get the athlete back quickly.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries.

A vital part of student-athletes services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center

in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully-operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

Student-athletes can also go to Schiffert Student Health Center to be seen by a practitioner or see an orthopaedic surgeon, if necessary. If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can rehab at the Merryman Center.

Staff psychologists, located in the Cook Counseling Center, are also available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues.

There are five Certified Athletic Trainers assisted by a staff of seven G.A.s and 15 student trainers in caring for Tech's 21 varsity sports. Jesse Donnenwerth begins his first year as a student trainer for the wrestling team.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's athletic program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

Chris Helms, in his fourth year at Tech, is responsible for the development and leadership of the SAASS office. Helms oversees an office comprised of associate directors Lois Berg and Colin Howlett, assistant directors Katie Ammons, Renia Edwards, Becky Kolenbrander and Drew Scales, and secretary Terrie Repass. Helms oversees the academic progress of the wrestling team.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

SAASS provides programming for all student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall adjacent to the SAASS

office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT Lab (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) houses over 26 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum and laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes to use when traveling to away contests.

The athletic department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Additionally, student-athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site offices, located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls.

With the help of these resources, the Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 71 percent in 2002 as compared to the national average of 58 percent. The 71 percent student-athlete graduation rate marks the fourth time in nine years that Tech has reached that level.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

Gentry is in his 15th year as the Hokies' director of strength and conditioning. His duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all 21 varsity sports at Virginia Tech. A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received a bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and a master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981. He received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior, from Virginia Tech in 1999. In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year.

The wrestling team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the Haren Weight Room is a 5,000-square foot weight room officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports, and Emily Chones, strength and conditioning

coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of five graduate assistants — Erin O'Neil, Lisa Guameri, Keith Short, Gabe Teeple and Ken Oxendine.

Sports Nutrition

A new program was added to the athletics department in July 2000 — sports nutrition.

The department is continually evolving to best serve the student-athlete.

In July 2002, Amy Freel, former coordinator of student life, became the full-time sports nutritionist in the Athletics Department.

Freel works one-on-one with student-athletes

to provide them with information that they need on their diets. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and how to eat to improve performance.

Sports Psychology

Another addition to the athletics department as of August 2000 is sports

psychology. The licensed psychologists, Dr. Gary Bennett and Dr. Robert Miller, associate director of the Thomas E. Cook Counseling Center, counsel student-athletes either individually or as a team.

The psychologists meet with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling, performance enhancement and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. As a team, the sports psychologists work on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

The psychologists also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process.

Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sports psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week.



The Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room

Blacksburg Virginia College Town U.S.A.



One of America's classic college towns, Blacksburg is a perfect setting for Virginia Tech.

Located in Southwest Virginia on a plateau between the Blue Ridge and Alleghany Mountains, Blacksburg combines the laid-back lifestyle of a small town with the amenities one would expect to find around a major center of higher education. Together, the town and university have worked hard to create a progressive community that ranks among the nation's elite living environments. Blacksburg was recently named one of the Top 10 places to live by *Outside* magazine.

Virginia Tech and the Town of Blacksburg gained national and international attention by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the quaint town's potential.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that accentuate the area. The nearly 40,000 residents (including students) enjoy a close proximity to a variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Appalachian Trail, Claytor Lake and the New River.


