THE OUTLOOK

Wrestling Team Looking For First EWL Championship

A few years ago, Tech wrestling coach Keith Mourlam, knowing he possessed a talented group of young wrestlers, would whisper to anyone who would listen.

"Just give me three years," he would say.

Well, this is year No. 3, and true to Mourlam's words, the Hokies go into this season with perhaps the best squad in school history. Coming off a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Wrestling Championships this past March in which Tech crowned two All-Americans, the Hokies enter this season with all their top guns back and ranked No. 19 in the preseason *Amateur Wrestling News* poll.

"I don't think it's any added pressure for us," Mourlam said. "Not for these guys. They're looking forward to this. This is what we've worked for and talked about for so long. Last year was key for us. It gave us confidence and confidence is what it's all about. You've got to think you're good first before you can win."

Last year marked a turning point in Tech's program. The previous year — with Mourlam redshirting all his top wrestlers to get them stronger mentally and physically — the Hokies won just two dual meets in their inaugural season in the powerful Eastern Wrestling League. But last season, with everyone in the fold, Tech surprised people in the wrestling world by finishing third at the EWL tournament and sending five guys to the NCAA Championships. This season, four of those guys who made it to the NCAA Championships return.

"We're looking for a finish in the top half in the EWL and then compete for that title come tournament time," Mourlam said. "I think we can finish in the top three again. We've got some great individuals, but we're going to need some of our other guys to come through and place."

Here's a look at each weight class and who looks to figure into the mix:

125 — Mourlam will be putting freshman Phill Niklowicz in at 125. Niklowicz, a native of Caro, Mich., was a two-time Michigan state champion for Caro High School. He holds the school record for most wins in a season (58) and for most career wins (218).

133 — Mourlam will turn to senior Jeremy Gaysek. Gaysek provides Tech with EWL experience and is looking to have a very good final season at Tech.

141 — Sean Gray comes into the season as the top contender to win the EWL at 141 and is currently ranked fourth nationally at that weight class. He finished last season with a 40-3 record, the third-most wins in a season at Tech, and his winning percentage (93.2) is the highest single-season winning percentage in school history.

149 — Mourlam more than likely will be relying on another freshman to compete at 149 pounds. Brent Rider, a native of Waverly, N.Y., comes to Tech after capturing the New York state championship at 140 pounds for Tioga High School in 1999. As a senior, Rider earned a second-place finish at the same weight. Mourlam also could go with Brian Wilson here.

157 — At 157, Mourlam needs at big year from Andrew Shuler. The sophomore from Lynchburg, Va., possesses a ton of

talent, but a knee injury kept him from reaching his full potential last season. The knee is fine now, and without question, he possesses the talent to get the job done.

165 — Chris Martin, the top contender for the EWL title at 165, went 34-5 last season and now stands as Tech's all-time win leader with 98. He enters the season as the fourth-ranked 165-pounder in the nation in what could be the country's toughest weight class.

174 — Hall, who went 22-8 last season and fell one win short of earning All-America honors last year at the NCAAs, comes into this year ranked sixth nationally at 174.

184 — Justus, who went 1-2 at the Championships in his first appearance a year ago, comes into the season ranked 15th nationally at 184. But in the EWL, the weight class isn't the strongest, so Justus stands a great shot at winning the title.

197 — At 197, Mourlam will be going with Wes Cummings, a redshirt freshman who transferred from Cal-Bakersfield this past spring. Cummings replaces steady Christian Basnight, the lone loss off last year's starting lineup.

Heavyweight — Finally, at heavyweight, Mourlam will use junior Ben Fisher. Last season, Doug Easlick, now a walk-on on Tech's football squad, wrestled at heavyweight. Easlick decided to concentrate on football, leaving the door open for Fisher.

As a team, Tech will find out how good it is quickly. Mourlam put together a rugged schedule for this team, including an appearance at the Cliff Keen Collegiate Wrestling Invitational and the National Wrestling Coaches Association Dual Meet Championship. Those two tournaments feature some of the best wrestlers in the country and should prepare the Hokies for what they'll see come tournament time.

Tech opens its EWL schedule on Dec. 9 at Cassell Coliseum against defending league champion Edinboro. The Fighting Scots come in as one of the nation's top 10 teams and feature a lineup with seven potential All-Americans.

"I think we'll be alright in dual meets, but I think we have the potential to be the best tournament team of anyone in the EWL," Mourlam said. "We've got three guys [Martin, Gray and Justus] who are ranked at the top of their weight classes and those guys along with Hall will bring in a lot of points. We need the other guys to help us too. That's the key for us.

"But this is the year we've been pointing to for a long time. We redshirted all those guys to get stronger and we took our lumps that one year. But hopefully, it will come together for us this year."

THE COACHES

KEITH MOURLAM • HEAD COACH



They say you never get a second chance to make a first impression. And the impression fifth-year head coach Keith Mourlam has made on Virginia Tech wrestling during his first four seasons is unprecedented.

Recognized nationally for his feats, Mourlam was named *Amateur Wrestling News*' Rookie Coach of the Year in 1997 and Colonial Athletic Association Coach of

the Year in 1998.

Every coach dreams of the opportunity to build an athletic program from the ground up, which is virtually what Mourlam has accomplished in his four short years at the helm. With a final record of 10-8 in 1997, Mourlam became the first head coach to lead his squad to a season finish above .500 and earn doubledigit wins in his inaugural year.

A year ago, Mourlam led the Hokies to a 10-7 overall record, a third-place finish in the Eastern Wrestling League and a 19thplace finish at the NCAA Championships. Five of his wrestlers — Mike Akers, Sean Gray, Eric Hall, Scott Justus and Chris Martin — qualified for the NCAAs while Gray and Martin earned All-America honors. For his efforts, Mourlam was named both the Virginia state and EWL Coach of the Year.

A championship wrestler at the University of Iowa — one of the top wrestling programs in the nation — Mourlam began his first year as the head wrestling coach at Virginia Tech after serving as coach Jerry Cheynet's top assistant during the 1995-96 season. As the recruiting coordinator during that year, Mourlam signed an outstanding recruiting class which earned

accolades from *Amateur Wrestling News* as the 21st-best incoming class in the nation, a first for a Tech wrestling team. The grapplers proved their worth as three wrestlers continued to national competition at the NCAAs.

Three years ago, Mourlam guided Tech to a 9-4 record, a perfect 5-0 mark in the CAA, the CAA dual-meet title, the CAA Tournament title and sent a school-record four wrestlers — Sean Gray, David Inkman, Chris Martin and Eric Hall — to the NCAA Championships. Gray, Inkman and Hall earned bids to the NCAA Championships after winning their respective weight classes at the CAA Championships, while Martin claimed a wild-card selection. Gray, a true freshman, was one win away from earning All-

America honors at the NCAA Championships at 134 pounds. For his efforts, Gray earned a spot on the *Amateur Wrestling News*' Freshman All-America Team at 134 pounds and was named Rookie of the Year by the Colonial Athletic Association.

During Mourlam's first season as head coach, John Dattalo and Hall earned bids to the NCAA Championships after winning their respective weight classes at the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament, while Martin claimed one of only two wild-card selections. Mourlam tutored Dattalo and Hall to conference honors as well during the 1996-97 season as Dattalo was named the Colonial Athletic Association's Wrestler of the Year and Hall earned Rookie of the Year honors. In addition to CAA awards, the standout freshmen, Hall and Martin, garnered spots on *Amateur Wrestling News*' Freshman All-America Team at their respective weight classes.

Mourlam continues to put Virginia Tech wrestling on the map as the Hokies accepted an invitation three years ago to join the highly-competitive Eastern Wrestling League.

Mourlam had the opportunity to continue his coaching expertise in national competition as he served as the head coach for the United States freestyle team at the Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada in 1998. The previous year he served as the assistant coach for the United States Senior team at the Pan American Games in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Mourlam came to Tech as a standout coach and collegiate wrestler. The 1977 Iowa graduate has been a part of four NCAA Championship teams — two as a student-athlete in 1975 and '76, and two as the assistant coach at his alma mater in 1985 and '86. During his senior year, Mourlam was the Big Ten Conference champion and runner-up for the NCAA title at 126 pounds.

Following his illustrious college career, Mourlam continued competing and was a two-time United States Wrestling Federation freestyle champion in 1981 and '82. During those two years, he traveled as a member of an international team competing in Germany, Cuba and Hungary.

Immediately out of college, Mourlam became the assistant coach at the University of Northern Iowa for a two-year stint. He then moved on to assist nationally-recognized head coach Dan Gable at his alma mater, Iowa, for three years. Gaining


> considerable experience with a highly respected coach and collegiate program, Mourlam worked as an assistant from 1984 until 1987 when he took over the position of administrative assistant. In that position, Mourlam had the opportunity to run the Dan Gable Training Camps.

"Keith is very intense and knows the sport inside and out," former Iowa head coach Dan Gable said. "He is an excellent teacher and has a great ability to communicate his knowledge of the sport to his athletes. Keith has been around championship teams and knows what it takes to win. He will do an excellent job at Virginia Tech."

Mourlam was named the Wrestling Coach of the Year for Division II & III Virginia collegiate state champion Newport News Apprentice School for two consecutive years in 1994 and 1995. He

was head coach there until accepting the assistant job at Tech.

Mourlam expanded his coaching expertise from the collegiate ranks to international competition beginning in 1992 when he was the assistant coach of the Senior United States wrestling team. Among his long list of coaching accomplishments, Mourlam has acted as the head coach of the championship East team in the 1994 Olympic Festival, head coach of the 1995 USA Senior Freestyle team and head coach of the 1995 USA World Espior Freestyle team.



DAN WIRNSBERGER • ASSISTANT COACH



In keeping with the notion that successful teaching leads to successful learning, head coach Keith Mourlam will once again team up with NCAA All-American Dan Wirnsberger to tutor the 1999-2000 Virginia Tech wrestling team for the fifth consecutive year.

Serving as a workout partner to all three of Tech's 1997 NCAA participants, all four of

the Hokies' 1998 NCAA qualifiers and all five of the 1999 qualifiers, Wirnsberger played a large role in what could be three of the Hokies' most successful consecutive wrestling seasons to date. He helped lead senior John Dattalo to CAA Wrestler of the Year honors, as well as freshmen Eric Hall and Chris Martin to Amateur Wrestling News Freshman All-America accolades in 1997. He helped guide the Hokies to the CAA dual-meet title, CAA Tournament title and a school-record four wrestlers to the NCAA Championships last season.

Last year, he was instrumental in helping Mike Akers, Sean Gray, Eric Hall, Scott Justus and Chris Martin qualify for the NCAA Championships. He also helped Mourlam and the squad take a surprising third place at the EWL Championships and 19th at the NCAA Championships.

Still competing, Wirnsberger joined the Dave Schultz Wrestling Club while training for the 1997 World Team Trials. He qualified for the trials after placing sixth at the USA Senior Freestyle Tournament, his first senior competition. Participating at a higher weight class of 167 pounds, Wirnsberger defeated such renowned opponents as two-time NCAA champion Marcus Mollica of Arizona State and Iowa's NCAA champion Darryl Weber.

Wirnsberger, a 1995 graduate of Michigan State University, was a highly-touted grappler at his alma mater in the 158-pound

Viola comes to Virginia Tech after graduating from the University of Michigan, where he wrestled.

A native of Chespeake, Va., Viola was a standout wrestler at Western Branch High School. weight class from 1990-95. The Greer, S.C., native earned All-America honors during his sophomore, junior and senior seasons under head coach Tom Minkel.

A three-year captain of the squad, Wirnsberger was named the team's MVP in 1995. During the season, he captured Big Ten honors as the wrestling



champion in his weight division. Continuing on to national competition, he was runner-up for the title of NCAA champion.

Michigan State wrestling was struggling in 1990 when Wirnsberger entered the program as a freshman. The grapplers finished at the bottom of the Big Ten rankings that year, but worked up to an 11th-place national ranking in his second year, seventh in his third and third in the nation during his senior season.

After graduation, Wirnsberger began work as a coach for the Mason (Michigan) Youth Wrestling Program. He later moved back to South Carolina where he served as head wrestling coach at Greer High School. In addition to his head coaching duties, Wirnsberger was the junior varsity football coach and taught classes for autistic students at the Greer Middle School.

At Tech, Wirnsberger is responsible for organizing practices, supervising the strength and conditioning program and individual workouts. He also organizes Tech's team and individual summer camps.

Wirnsberger is engaged to Dana Bottiglieri. The couple will be married in July, 2001.

1999–2000 REVIEW Hokies Placed 19th at NCAA Championships, Third at EWLs

Coming off a long 1998-99 campaign, Virginia Tech wrestling coach Keith Mourlam knew that the 1999-00 wrestling season could only go up. And after redshirting most of his top stars a year ago, he had high hopes for the Hokies in 1999-00.



Scott Justus was one of five Tech wrestlers who qualified for the NCAA Championships last year.

After a 2-13 campiagn the year before, the Hokies rebounded with a successful 10-7 campaign. Although Tech went just 2-5 in Eastern Wrestling League dual matches. the team came together to pull off a surprising third-place finish at the conference tournament. Mourlam pulled another surprise when the Hokies placed 19th at the NCAA Championships. The Hokies had five wrestlers - Mike Akers, Sean Gray, Eric Hall, Scott Justus

and Chris Martin — qualify for the NCAA Championships while Gray and Martin each earned All-America honors. Martin took fourth place at 165 pounds while Gray placed seventh at 141 pounds. Both won the EWL Championships at their respective weight classes.

The Hokies opened the 1999-00 season with a resounding 47-6 dual meet win over Anderson College at home. Up next was the Hokies' annual trip to the Navy Classic. Tech finished sixth in the tournament. Sean Gray (141 pounds) and Chris Martin (165 pounds) each won their weight classes while Christian Basnight (107 pounds) took second and Scott Justus (184) took third.

Following the Navy Classic, Mourlam's grapplers went to the tough Sheridan Invitational and earned a fourth-place finish. Tech had six wrestlers place and Gray won his weight class.

Next, Tech opened its EWL schedule with a 27-6 loss to Edinboro on the road. The Hokies bounced right back, winning three matches at the Virginia Duals. Tech knocked off Rider, North Carolina and Harvard.

Tech then recorded a split, defeating Bloomsburg, 24-15, before falling to Lock Haven, 31-14, the next day. The Hokies then hosted the Virginia State Championships and came away with the title. Basnight, Gray, Martin and Doug Easlick each won the title at their respective weight classes.

The Hokies would then go on to beat VMI and Virginia while dropping matches to Pittsburgh, West Virginia and Cleveland State. Tech won its final two matches of the regular season, beating Findlay and EWL foe Clarion.


Tech wrapped up the season by competing in its second Eastern Wrestling League tournament. The Hokies took a surprising third place with Gray and Martin winning titles.

At the NCAA Championships, Tech scored 27.50 points to earn a 19th-place finish in the nation. Nineteenth place was thirdbest among EWL schools.








team league. The EWL currently has 39 qualifiers for the NCAA Wrestling Championships, the third most qualifiers in the country behind the Big Ten and Pac-10 Conferences. This past season, the EWL crowned nine All-Americans and had five teams finish in the Top 30 at the NCAA Championships.

The EWL was formed in 1976 with Bloomsburg, Clarion,

Lock Haven, Penn State, Pittsburgh and Buffalo as its charter members. After Buffalo left the league in 1978, Cleveland State and West Virginia were added. Millersville was briefly a member from 1982 to 1984. In 1989, Edinboro was added before Penn State left for the Big Ten at the conclusion of the 1992 season.

Virginia Tech is in a transition period in regard to its conference affiliation. The

Enter Charles W. Steger. His assessment? "We have to rev the engines even higher. If you're not moving guickly forward, you might as well be standing still," says the energetic 53-year-old president.

Appointed president by the university board effective January 7, 2000, Steger possesses the breadth and depth of experience to lead Virginia Tech at the point when higher education must learn to cope with major technology changes permeating education.

Steger has lofty goals for Virginia's leading research university. "I would like to see us ranked among the nation's top 30 universities before the end of the decade," says Steger.

A registered architect and former dean of Tech's college of architecture and urban studies. Steger was the architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which concluded in 1998, raised \$337 million, \$87 million over its goal.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his Bachelor and Masters of Architecture and a Ph.D. in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Janet, have two sons - David and Christopher.

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 55, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his three years on

the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment

thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech enters competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001 season.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Already complete is the expansion of the North end zone for the 2000 season that will total over 5.000 permanent seats. South end zone bleachers will be replaced by permanent double-deck stands with seating for approximately 12,000 fans.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS

The success of Virginia Tech's wrestling program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech studentathletes has improved each year due in part to the Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs (SAOAEP).

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They delight and entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Contrary to popular opinion, not all athletes carry full scholarships and many are only partially funded.

Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential. The ultimate goal is for all student-athletes to successfully complete their degree. The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

Tech has made tremendous strides in recent years. The 1999 NCAA Division I Graduation Report states that for studentathletes who have exhausted their eligibility at Tech, 81 percent have graduated. Last spring, the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast paid tribute to a record 353 student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs who posted 3.0 or greater QCAs in the 1998 calendar year.

The Student-athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAOAEP office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab houses over 20 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum. Room 160 in Cassell Coliseum provides an area for private quiet study for the athletes' convenience. Additionally, student-athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site offices located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice, or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time. The Student-athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs is comprised of a coordinator, an associate coordinator, three assistant coordinators and a secretary forming a group of professionals serving the needs of all student-athletes.

The coordinator, Chris Helms, is responsible for the development and

leadership of SAOAEP. Helms, in his second year at Tech, is responsible for the wrestling team. Helms comes to Tech from Michigan State University where he served as the

assistant director of the Student-athlete Support Services office. Prior to MSU, Helms served as the coordinator of academic affairs for the Florida State University football program.

Lois Berg is in her 11th year at Tech.

She is also in charge of developing the freshman orientation program, which ensures the student-athlete a smooth transition from high school to the university.

Colin Howlett is in his third year with SAOAEP and is administratively responsible for the tutorial program that includes hiring, training and assigning of approximately 60 tutors each semester.

Katie Ammons, a former Hokie swimmer, is charged with the operation of the HEAT lab and other computing resources available for student-athletes.

Terrie Repass begins her 25th year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office receptionist and "first contact" person for the SAOAEP. She is responsible for organizing special events and meetings for the office. Repass prepares all accounting, purchasing and travel transactions for the office.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

For the Virginia Tech wrestling team, the strength and conditioning program, under the direction of Assistant Athletic Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, plays a very important role. A Durham, N.C., native, Gentry received a bachelor's in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979. Gentry received his master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel

Hill in 1981 where he worked as an assistant strength coach. He then went to East Carolina University and was elevated to head strength coach there in 1982. He worked at ECU until he came to Virginia Tech in 1987.


Gentry completed work for his Ph. D., at Virginia Tech this past summer.

Sano is in his fourth season at Tech after serving as a graduate assistant at ECU. Boswell, in her first year in Blacksburg, handles strength and conditioning for many of Tech's women's sports.

He received his B.A., in physical education from Emory & Henry, where he played football, in 1995 and his master's in physical education from Radford in 1998. A native of Radford, Va., Johnson is working toward his doctorate in health promotions at Tech.
