2000-2001 Outlook

New Coach, Returning Players Set High Goals

The combination of a new coach and the return of the top six players has the 2001 Virginia Tech women's tennis team setting high goals for the 2001 season. Lisa Hart, entering her first season at Tech after taking over for Anne Jones-Thompson who resigned after 16 years, believes the 2001 edition of the Hokies has the potential to achieve great things in the upcoming season.

With the top six players returning from last year's 18-8 squad, Tech will be a force to contend with in its first year in the BIG EAST Conference. The 2000 squad won Tech's fifth consecutive Atlantic 10 Championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight year. Coach Hart believes the tremendous experience gained by last year's team will provide a solid foundation for the Hokies in 2001.

"We have a great deal of experience with our top six players returning from last year," said Hart. "I expect Ines Khelifi, Kristen Stubbs and Antonella Pozzi to play at the top of the lineup with the remainder of the players battling for the No. 4 through No. 6 positions. There is a tremendous amount of parity in our lineup, which definitely adds to the strength of our team."

The Hokies return senior Antonella Pozzi, a 2001 co-captain, who will be relied upon to provide leadership both on and off the court. She returns following a 16-9 season playing in the middle of the lineup.

Pozzi was ranked as high as 72nd in 1998 before a shoulder injury sidelined her for the spring season. "Antonella is the smartest player on our team," Hart said. "She instinctively knows where to hit every ball and steps up on the big points. We will look to her as the team co-captain to provide leadership for the younger players."

Kristen Stubbs, the other co-captain of the 2001 squad, returns for her sophomore season after a tremendous freshman campaign. Stubbs was named Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Year and was selected to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference team. She compiled a 29-10 record while playing in the top three positions, exceeding all expectations, and her efforts earned a No. 23 ranking in the Eastern Region.

"Krisy leads by her tremendous work ethic and by her tenacity and focus on the court," Hart said. "She believes she can beat anyone in the country and plays with that mindset. We look for her to play at the top of our lineup and follow-up her outstanding freshman season with another great season."

The other player expected to compete at the top of the Hokies' lineup is junior Ines Khelifi. Named as the Atlantic 10 Most Outstanding Player last year, Khelifi has a powerful all-court game and has improved her endurance in preparation for the upcoming season. Khelifi was second on the team in victories with 22, playing mainly at the No. 1 position. She

should battle Pozzi and Stubbs for the top spot. "Ines has dedicated herself to tennis over last summer and into the fall," stated Hart. "Her net game has improved dramatically over the past year as well as her quickness and overall endurance. Ines has the ability and talent to obtain a national ranking in both singles and doubles."

The battle for the Nos. 4-6 positions will be intense with several players in contention. Bridget Bruner was an impressive 21-6 in her freshman season after transferring from the University of Maryland. "Bridget is a solid player with the ability to take her game to the next level," said Hart. "Also, her ability to succeed with several different doubles partners makes her an invaluable asset to our lineup. From a coach's perspective, Bridget is a player that you want on the court when a match is still in doubt."

All Atlantic 10 performer Michele Martaus will see action in the lineup in her senior season for the Hokies. "It is hard to determine where Michele will play in the lineup this spring due to injuries she battled in the fall," Hart said. "However, on or off the court, Martaus will make a positive impact on the team and serve as a great team leader."

Kristin Lanio experienced considerable success during her freshman season with a 21-13 mark and has the ability to contribute anywhere in the lineup. "Kristin's positive mindset on the court is a tremendous asset to her game," Hart said. "She is one of the most coachable players on the team."

Others who could break into the lineup during the season are juniors Kim Karli, Danielle Faucher, Monica Archondo, and freshmen Kristin Moran and Elizabeth Gordon. "Each of these players add depth to our lineup and are an asset to the Hokie women's tennis team," said Hart.

The BIG EAST Conference does not have a regular season schedule in tennis. Six teams will be selected to participate in the BIG EAST Championships by a committee with emphasis on national ranking (Top 75) followed by head-to-head results vs. BIG EAST opponents, and record vs. common opponents. The Hokies, ranked No. 59 in the preseason, will face a tough schedule featuring nine ranked opponents including a date at No. 13 Notre Dame in the third match of the spring season. Other ranked opponents include Western Michigan, Clemson, Old Dominion, Miami, Georgia Tech, Florida International, Virginia and Virginia Commonwealth.

"If all of our players are healthy and play their best tennis on the same day, we can compete with any team in the country," said Hart. "The key to our success will be staying healthy and developing our strengths. We have tremendous depth throughout our roster so if we do have injuries the drop-off will not be as dramatic. If our young players continue to progress and build on last year's success we will have an exciting team capable of reaching all of our goals and more this season."

Tech Earns ITA Academic Team Award For Fourth Straight Year

Each year the Intercollegiate Tennis Association sponsors an award for teams that achieve and maintain high academic standards. For the past four years, the Virginia Tech women's tennis team has earned the ITA All-American Academic Team honor. This accolade is not an easy one to achieve.

For the 1996-1997 academic year the team received the award for a total team grade point average of 3.2. The Hokies, never settling for less, earned the award for the 1997-1998 academic year with an overall GPA of 3.3. They made it three straight with a 3.3 average again for 1998-99. The squad followed up the past success winning the award for the fourth consecutive year with a 3.3 GPA for 1999-2000.

"I think it is wonderful how dedicated the players are to their academics," said head coach Lisa Hart. "It is commendable how well they manage their time between all of the hours on the tennis court, weight room, attending classes, and studying."

The Virginia Tech women's tennis program strives to build upon each year's success. Out of all of the Virginia Tech athletic teams, the women's tennis team continues to hold one of the highest overall team GPA's. In the fall of this year the team continued its academic success with a GPA of 3.39 overall.

"I am extremely proud of all of the girls' commitment to excellence in the classroom," added Hart.

Meet the Coaches

Head Coach

Enthusiasm is defined as, "something inspiring zeal or fervor." The definition also describes Virginia Tech head women's tennis coach Lisa Hart who has not stopped smiling since arriving in Blacksburg.

Hart was named the sixth women's tennis head coach by Director of Athletics Jim Weaver on July 10, 2000, replacing Anne Jones-Thompson who retired at the end of the 2000 season.

In making the announcement, Weaver stated, "I'm very pleased that Lisa has joined the Tech athletic staff as our women's tennis coach. With her experience at Nebraska as both a player and a coach, she brings the necessary tools to build upon the tradition our program has enjoyed under the leadership of Anne Jones-Thompson during her 16-year tenure."

Hart comes to Tech after serving as the assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Nebraska for the last two years. While she was on the Nebraska staff, the Cornhuskers compiled a two-year record of 36-13, including a 19-5 worksheet in 2000.

"I'm really excited about the opportunity to coach the women's tennis program at Virginia Tech," said Hart. "Virginia Tech is a good program with a solid tradition, winning five-straight Atlantic 10 Conference titles and making five NCAA Tournament appearances. With all six starters returning from last year's squad, I hope that we can make an impact in our first year as a member in the BIG EAST Conference."

Hart was a tennis standout at Nebraska, finishing her career as one of the most successful women's tennis players in school history. She recorded a 74-40 career singles mark, winning the Big 12 Conference No. 2 singles title as a senior.

Hart, the 1995 Big Eight Freshman of the Year, was the first women's tennis player at Nebraska to win a conference singles title since 1978 and only the sixth player ever. She was selected to the all-conference team twice and her 74 wins rank No. 3 on the school's career singles victory list.

Her dedication and excellence on the court were matched in the classroom as Hart was a three-time academic all-conference selection, earning first-team academic All-Big 12 honors as a senior. She was selected by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association as the Central Region's "Cissie Learie Sportsmanship Award" winner, one of six throughout the country. As a senior, Hart also received the Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship Award.

A Washington native, Hart had an outstanding high school career at Sunnyside High where she was a three-time state champion. She also earned All-American honors as a high school sophomore.

Hart earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Nebraska and also holds a master's degree in education with an emphasis in physical education and sports studies from Nebraska.

Hart, and her husband John who completed a law degree from Nebraska in May 2000, reside in Christiansburg, Va.

Thompson Goes Out on Top With Fifth Straight Atlantic 10 Championship

The Virginia Tech women's tennis team gave Coach Anne Jones-Thompson the perfect retirement present by winning a fifth consecutive Atlantic 10 Championship and advancing to the NCAA Tournament. Thompson, who announced her resignation on February 2, 2000, was a former Tech player who had coached the team since 1984. The Hokies, who finished the season 18-8, advanced to the NCAA regional championships for the fifth consecutive year.

The Hokies, decimated by injuries during the 1998-99 season, were successful due to the tremendous contribution from several underclassmen. Freshman Kristen Stubbs posted a 29-10 record and a No. 23 ranking in the Eastern Region. Stubbs had an outstanding freshman season, including a 9-0 record at the No. 2 position with a big victory against Alabama. She also had a 16-10 doubles record and was 5-2 in three-set matches. For her accomplishments, Stubbs was named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference team and also was named the Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Year.

Sophomore Ines Khelifi, a highly touted recruit from Canada and 2000 Atlantic 10 Most Outstanding Player, backed up her solid freshman season with a 22-15 record playing at the top of the Tech lineup. Khelifi posted a couple of big wins during the season against nationally-ranked Virginia Commonwealth. She also proved her versatility and adaptability by playing with five different doubles partners over the course of the season.

Freshman Kristin Lanio had an outstanding rookie campaign, recording 21 victories while moving up and down the Tech lineup in the No. 2 through No. 6 positions. Lanio also helped the Hokies in doubles with 12 wins.

Bridget Bruner, a freshman transfer from the University of Maryland, was a pleasant surprise with a 21-6 record at the No. 3 through No. 5 positions. Her .778 match-winning percentage led the team and she also produced a 14-10 doubles record.

Michelle Martaus proved to be a valuable asset to the team playing at the top three positions in the lineup and being named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference team.

The Hokies started the season off slowly with a 3-3 record before reeling off nine straight victories. Tech entered the Atlantic 10 Championships with a 14-6 record and rolled to its fifth consecutive title by a combined score of 15-1 over three opponents. Tech built momentum heading into the national tournament with a 5-4 win over No. 43 Virginia Commonwealth. The Hokies then traveled to Winston-Salem, N.C., for the NCAA Regional Championships where they were eliminated by host and third-ranked Wake Forest. Tech ended the season with a No. 63 national ranking and an 18-8 record.

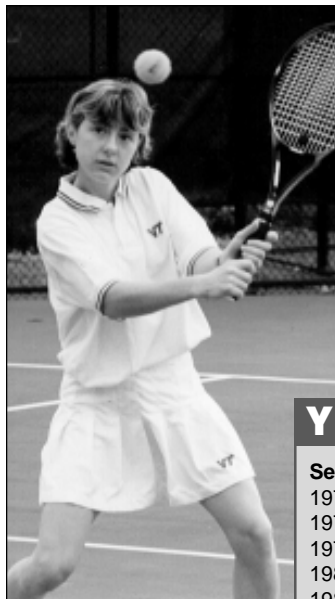

History

In 1977, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department made tennis the school's second women's varsity sport, one year after the women's basketball squad first took the court as a varsity team.

Carolyn Owen was named the tennis team's first head coach after Jo Kafer, former assistant athletic director for women's sports, helped upgrade tennis from club to varsity status. Owen served as both the women's basketball coach and as the women's tennis coach in 1977-78.

Anne Thompson, who later coached the team for 16 years, and her twin sister Lynne Jones were the first recipients of athletic scholarships for women at Tech.

Owen coached the 1977-78 squad to an 11-2 record, a second-place finish in the state and a sixth-place finish in the AIAW regional tournament. Owen resigned after the 1977-78 season and was replaced by engineering professor and local tennis player Karen Frair.

In its second year as a varsity sport, the team was led by No. 1 player Jill Allen and No. 2 Ann Grubbs. Grubbs and Allen finished second in the state while leading the Hokies to an overall record of 8-7. Tech again finished second in the Virginia State Championships.

In the 1979-80 season, Frair recruited several nationally ranked junior players, led by Annette Tector from Stoughton, Mass., and Andrea Fink from Glen Ridge, N.J. Friar coached the team through the fall of 1979 and then left to pursue other endeavors.

Larsen Bowker, who retired in 1998 as the Tech men's tennis coach, replaced Friar and led the team to an 11-8 record. Bowker coached the squad from January 1980 to May 1983. During this time, the women's team went 35-26, won the Mid-Atlantic Tennis Championships in 1982, finished second in the state twice and earned third in the Metro Conference three consecutive years.

Annette Tector won the state individual championship in 1981 and finished second in the Metro Conference in 1981 and 1983. Andrea Fink won the Metro Conference title in 1982 and joined Tector to finish second in doubles in 1982.

Bowker, who is now a volunteer assistant for the women's team, resigned after the spring season and was replaced by Jeff Murray.

Hokies Make Transition to BIG EAST

Virginia Tech became a BIG EAST Conference all-sports member at the beginning of the 2000-2001 academic year.

The new conference affiliation marks the first time Tech has been a member of a single all-sports conference since leaving the Southern Conference to become an independent in 1965. Since then, the Hokies also competed as a member of the Metro Conference in all sports except football from 1978 to 1995 and were a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference in all sports except football from 1995 until 2000.

Tech, a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference which was formed in 1991, is the 14th member of the conference, which conducts 20 championships in 16 men's and women's sports. The Hokies conduct varsity programs in 15 BIG EAST sports.

In its five years as a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference, Tech enjoyed tremendous success. The men's and women's tennis teams each won the conference championship every year in the league, and other Hokie teams also fared well in A-10 play.

Tech really hit the jackpot in 1998-99, winning championships in eight of the 18 conference sports in which its teams participated, and winning the Commissioner's Cup as the league's outstanding athletics program.

Murray coached the team for one year before Thompson took the reins.

In the 16 years that Thompson coached the team, the Hokies won 260 matches and lost 159. The team finished third in the Metro six times, won the Eastern Collegiate Invitational in 1988, claimed five Atlantic 10 championship titles, won the 1998 ECAC Team Tournament Championship and had Tech's first nationally ranked women's tennis players, Maria Lochiatto and Leslie Seward. Lochiatto and Seward finished 26th in doubles in 1988 and Laurie Shiflet was ranked 123rd in singles in 1989.

Tech has also had 18 regionally-ranked players, eight All-Metro selections, 52 players named to the Metro Conference Commissioner's List for Academic Excellence, 27 All-Atlantic 10 Conference selections and 20 All-Atlantic 10 Academic Team selections.

Despite playing tough competition, Virginia Tech women's tennis teams continue to post winning records. The Hokies' overall record is 328-207 for a winning percentage of 61 percent. Still considered young by other collegiate sports standards, the Virginia Tech tennis program will continue to grow and improve in the years to come.

Support Services

OFFICE OF ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS

Finding a balance between academic accomplishments and athletic success is the focus for student athletes at Virginia Tech, and the Student Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs (SAOAEPP) takes a very personal role in the supervision and support of all student-athletes. The advising office continuously engages with other campus agencies to help student athletes in their continuing pursuit of academic achievement.

The Student Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs provides programming for student athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education.

Tech has made tremendous strides in recent years. The 2000 NCAA Division I Graduation Report states that for overall student athletes who have exhausted their eligibility at Tech, 81 percent have graduated.

Last spring, the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast paid tribute to a record 358 student athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs who posted 3.0 or greater QCA's in the 1999 calendar year.

Academic facilities for student athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAOAEPP office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab houses over 25 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum. Room 160 in Cassell Coliseum

provides an area for private quiet study for the athletes' convenience. Additionally, student athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site offices located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls.

The Student Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs is comprised of coordinator Chris Helms, associate coordinator Lois Berg and three assistant coordinators — Renia Edwards, Colin Howlett and Katie Ammons. Terrie Repass is the office receptionist and "first contact" person for the SAOAEPP.

Helms, in his second year at Tech, is responsible for the overall development and leadership of the SAOAEPP. Helms came to Tech

from Michigan State, where he served as the assistant director of the Student Athlete Support Services office. Prior to that, he served as the coordinator of academic affairs for the Florida State football program and was an academic advisor at Central Connecticut State. Helms earned a bachelor's degree in psychology at Wake Forest and a master's in athletic counseling from Springfield College.

Berg, in her 12th year at Tech, handles the advising for the tennis teams.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

For the Virginia Tech women's tennis team, the strength and conditioning program, under the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, plays a very important role.

A Durham, N.C. native, Gentry received a bachelor's in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979. Gentry received his master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981 where he worked as an assistant strength coach. He then went to East Carolina University and was elevated to head strength coach there in 1982. He worked at ECU until he came to Virginia Tech in 1987.

Gentry earned an Ed.D. in curriculum and instruction at Virginia Tech in 1999, with an emphasis in motor behavior.

Assisting Gentry this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Sonny Sano, director of strength and

conditioning, Jay Johnson, strength and conditioning coordinator for men's Olympic sports and Michelle Boswell, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports.

Boswell, in her first year at Tech after serving as strength coach at East Carolina University, handles strength and conditioning for the women's tennis team. She received a bachelor's of science degree in exercise physiology from East Carolina in 1998. Boswell earned a master's degree in athletic administration from ECU in 2000. She is currently a competitive track and field athlete competing in the hammer throw. Boswell recently competed in the 2000 Olympic Trials in the hammerthrow and was an NCAA All-American in 1999.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department prides itself on providing the most current and comprehensive care available to all of its student-athletes.

Under the leadership and guidance of Dr. Duane Lagan, director of sports medicine, and Mike Goforth, director of athletic training, the team of general practitioners, orthopedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists and sports psychologists have assembled to form one of the finest sports medicine partnerships in the nation.

The Hokies are fortunate to have the services of a full complement of professional medical personnel available, including orthopedic, physical therapy, chiropractic, dental, and nutritional consultants.

Ron Esteban is in his first year in charge of the athletic training for the women's tennis team, but he is no stranger to the Virginia Tech athletic

program. He earned a bachelor's degree in sports medicine in 1991 and a master's in athletic administration from Tech in 1993.

Plans are underway to further enhance the training support by consolidating the training rooms in Cassell Coliseum to one centralized area. This will further enhance the availability of the training staff as well as better equip the staff to care for the needs of the student-athletes. The centralized area in Cassell will provide all the training services and that will allow the Merryman Center to be used for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy.

Student-athletes also have access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully-operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians. A staff psychologist, located in the Cook Counseling Center, is also available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues.

Tech Campus Is Home to a First-Class Tennis Facility

With the opening of the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center in the spring of 1992, Virginia Tech added another first-class athletic complex to a group of athletic facilities already considered to be one of the finest in the East.

The tennis center, located across from Lane Stadium, offers six outdoor courts with bleacher seating, six indoor courts with a mezzanine viewing area with bleachers, locker rooms, coaches' offices, a team room and a social area.

The tennis center was made possible by gifts from Dave and Betty Burrows of Roanoke; their son Jack Burrows and his wife Lee, of Roanoke; and their daughter Beverly and her husband, Bobby Burleson, of Tallahassee, Fla. Jack Burrows and Bobby Burleson were teammates on Tech's tennis team in the late 60's. Jack was an NCAA participant and is a member of the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame.

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

Virginia Tech is located in Blacksburg, Va., about 40 miles southwest of Roanoke. If you fly into Roanoke Regional Airport, take Interstate 581 to Interstate 81 South. To reach the campus from I-81, take Exit 118-B (Christiansburg) onto U.S. Route 460 West. Follow the 460 Blacksburg Bypass and turn right onto Rt. 314. A large campus map is located at this entrance to the university. When you take the 314 exit onto the Tech campus, you will see the football facility, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field, ahead to the left.

To get to the Burrows-Burleson Tennis center, turn right on Tech Center Drive across from the stadium. The tennis complex will be on the right approximately a quarter of a mile up the road.

If you are traveling to Tech through West Virginia, travel on 460 East and take the Virginia Tech exit (Rt. 314) to the Tech campus. From the south, drive on Interstate 81 north to the second Christiansburg exit and follow the directions listed above.



With six courts indoors and six courts outdoors, the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center is a great home for the Hokies. The center was honored with the USTA Outstanding Tennis Facility Award in 1999.
